Scout Court Of Honor Here Sets Council Record

Six Reach Eagle Rank, Scouting's Highest; Many Advance

Scouting took on new significance in Ozona Tuesday evening when the Ozona troop, No. 53, saw the advancement of five Scouts and their Scoutmaster to the rank of Eagle Scouts, the highest rank to which Scouts can aspire. Simultaneous advancement of six Eagle Scout rank in any one troop is a Concho Valley Council record, it was disclosed.

In addition to the award of certificates to the six Eagles, five boys who have just reached Scout age were inducted into the troop at Tenderfoot investiture ceremony conducted by Scoutmaster Joe Eddon. The Tenderfoot Scouts were W. B. Robertson, W. C. Brock, Bobby Lemmons, Walter Hill and Berkeley Smith.

Twenty-eight merit badges were awarded to nine Scouts by Supt. C. S. Denham, who presided over the Court of Honor. These went to Maurice Lemmons in camping, bird study, scholarship; Grover Jones in civics and scholarship; Clifton Taliaferro in bookbinding, reading, dairying, civics, bird study and pathfinding; to Howard Lemmons in civics, bird study and scholarship; to Richard Miller in camping, civics, bird study, pathfinding, pioneering and safety; to Norman Randall in scholarship; to Miles Pierce in music; to Beecher Montgomery in animal industry; and to Joe Haddon in music, farm home and its plan-

Schleicher Men Seek Designation Brady-Ozona Road

Crockett County Help Asked At Hearing In Austin Nov. 16

C. S. McKinney, county judge-elect of Schleicher County, and two newly elected commissioners, Henry Speck and Jeff Enoch, were here from Eldorado early this week conferring with members of the Commissioners Court of this county relative to a plan being advocated in Schleicher County for a through highway from Brady through Menard and Eldorado to Ozona.

The Eldorado men were here to seek the co-operation of Crockett County officials and citizens in a movement to secure designation by the State Highway Department of the proposed highway.

An appointment has been made with the Highway Commission for a hearing on the project at Austin on Monday, Nov. 16, Mr. McKinney said, and it was hoped that the Crockett County commissioners would send a representative from this county to the hearing. The new route is being advocated as a direct outlet for this section to Fort Worth and Dallas and other points in the eastern part of the state.

School Buys Public Address System For Outdoor Programs

A public address or sound system was purchased recently by the Ozona Public Schools for use in announcing plays at athletic contests, for outdoor activities of the schools in the Spring and for other occasions that might arise. It was announced this week by Supt. C. S. Denham.

The equipment is the newest type R.C.A. set, and is for use on regular electric current. The set will be initiated next Saturday afternoon at the football field when the Ozona Lions tangle with the Big Lake Owls in a non-conference game on the local grid.

Gymnasium Floor At High School Being Sanded, Refinished

Sanding and refinishing of the Ozona High School gymnasium floor is under way this week, C. O. Bolin, San Angelo floor finishing contractor, in charge of the work.

The gymnasium floor is being worked for the first time since the High School building was constructed. After the sanding is completed, the basketball court is to be re-lined by the school force, after which a new no-burn gymnasium floor finish is to be applied over the painted court lines.

Lions Cop First Conference Victory With Win Over Menard on 20-Yard-Line Penetrations In Scoreless Mud Battle

Big Lake Coming For Return Match Saturday At 3

Coach Ted White and his Ozona High Lions will rest from conference competition the coming week end after shading the Menard Yellow jackets of Coach Dave Williamson by a one penetration margin for their first conference victory Saturday afternoon in a mud slinging contest on Powell Field grid.

Not that the Lions will be idle next Saturday afternoon. Instead, they will be very busy entertaining the Owls from Big Lake in a non-conference combat, the second between the two teams this season. The locals nosed out the Owls 7-0 in their first meeting in Big Lake late in September, and will try to repeat the dose when the feathered crew invades Powell Field Saturday afternoon. The game is slated for 3 p. m.

The Lions proved themselves better mud daubers than the Yellowjackets in a listless duel here last Saturday. With two penetrations of the Menard 20-yard zone to one for the Jackets, the Lions were awarded the decision in the scoreless contest.

Jackets Threatened

The Wasps invaded the 20-yard zone of the Lions near the end of the first chucker. After a series of kicks (which was what both teams were doing most of the sixty minutes of play the visitors took the ball in midfield and a pass, Zimmerman to Burk, took the ball to Ozona's 22. A reverse play, that the locals finally solved to make its further use ineffective, worked at that period in the game to take the ball to Ozona's 15-yard line, where the Lions dug in to take the oval on downs.

