To Succeed Himself.

Judge Frank Willis, of Canadian, the judge of this, the Thirty-first Judicial District of Texas, was in Ochiltree this week holding Court. It will be remembered by his many friends in this county that he received the appointment about a year ago to succeed the lamented Judge F. P. Greever, who was shot and killed at LeFores.

He is a product of the Panhandle, a native of this district, having been born in Wheeler County. He is now in the prime of life and has practiced law in this section of the County throughout the last fifteen years and has been an attorney on one side or the other of practically every important case in the district during that time.

Since his appointment to this position he has held 23 terms of court in the district and never but one of his decisions has been reversed, and it is still pending in the Supreme Court, and there is only one other appeal now pending, which shows his ability as a District Judge.

Judge Willis is a candidate to succeed himself. He has made a splendid record during the short time he has occupied the bench. He is one of the most eminent jurists in the state and has administered the duties of his office in a fair and impartial manner, always abiding in the great principle of Democracy, "Equal justice to all and special privileges to none," a qualification well suited to a man occupying a position, the responsibilities of which require the attention of a manly man and able jurist as is Judge Willis.

PROPER STABLE FOR THE HORSES

Much Better Than a Combination Barn Can Be in Majority of Cases.

CONCRETE IS THE MATERIAL

In the Stalls Another Floor Is Laid Over This, Which May Be of Plank or Cork Brick—Well-Lighted With Small Windows High Up.

On many farms there are enough horses so that a separate barn for them is needed. If a farmer has a dozen or so horses that are being used most of the time, it is a good plan to have a separate barn, as horses and cattle do not get along very well. In combination barns it is necessary to build a solid partition between the two parts of the stable, and it is often a better plan to have two barns.

Concrete is used for the foundation and floors of the barn shown here. The foundation walls are extended up to the floor of the haymow, which assists materially in keeping the barn warm during the cold weather and cool in hot weather. It also makes it possible to keep the barn clean with the minimum of labor and trouble. The floor of the stable is made of concrete, but in the stalls another floor is often laid over it.

This floor may be made in several different ways—all of which have been

to one part of sand, and is swept into the joints.

Treated wood blocks of various kinds are also used for stall floors. These are made in several different sizes and shapes and are easily installed. All these types have many champions and all will give satisfaction if properly made. The plank floor must of course be considered as a temporary floor, but the treated blocks and cork bricks wear very well.

The partitions between the stalls in the horse stable are made in several ways. Some men prefer wooden partitions, while others build them of iron. Probably wooden partitions are used more often.

It is poor construction to put large windows in a horse barn. Horses are likely to break them, and in doing so get very badly cut. The best way to get a well-lighted stable is to provide plenty of small windows, which can be placed near the roof, so as to eliminate the possibility of breakage. These windows are very often covered with an iron grating, especially if they are low enough so that there is a possibility of the horses breaking them.

The upper part of the barn is built with a gambrel roof, so that trusses will support the roof, and a large open space will be available for a haymow. The studs for the side walls can be placed in studding sockets so that they will be kept from being in direct contact with the damp concrete. This method of construction has been very satisfactory in buildings of this type.

A good ventilating system must be provided in a horse barn, the same as in any other type. The intakes can be placed at the top of the concrete wall in this case, or the windows can be depended upon to do the ventilating. Sometimes out-take flues are provided that go to the ventilator on the roof, but generally the ventilator is placed to take care of the upper part of the barn. There are never as many horses crowded into a barn as cows, so it is not as necessary to provide an extensive ventilating system.

Space is provided in this barn for about 12 or 14 horses. There are five box stalls, three single stalls and three double stalls. A room is partitioned off in one corner for harnesses. The driveway through the center is used both for feeding and for cleaning.



used with success. A plank floor is sometimes used, and is built with a slight slope to the back of the stall. The planks are fastened to a cross-piece and can be removed when necessary. This type is very cheap and many farmers prefer it to any other.

Cork brick has also given very good results for the floors of horse stalls. They are made of very finely granulated cork which is mixed with refined asphalt and heated and then molded into a brick shape under pressure. Under tests they have shown

Some of the feed is fed very often from the second floor directly to the mangers, either by means of chutes or by openings in the floor.

