Last Rites For A. R. Chapman, Jr. Tues. October 16

Funeral services for A. R. Chapman, Jr., of 707 South Sixth Street, who died at his home October 14, were held at the Higginbotham Funeral Chapel Tuesday, October 16, at three o'clock p. m., with Rev. Welch of Odessa officiating.

Mr. Chapman was born to Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Raymond Chapman, Sr., June 1, 1922 in Ellis County, Texas, but had made his home here for the past 15 years. December 24, 1941 he was married to Mrs. Jewel Hamm, and October 24, 1942 he was inducted into the army. He received a medical discharge January 1, 1943 after serving with the 86th Infantry at Camp Roberts, California.

Mr. Chapman underwent a major operation March 15, of this year and had been confined to his bed since that time.

Pallbearers were Henry Bridges, J. N. Sanford, James Norman, Billy Long, L. M. Wright and A. A. Jarrett.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Jewel Chapman and one step-son, Thomas Arian Ham, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Chapman, Sr., of Odessa, paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Chapman of Odessa, a maternal grandfather, Nathan Simmons of this city and one brother, Elmer C. Chapman who is serving with the army in France.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of the Higginbotham Funeral home and interment was in the Lamesa cemetery.

Lamesa Veterans Announce Plans For VFW Chapter

Drive for charter members of a Veterans of Foreign Wars chapter in Lamesa will get underway this week. Organization meeting for local VFW group has been set for Saturday, October 27, 7:30 p. m. at the Lamesa Country Club.

Formation of a Lamesa VFW chapter is being sponsored by Clayton Barkhurst, veteran of marine action in the Pacific area. All veterans who saw overseas service, he said, are eligible for membership.

Barkhurst and other vets are anxious to have VFW take its place among civic organizations in the community.

Petition for a charter will be made following the initial meeting next week, Barkhurst reported. Organization in Lamesa of a VFW chapter follows the trend of a wide expansion program in all parts of the nation.

A dance has been planned for veterans and their guests following the organization meeting, with Barkhurst the host. No charge will be made for the dancing, he emphasized. All county veterans are invited to attend the meeting and dance.

Lamesa high school football 11, not the best in the world but getting a little better each time out, runs into the probable number two team in district 3-AA here Friday night on McCollum Field at 8 o'clock—the San Angelo Bobcats.

The Tornadoes, 6 to 0 victors over Big Spring in their conference opener last week, have worked overtime since Monday in an effort to get set for the once mighty Bobcats who are still formidable foes. Coach Choc Sanders and his squad scout the possibilities of upsetting the Bobcats but they realize that they enter the fray as three-touchdown underdogs.

Sanders said Wednesday that the Lamesa squad is in fair shape for this second district joust but not at full strength. All the regulars are expected to start however.

Bryant Clark, gangling end, has been ill this week but will probably be ready. Ed Hawkins is the number one end replacement. Patterson, quarterback, and Rowbotham, backfield prospect who looked good against Big Spring, are nursing bruises. Homer Rippey's knee is still not completely well, but he will probably answer the opening whistle at halfback. Billy Merritt, young back injured in the Lubbock game, is still side-lined.

Lamesa will be running principally from the T formation as usual. The locals may be able to give the visitors a tussle through the air lanes. Amarillo completed 10 out of 19 passes against San Angelo, and Highland Park made good on 5 out of 8 tries against the same club.

San Angelo Bobcats, idle last week, will be opening their 3-AA schedule. Right now they are rated about number two in the district along with Abilene, a notch behind the powerful Odessa Bronchos. The Bobcats, state champs in 1943 and district winners in 1944, are not that strong this year. They have lost two games, won one and tied one thus far in the current campaign. They opened the season by defeating Division 6 to 0, tying Lubbock 13-13, losing to Highland Park 19 to 6 and then to Amarillo 21 to 6.

The lads from the Concho are sparked by the lone returning letterman, Edwin Dodson, passing and running ace of the backfield. He and Hay, fullback, and Roberts, halfback, powered the running attack that scored on Highland Park. Dodson's passes brought the tally registered against Amarillo. Renner, star right end of the San Angelo eleven, is perhaps Dodson's most successful receiver.

Lamesa's Golden Tornadoes, still remembering when the Bobcats edged them 12 to 0 here on water-soaked field, would like very much to notch a triumph Friday evening. Lamesa's 11, literally the "baby team" in the district on the basis of ages as of May 1, 1945, could bowl the Bobcats over if play continues to improve as it has in the past three games.

The Tornado squad, 37 lads strong as far as first string material is concerned, shows an average age of 15 years and two months. Only four boys are 17, eleven are 16, twelve are 15, eight are 14, and two are 13 years old.

Other games in the district this week are head-lined by the inter-district clash between Amarillo and Odessa at Odessa, a probable preview game for two clubs that will likely meet in the play-offs. The other conference game Friday will be the meeting of Big Spring and Midland in the Steer stadium.

Abilene will play the Westerners at Lubbock, and Sweetwater will try to halt the rush of the Plainview Bulldogs at Plainview. Orville Newman, Tornado halfback, is tied for third place in individual scoring in 3-AA with 18 points. Tornado fans are hoping he will up that total against San Angelo.

Probable starting Lamesa line-up: Ends, Hoover and Clark; tackles, Hurley and Matlock; guards, Eudy and Elzwell; center, Taylor; quarterback, Patterson; halfbacks, Nieman and Rippey; fullback, Corbett.

Matlock, veteran tackle, will be field captain for the Tornadoes. A lad named Smith, a 208 pounder, is out for the team this week. Coach Sanders said that the newcomer would see action at tackle or guard if he can make the grade. He will not be eligible for 30 days.

MAYOR PROCLAIMS NAVY DAY

Mayor Sam Richardson of Lamesa has added his official proclamation of Navy Day, October 27, to those of other city mayors throughout the United States. No special program has been planned for the day, but end of the war will add much sentiment to the observance, the mayor emphasized, of the 23rd anniversary of the origin of Navy Day.

