Three New Wells Completed; Deep Test at 8,150

Three new wells were completed in the Pewitt ranch area of the Talco field during the past week. Three more new wells were spudded and there is one fishing job. Completed are Phillip-Pewitt No. 4, Humble-Pewitt No. 7, and Randy Moore-Pewitt No. 1. No Potentials have been taken, according to D. C. Thompson of the Hall Lumber Co., who supplied the information. B. G. Byers is setting surface casing on Randy Moore's D 2; Tri Drilling Co. on A. O. Phillips D 5 and L. C. Peters on Humble's Pewitt No. 8. W. B. Hinton is fishing on Davis No. 4 for a drill stem that twisted in two.

These completions give the Pewitt ranch area 34 new wells this year. Talco's deep test, scheduled for 10,000 feet, three miles southeast of Talco in the M. V. Delgado survey, was drilling at 8,150 feet it was reported on Tuesday.

The well is being drilled by W. B. Hinton, Magnolia Petroleum and on a 11,000 acre block, which extends westward into Franklin County. Lone Star Producing is credited with having picked up protective acreage along the new so-called Smackover trend south of Talco. In Franklin County, the company acquired over 600 acres out of the Richard Overton and H. H. Clifton surveys, and to the east of Titus County over 300 acres in the Thomas D. Hill survey.

Location had been staked Tuesday for a 3,000-foot wildcat a half mile west of Direct in Lamar County.

W. L. Hernstadt of New York spotted the No. 1 Grady & Paul Crawford on a 665-acre tract in the James Garland survey. It will be 990 east of the west line and 300 north of the south of the line of the tract.

Trojans Bow to James Bowie Friday 25 to 6

Talco Trojans were handed a 25 to 6 defeat Friday night by the James Bowie Pirates of Simms.

The Pirates won the toss and elected to receive on the kickoff. Talco kicked to the Pirate 10 and Hider brought the ball to the 22 before being hit by a host of Talco players. However the Pirates lost little time in starting a slashing offensive drive which reached paydirt in 14 plays on a 78 yard drive, with J. Williams carrying from the 12 yard line to mark up the first Pirate score.

Later in the first quarter the Pirates took the ball on their own 20 on a punt out of bounds and started another drive which was climaxed by a pass to H. Hall, right half of the Pirates, and he scampered over from the 10 yard marker for the second score.

The Trojans were baffled by the smooth ball handling and fast backs of the Pirates during the first half of the game. At the beginning of the second half the Trojans seemed to get a new lease on life and after receiving the opening kickoff and marching the length of the field to score and get back into the ball game. The Pirates again turned on steam and scored again in the third frame.

The Trojans played a fine game of ball during the entire second half after a slow start in the first half. James Bowie made 10 first downs to 2 for the Trojans during the first half, but this was reversed during the second half when Talco made 8 first downs while the Pirates garnered only 2. The final score in the game came during the last 15 seconds when a Trojan pass was intercepted and returned 18 yards for a score.

Call Meeting at Cooper for People Interested Sulphur River Project

A meeting of all persons interested in the Sulphur River basin improvement as recently passed by the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, will be held Wednesday, Oct. 25, in Cooper.

Principal speaker for the meeting will be Col. Charles G. Holle, U. S. Army Engineer in charge of this district, from New Orleans. Col. Holle will explain the overall project as approved by the board of engineers and how it will affect the people of the Sulphur basin.

Interested people expected at the meeting will be from Sulphur Springs, Paris, Mt. Vernon, Deport, Bogata, Talco and all land owners down the Sulphur river to the Texarkana Dam, as Col. Holle's talk will be on the entire Sulphur basin project, which not only covers the Cooper Dam and Reservoir, but channel improvement and levee construction with

drainage works along the main stem of Sulphur River and along its tributaries—Cuthand Creek, South Sulphur, Middle Sulphur, levee construction along North Sulphur River and channel improvement along Brushy Creek, all of which has been approved by the Board of Engineers of Rivers and Harbors at a cost of about \$16,000,000.

Coming with Col. Holle for the meeting will be Congressman Wright Patman of Texarkana, F. Webb Jr., of Lucas and Roy Mathias of Shreveport, La. Also, Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn, is expected to be present, but at the present time has not officially accepted.

The meeting will be held in the District Courtroom of the Delta County courthouse in Cooper. It will start at 2 p. m. This meeting is for the public interested in the project and to anyone else who would care to attend.

