Red Cross Chapter Offers Course In Home Nursing

Organization Meeting is January 10

Women Interested In Course Should Be Present Saturday

Six classes in Red Cross home nursing will be organized in Ochiltree County as part of the National Defense program. Classes will be without charge and will start about the middle of January. The services of Mrs. J. P. Powell, Dalhart, a graduate registered nurse, and an authorized Red Cross nurse, will be secured. Mrs. Powell will teach all classes.

An organization meeting will be held in the District Courtroom on Saturday afternoon, January 10, at 2:30. Every woman interested in taking this valuable training is requested to be present and enroll Saturday afternoon. This course or project is being sponsored by the Perryton Sorosis Club, with Mrs. Orl Ellis, chairman of arrangements. Her assistants are Mrs. Jack Allen, Mrs. H. C. Brillhart and Mrs. Rose Mitchell. Miss Elizabeth Huffhines, home agent, is cooperating with the Red Cross Chapter and Sorosis Club.

If it is impossible for any one desiring to take the course to be at the meeting Saturday afternoon, then they should contact Mrs. Ellis to be at the committee and be enrolled before Saturday. Classes will be taught twice a week for six weeks. There will be morning, afternoon and evening classes.

A small certificate will be issued to each student, taking the course in Red Cross Home Nursing, who can successfully pass the final examination. The purpose of this course is to insure safer and more healthful homes and more satisfactory family relationships, and not to provide vocational training. Each class will be limited to 20.

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More Volunteers From this Area In Armed Forces

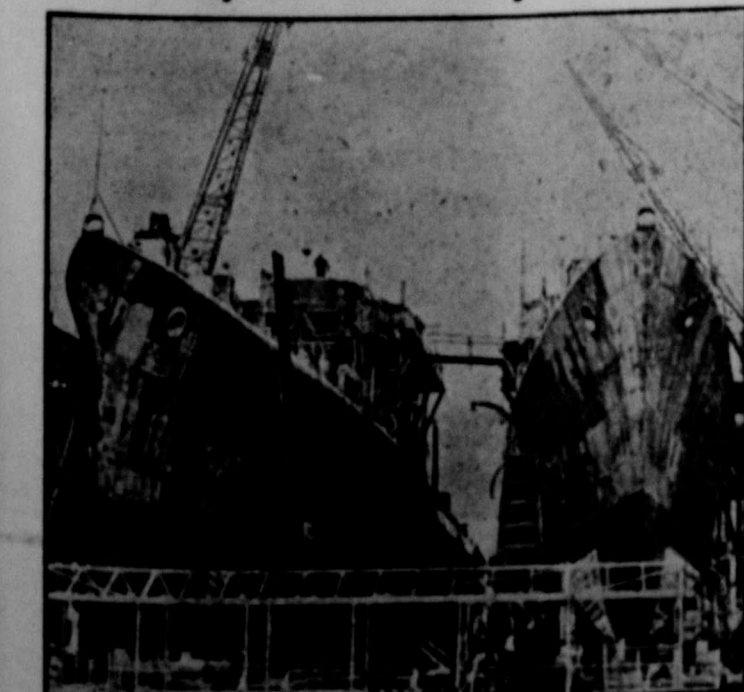
During the past week, at least five more boys from Perryton and surrounding communities have volunteered their services to their country. One joined the army and four the navy.

Truax Heads President's Birthday Fete

Glenn A. Truax will lead the 1942 campaign for the celebration of the President's birthday in Ochiltree County. Acceptance of county chairmanship has been announced by George Waverly Briggs, Dallas, vice chairman in charge of state organization for the Fight on Infantile Paralysis.

This year the campaign has been made doubly necessary due to the entrance of the United States into the world war. Gov. Coke Stevenson has received the January tire quotas for each county in Texas from the U. S. Office of Price Administration. Ochiltree's quota for the entire month of January is 12 tires and 10 tubes for passenger cars, motorcycles and light trucks; and 42 tires and 36 tubes for trucks and buses.

The program for national tire rationing has been delegated to the Office of Price Administration by Priorities Division orders, countersigned by President Roosevelt.

Administration of the program will be under state control, working through local rationing boards designated and authorized by the Governor and his State Defense Committee.

Mark McGee, prominent Port Worth attorney and a past department commander of the Texas American Legion, has been appointed as State Rationing Officer by the Governor.

County Judge Dave Shanks and Mayor W. H. Lance have recommended that the following Ochiltree County Tire Rationing Board be appointed: H. C. Brillhart, L. L. Lance and Van W. Stewart. Judge Shanks received a wire Wednesday from the Governor stating that the recommendations were satisfactory and that appointments would be made and instructions sent to the committee. These are expected to arrive today but until same are received, the committee will not organize nor has it any authority to ration tires.

Cannot Alter Regulations

Re-emphasizing that local tire rationing boards, set up under State authority, have no discretion to alter the new tire purchase regulations, effective Jan. 5, the Office of Price Administration in Washington has staffed a special unit for service to the boards throughout the country on points in the regulations which require special interpretations.

