We haven't checked lately, and for all we know all the safe deposit boxes in the new bank may be rented. If boxes are still available, we advise everyone, or every family, to get one. Unless you have a fire-proof vault or safe at home, you stand a chance of losing valuable papers that will be hard, and maybe impossible, to replace. Birth certificates, marriage license, deeds, abstracts, and other valuable papers should be in a fire-proof, burglary-proof place such as the safe deposit boxes afford. When it comes time to start collecting your Social Security payments, you may need your birth certificate as proof of age.

Like the other customers, we're proud of the new bank building. It was built to be occupied by a bank, and affords many more conveniences than were offered in the old building.

Merchants that are not now using the night depository unit at the new building should talk to bank officers and make arrangements to do so. No use taking chances of keeping large amounts of money overnight.

Antelopes Win District 2-AA Opener With Morton, 38-0

The Abernathy Antelopes won a 38-0 victory over the Morton Indians last week before a sparsely scattered crowd of less than 2,000 on Antelope Field.

The game, which was the opening District 2-AA game for both clubs, was Abernathy's seventh triumph of the season against no setbacks.

The crowd saw the Antelopes romp for two touchdowns in the first quarter and one in the second to walk off the field at intermission with a 24-0 lead under their belts. The Lopes failed to score in the last period, but exploded in the third for two quick touchdowns.

However, all did not start on such a bright note for the Antelopes. The Indians received the opening kickoff on Abernathy's 17-yard line and after pushing the ball to only the 23, they punted on fourth down. Halfback Gerald Watson fumbled on his own 48. Morton recovered! But quarterback Lane Tannehill all but made up for the mis-cue three plays later when he set up Abernathy's first touchdown by intercepting an Indian pass on his 33 yard line.

Fullback Danny Miller and halfback Aubrey Smith drove the ball to Morton's 46-yard line in 4 plays before Tannehill and Watson, anxious to erase the mis-cue, teamed up for a 46-yard pass and run play to climax the Antelopes' 67 yard touchdown march on the fifth play.

Parish, October 24, 1897, in Montague County, Texas. They first moved to this area in 1908, from Wise County. Mrs. Shipman died October 1, 1951.

th play. Tannehill passed to end Pat Attebury for the two point conversion.

The Antelopes scored the next time they got their paws on the ball. This time end Neal Humphrey was the one who started the Antelopes on their TD march. Humphrey bounced on a Morton fumble on the 42-yard line. It was Tannehill who ran through right tackle from 9 yards out to climax this second Antelope drive that covered 58 yards in 9 plays. Fullback Miller plunged through the middle of the line for the conversion.

The Indians presented their only serious scoring threat of the game in the second quarter when they advanced to Abernathy's 27-yard line. In this drive, the Indians were aided by a 15-yard personal foul penalty assessed against Abernathy. However, end Jimmy Dye put an

end to Morton's hopes when he covered another one of their fumbles on the Morton 27 and, again set up another touchdown drive for the Antelopes.

The Antelopes used sheer ground power in marching the 73 yards in 9 plays on this sustained drive. They did not even attempt a pass. Miller plunged to the 35, Watson to the 41, Miller to the 49, and Miller again to the Morton 43 for 14 yards, before Smith put the Antelopes knocking at the 9 when he ran 34 yards from the 43. Miller then carried to the 6 and Smith to the 1 before Miller plunged through for the score. Tannehill swept around left end on the keeper play for the conversion.

Antelopes Sluggish in Third
Both teams failed to provide a scoring punch in the third quarter. The Lopes and Indians both had

possession of the pigskin twice in that period. The Abernathians marched to the 13 and 34 yard lines before both drives fizzled out. Morton never got across midfield when they had their turns with the ball.

However, the Antelopes returned to first half form in the fourth quarter, scoring each time they got possession of the ball.

Quarterback Tannehill and halfback Watson again teamed up for another Abernathy score when Tannehill pitched to Watson from 6 yards out, climaxing a drive that covered 59 yards in 8 plays. Miller plunged over for his second conversion of the night.

The last tally of the game was set up by Tannehill when he intercepted another Morton pass, this time on Morton's 43-yard line. The Antelopes first unit moved the ball

Report on Grain, Soybean Contest Are Due Nov. 15

Final reports for the Soybean Production and Hybrid Grain Sorghum Production Contest will be due in the County Agent's Office, November 15, according to County Agent Ollie Limer.

To be eligible for the contest, the contestant, either adult, 4-H member or FFA member, must have at least one acre of the following hybrid sorghums: 590, 601, 610, 611, 620, 630, 650, or 660. A contestant must have at least

two acres of soybeans and the harvesting must be supervised by three farmers. For further harvesting information, the contestant should contact the County Agent's Office.

