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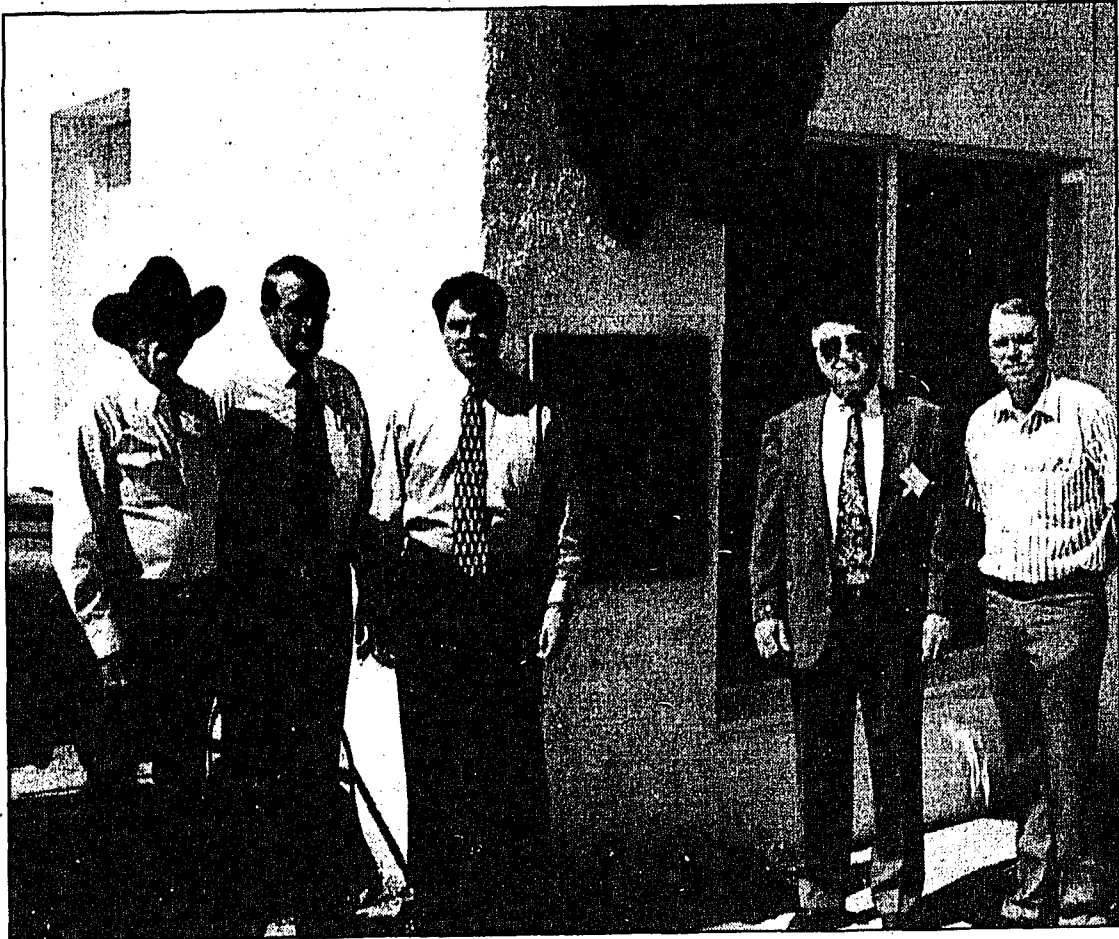

Enthusiasm is high and the Chamber of Commerce is already making plans to sponsor another city-wide garage sale toward the end of summer or in the fall.

Commissioners Say OK To Coleman Groups' Christmas Lighting Proposal

Coleman County Commissioners met in their regular meeting Monday and agreed to contribute \$1,000 to the Coleman Business People's Association and Chamber of Commerce in their efforts to "Light Coleman at Christmas Time" following a presentation by the group's spokesperson Diana Dobbins. The vote was unanimous to provide lights and strands for the front of the courthouse. These are to be purchased locally.

Commissioners also agreed to al-

low the Social Security Administration to install a direct local phone line enabling them to process claims directly and handle other detailed items. The county will not be out an expense as those incurred will be paid by the Social Security Administration.