The unit was set up simultaneously with the announcement of the national January quotas for tires and tubes. The totals for the 48 states, District of Columbia, Alaska, Puerto Rico, and Hawaii are: Passenger cars, motorcycles and light trucks, 114,191 tires and 95,580 tubes; and trucks and buses, 242,783 tires and 202,966 tubes.

Just how many tires can be made available for later months will depend in part on developments in military requirements, the OPA said.

"There is no need for people to get panicky," said OPA Administrator Henderson. "The fact that a rationing plan is going into effect doesn't mean that everyone is going to get a flat tire one minute later. All of us should begin at once to conserve in the use of tires by stopping unnecessary driving, by carrying our neighbors, by driving slowly to minimize tire wear, and by following the rules of good tire care."

In issuing tire purchase certificates, local rationing boards are limited to 25 per cent of their monthly quota during the first seven days of the month and to an additional 25 per cent each in the next seven-day periods. No local board can issue purchase certificates beyond these limits.

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Cold Wave Grips Panhandle for Week

With the temperature hovering around the zero mark for the past week, the Panhandle is getting the first winter weather of the year. Snow has covered the ground two or three times since the cold wave hit Wednesday night of last week but the moisture content has been practically nil. Minimum readings as follows: Dec. 31, two above; Jan. 1, one above; Jan. 6, six above; Jan. 6, six above; Jan. 3, three above; Jan. 4, 5 below; Jan. 5, seven above; Jan. 6, two above; Jan. 7, two above. Maximum temperature during this period has been 34 degrees.

Sale of New Cars Trucks Banned On January 1

The government on January 1 prohibited purchase, sale or delivery of new passenger cars and trucks pending establishment of an automobile rationing system and disclosed simultaneously that production of new automobiles and light trucks would be stopped entirely "within a few weeks."

The order, issued by Donald M. Nelson, OPM priorities director, is effective immediately. It is expected that purchase of new cars and trucks will be limited under the plan to government, lend-lease, and the most "essential" civilian users. Nelson said action would be taken to permit completion of conditional sales, chattel mortgage and similar automobile purchase contracts if delivery was made prior to January 1.

JUST HERE and THERE

Just how are we sitting in this war? That's what we are all wondering. What's your guess? Here's what we gather from many sources:

We're going to have plenty of reverses before the tide turns. Don't look for a turn for the better until late in summer or early fall. All depends on war production and organization.

No one seems to question that we will ultimately win the war. No less than two years says some, most informed men think it will be longer.

The Draft will be expanded and many men now deferred will be ordered into service.

Americans are fighting mad but they have yet to realize that there will be many sacrifices and the belt will have to be tightened several notches before we get down to wartime living.

Present rationing of automobiles and tires is only a starter. There'll be others.

Nathan Robertson in FM hits the nail on the head when he rakes Senator Harry Flood Byrd of Virginia over the coals on his proposal to cut non-defense spending by taking it out of the pockets of the sharecroppers, migrant crop workers, unemployed and others in the lowest income brackets.

Total farm appropriations this year run to almost \$1,500,000,000, including loans. Most of the above sum goes to the more prosperous 50 per cent of the farmers who get 89 per cent of the nation's farm income. But some of it goes to the lower 50 per cent income farmers who get only 11 per cent of the farm income, and some of it goes to feed the poor in cities.

Get this, Byrd is a big commercial farmer who does he propose to cut. Not the big commercial farmers like himself but \$400,000,000 from the food stamp program and abolishment of the Farm Security Administration.

Summary of the 1941 loan program by the Ochiltree county AAA office show a slight decrease in number of bushels of grain under loan in 1941 than in 1940, but that much more wheat and barley was stored on the farm instead of going into warehouses.

\$40,568.20 In Conservation Checks Arrive

Expect Payments Total \$260,000 in Next Two Months

The first of the AAA checks to be paid to Ochiltree county farmers for compliance with the 1941 soil conservation program began to arrive Monday when 211 checks totaling \$40,568.20 was received by County Agent E. W. Thomas.

It is expected that compliance checks for 1941 will amount to between \$225,000 and \$260,000. These will be paid during January, February, and March.

Payments for 1939 soil conserving amounted to \$258,000.

Charged With Assault With Murder Intent

Dennis Selby, age 37, Ochiltree county farmer living about seven miles northeast of Perryton, was released Monday afternoon by Sheriff J. S. Talley on a \$2,000 bond to await action of the grand jury at the April term of the district court on a charge of assault with intent to murder. R. T. Correll is attorney for Selby.

Selby was arrested following a complaint filed by Roy Pribble and Leroy Gross, 17 yr. old farm youths living across the state line in Beaver county, Okla. Pribble and Gross allege that shortly after noon Sunday, they drove into Selby's yard to get some water for their radiator, but finding the wind mill out of order they got in their car and started to drive away.

