Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm apparently can't get over the way the television networks tell who won before the votes are all in, his letter this week indicates.

Dear editor:

In all the jumble of election news I read last week I remember one item which said that despite the big voter-turnout and the long lines at some polling places, still only 55 percent of the eligible voters voted. This, the article said, was a deplorable thing.

I don't know about that. One way of looking at it is that it wasn't even necessary for that many to vote.

I started watching the returns on television and the first rattle out of the box, when less than one percent of the votes had been counted, the networks were already telling us who had won and by how many percentage points.

If one percent of the voters can indicate who's going to win, what are the other 99

percent doing standing in line waiting? Why, the networks started giving winners and losers three hours before closed in some parts of the country at different time zones.

It seems to me the voters in the standing in long lines waiting to see ballots, were about like fans standing outside a stadium trying to buy tickets to a football game that was already over.

Don't get me wrong. I'm not saying elections to football. You think I know which one is more important, a candidate who forgot his knowledge of nature and scheduled a rally on Friday when the local team was playing at home? But what puzzles me is this: if the networks are so smart on elections, how come they are so dumb on entertainment? Where do those guys when no election is on?

Names Needed On Petitions

Abolish County School Superintendent Office

Approximately 800 names for vote are needed to get an election for the abolishment of the county School Superintendent.

Persons who may sign the petitions should be qualified voters.

Anyone interested in bringing about the election should sign a petition at any of the following places: Barwise Elevator, banks in Lockney and Floydada, Davis Grain, Hesperian Office and Caprock Hardware in Floydada, Parks Oil in South Plains, Hubert Frizzell and G. B. Johnston in Lockney.

Judge Holmes said number needed to sign the petition is derived from 25% of the amount who voted on the governor in the last election.

The county school superintendent receives a salary of \$7400 and his salary is paid by the state.

It is thought that a secretary or someone would be needed to do the work required by Floyd County's two common school districts, Dougherty and South Plains, should the county school superintendent's office be abolished.

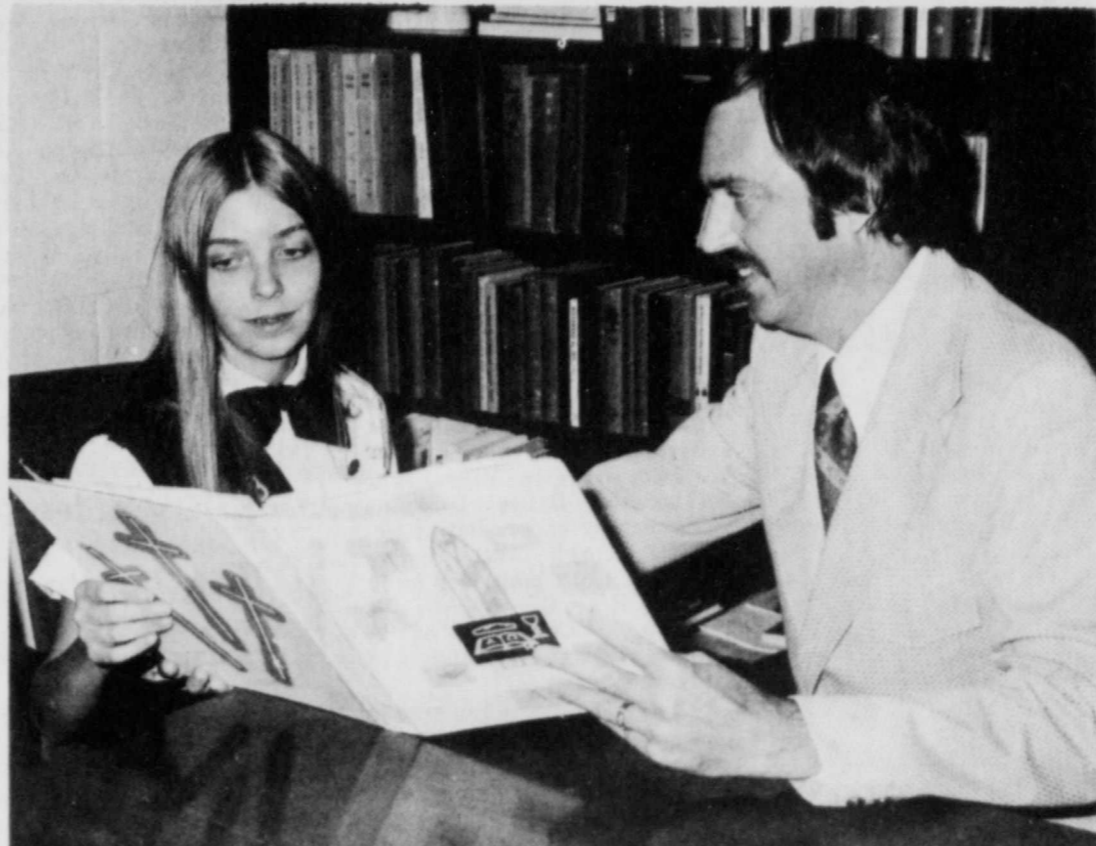
2. Your pastor will set regular meeting dates with you for study and will give an overall picture of the requirements and the three stages of development. He will explain the time required for each stage. You progress as you and he are able to work, but a minimum time for each stage is 4-6 months' work.

