

West Issues Call For Parley On Berlin

Tension Rises Again, But Tempers Cooled Quickly

BERLIN (AP)—Tension gripped Berlin again today but tempers tapered off. Three Soviet armored cars drove into the Western sector after putting up only token resistance to an American escort and a U.S. military convoy moved smoothly along the autobahn without interference from the Communists.

The United States, Britain and France handed identical notes to the Kremlin calling for a four-power meeting with a view to preventing further deterioration of the situation in Berlin and citing the "brutal killing on the Berlin wall" of a refugee.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A drug safety bill born in stormy controversy two years ago has sailed easily through the Senate without a vote cast in opposition.

The drug neyer was approved for marketing in the United States but was distributed to doctors for clinical testing and tests given to Americans.

More Tremors Are Expected In Italy

NAPLES, Italy (AP)—Geologists said today more slight tremors can be expected in the wake of the earthquake that struck with devastating force Tuesday and sent ripples of fear over a wide area from Naples to the Adriatic.

The surgeon who performed the operation, afterward told Robert Finkbine the drugs had had certain effects upon the fetus and that her child would have been born with deformities. He did not specify.

Call-Up Unlikely For Reservists

WASHINGTON (AP)—Current prospects are remote that another call-up of National Guardsmen and reservists might result from a new Berlin crisis, short of a serious, shooting outbreak.

Army sources asked about this today, said the Regular Army is in far better shape to cope with requirements in Europe or elsewhere than it was a year ago.

The Regular Army has five more combat-ready divisions than when the tension over Berlin last year resulted in the government's decision to summon reserve forces for active duty in this country. About 119,000 Army reservists and National Guardsmen were called up and now have been released.

Organizational strength of the Regular Army is 16 divisions. This includes two new divisions and three former training divisions which have been converted to combat outfits since last year.

Eight of the 16 divisions are ready in the continental United States. One is stationed in Hawaii, with one battle group deployed in Thailand. Five divisions are in Europe and one in Korea.

If a worsening of the situation arising out of the new Communist pressures on Berlin should bring a decision to bolster ground force strength in West Germany, the first of such reinforcements could be landed there within 24 hours of a buildup decision.

As of now, military leaders see nothing that requires any deployment of forces. But plans, detailed down to the smallest item, are ready for an emergency in Europe or elsewhere.

The Defense Department recently completed the "pre-stocking" of arms, equipment and supplies in West Germany sufficient to outfit and maintain two divisions, one armored and one infantry. The stockpile includes tanks, personnel carriers, artillery, mortars, rifles, machine guns and ammunition.

In an emergency, troops from the United States simply would board transport planes, carrying their personal equipment, and head for airfields in Germany. The Army estimates the first of such units would be ready and in the aircraft within 2 1/2 hours of receipt of orders.

The fact that the first reinforcements could be on their way within a matter of hours does not mean, however, that anything like two full divisions of troops could be put down in Germany within hours or even days. The airlift capacity still is well short of that.

Dr. Eidinoff To Remain In Hospital

RUSK (AP)—Dr. Harold Eidinoff, who claims to have regained sanity since a spectacular slaying in El Paso, must remain in a state hospital, a jury decided Thursday night.

"He is mentally ill," the county court verdict from a jury of five men and a woman stated. They deliberated 56 minutes.

Eidinoff, now 53, killed lawyer Ted Address at the El Paso air terminal Jan. 28, 1959. The shooting capped a five-year feud involving nude photographs of Eidinoff and his first wife which were displayed in a lawsuit, and a libel suit in which Address won a \$110,000 judgment against Eidinoff.

A district court jury at Lubbock pronounced Eidinoff insane then and at the time of the slaying. He since has been confined in the Rusk State Hospital. The verdict means he cannot be tried on a murder charge in the case.

As Eidinoff was led from the courtroom, he pointed to defense lawyer John McDonald of Palestine and said: "I'll let John do the talking for both of us."

McDonald said "we'll have to study the case" before deciding whether to appeal.

Eidinoff spent most of two days testifying in his attempt to convince the jurors he now is sane. Dr. Charles Castner, the psychiatrist who is superintendent of the state hospital here, said in his opinion Eidinoff "is mentally ill."

A similar attempt by Eidinoff to win freedom failed here last December when another jury could not agree on a verdict.

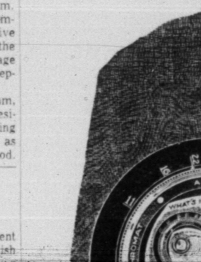

Call-Up Unlikely For Reservists

WASHINGTON (AP)—Current prospects are remote that another call-up of National Guardsmen and reservists might result from a new Berlin crisis, short of a serious, shooting outbreak.