They allege that Selby stuck his head out of the door but that they kept driving and that just as they reached the road, Selby started shooting at them. They ducked down in their car, an old coupe, and the car went into the ditch, stopping. They state that when the shooting stopped, they got out of the car and went back to see Selby and that Selby told them he had called to them to stop and when they didn't stop he grabbed his gun, a 22 cal. long rifle and started shooting.

The sheriff's office state that there were nine bullet holes in the car, two going through the door into the car. One bullet went through the top of Pribble's cap and Gross was seared over the right kidney by another bullet.

The boys, accompanied by their fathers, E. G. Pribble and L. V. Gross, came to Perryton and filed the complaint. Deputy Huston, accompanied by the boys and their fathers, and Capt. Pope Ivy and Patrolmen C. L. Russell and Sam Port, state highway police, went to the farm and placed Selby under arrest.

In 1941, 172 loans on 474,752 bushels of farm stored wheat, against 146 loans on 400,981 bushels in 1940. In 1941, 1,337,227 bushels of wheat covering 797 loans went into warehouses. In 1940, 864 loans on 1,071,301 bushels of wheat were made. PCT loans were 18 on 11,879 bushels of wheat with none in 1940.

In 1941, 121 loans on 224,271 bushels of farm stored barley were made. In 1940 only two loans on 1,848 bushels of farm stored barley were recorded with no barley going into warehouses. There were 13 loans on 11,974 bushels of barley that went into warehouse in 1941.

Total loans as follows: wheat, 1941, 987 loans on 1,823,858 bushels; 1940, 1010 loans on 2,072,283 bushels; barley, 1941, 134 loans on 236,245 bushels; 1940, two loans on 1,848 bushels.

In addition to the above barley figures, applications made for loans on 43,071 bushels were rejected on account of blight, smut or too much moisture.

CCC loans are available on grain sorghums until January 31, 1942, but none have been completed in this county at present time.

All wheat and barley loans will mature on April 30, 1942, and grain will automatically become the property of the Commodity Credit Corporation if not requested by that time. Only about two per cent of the loans have been liquidated but if the market price advances a little higher, many of the notes will be paid. At the present price of wheat, \$1.08 per bushel at local elevators, the farmer will realize a profit of approximately 6% cents per bushel on warehouse stored wheat and 13 cents per bushel on farm stored wheat. However, if the 7 cents storage was paid in advance, thereby giving the farmer \$1.01 per bushel loan rate instead of 94 cents there will only be 6 cents additional profit.

Production Credit Ass'n. Annual Meet

The Canadian Valley Production Credit Association annual stockholders' meeting will be held January 19, 1942, at 9:30 a. m., Palace Theatre, Canadian.

"Attendance of members and their participation in the discussion, in the election of directors and study of association business reports and plans are of primary importance in this cooperative credit organization," said Ford Hunker, manager of the Perryton office. "All members of the family who have a part in the farm or ranch planning and management are also being invited."

"This year, with fundamental changes in the farming and livestock business taking place, the presence of all members at this annual session devoted to consideration of association affairs is vital," he said. NOTICE Tax Payers

Your 1941 TAXES are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1942 to avoid penalty.

Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of.

Those who were 60 years of age or more on January 1, 1941 are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1941 are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1941 or will become 21 before election are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1942, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

In 1942 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1942, but must be paid between February 1st and April 1st, 1942.

Repair Farm Machinery Early in '42

COLLEGE STATION.—Repairing of farm machinery considerably ahead of the time it will be needed this year will be necessary, especially if new parts are required, says M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer of the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Repairing farm machinery and equipment has a direct relation to the possible seasonal or sectional shortage of labor. Consequently all labor-saving equipment should be considered in the program of repair from the milking machine to the combine.

It is reasonable to assume, Bentley explains, that machinery manufacturers considered that they had sufficient repair parts for 1942 needs. But during the last couple of months orders to manufacturers for parts have been unusually heavy. Moreover it takes an estimated 90 days to get new parts made and delivered even when the raw material is on hand.

"Taking conditions as they are, it would seem that every one who will need machinery parts this year should, in self protection, order them at once. Delay in doing so presents a serious hazard, especially in face of the national program to keep as much steel as possible out of unused equipment or repair parts."

The program, then, is to get needed repair parts, put them in place, and tune up the machine ready to run. Bentley continues. And when the present supply is exhausted give manufacturers time to make more before the machine needing repairs is wanted for use.

Bentley suggests that farm equipment known as orphans because of discontinuance of manufacture could, perhaps, be made usable by a local welder or blacksmith, adding that "we are told that existing manufacturers can furnish parts for machines they made 40 years ago." He emphasizes that protective maintenance of farm equipment never should be overlooked. "This means doing those things which will reduce the wear, corrosion or decay of equipment, such as providing proper lubrication, protection against rusting, and protecting equipment against weather damage as far as possible."

Years 1931-40, for example, did farm prices average parity, and for the ten years as a whole, farm prices averaged only 94.1 per cent of parity.