From then until the half period, it was mostly an exhibition of booting the soggy ball from one end of the field to the other, with both teams putting on occasional offensive spurts that soon bogged down in the heavy terrain. The Lions were turning in an excellent brand of defensive football to keep the visitors well away from

Vote In General Election Tuesday To Be Light Here

Amendments May Be Boost To Interest, However

Apparent lack of intense interest in the outcome of the general election next Tuesday gives rise to the prediction that considerably less than half the voters of Crockett County will go to the polls on that day to register their vote on issues presented.

Election of candidates for state, district and county offices being a mere formality, and the outcome of this state's balloting for presidential electors a foregone conclusion, voters have only the decision on six important proposed constitutional amendments to attract their interest, save in the case of those who have intense party feelings and vote them to swell the party showing, or to register futile but determined opposition to the dominant party.

All of the six proposed amendments to the state constitution are worthy of careful consideration by the voters, and should prove of sufficient interest to overcome the natural indifference to ward casting a ballot on party choices. In the order that they appear on the ballot, the six proposals are to provide a state monopoly on the sale of liquor, providing for a retirement fund for teachers in state supported schools, for workmen's compensation insurance for state employees, for creation of a board of pardons and paroles and limiting the governor's pardoning power, for increasing the salaries of the governor and certain other elected state officials, and limiting representation in the state legislature for the larger counties of the state.

Early Paving Of Sutton, Crockett Highway Sections

Department Lists Projects For Attention At Early Date

Announcement of plans for early completion of paving work on the last unpaved sections of Highway 27 through Sutton and Crockett Counties was made recently by the State Highway Department at Austin.

An appropriation of \$6,000 was made recently by the department to finish caliche base and asphalt surfacing on an unfinished stretch of this highway in Sutton County.

A section of the road nearly 25 miles in length west of Ozona, starting at the end of the nine-mile section from Ozona west, paving on which was completed recently, is among projects on the department's calendar for completion between now and the end of the present fiscal period next July, it was announced in a recent statement from the department. Paving of these two sections will remove the last unpaved parts of this important through highway across the state.

Taylor To Hold Final Methodist Services Sunday

Retiring Minister To Preach Both Morning And Evening

Rev. R. A. Taylor, retiring pastor of the Ozona Methodist Church, will preach his final sermons to local congregations Sunday morning and evening, the last Sunday in the present conference year. Rev. Taylor resigned several months ago to accept a position on the faculty of Westmoorland College in San Antonio, and has been serving as nominal pastor since taking up his new work at the college with the opening of the new term in September.

Rev. Taylor's sermon subject for the morning hour will be "Christian Education Implementing the Program of Christ," and for the final sermon at the evening hour "The Church in a Changing World," he has announced.

Rev. and Mrs. Taylor, and son, Bobby, will spend Friday night in Kerrville, coming on to Ozona Saturday. They will leave early Monday morning to return to San Antonio to attend the West Texas Conference opening Tuesday.

COUNTY'S TAX VALUES HIKE ON 1936 ROLL

Valuations Reach Total of \$5,663,235.14 for Current Year

INCREASE \$141,390

Taxpayers owe Schools County and State \$108,124.83

Assessed valuation of taxable property in Crockett County for 1936 reached a total of \$5,663,235.14, an increase of \$141,390 over the valuation for 1935, it was revealed by tabulation of values on the 1936 tax rolls completed early this week by Miss Rachel Schrader, deputy in charge of assessments in the office of W. S. Willis sheriff, assessor and collector of taxes.

With 100 percent payment of taxes by citizens, the county stands to take in a total of \$56,632.35 on its tax rate of \$1 on the \$100 valuation. The state's tax rate of 62 cents would bring in on this valuation a total of \$31,202.50 and taxpayers owe the schools \$20,290.07 on the school tax rate of 40 cents. In addition, the state is due \$1,045 on 697 poll tax assessments, while the county's part from the same source is \$174.25.

The tax rolls show a total of 1,832,162.2 acres of land in this county rendered for taxation at a taxable value of \$2,778,527.

Half Mile of Railway

One-half mile of railroad in this county will bring in a revenue of \$52.44 to the county's coffers in tax payments. The K.C.M. & O., now a part of the Santa Fe system, clips a corner of the county on the northwest edge. The roadbed for this stretch of road is assessed at \$2500 and rolling stock at \$120.

