The first basketball tournament of the current school year is to be held at the Klondike school gymnasium this coming Friday and Saturday, October 18 and 19. Sixteen teams have entered and from all indications the tournament will be one of the best held in Dawson county in several years. The playing schedule is as follows:

Friday afternoon, 2:00 o'clock, Wilson vs. Hancock; 2:50 Richardson vs. Tarzan; 3:40 Klondike vs. Fairview; 4:30 Five Mile vs. Courtney; 6:30 Pleasant Valley vs. Ackerly; 8:30 Browns vs. Woody. These games will be followed by two consolation games to complete the evenings play. The remaining four teams, Pluvana vs. Moore and Elbow vs. Gail are scheduled for 9:00 and 9:50 Saturday morning. The second round will start immediately upon the completion of the first round.

The referee for the championship games will be Dalton Meyers and for the consolation games Dub Mitchell.

The final games in both consolation and championship bracket will be held Saturday night at 7:30 and 9:30 with a game between the Klondike girls and a team to be selected in between.

Trophies for both consolation and championship will be given. An individual trophy of an athletic jacket will be awarded to the player considered the best player and sport in the tournament.

An exhibit of athletic supplies will also be displayed during the entire tournament.

Any team wishing to enter who have not registered to date may have the opportunity of playing if they are present during the tournament.

Asks Co-operation In Every Corn-Hog Parking Of Cars Producer to Get Vote

Traffic in Lamesa has become a problem, especially on Saturday's and special Trades Days. The City ordinance permits center parking around the square and one block from the square. This means if cars stop behind cars that are parked around the square there is a congested condition and traffic becomes dangerous.

Jack Phinizy, the City Marshall says that 98 per cent of the traffic troubles are caused by the people who live in the city limits and 100 per cent of the griping about traffic regulations is done by the city folks. In other words, the farmers who come here to trade are well satisfied to crowd and push through the heavy traffic and have no complaint to make. Instead, they very much desire to make sure that they obey all regulations. Jack says that he cannot understand why the people who live in Lamesa cannot adjust themselves to the traffic conditions as do the farmers.

Wonder if our city people could not give away on Saturday's and special trades days to our farmers and let them have the right of way. Of course every person in Lamesa has the same right to come to town and park their cars where there is an opening the same as other people, but for the sake of courtesy to Lamesa's trade territory and for safety too, it does seem that we city folks could keep our cars parked at some place on a back street or keep them at home on the special crowded days and allow those who do not get to come to town as often as we have the more convenient parking places.

Why cannot we town people do our trading during the week days when we will have more time, less crowded conditions and our merchants can better wait on us?

Again, we need to be more careful that some life may not be snapped out—and then we all will be sorry. Let's hear and heed and Marshall's warning.

