NEW OPTIMISM SEEN AS VITAL FOR AMERICAS

MEMPHIS, Tenn.—Be an optimist, advises Russell F. Meyer of St. Louis, for you'll be a better American and you'll make America a better place in which to live.
Meyer doesn't mean to refuse blindly to face unpleasant facts. That's stupidity. What he means is this: Face any problem squarely, and instead of succumbing to the defeat of pessimistic fatalism, set out cheerfully and courageously to find the solution.

Meyer is secretary of Optimist International, which seeks to promote a philosophy of constructive optimism.

Optimism is an excellent weapon against un-Americanism, Meyer believes.
"It took optimism and courage of a high order on the part of pioneers who built this nation out of a wilderness and gave it the new kind of government which we call democracy," he said. "Today it still requires optimism and courage in meeting the new problems which have arisen in our generation. Optimists feel, however, that these problems can be solved when they are approached in a spirit of confidence and co-operation. It is our belief that two isms we must encourage in this country are Americanism and optimism."

The best way to combat the spread of un-American ideas among youth is to encourage them to earn an honest living and become useful citizens, Meyer said. He told how Optimists throughout the nation are making friends with needy or delinquent boys, providing them with wholesome recreation, employment opportunities and other advantages.

"In every city," he said, "there are boys lacking in some of the things that go to make up a normal healthy existence. Boys whose parents are negligent, separated or dead, boys whose poverty deprives them of education and recreation, boys who get their training from hardened and cynical criminal gangs of the neighborhood, can easily drift into criminal or unsocial activities."

"Streets grant no diplomas and give no degrees, but they educate with fatal precision.
"Instead of throwing the young offender into reformatories, optimists feel that a better solution to the problem is to make friends with the youngsters and help him get started on the right foot."

WAR THEATRE IS MOVING TO NEW SPHERES

Britain still clung to a foothold in Greece today, but interest is shifting from the dying phases of the Greek campaign to the opening of a new struggle for control of the whole Mediterranean and the critical battle of the North Atlantic.

German troops flanked the British rear guard at Thermopylae and the Germans are reported to be driving hard upon Athens, but the British command said that allied troops continued to fall back in good order, despite the Nazi pressure.

In the battle of the North Atlantic—the sphere in which Britain may well win or lose the war—the United States is rapidly moving into a foremost position.

Statements of President Roosevelt and his cabinet lieutenants indicated that the answer to success of Germany's Balkan campaign might be employment of united sea power—in a manner not clearly specified—to guarantee the safe arrival of American war supplies to the democratic belligerents.

Indications that such action might be taken were given today by President Roosevelt. He said that the "United States neutrality patrol" might be extended as far and wide as necessary, even to the seven seas, for the protection of the Western hemisphere. The president said that he did not mean convoys.

It was indicated that the limits of the patrol would be pushed farther into the Atlantic, particularly beyond Greenland, where he said Axis forces might already be established.

The prospects of American sea aid heartened the British and brought denunciations from Axis spokesmen, who recalled Hitler's threat to sink any aid enroute to Great Britain.

In the more immediate theatre of the war in the Mediterranean, the British are preparing for big new Nazi threats, extended both to the western and eastern ends of the inland sea.

At the western end the critical point is Gibraltar, and rumors of an assault upon the rock were rife in European capitals, as well as rumors of an attack upon the Dardanelles at the eastern end of the Mediterranean.

94 Youths On the Ft Worth NYA Are Given Employment

AUSTIN, Texas—Ninety-four young men previously assigned to the NYA Airport project set up at the Fort Worth Municipal Airport have obtained jobs in aircraft industries.
Through the cooperation of the Texas State Employment Service 21 of these youth have gone to work for the War Department at Hicks Field in Fort Worth, eleven for commercial airlines companies, 23 for private flying schools, four for the Civil Aeronautics Authority, eight for the Fort Worth Municipal Airport, two for the Wichita Falls Engineering School, nineteen for the Duncan Field Army Air Depot near San Antonio, two at the Corpus Christi Seaplane Base, and four for the Randolph Field Air Corps Flying School.