Men of draft age and status are getting mighty tired of the conflicting reports coming out of Washington, as to who will be drafted and who will not, and when. It is all very confusing. Veterans with combat service in the other war who patriotically joined the National Guard, find themselves back in uniform, while others who did not join are exempt for the time being. National Security Board Chairman Symington and Draft Director Hershey should get together and let the men know what to expect and when.

This editor has been going along with Gov. Allan Shivers, due to his apparent sound, grass roots political philosophy and economy, but he slipped a cog in our esteem last week when he came out with a designation for two Thanksgivings in Texas this year—one on Nov. 23 and another on Nov. 30. We thought we were thru with that foolishness and mixup with the passing of President Roosevelt. But with a war on our hands and acting as a baby sitter for most of the non-communist nations of the world, Texas needs to be at work instead of playing on that second Thanksgiving day, even tho we have much for which to be thankful, despite a short cotton crop.

From time dating from his own schoolboy football days in which he played in the backfield, all thru the years as a reporter and newspaper publisher, this editor has had a lot of respect for the boys who play in the line. All newspaper reports, and they are without exception, give publicity to the boys in the backfield who grab passes and race for the goal or do the same thing around the ends after blocking interference has cleared the way, pull down a ball carrier from behind, or plunge for healthy gains after the line has opened a hole. Unless a lineman has an opportunity to do something spectacular, his name is seldom mentioned, except perhaps in the starting line-up. But it should be remembered that it is the co-ordinated efforts of every man on the team that win ball games. It is the line that holds when the going gets tough near a goal line and the line that takes more punishment from opponents than does the backfield. Here's to the linemen: Touchdowns are credited to the backfield boys, but they couldn't have put them over without the help of the line that ran interference or opened a hole for the ball carrier.

Wholesale Prices Drop .3 Per Cent

Wholesale prices, as measured by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, declined 0.3 per cent in the week ended Oct. 10.

The bureau reported Friday its index stood at 168.3 per cent of the 1926 average. That compared with a post-war high of 170.3 on Aug. 17, 1948.

The Oct. 10 index was 0.5 per cent below four weeks ago, 7.1 per cent above June 30—just before the Korean war—and 10.7 per cent above the comparable week in 1949.

All commodities in this index other than farm products and foods advanced 0.5 per cent to another postwar high and 8.4 per cent above the pre-Korea level. Farm and food prices were down.