Furthermore, what farmers really need and deserve is not parity price but parity income. And Oscar Johnson says: "Parity prices without parity consumption will never bring the cotton farmer parity income."

In other words, cotton farmers cannot get parity income if they get parity price per pound, but can sell only half as many pounds as they used to. We must keep fighting for parity income as a matter of simple justice.—The Progressive Farmer.

In buying all wood furniture, look at the finish and the grain; be sure the varnish has been put on evenly. Veneered furniture is often as serviceable as the solid if properly glued. In selecting upholstered pieces, be sure of the durability of the covering and the formation of the springs. An eight-tied spring will give many times the wear of a four tied one. Study the furniture before buying because many times the quality is sacrificed to meet the demand in quantity.

Foaming of milk has long been an annoyance to dairy products manufacturers, and a lot of work has been done to try and figure out ways to keep milk from foaming. Then the USDA Bureau of Dairy Industry decided that the part of milk that foamed might be different from that part of the milk that didn't foam. So they developed a concentrated skim-milk foam.

Add the concentrated foam to dry or condensed skim milk, whip it a few minutes, and you get a stiff mass that has the best whipped cream beat—as far as looks are concerned. Probably be getting it on sundaes and hot chocolate some day.

To prevent warping of a wooden ironing board, cover all sides of the well dried board with phenolic resin before covering it.

Hash or stew made from plate beef is just as nutritious as hash made from porterhouse or sirloin.

Perryton, Texas,
November 28, 1941

Dear Farm Producer
Subject: Farm Machinery Repair
Scrap Iron

We wish to call your attention to two matters in connection with U. S. D. A. Farm Defense Program.

First: All farmers are being urged to check up on their needs for repair parts for their machinery immediately, and purchase or order parts by January 1. If this is done, farmers can be pretty well assured of getting the parts, whereas, if the matter is delayed, it may be impossible to get repairs in time for next year's harvest. New machinery is going to be scarce, due to limitations on the use of steel, and to the fact that factories are engaged in defense production.

Second: The steel mills are in urgent need of scrap iron to use in their milling processes, and it is believed that many thousands of tons of this material is lying around the farms of the nation that could well be turned into the channels of trade.

You are therefore, urged to go over your obsolete and worn out farm tools, strip them of bolts and parts that might later be used for repairs and bring the remainder into local junk dealers who have indicated they can pay a minimum price of approximately \$6.00 per ton.

A ceiling has been put on the price, and it is very unlikely that the scrap will bring more later on.

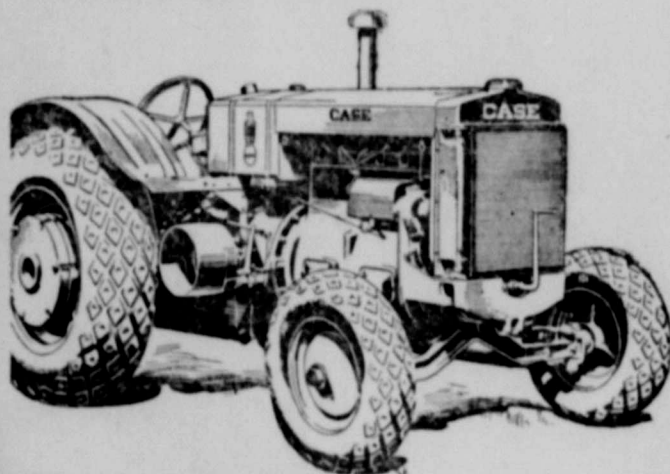

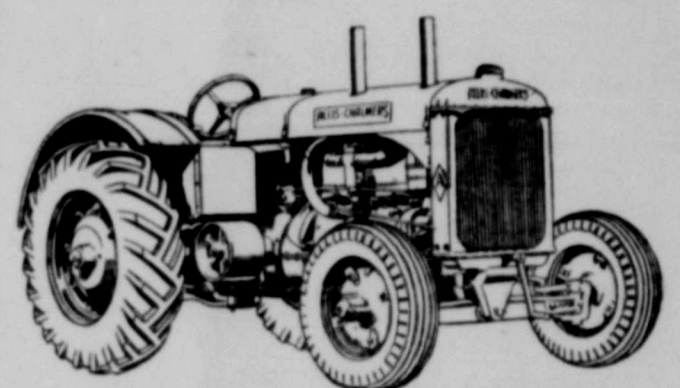

There are many kinds of patriotism, many ways of showing your love for America. The battlefronts are far away across the oceans, yet right here at home all of us can be soldiers and can behave like soldiers, with courage and discipline. In the present crisis that's the least that we can do.

Here in America we've got the best system of mass production in the world. We've also got the best system of distribution. That's why in normal times more people can buy more things more easily here than anywhere else. Now that some products are apt to become scarce, we've got to take extra care that we don't disturb that system of distribution more than we must. We've got to take extra care that we don't put impossible demands on it—that we don't disrupt it by hoarding.

Here in America there's no excuse for hoarding. We have plenty of food. There will be shortages of some manufactured goods, but we'll have enough basic necessities.

