Police to build gun range

City Manager Steve Shutt and City Attorney Tom Rees Sr. reported Tuesday night that they see few problems in securing right of way to lay a water line from the new municipal water wellfield near Loraine within the next week.

Rees said 10 landowners are involved and he has had positive responses from all but two that he had not yet contacted.

The officials said they had just agreed on language for the property easement forms.

Other business in the 6 p.m. regular city council meeting included approval for Chief of Police Pat Taylor to build a firing range in the southwestern corner of the city landfill north of town -- an area that has already been closed.

Well water coming in fall

Buoyed by \$1.2 million in interim financing, the City of Colorado City will open bids to bring new well water into town on Thursday, June 17.

A city council meeting will be held that night to open the bids and possibly to name a contractor.

City Manager Steve Shutt said the contractor will have 60 days to lay a 16-inch water line six miles into town from the

city's new wellfield at County Road 404 and Lucas Road near Loraine.

The line will run along the north side of 404 and go under South Hwy. 208 to the water tower at the Wallace Center in the southeastern part of town.

A pressure tank and pumping system will be constructed at the wellfield, and the new water will begin being supplied

to city residents.

In the second phase of the project, a bigger pumping station and storage tank will be built halfway between town and the wellfield.

Joe Smith of the Southwest Corp. in Abilene met recently with city council members to arrange the interim financing, which will be absorbed in a pending package of more than

Suit against city, officer nears trial

Nine Colorado High School students or just-graduated seniors gave depositions recently in a lawsuit pertaining to a collision between a city police car and a Jeep carrying three teenage boys.

The students were subpoenaed to the office of City Attorney Tom Rees Sr. in April to tell what they saw from the parking lot of Fuller Foods Thriftway in the 400 block of Hickory Street on Aug. 16, 1997.

At 10:39 p.m. that night, a northbound Jeep driven by Jaime Alvarez and ridden in by Abel Bonilla and Kyle Hammond allegedly turned in front of a car driven by City Police-

man George A. Oliver.

It was a damaging accident,

leaving Officer Oliver, Bonilla and Hammond with serious injuries.

The case could go to trial here this fall.

Officer Oliver had a broken wrist, a leg injury and a concussion, Bonilla a broken left arm and Hammond a broken jaw, missing teeth and injuries to his left leg and knee. Alvarez had severe bruises.

Bonilla, Hammond and Alvarez all graduated from CHS last month.

The students who gave depositions, or sworn testimony to attorneys and a court reporter, are Jessica Guevara, Amy Farmer, Edwina Ceballos, Margaret Ann Jameson, Philip Thompson, Rashad Walthall,

Tennis star gets liver disease

Kevin Lamb, a twenty-seven year old Colorado High School graduate, has been diagnosed with a rare liver disease known as Budd-Chiari Syndrome.

Lamb is in need of a liver transplant. If done soon, the young man will have a good chance to live with the disease.

Lamb attended Colorado City schools through all grades until his delayed graduation in 1992. He was an avid tennis player at CHS, and also loved playing Little League baseball.

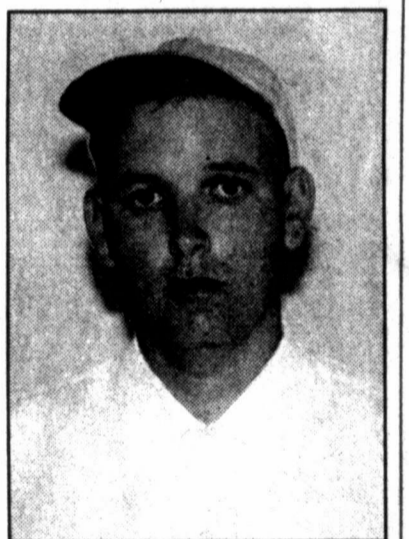
Kevin and his CHS tennis doubles partner Scott Walker were District Champions in 1986 and 1989 and were runners-up for the district title in 1990.

He currently resides in Abilene, but is being treated for his liver condition in Dallas at Baylor University Medical Center. Baylor will not perform the transplant without payment of the \$150,000 cost because Lamb has no insurance.

Lamb's sister, Kamie Merket, has organized a golf tournament in Lamesa at Lamesa Country Club this Saturday, June 12 to help raise the money needed for her brother's operation.

The Lamesa tourney is still open for individuals and teams. The format is an eight-man scramble and the entry fee is \$20 per person. Tee time is at 1

CHS changes schedule

Supt. Buddy Compton announced Monday that Colorado High School will go to a different type of block scheduling for 1999-2000 classes.

One difference is that all classes will be taught every day instead of 90-minute classes being taught every other day.

Some classes will be 90 minutes long and some 50 minutes.

The previous system was a modified A-B block schedule, and the new one is a modified

accelerated block schedule. Supt. Compton said in a news release.

"The primary difference between the two block schedules is that the classes taught in the accelerated block will be year-long courses that are finished by the break at Christmas," he said.

"All hour and a half classes will be one-year classes and will end in December and May with credits given at each of these times, and all 50-minute

classes will be semester courses that will continue throughout the entire year with credits given accordingly."

Compton and CHS Counselor Cliff Vlasin were out of town Monday and Tuesday and could not be reached for additional comment.

The superintendent listed 19 advantages and only two disadvantages to the change.

Disadvantages are that August and January starts with an

Rains allow cotton planting

Following a rainless January and February, modest but frequent showers since March have enabled most Mitchell County farmers to load their planters and get most of the county's 58,000 acres of cotton land planted.

"We should be getting pretty close to finishing," said

County Farm Service Agency Executive Director Keith Hiser Monday.

"From what I understand, a lot of people planted last week. It's not 100 percent, but whoever is going to plant will plant pretty quick."

An average of about .40 of an inch fell over most of the

county early Monday, although it amounted to no more than "a sprinkle" north of Loraine, where Hiser lives.

The rain added to several half-inch showers over the past few weeks, creating enough sub-soil moisture to get cotton out of the ground.

Now if the farmers can suc-

cessfully run the gauntlet of wind, hail, insects and intermittent dry weather and heat, they will be able to follow 1998's crop burnout with a fruitful harvest this fall.

Then supply, demand, foreign production and weather in other cotton states will help determine if the price per pound

reaches the break-even point of 60 cents.

December futures contracts have only been running in the low 50's lately.

"I think we're in a little better shape," Hiser said.