The mayor's proclamation follows:

WHEREAS, the Navy League of the United States has been officially designated by the secretary of the navy to arrange annual Navy Day celebration throughout the nation, as it has done since it inaugurated the first Navy Day in 1922;

WHEREAS, this year with our country victorious in this most terrible of all wars this annual display of support of our Navy should be more complete than ever before, the Navy League and the Navy Department working in unison to this end; and

WHEREAS, this year has seen the fruits of the Navy's hard task of winning the war against the Japanese; and

WHEREAS, the slogan for Navy Day, 1945 is, "A Strong Navy Guarantees Peace"; and

WHEREAS, Navy Day should be made a day of resolution that never again will our Navy be anything but strong;

Therefore, I, Sam Richardson, Mayor of the City of Lamesa hereby proclaim Saturday, October 27th, 1945, as Navy Day and call upon all citizens of Lamesa to take part in observance of this day through the many channels open to them and to join in the salute to the U. S. Navy and its coordinated sea-air power, the Marine Corps and the U. S. Coast Guard.

United War Fund Total Far Short Of \$10,371 Goal

Cooperation Asked in Raising \$5,000 in Whirlwind Cleanup

Dawson County citizens are \$5,000 short of their United War Fund quota, records compiled Wednesday by Don Emory revealed. J. R. (Dutch) Leuenberger is county chairman for the drive, and Emory is treasurer.

Leaders are anxious to complete the funds drive by Saturday of this week. The quota of \$10,371 for the county is the same as last year's goal. Total contributions of only \$4,542.74 had been reported to the treasurer Wednesday at noon.

Few rural community chairmen have made reports Leuenberger said. He urged that the leaders make reports as early as possible.

The county chairman and Co. Supt. P. K. Humes, rural War Fund chairman, attended a War Fund rally at the Grandview school Wednesday night. Director Richard Young and his "Hungry Five" orchestra were presented in a musical program, and both Leuenberger and Humes spoke briefly.

A total of \$120 against the community's \$170 quota was raised at the school program at Grandview. Humes reported. He has suggested that other Dawson County communities plan similar events—socials or pie suppers—proceeds going to the United War Fund drive.

Lt. (jg) Kirk McKinonn of the U. S. Navy will take over the place as assistant athletic coach for Lamesa high school at his discharge from service to assist Coach H. J. (Choc) Sanders.

In addition to his work with the Lamesa Golden Tornado athletes, McKinonn will be a member of the high school faculty.

The navy officer, now in Lamesa on emergency leave because of the illness of his mother, Mrs. Fred McKinonn, will return to his base for discharge. He is scheduled to leave Lamesa Friday, returning soon to assume his new duties. His wife is also a teacher in local schools.

Lt. McKinonn is a graduate of Lamesa high school and Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, and he marked up a good athletic record in both schools. He was on the coaching staff at Odessa at the time of his enlistment in the U. S. Navy.

Instructor of physical training for navy recruits at Harvard University early in his navy service Lt. McKinonn later commanded a navy contingent on a merchant marine vessel in both Pacific and Atlantic.

Addition of McKinonn to the Lamesa faculty still leaves the school short three teachers in both elementary grades and high school. Supt. Rogers reported. Temporary teachers are now filling these places, he said.

Andrew J. McDaniel, discharged from the army on September 30 at Fort Sam Houston, will return to his before-the-war job as a postal clerk in the Lamesa postoffice. Mrs. McDaniel and her young daughter live here, as does the veteran's mother, Mrs. A. J. McDaniel, Sr.

At his enlistment in Lubbock in March, 1942, McDaniel was assigned to the Service Company, 358th Infantry, 90th Infantry Division, then at Camp Barkeley, near Abilene. It was March 22, 1944, when his outfit sailed from the United States, and the division took part in the invasion of Normandy on June 7 that year.

The five battle stars on McDaniel's European-African-Middle Eastern campaign ribbon represent Normandy, Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe.

Decorations won by the Lamesa veteran, a master sergeant, feature the Bronze Star, the Combat Infantryman's badge, a bronze arrowhead to represent beachhead invasion and the French Croix de Guerre.

Thursday morning report from the hospital beside of Coy Biggerstaff, Sunday accident victim, showed that the 21-year-old Dawson countian is slowly improving.

Internal injuries. He had shown no improvement and remained critically ill. Dr. Sam Z. Frazier, attending physician, reported yesterday.

The 1937 Ford, owned jointly by Biggerstaff and Pvt. Billy Whisenant, was badly damaged. Cause for the car's leaving the highway has not been determined by Highway Patrolman Roy King who made the investigation.

Private Whisenant, only other occupant of the car, sustained minor cuts and bruises. The army private, son of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Whisenant of the Welch community, is stationed at Camp Wolters, Mineral Wells.

Young Biggerstaff, discharged from the air force only six weeks ago, is a veteran of 20 months overseas with the 341 Signal Company. He was released from service August 31 at Fort Sam Houston. A few weeks later he was hospitalized for minor injuries following a previous automobile accident.

The injured veteran formerly attended the Dawson school. He volunteered before his 17th birthday, and he held six battle stars and a Distinguished Unit badge at his return from the European theater of war. His action was in Italy, the Rhineland, France and Germany.

Phosphates and Their Value Is Emphaized

Limited application of superphosphates to 12 different Texas soils in experimental POTS made an average increased yield of 59 per cent in Bermuda grass, and also an average increase of 35 per cent in the phosphoric acid content of the grass.

Robert R. Lancaster, pasture specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, calculates the percentage increases from findings by Dr. J. F. Fudge and Dr. G. S. Fraps of the Texas Agricultural Experimental Station in experiments conducted at College Station. The two researches also brought out that one large application of superphosphate is more effective than an equivalent amount in two applications. Accordingly, says Lancaster, superphosphate should be applied to be available to stimulate the growth of seedlings and develop them into strong, thrifty plants able to endure severe conditions.

Some of the soils were much more favorable to Bermuda grass than others, Lancaster adds. Superphosphate greatly increased either the yield of the percentage of phosphoric acid of the grass, or both yield and percentage. The increase in yield

were greater where the soils were more deficient in active phosphoric acid.

