COTTON MILLS USE LESS THAN ONE PER CENT OF PRODUCTION

Fifteen Hundred More Cotton Mills Needed.

Cotton Mill and Farmer Inseparable Comrades.

There is no industry more important to our progress than that of the cotton mills and none more in need of the patronage of our merchants and of the friendship of the people. Texas is on the frontier of the factory zone and the cotton mill is now a pioneer industry. It can thrive only where business conditions are reliable, a public sentiment stable, and the consuming public friendly to its output. The product is a staple one and when it enters the market must meet the competition of the eastern and southern mills where there is an abundance of waste labor, cheap fuel, cheap money, and where conditions are more settled.

We have fifteen cotton mills in Texas representing an investment of \$2,329,000, running 112,404 spindles and having a capacity of 40,000 bales, a yearly output valued at approximately \$2,350,000 and giving employment to 1,000 people.

Our cotton mills use less than one per cent of our cotton production; the remaining ninety-nine per cent seeks the foreign factory. The people of Texas consume approximately 220,000 bales of cotton per annum and yet out of the 40,000 bales manufactured in Texas, at least seventy per cent of it must find a market outside of the State, due to our failure to patronize home industry. It would require 1,500 cotton mills of the capacity of our present factories to consume the product of our farms, call for an investment of \$250,000,000, give employment to 150,000 people and add approximately a quarter of a billion dollars in value to our cotton crop.

These desirable conditions can only be obtained through co-operation and by fostering and encouraging this important industry.

The cotton mill and the cotton farmer are inseparable comrades and in promoting the prosperity of the former we build up the latter.

COTTON FARMERS URGED TO GROW THEIR OWN FOOD

In a circular sent out to farmers and business men in the cotton States, the department at Washington offers a series of suggestions to remedy the situation created by the falling off in the demand for cotton. Instead of attempting to obtain through cotton the cash required to buy other necessities, farmers are urged to raise these necessities themselves. Cotton is low and likely to remain so. Food products are also high and likely to remain so. A man, therefore, who has all his acreage in cotton finds himself compelled to exchange a low-priced article for a high-priced one. This is not profitable.

One way within the reach of all to cut down expenses is to pay greater attention to a home-grown garden. A piece of good land as near the house as possible, should be devoted to it. Given extra care and well supplied with manure, in return the farmer will have an abundance of good wholesome food throughout a large portion of the year which will cost him little or nothing in cash. Vegetables and fruits should be canned for winter use. In this connection it is pointed out that summer is not the only time that work can be advantageously put into a garden. Farmers are advised, therefore, to get in touch at once, either with the county agents or with the State and Federal Departments of Agriculture if they wish any information on this matter.

In addition to garden truck, every farmer should grow his own corn, hay and forage crop and keep enough chickens and hogs to supply his table with at least the bulk of his meat. Few farmers in the cotton States at least, keep enough chickens. The profits that may or may not be made out of the poultry business have little to do with the fact that with some care a sufficiently large flock of chickens can be kept on the farm to supply the family with eggs and most of its meat. Hogs, too, can easily be raised for home consumption, and beef cattle as well.

Again, farmers can economize in the use of fertilizers. It is the poorest possible economy to starve the land; but there are other ways of feeding it than by buying high-priced manures and commercial fertilizers. Crops of such leguminous plants as crimson clover, vetch, or other winter legumes, or if seed for these can not be obtained at a reasonable price, oats, rye, peas, or beans add greatly to the fertility of the soil when they are plowed under. A certain amount of commercial fertilizer, of course, may be necessary, but the farmer should ascertain carefully how much and what kind his land really requires. Above all, all the farm manure should be carefully saved and distributed over the land.

It is obvious that if the farmer follows this advice he will plant less cotton. Much of the acreage that he has in the past devoted to this cash crop will now be required to produce food crops. This is precisely the result that is desired. It is probable that some millions of bales of cotton will have to be raised over from this year's crop. It is no decrease in the cotton acreage and no increase in the quantity of food produced. The price of cotton must therefore continue to be low and the cost of living high. This condition is at the bottom of the demand that some means be found to restrict the cotton acreage in the coming year. Experience however shows that such a result will not be achieved, but in an increase. Each man believes that his neighbors will plant less cotton and that the price will consequently go up. He determines therefore to take advantage of this by planting all the cotton he can. On the other hand specialists in the Department of Agriculture believe that if the total value of diversified farming be at once thoroughly understood the cotton acreage will be reduced in a natural and healthy manner.

