Citizen and Employer of Year due recognition at Saturday banquet

Who are Floydada's Citizen of the Year and Employer of the Year for 1986?

Identities of these honorees will be revealed Saturday evening at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. Citizen of the Year is a new award.

Serving of dinner begins at 7 p.m. in Duncan Elementary School cafeteria.

Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia, nationally-known western artist and a noted after-dinner speaker, is to address the 39th annual CofC banquet. "We are Floydada" has been chosen as the theme.

Jack Robertson, retiring Floydada Chamber of Commerce president, will serve as master of ceremonies. Posting of the colors will be handled by Boy Scout Troop 357 and the invocation will be spoken by the Rev. O.D. Johnson, pastor of First Christian Church.

Dinner is being catered by Judy Macha and Sande Reeves.

Following the welcome, Judy Allen will introduce directors. Mrs. Allen is the 1986-87 president of the Women's Division.

Employer of the Year is to be presented by Sharon Smith, the reigning Miss Floydada.

Robertson will introduce the Citizen of the Year.

Eddie Smith, named CofC proxy for 1987-88, is to present the past president plaque to Robertson. Smith also will introduce new directors.

"We are Floydada" will be presented by Robertson, who is to introduce Wyatt.

Dinner music will be given by Frieda Simpson. The Women's Division is in charge of decorations.

Elected as new directors are Stephen Fyffe, Larry Ogden, Clar Schacht and Wayne Tipton. Terms of Dr. Keith Patzer, Tipton, Fred Thayer and Alton Higginbotham expire, and Wally Pad-

gett has resigned from the board.

In addition to the elected directors, Alice Gilroy and Thayer have been appointed to one-year terms.

\$1,576,122 in disaster payments due farmers

Farmers in this county are to receive \$1,576,122.30 in generic certificates for the disaster declaration. Certificates are being processed by the local ASCS office.

Texas will be receiving a total of \$133 million in generic certificates, says Texas Department of Agriculture.

"Because the \$400 million appropriate to the disaster program had to be shared with other states, 73.9 percent of the amount requested will be sent to farmers in your county," according to a letter forwarded to County Judge Bill Hardin by Mike Moeller, deputy commissioner of agriculture.

Absentee balloting by personal appearance will be conducted March 16-31 in the county clerk's office in the

courthouse. Margaret Collier is absentee clerk.

Commissioners courtroom of the courthouse will be site of the April 4 election. Polls are to be open from 7

a.m. until 7 p.m.

Two ballot boxes are to be utilized. One will be for Precinct Three only and the other for the at-large trustee voting. Only persons residing within Precinct

Three are eligible to cast ballots in that trustee race. All eligible voters living anywhere in Floydada school district may vote in the at-large trustee election.

SPS offer again rejected

Topping the agenda for the Floydada City Council meeting on Tuesday, March 10, was a meeting with representatives of Southwest Public Service regarding the proposed sale of the city electric facility.

After hearing a counter offer to the city's February offer to sell the plant and facilities for "5 million invested over 20 years", the council rejected the new offer as being "only half of what we asked" in the words of councilman Wayne Russell.

The offer made Tuesday by SPS representative Gary Gipson called for a "guaranteed monthly payment of \$21,000 each month for a period of 20 years" from a trust of \$2½ million to be established by SPS. This would net the city \$5,040,000.00 over the 20 year period.

Although SPS offered no objections to city retention of ownership of the generator building, ballpark lighting, the debt of power facility, the bank accounts of the power company, Mayor Powell reminded Gipson "The letter we sent stated that there would be no

negotiation except on the matter of street lighting." Powell termed the new offer by SPS an "attempt to negotiate down from the stated selling price."

The discussion was brought to an abrupt end by a motion from council member Wayne Russell that the council reject the counter offer from SPS. The measure was quickly seconded by Councilman Frank Breed and passed with a unanimous vote.

Local attorney Ben Ayres, representing Ruben DeLeon, came before the council to protest a letter DeLeon had received from the city informing him the trailers he had moved onto several lots at N. 13th and East Virginia were "substandard housing and must be moved immediately." Ayres told the council that DeLeon had been told by city secretary Jimmie Lou Stewart that the city had no ordinances regarding trailers and he was free to do as he wanted in that area. "Acting in good faith, Ruben purchased the lots and the trailers and moved them in. He has spent between \$5,000 and \$6,000 on this project and you are telling him he is going to lose it all and the

trailers have to be moved out of the city limits."