"We still don't have any deep moisture, but if we can

BOB MOTLEY has been bowling for over 40 years, enjoying it so much that he continued the sport after a Colorado City bowling alley closed in the 1960's. He belongs to a traveling league.

Bowling relaxes C-City man

Once the bowling bug bit Bob Motley, he stayed bitten.

He was working for the Post Office when the old Crown's Bowl was built in the 2600 block of Hickory Street in the late 1950's, where chiropractor Don Bennett has his office now in the G-Kell Building.

Carrying mail on city and then rural routes during his 37 years as a postman, Motley found that he enjoyed unwinding at the bowling alley when he left work in the afternoons.

"It's like somebody gets hooked on fishing or hooked on golf," he said. "I just got hooked on bowling."

"It's something you can do when you get off work in the afternoon or at night before you go to bed."

Burdened with high utility costs, the Colorado City lanes closed in the '60's, and that's where Motley separated himself from more casual bowlers.

He joined a traveling league and kept right on bowling -- in Big Spring, San Angelo, Abilene, Midland, Odessa, Lubbock and other places on a monthly basis.

A member of the American Bowling Congress, the high point of his career came in 1982, when he averaged 202 for nine games at an ABC tournament in Austin and was the Class C high individual, winning \$750 and a quartz trophy clock.

The 75-year-old Marshall native is by no means finished as a competitor, though, having rolled a personal best of 288 two months ago at Diamond Lanes in Odessa.

300 is a perfect score in bowling, requiring 11 consecutive strikes.

"I hit 10 in a row and pulled the ball on the 11th,"

he said.

With his four teammates in the Basin Travel League, he took part in the annual ABC National Tournament May 24-25 in Syracuse, N. Y., where 8,000 teams took eight months, bowling 20 hours a day, seven days a week, to decide singles, doubles and team titles.

He has rolled as high as 650 for three games, or 217 a game, in singles competition, but that won't get you much in the national tourney.

The top man this year shot 856 for an average of 285.

"It keeps me active and keeps them old arthritis muscles going," he said. "A lot of times, we go into a house and they'll holler, 'Here comes the Motley crew!'"

He bowls with Red Bennett of Rotan, J. C. Harrison of Snyder and H. G. Tidwell and Doyle Graham, both of Sweetwater. Harrison is his doubles partner.

Graham is the best bowler on the team with a 180 average while Motley averages 165.

They compete annually in the national tournament, which has also been in New York City and Reno, Nev., and in the next two years will be in Albuquerque, N. M., and Billings, Mont.

They alternate bowling on the first Sunday of each month at two bowling alleys each in Abilene, Midland and San Angelo and one each in Big Spring and Lubbock.

But they do a month's worth in one day, bowling from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. in various combinations against other teams.

Motley also drives to bowl at least once a week somewhere because, as he says, "You can't be consistent just bowling one time a month."

He looks at the game as a convergence of all factors -- vision, form, the inspiration of the moment and the dexterity

of the day.

"It's got to be like when a pitcher pitches a no-hit game," he said. "When I won in Austin, I had been bowling 600 series on different lanes and in different situations for three weeks before I left."

"I was throwing a good ball at that time."

Last month in Syracuse, he felt hampered by the humidity in the bowling lanes, which made his feet stick instead of slide on his approach.

The baseball analogy is apropos because it is almost the same distance from a bowling foul line to the No. 1 pin as it is from the rubber on a pitching mound to the front of home plate -- 60 feet in bowling and 60 feet, six inches, in baseball.

Bowling lanes are oiled, although not on the edges, to within 10 feet of the pins with the off-kilter rotation caused by a weight inside the ball making the ball curve four or five inches to the left for a right-handed bowler when the ball hits dry wood.

Ideally, the ball curves into the "pocket" between the 1 and 2 pins and clobbers all 10 pins with the satisfying crash that is often compared to thunder.

Many bowlers use two balls -- a strike ball that curves and a spare ball that rolls straight to pick up the remaining pins from a less than perfect shot.

Motley carries a 16-pound ball and a 14-pounder, but both are strike balls that curve left.

He has been bowling long enough that the curving action is usually no hindrance to picking up a spare.

He has been unable to obtain the consistency with the 14-pounder that he has with the heavier ball.

Motley grew up on an East Texas dairy farm, delivering milk to people's homes for five cents a quart. He had three sisters, two of whom survive -- Mary Etta Pool of Nacogdoches and Blanche Kent of Mexico, Mo.

He came to C-City in 1933, and since his years as a postman he has maintained a sideline of installing ceramic tile.

He and his wife Dorothy have six children, nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

He said anyone who is interested in bowling should call him at 728-2525 and he will give advice and help arrange transportation.