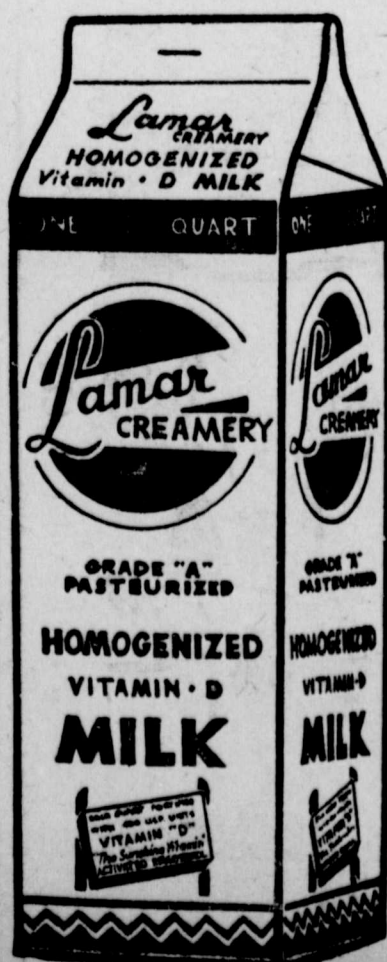

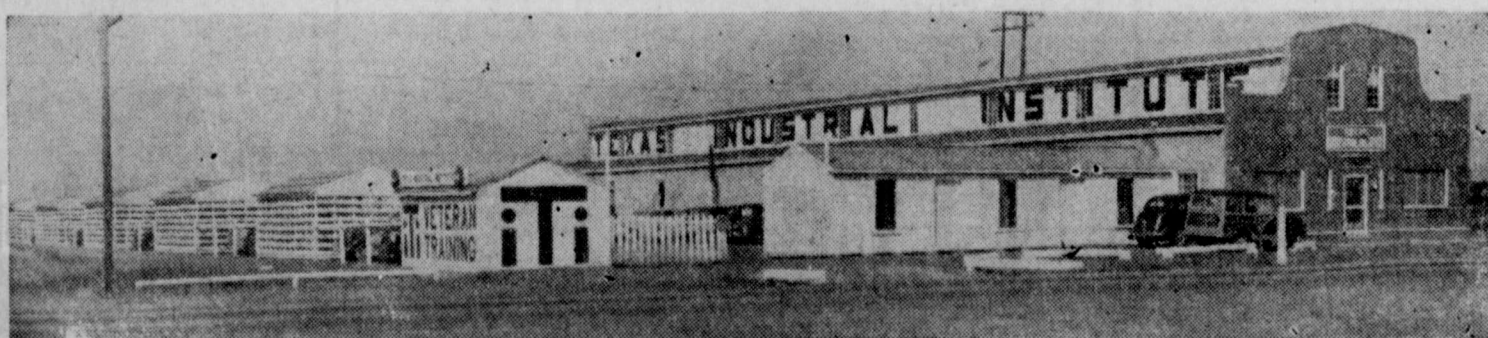
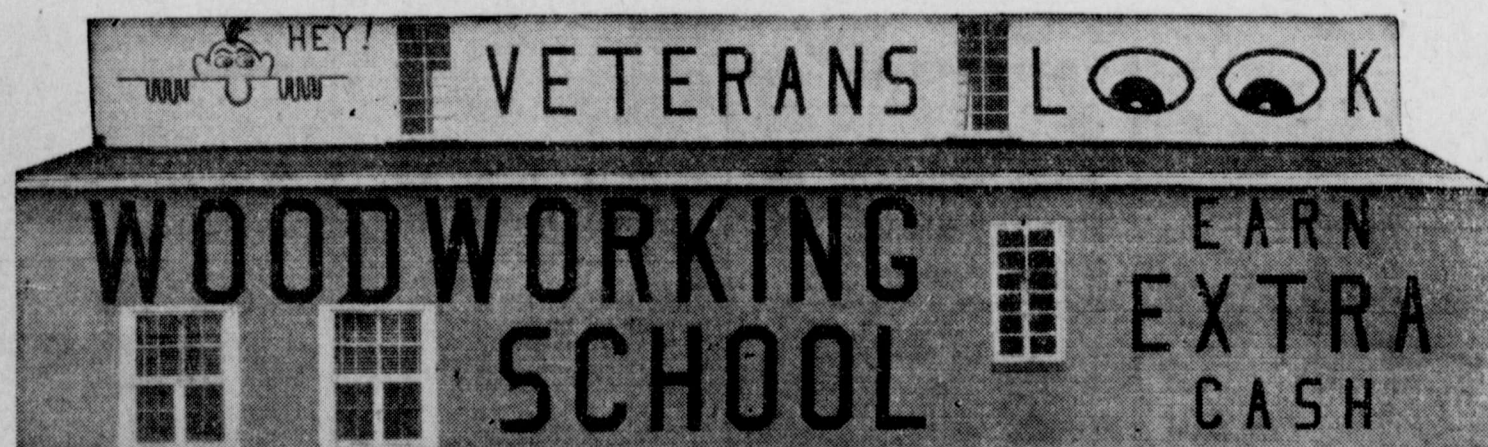

Alcorn Wants Government Trained Germs to Fight Off His Crop Pests

Editor's Note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, is demonstrating his knack for finding a lazier way of doing things, his letter this week reveals.

Dead Editor: I was out here yesterday watchin' autumn unfold, this is the time of the year when a man's energies is supposed to start surgin up and he's supposed to make the chips fly, but I learned long ago to enjoy the seasons without bein' victimized by em, a thinkin man ought to be able to think in the fall the same as the winter, and I was doin that yesterday when a copy of a newspaper floated down here out of the air on a gust of wind, thought at first it was only leaves fallin but there's a difference if you know how to detect it and since it fell in arm's length of where I was sittin I picked it up and read where scientists are showin some improvement.

Accordin to this article, in between their main job of workin on something to destroy more and more humans scientists are now workin on the idea of spreadin diseases among crop pests and sittin back and lettin them do the work.

This is what I call progress. For years people have been goin on the assumption man was made to fight insects, and it was all a farmer could do to fight off the pests as fast as scientists discovered new ones. But out in California scientists are sprayin fields with disease germs which go to work on crop pests, and I'm here to tell you they're gettin on the right track. What agriculture needs is a whole series of germs designed to attack all the pests which have been botherin farmers for years.

As the thing progresses, I think some method ought to be worked out where the germs will spread themselves over a crop, might as well be spreadin poison like we do now as germs if I have to do the work, and all a farmer would have to do would be to write Washington for a package of say trained boll worm germs or corn borer germs or anti-smut germs, etc., and open up the package when it arrived and let em go to work. Be the finest thing that ever happened to farmin, outside of government checks.

