Annual Fly-In is set for Monday

"We had 97 pilots register last year and we expect more than that number Monday," said J. O. Dockrey.

Dockrey is chairman of the oldest continuous Fly-In Breakfast in Texas and pilots will begin landing at the airport north of town "right about sunrise" on Monday, July 4.

Activities will start at 7 a.m. when employees of City National Bank begin serving a free breakfast to all the pilots. This meal will be served until 10 a.m. and the cost is \$3 to the general public. Almost 500 breakfasts were served last year.

There is no admission charge to the fly-in itself.

Nancy Robinson, pilot and author, will present awards at 9 a.m. to several pilots including the ones that flew the longest distance, the oldest and youngest pilot and the most unusual airplane.

T-shirt and cap fans once again can add to their collections by purchasing these souvenirs at the fly-in.

Dockrey added that the airport "is really looking good and clean thanks to the work the inmates from the Wallace Unit have done."

Wallace Unit back to normal following first "lock-down"

It was almost "business as usual" at the Wallace Unit Friday following a lock-down this week because of two incidents involving mostly black and Hispanic inmates at the unit.

Warden Rodney Cooper said the problems started Sunday when two correctional officers were struck by inmates and the problems carried on into Sunday evening when a group of inmates began throwing dirt clods and rocks and eventually broke a window at the unit.

As a result of this incident, 200 inmates were locked down in one of the housing units.

The entire unit was locked down Monday in what assistant warden Jackie Edwards described as a racial incident involving blacks, Hispanics and a few Caucasians.

"A group of Hispanic inmates climbed the fence that separates the two recreational areas within the compound and began chasing after black inmates," said Edwards. "One of our lieutenants saw what was happening and ordered tear gas to break up the melee."

Warden Cooper said Thursday that most activities have resumed at the unit including outside trustees working at the Lake Colorado City State Park, Ruddick Park and along the highways.

"Of course, those who were involved in the disturbances are still locked up," said Cooper.

Cooper said a lock-down is where there is basically no movement within the unit by the inmates including going to the dining area to eat. Meals are eaten within the confines of each cell.

Rees decides to stay as Westbrook's mayor

J. L. "Bill" Rees, mayor of Westbrook, announced last month that he was going to resign at July's city council meeting.

"I changed my mind," said the 81-year old mayor. "I just had too much encouragement to stay on the job."

Ruddick Park gets a facelift

Parts of Ruddick Park are getting a face-lift due to a joint effort of city employees and inmates from the 80-John Wallace Unit.

The portion of Lone Wolf Creek that runs south of the low-water crossing is being cleared of all underbrush and unsightly trees for a combination nature-jogging trail by the inmates. Some 33 were on the job last week, being supervised by three armed correctional officers on horse back.

Plans are to clean the area to the private fence line down the creek and then to obtain an easement so the creek can be cleaned all the way to Austin Street.

Part of the creek has been dammed up to provide a fishing area which will normally be about five feet deep.

While the inmates are doing all

the shoveling, cutting, raking - the city is using their dump trucks to haul the trash off. So far, over 20 truckloads of trash have been removed from the area.

Agencies combine to reduce costs

In a program similar to the cleanup of Ruddick Park, officials at the Wallace Unit and the Texas Department of Transportation are coordinating both state agencies in a joint program designed to benefit state taxpayers.

A letter of agreement has been signed by Wallace Unit warden, Rodney Cooper and TxDOT district engineer, Maribel P. Jaso, of Abilene, which initiates the work assistance program.

Inmates are provided time outside the TDCJ unit to perform basic roadway work along state right of ways. Jobs include brush

removal, litter pick up, painting and many other trade skills.

The overall objective is to integrate low risk inmates back into society while exposing them to some basic skills they may be able to employ upon their release.

Warden Cooper and Tom Roy, Mitchell County Maintenance Supervisor for TxDOT, both agreed that an augmented work force is a benefit for the county and the state.