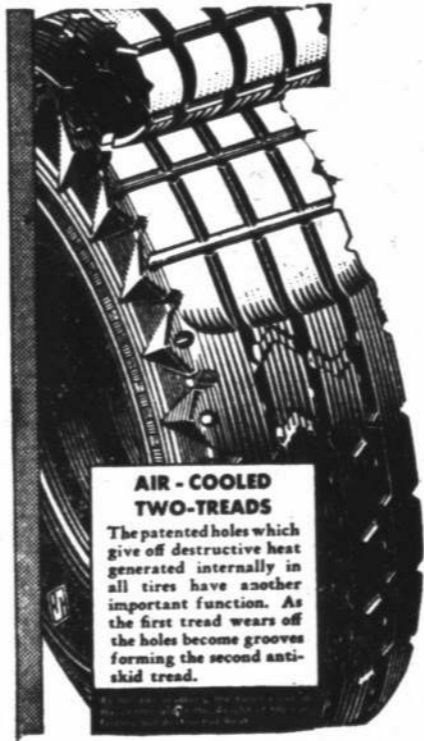

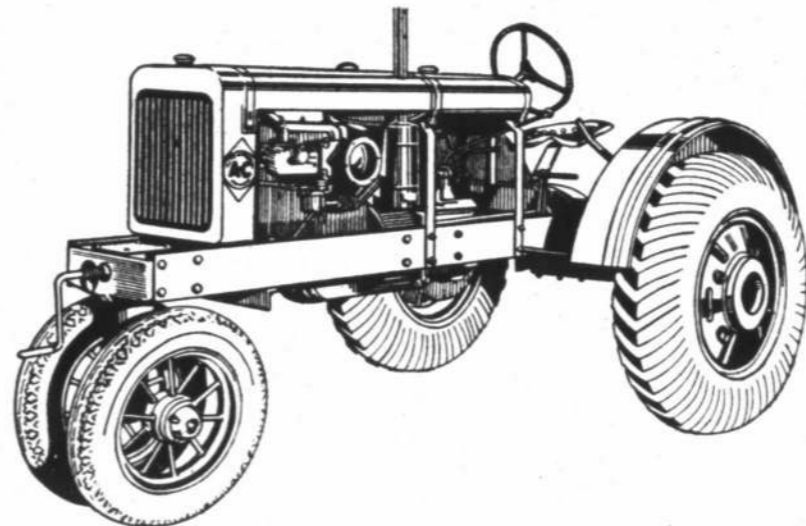

POLLING PLACE READY FOR VOTE ON CORN AND HOGS

There will be one polling place where Dawson county farmers can cast their votes in the nationwide corn-hog referendum on Saturday, October 26, has been set up in the county, it is announced by Dawson county agricultural agent.

Only one question will be on the ballot: Are you in favor of a corn-

hog adjustment program to follow the 1935 program which expires on November 30, 1936? All operators and owners, or their official representatives, of farms which produced corn or hogs in 1935 may vote whether they signed 1934 or 1935 corn-hog contracts or not. Each eligible person is entitled only to one vote.

The schedule of the polling place, which will be open from 8:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. is the county agent's office.

Officials of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration point out that unless a sufficient number of farmers vote favorably, there will be no program. The administration must be assured that a sufficient number of farmers will participate to make a program operative and successful.

Facts upon which farmers can base their judgment have been presented at a series of community meet show that livestock numbers are far out of line with feed supplies as a result of the drought. With plentiful supplies of cheap feed in prospect and with rapid rebuilding of swine numbers possible, farmers and consumers face the prospect that the next three years may bring the greatest increase in hog production that the country has even seen in a similar period and consequent disastrous hog prices.

During the past 45 years there have been ten such violent ups and downs, or cycles, which have undermined the swine industry, brought violent upswings and downswings in pork prices, destroyed farm buying power and wiped out markets for industrial products.

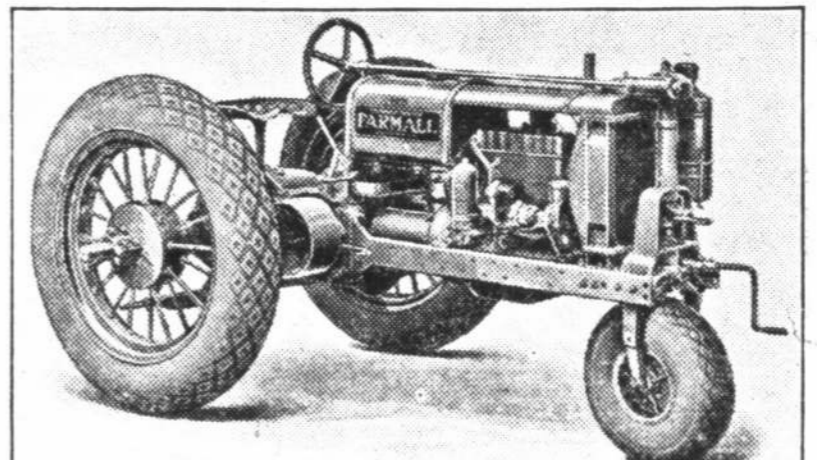

State School Beautification Project Planned

We have heard a great deal in the past few weeks about W. P. A. school year beautification projects, and although a number were submitted from this county, none have been approved. Interest in the program has therefore died to a great extent. However, word has been received by Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, County Superintendent, that a new program of school ward beautification and improvement of playground facilities is being promoted through the National Youth Administration, and if acted upon immediately is likely to materialize.

State Superintendent, L. A. Woods through the National Youth Administration, is sponsoring a State-wide project to build playground equipment, improve playground facilities, and beautify the school campus of any public school in the State that desires these improvements. Independent School Districts, as well as Common School Districts are eligible to participate in the project. If this project is approved at Washington (it has already been approved by the State WPA office) Federal funds for it will be limited, and the requests will be taken care of in the order of their arrival in the State WPA office.