Plenty of windows are provided so that the barn will be light and sanitary.

To be able to say of a world which died 80 years ago, "I remember it," is a sure entrance to the love and reverence of the young.

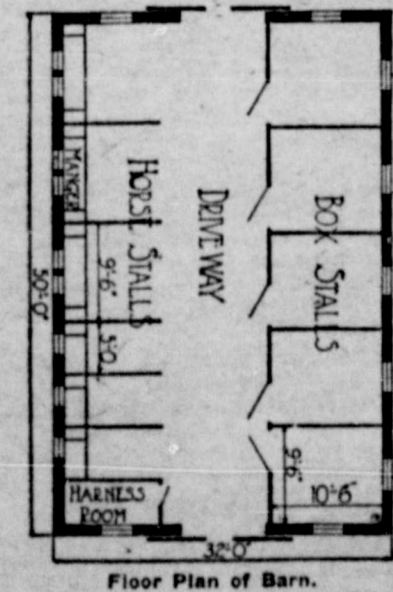

Wounds Caused by Dirt.

Wounds caused by earth are the by-effects of the action of projectiles. Exploding bullets and shells drive small particles of dirt into the skin. The neck, face and other exposed portions of the body are usually affected. The mildest form is "tattooed skin," which appears as if covered with dirt, which cannot be removed either with soap or benzine, as the smallest particles of dirt have been driven into the skin. With the second form, abrasions with cyanosis and swelling, deep necrosis may occur. The third variety is the formation of real wounds with irregular edges and subcutaneous hemorrhages; the wound is full of pieces of earth, stone or dirt. In one case one and a half pounds of dirt was found in the wound.



that they are remarkably nonabsorbent and make a floor that is very easy under foot and warm in cold weather. Cork bricks which have been submerged under water for three days have absorbed less than 2 per cent by weight.

The bricks are placed in a half-inch bed of cement mortar made of one part of portland cement and two parts of sand. The bricks are not crowded close together, but a space is left so that grout can be used to fill the joints. The grout for the joints is made of two parts of portland cement

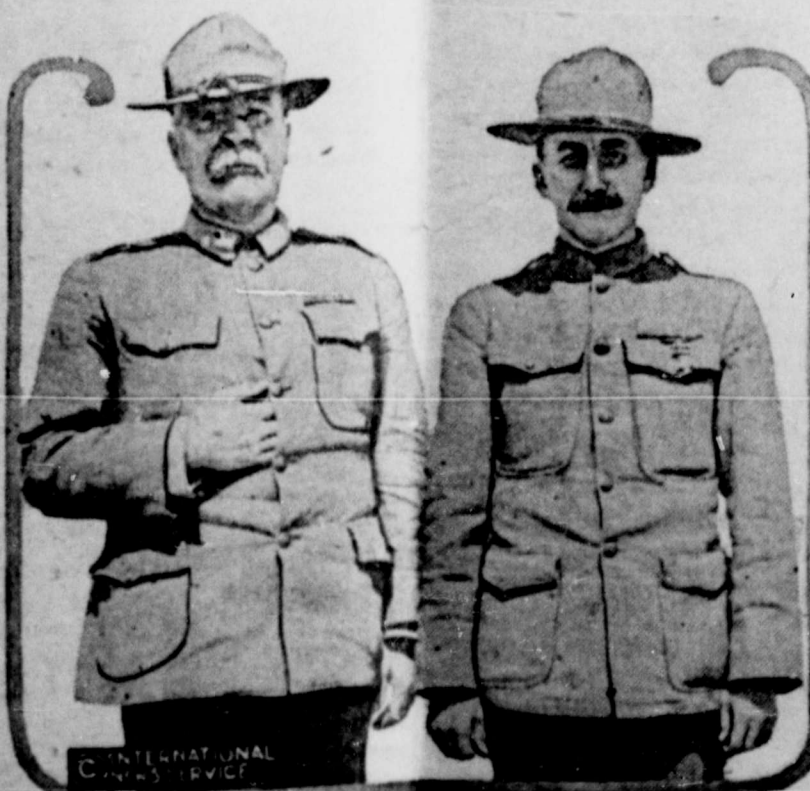

"YOU TOLD ME THE TRUTH AND I WANT THE PEOPLE TO KNOW IT"

The following unsolicited letter has been received from Mr. J. F. Ward of Donalds, Alberta. It is a plain statement of conditions as Mr. Ward has found them:

A Settler's Plain Letter.