"County residents have seen the benefits of this 'tag-team' approach to improvements along the roadways and have praised the efforts," said Roy.

Students graduate from Rural Scholar Program

Three students sponsored by the Mitchell County Hospital District are graduating from the Outstanding Rural Scholar Recognition Program this summer.

Toni Everett, Becky Manning and Elizabeth Wadsworth join fifteen other graduates from the program.

Texas Senator Steve Carriker (D-Roby) was the sponsor of the legislation which created the program in 1989. The program is designed to help rural Texas communities "grow their own" health care professionals by providing matching funds to community sponsors of students pursuing health care professions. Carriker says, "This program has proven to be a great asset to rural Texas. Through their participation in the program, more than 25 communities, including Colorado City, have taken positive steps to

ensure that their health care needs will be met. At the same time, the program has enabled 40 students from all parts of the state to pursue their education who otherwise might not be able to do so."

Fifteen exceptional students from a statewide pool of applicants have been recognized as new Outstanding Rural Scholars by the Center for Rural Health Initiatives and they include Sherri Smith and Holly Turner, sponsored by Mitchell County Hospital District.

These students are eligible to apply for forgiveness loans to pay their educational expenses. In order to qualify for a forgiveness loan under the program, these students must agree to provide one year of service in their health care field to the sponsor for each year of education expenses met by the sponsor and the Center for Rural Health Initiatives.

Blue Ridge Oil and Gas Exploration of Ozona has revealed plans to drill an 8,999-ft. new pool wildcat well in Mitchell County's North Van Gogh Field. The operator has 640 acres leased, with drillsite in the H&TCRR Co. Survey A-1046. It has designated the venture as the No. 1 Emma Hopper. Drillsite is 16 miles northwest of Colorado City.

Parker and Parsley Development Co. of Midland is preparing to conduct a plugback for shallower production in Mitchell County's Iatan Field. Involved in the operation will be the No. 225 Mary Foster.

The well currently bottoms at 2,330 feet in the San Andres Formation.

The well was originally completed in 1987 by Mobil Producing, pumping 17 barrels of oil per day plus 334 barrels of water from

Clear Fork perforations at 2,441 to 2,892 feet into the hole.

Location is in a 3,840-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey.

A new producer has been brought on line in Mitchell County's Double B Field, with Trend Exploration Co. as the operator.

Located four miles northeast of Vincent, the well is in an 80-acre lease in the Lavaca Navigation Co. Survey A-1888. It is designated as the No. 6101 Sterling Family Trust.

On a 10/64 choke, the well pumped 86 barrels of oil per day plus 459,000 CF gas. Flowing tubing pressure registered 1,130 PSI.

The well bottomed at 7,453 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Canyon Formation, 7,430 to 7,453 feet into the hole.

States should make their own ground water monitoring decisions, says Stenholm

During a public meeting on ground water monitoring requirements for small, dry and remote landfills, Congressman Charles Stenholm urged EPA to give states flexibility in complying with the landfill regulations mandated by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA).

"As a farmer and a native West Texan, I understand the importance of safeguarding the nation's groundwater," said Stenholm. "By the same token, we must balance such protection with the ability of rural America to remain economically viable."

In 1991, Stenholm was instrumental in establishing an arid exemption for small towns facing stringent ground water monitoring requirements. "In arid parts of the west, the potential for ground water contamination is quite low," stated Stenholm. "I felt it was neither practical nor fair for one set of regulations to be implemented nationwide, without taking into consideration variations in precipitation, topography, ground water percolation, population density and other factors."

On May 7, 1993 the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit issued a ruling that set aside the arid exemption from underground water monitoring. EPA is holding public meetings to determine how they can

modify the existing ground water monitoring regulations to provide greater implementation flexibility.

"Many of us who have been carefully following this issue over the years do not believe the Court had all the information necessary to render a fair or reasonable ruling," Stenholm told EPA. "Nor do I believe the Court understood the significant fiscal impact this decision would have on small rural communities."