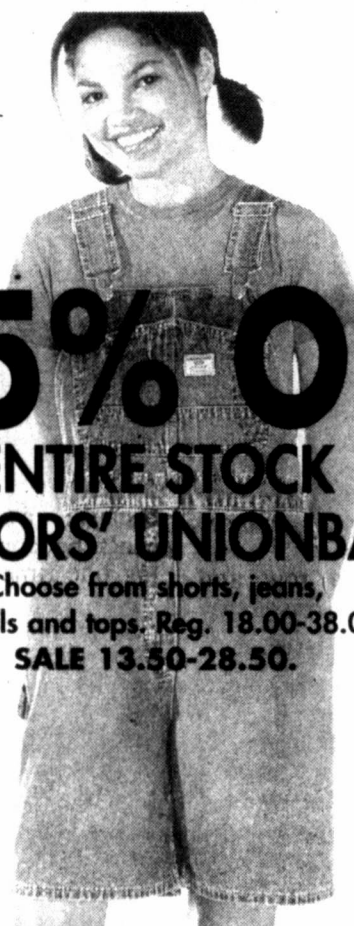

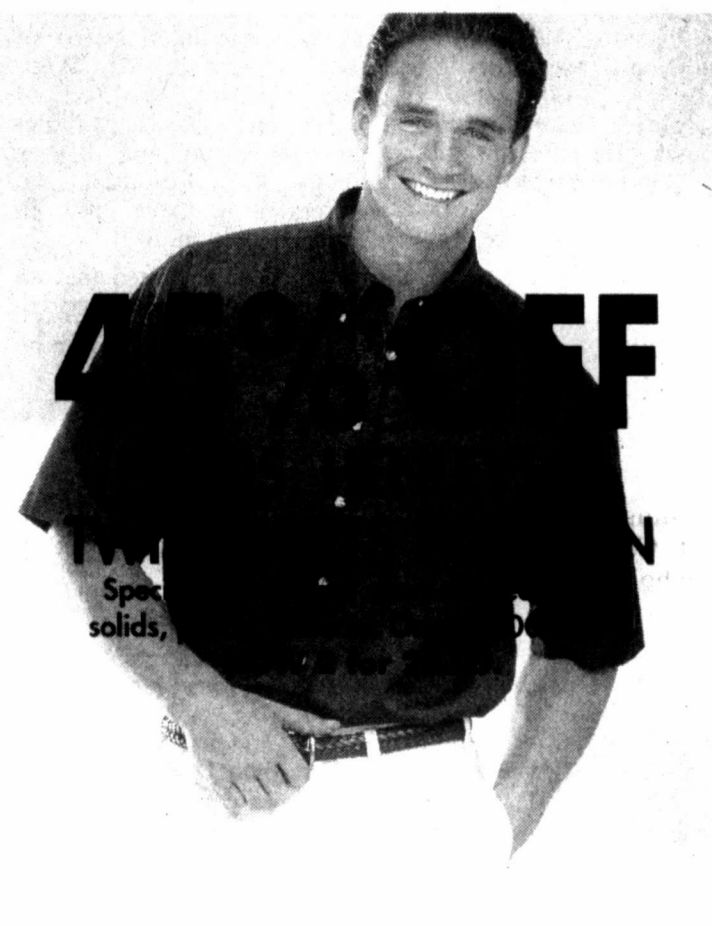

Water district creation still incomplete, says rep

SAN ANGELO -- State Rep. Robert "Rob" Junell enjoyed the recently concluded state legislative session, passing a teachers' pay raise and tax cuts, helping farmers with boll weevil eradication funding and endorsing Gov. George W. Bush for President on national television.

"I think he's done a darn good job as governor of the State of Texas," Rep. Junell said in a Thursday telephone interview, two days after he spoke for five minutes introducing Gov. Bush to a national TV audience in Austin.

"Consequently, I believe he'd do a good job as President of the U. S. He's honest and hard-working, and he likes people."

"I think that goes a long way toward being able to do a good job -- if they like the people they're trying to help."

Rep. Junell, a Democrat who crossed party lines to endorse Gov. Bush for re-election last year, said he and the governor "don't go bowling together or anything like that. We're professional friends and acquaintances."

"He doesn't take himself too seriously. He takes his job seriously, but he pokes fun at himself."

"He has a good vision for how he wants the state to go, and I think he'll have a good vision for the country."

Asked if he had had a similar experience to speaking to the national audience, Junell said he was interviewed on C-SPAN last winter while in Washington to meet with U. S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchinson about the state's settlement with the tobacco industry.

"You've just got to be yourself, and that's what I tried to do," he said.

A leader of bipartisanship in Austin, Junell said on TV that "the people of America will find out what the people of Texas know about Gov. Bush" as he pursues his presidential campaign.

"Some leaders try to bully, or they grandstand," he said.

"Gov. Bush works in a spirit of cooperation and respect for others."

While preparing a couple of lawsuits for trial at his San Angelo law firm, Jackson Walker, Junell said he regrets that his bill to establish the Mitchell County Groundwater Conservation District will have to be revised in two years.

He explained that the state's 13 new groundwater districts are only "temporary districts" because it will take an act of the 2001 legislature, the 77th, to give them their full powers.

In the meantime, they will set well permitting and spacing restrictions and grant permit exemptions but will not hold elections to confirm their existence, elect permanent board members or assess property taxes.

They also may not exercise powers of eminent domain, permit or restrict groundwater transfers out of the district or develop management plans until after statewide regional water plans are completed.

So the district's commissioners court-appointed board of Robert Chambers of Westbrook, Catarino Martinez of Loraine and David Stubblefield, Jim Baum and Bobby Lemons, all of Colorado City, will remain in place until an election is held in 2001.

It had been expected that an election to have voters confirm or deny the district would be held this fall.

"I think it was a good session," he said. "We returned money to the taxpayers, gave the teachers a pay raise and passed the boll weevil eradica-

tion funding -- \$25 million a year for the next two years to go with the \$25 million we had already appropriated."

"We've got to have water to get another prison unit as well as take care of the ones we have now. It's also important to the people of Mitchell County to have the water district for drinking and irrigation."

"People need to join together and work together."

The representative said he will come to C-City sometime in the next few weeks to visit the county courthouse, City Hall, the CCR and other places.

Tax cuts enacted in the legislative session include the elimination of the state franchise tax for businesses with annual gross incomes of less than \$150,000 and almost \$2 billion in tax relief for public school districts.

Junell, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said he was also disappointed that the proposed new state constitution he and Republican Sen. Bill Ratliff of Mount Pleasant had written was not considered more seriously.

Asked if most of the opposition was over the document's appointment of district judges, replacing the system of electing them, Junell said it was more a question of timing.

"There was not a crisis or anything that would make it very important right now," he said. "It was not on the front burner."

"We're going to see how it goes the next time around."

He said he and Sen. Ratliff will not revise their constitution for the 2001 session.

Compton said classes will be smaller, students will be responsible for fewer classes at a time, advanced courses can be

spread out in the fall and spring and TAAS Test scores will improve.

"Concern has been expressed about TAAS scores," he said. "All the research we have been able to gather indicates that TAAS scores have always been improved by going to the accelerated block schedule."

CISD TAAS scores are scheduled to be released at the regular monthly school board meeting on Monday, June 14.

Other advantages, Compton said, are that students will not have to stay in classes they are failing for a full school year, homework will tend to be completed in class, eligibility requirements will be easier to maintain and teaching courses daily "will enhance the learning process."

School will continue to begin at 8:15 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m. with band in the first period and athletics in the last.

"We are not experimenting with your child's education because this type of block schedule has already proven to be effective," Compton said.

"I can assure each person in the community that if we felt this type of schedule would be harmful to the students at Colorado High School, we would not implement it."

"We feel, and all our research indicates, that it will be beneficial to our students and enable them a greater chance for success."

"Change always brings out critics, but the people making the decision are educators of the highest integrity and would do nothing to hurt or cause one of our students to regress in their education."

Compton said he is eager to meet with parents individually to discuss the plan and that appointments may be scheduled by calling his office at 728-3721.