"Diversification," says the circular, "and the production of home

INEXPENSIVE FARM HOME.

Department of Agriculture Furnishes Free Plans.

The farm house is the most important building on the farm, and money judiciously expended in its planning and construction is well invested. The United States Department of Agriculture, through its Bureau of Farm Management, has been investigating conditions in the rural districts and in many instances found that the living apartments were inconsistent in cost with the value of the farm, and very often in striking contrast with out-buildings and farm machinery.

The Department of Agriculture is not only striving to make the business of farming more remunerative, but is also endeavoring to make farm life more attractive. A series of plans for the construction of farm homes has been prepared. In designing these homes, service, economy and attractiveness have been combined in a frame structure which can be built for \$800 in a community where average prices for material and labor prevail.

The specifications call for a simple four-roomed structure. There is a lot of chimney and one chimney entrance. Another day may be provided for a fireplace of wall and floor space, or a fireplace.

The government experts are planning these homes around the comfort and convenience of the farm woman as paramount. They drew their plans accordingly. The kitchen is the most pleasantly located room in the structure. It opens on a screened porch. There is a large part of the work may be done in the summer.

The water problem has also been carefully considered. Cold water may be drawn from a bucket pump on the back porch or from a pusher pump in the sink. Hot water is provided by a reservoir connected with the kitchen stove. The sink with only a drain pipe to be provided, has been found too expensive to be included.

The living and dining room is combined and affords sufficient space for the longest table the harvest days will ever require. It has two rooms in the kitchen which are convenient for serving a large number of workmen. The Bureau of Farm Management is trying to help the farmer and will gladly furnish free plans to farmers contemplating building homes.

TEXAS FACTS

COTTON.

In hauling the Texas cotton crop to market the services of 400,000 teams and wagons are required, which form a procession 2,400 miles long.

One year's cotton crop of Texas will clothe 300,000,000 people.

In Texas there are 4,670 gins, 113 compresses, 228 oil mills and 15 cotton mills.

Dallas, Texas, is the largest cotton gin machinery manufacturing center in the world.

Cotton constitutes 47 per cent of the agricultural production of Texas.

Twenty-five per cent of the cotton seed oil mills of the United States are located in Texas.

To cotton seed crushing establishments of Texas represent a capital investment of \$21,506,000. They furnish employment to 4,000 persons.

One seed of Texas cotton will produce one stalk of about 20 bolls. There are 80 cotton seeds in one boll.

It takes 25 pounds of cotton seed to plant one acre.

It takes 1,650 pounds of seed cotton to make a bale of 500 pounds lint, and 1,150 pounds of cotton seed.

The seed from a bale of cotton will yield 17 gallons of oil, 350 pounds of meal, 300 pounds of hulls and 25 pounds of lint.

The compress reduces the size of the cotton bale one-half.

Three-fourths of the Texas cotton crop is sold in Europe.

Texas has 26 per cent of all the land in the world, which is at the present time considered capable of growing cotton.

More new cotton gins were installed in Texas during the 1910-1911 ginning season than in any other state in the Union.

We have one gin to every 2,500 acres planted to cotton.

To manufacture all the cotton we produce in Texas will require an additional investment of a quarter of a billion dollars in cotton mills.

The importance of cotton as a necessity of life is made manifest when we consider that during the past century the world's population has increased 120 per cent, while the uses of cotton show an increase of 3,700 per cent.

The leading cotton-producing counties of Texas are Ellis, McLennan, Hill and Williamson.

The greater part of the Texas cotton crop is planted in April and matures in October, although some of the crop is marketed the latter part of August.

The largest cotton crop ever produced in Texas was in 1912 and amounted to 4,880,210 bales of 500 pounds each and sold for \$321,430,000, including the value of the seed.

The seed from the Texas cotton crop sell for \$39,690,000 annually and weigh 2,171,000 tons.

An acre of cotton in Texas the leading cotton state, yields \$11.00 more than an acre planted to corn in Illinois, the leading corn state, and \$14.00 more than an acre of oats in the leading oat-producing state, which is Iowa.

Texas factories use only one bale of cotton out of every 100 produced.

An acre of Texas cotton yields \$23.69 worth of lint and \$3.50 of seed.

The average cotton production of the world is 13 bales per 1,000 population, and the average for Texas is 1,000 bales per 1,000 population.

Texas has more cotton gins, compresses and cotton seed oil mills than any other state.