Pipe lines and public utility concerns will pay taxes on assessments.

Rains, Advancing Wool Market Put Ranchers On Top

Industry Is Facing Best Outlook In Nearly Decade

With a frenzied activity in the wool market that sent prices soaring to the highest level since the roaring 1920's, a good moisture seasoning already in the ground and a steady drizzle that is sending the moisture deeper and deeper into the ground for an assured abundance of winter feed and early green grass in the spring, ranchmen of West Texas find themselves in the best position they have known in nearly a decade.

A buying drive early this week sent wool prices skyward, with more than three million pounds of the fibre sold in this ranching area at prices from 25 to better than 28 cents for fall wool and long wool at 30 to 35 cents.

Rains have literally soaked a large area of the ranching section since last week-end. Here the fall in the week's period has amounted to a little more than an inch and a half. Uninterrupted drizzles, falling last Friday and Saturday, and starting up again this week on Monday, have accounted for the total moisture, with the result that all of the fall has soaked into the ground.

FUN OR VANDALISM?

Another observance of Hallow-
e'en by the youth of the land ap-
proaches. Confined to the walking
of goblins, witches soaring thru
the skies aboard brooms, innocent
frolic and fun on an evening set
aside for the purpose, the observ-
ance of All-Hallow Eve is pleas-
ant for everybody.

But, unfortunately, there is al-
ways a group of youngsters who
are not content to confine their
nocturnal activities on this oc-
casion to innocent fun, but, un-
der the guise of such, turn hood-
lums for an evening with license
to destroy the property of others
with impunity.

On the occasion of this observ-
ance last year, a group of such un-
restrained youth here damaged
plate glass windows of every busi-
ness house in Ozona to the ex-
tent of several hundred dollars by
scratching them with soap and
other materials that inflicted per-
manent damage. Look at any win-
dow in town after it has been new-
ly cleaned and you can see the
marks of the soap treatment a
year ago. If it happened that a
painted sign was on the outside,
the sweeping swipes of soap cut
swatches through the paint as if
a scraper had been used.

The downtown section present-
ed a sorry appearance for days af-
ter the occasion despite the ef-
forts of storekeepers to remove
the signs of vandalism as rapidly
as possible. But that was not the
worst of the demonstration, the
permanent damage to plate glass
and store fronts ran into hundreds
of dollars.

Hallowe'en is youth's own—and
every boy and girl should cele-
brate the evening in fun and fro-
lic. But the impulse to turn van-
dal under cover of darkness and
a mask should be restrained by
citizens and law enforcing authori-
ties.

NO WITCHES' FROLIC

Dallas News—Hallowe'en is al-
most upon us again and with it
the annual problem which its cele-
bration presents to the police of
Dallas and its two park city neigh-
bors. Officers of the law are justi-
fied in taking time by the fore-
lock and in making quite clear
that merry-makers must distin-
guish clearly between innocent or
prankish fun and wanton property
damage. For several years past
Dallas has suffered from injury
both to persons and property, in-
flicted under the guise of Hallow-
e'en fun.

There is some intended crime
carried on under protection of
Hallowe'en masks and dominoes.
The police take that into account
but it is well for business enter-
prises open at night to adopt their
own special precautions against it.
Malicious mischief comes in an-
other category. It is sometimes the
product of adult minds that have
not awakened to the responsibil-
ities of maturity; more frequently
it is the product of unthinking
youth. In either case the law
should be prepared to make ar-
rests where this type of damage is
involved and the offenders or their
parents held accountable for what
is done in the way of injury.

Hallowe'en might as well be
blotted out of all campaigns to
abate noise. Most of us are good-
natured and will accept stoically
if not tolerantly, the usual pranks
of the occasion. We expect spirits
to ring our doorbells or to lift
their hobgoblin countenances a-
gainst our window panes. When it
comes to letting air out of car
tires, carrying off property or any
other real damage, the citizen is
justified in using force to prevent
loss or inconvenience and to make
use of the law in making arrests
to bring home the gravity of the
offense.

TEACHER RETIREMENT

One of the proposed amend-
ments to the Texas Constitution
which will be voted upon Novem-
ber 3—No. 2 on the list of six to
be submitted then—authorizes the
Legislature to establish and levy
taxes for a system of teacher re-
tirement—including teachers both
in public schools and in colleges
and universities maintained by
the state.