California fugitive tripped up by phony driver's license

Department of Public Safety Troopers Shane Johnson and Carlos Diaz of Colorado City arrested a California murder suspect Monday night on Interstate 20 after his identification proved questionable.

Troopers Johnson and Diaz stopped an eastbound car with driver Michelle Gulla, 28, and suspect Miguel Angel Flores, 27, both of Las Vegas, Nev., at 7:10 p.m. just west of C-City.

Trooper Diaz first approached the car and reported to Trooper Johnson that Ms. Gulla seemed nervous.

Johnson determined that Flores' California driver's license was a forgery, and the officers found his real license

hidden in Ms. Gulla's purse. Checking criminal records under his real name, they learned that there was a San Bernardino, Calif., murder warrant out for him.

Sheriff Patrick Toombs said Flores was wanted for a February 1997 murder in which the body went unidentified for a year and a half.

Sheriff Toombs said Nevada criminals often commit offenses in California and escape detection by going back across the state line.

County Judge Ray Mayo set a \$50,000 cash bond against Flores Monday night, and the suspect waived extradition to California.

A cash bond requires that the full amount of the bond be posted before a suspect is released.

Ms. Gulla was taken into custody on a state charge of harboring a fugitive. Her bond had not been set Tuesday afternoon.

Sheriff Toombs said the couple had been living together for five years.

Although Ms. Gulla was nervous when stopped by the state troopers, he said, Flores remained calm.

The sheriff, who came to the scene before the couple was arrested at 7:38, said the investigation was an example of good work by the troopers.

\$3 million in a loan and grants from the federal Rural Development Corp. in Temple.

The project's second phase will run a 10 or 12-inch line across rocky ground to the municipal water treatment plant in southwestern C-City.

"I think it's all going to be finished just about in time to meet our next summer's demands -- in late April or May," said Shutt.

"Joe Smith has done an outstanding job for this city."

He said the federal agency has indicated that it will probably issue a statement of conditions for the loans and grants in late June or early July.

That will not slow things down because most of the conditions will have already been met, he said.

"I know it seems like a long time, but this can take two or three years," the city manager said. "We're compressing it into six or eight months."

"You're not going to believe the quality of this water. It's going to be so much better."

Shutt, City Water Supt. Kenneth Rich and council members Phil Anderson, Faye Ross, Gary Redwine, Bob Reily, Jim Baum, Sammy Contreras Sr. and A. W. Rowe are rushing to complete the transformation from lake water to well water because of concern about the year-long drought and the falling levels of Champion Creek Reservoir and Lake C-City.

Shutt and Rich believe that using West Texas lakes as municipal water reservoirs has become unwise, and they say the Santa Rosa Aquifer under eastern Mitchell County will be a bountiful source of water.

"I was told by the Rural Development people that this will probably be their last project of the Millennium," Shutt said.

"They said we're setting a record for the time."

Stanton driller Gene Wheeler has drilled four wells in the east field and three in the north field near the water towers north of West 17th Street.

The city had six old wells in the north field and was using five, but it will close two more and begin using the three new ones for a total of five, producing 350,000 gallons a day.

"We have managed to improve the quality but not the quantity," Shutt said.

He said the underground water pressure under the east field is so great that a three-foot stand pipe fills up to within a foot of the top.

The east field is expected to produce a million gallons a day, and Lake C-City water will begin being used in a small percentage.

Chief Taylor said using state-owned property north of Interstate 20 has proved problematic because the land is sometimes muddy.