Mr. Woods has stated that any school may budget as much as \$5.00 per teacher for the purchase of materials for the improvement of playground facilities, and that this item will be considered a legitimate disbursement against the local maintenance fund of the district. When the adopted budget is inadequate to take care of this item, supplementary budgets may be adopted to include it.

Briefly the project is as follows:

Each school district that wishes to participate, will budget \$5 per teacher for the purchase of materials for the improvement of playground facilities. The National Youth Administration through the Works Progress Administration will provide all necessary labor. Only youths unemployed and from relief families will be given work. When available these youths will be drawn from the school community. For each five dollars spent for materials, the Federal Government will spend \$57.60 for labor.

Trustees and principals interested in seeing their playground facilities improved should call at their very earliest convenience at the office of the county superintendent, and make application for this aid. Schools failing to make application will not be eligible to participate in this program.

Dawson County Owes \$735,995 Says Auditor

Austin, Sept. 30.—"Each person in Dawson county would owe \$54.22 if the \$735,995 debt of all the taxing districts in the county were distributed evenly," said State Auditor Orville S. Carpenter today about a recent survey.

"Average per capita indebtedness of all local units of government in Texas is \$115.10. Dawson county's debt is considerably less than this figure. Debts range from \$13 average per person in some counties to \$400 or \$500 in others," Mr. Carpenter said, concerning a recent report of the state auditor on "Taxes and Indebtedness of Local Units of Government in Texas for 1934."

"More than twelve and one-half million dollars worth of property is listed on the rolls of tax districts in Dawson county," he stated.

"This \$12,512,125 worth of property is assessed at an average of 40 per cent of its true value. Other counties have assessment bases ranging from 20 to 100 per cent of their property value," Mr. Carpenter explained.

"Taxing units considered in Dawson county were school districts, cities, and the county itself. The largest item in the Dawson county debt was City of Lamesa bonds and warrants, \$338,127," Mr. Carpenter said.

NEW GASOLINE PERFECTED BY PHILLIPS PET. CO.

Bartlesville, Okla., Oct. 4.—A new type of gasoline, made possible by the new refining process, polymerization, has been put on the market. It has been announced by Frank Phillips, president of the Phillips Petroleum Company.

"Taming the rich, highly explosive gases which formerly were wasted long been a dream of petroleum chemists," Phillips said. "For years we have experimented with a process for this—polymerization; joining together instead of breaking down. Now polymerized gasoline is available to the public."

A characteristic of the new gasoline is said to be that it contains more energy per gallon than any other gasoline of similar specifications.

Furthermore, says Phillips, the process of polymerization produces a special product which has a higher octane rating than any other gasoline of similar specifications.

