Tommy Foster Local 4-H Club Boy Wins Honors

Tommy Foster has been selected as one of the 4-H Club members to be honored at the Sears-Roebuck Foundation-San Antonio Livestock Exposition Rural Youth Honoree Banquet on Friday, February 7, in the Gunter Hotel. He is one of two boys selected in the twenty-two county area which makes up Extension District 7.

The banquet each year honors a number of boys and girls from the 4-H Clubs, the FFA Chapters, and the F H A Chapters in Southwest Texas. It is an annual affair sponsored by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation and the San Antonio Livestock Exposition which honors rural youth for their achievements. In addition to the boys and girls, the county extension agents and teachers with honorees also attend.

Tommy was selected on the basis of his 4-H Club record. He has been a member of the club for 5 years. During that time he has fed fat lambs and range ewes. His lambs have been shown at the local county show, at the Odessa, Abilene, San Antonio, and San Angelo shows where they have won ribbons. In addition to his livestock projects, Tommy has been on several range judging teams and grass identification teams. The teams of which he was a member have won the district contest as well as several other contests and placed in the top three at the state 4-H club contests at College Station.

In December of last year, Tommy received the Gold Star Award at the District 7 Luncheon in San Angelo. The Gold Star is the highest award a club member can receive at the county level; it can be won only one time. Other awards he has won include achievement, range management and agricultural program.

Tommy has also carried on a range management demonstration for several years. As a part of the demonstration, he collected and identified over seventy range plants growing on his father's ranch and in the surrounding area. He placed second in this division in the district in '62.

In addition to the banquet, the honorees receive tickets to the Saturday afternoon performance of the rodeo. The Livestock Exposition also provides them with gold official badges which entitle them to free admission to the show grounds during the show.

Tommy will be showing a crossbred lamb in the lamb show on Saturday morning. He will be accompanied to San Antonio by his parents.

LIONS CLUB

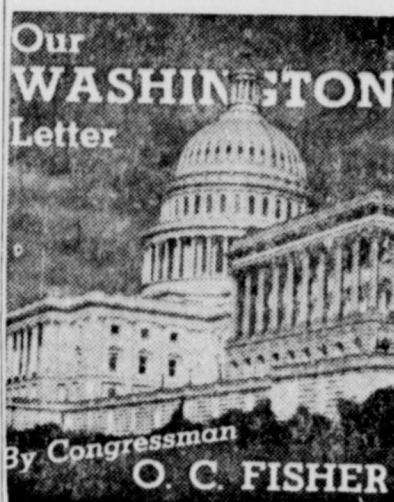
The Lions Club met at noon Wednesday in the community center for the regular weekly luncheon. Cary Tomerlin was a guest.

History is being made in the House in action on the mislabeled Civil Rights Bill, now being debated. One thing is admitted, by both friend and foe of the legislation; it is undoubtedly the most revolutionary legislation submitted to Congress since the Force bills of the Reconstruction era.

If enacted in its present form, rights and privileges enjoyed by American people since the enactment of the Constitution will be drastically curtailed, and subjected to direct federal harassment and control.

For example, the Bill would for the first time bring the American educational system—public and private—under substantial Federal control by allowing the President to control the placement of pupils in local schools, and allow him to approve the faculty, censor textbooks, and even change study courses, as these things pertain to races and religion. The alternative would be loss of Federal aid.

It creates an FEPC, giving power to a federal agency to dictate to the storekeeper on Main Street, whom he can hire, fire, or promote; and the offender can be sent to jail without a jury trial if he disobeys. The bill grants \$10 million a year to hire Federal inspectors to run herd on American business, and control their hiring and firing policies.

In 1883, the U.S. Supreme Court held unconstitutional a law enacted by a Union-dominated Congress, during the post-war period of hysteria, which made it illegal for any private business to refuse to serve or otherwise do business with anyone. The court then held that such a law was contrary to the enjoyment of private property rights guaranteed under the Constitution.

Despite that decision, never before challenged, this bill re-enacts a so-called "public accommodations" provision, and again makes it illegal to do what the Supreme Court in 1883 held an American citizen had a right to do, in the exercise of his property rights.

These are but a few of a score of provisions which strike heavy blows at private and property rights of American citizens. Even many of its sponsors frankly admit that the bill expands Federal power over the social, educational and economic activities of the average citizen, on a scale never proposed in American history. Actually, the civil rights feature is incidental. It destroys and nullifies far more civil rights than it protects.

Mrs. Jim Dukes says that the years are passing too fast to suit her. She and Jim are now great grandparents.