3. Service projects that are both beneficial to the church and a help in your religious development are selected, two service projects per stage of study.

4. The award is a specific recognition of superior churchmanship on your part.

When you give evidence of meeting this qualification, and have proceeded through the three stages completely, your pastor will arrange for a conference (or Board of Review) involving church laymen and officials and a community resource person to interview you. The pastor then notifies the United Church Women of Greater Kansas City at least six weeks prior to the date you will receive the award.

5. The formal presentation of the "God and Community Award" is made under the auspices of the Girl Scout's own church, preferably at a morning worship service. A Cadette Girl Scout in uniform wears the award on the shirt pocket flap; a Senior Scout in uniform wears it near her heart. On regular dress, the girl wears the award detached from the ribbon, if she likes, near her heart.

S. Cotton Allotment Cut 1.5 Million Acres

Provisions Outlined

The congressman expressed concern about the allotment reduction, pointing out it will mean a cut in cotton payments issued to producers.

Major provisions of the 1973 program include:

• A national paying base, or allotment, of 10 million acres, compared with 11.5 million in 1972.

• No cotton set-aside (idle acreage) requirement as a condition for eligibility for price support loans and production payments.

• A national production goal of 11.1 million bales, down nearly 3 million bales from this year's estimated crop.

• A preliminary government payment rate of 15 cents a pound, to be paid as soon after next July 1 as practicable, same as 1972.

The National Cotton Advisory Committee and the National Cotton Council, along with the Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., had urged the USDA to make no changes in the acreage allotment or the

set-aside level.

Under the 1972 program, growers had to set-aside, or idle, the equivalent of 20 per cent of their base allotment.

Could Count Blanks
On the Texas High Plains, where the base allotment this year totaled almost 1.7 million acres in 25 counties, the cotton set-aside amounted to approximately 340,000 acres.

Many growers, however, used skip-row planting patterns, and were allowed to count the blank rows—provided they were at least two rows of normal size in width—on their set-aside requirements.

The program changes for 1973 were described by USDA officials as a move to give growers more income and less government.

A grower who retained the payment yield next year that he had in 1972 might expect the total farm cotton payment in 1973 to be down something like 13 per cent, some agricultural officials at Lubbock speculated.

With the elimination of the set-aside, and with the reduced acreage allotment for cotton, farmers might be expected to plant about 1 million more acres to soybeans, perhaps 200,000 to 300,000 acres in sorghum and smaller acreages of other things such as corn, Frick estimated.

Will Permit Transfers
"The need for soybeans is the overriding one," he asserted.

To the federal government, the changes can mean the cotton program will cost \$704 million next year, compared with \$810 million this year, officials said.