Our system of distribution is geared to supply our normal wants. If suddenly we increase our wants to abnormal proportions by panicky buying, we'll throw it out of gear. We'll create shortages that otherwise wouldn't exist, drive prices up to extreme highs. You can help to prevent that by refusing to become frightened by false rumors of severe scarcities, by buying no more than you usually do, by trusting in America and America's ability to keep you supplied with all the things you really need.

Something to Remember

What will happen to America after the war? How will we meet our rising government debt, change our economy back to a peace-time basis and continue with our job of making America into the best place to live in the world?

Such problems are causing grave concern in the minds of many Americans at the present time. In a recent speech Dr. Robert G. Sproul, President of the University of California, pointed out some facts that should reassure us on these points.

After the war, he said, "the land and its resources will still be here; all of the knowledge of mankind from the beginning of history to the present will still be ours. . . . Such adjustments as we may have to make in our social and economic scheme will not destroy our democracy as long as we preserve inviolate its central and fundamental principle of respect for and recognition of the dignity and worth of the individual."

That concept of the individual has always been one of the foundations of our freedom. Because of it we are able to work where we please, save our money or spend it, worship as we wish and enjoy all our liberties. Whatever happens in the months to come, we must remember that and let nothing destroy it.

Air Corps Examiners Coming to Panhandle

The "stream lined" recruiting of the aviation branch of the Army reflects the quickened tempo caused by the war. No longer is it content to sit back in recruiting stations and wait for young men to come to it. To-day it brings the information and the examining board to the communities.

Starting in January, the Aviation Procurement team from Fort Bliss and the Itinerant Aviation Cadet Examining Board from Goodfellow Field will cover the following "circuit": Amarillo, Texas, Elks Club House, January 5-6-7; Childress, Texas, Municipal Bldg., January 8-9-10; Pampa, Texas, Army Recruiting Station, January 12-14-15; Borger, Texas, American Legion Hall, January 13-15-17.

Present will be a recruiting officer to explain requirements to men who want to learn to fly, or men who want to be Navigator-Bombardiers. Also present, a flight surgeon to give the physical examination, air officers to "size up" candidates and see if they are good air corps material.

Those who qualify, are then enlisted on the spot, and given a furlough for thirty days, so that they can know they are "In the Air Corps" and still have time to finish up business matters.

Those who pass the physical examination, but must take the mental examinations later, are given help in arranging to meet the mental examination requirements. They are given letters to their local boards requesting deferment until the next examination is past.

Simeon Realized Fulfillment of Hope for Messiah

The International Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 11
Text: Luke 2:25-35, 39, 40.

THIS is a beautiful lesson. Its chief character is not the infant Jesus, but the saint in Israel, Simeon, to whom the parents brought the child Jesus to fulfill the ritual requirements of the Jewish law.

What a noble figure appears in the very brief description of Simeon! We are told that he was righteous and devout, that he looked for what Luke called "the consolation of Israel," and that the Holy Spirit was upon him. Could anything greater be said of any man?

A righteous and devout priest, well versed in the Jewish Scriptures, would have found it impossible not to have his life filled with vision, and hope, and expectation. These Scriptures told of a Messiah who was to come, a great Savior and Deliverer, the glory of whose coming and reign was described in rich and beautiful terms. All his life Simeon had lived in the devoutness of this hope, "looking for the consolation of Israel."

A strong spiritual conviction had developed in Simeon, some mystic words of God that he should not see death until he had seen "the Lord's Christ," this Messiah of his faith, his longing, and his expectation.

The greatest experiences of joy are touched with sorrow, and Simeon suggested something of the suffering as well as the glory and satisfaction of Mary through the coming mission of her Son. Surely the hearts of many parents may respond to this beautiful scene! And the hope of many who still look for the consolation of humanity, despite the sad and violent times, may be quickened anew. We know that the Lord Jesus, the Prince of Peace, has come, though the world has not recognized Him.

