FARMERS SET ATTENDANCE RECORDS HERE

Auto, Plane Accidents Exact Toll

TWENTY-ONE DIE IN MILAN AUTO RACE

(By Associated Press)
MILAN, Italy, Sept. 10.—Twenty-one deaths have resulted from an accident in an automobile race here yesterday. While speeding at 120 miles an hour a competitor for the track championship of Europe plunged into the grandstand, killing himself and eighteen others. Twenty six spectators, including Dorothy Dunsen, of Boston, were injured. Two of these died later.

Despite the accident, the race continued, a Frenchman, Chiron, driving a Bugatti car to victory at the average speed of 160 miles an hour.

Speeding Cars Collide

As the driver, Malerand sped into the straightaway in front of the grandstand at the Monza automobile on his eighteenth circuit he attempted to pass another competitor, Fucini.

The front of Malerand's car crashed into the rear of Fucini's, and the two automobiles plunged across the barrier and a ditch separating the track from the stands. It plowed into the midst of the crowd, killing 20 spectators and the driver.

TEN LIVES ARE LOST IN FLYING ACCIDENTS

(By Associated Press)
Ten men were killed and five others seriously injured in aviation accidents in widely scattered sections of the United States Sunday.

None of the accidents was in connection with the cross country air races now in progress, but a Navy flier was seriously injured when his plane crashed during a race at Los Angeles.

Two students at Otterbein, Ind., high school were killed when the plane in which they were passengers crashed attempting to make a landing at the air field there. The two boys, Corwin, 18, and Robert Burns, 18, died of fractured skulls. Donald Burgett, of Chalmers, Ind., pilot, was seriously injured.

Test Flight Fatal

Harold Tennant of Sioux Falls, S. D., and Frank Kuehn of Garrettsville, S. D., were killed when the plane in which they were passengers crashed during a test flight.

DUNCAN CAN'T GIVE FIGURES

ENROLLMENT REPORT IS IMPOSSIBLE NOW, HE DECLARES
The first week's enrollment in Lubbock city schools remains an uncertain quantity and apparently no one knows, as yet, just whether or not there will be an increase in enrollment for this year as compared to last year.

Although classwork has been in progress since last Wednesday, City School Superintendent M. H. Duncan said yesterday afternoon that the enrollment lists have not yet been compiled.

"It may be the end of the month before we have an estimate on attendance," Mr. Duncan told the Avalanche-Journal.

SOUTH PLAINS WIDE SESSION OPENED TODAY

MORE THAN 300 BEGIN PROGRAM AT STATE EXPERIMENT FARM

Breaking all attendance records for Field Day events of the past, more than three hundred farmers representing eleven South Plains counties had registered at the experiment station east of the city by 11 o'clock this morning.

The occasion was the annual field day program of the Experiment Station here. Attendance was far above expectations of Don L. Jones, superintendent of the station.

The morning's program consisted mainly in a tour of inspection over the experiment farm and demonstration on growing crops. An exhibit of cotton, in which seventy-four varieties of seed were represented, growing in seventy-four rows in a single field, was a special interest. The exhibit showed how different seed reacts under the same treatment, culture, soil and climate conditions.

County Agents Here
County agents of most of the eleven counties included in the experiment station district were on hand.

Luncheon was served at noon, courtesy of the Chamber of Commerce.

The official program started at 1 o'clock and included a variety of interesting subjects on the list for discussion.

Speakers Are Able
Speakers listed for the afternoon were E. E. Connor, director of the A. and M. college experiment station, College Station; P. C. Mangelsdorf, of College Station, who was to discuss small grains; W. L. Shengul, of the Tech, slated to talk on livestock; R. E. Dickson, superintendent of the Spear experiment station, who was to talk on soil run-off; a phase of soil conservation; and Don L. Jones, of the Lubbock experiment station, who was to discuss soil conservation, grains, and date of planting.

O. B. Shook Isn't Dead, He Reports

SO IT WON'T BE VERY LONG NOW

Completion of Lubbock's new federal building within three years is possible, if no untoward developments accrue, according to Postmaster John L. Vaughan. LUBBOCK GOES TO FOURTH IN BUILDING RACE

LAST WEEK SENDS CITY SOARING PAST THREE LARGE RIVALS

Maintaining the record-breaking pace of building set last week, which swept Lubbock to fourth place in the state, over the heads of San Antonio, Shreveport, Corpus Christi and Waco in this matter of construction work, five permits for \$20,800 were issued here this morning.

All of the permits were for residences.

Lubbock had a total of \$113,520 in permits for the past week, the amount representing almost entirely new residence construction. The largest single permit of the week was for \$7,000.

