Mitchell County was represented in a Thursday meeting hosted by Western Texas College in Snyder as 25 counties representing portions of three districts of ASCS executive directors and program assistants assembled.

Subject of the meeting was the 1974 cotton loan program. Don Stewart and Margaret Brune, representing Mitchell County ASCS office, attended the preliminary schooling session on loan handling conducted by Kermit Decker from the state ASCS office.

District directors present were Eddie Braswell of the district including Mitchell County, Tom Eagan of San Angelo and Tolbert Jaynes of the district north of Mitchell County.

Stewart said that a form is available in the ASCS office enabling county producers to put their cotton in the federal loan program. They will need their class cards and warehouse re-

Rainfall Spotted

Colorado City's rain gauge showed .22 inches of rainfall for the past three days.

Largest amount reported for the three day period was from Landers community where one inch fell.

Loraine had from .3 to .5 of an inch for the same three day period.

Other parts of the county reported only showers and traces of rainfall.

ceipts with grade and staple information.

Loan rate for such middling cotton is 25.26 cents per pound, but Stewart said most of the county's cotton is shorter staple and will rate about 15

to 20 cents per pound. Badly spotted cotton probably will not be eligible for the loan program.

To be eligible for the loan a producer must have an established allotment and meet certain other requirements. No holdover 1973 cotton is eligible, Stewart said.

"Of course, a producer might get more for his cotton through a private broker but we are anticipating some cotton will go into the loan," Stewart said.

Some loans are handled through the Plains Co-op or through local co-op bins, he pointed out, but the ASCS can

also help a producer get his cotton into the loan program.

A producer has a 10-month period after the loan is made before deciding whether or not to leave the cotton in the loan or he can redeem it.

A producer has the right to redeem his cotton by paying handling charges, storage and a clerk fee, plus interest of 9.375, and Stewart pointed out

that this would amount to about \$20 per bale if redemption from the loan is desired.

Most of the cotton which goes into the loan is left in and taken over by the Commodity Credit Corporation, he said. If this is the case, then the producer is not subject to any handling or storage fees.

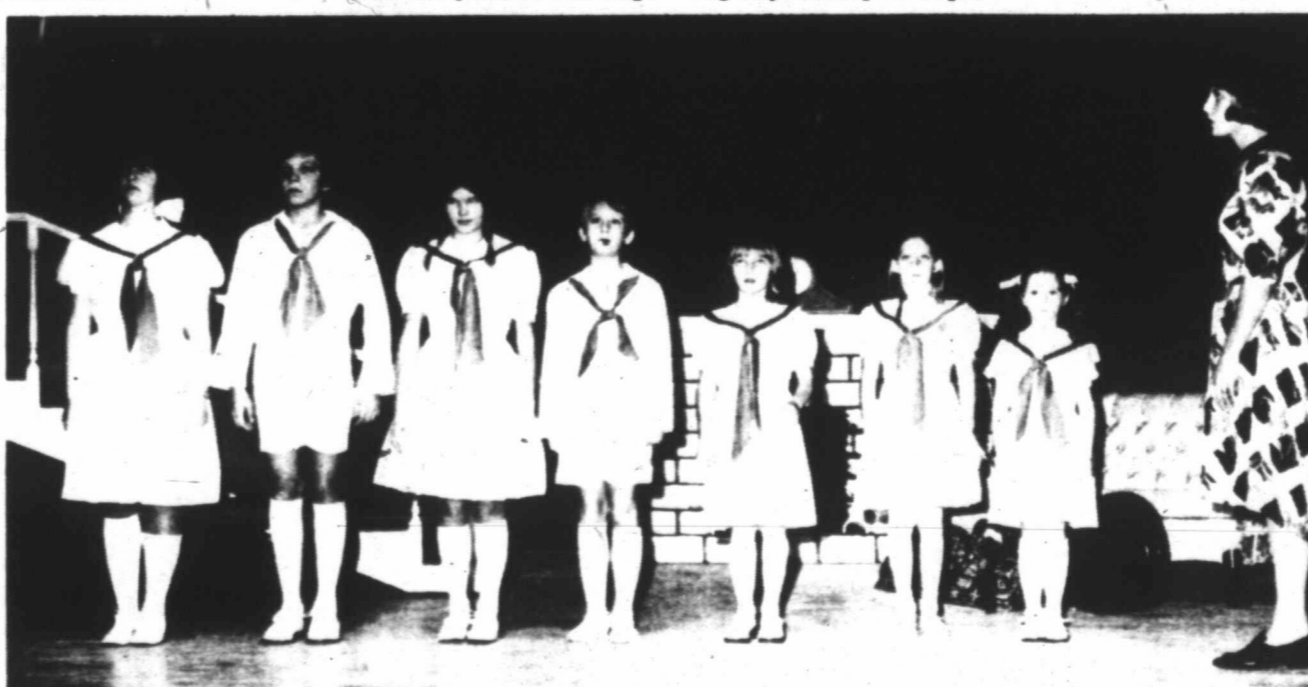

Food Stamp Sales Vary

Food stamp sales the past four months have been varying little, according to figures released by Postmaster Arlene Morris.

July sales of stamps went to 354 ATP card holders for \$33,377 in stamps for \$13,073.25 paid out in cash.

August saw 336 purchasers pay \$12,573.75 for \$32,579 in stamps.

September sales reached the \$33,377 mark when 332 card holders paid \$12,817 for the stamps.

October's stamp sales totaled \$32,052 for \$12,210.75 in cash paid by 317 ATP card holders.

Food stamp sales in Mitchell County began in November last year and had increased almost every month except for the past four months of variation between the \$33,000 and \$32,000 amounts.