The seventy boys now assigned to the Fort Worth NYA Airport Project are receiving work experience in assisting government meteorologists in compiling weather data and weather reports; in helping radio technicians with radio communications; in aiding in the operation of the airport traffic control; in helping regular paid city employees in aircraft servicing and storage; and in assisting in the inspection of airplane motors and in making minor motor repairs.

Four hours each day the boys are engaged in actual production work for which they are paid by the NYA. Optional related information and training for the young men includes blueprint reading, meteorology, metallurgy, and airport organization in which each day another four hours may be spent. The teachers of these classes are provided by the Fort Worth Public Schools and by the State Department of Education.

My Home Town Contest Drawing Many Boys, Girls

MINERAL WELLS, Texas—The "My Home Town" contest, always a big feature at West Texas chamber of commerce conventions, is "going fine," according to report by C. M. Caldwell of Abilene, conductor of the contest. The number of entries among high school boys and girls of West Texas had reached 42 as this week opened. It was announced that was more than ever before at that stage.

However, said Judge Caldwell, "we are confidently expecting and should have more than 100 entries this year. The decentralization of the contest, holding the preliminaries in the ten WTCC districts, makes it more convenient for these young people to compete. We are not, this year, asking all entries to come and spend two or three days in the convention city. Only the ten finalists, the winner of each district competition, will come to Mineral Wells for the final competition for the Thomas Ethridge cup and scholarship in West Texas universities and colleges. Each of these finalists will receive a cash award."

District 2, at Lubbock, Saturday, May 3, at 9:30 a. m. Texas Tech is the sponsor, Miss Ruth Firtle in charge, and the contest will be held in Room 202, Tech Administration building. Two of the three judges have been selected. They are Miss Anna Jo Pendleton, speech professor, and John E. Harding, instructor in business administration.

District 6, Midland high school, Supt. W. W. Lackey in charge, set for Monday night, May 5, at 8 o'clock.

District 7, sponsored by the College of Mines at El Paso, Baxter Polk, librarian, in charge, set for Saturday, May 3, at 9 a. m.

District 10, at Stephenville, John Tarleton college sponsor and A. J. Spangler in charge, set for Saturday May 10, in the main auditorium, at 1:30 p. m.

Caldwell's record of entries shows District 2, the South Plains territory, leading with eleven entries from—in order as received: Farwell, Levelland, Petersburg, Tahoka, Silverton, Plainview, Ralls, Anton, Lubbock, Dalou and Post District 3, centering on Wichita Falls, that contest to be held in the junior college in that city, was next with seven entries from Throckmorton, Graham, Olney, Electra, Quanah, Munday and Wichita Falls.

Carrots were used as the yellow vegetables in salads because of its high nutritious value and its popularity with the girls. It was found that the majority of the girls preferred new carrots to cooked ones.

"A few spoons of grated carrots with some raisins and enough salad dressing to moisten makes a tasty, nutritious, and attractive salad when it is served on a lettuce leaf fresh from the garden," said Miss Wheatley.

Next month which is May, will be devoted to care of windows beginning with cleaning and then going into making and caring for curtains for the girls' bedroom.
Miss Wheatley will meet all clubs in the county next month by the original schedule beginning the first Monday and going on in the order that they come.

TRAINEES ARE WARNED ABOUT NEW 'SWINDLE'

Prospective trainees were warned today by General J. Watt Page, against subscribing to "deferment or exemption insurance."

"It has come to the attention of State Headquarters," General Page said, "that swindlers are operating in Texas, and particularly among the colored registrants, selling for a cash fee policies or papers which are purported to insure the registrant against military training, or to procure for him deferment of service under the Selective Service Act. It is reported that some of these racketeers are impersonating army officers, and in one instance investigation developed that a colored 'sergeant' was threatening hesitant victims with induction into the army on 'a moment's notice.'"