Stenholm urged EPA to review and adopt the alternative ground water monitoring methods for small landfills in arid areas developed by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. "States must be given the authority to make decisions which are site-specific and which will not be financially devastating to rural America," Stenholm said.

TEXAS ANGLER

By Keith Warren

How could something that smells so bad catch something that tastes so good? Every time I go catfishing I ask myself that question. Catfish are one of the tastiest fish you'll find and they are located in just about every river, creek, lake and pond you can think of.

For people who like to eat fish, you can't do any better than going after Mr. Whiskers. It is easy to catch these fish as long as you follow a few simple rules.

Most successful fishermen fish over baited holes. They will take their favorite bait, put it in a burlap bag and sink it. Usually they will float a jug over the bait so it will be easy to locate.

I suggest that those who want to bait a hole use soured grain. Purchase a 50-pound bag of grain such as milo or wheat at any feed store. You also need two 5-gallon buckets. Pour half a sack of grain in each bucket and fill with water. Generally, the warmer the weather the faster the grain will sour. How will you know when it's ready? Believe me, without a doubt you will know! It will smell so bad you will ask yourself if it is worth all the trouble.

Once the grain has soured, pour one bucket of grain in a burlap bag. Tie a line around the top of the bag to close it and then sink it in your favorite fishing hole. A depth of 8 to 10 feet of water is productive both in summer and winter as long as there is deep water nearby. Make sure to float a jug above your bait so you can locate it. Any catfish in the area of your bait will come up to it and nudge the burlap bag to try to get some of the grain out. It only takes a few days to draw fish to the bait. The bait will remain very smelly for a couple of weeks in the bag.

Before starting to fish, take the remaining bucket of grain and scatter a couple of pounds in the

vicinity of the burlap bag. Be sure not to get it in your boat! This scattered grain gets the fish in the area in a feeding mood. Don't put out too much grain or the fish may fill up eating it and not touch your baited hook.

There are several choices of good baits to use: commercially produced cheese baits, chicken liver, nightcrawlers and shrimp, to name a few. I prefer to use Strike King's Nightcrawler Links or the new Cheese-Flavored Nightcrawler Links. The baits smell like cheese but are not nearly as messy and they stay on a single hook. Strike King has a special hook, The Whisker Sticker, which I have used and it works well.

When fishing over a baited hole you need to keep your boat from moving, so anchor or tie both ends of your boat.

If there's a catfish in the area, he'll bite. Remember to observe the minimum length requirement and bag limits and only keep what you can use.