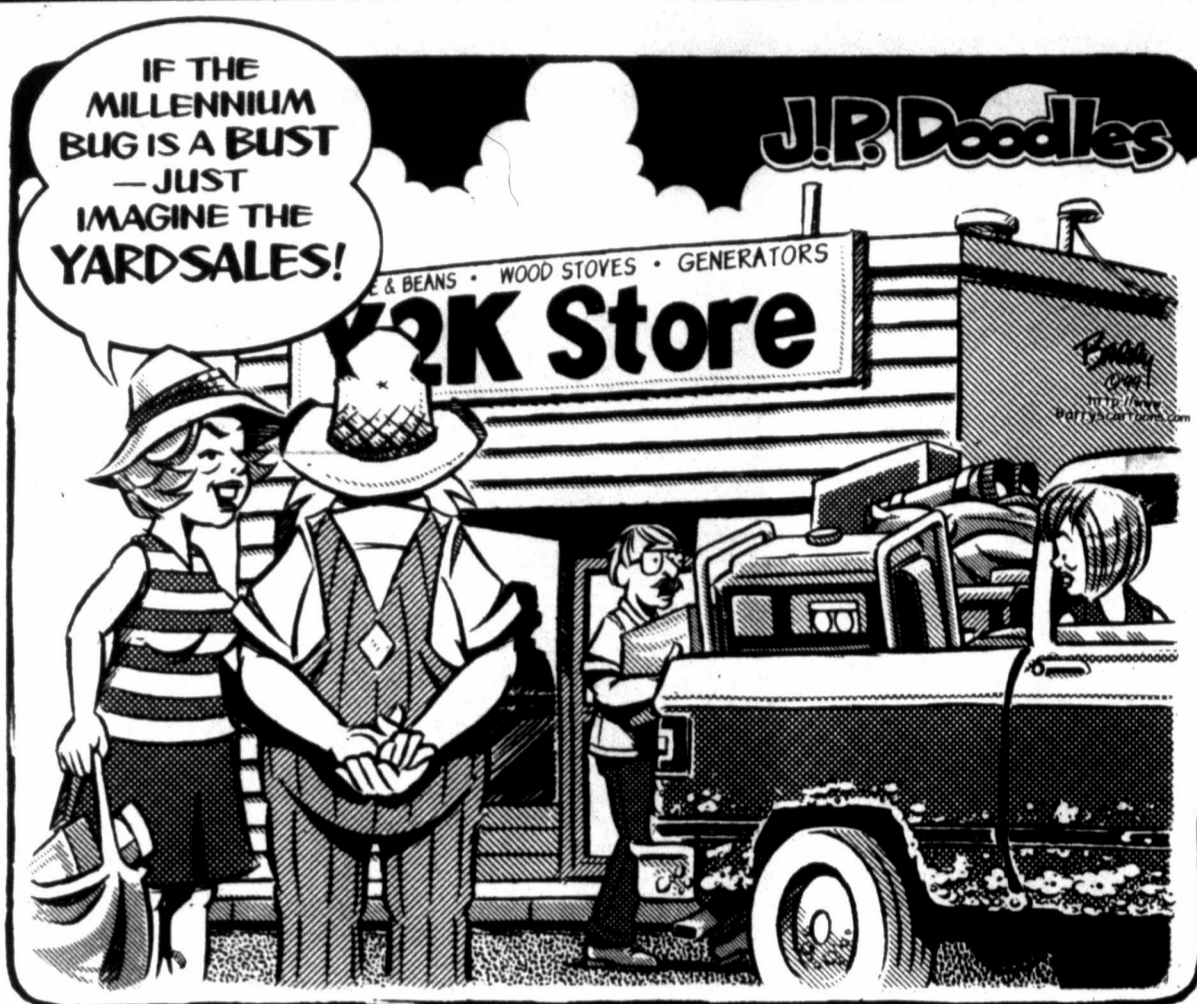

The waiter brought out four special shrimp cocktails. "They were fourteen dollars apiece," says Clint. "That kinda set the tone for the evening."

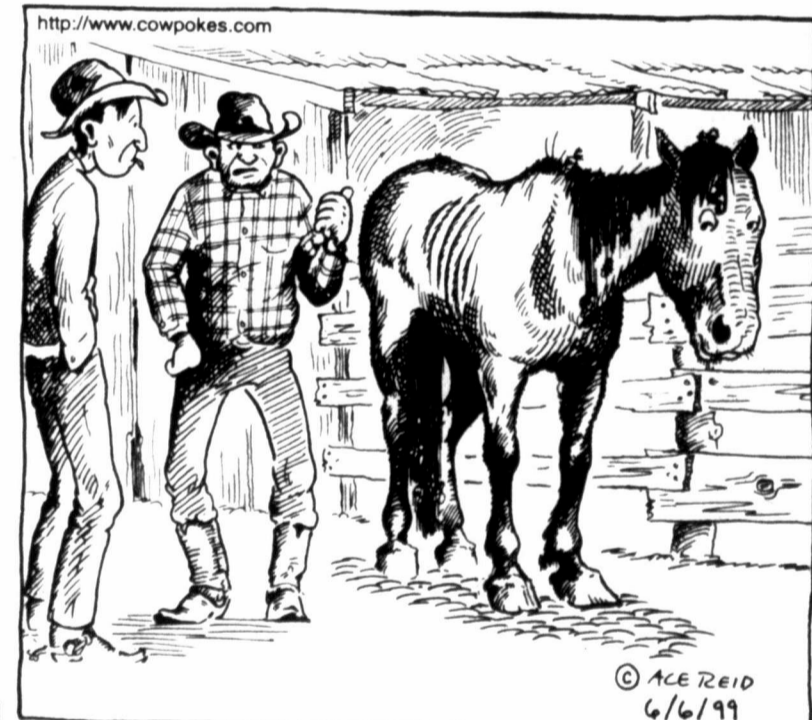

Seatbelts save I-20 travelers from injury in Monday wrecks

Two people were injured, neither seriously, in separate traffic accidents Monday morning west of Colorado City on Interstate 20.

Robert Blade, 67, of Cartersville, Ga., was eastbound in a Chevrolet Suburban when it went out of control at 9:30 a.m., went through the south median and overturned on the south service road, Department of Public Safety Trooper Donald Wilks said.

Blade, who was wearing his seatbelt, sustained a slight elbow injury but declined medical attention.

Then at 11:30 a.m. Monday, a westbound Isuzu Rodeo driven by 43-year-old Beula Duty of El Paso went into the center median and overturned. The first wreck was halfway between C-City and Westbrook and the second a half-mile east

of Westbrook, Trooper Wilks said.

Suffering a stiff neck and bruises from her seatbelt and shoulder belt, Ms. Duty was taken by Mitchell County EMS to the county hospital, where she was treated and released.

Trooper Wilks said both accidents apparently happened because the drivers either became distracted or fell asleep. He said both drivers probably escaped more serious injuries by wearing seatbelts.

keep getting these weekly rains, I think we can make a crop.

"Right now, everything looks pretty good. The pastures still aren't green enough, but our planting looks good."

"The grass has just not come on this year. There was too much hot weather last year for it to recover with what little rain we've had this year."

Hiser would like to see an old-fashioned "gully washer" on the Lake Colorado City watershed to begin refilling the lake and sprout new grass in the pastures to lessen livestock production expenses.

Colorado City Livestock Market owner Jim Calvert agreed Monday that the rain has done little for pastures.

He said there is a huge upside down, umbrella-shaped dry area running from C-City and Snyder west to Deming and Carlsbad, N. M., Ozona, the Big Bend, Arizona and the severely parched Northern Mexico, where the cattle population is down to less than 40 percent of normal.

"We have got some dead grass where we have had some pretty good rain," Calvert said. "Some green weeds and wild rye came up, but the hot weather got back in and it died."

Cattle prices have been good lately, though, with some young cow-calf pairs bringing \$770 on May 22 and 630-pound black steers selling for \$86 per 100 pounds last Saturday for a \$7 to \$8 increase.

"Some of the people are completely out of business," Calvert said. "They don't have any cattle."

"It would take a general rain over the whole area, and some of the pastures would have to have some rest. It would take maybe a year for them to come back, even if we got rain."

"It's really pretty tough." 1998 was Mitchell County's driest year of the 1990's with only 10.24 inches of rain.

There was .57 in January and none in February this year, but 2.05 in March and a drought-dampening 2.34 in April put hope in beleaguered farmers' hearts.

Most of May's 1.15 came late in the month, which kept most producers from meeting the Uniform Planting Date of May 17.

Now June, one of the county's traditionally more productive rainy months, has about a half-inch to date.

With an average annual rainfall of 18.68 inches this decade and about 6 1/2 so far this year, the county appears to be on course for a better year for moisture.

The only years of the decade with more than 20 inches of rain were '90 with 23.19, '91 with 32.03, '92 with 23.17 and '97 with 25.56.

June brought 5.74 in '91 and 6.23 in '97. If '99 does turn out to be a good year, it will do so without plentiful rains in May, running against the norm.

There were 6.31 inches in May '92, four inches in '93, 5.70 in '94, 5.12 in '95 and 2.35 in '97.

Totals for the first nine months of last year were .42, 1.03, 1.05, .12, 1.21, .42, .17, .87 and .35 -- finally relieved by 3.09 in October but then put back into the doldrums by .74 in November and .77 in December.

