ROAD NOTICE TO NON-RESIDENT LAND OWNERS

We the undersigned Jury of Freeholders, citizens of said Ochiltree County, Texas, duly appointed by the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree County, Texas, at its April Term 1929, to view and establish a first class Road from Perryton along and adjacent to P. & S. F. R. 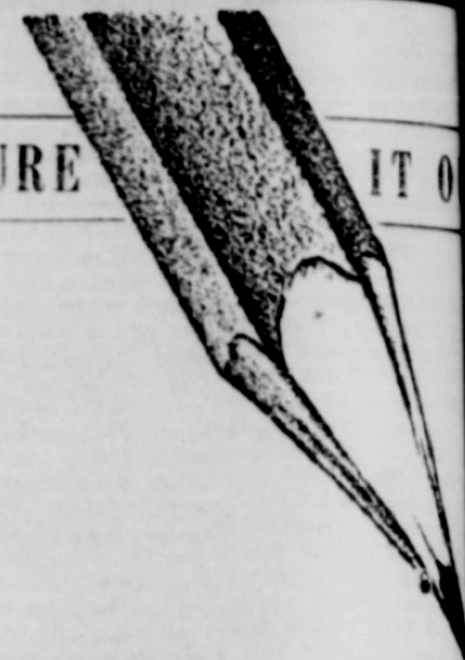

ORDINANCE NO. 97

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS, AS FOLLOWS

SECTION 1.—That each and every property owner in said City is hereby required to number his building with the proper sized number, the material to be either glass or metal in accordance with the Philadelphia system of numbering houses.

SECTION 2.—That any property owner who fails to comply with the requirements of Section 1 of this Ordinance within Thirty Days from the date of publication of this ordinance, shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than One Dollar (\$1.00), nor more than Two Dollars (\$2.00), and any one failing for additional thirty days to comply with

said Section 1, shall upon conviction be fined not less than Two Dollars, nor more than Ten Dollars, for each offense.

SECTION 3.—The plan for numbering the City of Perryton, Texas, is the Philadelphia system of 100 for each block, with a number determined for every 25 feet of frontage; regardless of size or shape of lot.

SECTION 4.—First Street is the base for all Streets running North and South, Main Street is the base for all Streets running East and West. Brillhart Avenue being considered First Street.

SECTION 5.—Even numbers will be found on the right, and odd numbers will be found on the left from the different bases on the respective streets and avenues.

SECTION 6.—That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and approval by the Mayor and published as required by law.

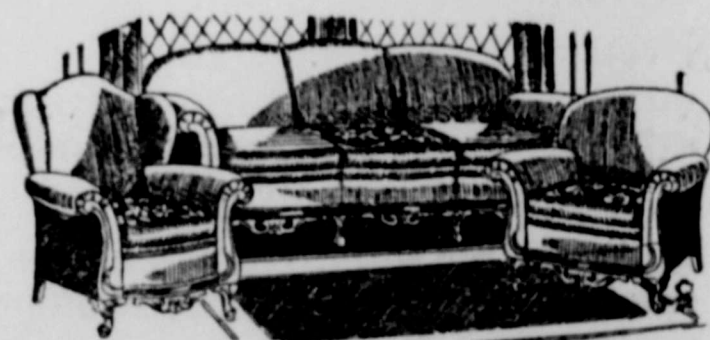

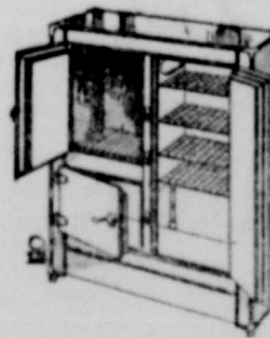

GOVERNMENT FURNISHES ENLIGHTENING STATISTICS

Some very enlightening information is furnished from statistics compiled by Army officials in connection with physical examinations of young men who attend Citizens' Military Training Camps.

When candidate report to camps they are given a rigid physical examination by Army medical officers. Among the items recorded on each boys examination report are weight, height and chest measurement. When camp closes each student is again examined and these items recorded. The difference between the two records shows the gain or loss in each item for the individual.

In many cases where young men who are underweight and generally below average in physical fitness, report to camp, the gain in each item has been very great. A gain of as much as fifteen pounds in weight during the month of training, has been recorded in some cases.

The famous "straightening" process of infantry drill has a tendency to take the curve out of the young civilian's back. It straightens and broadens his shoulders and adds, in some cases, an inch or more of his height in one month.

Erect carriage has a tendency to increase chest measurement.

Boys who report to camp fat and overweight invariably lose weight due to the fact that training does away with unnecessary fat and starts the building of hard muscle. The loss

of weight in such individual cases necessarily lowers the average gain per man.

The Commanding General, 8th Corps Area, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, furnishing the following statistics for C. M. T. Camps during the past four years:

Total trained during four years... 11,334

Average gain per man in weight... 22 pounds

Average gain per man in height... 47 inches

Average gain per man in chest measurement... 28 inch

The figures show that Uncle Sam has added more than twelve tons of brawn, 444 feet of height and 264 feet of chest measurement to the young men who have attended the C. M. T. Camps in this Corps Area since 1925.