City manager Bill Feuerbacher told the council that "This project constitutes a trailer court which the area is not zoned for and which requires more space than DeLeon had."

City attorney Steve Hale suggested that the council agree to hold the eviction order in abeyance while DeLeon seeks a variance from the planning and zoning commission which would allow the trailers to remain providing they are brought up to standard and can pass the necessary inspections by sewer, water, and light personnel before connection to city facilities.

A motion by Council woman Ginger Warren, seconded by Russell, passed unanimously to approve this course of action.

Demolition and cleanup of Rilla Sue Woody property met yet another snag when the council was informed by attorney Hale that "There is an IRS lien against the property and the city will have to secure permission of the IRS before the structure can be demolished." He suggested that the bid be

Discussion of possible capital improvement projects consumed the majority of the regular board of trustees session on Monday, March 9.

Among items the FISD trustees are considering for implementation before the start of the 1987-88 school year next fall are a weight room for the field house, new lockers for the high school and for the junior high gym, completion of the re-roofing of the high school and surfacing the parking lot at the field house. Each of these items will be put up for bids to be opened and considered at the April board meeting before a final decision is made concerning which projects will be implemented.

Superintendent Jerry Cannon reported that steps have been taken to alleviate the traffic problems at dismissal time at A.B. Duncan Elementary. He told board members that a staggered dismissal system has been instituted. Early childhood students, pre-kindergarten and kindergarten students are now being dismissed from class at 3:20 each afternoon. First graders are being dismissed at 3:30, second graders at 3:40 and third graders at 3:45. Parents with children in more than one grade will pick students up at the latest dismissal time for their child and bus students will go home at 3:45.

Cannon said "We are hoping that a series of dismissals will not create the traffic jam and danger to our students that a uniform dismissal time has in the past."

Cannon also told the board that the Texas Education Agency will be making an accreditation visit in late March. This visit is part of the three year series which includes an audit and other inspection tours in order to remain in good standing with the state agency.

The board granted Cannon permission to pursue authorization to construct a building complex for Title I reading classes with excess funds the district has on hand. The small building would house "a couple of class rooms" and be a permanent addition to the A.B. Duncan campus.

Cannon received approval to cooper-

ate with the Region 17 area in obtaining a block grant to be used for summer in-service training and the purchase of new equipment such as video or computer items for Floydada campuses.

A proposal by principals Ronnie Wood, high school, and Joe Christian, junior high, to adjust the starting and dismissal times for junior high and high school was considered, but "left as is" after discussion. The two administrators had asked that the adjustment be made to offset the times when students going on trips for various reasons are not present in seventh period.

Assistant superintendent Jimmy Collins sought and received authorization to "look around for a good used pickup for the bus mechanic." He also obtained approval for advertising a 1972 and a 1973 school bus for sale.

Collins reported that a roof problem at the junior high, first thought to be a simple leak, turned into a "major mess" resulting in a \$2500 re-roofing job. The junior high band hall was the site of the problem.

The board approved the local textbook committee report on a motion by John Dunlap, seconded by Don Hardy and passed by unanimous vote. A tentative school calendar for 1987-88 was also approved. The schedule will be "much the same as this year" according to Cannon. School would start on September 1 and end on May 30 under this plan approved on a motion by Charlene Brown, seconded by Dunlap and passed unanimously.

Collins presented a tax report showing collections to be 90.91% complete as of February 28 with \$741,527 collected and a balance due of \$74,088.

