Howerton Selected By Coaches As Most Valuable

Six foot, five inch, senior post Veronica Howerton was selected as the Most Valuable Player of the Year by the coaches of District 20-AA. Howerton was one of the most instrumental elements used by the Rivercrest Rebels en route to making their fourth trip to

the Region III tournament in as many years. Senior forward Jean Ann Norman was selected to the first team all-district.

Head coach Frank Stubblefield was pleased with the two selections, but was rather disappointed because no one else made the

honorary squads.

In the boys division, junior forward Stan Wood was chosen to the first team all-district. Honorable mention choices included senior David Wisinger and juniors Bradley Moore, David Rozell, and John Hines.

Boys head coach Wake Wood was very disappointed by the selections. "I feel like the players from Rivercrest have been shunned by the

coaches of the district for the past four years. Not just in boys basketball, but in girls basketball and in football." Despite the disappointment felt by the teams, congratulations are in order, not only for these all-district selections, but to all the athletes that make up the squads that have given Rivercrest another season to be proud of.

Girl Scout Week Celebrated March 7-13

The Red River Valley Girl Scout Council joins Girls Scouts USA in celebrating Girl Scout Week, March 7-13. In honor of its 70th birthday, Girl Scouts USA has asked all Girl Scouts to share in giving to the nation a special birthday gift of projects based on the theme "water in our lives." Girl Scouts throughout the Council will be giving service to their communities in special ways related to their community needs.

The Red River Valley Girl Scout Council is chartered by Girl Scouts USA and directs and coordinates the Girl Scout movement in a 12 and two-thirds county area of southeast Oklahoma and northeast Texas. The first Girl Scout troop in the council was registered in February, 1921, only nine years after the first Girl Scout troop was registered in the United States. The Red River Valley Girl Scout Council was first chartered in 1955 and the Council office

is located at 38 First N.W., Paris, Texas.

Besides the observance of Girl Scout Week in March, the council is planning several other Council-wide events during the Spring. On April 3, Girl Scout Happening '82 will be taking place from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Mt. Pleasant Civic Center. April 30-May 2, sixth through ninth grade girls will participate in a Council-wide camp out, Ca Fu Ou, at Beaver's Bend State Park in Oklahoma. Open House at Camp Gambill will be held May 2 from 2 to 5 p.m.

Day Camps will be in session throughout the Council in the months of June and July. Neighborhoods planning Day Camps are Lamar, Mt. Pleasant, Sulphur Springs, Valliant, Hugo, Mt. Vernon and Clarksville.

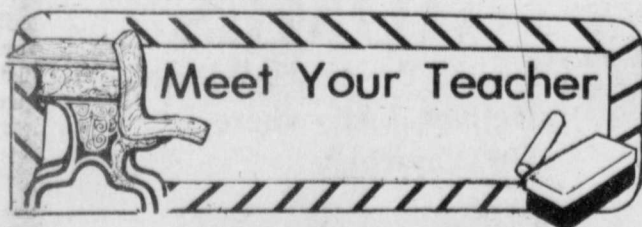
It's March already, and it seems like only yesterday that autumn was passing too quickly. Then winter set in and it zoomed right on by too!

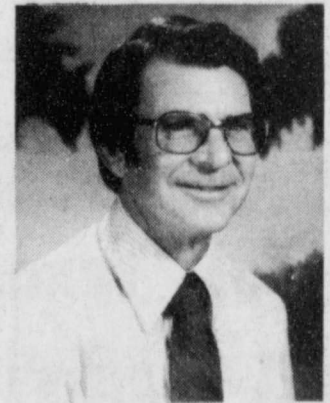
CINDY HOWARD—who plays the maid in the University Interscholastic League play, "Two Fools Who Gained A Measure Of Wisdom" is shown