In order to maintain at its highest degree the power of the body to overcome the poisons formed by typhoid germs, it has been found that one should be vaccinated against typhoid and re-vaccinated after an interval of about three years. It has also been found that one should be vaccinated against smallpox every three years as a precautionary measure.

Vaccination against typhoid and smallpox is required of each student before his enrollment in C. M. T. Camps. Those vaccinations are required, not only for the students own protection, but for the protection of those with whom he will come in contact.

The actual results in the prevention of smallpox in America military forces during the past 75 years can best be expressed in the statement that for every one case of smallpox occurring during the World War, nine occurred during the Spanish American War, and 28 occurred during the Civil War. Of those who had smallpox during the Civil War, 39 percent died; during the Spanish American War, 31 percent died, and during the World War, less than 2 percent of the cases died.

During the Spanish American War before vaccination against typhoid was known, 282 men out of every 2,000 soldiers in the Army had typhoid fever, whereas during the World War, when every soldier was vaccinated, only one man out of

2000 soldiers had the disease for each year of the War.

Citizens' Military Training Camps offer young men one month of training and the opportunity for physical betterment through out door recreation, with all necessary expenses paid by the Government.

Camps are being held in the Eighth Corps Area during the summer of 1929 at:

Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas—June 14th to July 13th; Ft. Sill, Lawton, Oklahoma—July 5th to August 3rd; Ft. Logan, Denver Colorado—June 20th to July 19th; Ft. D. A. Russell, Cheyenne, Wyoming—June 20th to July 19th; Ft. Bliss, El Paso, Texas—July 25th to August 23rd; Camp Steven D. Little, Nogales, Arizona—August 1st to August 30th.

Windrow-Harvesters

Service Store Places Order for Car Load Shipment of New Harvester Machines

A number of our wheat growers are very much interested in this comparatively new method of lessening the cost of harvesting and the fact that it will enable them to start cutting several days earlier, thereby reducing the risk of hail or storm damage.

The following extracts from a letter written by C. J. Swartwood, Glendive, Montana are offered for publication by H. L. Rogers of Farnsworth, who takes great interest in the development of improved farm equipment.

The equipment referred to, was on exhibit at the Wichita machinery show, and Mr. Rogers met and talked with a number of farmers from sections where these machines have been in use for the past two seasons.

It was not expected by the manufacturers that these machines would be so popular in this early harvest section, and production was not planned for earlier delivery. However, an order for a solid carload for the Service Store at Farnsworth will be given special handling, and it is hoped they will arrive shortly after May 1. A number of farmers have placed orders already, as it is very likely that there will be a shortage of these machines. Mr. Swartwood says:

"I handle 750 acres of wheat land alone, except at harvest time, when I hire a man to operate the harvester-thresher and one to shovel grain into the bin.

"Have been able to plow as high as 15 acres a day with a 3-bottom plow, to drill 45 to 50 acres with the 14-foot tractor drill, have cut over 60 acres a day with the 16-foot windrow-harvester, and averaged 80 acres picking up and threshing with the No. 8 harvester-thresher.

"The 16-foot windrower and the No. 8 harvester-thresher made just the right combination. When the straw was dry I found no windrow too heavy for the No. 8 traveling three miles an hour in intermediate gear. Some mornings, when the straw was tough, would have to throttle the tractor down for a short distance through some heavy spots. In case I had a field so heavy that the No. 8 would not handle the 16-foot windrow in intermediate gear, would simply slip into low gear and pull it at the rate of two miles an hour. At that rate of speed I would be picking up practically the same amount of grain as I would taking a 10-foot windrow in intermediate gear.

grain has to stand dead ripe two to four weeks, as it does when a large acreage is covered with a single machine. Twice the acreage can be handled successfully with the windrower and harvester-thresher.

"The windrower and harvester-thresher are standing up good. The wear is not excessive after harvesting 600 acres, notwithstanding the fact that they were operated in a cloud of dust all season, it being very dry. Broke some spring teeth out of the pick-up, but they are cheaply replaced. The tractor has run 1,500 hours with no expense but a set of spark plugs. Ground the valves once myself. It is in a high state of efficiency yet and I believe will run 1,000 hours more before it will require new sleeves.

"The Six Speed Special meets every trucking requirement of the farmer—speed power, and efficiency. The low gear on the rear axle makes it possible to crawl out of or up any bad place or hill."

HJR No. 6
A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to the

Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.

LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court of such lower rank and together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article 5. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such regulations and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such regulations and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. The Supreme Court shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, writs of certiorari, writs of mandamus, writs of prohibition, and writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

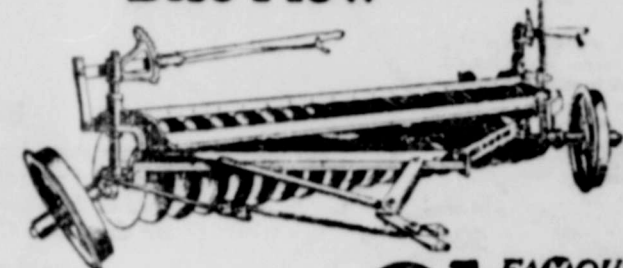
Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing

for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court", and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State. Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election. IMPROVE SECONDARY ROADS

The vast sum of money collected from automobile licenses, gasoline taxes and bond issues for road construction, have been spent largely for trunk highways.