Small applications of superphosphate often produced large increases in yield, but only small increases in the mineral content of the grass. Higher rates applied made larger increases in both yield and mineral nutrient well above the minimum for range animals.

Since the mineral strength in grasses, rather than growth, is the most important on many Texas

pastures, the amount of superphosphate applied should be enough not only to increase the yield, but also to raise the mineral content above the minimum for range animals. Other information indicates the increased value of working superphosphate into the soil as it is applied. This date is included in Experiment Station Bulletin No. 672, Value of Different Phosphate for Texas Soils and Grasses. A new Extension Service, publication, MS-534, discusses Fertilizing Texas Pastures.

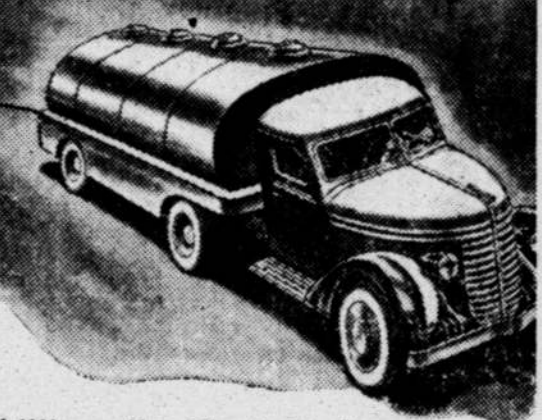

Regulations To Secure Men For Army Are Given

The following text was received from Washington and has significant bearing on securing volunteers for the Regular Army.

1. Period Of Enlistments

a. 1 Year Enlistment. Is open to any member of the AUS who has served therein for a period of not less than six months, such one-year period to begin upon the completion of any furlough granted for such reenlistment.

b. 18 Months Enlistments. Is open to any applicant whether he has previous service or not.

c. 2 Year Enlistment. Is open to any applicant whether he has previous service or not.

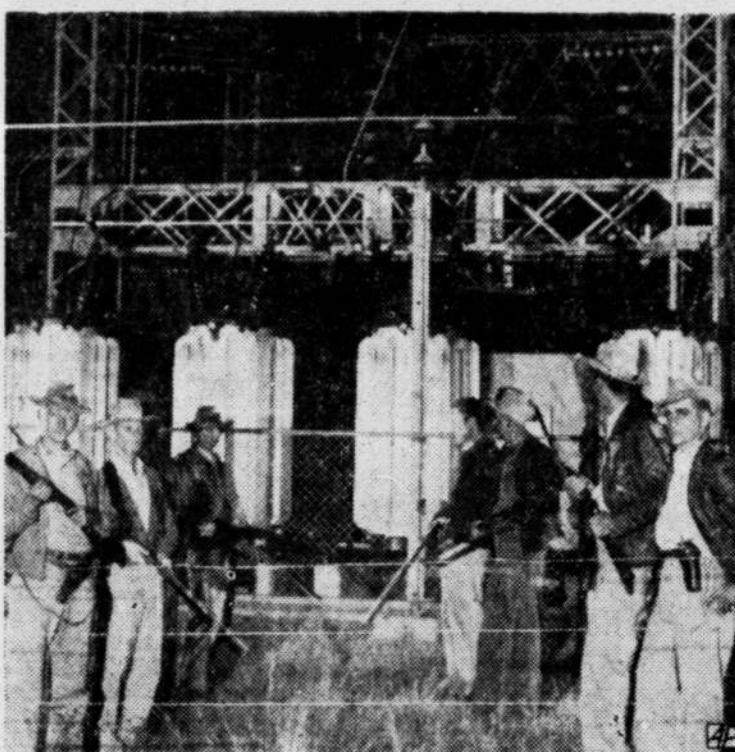
d. Exception. No one who has enlisted on or after 1 June 1945, may be discharged for the purpose of reenlisting for a shorter period.

2. Age. Any male person between the ages of 17 and 34 may be enlisted, providing otherwise qualified, except that no person under eighteen years of age may be enlisted without written consent of his parents or guardian.

3. Promotion. Any person who enlists or reenlists in Grade 7 will, upon the expiration of six months service, be promoted to Grade 6 (if he has not already been promoted), providing he is otherwise qualified. Vacancy need not exist.

4. Enlistment In Grade. A. Men who have been honorably discharged and who enlist within 20 days of discharge, will be enlisted in the highest permanent or temporary grade at time of discharge. Provided such enlistment is made prior to February 1, 1946.

b. Men discharged under the provisions of RR-1-1, since 12 May 1945 and prior to receipt of this

radio, will also be enlisted in the highest permanent or temporary grade, held at the time of discharge provided they re-enlist prior to 25 October 1945.

5. Reenlistment Furloughs. a. All men reenlisting within twenty days of discharge will be granted reenlistment furloughs on the basis of thirty days for each year of service. However, no furlough will exceed ninety days.

b. Their reenlistment furlough pay, plus five cents per mile to place where members of his immediate family are residing and back to the reception center to which he is ordered to report for duty, will be paid in advance, if desired. Any travel pay received at the time of discharge will be excluded from travel pay received at the reception center.

c. Orders will be issued by the recruiting officer on all men enlisted or reenlisted in the Regular Army who are entitled to furlough, directing them to proceed to a designated financial office to receive payment of their reenlistment allowance, furlough pay due in advance, travel pay due on the basis of five cents per mile from the enlistment station to the designated financial office, thence to the place of furlough, thence to a designated War Department reception center. Such orders will also show the duration of furlough and date the soldier will report at the reception center.

8. Mustering Out Pay. Any person immediately reenlisting upon discharge will be paid a mustering out pay.

7. Reenlistment Allowance. Any man discharged on or after 1 June 1945 who reenlists within ninety days, is entitled to reenlistment allowance on the basis of fifty dollars for each year of service completed subsequent to payment of any previous enlistment allowance. Completed service will be based upon continuous active federal service in the AUS or component thereof, whether in enlisted, commissioned,

8. Dependent Allowance. Any man enlisting or reenlisting prior to 1 July 1946, will receive a monthly family allowance for the period of that enlistment. (The provision is important to all enlisting or reenlisting at this time. If they enlist for only 18 months or two years, this allowance will continue for only that period of time, but if they enlist for three years, it will continue for three years.)

