Smoot Nov. 3, 1927 in Plainview. He moved to Tulia in 1948. A retired carpenter, he was a member of First United Methodist Church in Hart.

Survivors include his wife, Ruth; three daughters, Peggy Faulkner of Lubbock, Marilyn Kinnaird of Euless and Marietta Blackwell of Colleyville; two sons, Lonnie V. of Tulia and Morris H. ## Hart Days Celebration Gaining Momentum

Preparations continue to gain momentum as proceedings bring nearer the annual celebration of Hart Days. The event is scheduled for July 24-26.

"Western Days" is the theme chosen for this year's festivities. Honored pioneers are Martha Bauman and Myrt Loman.

Next planning session is Tuesday, July 8 at 8:30 p.m. in the community room of Farmers State Bank.

This year's celebration will again include the popular Miss Hart contest and the equally appealing Little Miss Hart competition. Mrs. Ricky Mitchell is chairman of the queens' contests. Entry fee for each contest is \$10.

Miss Hart contestants must be between the ages of 15-19 as of Sept. 1, 1980 and have attended school in Hart the past semester. Little Miss Hart entries must be five to seven years of age as of Sept. 1, 1980. They must have lived in the community at least three months.

Friday, July 25 has been designated as "Western Day" and all persons are required to dress in accordance. Persons not wearing some form of western attire will be fined. Members of the Good Neighbors Club will assess and collect fines.

A beard growing contest has also been established. This is sponsored by Chi Psi sorority. There is no charge for entering the contest but contestants should sign up at Hi-Plains Insurance. Beards cannot already be grown but must be started now. The judging and decision will be made on Saturday following the parade. Winner will receive a steak dinner for two at K-Bob's Restaurant.

The annual watermelon feast is also planned and will come under the direction of Jim Black.

Held annually, the Merchants Drawing is scheduled for Saturday with Zealot Club members making arrangements. Valuable gifts from local merchants will be given away. Persons must be present to win although husbands and wives will be allowed to accept prizes for each other. No other exception is made.

R.G. Henderson will be parade marshal. Floats will be judged in one division on scales of one to 10 in each of three separate categories, originality, following the theme and showmanship. Most Unusual Entry will be given in addition to the top three floats. Prizes will be \$35, first place; \$25, second place and \$15, third place and most unusual, respectively.

Jimmy Ray Davis is chairman of the fiddlers contest which will get underway at 1 p.m. Saturday, July 26.

Other Saturday events are hot air balloon rides, teen dance, square dance and carnival.

Bill Anderson of Miller Flying Service will be in charge of the balloon rides and persons who have always wished for a lift to the skies in a hot air balloon will have the opportunity for \$5 each.

## Su Cox Attends Seminar Human Relations Education

Each weekday, for about two weeks, 31 persons gathered between 2 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. in the snack bar of the West Texas State University Student Union Building.

The time each day was more than a break from the stuffy summer heat during the three and a half hour class. The students were "relating."

Su Cox was one of 31 elementary, junior high school, high school and college level teachers, a nursing school instructor and a school nurse from 14 communities in the Panhandle and South Plains area, participating in the Human Relations Education Seminar.

Students said they became a "close knit group" and became acquainted with each class member in their "eyeball-to-eyeball, knee-to-knee" communication in the graduate seminar. Dr. Jack Nance, associate professor of education, instructed the class from 12:30 p.m. to 3:50 p.m. daily from June 3-18.

Through role-playing, films and group dynamics, the students said they learned more about themselves and others, how to deal with conflict, how to deal with administrators, colleagues and students, and how to be more honest with themselves through self-analysis and interaction with others.

"We learn more about principals -- spelled p-a-l-s," laughed one class member.

Several class members said they never had experienced a similar opportunity to learn about human relations. The students, who are

earning master's degrees at WTSU, said the course has been personally and educationally beneficial and could prove beneficial to any person. They earned three semester credit hours.

Students enrolled in the class were from Amarillo, Canyon, Lockney, Odessa, Hart, Gruver, Lubbock, Spearman, Pampa, Plainview, Borger, Phillips and Abernathy.