Forms for reporting results are available at the County Agent's Office.

The annual harvest festival parade will begin at 4:30 P. M. October 31, 1958 from the parking area in front of the Elementary School building.

All clubs, merchants, and organizations that wish to enter the parade should contact Boyd M. Mchell, phone 24, by October 27.

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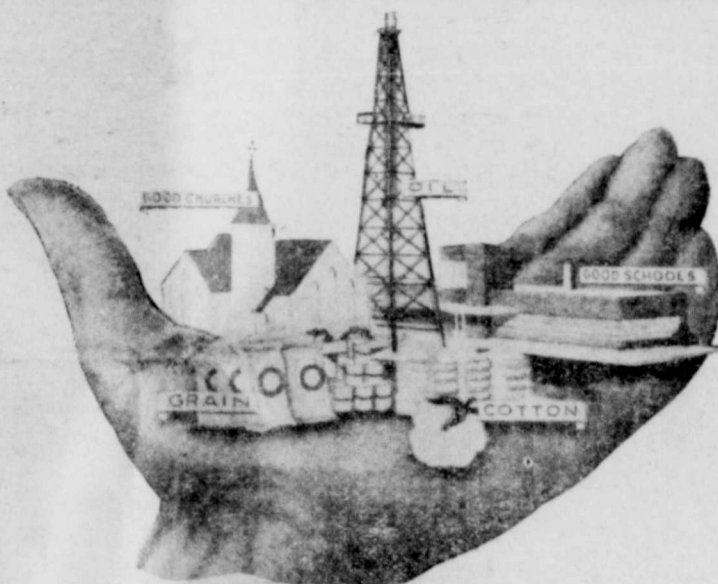

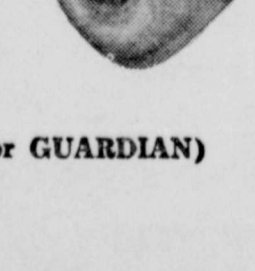

THE ACTION OF BAPTISM?

By LOYD E. ASH

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

Bible-reading people are aware of the importance of being baptized. In giving the Great Commission the Lord commanded his disciples, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations baptizing them" (Matt. 28:19). "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16).

We are concerned with what is the right action involved in baptism. Is it sprinkling, pouring, or immersion, or all three? These are the three actions commonly called "baptism" by religious people of our day. Each of us should be deeply concerned with what action conforms to Bible teaching on the subject. Do you know what true baptism is?

Definition

You will find that Webster includes all three actions in his definition of baptism. BUT WE ARE NOT INTERESTED IN HIS DEFINITION. Does this sound strange to you? The reason is simple: our dictionary gives MODERN usages of the word. The thing we are interested in is: what did the LORD mean when He commanded baptism?

It is reasonable that we consult Greek scholars for a proper definition: inasmuch as the New Testament was originally written in the Greek language. Dr. Joseph Henry Thayer's Greek-English Lexicon of the New Testament has long been the accepted authority on Greek words. He states "baptism" means: To dip, to immerge, to submerge... an immersion in water" (Page 94).

All Greek scholars concur with this. Should not this forever settle the question? Only immersion fits the definition!

Requirements

Another way we can know the certainty of the action of baptism is to see the various requirements of Bible baptism. Let us consult a number of passages.

Acts 10:47, "Can any forbid water, that these should be baptized?" This indicates the proper element in WATER.

John 3:23, "And John also was

baptizing in Aenon near Salim, because there was much WATER. Therefore, scriptural baptism requires MUCH WATER.

Acts 8:36, "And as they went on their way, they came unto a certain water; and the eunuch said, 'See here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptized?' " It is significant that here the candidate came to the water. The water was not brought to the candidate.

Acts 8:38, "They went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him." From this verse we learn that Bible baptism requires the candidate's GOING DOWN INTO THE WATER. In which case is this true: sprinkling, pouring, or immersion?

Romans 6:4, "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism." Here baptism is called a BURIAL. Which action conforms to a burial: sprinkling, pouring, or immersion?

Col. 2:12, "Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him." This teaches that baptism is also a resurrection. Does sprinkling, pouring, or immersion require this?

Matt. 3:16, "And Jesus, when he was baptized, went straightway out of the water." Therefore, baptism also includes a coming UP OUT OF THE WATER. Which action necessitates a coming up out of water: sprinkling, pouring, or immersion?

Let us put these requirements all together and look at them:

1. Water. Acts 10:47
2. Much water. John 3:23
3. Coming to the water. Acts 8:36
4. Going down into water. Acts 8:38
5. A burial. Romans 6:4
6. A resurrection. Col. 2:12
7. A coming up out of the water. Matt. 3:16

It is evident to the sincere observer that only immersion conforms to Bible teaching on the subject of baptism. Have you been baptized scripturally?