9. G. I. Bill of Rights and Postal Privileges. All persons enlisting or reenlisting within the period of one year from the passage of this Armed Forces Voluntary Recruitment Act of 1945, are entitled to all privileges of the G. I. Bill of Rights and the free postal privileges is extended to 31 December 1947.

Practical Courses In Agriculture Offered Veterans

Returned war veterans are being offered one and two-year programs of practical studies at the Texas A. and M. College to prepare them for opportunities in businesses allied with agriculture. Charles N. Shephardson, dean of Agriculture, has announced.

A practical agricultural education is becoming more and more essential to successful conduct of crop and livestock production as new developments appear upon the vast agricultural scene, Dean Shephardson said.

These basal courses, therefore, are designed to give the veteran a scientific background for agricultural production that will enable him to enter into the business of farming, ranching, or allied enterprises, with the education that modern agriculture demands.

The curricula announced for these courses, one to be completed in one school month and the other in 18 school months, represents intensive work by Dean Shephardson and his department heads during the past year. As approved by the Veterans Administration, it consists of about half class work and about half-time spent in the laboratories and on the farms and stock farms owned and operated by the college.

The nine months' program is designed especially for farm mechanics, nursery workers, landscape gardeners, meat and freezer locker plant operators, and for poultrymen. The two-year program will reach those more interested in being dairymen, dairy plant operators, or field crop, truck, fruit, livestock and poultry farmers, and those who seek training for managing agricultural business enterprises.

These practical agricultural courses do not lead to a college degree. While records of high school work are not required upon entrance, Dean Shephardson pointed out that it should be to the advantage of the student to file any high school credits with the College so that later, if he so desires, he may transfer to the regular four-year agricultural course and work toward a degree.

The first class in practical agriculture got under way October 2, with advanced registration of ten students. This number will be increased as redeployment mounts and veterans learn of the progressive action the Texas A. and M. College has prepared in their behalf.

Through these courses, the college is carrying out President Gibbs Gilchrist's program for terminal schools to provide short and intensive courses for students in something that will enable them to make a better living. They have been designed to attract those who are not able to complete the normal four and five-year courses, or who find such courses too difficult.

Shadow Boxer; Old Battleship Turns to Teaching

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — The battleship Wyoming — Navy men call her the "Cresapeake Raider" — has fired more rounds of anti-aircraft ammunition than any other ship in World War II, but not one shell at an enemy.

The nickname may be unkind, but comes natural for a ship that left a proud post in the Battle Fleet to spend her dotage in the shelter

of Chesapeake Bay. She has been there for more than three years.

The Wyoming, shorn of her 12-inch guns and equipped with the most modern anti-aircraft weapons, has trained more than 35,000 officers and men since March, 1942. Her new armament has fired roughly 1,700,000 rounds of ack-ack during that time.

The vessel has operated as one of the anti-aircraft gunnery schools under Rear Admiral C. F. Bryant, Commander of Fleet Operations, Training Command Atlantic Fleet—an officer who first went to sea on the Wyoming following his graduation from the Naval Academy in June, 1914.

The "Cresapeake Raider" is the second-oldest battlewagon in service. The U. S. S. Arkansas beat her into commission by eight days in September, 1912.

Though too infirm for active duty in the conflict just past, the Wyoming had her days of glory. World War I found her at the defeat of the German fleet at Scapa Flow. In 1931 she rescued Sir Hubert Wilkins, British Arctic explorer, when his submarine broke down at sea.

Many famed admirals have trod the ship's quarter deck since 1912. Adm. William F. Halsey, Jr., Commander of the U. S. Third Fleet, was her executive officer in 1925. Vice Adm. Randall Jacobs, Chief of Naval Personnel, and Vice Adm. Daniel E. Barbey, Commander of the Seventh Fleet's amphibious force, were aboard her just before war was declared.

For many years the Wyoming served as a training ship for Naval

Academy Midshipmen, and in 1935, carried Naval Reservists from Baltimore on a cruise to Halifax. She now is commanded by Capt. T. F. Wellings.

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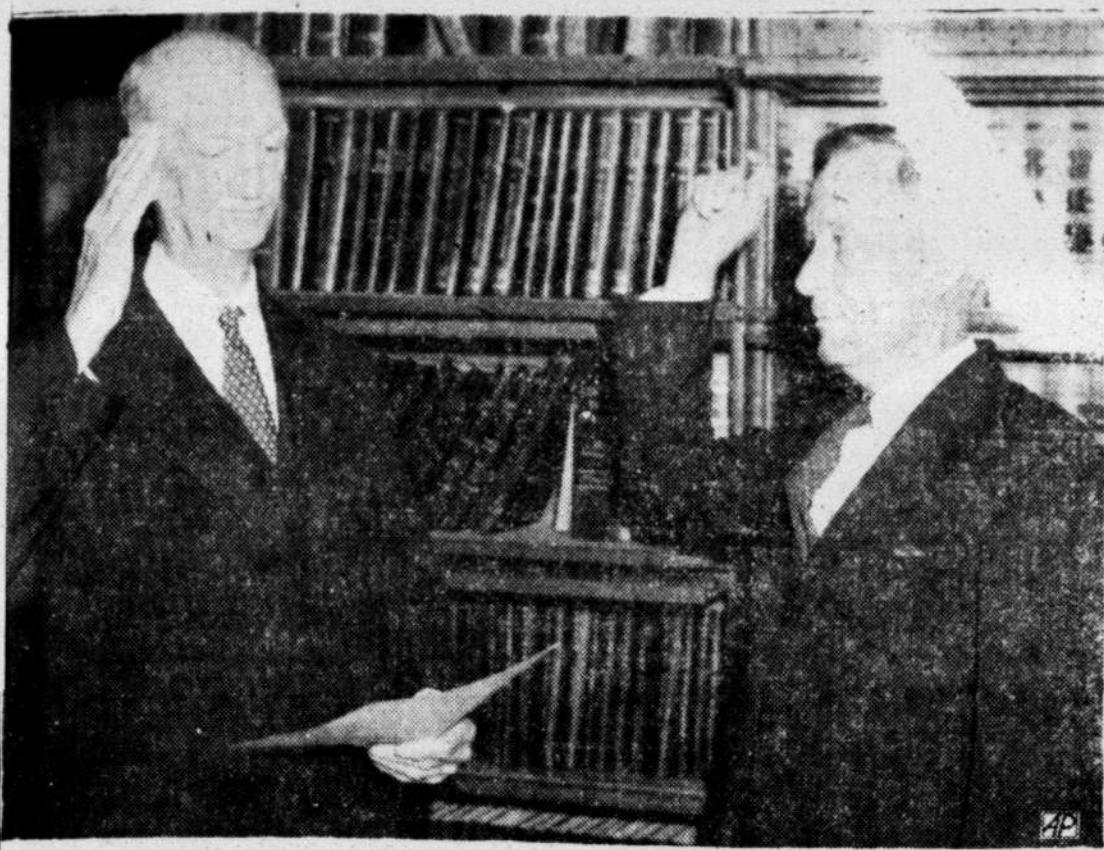