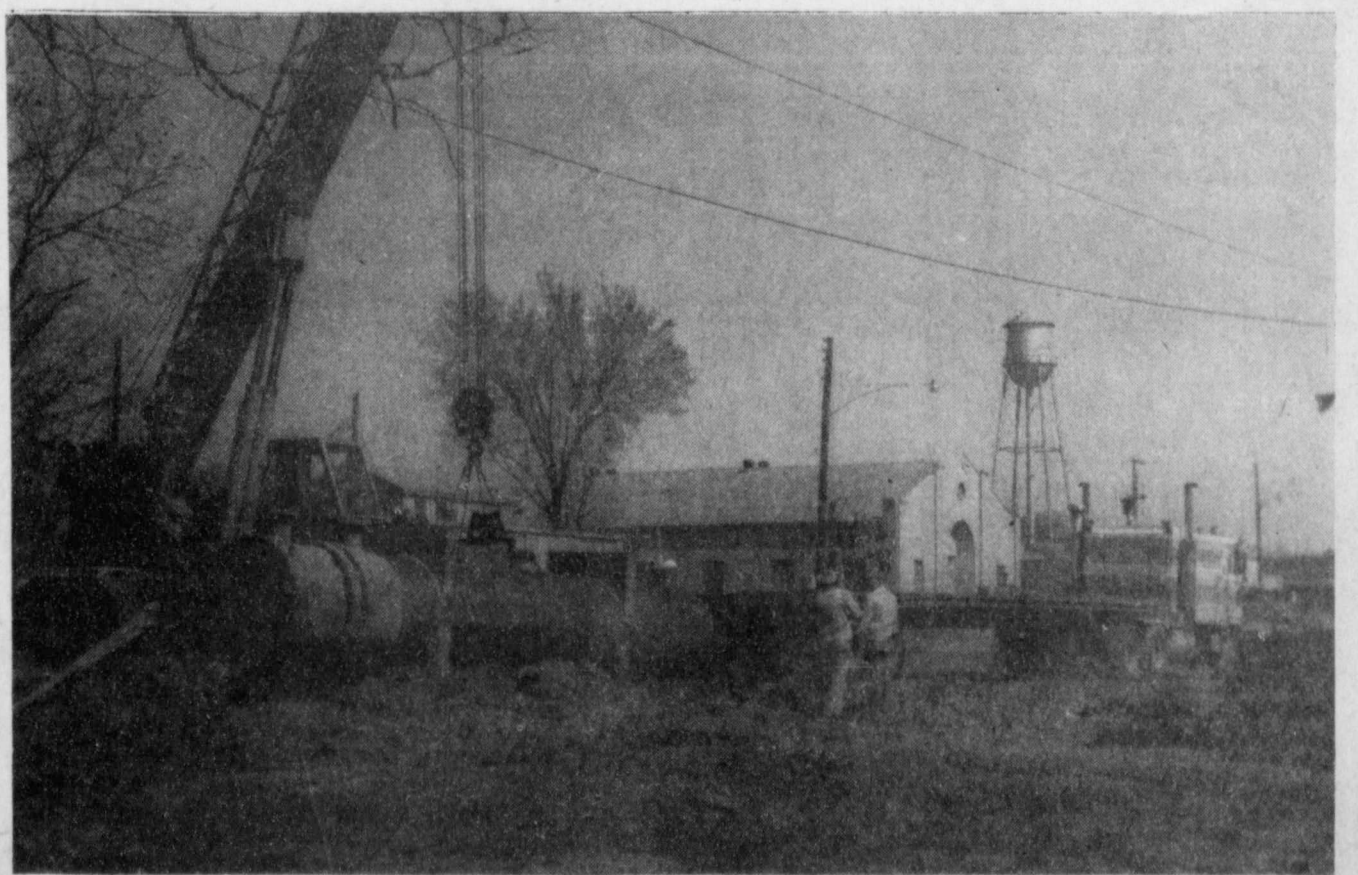

No invitations are being sent. All friends and relatives are invited to attend.

