EASTLAND TEAM WINS LEGION BASEBALL TOURNEY IN 1-0 TILT

A home run in the bottom half of the eighth inning of the final game of the Cisco invitation baseball tournament at ABC Field Saturday night gave the Eastland Yellow Jackets the tourney championship. The home run off the bat of Rodney Stephens broke up a pitcher's duel between Ball of Eula and T. Edwards of Eastland.

The home run ball was one of the few fat balls served by either pitcher during the game which was tied at 0-0 at the end of the official seven innings. Prior to the heart breaking blow by Stephens, Ball had given up only one hit, a scratch single also by Stephens. Ball struck out six Eastland batters, walked two and hit two with pitched balls. T. Edwards of the Yellow Jackets struck out nine Eula players and failed to issue a walk but gave up four hits.

Ball was in trouble once during the eighth inning contest. In the seventh inning he walked T. Edwards, hit P. Edwards with a pitched ball advancing T. Edwards to Second. Pittman got on an error by the first baseman and advanced both runners. Miller, Eastland center fielder, hit a ball to Blackburn, Eula shortstop, who threw to the plate in time to get T. Edwards out. With one away Ball struck out Manard and caused Jessup to hit back to the pitchers box where Ball took the ball and threw to first in time for the third out.

Edwards was effective in the first half of the eighth and retired the first three batters in order. Stephens was the first man up for Eastland in the bottom half of the eighth and picked a hard fast ball by the Eula pitcher and slammed it over the fence in deep right center. That was the ball game and the championship for the Yellow Jackets. It was a fitting climax to a fine tournament.

Following the tournament the official all-tournament team was

presented to the fans and thanks given to the umpires, the scorer and all having a part in making the first annual tournament a success.

New Castor Bean Plant Announced For Cross Plains

The Producer's Marketing Association of Baird announced this week that a castor bean hulling plant would be located in Cross Plains to take care of the crop in the Eastland, Brown and Callahan county area.

The plant will be located in the Petty building in Cross Plains. A vetch cleaning and separating building had been located in the building.

Doyle Burchfield of Cross Plains has been employed to handle the new plant which is expected to be in operation late in August.

A plant has been located in Carbon in Eastland County and one has been in operation in Brownwood for the past two years.

Castor bean growers were cautioned not to become discouraged if the dry weather was causing the plans to shed their leaves. Good rains in the latter part of August and September will produce a good crop.

GEORGETOWN, Aug. 12.—Seminars, lectures, forums and conferences kept Texas ministers unusually busy during the 52nd Pastors' School held Aug. 4—8 at Southwestern university. These were red-letter days in Methodism when 500 ministers gathered from all sections of the state to participate in this conference.

Attending the conference from Cisco was Rev. Bob Sanders of the Wesley Methodist Church. Lectures were provided by outstanding leaders in the various fields of the work of the church.

Extensive Loss Is Caused By Blaze

One residence was destroyed and two others were damaged considerably by fire Monday afternoon in the 600 block of West 9th Street. The home of Mrs. Alma Keough, 605 West 9th, was a total loss, and the homes of Mrs. Elva Moad, 603 West 9th, and O. L. Stamey, 607 West 9th, were damaged.

The fire apparently started at the rear of the Keough home and spread to a wooden garage. From there, it went to the home and the Moad and Stamey homes, on each side, were ignited. The Stamey residence suffered much damage, although part of the furniture was saved. The Moad damages were extensive, including the roof, ceiling and the west wall and water and smoke damages.

It was understood that the Keough and Stamey homes and furnishings were partly covered by insurance, while the Moad residence was not insured.

The alarm was turned in around 4 p. m. It first went in as a grass fire and no alarm was sounded. Firemen took a truck and sent back for more equipment when it was determined that the buildings were on fire.