The proposed retirement system
is a matching plan. Each person
employed in such capacity would
be required to contribute a cer-
tain percentage of his salary, to
be matched by similar contribu-
tions from the state up to five per
cent of the compensation of the
person involved, though the total,
per year, per teacher, is not to ex-
ceed \$180. No person would be
eligible for retirement annuity
who had not taught 20 years in
the state. And any person accept-
ing teacher retirement pension
would not be eligible for bene-
fits from other pension funds.

The amendment ought to pass,
it seems to us.

We've been niggardly enough,
in our compensation to teachers.

We ought to give them this defi-
nite hope of moderate security in
their old age.—El Paso Herald
Post.

ALWAYS A CANDIDATE

Norman Thomas, now running
for President of the United States
for the third time on the Socialist
ticket, is the most persistent and
unsuccessful candidate now be-
fore the public. He has never been
elected to any office, and doesn't
expect to be.

His "also ran" record follows:
In 1924 for governor of New
York; in 1929 for mayor of New
York City; in 1926 for New York
State Senate; in 1927 for alder-
man; in 1928 for President; in
1929 for mayor; in 1930 for Con-
gress; in 1931 for Manhattan bor-
ough president; in 1932 for Presi-
dent; in 1934 for United States
Senator, and now again for Presi-
dent in 1936.

As Mr. Thomas will not be 52
years old until November 20 of
this year, he may be a candidate
for President in at least three or
four more campaigns. The Social-
ists seem likely to nominate him
as often as he "chooses to run."

As a boy in his home town of
Marion, Ohio, Thomas once car-
ried newspapers for the late Presi-
dent Harding. He was graduated
from Princeton in 1905, and from
Union Theological Seminary in
1911, in which year he entered the

Presbyterian ministry, filling var-
ious pastorates during the next 20
years. He is also widely known as
a magazine editor and author.

He admits that if his chief de-
sire was to be President he would
not be a Socialist. But his devo-
tion to Socialistic principles en-
ables him to take a beating with

a smile every time he runs
something.

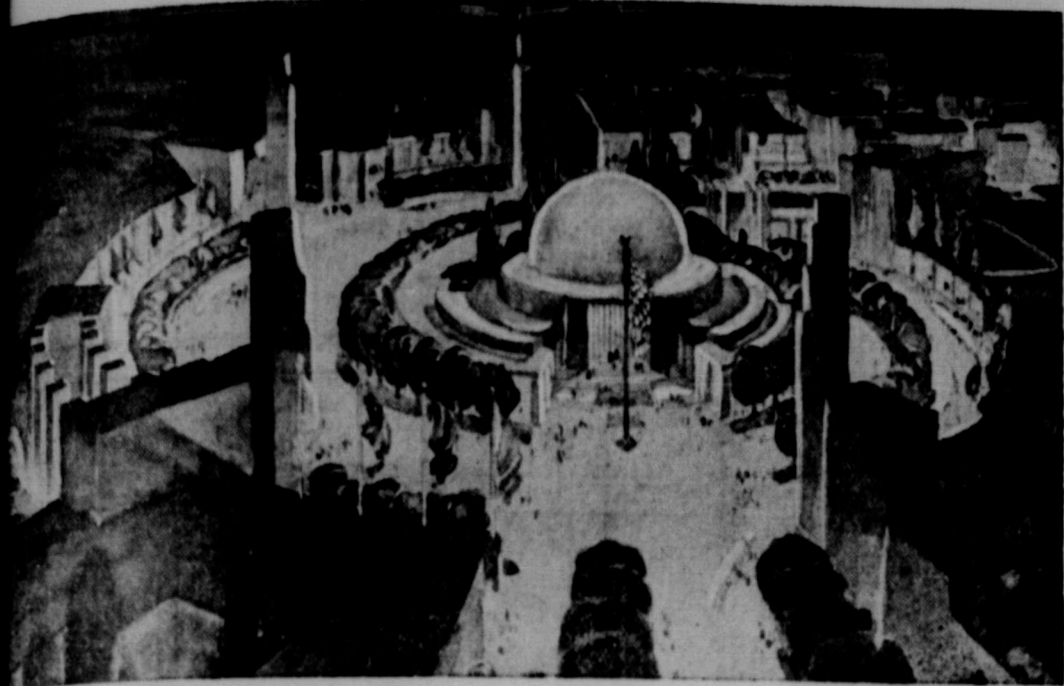

Business Recovery In Texas Continues

AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—Dollar sales of department stores in Texas during September increased substantially over the like month last year and the gain in sales from August to September was greater than the average seasonal gain between these two months, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.
Reports from 87 representative establishments show total gains of 16.7 per cent over September last year. The increase from August to September was 40.3 per cent against an average seasonal gain of 35.8 per cent. During the first nine months of the year aggregate sales increased 16.6 per cent over those of the corresponding period last year.