Army sources asked about this today, said the Regular Army is in far better shape to cope with requirements in Europe or elsewhere than it was a year ago.

The Regular Army has five more combat-ready divisions than when the tension over Berlin last year resulted in the government's decision to summon reserve forces for active duty in this country. About 119,000 Army reservists and National Guardsmen were called up and now have been released.

Organizational strength of the Regular Army is 16 divisions. This includes two new divisions and three former training divisions which have been converted to combat outfits since last year.

Eight of the 16 divisions are ready in the continental United States. One is stationed in Hawaii, with one battle group deployed in Thailand. Five divisions are in Europe and one in Korea.

If a worsening of the situation arising out of the new Communist pressures on Berlin should bring a decision to bolster ground force strength in West Germany, the first of such reinforcements could be landed there within 24 hours of a buildup decision.

As of now, military leaders see nothing that requires any deployment of forces. But plans, detailed down to the smallest item, are ready for an emergency in Europe or elsewhere.

The Defense Department recently completed the "pre-stocking" of arms, equipment and supplies in West Germany sufficient to outfit and maintain two divisions, one armored and one infantry. The stockpile includes tanks, personnel carriers, artillery, mortars, rifles, machine guns and ammunition.

In an emergency, troops from the United States simply would board transport planes, carrying their personal equipment, and head for airfields in Germany. The Army estimates the first of such units would be ready and in the aircraft within 2 1/2 hours of receipt of orders.

The fact that the first reinforcements could be on their way within a matter of hours does not mean, however, that anything like two full divisions of troops could be put down in Germany within hours or even days. The airlift capacity still is well short of that.

Dr. Eidinoff To Remain In Hospital

RUSK (AP)—Dr. Harold Eidinoff, who claims to have regained sanity since a spectacular slaying in El Paso, must remain in a state hospital, a jury decided Thursday night.

"He is mentally ill," the county court verdict from a jury of five men and a woman stated. They deliberated 56 minutes.

Eidinoff, now 53, killed lawyer Ted Address at the El Paso air terminal Jan. 28, 1959. The shooting capped a five-year feud involving nude photographs of Eidinoff and his first wife which were displayed in a lawsuit, and a libel suit in which Address won a \$110,000 judgment against Eidinoff.

A district court jury at Lubbock pronounced Eidinoff insane then and at the time of the slaying. He since has been confined in the Rusk State Hospital. The verdict means he cannot be tried on a murder charge in the case.

As Eidinoff was led from the courtroom, he pointed to defense lawyer John McDonald of Palestine and said: "I'll let John do the talking for both of us."

McDonald said "we'll have to study the case" before deciding whether to appeal.

Eidinoff spent most of two days testifying in his attempt to convince the jurors he now is sane. Dr. Charles Castner, the psychiatrist who is superintendent of the state hospital here, said in his opinion Eidinoff "is mentally ill."

A similar attempt by Eidinoff to win freedom failed here last December when another jury could not agree on a verdict.

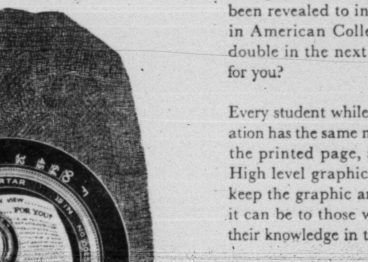

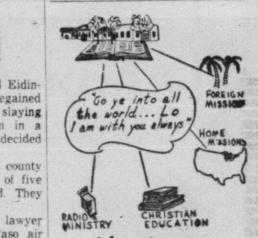

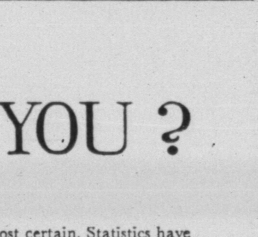

Peach Chutney

2½ cups sugar
¼ cup cider vinegar
1 cup coarsely grated sweet onion
1 large clove garlic (minced)
¼ cup Worcestershire sauce
1 small pod chili pepper (from mixed pickling spices)
1 teaspoon ground ginger
1 stick cinnamon and 1 teaspoon whole allspice tied in a bag
1 cup currants (rinsed and drained)
7 cups prepared peaches
In a large kettle mix all the ingredients except the peaches and boil for 10 minutes. Add peaches and boil gently, stirring often, until they are clear and syrup is thickened. Remove spice bag. Ladle boiling hot relish to within ¼ inch of the top of fruit jars; place dome lids on jars; screw bands tight. Makes five ½ pint. To prepare peaches: Peel 12 medium (about ¾ pounds) peaches and slice ¼-inch thick lengthwise; measure 7 cups; add to 2 tablespoons salt dissolved in 1 quart cold water; cover and allow to stand overnight. Drain well before using for Peach Chutney.