To the farmer, with demand brisk for some other crops and prices good, the changes might mean he could make more money than with cotton, depending upon many variables, USDA spokesmen contended.

Butz said: "Cotton farmers have been shifting toward greater reliance on markets as a source of their income for the past two years by transferring allotments, through the leasing process, to areas where cotton can best be produced. The 1973 program will continue to allow such transfers."

To Spur Activity
Allotment brokers at Lubbock said elimination of the set-aside might spur activity in transferring cotton acreages from other

parts of Texas to the High Plains, since growers will not be obligated to idle two-tenths of every acre leased.

The set-aside change also will mean growers will not run a risk of being called out of compliance with the farm program, or subjected to penalties, for failure to idle cotton land of "average productivity."

A cotton farmer receives a federal payment on a certain allotted acreage. That is, if he has a 320-acre farm, he might have a 100-acre allotment for growing cotton.

Eligible For Loans
The set-aside meant he had to agree not to grow cotton on a certain portion of the allotment. But the payment still was made on the basis of 50 acres. And he could grow whatever he wanted—including cotton—on the rest of the farm, except that he could not get the payment for the "extra" portion.

All the cotton a cooperating farmer produces is eligible for a price support loan set at least 10 per cent below the average world market price.

The base loan rate for 1973, as announced last month, will be 19.5 cents per pound for middling one-inch, 3.5-4.9 micronaire, at average location. This is unchanged from the 1972 loan level.

Allotments Disclosed
Federal farm policy officials now figure farmers will plant about 12 million acres of cotton next year, compared with 13.7 million for 1972.

The 1973 allotments by states also will be 387,316 acres in Alabama, 208,069 in Arizona, 831,428 in Arkansas, 462,725 in

California, 18,893 in Florida, 506,201 in Georgia, 1,771 in Illinois, 7 in Kansas, 4,238 in Kentucky, 348,292 in Louisiana, 956,654 in Mississippi, 223,759 in Missouri, 2,202 in Nevada, 270,800 in North Carolina, 464,480 in Oklahoma, 413,183 in South Carolina, 332,009 in Tennessee and 9,501 in Virginia.

WHEAT MEET SET IN AMARILLO

Topics ranging from wheat production, grazing and marketing to farm programs and ecology will highlight two wheat meetings slated for Nov. 29-30 in Amarillo.

Each meeting will begin with registration at 9 a.m. at the Holiday Inn West, announces R. J. Hodges, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which is sponsoring the meetings along with the Texas Wheat Producers Association (TWPA). Leo Witkowski of Hereford is president of the TSPA.

Three of the Extension Service's area income programs—Panhandle Economic Program, South Plains Development Program, Rolling Plains Economic Program—are also joint sponsors of the meetings.

A Wheat Symposium on the first day will feature discussions of the current wheat

situation, ecology, insect, disease and weed control in wheat, wheat varieties, feed wheat, and grazing wheat and associated health problems of animals.

Among the keynote speakers will be Bill Nelson, executive vice president of the Texas Wheat Producers' Board, and Dr. L.S. (Bill) Pope, associate dean of agriculture at Texas A&M University. Also on hand will be Extension Service specialists and scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. A consultant in feed wheat nutrition and a livestock and wheat producer will also be in the program.

The 22nd annual meeting of the TWPA on Nov. 30 will feature several outstanding speakers on the national scene, notes Hodges. Among these are Joe Halow, executive vice president of Great Plains Wheat, Inc., Washington, D.C. who will discuss the world wheat situation. Gene Moos, president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, will talk on farm programs and how they affect wheat farmers.

Another speaker on wheat programs will be Victor A. Senechal with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Washington, D.C.

A panel discussion that afternoon will feature the topic, "Transportation—The Key to Wheat Marketing."

Floydada's "House of The Seven Gables", mentioned Sunday in editor Wendell Tooley's "Caprock Chat" column, is located at the corner of Second and Mississippi Streets in Floydada. There may be other houses with seven gables in the city, but that's the one editor Tooley was writing about.