The result has been great development along these roads, towns have built up and property values have increased out of all proportion to the growth that has been enjoyed by communities lying back from the main highways.

Smaller places not on the trunk roads have been almost wiped out of existence and farms which are left off the main routes have not improved in value. It is estimated that seventy-four per cent of rural mail deliveries are on more or less unimproved roads.

Our system of building main highways has been to parallel railroads rather than to strike off through new country. Thus we have added to traffic congestion in centers which are already badly congested. It is time to broaden our highway program and improve rural, or secondary roads which reach country not now developed as it should be.

It is stated that Ohio farmers, for example, pay twenty-seven per cent of Ohio road costs but receive only eleven per cent of road construction in rural districts.

A farmer may haul one or two loads a day to town over a mud road. If this road was improved to an extent sufficient to serve, rural needs he could probably make five trips or more a day with a bigger load.

It has been found that with expenditures of from \$1,500 to \$5,000 a mile roads which are now a liability can be turned into an asset of inestimable value. This has been proved in many states by the judicious use of gravel, crushed rock, oil and asphaltic materials. A definite program should be adopted to improve five to ten miles of secondary road for every mile of trunk highway in the majority of our states.

URGE STORING OF NEW GRAIN CROP ON FARM

"Prepare to store your wheat on the farm this season or you will have to dump it on the ground," is the warning being broadcast to wheat growers this spring by the department of agriculture and farm experts in the middle west.

Three reasons, it is pointed out, make the situation more acute this year than ever before. First, more combines will be in use, which will place the great bulk of the wheat crop on the market at the same time; second, the elevators already are full of wheat, and third, another big wheat crop is coming on.

The government has taken official notice of the situation facing wheat growers and is working on a measure that will provide cooperative marketing with large sums of money to be loaned to farmers for the purchase of storage facilities. At least one farm organization is planning to purchase several thousand grain bins for its farm members, to be paid for when the farmers market their wheat.

That the wheat grower is fully awake to the situation is evidenced by the fact that grain bin manufacturers are enjoying an unprecedented business in grain bins even thus far in the season.

The Columbian Steel Tank company, builders of the Columbian Red Top grain bin, report that grain bin business the first three months of 1929 was double that of the same period last year. This company manufactured and distributed storage facilities for 10,000,000 bushels of wheat last year and has found it necessary to double its plant capacity this year.

SOME WEATHER PROVERBS ARE SUPPORTED BY FACTS

The weather forecast in the little box at the top of the morning newspaper is almost the first item read of us. If we live in the city we want to know, naturally, whether to carry an umbrella or

put chains on the car; if we are engaged in agriculture, the probable state of the weather for the day and the prediction for to-morrow determines what work will be planned or accomplished.

With reliable service the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture it would seem that the old-time weather proverbs would soon pass out of use and be forgotten, even if any of them were dependable. Many, indeed, were absurd and misleading, but not a few are interesting as reflecting the accuracy of observation by those who are "out in all weathers," and useful when the morning paper is not at hand to furnish a forecast.

Among the best of these, perhaps, are the proverbs that have to do with the color of the sky and the appearances of the sun, the moon, and the stars, for all are affected by the state of the atmosphere. Any modified appearance of the sun is most conspicuous when it is near the horizon. Hence there are many weather proverbs about the sun at morning or evening. When the air is heavily charged with dust particles laden with moisture we see the sun as a fiery red ball, and predict rain, in such proverbs as "A red sun has water in his eye," or, "If the sun begin his race, be sure the rain will fall apace." The red sun implies a humid atmosphere, a condition essential and favorable to the occurrence of rain.

On the other hand, a red evening sky usually means that the air contains very little moisture and that rain within the next 24 hours is improbable. When the evening sky is overcast with uniform gray the dust particles in the atmosphere have evidently become loaded with moisture, giving rise to the proverb, "If the sunset is gray, the next will be a rainy day." A gray morning, however, for reasons which meteorologists can explain in connection with the formation of dew, generally justifies the expectation of a fair day. "Evening red and morning gray, two sure signs of one fair day." "An evening gray and a morning red," though, "Will send the shepherd wet to bed."

CROWNS ARE SHALLOWER, BUT

Without a doubt one of the season's important style notes is the shallower crown. But it should be remembered that in its extreme types the low crown is only for the youthful person. The majority cannot wear it well without some modification.

CUTS THROAT, SAVES LIFE

Copenhagen.—A Danish laborer named Hansen swallowed a piece of bread which lodged in his throat and choked him. He used a knife to cut into his throat and remove the bread. The throat was sewed up at a hospital to which he was removed. This self-performed operation, physicians said, saved his life.