B. A. Myers Dies in Waco

Funeral services for Burr A. Myers, 62, Amarillo, were conducted at 10:30 a. m. Monday at the First Methodist Church, Plainview.

Myers was a longtime resident of Plainview. He died Saturday at the Veterans Hospital in Waco after a long illness.

Dr. J. H. Crawford, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated. Burial was in the Plainview Cemetery.

Myers was born at Huntington, Indiana. He moved to Lubbock County in 1908 from Indiana and taught in the Lubbock County

school system. He was a former resident of the Abernathy area.

He was manager of the Texas Employment Commission office at Amarillo from 1943 until his health failed two years ago. He served in the Navy during World War I and was a member of the Plainview First Methodist Church.

Survivors include the wife; a daughter, Mrs. B. W. Southern, Amarillo; a son, Burton R., Lubbock, and one grandchild.

During 1957, 2,539 persons were killed in 2,077 traffic accidents, reports Texas DPS.

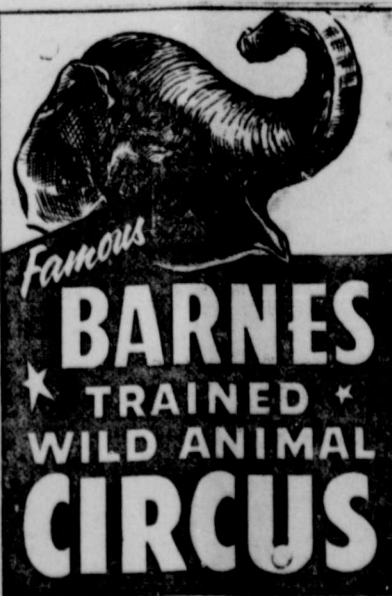

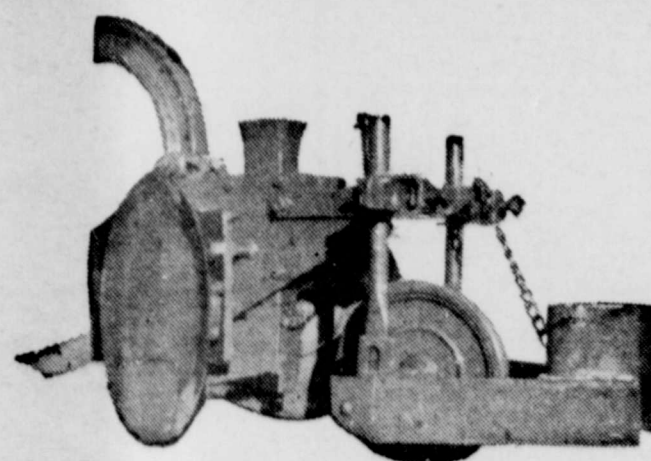

INSULATION

No matter how your home is heated, good insulation will save you money — give

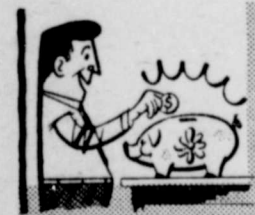
greater heating comfort — provide more efficient summertime cooling. Ceilings should have 6 inches of non-settling insulation. Walls should have 3½ inches—floors, 2 inches. A concrete floor should have 2 inches of insulation between it and the foundation. Windows are great to see through but they're guilty of tremendous heat loss and so they should be small or doubled-glassed — always weather-stripped. Ducts in a forced-air heating system should have a 2 inch coat of insulation.



DESIGN OF HEATING SYSTEM

A properly designed heating system is a must if you are to have enough heating

plus the efficiency necessary for low-cost operation. The system must be sized to meet the heating demand of the building and its occupants. A too-small system won't do the job and a too-large system is wasteful of both the cost of the unit and of its operating cost. In a forced-air system the size of the ducts and the blower is important for correct air distribution. The placement and size of the ceiling louvers must be considered in getting enough heat to all areas of the room.



HOME DESIGN

For greater comfort and economy much can be done with the home itself. Cold,

windy or hot exposures must be reckoned with. However, since cooling a building is usually more expensive than heating, air conditioning engineers recommend that home design offset hot, sunny exposures. One way of making the home cooler is to have extending roof overhangs to shade the exterior walls and windows. Other ways include designing the garage on the southwest corner of the house. Porches can be used to advantage, as well as adding beauty to the home. Shade trees on the sunny sides of the house are helpful.