Texas Trails In Egg Production

At the end of August, Texas led all of the states in the number of laying hens. This state also carried the flag at the corresponding date in 1944, but this year had about 500,000 fewer producing birds than 2 months earlier.

The quarterly report of the U. S. department of Agriculture's crop reporting board counted Texas' egg-layers at 21,888,000. Iowa was on Texas' heels with 21,478,000 and Minnesota in third place with 18,700,000. Texas' numerical leadership, however, was an empty honor because in production per hen, which means the profit on investment, the birds of this state dropped to 39th place among the states. Vermont led with a production of 621 eggs per hundred hens during August, while the best the Lone Star fowl could do was 1.153. But that figure was a gain of 124 eggs over August, 1944.

In total production for the first nine months of the year Texas returned to the upper bracket with 2,550,000 eggs and third place, while Iowa was far ahead of all states with a total of 3,355,000,000.

S. A. Moore, poultry husbandman for the A. and M. College Extension Service, sees in these figures not only a possible waste of expensive feed, but an urgent need of better producing hens in Texas flocks. He observes that Iowa, with about the same number of layers,

was able to produce 700,000,000 more eggs in the nine months. Although this period included the coldest winter months, Iowa produced nearly 6,000,000 more dozens of eggs than Texas poultrymen.

Moore believes that in addition to continuing good management, larger production in this state should be sought through improving the breeding of the laying flocks. This could be promoted by progressive up-breeding commencing with Record of Production males and selected hens. Males from this mating would rank as "certified." A further cross of this progeny with selected hens would produce "approved" chicks which would have the best breeding of their ancestors. This system of breeding would conform to the requirements of the National Poultry Improvement Plan, and bring high quality males into general flocks.

Fourteen Texas breeders are doing trapnest work and their stock is recognized as of R. O. P. quality, Moore says.