Optometrist Tommy McIntosh brought the seven-gabled house to The Hesperian's attention after hearing about a "House of The Seven Gables" in Lubbock.

In case you don't (as this reporter didn't) know what a gable is, it's (according to Webster's Third New International Unabridged Dictionary) "the vertical triangular portion of the end of a building from the level of the cornice or eaves to the ridge of the roof" or "a similar end when not triangular in shape..."

So the house at the corner of Second and Mississippi is "The House of Seven Gables," Floydada version.

A check into the history of the house hasn't revealed whether it was purposely designed with Nathaniel Hawthorne's novel in mind, but we did find out that the house was built for Mrs. A. D. White, wife of a Floyd County pioneer, after the White home burned, in the 1920's.

Walter Gound, who was possibly the only carpenter here then, built the house. Mrs. White lived in the house from 1926, when it was

completed, until her death in 1953, according to one of her daughters, Mrs. Polk Goen of Floydada, who lived there until she married. Another daughter, Mrs. R. B. Rosson of Floydada, lived in the house for brief intervals.

The Hesperian talked with Mrs. Goen and Mrs. Rosson, wondering if there was any connection between the local "House of The Seven Gables" and Hawthorne's famous story, but if there was, the daughters didn't know anything about it.

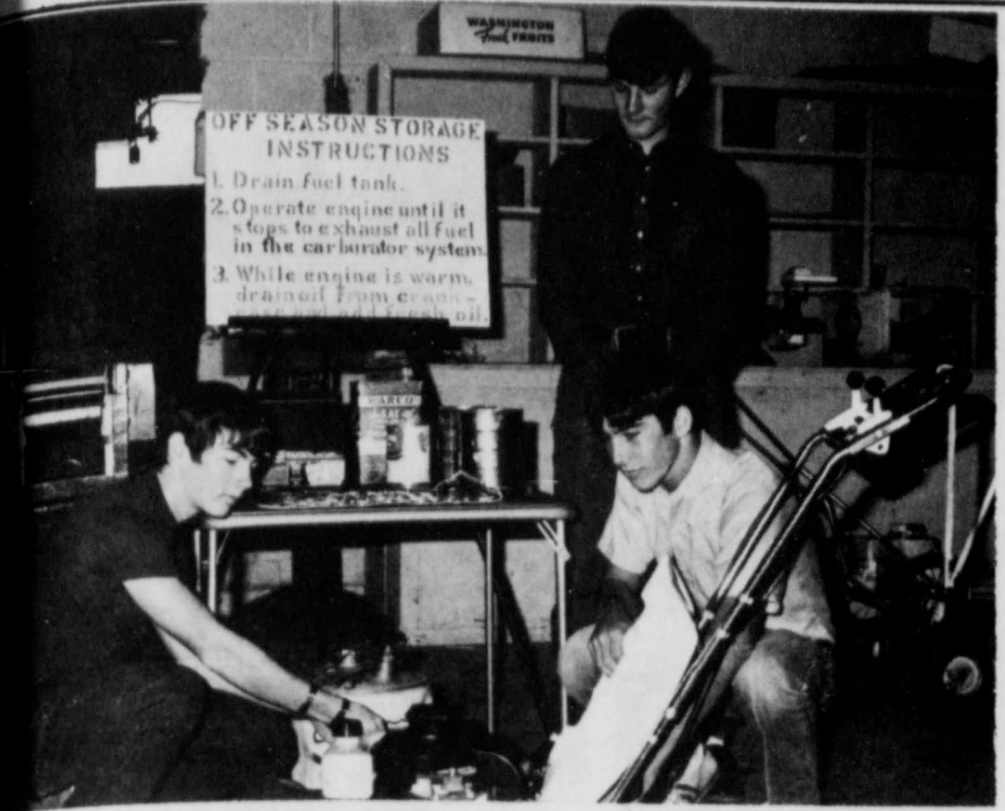