County Judge Sherrill Ragsdale was given the responsibility to find an individual to serve on the Work Force Development Board. Ragsdale stated he is on the Abilene board that will select 27

nominating members from 19 counties. Several names were suggested and commissioners asked Ragsdale to find an individual who can give their time to this board. Approximately 15 individuals will be chosen from the Coleman area. There will be one representative from the county, one from each school district, CTO, City and several from the Chamber of Commerce.

Of the named submitted from the 19 counties, 27 will be chosen.

Ragsdale said, "This will entail quite a bit of the individual's time, especially for the first several months as they will be administering 3.7 million dollars of funds for Adult Education, Literacy, Post Secondary Vocation, Technical Job Training, Employment Services, Trade Adjustment Assistance, Senior Texas Employment Program, Job Opportunities and Basic Skills Training and the Food Stamp Program to name a few."

This board will replace the JTPA Board and most of the Texas Employment Commission will fall under this board with the exception of the regulation of Unemployment Insurance. This board will also replace PIC and others.

Bills totaling \$50,000 were approved and County Auditor Shirley Sansing was authorized to transfer \$10,000 into each precinct.

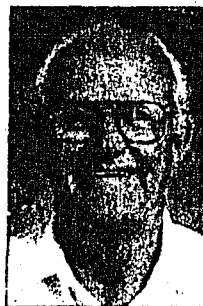
Rockwood Native Named Top Volunteer In Odessa

Adjournment and closing ritual was observed by membership.

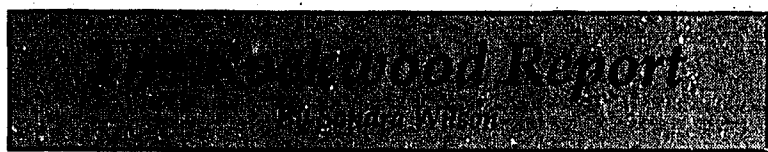

Local Dairyman Agrees Industry Facing Hard Times

ARLINGTON, TX—Consumers throughout the Southwest will be facing higher prices for their milk in the coming weeks due to the soaring production costs dairy farmers are experiencing. Production costs are expected to increase through the summer as dairymen cope with grain and hay shortages brought on by drought conditions and increased world demand for U.S. grain.

"The price of feed is literally going through the roof causing many dairymen to go out of business. This may be the worst economic squeeze dairymen have faced in 50 years," says Decatur, Texas dairy farmer Calvin Buchanan. "Feed accounts for more than half of our operating costs, so even a modest increase in the price of feed can play havoc with our operating budget."

According to Buchanan, feed costs are running about 45 percent higher than a year ago and there seems to be no end in sight. "The entire dairy industry in the Southwestern states could be in jeopardy, unless dairy farmers get a significant increase in their milk prices very soon," Buchanan says. Consumers can expect to pay 20-25 cents more per gallon for milk in the coming weeks, according to Jim Carroll, region manager of Associated Milk Producers, Inc. (AMPI) in Arlington, Texas.

"The price increase that we will begin charging milk processors is being calculated to cover the dramatic and devastating escalation in the price of grain, hay, fuel, and fertilizer dairy farmers are currently experiencing," says Carroll.

Economic hardship on the nation's dairy farms has caused the closing of nearly one-fourth of all dairies operating in 1990. As dairy farmers exit the business, at least one-third of their cows are being taken out of production, thus reducing the total number of cows available to produce milk across the nation. Less cows mean less milk with the end result being higher prices for consumers.