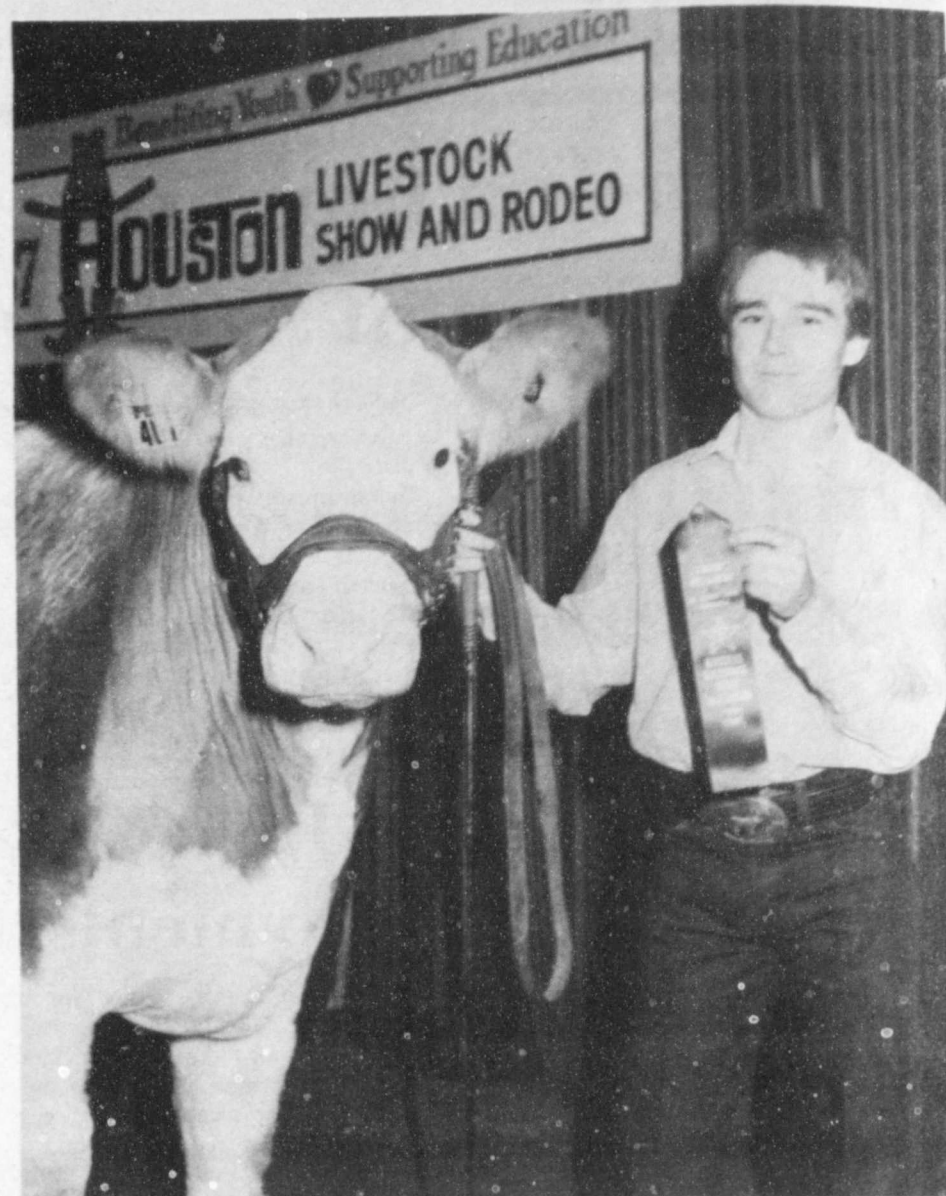
Following an extensive executive session to consider personnel, board members authorized the renewal of teacher contracts as recommended by building principals.

Tommy Baxter, girls basketball and track coach, requested and was granted a reassignment within the system. He will serve as the high school tennis coach next year and will teach P.E. and

sociology.

The board voted to add an assistant band director to the high school staff and to add a P.E. aide to the staff at A.B. Duncan. Salaries for custodians, bus drivers and cafeteria personnel were set with a 3% increase.

Board members attending the session were Bill Orman, Harvey Allen, Freddie Morren, Weldon Pruitt, Charlene Brown, Don Hardy and John Dunlap. Also in attendance were Jerry Cannon, Jimmy Collins, Joe Stepp and the Hesperian reporter.