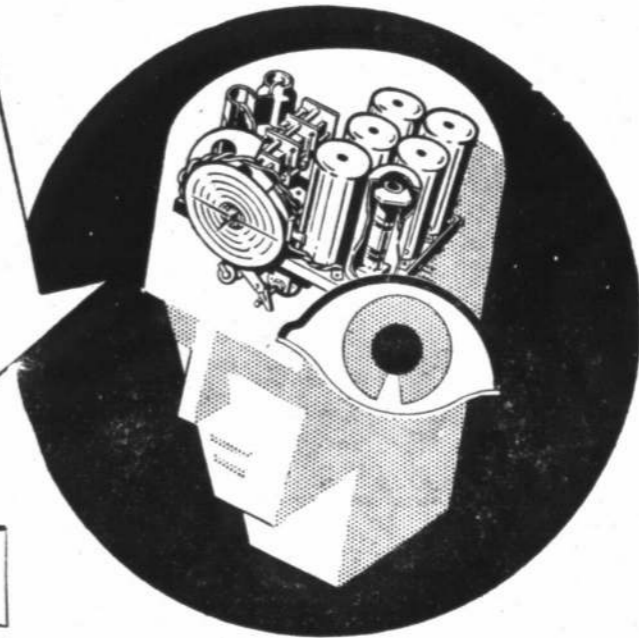

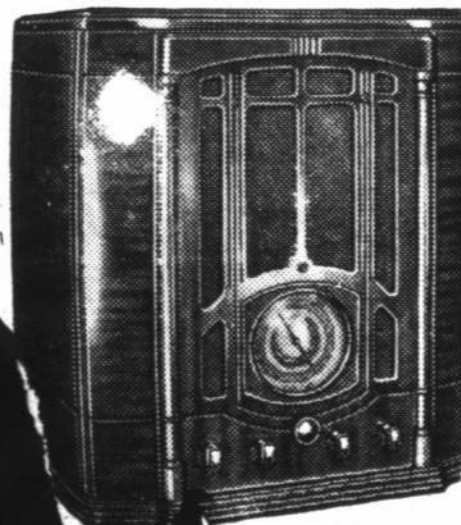

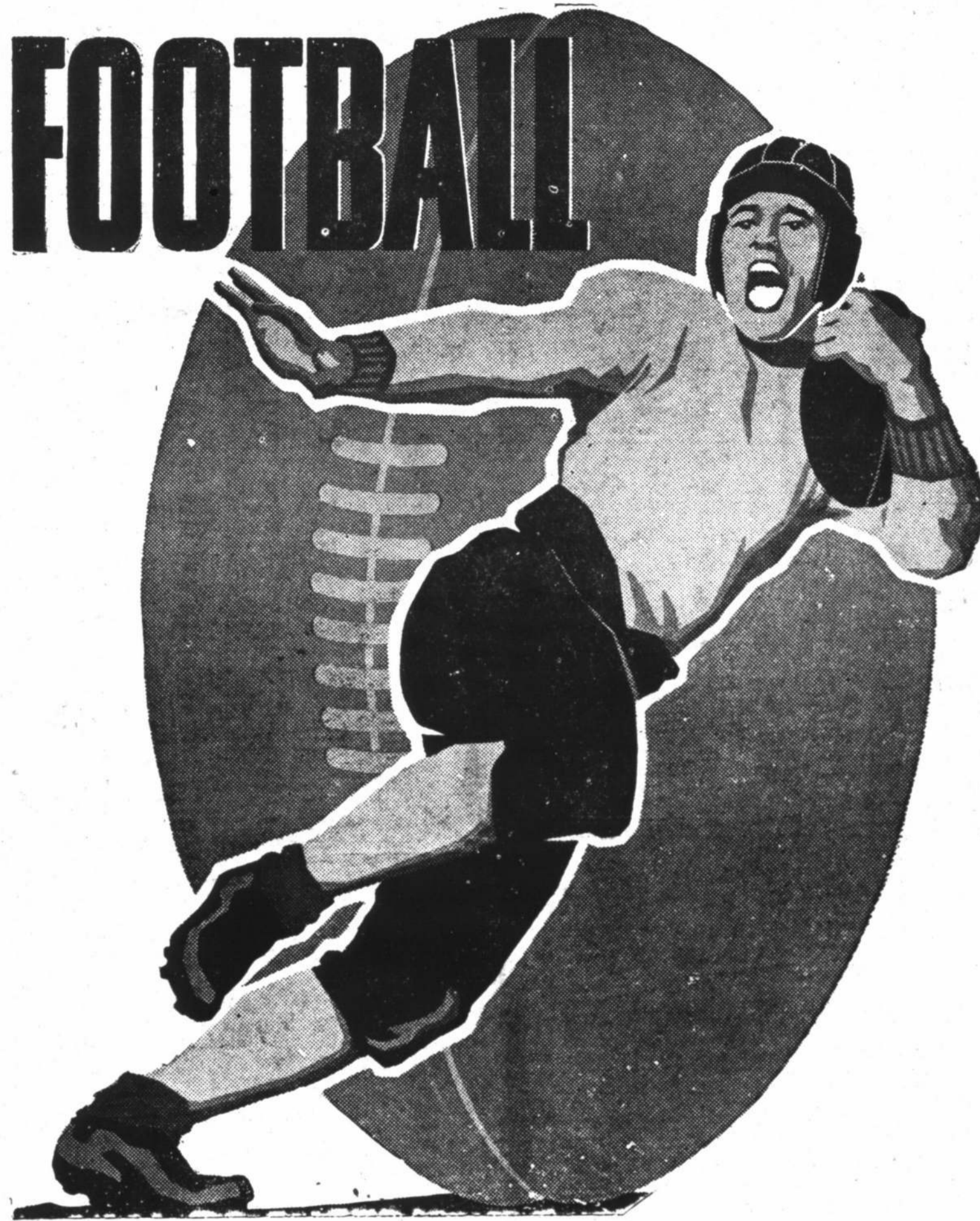