Fire Chief Pete Clements expressed appreciation to the large number of volunteers who assisted in fighting the blaze. Firemen laid three lines to fight the fire, using over 300,000 gallons of water in a two-hour battle. A large crowd attended the fire.

Although an accurate estimate of the damages was not available, firemen believed \$15,000 would cover the loss of property.

City officials asked residents to discontinue burning dead grass due to the dry, windy weather. A dozen or more grass fires have been extinguished by firemen in the past 10 days.

Steffey At Fort Hood For Annual Army Training

Fred A. Steffey, former Cisco resident and newly-named band director of the Ranger High School band, is at Fort Hood, Texas, for two weeks, participating in summer training with an Abilene Army reserve unit.

Steffey, a Second Lieutenant in the Transportation Corps, will be at Fort Hood, until August 17.

The 25-year-old band director has been working on his master's degree at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene for the past school year, and is a member of the Abilene reserve unit, the 4005th Organized Reserve Area Service Unit.

Thirty-two officers from the Abilene area, are receiving their annual summer training at Fort Hood. This is the second year they have gone to the Central Texas post.

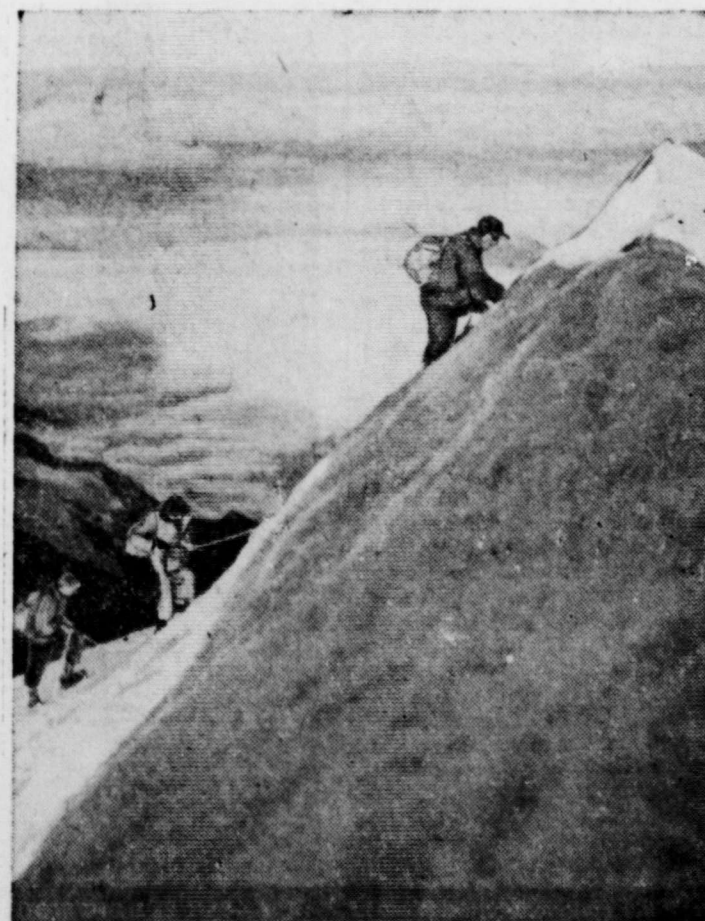
While at Fort Hood, Lt. Steffey is scheduled to make a number of vehicle and record inspections for the post motor pool.

Steffey received his commission following graduation from the University of Texas in June, 1950. He was in an ROTC unit at the university. Last summer he was on active duty 90 days at Ft. Eustis, Virginia attending the Transportation Corps School.

During World War II, he served with a Navy minesweeper squadron. He entered the Navy in June, 1944 and was discharged two years later. During his service, Lt. Steffey served 18 months in the Pacific area.

OPS RETRENCHES

The Office of Price Stabilization must soon cut its staff in half—from 12,000 to about 6,000 employees—because of heavy budget reductions imposed by Congress.