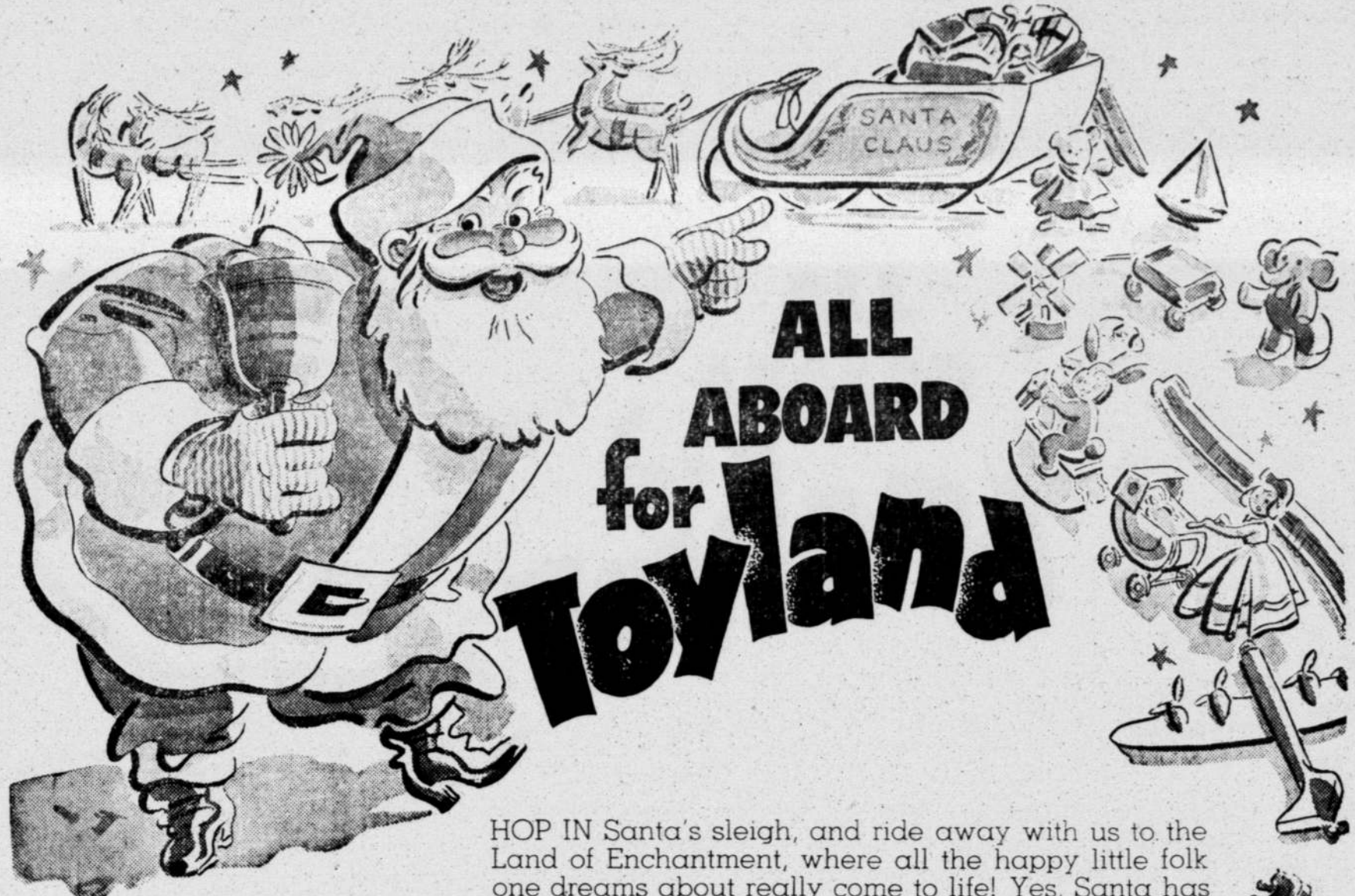

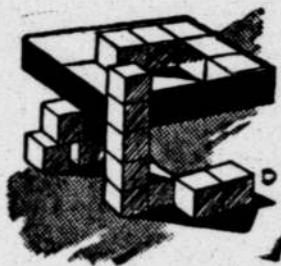

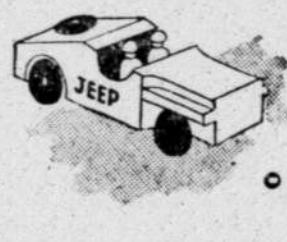

FSA Ready For Limited Loans To Ex-Servicemen

With a Congressional appropriation of more than three times that of last fiscal year Farm Security Administration is ready to make a limited number of loans to farmers and returning servicemen in Dawson and Borden Counties desiring to purchase family-sized farms. This announcement was made this week by FSA Supervisor, William D. Mitchell, whose offices are at Lamesa, Texas.

Fifty million dollars is available for this purpose this year as compared with \$15,000,000 last year. One-half of this sum has been designated especially for loans to ex-servicemen who can qualify. Loans may run to 40 years and bear three per cent interest.

Applications will be reviewed by an FSA Committee of local farmers, including Ben Dopson, of Route C, Lamesa, Texas; Jack Broyles, of Route D, Lamesa, Texas; and Marcus M. Debnam, of Route 4, Lamesa, Texas. This committee must pass upon the eligibility of an applicant and determine that the farm intended for purchase is at a price in accord with its agricultural value. FSA Administrator, Frank Hancock, Washington, has decreed that the agency shall not veer from its sound policies of buying land at its true worth nor contribute to an inflationary trends in land cost.

Dawson Veterans Record Discharges With County Clerk

Honorable discharges from military service have been recorded for at least 19 Dawson County veterans of World War II within the past week, courthouse records show. A marine private, four navy men and 14 army men have returned to civilian life in this vicinity.

Ex-servicemen are required to record their discharges with the county clerk of their home county within 10 days after release to avoid federal penalty.

Discharged veterans include Robert H. Smith, Harold T. Young, Savoy L. Tenyson, Harry Lee Phillips, Wallace H. Conger, Preston J. Rushing, Otho Henry (negro), Clarence H. Mosley, Marion A. Simpson, Burnie L. Williams, James Vinson Chapman, Ruford Lawrence Futch, Aaron D. Beck, Henry P. Cantrell, Charles B. Hogg, Cecil E. Burrell, Eddie Raymond Crass, Carl Smith.

Harold T. Young, technician fifth grade in a field artillery unit, was discharged from the army at Brooke Convalescent Hospital, Fort Sam Houston, October 11. Inducted at Fort Bliss, Young went overseas in August, 1944, and returned to the United States in May.

Serving as a field lineman, Young was with the headquarters battery, 259th FA battalion, in the European theater of war. He was wounded March 5, and for his injuries he received the Purple Heart. He took part in engagements in Southern France, the Ardennes and the Rhineland.

October 10 was the discharge date for Robert H. Smith, Lamesa. He received his papers at Sheppard Field, Wichita Falls after serving with the 2569 Army Air Force Base Unit as an airplane and engine mechanic. He enlisted on October 13, 1942, in Lubbock, and held a sergeant rating at the time of his release from service.

A light truck driver with headquarters company of the 395th Infantry in the European-African-Middle Eastern campaign for two years, Wallace H. Conger, technician fifth grade, received honorable discharge at Fort Sam Houston on October 7. His five battle stars represent the Ardennes, Central Europe, Rhineland, Normandy and Northern France engagements. His medals include a Distinguished Unit badge.

Conger enlisted in late 1940, shipped out to Europe in October 8, 1943 and returned to the states on September 28.

Harry Lee Phillips of O'Donnell has been discharged from the navy as of October 10. He was rated a machinist's mate second class at the end of his service aboard the U. S. S. Mississippi, Phillips, who enlisted in the navy February 19, 1941, was discharged at San Pedro, Calif.

The Bismarck Archipelago, New Guinea, Southern Philippines, Luzon and Ryukyu trace the steps of overseas airforce service for Cpl. Preston J. Rushing of O'Donnell, who was discharged at Fort Bliss October 11. Rushing served as general clerk with the 110 Tactical Reconnaissance squadron.

Rushing returned from the Pacific on October 4. He was inducted in Lubbock on April 6, 1942, and went across on November 14, 1943.

Otho Henry, Lamesa negro army technician fifth grade, was discharged at Fort Sam Houston October 10. He was an auto mechanic through campaigns in five European locations between December, 1943, when he left the states, and his return October 2.

A Distinguished Unit badge and five European battle stars point to the service record of Clarence H. Mosley, technician fourth grade with the 748th tank battalion's service company. He served as a radio repairman in Normandy, Northern

France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe.

Mosley was discharged at Camp Fannin, Tyler, on October 8. His induction date was January 21, 1942. He left the states September 5, 1943, and returned September 19 this year.