Texas Industrial Institute Gives Vets Training

A school for training men in the production of industrial wood-working and kindred subjects—that is the purpose of the Texas Industrial Institute, 2301 N. Main St., Paris, says the president, John H. Bland.

Eighty-six veterans are now enrolled in the 12 months' course, and 30 of these men are from Oklahoma.

The students go to school five hours a day, Monday through Friday. There is one class from 7 a. m. until noon, and another class is from 1 p. m. to 6 p. m. Four of the hours are devoted to shop work, and the other hour is given theory.

A visitor at the school will find items as coffee tables, picture frames, end tables, bed room suites and lawn chairs. This will all be unfinished work.

Students are allowed to sell the personal items they make. One student sold \$72 worth of unfinished furniture last month, Mr. Bland explained. But he added that approximately 90 per cent of the unfinished furniture is kept by the vets themselves.

The school was founded by Mr. Bland in May, 1947, and the doors to the school were opened to students the following July 11. He estimates that approximately 300 veterans have attended since the opening.

The school is housed in a new and modern building, which was originally built as a furniture factory, and has 15,000 square feet of floor space. Valuation of the building and equipment exceeds \$100,000, Mr. Bland said.

Students put in 1,300 hours during the 12 months' course. Fifty hours are spent in the layout of projects, and another 50 hours are spent in the selection of stock. Eight hundred hours are spent in sizing stock to dimensions, while 100 hours are devoted to sanding. In the assembling of project, 150 hours are spent. For studying the maintenance of tools and machines, 100 hours are given. The students spend 50 hours estimating bills of materials and labor costs.

In addition to the president, other personnel of the staff include the following: John B. Harvill, vice-president, secretary and director; Frank D. Wear, vice president and legal advisor; Jas. D. Calame, principal; Cecil E. Harvill, assistant principal; Jean Brown, registrar; John W. Bramlett, instructor; and Allen H. Hoover, instructor.

Gov. Proclaims Oil Progress Week

Progress of Texas has been in direct proportion to the development of this state's petroleum resources by private enterprise according to rules laid down by the State's elected government, says Gov. Allan Shivers.

Texas produces nearly one-half of the nation's oil supply. The petroleum industry is the largest contributor to the economy of Texas and to the support of its public institutions and government.

The oil industry in Texas, as well as in the entire United States, is better prepared today than ever before to meet any national emergency because of consistent increase in the oil industry's capacity in all phases of production, refining and proved oil reserves.

At the half-way mark of this century, it is possible to survey the progress of America in the last fifty years and to assay the advances which may be expected in the future. It is plain that our state's progress, and our nation's progress, go hand in hand with oil progress.

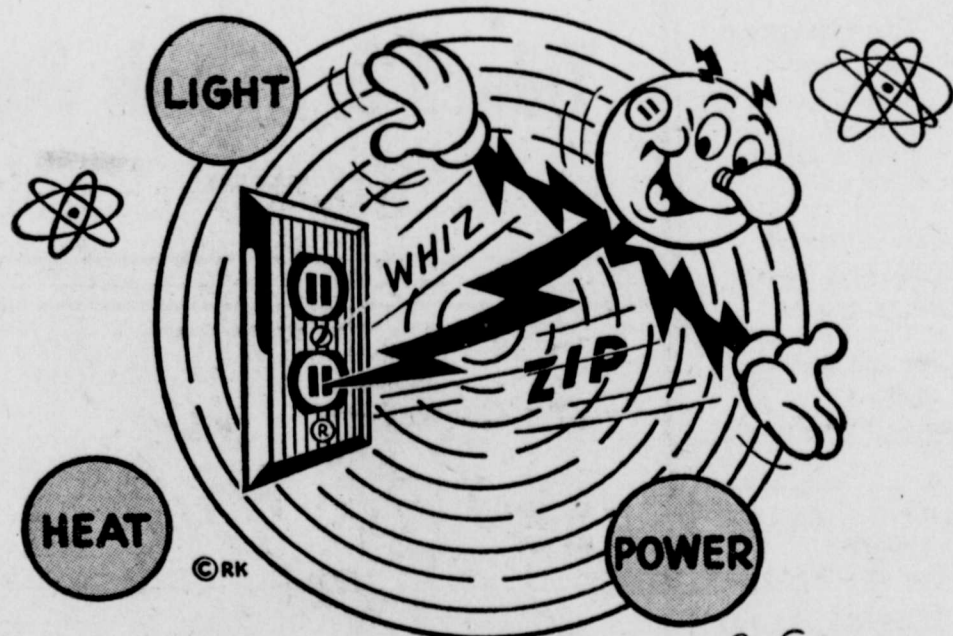