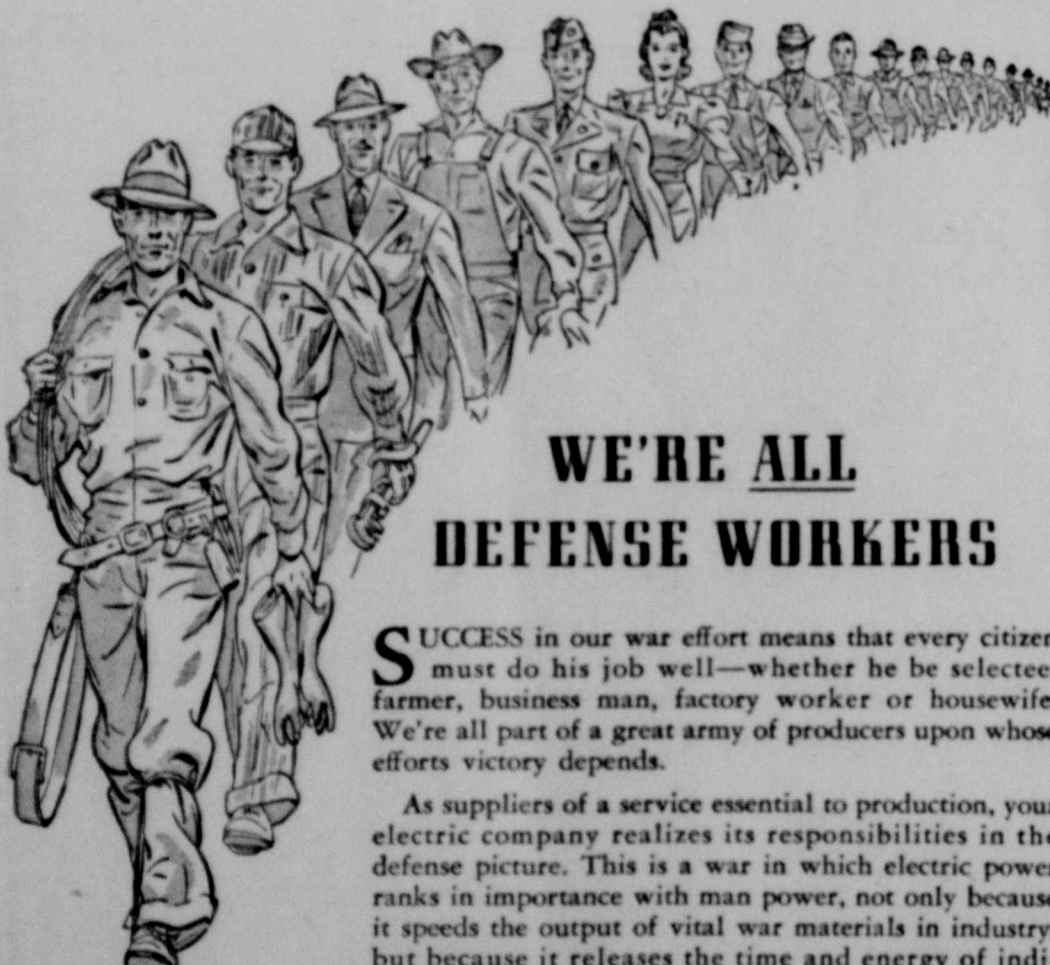

The Library Corner

"Lance" by Edward F. Haskell, one of the latest books acquired by the Perryton Library is the most widely discussed novel of the present century, and is announced by the most famous critics to the greatest novel since the dawn of civilization. At times in the perusal of this book one is struck dumb by the wisdom of its contents. It is a novel about multicultural men, of "world-sized" people, who live everywhere but find their place nowhere. Its theme has never before been touched by a novelist. Literature, in fact, has not as yet recognized its existence at all. The world's sharp constriction—through rapid transport and communication, through the farflung movements of refugees and the shifts of entire populations in recent and current wars—has produced millions of rootless, groping multicultural men and women. So Edward Haskell, who has been such a person himself, writes their story.

The scene of the book is chiefly a prison camp in Bulgaria housing captured British soldiers during the First World War. Here in the Balkans, cross-roads of the world, where the paths of Americans, Germans, Russians, English, Irish, Scotch converge, we find Lance, a private in the British Army, who is as much German as he is English. The young scientist is fighting not for love of a single country, but for the opportunity to observe many kinds of people in crucial situations. We find Eleonora, proud and embittered daughter of an American war profiteer, who puts him in the most crucial situation of all. They and many of those about them feel that a single race, country, and church are treacherous landmarks by which to mark their course. They come into conflict with the more numerous men and women who cling passionately to these ancient absolutes and blindly oppose the scientists who risk their lives to save them from each other.

It seems to Lance and Eleonora that they can see as from a mountain peak, into the separate valleys where separate nations live, that while each nation knows only its narrow valley, he and she can know and compare them all.

And in wielding its power of life or death over Lance, a British court-martial finds the opportunity of deciding between the interests of its own army and the interest of world civilization.

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Ten Ways to Make Tires Last Longer

America's 27 million car owners can help their country conserve rubber by making their own tires last longer. In an appeal for cooperation of car owners, the OPM listed 10 simple rules by which civilian requirements for rubber can be reduced:

1. Use tires as long as possible by having them retreaded. The cost is about half that of a new tire. Retread wear is about 80 per cent of that of a new tire.

2. Inflate tires weekly. Never let pressure fall more than three pounds below recommended minimums.

3. Reduce speed. Tires run at 40 miles per hour last twice as long as at 60 miles per hour.

4. Avoid short stops and jack-rabbit starts. They burn rubber.

5. Avoid hitting curbs, holes, rocks, bumps. That increases wear and encourages blowouts.

6. Check wheel alignment twice a year. A tire a half inch out of line drags sideways 87 feet per mile and causes uneven wear.