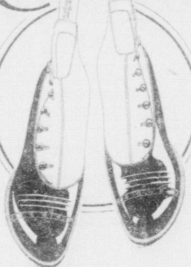

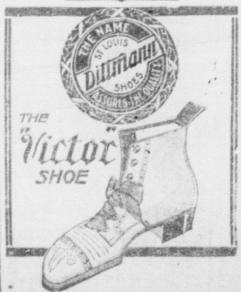

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NO-TSU-OH'S GREAT

FLOWER PAGEANT

FROM AN ARTISTIC VIEWPOINT IT WILL BE THE PRETTIEST SPECTACLE YET SEEN.

HOUSTON-MADE FLOWERS

Florists and Horticulturists From All Over Texas and Many From Portions of United States Will Be on Hand—World of Flowers.

Without doubt the prettiest spectacle of the No-Tsu-Oh and Deep Water Jubilee, from an artistic viewpoint, will be the flower pageant. This event is expected to attract unusual attention, as it is planned along lines to excel anything of the kind ever seen in the South. One of the significant features of this gorgeous parade is found in the fact that the myriad of flowers to be used for the event are being manufactured in Houston.

Up to the present time there are over 50 entries, including a car representing every auto dealer in the city. Nearly every club in the city has an entry of a float and others are expected within a few days. A number of electricians are also entered with others promised, and Manager Ostoff is sparing no efforts to increase the number. Prizes will be awarded for the prettiest float and other special prizes will also be distributed.

This year the flower pageant will not only be greater than ever before, but it will become one of the important features of the No-Tsu-Oh owing to the inauguration of the First Annual Flower Show to be held during the Jubilee. This will bring florists and horticulturists to Houston from all parts of Texas and from many portions of the United States, and because of this fact added efforts will be made to exhibit in great variety the products peculiar to Texas gardens. Director Matthews and his vice chairmen, H. Stude and Fred Austin, are very sanguine over the outlook for a most successful Flower Parade.

Ships of All Nations Parade. The rugged hardness of the Norse from those Viking-like European eyes first saw the new world, the symmetrical beauty and grace of an American Indian canoe, the rigor of an Arctic night and the up-to-the-minute fighting trim of one of Uncle Sam's greatest fighting machines will be some of the features of the greatest event that Houston has ever witnessed, when the ships of All Nations Parade will be staged to the downtown streets on Tuesday night, November 13, at No-Tsu-Oh week. Already thousands of dollars have been spent in making the parade the best of its kind ever seen in Houston and Clark Co. under whose direction the ships are being built, ventured the opinion that the coming "Ships of All Nations" parade will eclipse anything ever seen in the South, the famous San Francisco "Golden Gate" excepted. And Clark Co. is going to have for his big staged pageant in nearly every large city in the South.

More is needed than mere money to make success in anything, for with out enthusiasm, no public interest, no devotion or devotion can be made a winner. At least that is the assertion of a man who has had much to do with the success of many of the ships of the No-Tsu-Oh, and the truthfulness of his assertion is being shown in the Ships of All Nations parade.

Every nationality of people living in Houston felt a responsive chord when it was announced that a representative ship of every great nation would be shown in the parade, and it is the striking of this responsive chord that much of the success of the parade preparations is due. While many of the nationalities were unable to assist materially with money, their suggestions, and their help have been given freely to the committee in charge of the parade.

The parade will consist of 19 vessels, with their crews, besides hundreds of attendants. Noticeable this year will be the absence of banners proclaiming the name and nature of the floats following. In the first place the ships are not to be decorated as floats, although, as one punster put it, they will be the first real "floats" ever shown in a No-Tsu-Oh parade.

In the second place they will portray so faithfully the nation that they will represent that any one who has ever seen a picture of the representative ship of that particular nation will not be at a loss to know what it is. Besides that, the name of the ship will be painted in large letters on the trappings of the animals drawing the ship.

A feature of the entire pageant will be the illuminating of the ships by electric lights, the lights being provided by storage batteries. On most of the ships the electric light globes will be strung along the edges of the sails and on the spars, while the ports will show a gleam of light when possible.

A new fire will be used in the illumination. This fire will burn in the water, and will be the first of its kind ever used in a parade.

It is expected that the parade will be the most successful ever seen in Houston, and that it will become one of the important features of the No-Tsu-Oh.

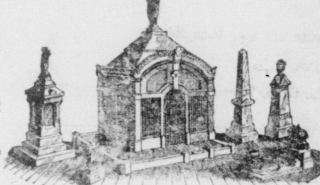