The cities ranked as follows: Houston, \$353,122; Fort Worth, \$144,218; Dallas, \$132,172; Lubbock, \$113,520; San Antonio, \$81,469; Corpus Christi, \$57,955; Shreveport, \$43,625; Waco, \$3,740.

Installation of the standards on Avenue H is in line with recently adopted policy of the city commission for a better lighted city.

Residences Scarce In City—Realtors

Opening the city schools and the nearness of the Tech opening date have caused a moderate shortage of homes and apartments in Lubbock, real estate men here declare.

While the shortage is not of proportions to alarm any one seeking a home here, realtors assert that rent houses or apartments meet a ready demand.

FIRE WRECKS GARAGE HERE

\$20,000 DAMAGE DONE SUNDAY BY FLAMES ON AVENUE H
Fire of undetermined origin raged a large frame building on north Avenue H, just across the railroad tracks and occasioned a loss of approximately \$20,000 early Sunday morning. The building belonged to S. F. Gentry and Mr. Gentry said that it was only partially covered by insurance.

Eight Cars Burned
Housed in the building were a garage, operated by S. E. Davis and J. E. Wason, and a restaurant operated by Mr. Gentry. Eight automobiles stored in the garage, and all fixtures and equipment were lost. Contents of the garage were insured for about one fourth of the loss. It was estimated.

All fixtures and stock in the restaurant was totally destroyed.

The call was the third answered by the local fire department since July 30, the summer having been generally free of fires.

SMITH FORCES IN SADDLE AT DEMO SESSION

DALLAS CONFAB OPENS TODAY; TWO REFUSE TO BACK NOMINEE

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Sept. 10.—The "Loyalist Forces" of Texas democracy scored first in the battle between the Smith and Anti-Smith factions at the State Democratic Executive Committee meeting here today when the committee by unanimous vote declared that the loyal Smith delegations from Dallas and Harris counties would be recognized at the State convention here tomorrow.

Leaders of the Anti-Smith delegates previously had said they would bolt the regular convention tomorrow and hold a meeting of their own appointing a separate state executive committee and a full list of state officers if their followers were not seated.

Fight Opens Early
The fight for party regularity and loyalty was launched immediately after the meeting was called to order. The committee cancelled the proxy of Mrs. J. Y. Webb, of Dallas, held for J. W. Sullivan of Denton, because she declared she would not support the democratic nominee, Benton McMillian, committee man from Zavalla county, was the only committee member who said he would not vote for Smith. He was requested to withdraw, but declined. The committee had no authority to expel him.

Renfro Raps Anti
Connie C. Renfro in presenting the claims of the Smith delegation of Dallas county, declared that "these Hoover democrats just evaded from the Constitutional democrats that worked so hard to control the state convention last May. They are not democrats at all."

Cook, B. Colquhoun, former Governor of Texas, who is representing all "Hoover Democrats" at the committee session, replied to Renfro.

Three more contests were to be heard by the executive committee. They were from Tarrant, Palo Pinto and Wichita counties.

MARLIN, Tex., Sept. 10.—The trial of Yancy Story, charged with robbery in connection with the hold-up of the Bank of Krum, Denton county, got under way here today. The case was sent to Falls county on a change of venue from Sherman, following a mistrial. Previously Story had been convicted at Dallas and given a 99-year sentence, but the case was reversed on appeal.

GIRL SLAIN BY ANGRY BULL

HUTCHINSON, Kas., Sept. 10.—Hazel Esch, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Esch, living near Iaman, northeast of here, was injured fatally when gored by a bull Saturday.

The girl had been sent to drive some cattle from one pasture to another. When she did not return a search was started. She was found in a pasture, cut and bruised, with the bull standing over her. The injured girl regained consciousness long enough to tell of the attack, but died two hours later. She said the bull tossed her into the air three times and then gored and pawed her.

COTTON PRICE TUMBLES WITH NEW ESTIMATE

GOVERNMENT GUESS IS RESPONSIBLE FOR \$4.50 PLUNGE

(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 10.—Cotton prices dropped nearly \$5 a bale early today on execution of selling orders accumulated over the week end which were induced by Saturday's bearish government crop figures. The offerings were thrown on the market in large volume almost from the start and although there was a rally of 3 to 11 points after the start, October contracts eventually sold off to 17.32 cents a pound, December 17.61 cents, and January 17.54 cents, or \$2 to 26 points below the previous close. At the end of the first half hour of trading the market was still weak and at the lowest.

BEER RAID IS STAGED HERE

Two women were jailed in the city jail, pending filing of formal charges, as the result of two beer raids made by the police department late Saturday night.