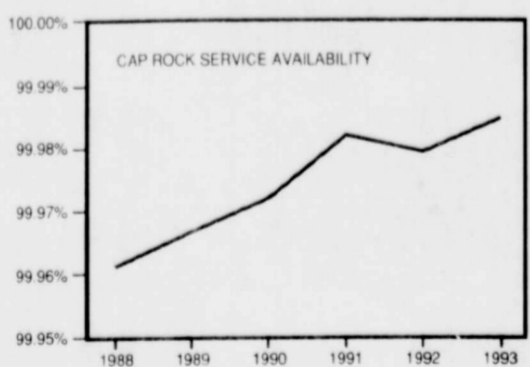

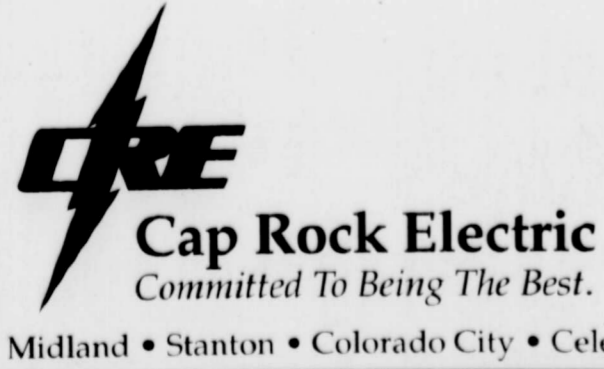

Q. Are immunizations really necessary for children before the age of two?

A. Yes. Childhood diseases like measles and whooping cough can cause permanent brain damage or even death. All children should have four immunization visits from two months to two years of age. In the past five years, more than 4,400 Texas children under five years of age have had measles and 14 of these children died! Half of the nation's 2,200 measles cases in 1992 were reported in Texas. With only 40 percent of its children immunized, Texas ranks very low in the nation in childhood immunizations. Dangerous childhood diseases could reach epidemic levels in Texas, and the cost of immunizations is far less than the cost of treating these diseases.

Q. What is the recommended schedule for immunizations?

A. The schedule recommended by the Texas Department of Health is as follows (although physicians' recommendations may vary slightly):

- AT BIRTH:** Hepatitis B
- 2 MONTHS:** Hepatitis B
- 4 MONTHS:** DTP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis or Whooping Cough) Polio Hib
- 6 MONTHS:** Hepatitis B DTP Polio Hib
- 12-15 MONTHS:** DTP Hib MMR (measles, mumps, rubella)
- 4-6 YEARS:** DTP Polio MMR