"It is with pleasure I drop a line to you. We had a good year. Off of 65 acres, oats and wheat, I got over 2,500 bushels of wheat and oats. Oats went here from 50 to 100 bushels per acre, and wheat from 25 to 52 per acre. Just see me being here one year and have over 700 bushels of wheat. It is now over \$1.00 per bushel. Oats is 42 cents, and going up. You told me the truth, and I want the people of Toledo to know it. Hogs are 8% cents; cattle are high. Canada is good enough for me. I have 5 good horses. I sold 2 good colts, 2 cows and 18 head of hogs and killed 2. I have 6 hogs left. I got 400 bushels of potatoes off an acre and a good garden last summer, fine celery and good onions. One neighbor had over 1,200 bushels of wheat, and sold over \$700 of hogs and 2,000 bushels of oats. This is a great country. If you should tell the people of Toledo of this it would get some of them thinking. The soil is a rich black loam, and a pleasure to work it.

"We have a good farm. We have a flowing well with soft water. It is the best water in the country. Some people think they got to go to war when they come out here. They need not be afraid of war. There is no war on 160 acres, and road tax of 12 days with your team. I tell you the truth, there is no land in or around Toledo as good as our land here in Alberta. If anybody wants to write us, give them our address.

"We have had nice weather. We have had it quite cold for one week, but no rain and sleet, and the sun shines nearly every day, and it is hot in the sun. Coal is \$2.25 per ton. The people are very nice and good here. We are well enjoying the West. The horses and cows are feeding on the prairies all the winter. We just have two horses in the stable to go to town with. Yours truly, (Sgd.) J. F. WARD, Donalds, Alberta, Feb. 9, 1916."

"I was born in Wisconsin, but moved with my parents when a boy to Stephen Co., Iowa. I was there farming for 50 years. I sold my land there for over \$200 an acre. I moved to Saskatchewan, and located near Briercrest in the spring of 1912. I bought a half section of land. I have good neighbors. I feel quite at home here the same as in Iowa. We have perfect safety and no trouble in living up to the laws in force. My taxes are about \$55 a year on the half section fee."

FOR SIMPLE COOKERY

BEAN POTS, CASSEROLES AND RAMEKINS ARE GOOD.

Variety of Leftovers, Including Odd Vegetables, Can Be Used to Make Delicious Combinations, Is Assertion Made.

Perhaps the woman who has learned to cook by imagination will find the casserole more useful than the one who cooks altogether by recipes, for the latter often contains various leftovers and odd vegetables which will fit into a delicious casserole better than into any other dish. For instance, the woman who uses ham often finds scraps left over from cutting bits of meat which have adhered to the bone and the end which is unavailable for slicing. Often she will utilize these strips for sandwiches, creamed ham, or an omelet for breakfast or luncheon, whereas they could be made into a much more substantial dish well suited to a home dinner. I discovered this while keeping house on a farm ten miles from a railroad when ham was a staple weekly article, and the garden in summer and the vegetable cellar in winter were my chief assets. I used to oil my largest bean pot with ham fat, put in a layer of sliced turnip, then a more ham, some parsnips, and more ham, a layer of sliced raw potatoes, some minced onions and shredded cabbage, interspersing every layer with ham, a sprinkling of flour and a little salt and pepper. Sometimes, a few parboiled beans were added, the ingredients depending on the season of the year. The whole was barely covered with ham liquor or stock and baked very slowly for at least three hours. I have found the length this homely dish bears is firmly believe that we Americans are verging in our tastes far too much on the luxuries and should realize the possibilities of the things to be found in every household.

Not long ago I tested a recipe in which beef tongue was used, but found myself confronted with the root end for utilization. Into the casserole went these bits of meat, together with some chopped carrots, minced onion, chopped green pepper, tomato, salt, pepper, a few spices, dry bread crumbs for thickening, and a little of the tongue liquor. It was a good casserole, but one truly inspired by imagination and necessity!