You'll need a pound of okra for four servings. If the okra is young and tender, the pods should snap easily.

Rhubarb Cake Pudding

9 tablespoons butter or margarine
2½ cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1 pound rhubarb (cut in ¼-inch lengths)
1½ cups cake flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
2½ cup granulated sugar
1 egg
Finely grated rind of 1 orange
2½ cup milk
Melt 3 tablespoons of the butter over low heat in an 8 by 8 by 2 inch baking pan; pat brown sugar over melted butter. Arrange rhubarb (there should be 2½ to 3 cups) over sugar. Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Cream the remaining 6 tablespoons butter with the granulated sugar; beat in egg and orange rind well. Add sifted dry ingredients in 4 additions, alternately with milk, stirring only until smooth each time; begin and end with flour. Pour batter over rhubarb. Bake in moderate (350 degrees) oven until cake tester inserted in center comes out without any particles of cake sticking to it—30 to 60 minutes. Place cake

in pan on wire rack for a few minutes; invert on serving plate and remove pan. Serve warm.

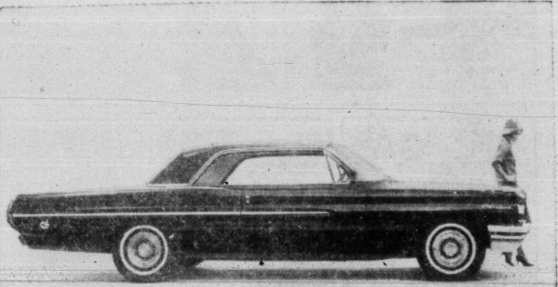

Wilkinson Claims Agan Unacceptable

FORT WORTH (AP)—Oklahoma's Coach Bud Wilkinson said Johnny Agan, the Albany, Tex., football star, couldn't play football at Oklahoma because he didn't qualify scholastically for a Big Eight Conference scholarship.

This caused Coach J. T. King at Texas Tech, where Agan wound up, to comment that it was unusual for Wilkinson to bring up the scholarship point three months after the boy's graduation from high school.

Agan signed a letter of intent at Tech but announced, after working at a summer job for a baker of Oklahoma, he was going to that school. This week, however, he showed up at Tech and said he wanted to enroll. He was accepted.

Wilkinson, in a statement issued Thursday at Norman, Okla., said Oklahoma was forced to disqualify Agan for a scholarship after it was learned he had not finished in the upper two-thirds of his graduating class.

King here for a football dinner, said Thursday night that Oklahoma probably has a situation similar to Tech.

"We cannot take any boy from out of state unless he finishes in the upper half of his class. In Texas, if a boy meets the required standards to enter college we can take him. Where the boy finishes in his graduating high school class has no bearing on the matter."

King declared that the first thing he and his staff checked on visiting a potential recruit was his grades.

Howard Grubbs, secretary of the Southwest Conference, said the conference had no general standards as such. "The various schools establish their own requirements," he explained.

Wilkinson said Agan's scholastic status was not discovered until Aug. 1 and until that time Oklahoma had been led to believe he met requirements.

The Dallas News said, however, that Bill Anderson, principal of Albany High School, indicated Oklahoma had been aware of Agan's scholastic standing since last May.

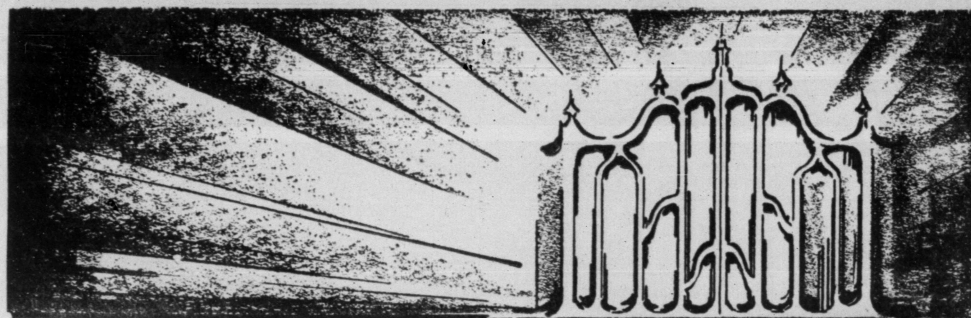