Rev. Sidney Knox Dies In Lubbock

Funeral services for the Rev. Sidney Cornell Knox, 34, a former Abernathian, and a missionary to New Guinea for three years were held at 2 P. M. Thursday at the First Nazarene Church in Lubbock.

Dr. Hardy C. Powers, Dallas, general superintendent of the Church of the Nazarene, officiated. Assisting him were the Rev. Milton Poole, pastor of the First Nazarene Church in Lubbock, and Dr. Orville Jenkins, Lubbock, district superintendent.

Burial was in Tech Memorial Park.

The Rev. Mr. Knox died at 12:30 A. M. Tuesday, Oct. 14, at 512 Ave. V, Apt. D, Lubbock. Until recently, he had lived at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Knox, 101 Vernon Ave.

On learning he had cancer of the intestinal tract last January, the Rev. Mr. Knox returned from Port Moresby, New Guinea, with his family. He arrived in San Francisco in June and was flown to Lubbock by special ambulance plane.

The minister and his wife opened Nazarene Missionary work in New Guinea in 1955, beginning with natives of the island who had never heard English spoken. Their headquarters were located at Kudjit, near the headwaters of the Tari River.

A pre-fabricated shelter house, jeep, trailer and other equipment were transported to the area by air. By 1956 the Knox family had erected the shelter where preaching services were conducted and established a day school with enrollment of 80 pupils.

As the work progressed, another missionary couple joined the pioneers. The mission had been launched by a contribution of \$102,000 by Nazarenes of 4,250 churches in the United States, Canada, the British Isles and elsewhere.

A district superintendent and committee of 26 pastors and elders met the family when it reached San Francisco in June.

Before taking up the mission-

ary work, the Rev. Mr. Knox was pastor of Nazarene Churches at Slaton and Big Spring. A native of Mangum, Okla., he began to prepare for work as a medical missionary at Bethany Nazarene College, Bethany, Okla. He met the former Miss Wanda Mae Fulton of Oklahoma at the college and they were married in May, 1959, soon after graduation from college.

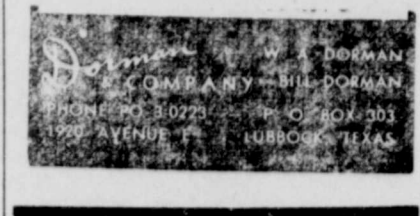

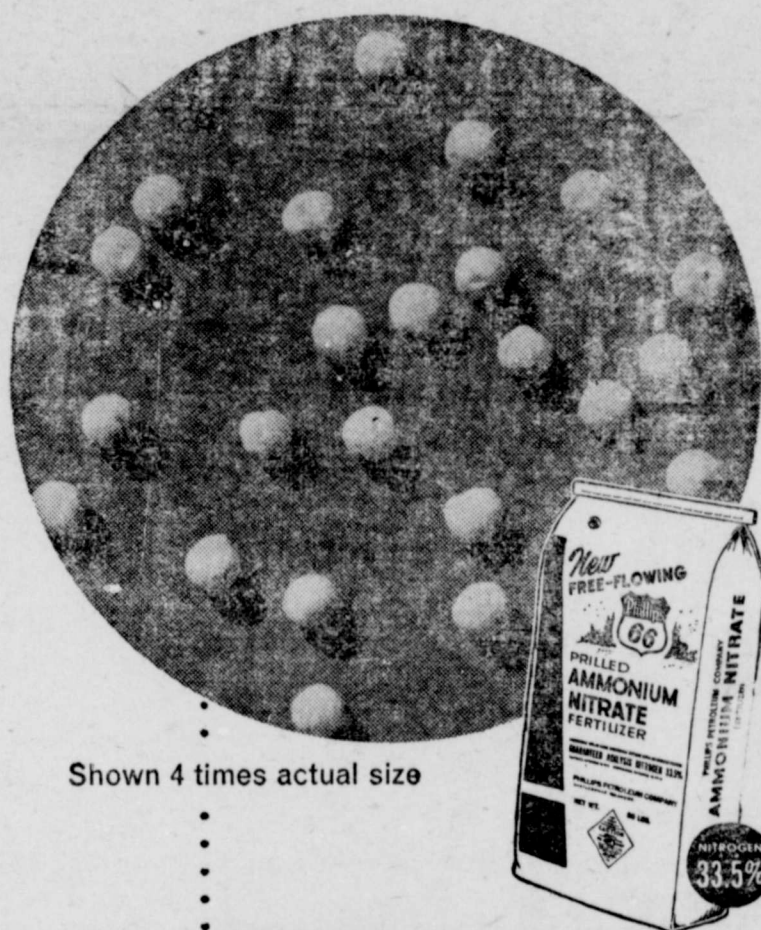