The old-time Bean-on bean pot is an excellent utensil for cooking meats which are cut in comparatively small pieces, as well as fruits and dried vegetables, while the old-fashioned blue and white stewpot, which can be obtained in almost any size, is especially suitable for use to large families and is inexpensive. Probably the most attractive utensil is the ramekin, little sister of the casserole. It is not only inexpensive, but is particularly useful for individual service, not only of savory dishes and vegetables, but of desserts. The family may tire, for example, of creamed corn, but if it is combined with a little leftover veal or chicken, well seasoned, strewn with crumbs, and served in ramekins, it becomes a "new dish." The youngsters may often rebel at such a plebeian dessert as bread pudding, but if prepared in ramekins with a little meringue topped with currant jelly it becomes "something new!"—Good Housekeeping.

Lamb Curry. Cut the meat in small pieces (and inferior portions such as the neck can be utilized in a curry), dip in flour and fry in hot olive oil, pork fat or butter until a rich brown. Mince or slice as onion and fry in the same way. Then put into a saucepan, cover with boiling water and simmer until the bones and gristly pieces will slip out. When the meat is sufficiently tender add a cupful each of strained tomato and rice, then a little celery cut fine or celery salt to season, with salt, paprika and a little curry powder. Cook ten minutes longer and serve.

Says the Cook. If you want the best pie crust, says the cook, it should be made the day before you wish to use and put into a cold pastry. Then the crust will be flaky and crisp. If you wish to retain the crispness after baking let the pie cool thoroughly before putting away.

To improve the top crust of the pie she has found the following very good: Brush it over with water and then sprinkle with granulated sugar. This improves the appearance and makes it brown and crisp.

Serving Baked Potatoes. Roll each hot baked potato in a paper napkin, twisting each end. This serves three purposes: 1. Keeps potato hot. 2. Napkin serves as holder when removing the potato skin. 3. The napkin serves as a receptacle for the unsightly paring or skin. Potatoes served thus wrapped are artistic, especially when placed in a basket upon the table.

Good Tea. To make good tea, scald the teapot and to a pint of boiling water add two teaspoonfuls of tea, cover tightly and set away from fire four minutes; then strain.

Avoid Sunscald Injury. Are the apple trees protected by wire or boards on the south side? If not, they are likely to be injured by sunscald.

FOODS FOR THE CHILDREN

Palatable and Nourishing and So Many That Constant Variety is Made Possible.

Many children do not know the taste of meat up to the seventh year, but if a child is anemic, a tender, juicy chop, cooked slowly, but not too well done, or a piece of roast mutton or beef may be given once a day, at breakfast or noon, but never at night. Never give pork, veal or fried food.

Among vegetables, spinach, carrots, onions and baked potatoes are best. Salads with mayonnaise dressing are excellent for children, but they seldom care for them, except lettuce sandwiches, made of buttered whole-wheat bread with young leaves of lettuce between, sprinkled with salt.

Cooked fruit is good for young children. The best way to cook is to put it in the double boiler with half a cupful of water to a quart of fruit, and let cook until soft, then add the sugar at the table as required. Many fruits are sweet enough in their cooked form. A little cornstarch will make the juice appetizing, thick and rich. Apples, pears, peaches and bananas may be baked in the oven, in a casserole, only a little water being added and the casserole covered.

Cereals, properly cooked, mixed with dates or figs, are excellent, accompanied by rich milk or half milk and half cream. An ideal breakfast for a child of six consists of either stewed fruit or a small glassful of orange juice, a well-cooked cereal, slices of whole-wheat or Boston brown bread, or toast, and a glass of milk.

Among cakes, gingerbread, ginger cookies, raisin cookies and patty-cakes can be eaten.

Chicken, roasted or broiled, is also suitable for children, together with rice. The rice should be well boiled in salted water, or in half milk and half water, in a double boiler, or it may be made into a creamy rice pudding, the proportions being a tablespoonful of well-washed rice to a quart of milk and two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Bake slowly for two hours.

WORTH KNOWING

Colorado handkerchiefs should be soaked in cold water for a short time before they are washed. This will prevent the colors from running or fading.