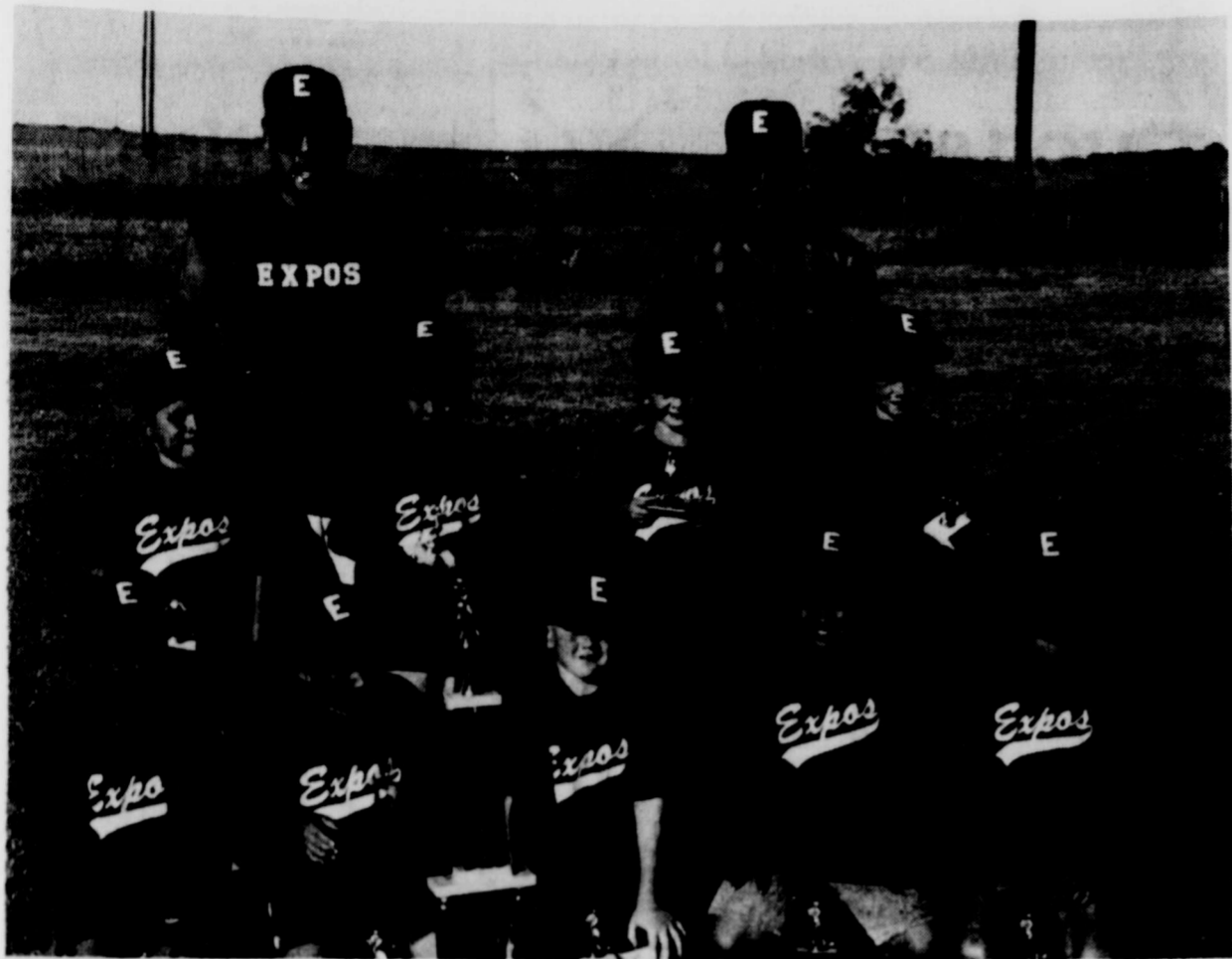

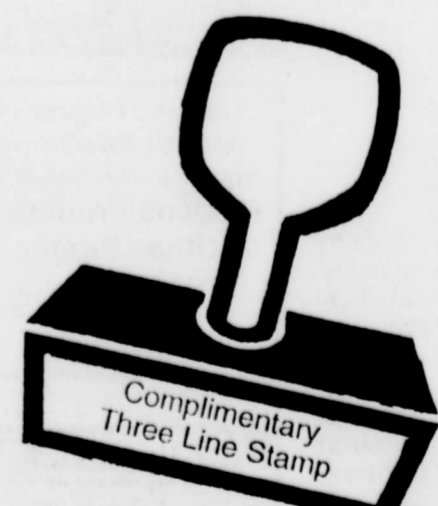

Franklin D. Roosevelt signed it into law on June 22, 1944 as World War II waned. A young Navy veteran by the name of George Bush used it, as did a budding young author named James Michener. So did actors Clint Eastwood and Paul Newman.

Entertainers, politicians, sports figures and millions of ordinary men and women veterans have used the G.I. Bill to gain an education or vocational rehabilitation, guarantee a home loan or make a smooth transition from military to civilian life.

The 50th anniversary has been marked of the historic signing of a law that Michener later called "one of the two or three finest laws Congress has ever passed since our Constitution took effect."

One of the key elements of the G.I. Bill is the home loan guaranty program. Since the first loan was guaranteed on November 17, 1944 to Miles E. Myers of Washington, D.C., the Department of Veterans Affairs has guaranteed more than 14 million home loans at a value of more than \$433 billion.

Last year in the state of Texas alone, 25,594 home loans were guaranteed. The value of those homes was in excess of \$1,974,942,000.

"Millions of men and women in Texas have had their lives dramatically improved because of the impact of the G.I. Bill," said Dr. Lois High, Director of the VA Regional Office in Waco. "Men and women have become homeowners, not renters, because of the G.I. Bill benefits they earned while in service to the country. I'm honored to help VA administer this remarkable program," Director High said.

The other key element of the bill is the education benefits provided to veterans. Originally, the benefit was \$500 a year for tuition and training costs. Educators at the time feared classes would be watered down. But veterans proved to be much better than average students and actually raised scholarship levels significantly.

By 1947 half of the nation's college students were veterans.

"Last year we provided educational assistance to about 25,000 veterans in this state—benefits totaling about \$48,500,000," Director High said.

"Today, education and home loan benefits are a permanent part of the veteran's package of benefits. In fact, they've been expanded to include active duty personnel, reservists and surviving spouses. Instead of helping veterans ease into civilian life, these benefits now are offered as an incentive to join the all-volunteer military force," she said.

"Thanks to the G.I. Bill, this nation is a much richer one—in education, in living conditions and in almost every area of the social fabric of America," She said.