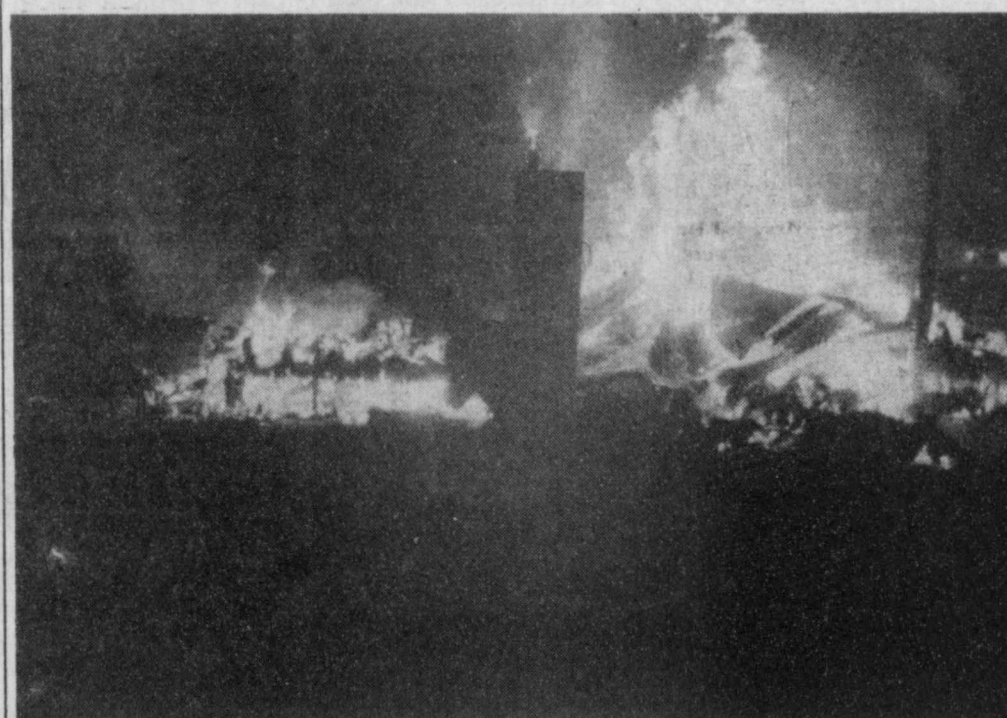

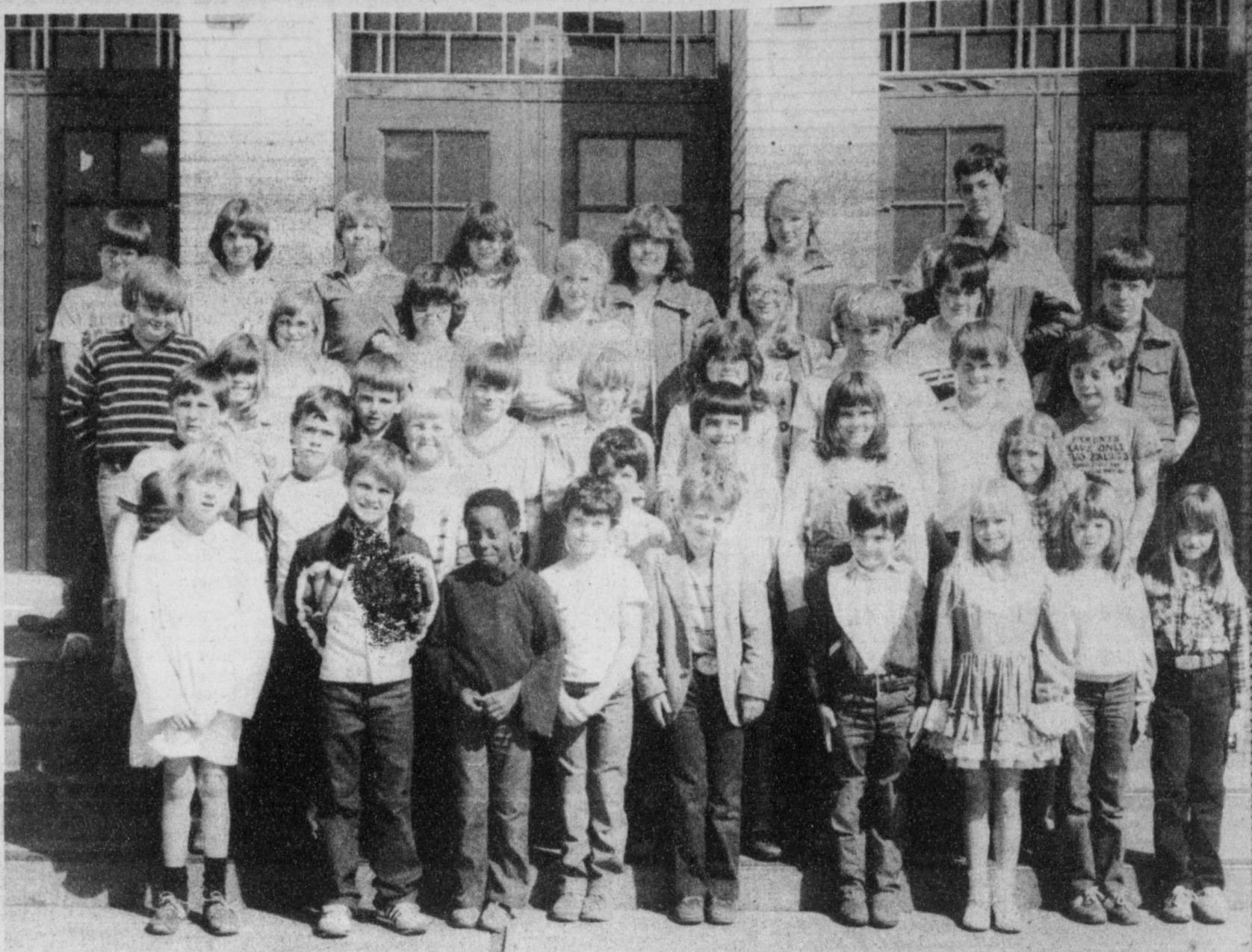

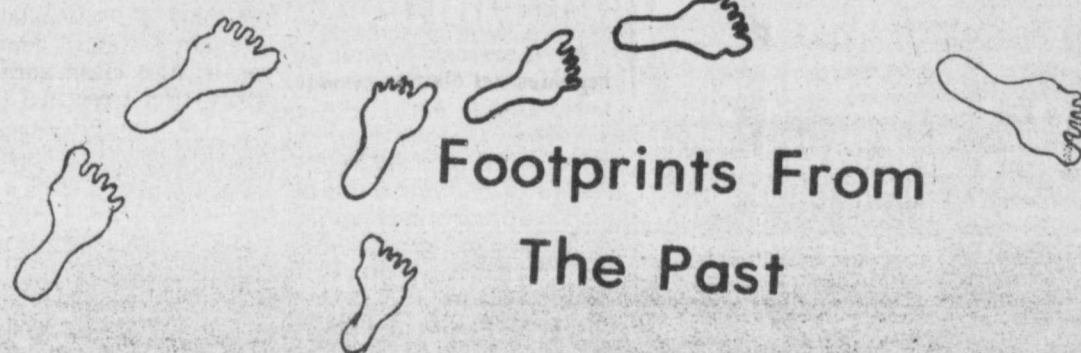

One pony my brother and I owned was a small, boney little thing. There was just no way to fatten her up or even

We galloped her in a little race to school one day and slid on a muddy corner and the pony slipped. We weren't hurt, but the little pony was. She couldn't walk and she had to be turned out to pasture. Somehow she got loose and disappeared, and my brother and I grieved like she was a member of the family.

After about a year, we found her. She was nearly starved, and walked with a limp. She was never fit to ride again, so we tried to get Dad to buy us a new pony. But as long as we still had old Dixie, he wouldn't. Finally we sold old Dixie, and he got us another pony, but we

never had a horse that we loved any more than Dixie.

Glen Nichols Selected As Conservation Farmer

Glen Nichols has been selected as outstanding resident conservation farmer in Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. The district's board of directors chose Nichols because of his outstanding program on his farm.

Glen Nichols and his sons David and Donnie farm 1182 acres north of Clarksville. He purchased this farm in 1980. Prior to that, he managed the farm for Dr. H.W. Parchman. The Nichols family lives on the farm. Other family members include his wife, Sue, daughter, Anna, who also provide a great deal of help on managing the farm.

The farm has been under cooperater agreement since 1948. After Glen purchased the farm, he continued as a cooperater with the district. Working with the Soil Conservation Service he developed a conservation plan for the farm. It contains

approximately 505 acres of cropland and 677 acres of pastureland. The cropland is located in the Red River Bottom. These soils are productive especially when an adequate drainage system is installed. The crops grown consist of wheat, soybeans and grain sorghum. Last year for the first time, he planted about 40 acres of rice.

The pastureland consists primarily of bermudagrass and clover. The grazing is managed to maintain an adequate height on the bermudagrass. Nichols realizes that good pasture management provides a long life for the forage species, improves its quality and protects the soil. Wheat also provided grazing during the winter months.