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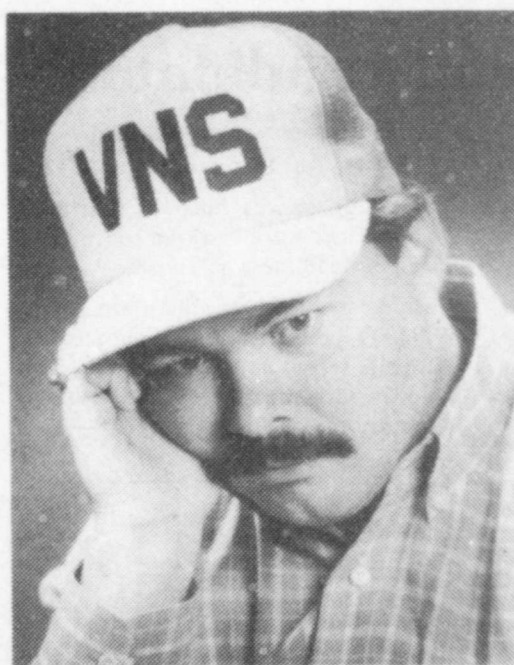

Commissioners purchase motor grader and pickup

Floyd County Precinct 3 purchased a new motor grader following the opening of bids at the regular March session of commissioners court on Monday, March 9. The purchase of a John Deere machine was approved on a motion by Pct. 1 commissioner Thomas Warren, seconded by Pct. 2 commissioner Floyd Jackson and unanimously passed in the ensuing vote.

Yellowhouse Machinery was the successful bidder with a low bid of \$54,950. One other bid was received, \$66,697 from Plains Machinery. Both bids included the allowance for a trade in.

Two bids were also received on the purchase of a new pickup for use by the Extension Service office in Floyd County. City Auto submitted a bid of \$11,990 plus a trade in. Oden Chevrolet-Olds submitted a bid exactly \$1000 higher, \$12,990 plus the trade in. The bid was awarded to City Auto on a motion by Pct. 1 commissioner Sam Spence, seconded by Pct. 4 commissioner Kay Crabtree and passed by unanimous vote.

Members of the court voted to begin meeting on both the second Monday of each month and the fourth Monday of each month after hearing Judge Bill Hardin explain that "some county bills are being held until the regular court date to be paid. We have been incurring some penalties and interests which could be avoided if we could approve these bills for payment earlier."

The next regular session of the court will be on March 16 under the new schedule.

County treasurer Glenna Orman reported to the court that the county began the month of February with "\$215,209.19, taking in receipts of \$875,799.27 and disbursing \$655,599.44. This leaves a balance of \$435,409.02 on February 28."

Orman also reported \$676,000 in certificates of deposit which have earned \$11,169.89 in interest this year.

She added that local tax collections are "91.56% complete and an additional \$2,271.00 has been received from the Revenue Sharing fund."

Among the more routine matters handled by the court during the Monday session were the renewal of landfill contracts with both the City of Lockney and the City of Floydada and the approval of a bond for recently appointed commissioner Kay Crabtree. The court also designated the First National Bank of Floydada as the county depository following the acceptance of the FNB bid during the February session.

R.G. Dunlap and L.D. Brittain met with the court to request that the funds allotted for the Senior Citizens Center in Floydada be made available to the organization. The request was granted and the court will attempt to "do the same for the Lockney senior citizens when the time comes to help them meet expenses" according to Judge Hardin. The \$1500 expenditure was approved on a motion by Warren and seconded by Crabtree. The measure passed with a

unanimous vote.

The court approved a form for use by county employees when requesting reimbursement for expenses such as mileage, food and lodging when traveling on county business. The four commissioners also approved a motion to allow the judge to sign an authorization for the City of Floydada to demolish a dilapidated structure on a lot owned by the taxing entities. The lot, at 511 N. 3rd in Floydada, will be cleared at no expense to the county.

One farm work contract was approved for clearing off old improvements for Mark Noland in Precinct 3. Contract #332 was declared void at the request of Commissioner Warren.

Two matters were tabled until a later date. The first, county health insurance coverage, will be taken up at a Tuesday session on March 10 at 11:00 a.m. The second will be reviewed after more information is gathered on the subject, a service contract for the copy machine in the courthouse.

'Rash of wrecks' reported

When Sgt. Harold Snell spoke of "a rash of wrecks," he wasn't underestimating. The police department has investigated no fewer than six since Feb. 27.

A local woman, Gloria Cavazos, was hospitalized for observation following a Thursday mishap at 1:08 p.m. on the "Y". Third and Houston. Ms. Cavazos' 1983 Oldsmobile was struck by an '84 White truck, driven by Charles Zondio of Columbus, Miss.