Mass sergeant for the 612th quartermaster unit in Europe for almost a year and a half, Marion A. Simpson was discharged at Fort Sam Houston October 10. He held a staff sergeant rating along with five battle stars and the American Defense ribbon.

The pre-Pearl Harbor veteran enlisted August 12, 1940, but it was May 13, 1944, before he was shipped to the European theater of war. He returned to the states just eight days before he was discharged.

Burnie L. Williams spent a couple of years as an airplane mechanic and gunner with the U. S. Army Air Force in the Pacific and now he has been honorably discharged. He was released at Camp Fannin on October 12.

The six battle stars on his Asiatic-Pacific campaign ribbon represent the Bismarck Archipelago, China, New Guinea, South Philippines, Luzon and the Western Pacific. He holds the Bronze Star, the Air Medal with one cluster, the American Defense medal and the Philippines Liberation medal with a bronze star.

Enlisting in June, 1941, Williams held a technical sergeant rating at his return to the states on September 21. He went overseas July 26, 1943.

Service on the U. S. S. Custer for a year and a half sums up the World War II record of James Vinson Chapman, 905 North Second, Lamesa, Chapman, shipfitter third class in the navy, was discharged at Shoemaker, Calif., October 6. He enlisted in the navy March 18, 1944.

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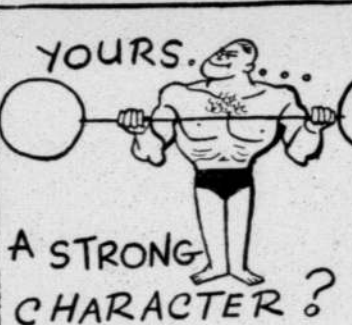

FARM NEWS

Mother Nature and the American farmer have done it again. The September Crop Reports reveal that a bumper harvest as large as the record years of 1942 and 1944 is in sight or in the bin. Crop prospects improved 3 per cent during August to reach a level of 24 per cent above the 1923-32 "pre-drought" average. The impressive list of record and near record crops tells a story

of another outstanding war-effort by the Nation's farmers, the effects of wider use of improved varieties, liberal application of fertilizer, and improved cropping practices. Concentration of crops are above average with the exception of rye, apples, sugar beets, dry beans, and bean corn. All crops expected to set records last month still are in that class and have been joined by soybeans, tobacco and pears. Corn made the greatest gain during the month adding 225 million bushels to the previous estimate to bring prospects to a fraction over 1 billion bushels although the crop board cautions that a larger acreage of corn is still in a close race with killing frost.

The speed with which nylons, auto mobile tires, elastic and many other everyday necessities return for civilian use depends largely on the amount of used fats and oils turned into butchers now, according to information received from the State Office of Marketing. These are only a few of the important by-products made from salvaged fat. Others include soap, oil cloth, hot water bottles, medicines, rust resisting paints and varnishes. The supply of fats and oils is lower now than at any time since the war and not much change can be expected until areas in the Pacific are producing again, which will take many months. For that reason, it is just as important to turn in salvaged fat as it has ever been.

The government is preparing an egg-buying program to support the recently weakened egg market. The Department of Agriculture will carry out the government commitment to support the price of producer's eggs. The egg market has been running weak and unsteady—particularly on under grade and current receipt eggs—probably because military buying of frozen eggs has declined sharply. Army cancellations of dried egg contracts will not mean a wholesale dumping of frozen eggs on the market, the department declares. Any frozen eggs, classed as surplus property, will be disposed of in an orderly manner. The armed forces are still buying shell eggs to feed U. S. troops in this country and abroad. England and Europe still need dried eggs. Plans are being worked out to supply the demands abroad. If these plans are completed satisfactorily, the export market can be expected to take care of the temporary surplus, after the U. S. demands are met.

Farmers are finding little change in the procedure for applying for and receiving beef production payments through their County Agricultural Conservation Association as the result of the removal of slaughter quotas on packers. Payments are still being made on eligible cattle sold to any slaughterer. County

Civil Service Has Announced Some New Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced new examinations for positions as dentist, student dietitian, and psychiatric and medical social worker. Because a sufficient number of eligibles cannot be obtained from among veterans entitled to reopen examinations, these examinations have been opened to the general public, and all persons who qualify may apply.

Announcements and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, Owen Taylor, located at the Lamesa Post Office, or from Civil Service Regional offices, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications should be sent to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., and will be accepted until further notice.

To qualify as dentist, \$3,640 a year, applicants must hold the degree of D. D. S. or D. D. M., must be licensed in a state or territory, and must have had 1 year's dental internship or active practice after graduation.

Student dietitians begin at \$1,704 a year and after 6 months of satisfactory service are promoted to \$1,902 a year. To qualify for student dietitian appointment, applicants must have completed, or expected to complete within 6 months, at least 36 semester hours of appropriate study in a college or university, and must pass a written general test.

Positions in veterans administration facilities as social worker (psychiatric and medical) pay \$2,980 and \$3,640 a year; and as supervisor of social work (psychiatric and medical) \$3,640 and \$4,300 a year. To qualify, applicants must have had appropriate education and social case work experience in a health or welfare agency.