When about to clean paint in a kitchen or other rooms where there is a stove heat a boiler of water and allow it to boil without a cover for a long time.

As you pack each article for moving, make a note of where you put it and when you want to reach a certain article you can do so without any difficulty.

Wash the glass over pictures with a cloth wrung from hot water and dipped in alcohol. Polish them immediately until they are dry and glossy with chamois or tissue paper.

Soap and powdered chalk mixed and rubbed on mildew spots will remove them. To expedite matters let the spotted article lie in the sun for a few hours, dampen it again as it dries.

French Cream Candy.

Mix the whites of two eggs and half as much water, but do not beat. Stir in powdered or confectioner's sugar until stiff enough to handle. Use any preferred flavoring—vanilla, lemon or rose—or half of lemon and vanilla is nice. Break off pieces, roll in small balls, and press half an English walnut meat on each side.

This cream may be used for a great variety of candies, by mixing with chopped nuts or candied fruits, raisins, figs or dates, and by using strong black coffee instead of water for a maple taste and cream color, or chocolate may be used, or half chocolate and half coffee, flavored with vanilla, produces a very agreeable taste.—Farm and Home.

Plain Sugar Cookies.

One cupful of sugar, one-half cupful shortening (butter is the nicest, but you can use beef drippings with part butter), one egg, one-half cupful sweet milk, one teaspoonful cream of tartar and one-half teaspoonful soda a little salt and any flavoring you prefer. Use nutmeg and ginger. Flour to mix very soft. Roll one-fourth inch thick, sprinkle sugar over top, roll across once to make sugar stick. I cut them square with a knife and lift them on the cookie sheet with the knife. Bake in a quick oven. If you like them crispy roll thinner.

Chicken Croquettes.

One and three-quarters cupfuls finely chopped cold chicken, one-half teaspoonful salt, one-quarter teaspoonful celery salt, cayenne, a few drops tabasco, one teaspoonful lemon juice, few drops onion juice, one teaspoonful chopped parsley, one cupful thick white sauce; mix in order given, cool, shape, crumb and fry. Croquette mixture should be as soft as can be handled; so as to be creamy inside when cooked.

Cream Whip.

For a cream whip, which is very simple to make, fill sherbet glasses half full of preserved or ripe fruit, heap them with whipped cream which has been flavored with vanilla and sprinkle the tops lightly with cocoa, coconut or minced nuts.

To Clean a Wringer. Kerosene oil is excellent for cleaning the rubber rollers of a clothes wringer. After it has been applied the rollers should be rinsed off with warm water.

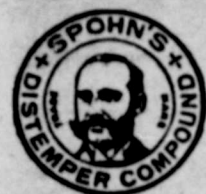

DISTINGUISHED BY NOVEL FINISHINGS.

A lovely gown of black net, with flounces bordered with corded or banded taffeta, is distinguished by much originality. Several novel ideas appear in its finishing, which might be used on gowns made of any of the sheer fabrics that add so much to the midsummer wardrobe.

The model is made over a slip of black taffeta with plain skirt and low bodice, which serves as a foundation and support for the net overdress. This has two flounces, one overlapping the other, headed by two puffs which form shorter, doubled flounces, about the hips.

The net bodice is shirred on to a narrow band at the round neck with a row of four small shirred tucks, forming a soft and pretty finish. It is set in one with the full sleeves.