General Page pointed out that, with the exception of ministers and students of divinity, there is no such thing as an "exemption" under the Selective Service Act, and that local boards alone have the authority and responsibility for determining whether a registrant may be deferred from military training. He said:

"Registrants are classified according to their order numbers and when the time comes for classification of a registrant, his case will be given separate consideration by his local board in accordance with the provisions of the Selective Service Act and Regulations. There is no way by which exemption or deferment may be purchased for any price or consideration whatsoever."

Registrants are urged to report immediately any instance of this nature, together with all evidence collected, to his local board or to a United States attorney.

"The Selective Service Act is a Federal Law," General Page said, "and any violation of it is a federal offense and will be prosecuted by the United States Department of Justice."

INDICATION OF U. S. SEA AID GIVEN TODAY

Roosevelt Says He Does Not
Mean Convoys, But Does
Not Divulge His New
Aid Plans

WASHINGTON, April 25.—President Roosevelt said today that the United States is taking action to counter attack Axis forces which may be in Greenland, and indicated an extension of the naval patrol system might be employed to get war supplies to Great Britain.

The President did not reveal what action would be taken in Greenland, where the new defense pact gave this country the right to set up new bases. He was emphatic in defending the right of the country to extend the neutrality patrol wherever necessary to defend the safety and security of the Western hemisphere.

The patrol, he said, could be extended to the seven seas if necessary and denied that he intended to set up a convoy system.

Last night the frank statements of Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox and Secretary of State Cordell Hull that "this is our fight" appeared to confirm indications that the United States soon would extend naval activities in the Atlantic to insure delivery of war supplies to Great Britain.

Each Patrolman Is Costing State About \$4,000 Per Annum

AUSTIN, Tex.—Sen. A. M. Aikin of Paris estimates that it costs \$3,500 to \$4,000 to keep a highway patrolman on the road. Their average salary is \$2,000 (base pay for a private is \$1,800 a year). In addition automobiles or motorcycles must be purchased and maintained and uniforms purchased. Each patrolman is furnished two uniforms a year, but he must pay for their upkeep.

The state has 234 uniformed men at present, including Director Homer Garrison, in addition to clerical employees of the department and garagemen. A bill before the legislature to levy a drivers' license would increase the number of patrolmen in accordance with the income from the license fee law that is finally adopted. A 60-cent-a-year license, sponsors say, would provide for 200 more patrolmen.

The present force patrols only part of the state's 24,000 miles of designated road. They are assigned according to density of traffic and to hazards on the road. This year, crews usually checking motor vehicles for mechanical defects and testing drivers have been transferred to active patrol duty in areas where traffic has increased because of national defense projects.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The senate committee investigating national defense heard charges today that contractors for the army's cantonment program, in "many cases" had been receiving fees four times the size they had been receiving in private business.

A Stab of Light Into the Dim Future

A mere million dollars is nothing in the vortex of billions whirling about in Washington today. Yet the million dollars spent by the Temporary National Economic Committee during the past three years in getting together 20,000 pages of testimony from more than 500 industrial leaders may turn out to be the most productive million of them all.

he committee set itself a crushing task—nothing less than to find out the answers to the questions everyone has been asking for 10 years: Why want amid plenty? What's wrong with our economic system?

Now, in 37 volumes, the report is made. It should be the greatest mine of information that exists on our economy.

Everybody is concerned about what will happen after the war emergency is over. Will it mean another depression worse than the last one? It is certainly possible unless the greatest possible foresight is used, beginning now. The recommendations of the TNEC are aimed, apparently, at this post-war period rather than at the period of the defense effort, which is no time to rock boats.

First, the committee is sold on free enterprise. It feels that the only way in which America will eventually be gotten back at peacetime work is by reopening the opportunities for new enterprise. Those avenues are now increasingly blocked on one hand by the increasing size of a few vast corporations, and by increasing government regulation.