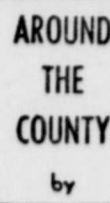

The steer on the I.W. Terry ranch about 25 miles southwest of Sterling City mentioned in last week's column died of rabies according to the report received from the Texas State Department of Public Health Laboratory in Austin. The head of the steer was removed, taken to San Angelo where the brain was removed by a veterinarian, and sent to the laboratory for diagnosis.

According to the telephone report made to Dr. Swann late Wednesday evening, the test showed the brain to be positive for rabies. Two persons are currently taking the fourteen shot series of injections for prevention. They were exposed through handling the animal for treatment three days before it died. This brings the total to seven persons taking the shots in the last two months.

A string of thirty-one consecutive days in which no screwworms were positively identified in Texas was broken on January 21. This was the first case since December 20; it was also the first case of the year, '64.

The case was confirmed in Wilson County near the town of Sutherland Springs about 30 miles southeast of San Antonio and near the town of Floresville. The December case came from Hidalgo County on the Rio Grande River.

In 1963, twenty-nine cases were confirmed in the month of January. The case this year was the only one in six southwestern states of the U. S. and Mexico as well. There were twenty-nine non-screwworm cases this month.

To combat the case in Wilson County, program officials immediately dispersed 100,000 sterile flies in the area. Inspectors are spraying livestock in the herd and in the surrounding area. A case of worms missed now could mean trouble in the near future. In spite of extremely cold weather over all of Texas in the past few weeks, a few flies will escape freezing. One fly that started one case could snowball into a large number if allowed to run its course and live out the cycle.

To keep the program working at its best, all livestock producers are urged to maintain constant vigilance for

screwworms. With the heavy feeding under way, nearly all producers are seeing their stock every day or every day and can be members of the "screwworm vigilantes." To protect your investment in the program, inspect livestock, report all cases immediately, and send in a sample.

There's still time to inspect your fruit and nut trees for evidence of scale and treat them if any is present. Scale is a tiny insect about the size of a pinhead which attaches itself to the limbs and trunks of fruit and nut trees. It has the appearance of a small, dirty white snail. Generally, it attacks trees that are not in top condition and will result in the death of the tree if allowed to go unchecked.

Treatment, if it is to be effective, must be accomplished during the dormant period of the tree. The best treatment is a spray consisting of 3½ gallons of oil emulsion in one hundred gallons of water. This must be applied before the buds begin to form as the oil will burn them. In severe cases, two treatments about thirty days apart are recommended. Commercial preparations of the oil emulsion are available on the market.

315 Poll Taxes Sold

A total of 315 poll taxes were sold in Sterling County this year. There are about that many persons over the poll tax paying age of 60, so more than 600 voters will be eligible to vote this year in Sterling County, said a deputy in the county tax assessor's office.