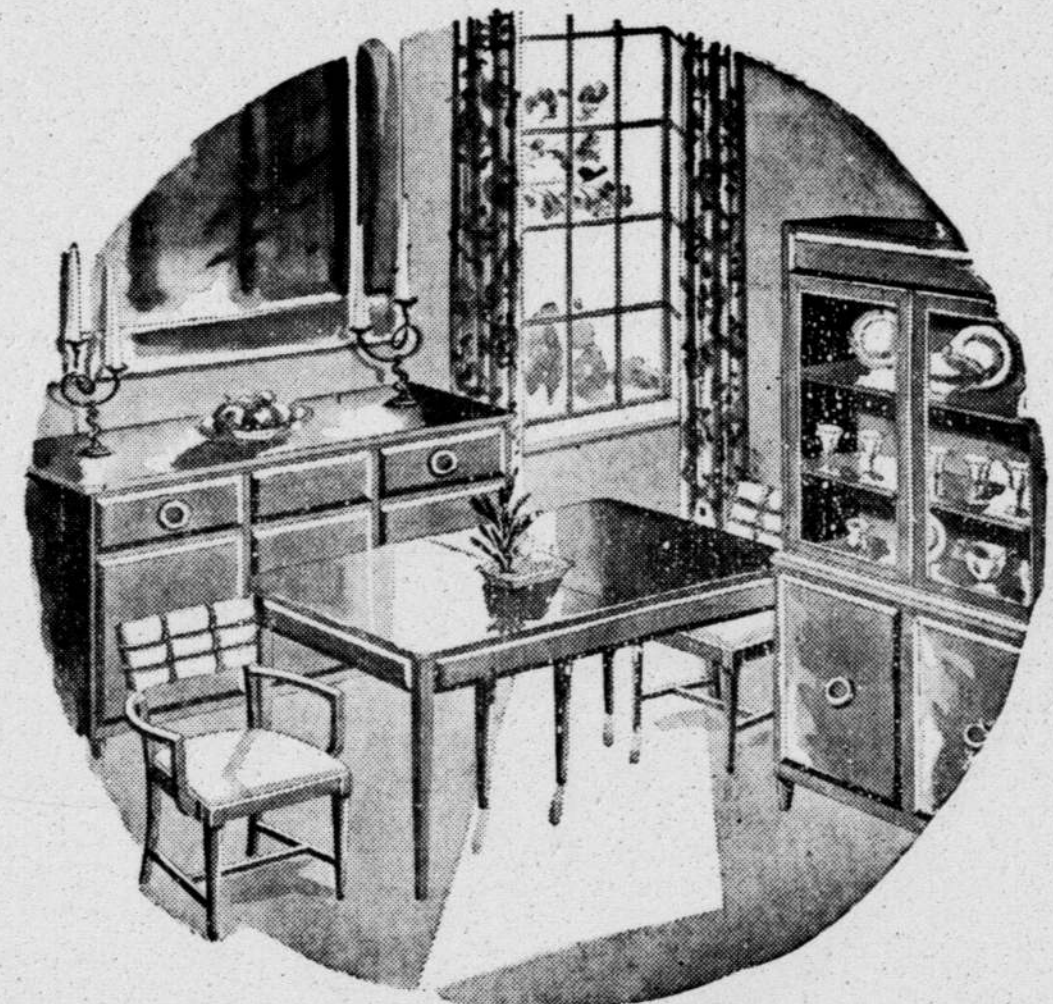

A. Atoms are the units that form the basic building blocks of all matter. Put together, they form molecules.

tively-charged particles, and neutrons, or particles without electrical charges. Around them fly electrons, or negatively-charged particles.

Q. What is meant by atomic fission?
A. It's a 75-cent phrase for smashing atoms into two pieces.

Q. What is the potential power of an atom?
A. The electrical force binding an atom together never has been measured, but when a uranium atom is split in two (not even shattered) by 50 electron volts a force of 200,000,000 electron volts is released—a fraction of that available. The full atomic force of a pound of uranium might send the Empire State building 20 miles into the air.

Q. Who discovered the atomic bomb?
A. It was the culmination of work by hundreds of scientists here and abroad. In direct charge of solving the final technical problems was Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer. Maj. Gen. Leslie R. Groves had over-all responsibilities.

Q. Why is discovery of the means of utilizing atomic energy being called Promethean?
A. In the Greek legend, Prometheus stole fire from heaven and gave it to man. This discovery of a new kind of fire may be the greatest event in human history since then.

Q. How is an atomic explosion akin to the heat of the sun?
A. The sun evidently gets its heat from atomic fires, inconceivably hotter and longer lasting than ordinary fires.

Q. How does an atomic explosion differ from an ordinary explosion?
A. An ordinary explosion is a greatly speeded up ordinary fire, in which heat results when molecules separate. An atomic explosion gets its greater heat and force from the separation of atoms which make up the molecules, and from the break-up of atoms themselves.

Q. What was the principal apparatus used in the experiments that led to construction of the bomb?
A. The cyclotron was used. There are 37 in the world, including 20 in the United States.

Q. How does a cyclotron work?
A. The cyclotron hurls atoms of heavy hydrogen around in a small circle in a vacuum until they are traveling thousands of miles a second and their speed gives them an electrical energy equal to as much as 5,000,000 volts. They emerge to strike a target, usually a piece of metal. Tearing particles from some of the atoms in this target, they release part of the energy of the namaged atoms, in the form of rays.

Q. What gap did the scientists have to bridge between the cyclotron and an atomic bomb?
A. In the bomb, the tremendous activating apparatus of the labora-

Restrictions On Explosives Off; Clerk Praised

Howard Humphrey, county clerk, and licensing agent in administration of the Federal Explosives Act recently received a letter of tribute and a certificate of service from the Bureau of Mines in appreciation of the services he rendered as licensing agent during the war years, 1941-1945.

The communication further stated that restrictions had been lifted on persons covered by the licenses pertaining to explosives and ingredients and that the new general license relieves persons covered by it from the duty of applying for and securing licenses under the Federal Explosives Act and the regulations.

Consequently the authority of licensing agents under the Federal Explosives Act and regulations to issue licenses is hereby suspended until the general license shall have expired.

A portion of the letter which County Clerk Humphrey received from R. R. Sayers of the United States Department of the Interior follows:

With victory in Europe and Japan a reality, it is now possible to relax many of our domestic wartime security measures. Accordingly, some

of the obligations formerly imposed by the Federal Explosives Act have now been eliminated. Effective immediately, a general license has been granted to the makers, distributors, and users of non-military explosives. You are asked to point out to the persons who have been obtaining licenses from you that they are relieved of this duty and that your authority to issue individual licenses

has been suspended. As this law and its successful administration in the critical years of 1941-1945 assume a rightful place in the pages of history, I should like to thank you and each of the 4,000 explosives licensing agents for your services to your country during the past three and a half years. Steel can be rolled into strips as thin as .0015 of an inch.