She was taken by her family to Caprock Hospital, where she was a patient until the following day.

A four-vehicle accident was investigated on March 4 by the police department. No injuries were involved.

A '78 Honda four-door car, driven by Jett Cheek, was attempting a turn into the bus barn — west of junior high — about 8:15 a.m. when the vehicle struck an '84 Chevrolet pickup, driven by Charles Bullock. The impact caused the Bullock pickup to go out of control before striking a city "guy-wire" and a parked '83 Honda motorcycle, belonging to DeWane Franklin.

In turn, the cycle was shoved into a

'77 Ford belonging to Jim Gomez. The latter vehicle and the motorcycle were both parked at the time of the accident. Cheek was cited for failure to yield right-of-way while making a left turn.

At 1:30 p.m. the same day, an '84 Jeep station wagon driven by Wanda Bilbrey was "backed into" by an '81 Buick driven by Lola Allen. The mishap occurred in front of First National Bank on South Main.

Two autos reportedly sustained extensive damage on Feb. 28 in a 7:20 a.m. accident at Second and Missouri. Involved were a '77 Pontiac driven by Della Suarez and a '78 Buick driven by Gary Lee Vick. The Buick "had to be towed off."

Ms. Suarez was cited for running a red light, according to officers.

Police investigated two "hit-and-run" accidents on Feb. 27.

At 11:45 a.m., the '76 Ford of Lesca Durham of Lockney was struck by an orange pickup. The pickup "backed out" and struck the Ford at Fifth and California, damaging the car's passenger door. The pickup left the scene without reporting the accident.

A blue Toyota pickup struck the Pizza Gold building at 10:40 p.m. that day. It left the scene, but police learned the following day that the driver was Ted King of Plainview.

DOG BITES CHILD
A juvenile was "bitten on the calf of the leg" by a dog on March 3 while "walking down the street." The incident happened on the "Y."

The child was attended by a school nurse, who notified the police department. The dog's owner has been contacted, and the animal is being held for observation.

Thieves also took a center link (part of a lift mechanism) from a John Deere tractor at Scott Gin. Chain also was stolen.

Theft of a battery, possibly stolen in January from a vehicle at 220 W. Jackson, also has been reported.

awarded pending receipt of that permission.

Four bids were received, with the bid being awarded to Ray Macha for \$600 pending authorization from IRS to carry out the work. Other bids included \$800 by Carlos Baker, \$800 by Mike Reeves and \$950 by Kevin Nelson.

The subject of Floydada Cable TV was again raised as the city recently received notification of an increase in the basic cable service of \$0.50 per month.

Council member Green reminded the gathering that "This is not the first increase we have experienced and our service from the company has continued to deteriorate. Their franchise calls for a full time office (40 hours a week) and a full time serviceman in Floydada. We haven't got either one now."

He urged the council to consider enforcing the franchise as granted or to cancel it. The council, in full agreement, voted to notify the Floydada Cable TV that they would have to honor their

franchise or risk having it cancelled for non-compliance.

The city water department budget will be financed in the 1987-88 budget with a rate increase of \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons after the minimum of \$14.00. This would return the water rate to \$2.00 per 1,000 over the minimum which was charged until last summer. City manager Feuerbacher stated that this would allow the water department to "pay it's own way."

Council approved the increase by unanimous vote.

Mayor Powell was authorized to sign the 1987 engineering contract with Bill R. McMorries and Associates and line item adjustments to the current budget were also approved.

Bids will be sought for the proposed installation of water main improvements of the Ralls Highway and Menefee Street to an existing main south of the nursing home. Bids will also be taken for the sale of a 1982 Ford four door sedan and the purchase of a new sanitation vehicle.

Repairs to the intersection of South Garrison and Ollie Street will be advertised for bids. The project is estimated at a cost of over \$13,000.00 and is "long over due" according to Feuerbacher. The standing water problem in that area has existed for more than 20 years."

Ordinance #694 concerning junk cars was passed on a motion by Frank Breed, seconded by Leroy Burns. The ordinance will allow city officials to deal effectively with problem of junk cars.