Sales of the stamps have more than doubled since November's figures a year ago, as \$15,005 was the amount of food stamps sold, with buyers paying only \$6,461.75 for the increase in their food buying money.

Self Culture Club Has Program On Community Affairs

A program on public affairs highlighted the Nov. 1 meeting of Colorado City's Self Culture Club. The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. C. P. Gary, with prayer and pledge led by Mrs. Paul Beeman.

During the business session, the finance chairman announced that napkins were ready for sale as a money making project. Letters from San Angelo Health Center and Big Spring State Hospital were read, telling of items needed as Christmas gifts for the residents in each place.

The club voted to donate \$5 to the San Angelo Center, and a box of gifts to the Big Spring State Hospital.

A motion was made to request the hospital board of Root Memorial Hospital to ban smoking in the hospital and post signs to that effect. The motion carried.

Mrs. E. L. Tiller began the program speaking on "You've Come a Long Way." In referring to women's rights, she said, "Since being granted the right and privilege to vote, I think we have made gains, but we may have slipped backward in a few areas. The gap in earnings between men and women in the field of education has widened during the time women have been working for equal rights." She pointed out that President Ford has supported the pro-

posed Equal Rights Amendment and it has been approved by 33 of the 38 states needed for ratification. However, the amendment has sparked considerable controversy.

Mrs. Paul Beeman, continuing the public affairs program, spoke on "Stress of 'Poll-Power' Campaign." "Many Americans are trapped in one giant mistake. It is a basic conviction of millions. That is the idea that one person doesn't count much-he or she cannot make a difference," Mrs. Beeman said. "Nowhere in the world would you count for as much as you do in the United States... You are a free American citizen by virtue of inalienable rights and by virtue of public law that was adopted with you in mind."

"Did you vote in the last election? Did you personally exercise the right given to you by the founding fathers of this country? There are 5.3 million registered voters in the state of Texas. Only 28 per cent of these voters bothered to go to the polls in the May Primary election. Political experts cannot find a reason for the apathy found everywhere.

"The goal of Texas Federations of Women's Clubs Poll Power Campaign is to increase voters participation... by seeking out, informing and encouraging every registered voter to

exercise the right to vote. "It is time for the women of the Texas Federation to 'stand up and be counted.' They have the woman power to solve the problem of apathy at the ballot box."

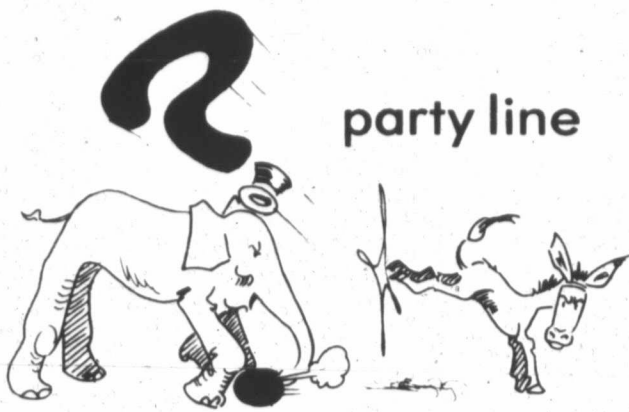

What are the duties of the county commissioners, their salaries, and is their job full time or part time? Why do they make more than the county sheriff or the county attorney?

Individually, the commissioners serve as road commissioners in their road precincts. In this capacity they are responsible for building and maintaining county roads and bridges in the precinct from which elected. Each road commissioner hires road personnel and contracts for road materials and road machinery.

Collectively the county commissioners with the county judge compose the county commissioners court. The commissioners court is the administrative body of the county. It adopts the county budget after it is prepared by the county auditor or the county judge and, within certain limits, determines the county tax rate. It lets contracts in the name of the county, directs payment of all accounts against the county, and may serve as a board of equalization for state and county tax assessments. It administers county welfare services and maintains county buildings. Said court shall have all such other powers and jurisdiction, and shall perform all such other duties, as are now or may hereafter be prescribed by law. (Article 2351, Vernon's Annotated Revised Civil Statutes). The commissioners perform these duties, one from each of the four precincts, for a four year term with a base salary of \$8,664 annually.

Whether or not the job is full or part time cannot be answered. In talking with 3 of the 4 commissioners (one could not be contacted) each commissioner stated that it was a 24 hour a day job. No commissioner, however, would realistically break the job down into actual hours devoted to county business. They are "on call twenty-four hours a day." They have one set meeting day a month at the courthouse, but they are subject to being together by the county judge or by three commissioners for pressing county business. It takes as much or as little time as they deem necessary to dispose of county business. The county commissioner, as with any other elected county official, is responsible to the people rather than to a chief executive within the system. Each commissioner is his own boss. Thus, the quality of the job and the time spent at it is essentially up to the man holding the office, as with any other elected official.

The base salary of the county commissioners is not more than that of the sheriff or the county attorney. Their salary lacks \$48 a month being as much as either the sheriff or the county attorney, who are paid the same. The salaries obviously are not paid on a per hour basis.

All county salaries are set by the commissioners court. These are set with some guidelines from the state and as compared with salaries in other counties.

When comparing salaries a question comes to my mind. Why is a qualified sheriff's deputy listed on the payroll as an office deputy and paid less than the courthouse custodian?

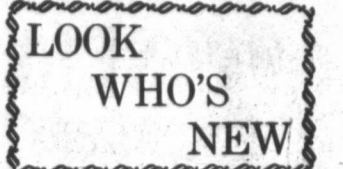