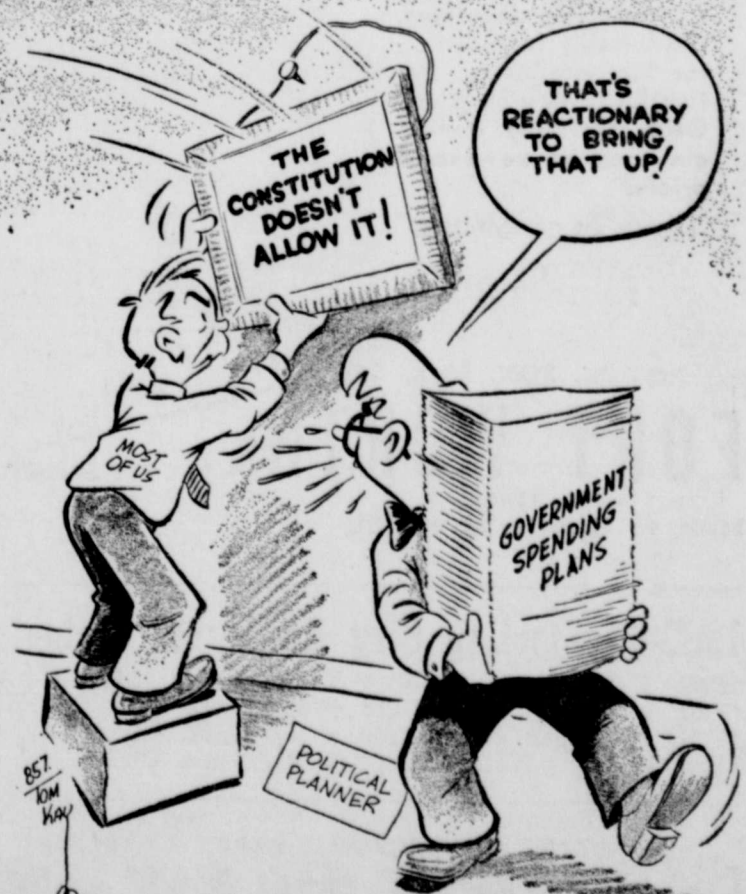
Sophomore Fiesta February 21

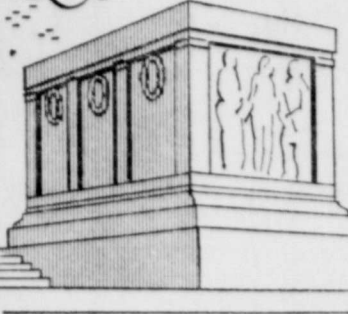

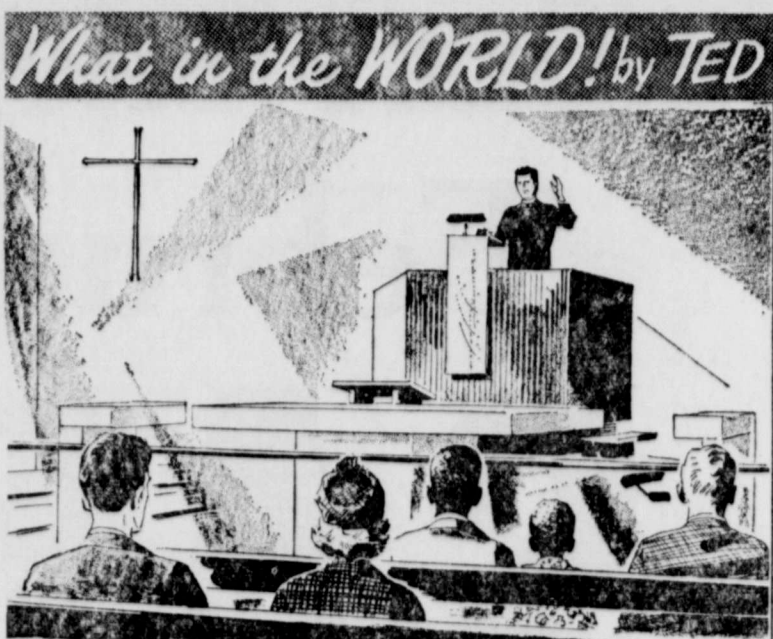
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All Faiths... All Nations

A new symbol of faith breaks the skyline among the new buildings surrounding United Nations headquarters in New York.

It's the 12-story Church Center for the U.N., built by the Methodist Church at a cost of \$3 million, but open to those of all religions. Administered by the National Council of Churches, the center gives both laymen and clergymen first-hand contact with the U.N.

The center conducts orientation programs for outbound missionaries and relief personnel and arranges meetings with U.N. delegates for church leaders concerned with particular

countries.

The heart of the center is a \$100,000 chapel seating 120 persons. There are also public seminars, briefings and tours of the U.N. Twelve conference rooms are equipped with translation facilities that pipe in U.N. proceedings in five languages. Closed-circuit television also links the center and U.N. headquarters.

"Our aim is to foster increasing knowledge and support of the U.N. throughout the church public," explains one official. "The churches are embarking on this cooperative venture because U.N. objectives are basically Christian objectives."

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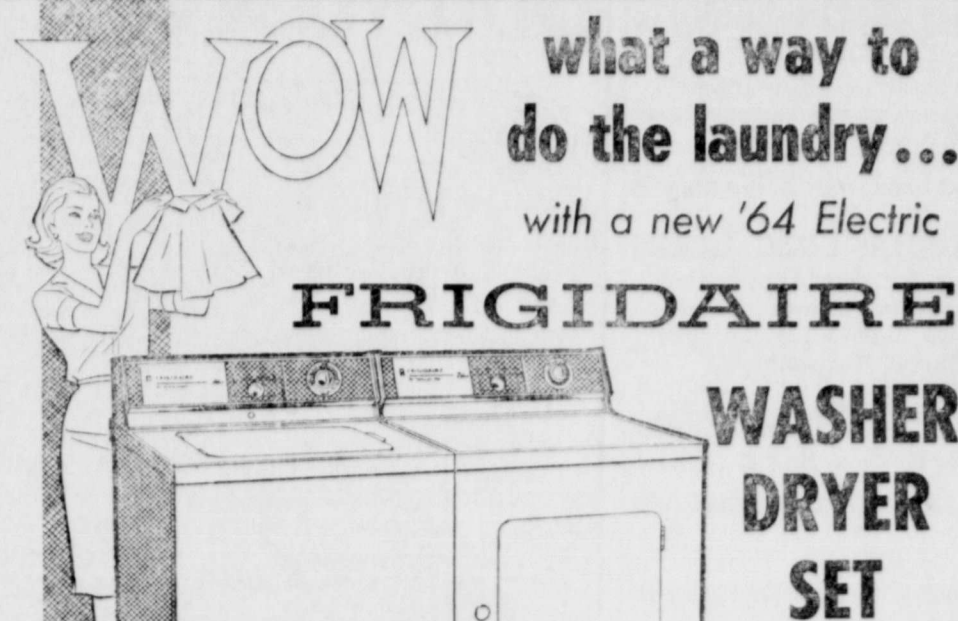
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Live modern at little cost—
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Crippled Boy Wins Sports Letters With Assist from March of Dimes