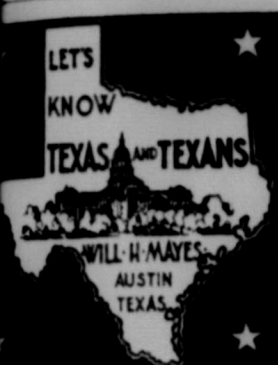

This column answers will be to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Where and when was there first Ewell in Texas? K. G. D.
It was on the Nueces river at 40 miles southwest of "Dog Flat," now Tilden, and was the stage stand between that and the Rio Grande; was established in 1832 and named for Ewell of the U. S. dragoons.

Who published "Texas Sift" and what became of it?

It was published by Alex E. Knox and J. Arroyo Knox, first at Austin, and then at San Antonio, for which it was moved to New York and died. It was a much needed, but rather radical humor paper.

Q. How did (a) Sealy, (b) the Brazos river, (c) San Felipe, get their names? V. R. K.

A. Sealy was named for George and John Sealy of Galveston, officials of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Ry.; (b) Brazos river was originally named Brazos de Dios, meaning "Arms of God," by De Leon expedition of 1689, and so-called because of its many tributaries; (c) San Felipe was first named San Felipe de Austin, July 16, 1823, for the Patron Saint Felipe and Stephen F. Austin.

Q. How is the battle of San Jacinto ranked among the decisive battles of the world? N. B.

A. Cressy in his "Decisive Battles of the World," places it as sixteenth, because of the large territory reshaped as a consequence of the Texas victory.

Q. How many and what were the Texas "municipalities" in 1836? H. H.

A. There were 18 "municipalities" (governmental districts) in Texas in 1836, as follows: San Felipe de Austin, Bexar (San Antonio), Brazoria, Goliad, Gonzales, Matagorda, Mina (Bastrop), Nacogdoches, San Augustine, San Patricio, Harrisburg, Jasper, Liberty, Milam, Refugio, Shelby (Tenaha), Victoria and Washington.

Q. Who was Dr. James Grant and what was his part in early Texas history? E. D. T.

A. He was a native of Scotland, who became a naturalized citizen of Mexico and large land holder near Parras, Coahuila. In 1835 he secured a grant to settle 800 families between the Rio Grande and

the Nueces. He became embittered toward Mexico and with 40 men joined Milam in the capture of San Antonio in 1835. On March 2, 1836, while encamped with about 40 men on the Agua Dulce, 20 miles west of San Patricio, the Texans were surprised by several hundred Mexicans under Gen. Urrea, and Grant and most of his men were killed.

Q. What was Dr. Grant's attitude toward the independence of Texas? E. D. T.

A. He opposed it and his attempted expedition to Mexico at the time he was killed was with a view to forcing reestablishment of the constitution of 1824, rather than resort to separation of Texas from that country.

Q. What position did Ellis P. Bean hold in Nolan's "trading expedition" to Texas? G. S.

A. Bean was second in command and when Nolan was killed took command and strongly opposed surrender, but yielded to pleadings of his men when the Spaniards agreed to take them to Natchez and release them, instead of which they were chained and taken to Mexican prisons.

Q. What is the Texas State Motto, and when was it adopted? B. O. F.

A. "Friendship," adopted by the Fourth Called Session of the 41st Legislature in February, 1930.

Q. How was Col. Frank W. Johnson associated with Dr. Grant in the Mexican expedition of 1836? E. D. T.

A. Early in 1836 he helped Grant get permission from the Texas Executive Council to carry out a plan to reestablish the 1824 constitution of Texas and Coahuila. The night of March 1, 1836, while Grant and a party were foraging for horses on the Agua Dulce, Johnson and a number of the men, who were at San Patricio, were surrounded by Urrea's army and most of them were slaughtered or captured, Johnson and a few escaping the massacre.

Q. Tell something of Col. F. W. Johnson's life prior to the attempted Mexican expedition with Dr. Grant. E. D. T.

A. He was born in Virginia in 1784; came to Texas in 1826; was surveyor in Ayish district in 1830; was alcalde at San Felipe in 1831; commanded the forces at Anahuac in Anahuac in 1832; was adjutant, first to Austin and then to Burleson, in 1835; was with Milam at storming of San Antonio in 1835 and first in command after Milam's death.