The proposed budget for 1987-88 (going into effect on April 1) was approved following a public hearing on the subject. The budget estimates revenues from all sources at \$2,320,044 with operating expenses totaling \$2,104,790, transfers totaling \$151,136 and bond payments of \$64,118.

Council set a workshop meeting for March 23 to discuss the landfill situation with county commissioners before adjourning for the evening. Other matters needing clarification and co-operation between the city and the county will also be raised.

"By Love Set Free," a feature motion picture based on the true story of a young American's imprisonment in a South American country, will be shown on Sunday, March 15, at First Baptist Church of Floydada.

But they found that happiness was much more elusive. Arrested on a drug charge, Lewis was thrown into an overcrowded prison, where he underwent severe and inhuman tortures.

Pooka immediately began working for his release, but, after several months, discovered that the unscrupulous lawyer she had hired had done little if

anything to aid in securing Gwynn's release.

A missionary to that area who had learned through family friends of Gwynn and Pooka's plight stepped in, the picture and began working with them, giving of his time, his friendship, and his prayers. That involvement is credited with changing the lives of this struggling young couple.

"By Love Set Free" is a "a heartening story of how compassionate love and concern can not only touch one couple, but can also reach out to others at the same time. Here is a story of an entire family affected by one man's Christian

commitment. It is a film that offers renewed hope to anyone who believes that things can't be changed for the better through prayer and personal involvement."

"By Love Set Free" was produced by World Wide Pictures in association with Johnson-Nyquist Productions. World Wide is the film ministry of the Billy Graham organization, and has produced such features as "The Hiding Place," "Joni" and "The Prodigal."



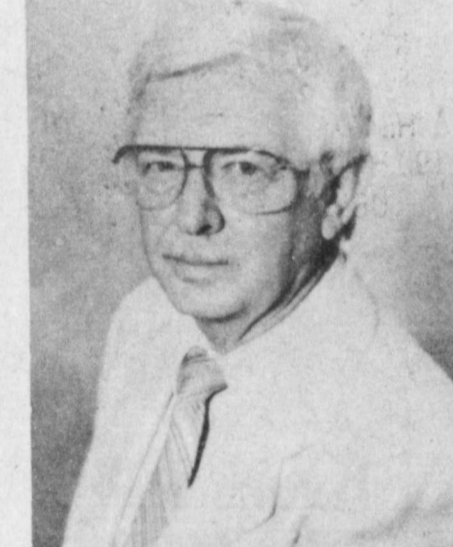

Coach Mike Vickers said his male athletes expect to "see a lot of schools we'll see at regional." Competition

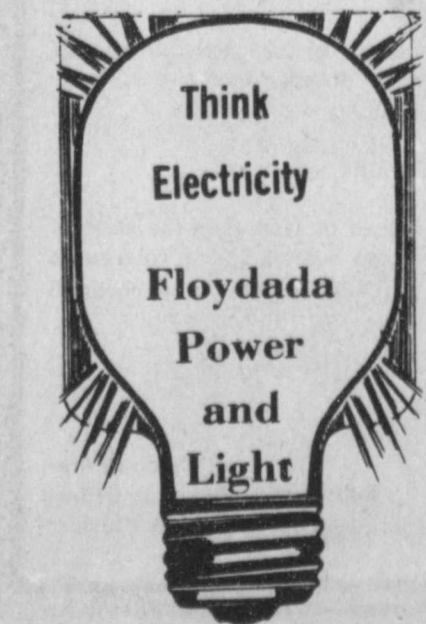

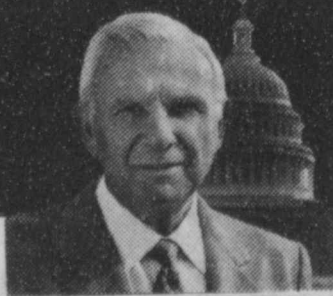

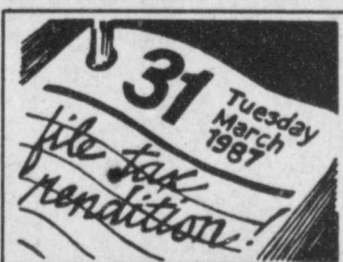

PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1987. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

- You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can put your own opinion of your property's value on record.

By filing a special type of rendition called a report of decreased value, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1986. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1987 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.

The deadline for 1987 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.