The county had gotten only 4.25 through June last year.

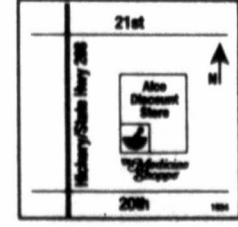

Denise Crawford, the tireless President of the Mitchell County unit of the American Cancer Society, was still reeling after the successful fundraiser.

"I'm very glad its over, very relieved that its over, but very pleased as well because we had an excellent turnout," she said.

A smashing success, the event will be back next year.

"From this point on, we will be doing an annual Relay for Life," said Crawford.

Opening ceremonies began with prayer, the National Anthem, Pledge of Allegiance and, perhaps most notably, the Cancer Survivor Lap.

Forty-one cancer survivors from the area began the event with a lap around Wolf Stadium's quarter-mile track, poignant evidence of the urgency of this fundraiser.

The survivors, led around the oval track by Mark Sheets of the FFA carrying the American flag and Robin Morris from the 4-H flying the Texas flag, reflected hope for the event and mankind's battle against this deadly disease.

Nineteen teams, totaling around two hundred ninety runners, walked, ran or jogged from 7 p.m. Friday until the final lap at 12 p.m. Saturday.

In fact, just five of the teams recorded the number of laps they completed and registered 1351 laps, almost three hundred thirty-eight miles! Its possible that almost nine hundred miles were covered by all nineteen teams to fight cancer last weekend.

Joining Crawford on the Relay Committee were Cheryl Haggerton, team recruitment chairman, Virginia Dearen, luminary chair, Rodney Cooper handled entertainment, Neal Webb took care of site logistics and Charlotte Clemmer signed

up cancer survivors. Bob and Laverne Chalker, Bonnie Denton, Mary Stice, Ina and Lloyd Finch, Terry Haggerton, Mildred Free, Amy Farmer and a host of others volunteered to help raise money to fight the war against cancer.

Crawford said the committee will publicly thank all of those organizations and individuals who helped out, and there were many.

Entertainment for the event was very interesting, to say the least.

The Male Fashion Show was a big hit, as was the "detailed" Cancer Awareness Skit performed by the Relay Committee.

"I think the fashion show was one of the most entertaining parts of the evening," said Crawford, "they were all really, really cute."

As the lights were dimmed at 9:30 for the Luminary event, Martha Anderson sang a beautiful rendition of "From A Distance", and the field and track were enlightened by the candle-lit Luminary tribute bags, placed about three feet apart around the circumference of the track in Wolf Stadium. It was a breathtaking moment.

For the past nine years, Mitchell County has raised funds for the American Cancer Society through a Night Time Golf tournament, but Crawford said this event "did a lot better" than the golf event ever did.

"In comparison, the relay versus the golf tournament, the

relay involved the whole community, not just the golfers.

"We had teams out there that started as young as third, fourth, fifth and sixth graders," she said, "it pulled in people of all ages."

The tally is not complete yet, but Crawford feels sure they easily surpassed their goal of

\$10,000. Teams paid \$50 per person, and there were almost six-hundred luminary bags purchased which required a minimum donation of \$2, and many folks donated much more.

Many expenses were paid and money raised by sponsorships, donations ranging from \$25 to \$750. Over forty of these sort of contributions were made.

With expenses probably in the neighborhood of \$3000, the event possibly netted \$12,000 to \$15,000.

There were twenty-four tents of all shapes and sizes set up on the stadium field to house team members during the event, as well as the hamburger stand operated by City National Bank employees and a coke sales stand donated by Coca-Cola of Big Spring.

Relay for Life awards were given during closing ceremonies Saturday.

The award for best theme went to "M.A.S.H.", a team from Family Medical Associates whose team captain was Frankie Riney.

The "Youngest" team award went to "KWAC" (Kids Walking Against Cancer) from Calvary Baptist Church, whose members ages totaled 302 years.

The "Oldest" team award went to the "Care Bears" from Valley Fair Lodge, whose age total was 706 years.

The "First Money In" award went to team captain Page Molina's Heart of West Texas Home Health Care team.

The "Lap Champion" award went to team "Steppenwolves", who completed 380 laps, or 95 miles around the track.

Bea Madrid of the Valley Angels was the Individual who raised the most money.

Indeed, the benefit and the work done by all those involved will touch many lives.

Christopher Caples, Stephanie Valadarez and Gina Howarth.

Their depositions were filed with 32nd District Court Clerk Sharon Hammond on May 10.

Represented by San Angelo attorney Max Parker, Bonilla's and Hammond's parents filed the suit, alleging that Officer Oliver was driving south on Hickory at a high rate of speed and without his emergency lights flashing.

Jerry Hammond of Burnet and Asencion Bonilla of Colorado City acted in behalf of their sons, seeking unspecified damages.

Last summer, the city filed suit against Alvarez and won a June 22 ruling from District

Judge Weldon Kirk of Sweetwater to make him a third-party defendant.

The city argued that young Alvarez was the primary cause of the accident by turning in front of the police car and not yielding the right of way.

Officer Oliver was off work, recuperating from his injuries, until after Thanksgiving that year and did not return to full duty until January 1998.

He has collected \$9,013 in worker's compensation, including \$6,984 for medical treatment, according to court documents.

The city has claimed "sovereign immunity" and Officer Oliver "official immunity," invoking state laws that limit the civil liability of governmental entities and law enforcement officers.

Alvarez and his father Marcelo are represented by San Angelo attorney John H. Hoffmann and Abilene attorney Roger Glandon, who have denied all allegations.

The city is represented by

Midland attorneys James Mosley and Rick Strange.

Parker told the CCR Tuesday that depositions are still needed from medical professionals who treated the injured parties and possibly from some experts.

"There is nothing that has developed in the depositions that has changed our perspective that Officer Oliver and the city were at fault," Parker said.

Testimony has also been taken from Officer Oliver, Chief of Police Pat Taylor, Department of Public Safety Trooper Mark Negri of Sweetwater, who investigated the accident, and Hood County Deputy Sheriff Steve Smith of Granbury.

Deputy Smith was a C-City officer at that time, and he had summoned Officer Oliver for back-up on a burglary investigation when the accident happened.

"I would have liked to try it this summer before all the kids get out of pocket, but it's not on the August docket," Parker said. "So it could be set later in the fall."