Thus the committee suggests: subjecting national corporations to national charter and control; loosening the grip of patent rights; abolition of basing-point systems for calculating prices; repeal of the Miller-Tydings type of price-maintenance laws; government restriction of new mergers; legal and tax policies which will foster and protect new enterprises.

That is a bare hint of the line of thought that has come to the majority of the TNEC after hearing all this testimony. The crux of the matter is here: as long as American business continues to gravitate into larger and fewer units, an equal centralization and expansion of government is inevitable. As free enterprise is restricted, free government is endangered; political freedom is impossible without economic freedom.

When the present emergency is passed, it is clear that the United States is going to have to do some fast stepping. Every bit of light that can be thrown now on the best direction of those steps is a guarantee of future safety and progress.

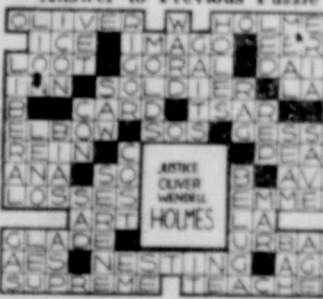

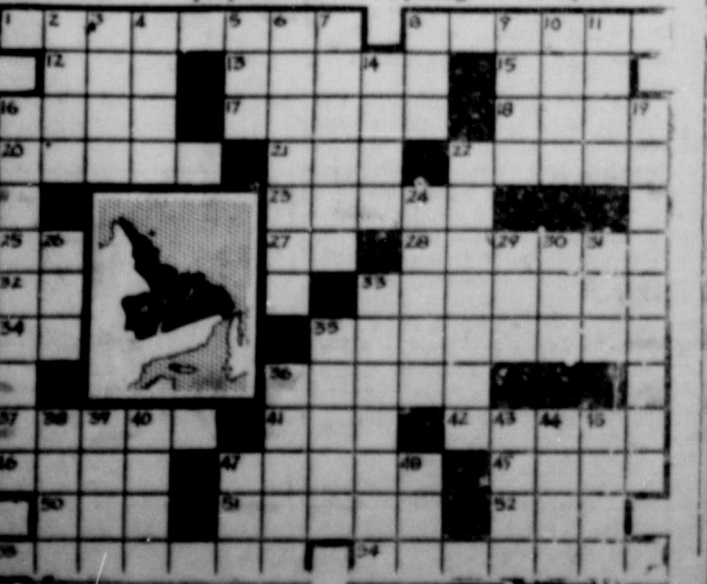

Defense Plants To Get Aid On Taxes

By United Press
CHICAGO—Defense contractors will be awarded special income tax deductions in 16 states, according to the Federation of Tax Administrators.

This protective step, already taken by the Federal government, will emerge in the form of accelerated depreciation rates on facilities built or acquired directly for defense production.

Its purpose is to expedite production by offsetting the risk involved in constructing facilities which may be useless in peacetime.

Under the system, a contractor may acquire a certificate from the War or Navy Department and the National Defense Advisory Commission stating that his facilities are essential for materials ordered by the government.

Write-Off 20 Per Cent
The certificate entitles the contractor to a 20 per cent annual depreciation rate. As an example, the federation cites a hypothetical case in which a contractor constructed a building costing \$1,000,000. He acquired a federal certificate. At 20 per cent depreciation per year, in five years his building will become untaxable, as it will have depreciated 100 per cent.

At the usual rate of 2½ per cent depreciation per year the building would be taxed for 40 years instead of five.

Defense certificates will be non-void in the same way by Arkansas, Georgia, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Mississippi, New York, Oregon, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia, the federation explained.

Other States May Aid

South Dakota has indicated that it will grant the privilege when a specific case arises for consideration, while Connecticut, Pennsylvania and Vermont are among the states using a net income tax, and, therefore, may be listed among the states where special allowances may be obtained, according to the federation.

Legislative action may be necessary in some states, including California, Maryland and Minnesota, the federation said. In Utah, the tax commission has recommended that the legislature consider amendments to the income tax which would grant the allowance.