7. Repair cuts, leaks, breaks promptly. Delay increases damage. Use blowout patches only temporarily. Use vulcanizing.

8. Swap wheels around every 5,000 miles. Tires last longer.

9. Use only tires that fit your rims. Have your garage man advise you.

10. Cooperate to save rubber. Waste is sabotage. Don't speed around curves. Use your car only when essential. Use public transportation where possible. Team up with your neighbors to use fewer cars, make fewer trips. Help the merchants conserve, too, by carrying small bundles instead of asking for delivery.

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SAMARITANS ARE SAFER

Who's Who in Emergency

The odd and unpredictable reactions of individuals in the face of emergency would often be laughable if the results were not so frequently tragic.

There is the legendary one about Pat, found weeping beside the body of strangled Mike. He explained that Mike had cut himself while shaving and that he had put a tourniquet around Mike's neck to keep him from bleeding to death.

A bit far-fetched, perhaps. But a friend of mine, who once thought the Pat-and-Mike anecdote laughable, was recently one of a group who looked on helplessly while the victim of an automobile accident quickly bled to death from a gashed throat. Wishing desperately that he knew what to do, my friend reported that the only thing he could think of at the moment of crisis was that impossible yarn about Pat and Mike. Yet the life of that individual might have been saved had my friend or any one of that handful of ignorant onlookers known what to do pending medical aid.

Automobile and other types of accident are so prevalent in this country today that someone is injured every three and one-third seconds and someone is killed every five and one-third minutes. At this rate, which means accidental death or injury to one out of every 14 persons during the year, the chances are that even the unscathed will be confronted with some kind of accident emergency.

The majority of those who have faced some such test will readily admit their ineffectiveness, though it is usually to their chagrin and sorrow. Yet those who have not proved themselves are generally over-confident of their ability to cope with a crisis, and it is possible they will be surprised to know, as a result of psychological tests, that out of 100 individuals confronted with an emergency, 95 can neither think nor act correctly, three can think correctly but cannot act, and only two can both think and act correctly.

Each of us, whether he likes it or not, is faced with the question: How will you react in an emergency? And the chances apparently are 98 to two that unless you have taken the slight trouble to acquire a knowledge of First Aid, you will be just about as helpful and effective as Pat or my friend whose ignorance was almost equally great.

Fortunately, the American Red Cross conducts First Aid training courses which make it possible for virtually everyone to take his place in the ranks of "Who's Who in an Emergency." By means of such knowledge and the training that establishes correct patterns of reaction, the surprise element present in every emergency is largely eliminated and sure, controlled action becomes easy. Psychologically speaking, the stimulus is short-circuited through the reflexes and reaction time is greatly speeded up.

When confronted with an emergency you need ask yourself only two questions: "Have I the ability to aid?" and "By what means can I help?" If you will read the remainder of the articles of this series you will be well on the way to a satisfactory answer.

cases for more tires than are covered by its monthly quota. The quotas are valid only for the month for which set, and unused portions of any quota do not carry over.

To secure a new tire or tube under the quotas, an eligible purchaser must fill out an application which must be certified to by an inspector as to the condition of the tire or tube being replaced. The application then must be taken to the local board which can issue a certificate for purchase if the purchaser can show that he is eligible. The application must then be taken to a tire dealer where the tire or tube may be purchased.

The eligibility list has been supplied by the OPA and it in general covers vehicles whose continuous operation is required to maintain the public health and safety, buses with a capacity of 10 or more passengers, and necessary truck operations.

No one can sell, lease, trade, or transfer any new auto tires. Tires that have been used for fewer than 1,000 miles are included as new tires.

The ban does not apply to bicycle tires nor to tires necessary to equip new autos, trucks, buses, motor cycles, farm machines and other vehicles. Retreaded tires are not included.

Tire Eligibility List
No tire purchase certificate shall be issued unless the applicant is to mount the tire on:

A. On a vehicle which is operated by a physician, surgeon, visiting nurse or a veterinarian, and which is used principally for professional services.

B. On an ambulance.

C. On a vehicle used exclusively for one or more of the following purposes:

1. To maintain fire fighting services.
2. To maintain necessary public police services.
3. To enforce such laws as relate specifically to the protection of public health and safety.
4. To maintain garbage disposal and other sanitation services.
5. To maintain mail services.

D. On a vehicle with a capacity of ten or more passengers operated exclusively for one or more of the following purposes:

1. Transportation of passengers as part of the services rendered to the public by a regular transportation system.
2. Transportation of students and teachers to and from school.
3. Transportation of employees to or from any industrial or mining establishment or construction project, except when public transportation facilities are readily available.
E. On a truck operated exclusively for one or more of the purposes stated in the preceding sections or for one or more of the following purposes:

1. Transportation of ice and of fuel.
2. Transportation of material and equipment for the building and maintenance of public roads.
3. Transportation of material and equipment for the construction and maintenance of public utilities.
4. Transportation of material and equipment for the construction and maintenance of production facilities.
5. Transportation of material and equipment for the construction of defense housing facilities and military and naval establishments.
6. Transportation of material to render roofing, plumbing, heating and electrical repair services.
7. Transportation of any common carrier.
8. Transportation of waste and scrap materials.
9. Transportation of raw materials, semi-manufactured goods, and finished products, including farm products and foods, provided that no certificate shall be issued for a new tire, casing or tube to be mounted on a truck used (a) for the transportation of commodities to the ultimate consumer for personal, family or household use, or (b) for transportation of materials for construction and maintenance except to the extent specifically provided by sub-sections 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 of this section.