The reception was held at the Fellowship Hall at Highland Baptist Church. The room was decorated with flowers coordinating with the bride's bouquet. The bride's traveling

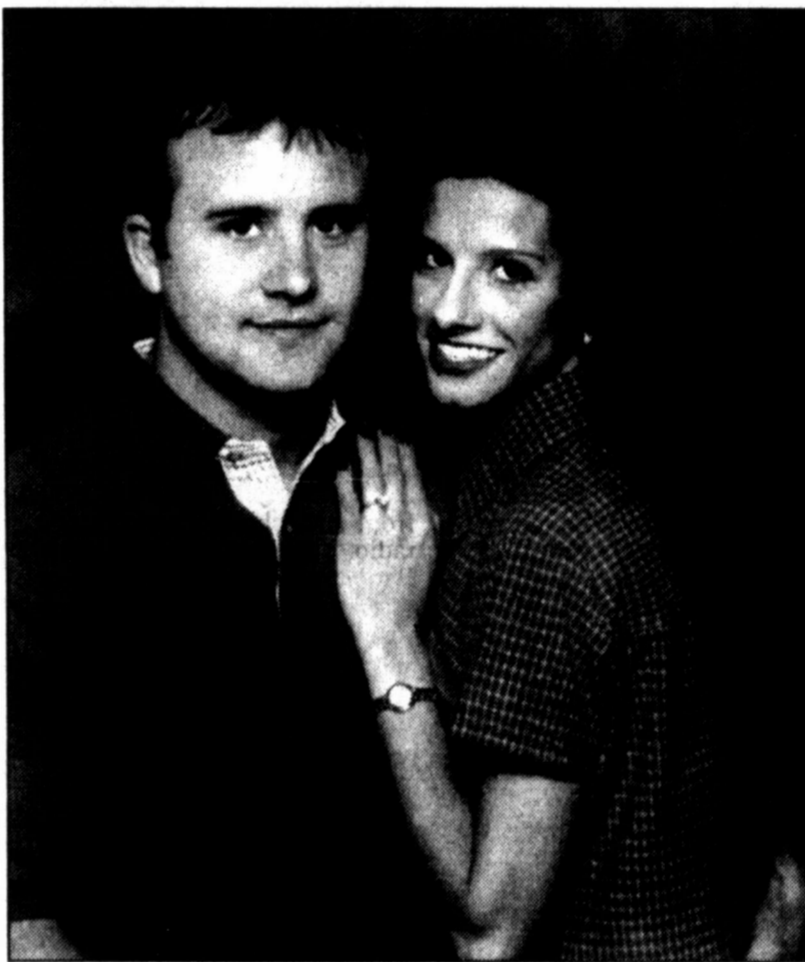

PERSONAL PIZZAS

1 pkg. english muffins
1 jar pizza sauce
Pepperoni (sliced)
Other toppings, such as chopped onions, green pepper, canadian bacon, mushrooms, olives, sausage, etc.

Parmesan cheese
Shredded mozzarella
If not already, slice english muffins. Toast in toaster or toaster oven until golden brown and crisp. Spread pizza sauce on each slice of english muffin. Top sauce with cheese, then add toppings of choice. Broil until cheese is bubbly.

SNACK MIX

1 box each of corn, wheat and rice Chex
1 box small pretzels
1 container peanuts (shelled and unsalted)

Seasoning salt
Combine cereal, pretzels and peanuts. Mix together. Sprinkle seasoning salt over the top and stir gently.

CRESCENT ROLL HOT DOGS

1 pkg. crescent rolls
1 pkg. hot dogs
1 pkg. sliced cheese
Unroll crescent rolls. Make a slit in each hot dog. Put cheese and hot dog on widest part of the roll. Roll the cheese and hot dog up in the crescent roll. Place each crescent roll hot dog on a baking sheet that has been covered with aluminum foil and sprayed with cooking spray. Cook at 350° for 10-15 minutes until golden brown. Cool until dogs are able to be handled.