A boy who can scarcely walk because of arthritis wins a letter in athletics.

Impossible, you say. Not if the lad has the grit of Tim Ewald.

Even though this 17-year-old from Minneapolis can barely "inch" along with the help of a cane, he wears the monogram of Golden Valley High School in both football and track.

How come? How is all this athletic activity possible when it takes this likable youngster as much as 15 minutes merely to tie his shoelaces?

You must look back seven years to find the answer. As the second-oldest of five sons, Tim at the age of 10 could outrun all his brothers and even his parents, Graydon and Diane Ewald.

At touch football, no one could lay a hand on him. Tim dreamed of a high school and college career in football and track.

Then, at the age of 10, came disaster. One night the boy was struck by the indescribably severe pains of rheumatoid arthritis throughout his body. His temperature soared. For long months he had to be hospitalized in body casts and treated with cortisone.

Aided by March of Dimes

Now, after seven years of the disease, Tim is slowly regaining some mobility—thanks in great part to physical therapy given him at the March of Dimes Arthritis Treatment Center in the University of Minnesota Medical School. This treatment is conscientiously repeated at home.

Much as the boy yearned to play, such strenuous sports as football and track were not for him. It was all he could do just to hobble from class to class. But in his freshman year at high school he resolved to be as close to sports as his crippled condition permitted.

Tim made a private vow that he would become a team manager.

He made it in his freshman year as manager of the football squad. He made it again in his sophomore year. Last

year, his third, he managed the track team. He won his letters in two sports.

Tim won't talk much about what his duties are. He's an excessively modest youngster but, even if it does embarrass the boy, his father says:

"I looked into this with some care because it would be dangerous for Tim to overdo. I found out that these manager-ships aren't snap jobs given by the players to a classmate they feel sorry for. The work is tough—Tim goes along in the team bus to games all around the state, he checks equipment and keeps the players' records, he's a timekeeper, and so on. But he thrives on it—and it's far better therapy than gnawing his nails because of no contact with sports."

Even with his heavy schedule of classes, homework, team management, home exercises and weekly visits to the March of Dimes Arthritis Treatment Center, Tim finds time to draw,

chiefly cartoons and caricatures for which he seems to have promising talent. He thinks that someday he might like to be a sports cartoonist.

Faces Surgery

Will he walk again normally?

It's quite possible. This year, after graduation from high school, he may undergo hip surgery. Dr. Keith N. Drummond, assistant director of the March of Dimes center, explains that Tim's hips are now locked in a bent position caused by contraction of the tendons and muscles and by inflammation of the hip joints. Under favorable circumstances, surgery could release and lengthen these shortened tissues.

Whether crippled for life or on his feet again, which now seems likely, Tim is determined to continue working actively in sports. That's about all he'll say. But you know that this quiet and resolute youngster means it.

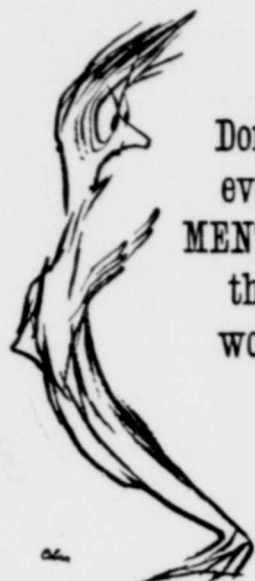

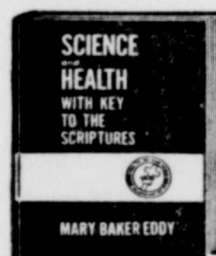

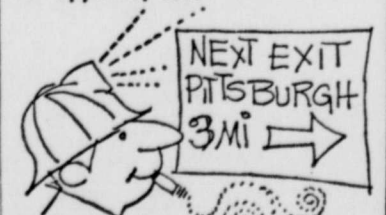