As is to be expected, OPS and other officials are saying that the result will be to cripple the whole price control program, and that the consumer will be the greatest sufferer. That may seem a compelling argument to many people. But it is purely a superficial argument which ignores the long-term dangers the controls create and the damage they do to the economy.

Controls, by their very nature, attempt to replace the natural law of supply and demand with fallible human judgment. Political expediency—the everlasting search for votes and patronage and power—often influences that judgment. Business is enmeshed in red tape, and harried with volumes of complex, confused and conflicting rules and regulations. Everyone from the biggest manufacturer down to the corner retail store is bossed by bureaucrats and jobholders who frequently have small understanding of the matters with which

Culver Is Given Support In Race

FORT WORTH, Aug. 9.—Judge Robert T. Neill, law partner and state campaign manager for Glen R. Lewis in the July primary, will support Justice Frank P. Culver of Tarrant County in the runoff for the Supreme Court, Culver's headquarters announced Saturday. Neill stated in a letter to Culver:

"I will vote for you; am deeply interested in your success and will do what I personally can to assist you."

Lewis, who lives in San Angelo, was third in the race. Culver was high man, leading his runoff opponent in approximately two-thirds of the counties. Culver, justice of the Second Court of Civil Appeals in Fort Worth, said, "I deeply appreciate the support of Judge Neill, who is recognized as outstanding as a lawyer and citizen."

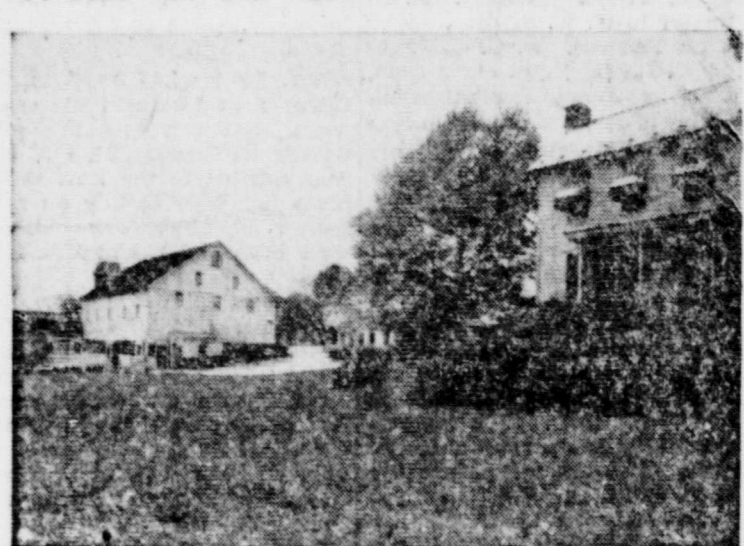

Good Farm Lawn Possible With Well Chosen Grasses



An Attractive Farm Lawn.

Every farm home owner would like to have an attractive lawn and ordinarily he can have one if he wants to make the necessary effort. The climate in most parts of the United States favors the growth of some kind of grass, and rainfall usually is adequate to maintain the life of a lawn even though it is sometimes insufficient for limited periods to promote the best growth. The farm home owner usually does not demand the fine-textured and expensive bentgrass sward of the golf course but he would like a uniform, vigorous turf that presents a good appearance under favorable growing conditions and withstands wear and drought.

Because farm lawns do not ordinarily have artificial irrigation, special attention should be given to the other factors necessary for a good lawn such as a good top soil 3 to 4 inches deep containing plenty of organic matter, adequate drainage so that proper aeration is obtained, a good well-fertilized seedbed and high quality seed of the right kind. Avoid using any of the "cheap" lawn mixtures on the market. The best seed of adapted varieties always gives best results. Liberal fertilization at the time of sowing and frequently thereafter helps materially to make up for periods of short water supply.