EASY FRUIT SALAD

Pineapple chunks, canned
Sliced peaches, canned
Pears, canned
Bananas, sliced

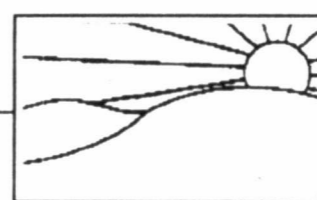

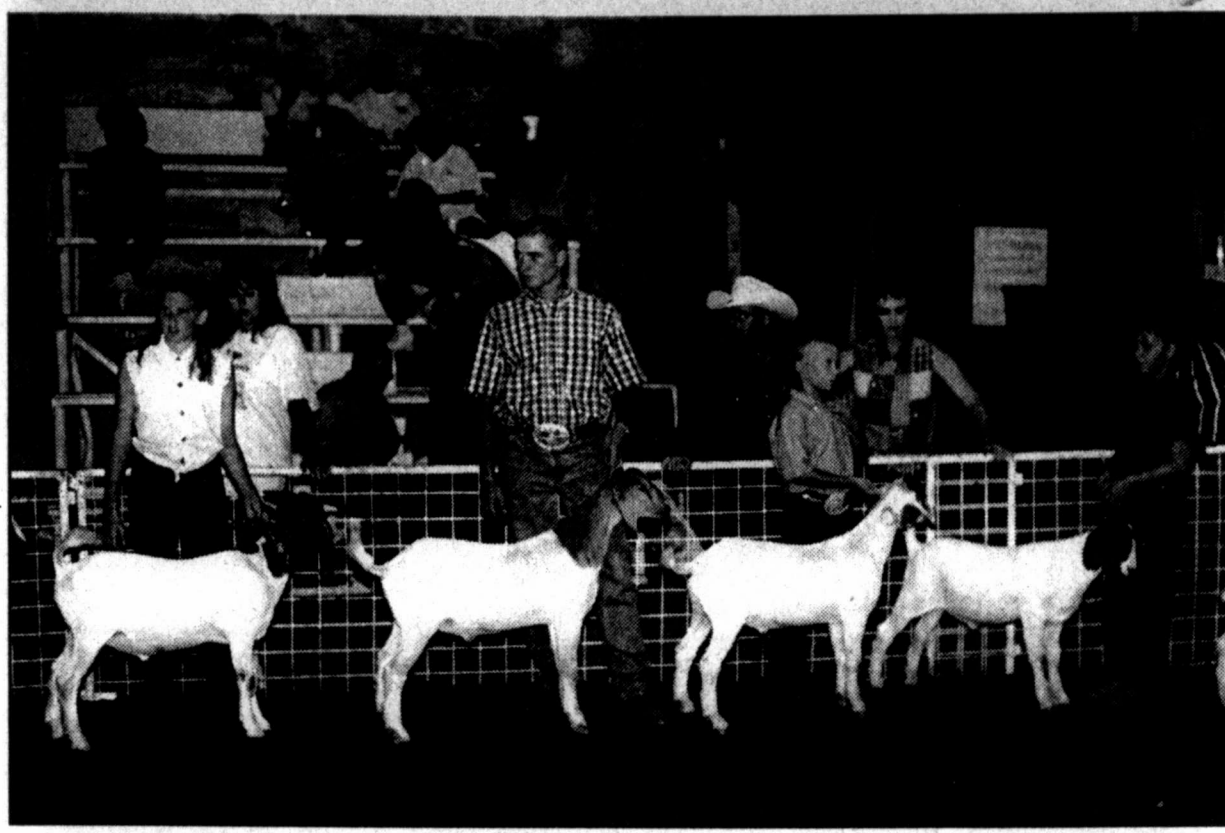

Colorado City's Wolf Creek Golf Links will play host to the first annual Slingin Sammy Baugh Classic on July 16-17, a tournament designed to raise money for college scholarships for students from West Texas schools.

Tournament Director Bob O'Day from Snyder has been busy coaxing sports celebrities from all over the country to come and help out at the legendary Baugh's namesake tourney.

O'Day has been successful in bringing in twenty-four sports stars, including Baugh, for the fundraising event.

Local sports heavy weights such as Hollis Gainey and Don Maynard will be there to tee it up for the worthwhile cause.

Red Cashion, the NFL official famous for his outspoken exclamation of "first down" during NFL telecasts, E.J. Holub, and Cotton Davidson will also play the Wolf Creek course.

Nolan Richardson, legendary University of Arkansas head basketball coach will fly down for Friday's round.

Another University of Arkansas favorite, Frank Broyles, will be here.

Dick Compton, a 1958 CHS graduate who played football for McMurry on scholarship and was drafted by the Detroit Lions and finished up his six-year NFL career with the Pittsburgh Steelers is going to tee it up as well.

Snyder's David McGinnis, defensive coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals, will also try his luck on Colorado City's nine-hole gem.

Legendary University of Texas head football coach Darrell Royal, ex-Dallas Cowboys running back Walt Garrison and his wife, All-American Cowgirl Debbie Garrison will all take part in an effort to raise thousands of dollars in educational support.

John David Crow, Jim Farmer, Dave Parks and UT football's T. Jones will be in C-City in the middle of the sweltering July heat to play a little golf and lend their name for Slingin Sammy's benefit tournament.

Former TCU All-American running back Jack Spikes, a Snyder product, will join the duffers, as will Dean Weese and Bill Yoman.

Actor Powers Boothe will play in the four-man scramble tournament. Boothe is originally from Snyder and has starred in several major motion pictures, not surprisingly, he made some great western films.

Philadelphia Eagles quarterback Koy Detmer and brother Ty Detmer, drafted by the new NFL expansion team Cleveland Browns, will be there along with who else but Bud McFadden and Dick Nolan.

Clearly, these folks are all coming here to the Mother City of West Texas for one reason, to raise money that will help kids get a college scholarship who might not have been able to otherwise.

Tournament costs have leveled off at around \$8000, a figure which includes Wolf Creek fees, tournament caps and various other expenses.

United Supermarket in Snyder has donated all food and drinks, as the meat for the occasion is still being sought.

Hole sponsorships will help defray tourney costs as O'Day says he has already sold around \$2000 worth of them. Hole sponsors must donate at least \$250, after which they will place a sign advertising their business near the green or teebox of the sponsored hole.

Another money-maker for the event, and probably what will be the most successful, is the silent auction of sports memorabilia.

Some of those items include a TCU jersey and helmet autographed by Sam Baugh, a Texas Tech football and helmet autographed by Coach Spike Dykes, a Texas A & M football and helmet autographed by John David Crow and R.C. Slocum and a Baylor football and helmet autographed by Grant Teaff and Kevin Steele.

Other items being auctioned include a University of Texas football and helmet autographed by Darrell Royal, Earl Campbell and Mack Brown, a 1999 Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame autographed football, and an SMU football autographed by Craig James and Eric

Dickerson.

The scholarships that will be generated out of this tournament will be for Sul Ross University in Alpine. \$20,000 in scholarships have been awarded to area kids for the 1999-2000 school year.

Those awards include five \$4000 scholarships. One of these will go to a CHS student who has not yet been named.

O'Day has said the scholarships go to kids who are not only deserving, but actually need the money to further their education. The awards are for \$1000 per year or \$500 per semester.

Superintendent Buddy Compton has been given the information for the CHS scholarship, which will be called the Gainey-Compton-Maynard Scholarship, and the recipient will be chosen from a predetermined criteria before the tournament in July.

Timing is one reason why this tournament will be held at Wolf Creek, another is cost, and perhaps the most important thing was Abel Alvarez and Wolf Creek were so accommodating to O'Day and his committee, without knowing the extent of the celebrities who are going to play.

Other courses approached by O'Day's committee either did not have a slot open on the date when the tournament needed to be held, or the cost of green fees and carts was much too extravagant he said. However, when they found out all the celebrities who were coming and became interested, their offers were too late.

With the proper backing and that famous C-City hospitality, this event will stay in Colorado City, grow, and benefit CHS students more and more as the years go by.

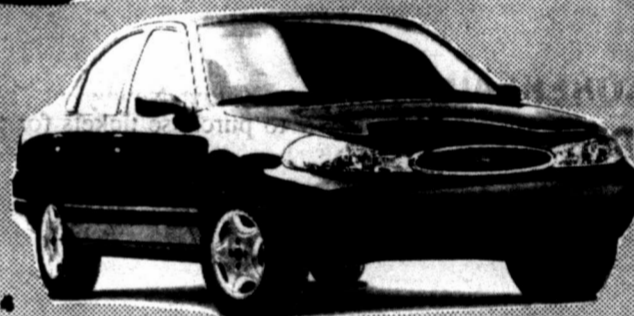

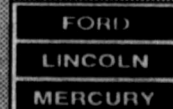