Nichols has continually worked to improve the farm. Most of the bottomland has been cleared to develop the land for a more intensified use. The cleared land is now

in cropland and improved pasture. With the help of SCS he has installed about 7000 feet of drainage as crops and weather allow. A conservation cropping system is being allowed on all the cropland that will maintain and improve the soil. Crop residues are also utilized to add organic matter and improve soil tilth.

Glen Nichols is and continues to be one of the top producers in Red River County. The board of directors were unanimous in their choice of Glen Nichols as the district's outstanding resident conservation farmer, and they wish to commend him on the excellent job he is doing.

PJC Hosts Program

With a grant given to PJC by the Meadows Foundation of Dallas, Virginia Brown, coordinator of continuing education at the college, is planning a model senior citizens' employment program to meet the needs of Paris area employers and senior adults. Mrs. Brown, who has been doing research on the project for some months, has mailed a letter and questionnaire to Lamar County residents with the hopes of obtaining response

on the need for such a program here and the availability of senior employees.

"Research has shown that more than one of every five older Americans who retires will return to work at least part-time," Mrs. Brown noted, "so employment programs are being established to meet these needs."

Since the PJC grant funds only the planning of a program proposal, an expression of community need and talent is necessary before further development and funding possibilities can be explored. Mrs. Brown asks senior citizens interested in employment to come by her office in the Alford Center at PJC and fill out an application or call her at 785-7661, extension 168. She also wants the names of area employers interested in hiring one or more persons 55 or older for full time, part-time or occasional work.

The model program designed by Mrs. Brown may be used by other community colleges and social service agencies in rural areas. Ark-Tex Council of Governments and other council of governments in Northeast Texas and Southeast Oklahoma areas have endorsed the concept and are supporting the development of the program, Mrs. Brown said.

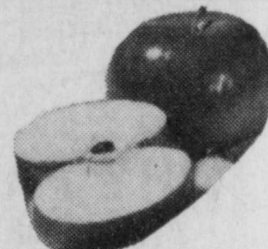