F. On farm tractors or other farm implements, other than automobiles or trucks, for the operation of which rubber tires, casings or tubes are essential.

G. On industrial, mining and construction equipment, other than automobiles or trucks, for the operation of which rubber tires, casings or tubes are essential.

Rationing Conditions
A certified eligible purchaser of new tires must meet the following conditions:

1. That the vehicle on which the new tire casing or tube is to be mounted constitutes an "eligible" vehicle.
2. That the vehicle cannot be replaced by one owned, operated or subject to the control of the applicant, which is equipped with serviceable tires and tubes and which is not fully employed for a use specified in one or more of the listed eligible categories.
3. That the tire, casing or tube is to be mounted at once to replace a tire, casing or tube no longer serviceable.
4. That the tire, casing or tube, when added to all other tires, casings and tubes in the applicant's possession, whether unmounted or mounted on a vehicle, and when that total is applied only to eligible vehicles, does not add up to more than one spare tire, casing or tube of a given size for each eligible vehicle.
5. That the existing tire, casing or tube cannot be recapped, retreaded or repaired for safe use at speeds which the applicant may reasonably be expected to operate, or that such recapping, retreading or repairing cannot be obtained without inordinate delay.
6. That the applicant agrees to trade in replaced tires, casings and

United States Navy Lowers Age Limit for Reserve Officers

NEW ORLEANS.—Launching a drive to procure thousands of deck and engineering officers to man the rapidly-growing two-ocean fleet, the Navy Department today opened Class V-7 of the Naval Reserve to senior and junior college men and reduced the minimum age limit from 20 to 19 years. Captain T. A. Thomson, Jr., Commandant of the Eighth Naval District, announced.

At the same time, Naval Reserve Recruiting offices were ordered at top speed in enlisting college graduates for immediate appointment as Reserve midshipmen inasmuch as lowering of the age limit to 19 will open enlistments to a field heretofore just under the minimum age limit. The quota for such college graduates or seniors has been set at 850 for the Eighth Naval District with a like quota of 850 for college juniors. In past recruiting efforts for V-7 volunteers, the Eighth Naval District has consistently met its quotas ahead of time.

Under the new plan, regularly enrolled college juniors and seniors may be enlisted prior to graduation provided they submit a certificate from the registrar of the school attesting that upon graduation they will have completed the required studies. Such men will be continued on inactive duty until they have completed the work required for their college degree. Then they will be appointed midshipmen and sent to special Navy schools for training in Naval science. Upon graduation, they will be commissioned Ensigns in the Naval Reserve, eligible for sea duty.

All candidates will receive approximately 30 days elementary training at some navy activity prior

to assignment to a Reserve Midshipman School. While undergoing such training, they will be furnished, at no expense to them, their initial outfit of uniform, clothing, and equipment. In their enlisted capacity, they will be given an insight into life aboard ship, and will be instructed in the fundamentals of military discipline and of naval customs and usage.

After being appointed a Reserve midshipman and during the period under instruction each midshipman U. S. Naval Reserve, will be entitled to receive the same pay and allowance as midshipmen of the Regular Navy, namely \$700 per year and daily ration. From this pay, the Naval Reserve midshipmen will be able and required to provide articles of uniform, books, and clothing. Bedding, certain books, and other equipment will be provided by the Government.

Applicants for enlistment in Class V-7 must fulfill the following requirements:

(a) Be native-born male citizens of the United States, not less than 19 and under 28 years of age, as of date of enlistment.

(b) Must be physically fit and not less than 65 1/2 inches in height.

(c) Be of good repute in their community, and furnish three letters of recommendation on letter-head stationery from responsible citizens in their community.

(d) Be unmarried on date of enlistment, and agree not to marry prior to completion of reserve midshipman training.

(e) Possess one of the following degrees from an accredited university or college; Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Any En-

gineering degree, Bachelor of Education, Bachelor of Philosophy, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Commercial Science, Bachelor of Journalism, Bachelor of Laws (provided the applicant's law course was preceded by at least 2 years of pre-law work at an accredited institution).

(f) Must submit certified transcript of college record in substantiation of degree held, which must include at least two one-semester courses, or their equivalent, in mathematics of college grade submit credit for a course in Trigonometry taken in any accredited school or college.

With reference to the mathematics required, it is explained that this means mathematics for college credit is given toward degree and not mathematics taken in high schools or secondary schools. Subjects such as Physics, Chemistry, Statistics, Actuarial Science, Accounting are not considered meeting the math requirement.