The grasses suitable for the permanent farm lawn must be those well adapted to the climate of the region. Species that require special care to survive should not be used. Kentucky bluegrass and red or Chewings fescue are adapted for use over a large area in the northern and central states. Tall fescue, Alta or Ky 31, is probably one of the most suitable types to use where a close turf is not required. In the North it can be combined with Kentucky bluegrass and in the South with Bermudagrass. The Zoysias may be combined with any of the other adapted grasses in either region. In the sub-humid areas of the Great Plains some of the dryland grasses such as buffalograss, crested wheatgrass and blue grama may be used.

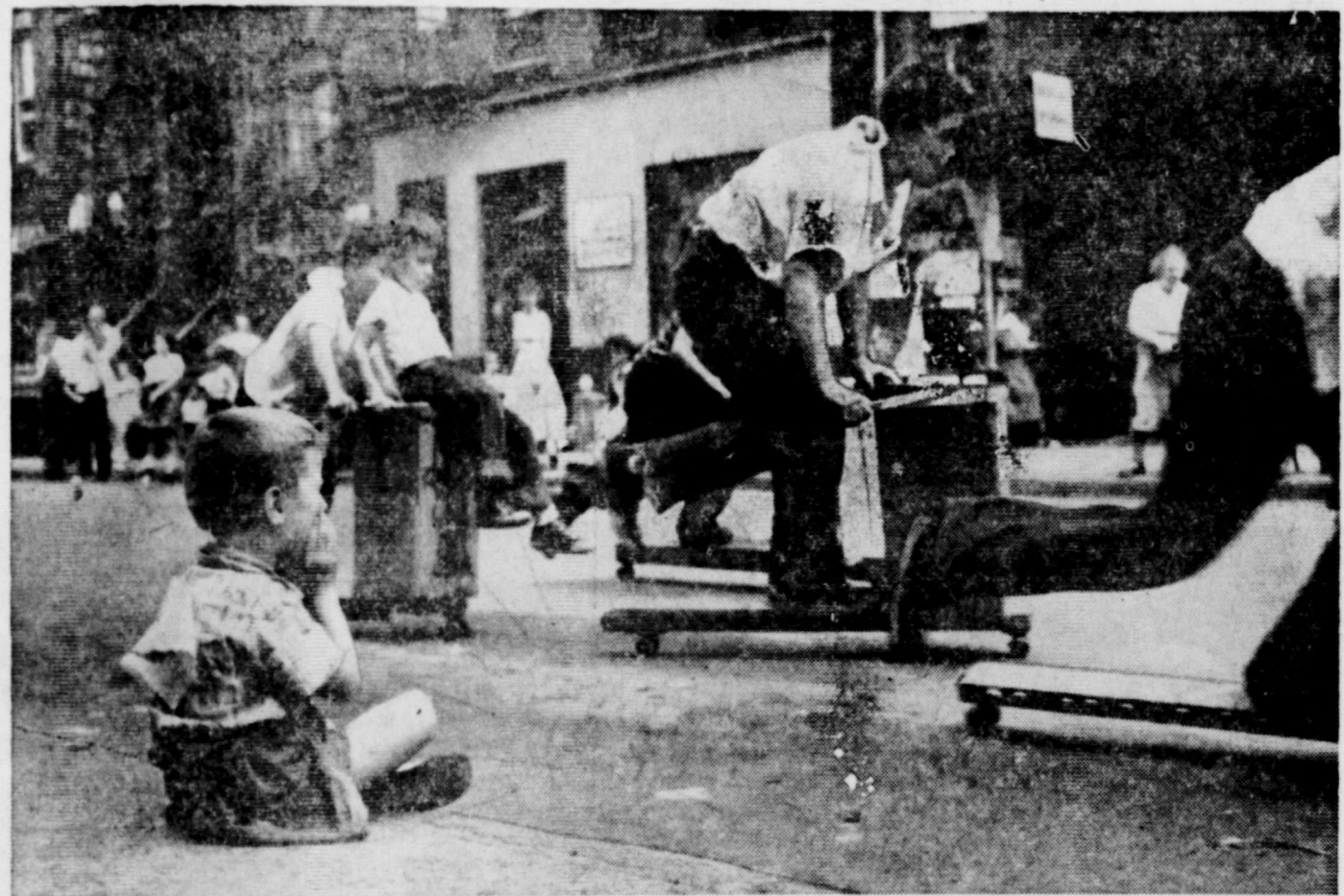

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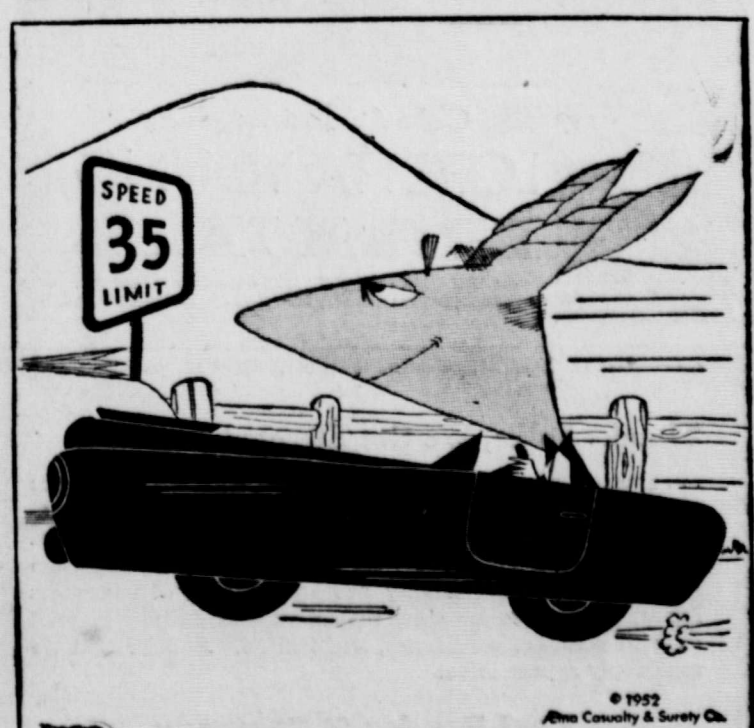

"I've Got You Under My Skin" is a fine tune to hum as long as it isn't dedicated to a bad case of sunburn.

Sun worshippers are common today, when it is the height of fashion (or so some claim) to display tanned shoulders with a strapless gown. Even the male of the species wants a "healthy tan" early in the season, if he is to appear on the beach in a bathing suit.

These worshippers have some points in their favor: The helpful effects of the sun's rays have long been recognized. But a good thing can be overdone, and a ruined vacation or loss of time from work may result.

A dark pigment, melanin, which is present in the skin of most persons, when brought nearer the skin's surface by the sun's rays partly protects against sunburn. However, this movement takes place in stages, so that a person who goes out one afternoon expecting to turn to a nice mahogany brown is bound to be in for a shock. And some persons with light reddish complexions are in for even a bigger shock: When the burn dies down, they may not even have a tan to show for their trouble!

Sunburns, although they may be unpleasant, are not the only bad effects of too much sun. Fever blisters can follow a long fishing trip if the face is not protected from the sun. Keratosis, a skin disease with horny growths which look like warts or callouses

may result from overexposure to sunlight; it may be a forerunner to skin cancer.

Some people are over-sensitive to sunlight so cannot take the amount of sunning which the average person can. Also, certain drugs such as sulfa drugs may cause a person to be over-sensitive to the sun.

Pellagra, a disease of nutrition caused by too little niacin (one of the B-complex vitamins) may appear sooner or, if present, may be made worse by sunlight.

And even the lowly little freckle deserves a word. Although this normal bit of skin pigment may be there the year around, it seems to "pop out" almost with the first good summer's sun!