Girl Soon To End Cruise As Sailor

TORONTO, Ont.—Nora Bailey, "able-bodied seaman" and graduate child psychiatrist, is on her way home after a 17-month round-the-world voyage as seaman on the sailing schooner Yankee.

The 92-foot schooner has left Antigua, its last port of call before docking at its home port, Gloucester, Mass., where it is expected April 27, according to word reaching her father, A. H. Bailey, in Toronto.

The young Toronto girl signed on as an able-bodied seaman and has done her full share of sail handling and navigation. Miss Bailey was the only Canadian, and, except for the skipper's wife, the only woman aboard.

The crew is composed of uni-

versity students who sign on for the adventure. Capt. Irving Johnson, owner, has taken his boat on three previous round-the-world cruises, with a similar 14-man crew.

According to plan, the students spend their time studying oceanography and the customs of the natives en route.

According to her father, Nora has written of the "usual hazards" of such expeditions, including "terrible storms" on the Indian Ocean, and sharks in the Pacific and Caribbean.

Fish Hatcheries of State Put On a Mass Production

By United Press
COLLEGE STATION, Tex.—Who, said rabbits were prolific? Figures on last year's output by the Federal Fish Hatchery near Burnet, Tex., were almost astronomical. Dr. Walter P. Taylor of Texas A. & M. College, in charge of the hatchery, said the public to inspect the hatchery restoration project, called a "fish factory."

Mass production methods are similar to those used by industry, Taylor said. The difference is that the hatchery turns out a live product instead of an inanimate one.

Taylor, senior biologist of the fish and wildlife service, U. S. Department of the Interior, said the Burnet project is one of 120 operated by the service in 45 states.

The objective: "More and better fish for the fisherman's reel."

"Baby fish are planted in lakes, streams and even in the oceans as replacements for those which fall victim to man."

"The role of fish hatcheries as an elemental factor in conserving the majority of the food and game species is widely conceded," Taylor said. "The heaviest mortality among fishes occur in early life. Artificial propagation is designed to eliminate this hazard."

Taylor said there were six federal hatcheries in Texas which last year distributed 3,259,775 eggs, fry and fingerlings of eight species.

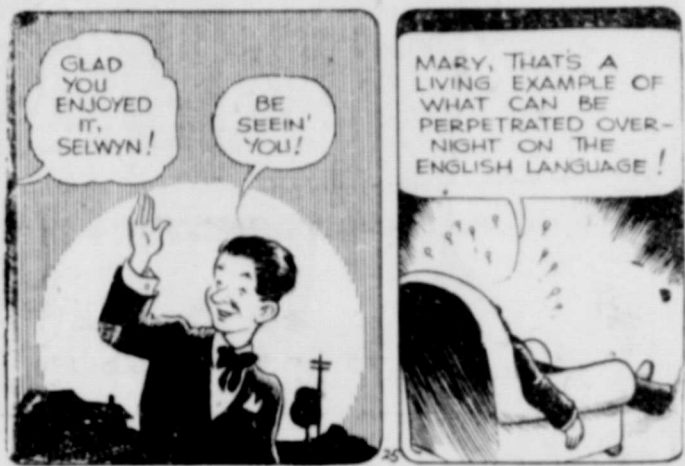

Although the state maintained its no-death—no-injury record during 1940, its no-crash mark was shattered twice, once when a storm-tossed plane returned to a Pittsburgh airport and overshot the runway in landing, again when engine trouble forced a New York to Chicago skyliner down near Greensburg. Both planes were wrecked, but no one was hurt.

State Aviation Inspector John J. Quinn said all flight activity in the state during 1940 brought 13 deaths in 70 crashes. Two "freak" accidents took the lives of a 15-year-old boy who cycled into the path of a landing plane at Pittsburgh and a man who hired a plane for a joyride and jumped out several thousand feet in the air.

Flying is setting new records in Pennsylvania yearly, with more licensed planes, airports and pilots each year. Activity is up as much as 500 per cent, Quinn said.