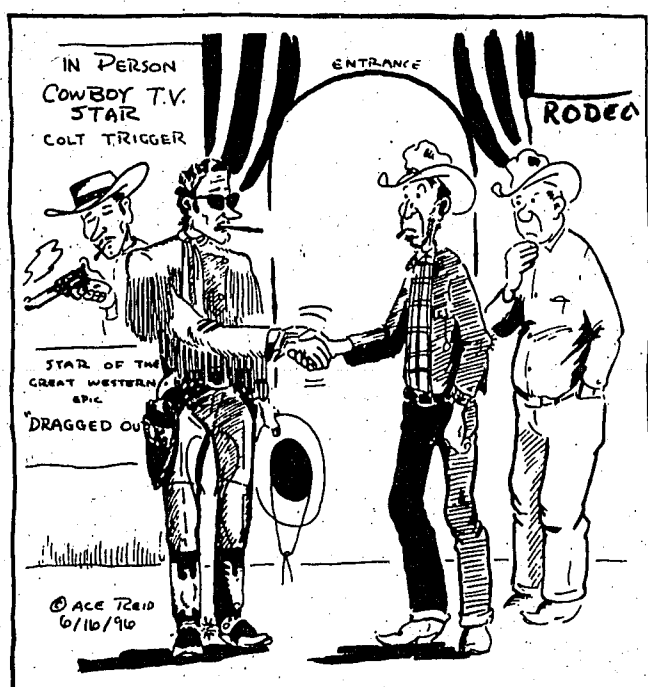

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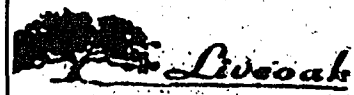

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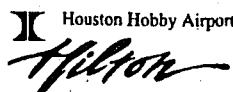

(David is wearing some of the T-shirts.) We reluctantly bid farewell to Lucy and followed Jonathan and Kefa out to our vans. They drove us the short distance to the airfield where we caught Kenya

Air back to Nairobi. Three of our members would catch the plane back to London this day and we would pick up five new people that would spend the next week with us in Tanzania.

The Air Kenya plane did make it off the runway and we were soon airborne. The airplane flew almost directly east. Again we had a bowl of hard candies for our in-flight service. It was interesting to watch the ground below us. We were about five to six thousand feet above the terrain. Occasionally we

could see some wildlife and the main sights to be seen were an occasional Masai village and their grazing herds. We did not pass over any bodies of water during this flight but on the flight to the Mara we had seen a lake in the distance that had a pink shoreline. The pink came from the hundreds of flamingos wading in the shallow water. From the distance all you could see was the color. It was a magnificent sight.

Soon the plane started losing altitude and we were flying over very typical suburbia. Some of the houses were complete with backyard swimming pools. It was nice to land on a concrete runway and we were able to taxi all the way to the Kenya Air Terminal on the paved surface. The terminal was extremely small and very crowded. We each picked up our luggage at the plane and tried to make our way through the terminal. Once through the terminal we started looking for the "Wildlife Safari" vans that would take the two

groups their separate ways. The driveway from the street to the terminal was a victim of severe gridlock. There seemed to be more and more cars coming in but none of the cars there were in could find their way out. After a fifteen minute wait which seemed like several hours, we finally spied Abdul.

One of the vans was filled with the five new safari members. The other two vans were for us that got off the plane. The drivers had brought boxed lunches from the Serena Hotel in Nairobi and we were able to buy cold drinks to go with the lunch. It had been a long time since breakfast for most of us, but we were filled long before the boxes became empty. We had sandwiches, fried chicken, quiche, raw vegetables, a couple of slices of buttered bread, two or three pieces of fruit and then we had a good piece of cake for dessert. We were fairly smart in that we saved the leftovers in case we got hungry later. With a large lunch at 2:30 p.m., we didn't think we would get hungry before dinner time.

After a brief shopping tour, we loaded back into the vans and headed for the Kenya-Tanzania border. Our current vans and drivers could not cross the border to go into Tanzania and the ones from Tanzania could not come into Kenya. There was a no man's land in between the two borders where the people and luggage could be transferred from one vehicle to another. In addition, the

people had to individually clear customs. What a mess! It was a complete nightmare! Our drivers for Tanzania were Mike, Hussien and Yeosef. The drivers of both sets of vans exchanged the luggage while fighting off the local vendors as we sat in the vans. The vendors banged on the windows, threw their wares into the van and screamed for their money. The drivers had to escort us from car to car and from car to custom office and back to prevent our getting smothered by the extremely eager vendors. No one knows how long the crisis will last. A bumper grain crop in the Midwest this summer will be required to keep dairymen in business and milking enough cows to supply domestic needs. If the drought continues, even temporary milk price relief won't be enough to keep the milk supply up.

Carroll understands that no one likes to see the price of basic foods, such as milk, increase unless the increase is absolutely essential. "In the long run consumers get the benefit by assuring the availability of fresh milk at prices in line with other essential foods. For the dairy farmer, the price increase is an effort to help cover additional production costs until the crisis is over," says Carroll.