Whooping Cough Control Needed Says Health Head

AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—While whooping cough is evident in all months of the year, the first weeks in October this year showed a rise in the number of cases reported to the State Health Department.

"Whooping cough is one of the most serious communicable or germ diseases affecting childhood and is especially dangerous to babies who have not passed their first birthday," Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, said in recommending stricter methods of control. About ninety per cent of all deaths from whooping cough occur in children under five years of age, the records show.

"The disease is usually transmitted," Dr. Brown said, "by direct contact with the secretion of the mouth or the nose, or with articles freshly soiled with the secretion. Only a short exposure is required to contract the infection. The communicable stage must be considered to extend from seven days after exposure to an individual infected with whooping cough to three weeks after the development of the characteristic whoop.

"Whooping cough is not easy to detect in its early stages, for during the first week or two it resembles an ordinary cold in its symptoms. Then, however, the child begins to have attacks of whooping. The catarrhal symptoms and cough gradually become more severe, there is a running from the nose and the eyes are reddened. The child coughs in spells, the cough getting more severe and finally develops what is commonly known as the 'whoop.'

"Preventive measures against whooping cough should include keeping small children away from other children when whooping cough is in the neighborhood, and

a visit to the family physician if whooping cough is suspected. Medical care is essential in whooping cough because proper medications can ease the spasmodic whooping and thus may save a life.

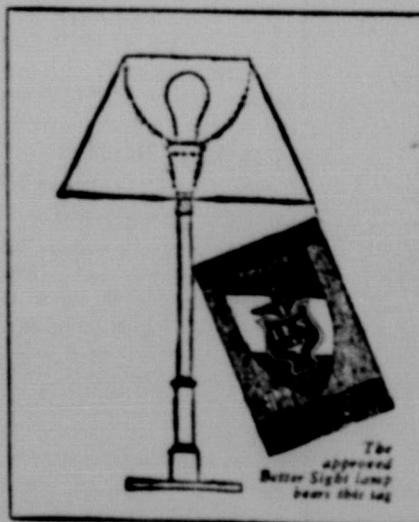

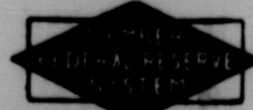

ed values of \$1,000,958 in this county for the current year, the rolls show.

Remarkable gains in the number of head of various classes of livestock are noted in the assessments this year over a year ago. Cattle rendered for taxation jumped from 8,783 head last year to 14,921 head this year. At a flat valuation of \$10 the head, cattle are taxed on a total valuation of \$149,210.

The rendition of sheep jumped nearly 100,000 head this year over 1935. This year a total of 279,775 head of sheep were assessed at \$2.25 a head for a total valuation of \$629,494, against a total of 180,175 head last year. Horses numbered 1584 head this year, valued at \$20 a head, for a total of \$31,680. Last year 1405 head were rendered. No mules were listed in the county.

One Man Tells All

Goats on the 1936 rolls number 17,165, assessed at a flat dollar a head. Last year's rendition of goats showed 10,000 head.

Only one man in the county turned in for purposes of taxation, his cash in the bank and notes receivable. This lone item, of \$8000 cash in banks and \$6000 in notes receivable, stands out on the recapitulation sheet of the tax rolls as the county's total cash and notes.

The Crockett County tax rolls were mailed to the State Comptroller several days ago for approval and as soon as this approval is received, probably this week, collection of 1936 taxes will be under way.

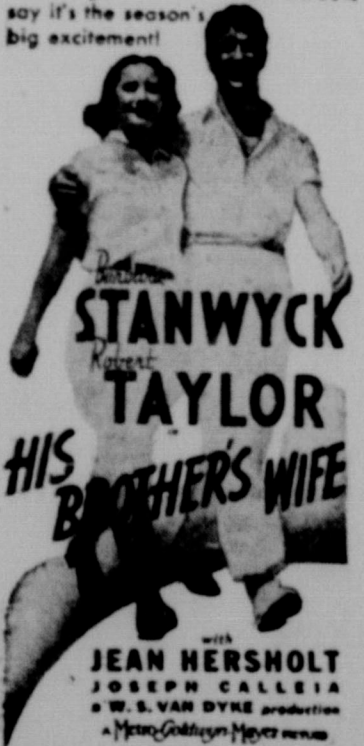