Between three hundred and four hundred bottles of beer, some on ice and ready to serve were confiscated in the raid. A number of empty bottles and thirty gallons of waste Police Chief John Leonard turned over to the officers.

The raids were conducted at two residences on Avenue D in the 1400 block.

Assisting in the raids, in addition to city officers, were Deputy Constable Joe Birdsong and District Attorney Darwood Bradley.

Subways Can Be In By January 1st, '29

Should the city vote the \$250,000 bond issue on September 22, it would be possible for the two new ways under San Joaquin and South Broadway and North Avenue to be completed by next June 1.

This was pointed out today by Mayor Markley D. Woods, in announcing the proposed bond issue.

Mr. Woods stressed the increasing need of the subways, with traffic on the two roads which they would serve being constantly augmented.

The bond issue would provide funds for paying sewer extension, water extension, water extension and storm sewers in addition to the subways.

NINE INJURED AS PRISONERS STAGE ESCAPE

EX-TEXAS BANK BANDIT LEADS CONVICTS IN DARING COUP

(By Associated Press)
BATON ROUGE, La., Sept. 10.—Six convicts are dead, another is believed to have been shot fatally and eight persons are injured as the result of an attempt by fourteen prisoners to shoot their way out of the Louisiana State penitentiary last night.

Headed by Cleveland Owen, New Orleans desperado, the convicts overpowered two guards, broke into the ammunition room where they obtained guns and then raced for a launch in the nearby Mississippi river while they kept up a running gunfire with prison authorities.

Three prisoners were killed before they reached the boat and three others lost their lives before the craft could be gotten out of range of the bullets. Another is believed to have been killed, but he possibly have escaped.

Two Others Surrender
Four guards and three prisoners were wounded and two or three convicts escaped. Two others surrendered when firing began.

Warden Amosher, who was here when he received a report of the break, rushed to the scene and today was directing an intensive search for the missing prisoners. They are believed to have deserted the launch as soon as possible and struck out cross-country.

Owen, serving a 14 to 21 year sentence for shooting a New Orleans policeman with intent to kill, is credited by prison officials with engineering the affair. A few months ago he and several others escaped and after being recaptured he declared he never would be taken alive again.

In a prosecutor said he had discovered a "frank connection between the underworld and police forces."

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 10.—In another week Governor Smith will leave for the west to start his active campaign for the presidency.

Before he returns to Rochester, October 1, to attend the Democratic State convention, the Democratic Presidential nominee, will travel on an eleven-car, elaborately equipped special train, will swing into thirteen states, many of which he has never visited before, and only one of which, Oklahoma, was carried by his party in the 1924 presidential race.

In six of the commonwealths—Nebraska, Oklahoma, Colorado, Montana, Minnesota and Wisconsin—he will deliver campaign addresses, the last being set for Wisconsin, the only state the late Senator Robert M. LaFollette, running on an independent presidential ticket, carried four years ago.

Because it is difficult for him to sleep on trains, Governor Smith will do much of his traveling in the day time. His two weeks schedule, subject to change, is announced as follows:

HOOVER KEEPING IN CLOSE TOUCH WITH CANDIDACY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Herbert Hoover is disclosing to callers a knowledge of political conditions in the various states which have surprised many of them both in its details and its broad grasp of the possible effects of the unusual cross currents at work in this campaign.

While he never talks for publication as to his own beliefs concerning the outcome of the election, it is known he has card-indexed the states in his own mind and can present concisely and with a wealth of detail the fundamental reasons for his confidence in winning in one place and for his opinion that he will trail his democratic opponent in another.

Is Feeling Pleased
As time goes on the republican presidential candidate's satisfaction with the situation in the west grows and he apparently entertains serious doubts now about only three states in that section—Missouri, Arizona and Montana. In his view, the refusal of Nathan F. Frank, of St. Louis, defeated for the republican senatorial nomination, to run as an independent candidate for the senate has improved the situation in Missouri.

While no one connected with republican headquarters will even intimate that Hoover entertains a belief that he can break the solid South in November, the republican candidate has been giving more and more attention to that section and the party organizations have been strengthened in some of the states and supplemental ones organized elsewhere, as in Mississippi.

He's Watching South
Just at the present time, the republican candidate has his eyes centered on Virginia, North Carolina, Georgia and Mississippi, but he also is observing the situations that are developing in Texas, Florida and Alabama. Especially optimistic reports have been brought to him from the Lone Star State where some democratic leaders have been told that he has an opportunity in North Carolina, where the anti-Smith groups appear to be most active, and Georgia and Virginia.