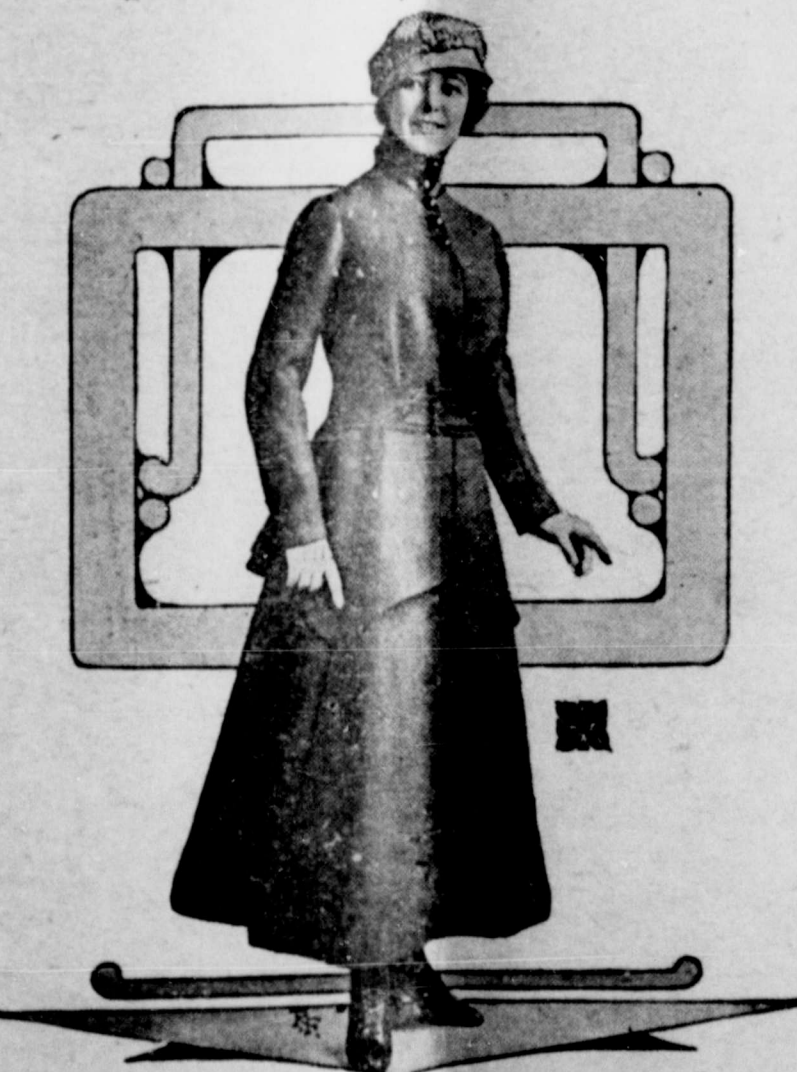
The sleeve is elbow length and finished with four rows of baby velvet ribbon. By gathering in the fullness at two places about the upper arm two puffs are formed, corresponding with those at the top of the skirt. Little rosettes of baby velvet ribbon with hanging ends are mounted at the back of the neck and at the back of each sleeve.

An emplacement of taffeta with lace overlay across the top and bottom appears at the back and front of the bodice, forming a little blouse with a

A trim and interestingly practical suit, meant to fill the needs of the schoolgirl, proclaims itself an American design made for an American girl. Without a furbelow of any description, it is made of a cravenetted wool fabric, firm as to weave and fairly light as to weight. The skirt is full and flaring, but it achieves these desirable traits without plaits of any kind, by means of lapped seams and shaped corners. It is finished with a three-inch hem and appears longer in the picture than it need be. Shoe-top length would mean additional style.

The smart coat is held in to the figure by a belt of the material, and has a flaring and pointed peplum. Making stitching, irreproachable as to neatness and accuracy of line, emphasizes its value as a finish, because there is no ornamentation to distract the attention from it. There is a French collar at the neck, which buttons close up about it, under the chin. Three buttons at the top of the coat continue a row begun by two on the collar, and three smaller buttons, of the same kind, are placed on the back of the sleeves near the hand.

The belt fastening is ingenious and betrays that careful thought was given to every detail of the suit. At each end the belt is extended into a tongue

short peplum. The lace used is a black net run with silver. This might be replaced with an embroidered pattern, or the printed taffetas could be used.

Striped ribbons or silks are used with georgette crepe for afternoon gowns in banded effects. In these the upper part of the skirt is made of the crepe and at the knee, or a little above, the banded silk is set on to form the lower part of the skirt. The bodice is usually made of the crepe, with the banded silk used in some sort of over-trapery and in the cuffs.

These tongues carry a buttonhole. A slit in the belt at the right side is buttonhole stitched, and the tongue on the left side of the belt thrust through it, buttoning over high composition buttons that match up well with the suit.

A small breast pocket might find a place in the coat, for the sake of convenience. The suit suggests the military modes, and one suspects its creator of gentle irony inasmuch as he has designed for the schoolgirl a suit with no foolishness about it.