"Air Graveyard" Is Fading As Peril

HARRISBURG, Pa.—Skyliners soar easily back and forth across Pennsylvania today, defying the rugged Alleghenies which 10 years ago were known as "the graveyard of aviation."

Not for more than four years has a scheduled commercial flight come to grief in the hills which formerly thrust rocky fingers up through low-hanging clouds and steel storms to pull mail and passenger-planes down to their doom in startling numbers.

Sizeable and modern mountain-top airports, scattered through the timbered hills are primarily responsible for the safety record which began March 26, 1937, the day after an airliner slid down through the fog to crash with 10 passengers and a crew of three in a cornfield near Pittsburgh.

Food Experts Of Britain Ask for Plankton Culture

LONDON—A proposal to sweep up whale food from the Atlantic and utilize it for human consumption in an effort to beat the German counter blockade has been made.

Sir John Graham Kerr one of the world's leading zoologists, will ask Major Gwilym Lloyd George, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Food, to appoint a committee to investigate the practicability of large scale collection of plankton by means of mechanical separators.

Plankton, some kinds of which form the food of whales and other sea creatures, is the scientific name given to drifting and usually microscopic living organism in the sea, lakes, ponds and streams.

Sir John said large areas of the sea off the west coast of Scotland are rich in plankton and that small-scale experiments show that this substance can readily be converted into nourishing human food. Big advances in the knowledge of plankton, he declared have been made at the marine laboratories at Millport.

The study of plankton has begun about 1884 by the German

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Greatest Surplus On Farms Is Said To Be the Farmers

zoologist, Johannes Muller, in the sea around Heligoland and wide investigation of the subject followed in Germany and Britain.

The richest plankton in the world is that found on the borders of the polar seas, the regions of melting ice.

DALLAS, Texas—The greatest surplus on southern farms is farmers, Dr. W. H. Metzler, assistant sociologist of the University of Arkansas college of agriculture, said in an address here.

Metzler quoted statistics: each year 106,000 farmers die in rural areas of the south while 410,000 farm boys reach maturity.

If a farm were provided each boy, 3,040,000 new farms would be needed in 10 years, or about 50 per cent of the current total in the nation.

Industry has the job of absorbing this surplus population, Metzler said. Its failure to do so rests with technological improvements.

"Expanding production form-ly meant an increased demand for workers who came from the farms," the sociologist said.

"Of late, production has been increasing rapidly—through improved technocracy alone, and not through the hiring of extra men."

Metzler noted that production indices went up 45 per cent between 1919 and 1929, while employment declined 800,000.

Gas Helps To Put Bombers In Skies

DALLAS, Texas. — Gas helps to put bombers in the sky. In its own efficient way, this fuel is doing a bang-up job of helping Uncle Sam to roll armament production into high gear, according to discussions scheduled for the national convention of the natural gas section, American Gas Association, in Dallas May 5-7. This and similar topics will be presented under the general theme of "The Part Natural Gas is Playing in National Defense."

The natural gas industry of the nation, with several thousand visitors, will be represented at the convention.

From hardening intricate parts of machine guns to the final heat treating of tiny parts for gigantic bombers, specially designed gas furnaces are speeding national defense production at an ever-increasing pace. Equipment developed for peace-time uses through cooperative research and engineering under sponsorship of the American Gas Association, is rapidly being put to work to speed production in war industries.

North American Aviation, Inc., warplane plant between Dallas and Fort Worth, is an example of natural gas service to national defense projects. Supplying all fuel requirements at the \$7,500,000 factory, the Lone Star Gas Company's 4,800 miles of interconnected pipe lines assure an adequate supply of gas under all conditions short of a general disaster. Another example is at Camp Barkeley, eight miles southwest of Abilene, where 19,000 officers and men of the 45th Division depend upon natural gas for all fuel requirements, from heating water for shaving to generating steam for heating the sixty-six buildings that comprise the 710-bed hospital area. The problems overcome in supplying these national defense plants and camps are to be studied at the Dallas convention.