WTSU residence halls became home for two weeks for students from outlying towns. For those students, human relations extended beyond class time. One student said she had become "good friends" with several of her classmates and dormitory neighbors.

## TABS Results Presented To Board

Results from the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills were presented to the Hart School Board of Education June 12. As mandated by the Texas Legislature, all fifth and ninth grade students took the tests this year. Next year, all third, fifth, and ninth grade students will take the tests.

Designed to assess minimum basic skills in reading, writing and arithmetic, the tests were given in February and were scored by Westinghouse Data-Score Systems.

Individual results were interpreted to each student by his/her counselor. Test results are available to parents (the individual results will become a part of each student's permanent folder) A summary of the test results will be presented to the Hart faculty at an August in Service Meeting.

The test is designed to pinpoint strengths and weaknesses in each of the three areas in order to plan curriculum and teaching that will better meet the needs of all students more effectively.

Brown 1 1/2 lbs ground chuck. Add 1 med onion, chopped, and green chilies (fresh ones if available), chopped. Place meat mixture in center of flour tortillas and place in baking dish. Sprinkle generously with grated cheese. Pour 1 can green enchilada sauce and 1 can cream mushroom soup over enchiladas and heat in oven until bubbly hot.

### LEMON JELLO CAKE

1 yellow cake mix  
1/2 c salad oil  
1 1/2 c water  
6 oz lemon Jello  
8 eggs  
1 t lemon extract

Put all ingredients into mixing bowl; mix thoroughly with wire whip. Bake in loaf pan in pre-heated 350° oven till done. Pour following mixture over hot cake: 2 c sifted powdered sugar and 1 c lemon juice.

### LACY COFFEE FAN

2 pkg or cakes yeast  
1/4 c warm water  
1 1/4 t salt  
1/2 c sugar  
6 1/2 c flour  
3 T dry milk  
3 eggs, beaten  
2/3 c melted shortening

Sprinkle or crumble yeast into warm water. Stir until dissolved. Add salt, sugar, 2 c flour and dry milk. Stir to blend, then beat well. Stir in eggs, then cooled melted shortening. Beat well. Stir in 4 more c flour, reserving last 1/2 c for kneading. Sprinkle about 1/4 c flour over pastry cloth or board. Turn dough out on flour and knead until smooth and satiny, 5 to 7 mins., adding remaining 1/4 c flour if needed. Put dough into lightly greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 1 1/2 hrs.) Punch down. Cover and let rise 5 mins.

### FILLING

1/2 c brown sugar  
1/2 c flour  
1/8 t salt  
1/4 t cinnamon  
3 T margarine  
2 T nuts, chopped

With fork or pastry blender, mix sugar, flour, salt and cinnamon. Cut in margarine until mixture is crumbly. Stir in chopped nuts.

Divide sweet dough into thirds. On floured board, roll out 1/3 into rectangle. Spread with 1 T melted margarine and sprinkle with filling. Roll up, beginning at wide side. Pinch edge of dough into roll to seal. Place sealed edged down onto greased baking sheet, shaping into ring. Pinch ends together. With scissors, make cuts 2/3 of the way through the ring at 1" intervals. Turn each section on its side. Let rise till double, bake in 375° oven.

Elimination of bindweed from the City of Hart is a project being readied by Hart Lions Club. Spraying will begin in approximately three weeks.


Members of the club will canvass the town, applying chemicals to eradicate the troublesome weed from alleyways and vacant lots. They will not go into yards or gardens.

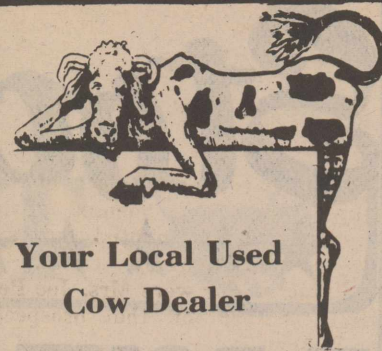
