## City Ponders Un-Tagged Dog Surplus

Wellington's dog problem came before the City Council again Monday night, December 6, and the owners responsibility for keeping their pets tagged was emphasized.

In other action, council members approved the purchase of a pickup which will be used by the city manager Glen Taylor and a grazing lease on 40 acres adjoining the city golf course was also approved.

Mr. Taylor told the council that the coin container at the public water dock had been pried open and robbed of an estimated \$70. Water sales are metered. He said this has been repaired and reinforced.

A number of dog owners had indicated to council members they would be present to complain of the killing of pets, however, no one appeared. Sheriff John Rainey and Chief Deputy Richard Keller were there to discuss the problem with them.

"We have far too many dogs running loose in town and not more than half of them are tagged," the sheriff said. Council members agreed

and Tom Wilkins pointed out the danger of stray dogs to small children who walk to school. Member J.L. Harper, who walks for health reasons, said he has been chased by dogs and now always carries a golf club to ward them off.

The city ordinance covering dog tagging was read: This states that all dogs and cats must be vaccinated for rabies by May 1 of each year; the owner shall be given a certificate which is to be recorded at City Hall, where a numbered rabies tag is issued.

The ordinance is specific that the tag is to be attached to a collar and worn continuously by the dog or cat. It is the owner's responsibility to keep the tag on. Pets not tagged can be destroyed. When the city-county law enforcement program was set up, Council members pointed out specifically that the dog problem now belonged to the sheriff's department.

The 40 acres of grass adjoining the airport was leased to Sam McGill for \$5.00 per acre, with the understanding that it not be overgrazed. Mr. Taylor told council

members an army surplus self-propelled packer had been located at Ft. Hood and a truck at Oklahoma City. Both are being held for the city, and are to be picked up without cost.

Councilman Wayne Cudd

asked if a ledger has been set up on work done for the public in which city machinery is used. He was told that there is a ledger and that all persons for whom work is done are billed.

## Christmas Cantata Will Be on Sunday

The choir of First United Methodist Church will present its Christmas cantata, "Good Tidings of Joy," Sunday, December 12, at 6:00 p.m.

Prophecy of the old testament is shown in "The Prophet's Word," a quartet by Mrs. Art Kane, Mrs. Fred Covey, Tom Lewis and L.B. Bratten.

Mrs. B.M. Simes will be the soloist in "The Song of the Angels," with the choir accompanying her. Then again earlier prophecies are recalled

in "Why Have You Come, O Shepherds?" by the girl's chorus and the men's chorus.

Mary, herself, expresses wonderment as she asks "Art thou the lord of all?" in "The Song of Mary." Mrs. Richard Nall is the soloist. There is the praise of angels in "He Came to Earth," with Lynn Emmert as soloist, joined by the duet, Mrs. A.V. Lowrie and Mrs. Jack Davis, and the women's chorus.

In "Pilgrims of the Night," a solo by L.B. Bratten, joined by the choir, Angels sing out that there is room for all pilgrims in Christ's love. The

cantata ends as the choir sings the "Gloria."

The performance will close on a note of praise as the choir sings an arrangement of the Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's Messiah.

## County May Leave Probation Plan

There is a likelihood that Collingsworth County will withdraw from the 100th Judicial District Probation Program, effective December 31, 1976. A cut in federal funding of this program does not leave enough money to continue it as it exists now.

The program presently consists of an adult probation officer, headquartered at Memphis; a juvenile probation officer, Bob Watson, who handles boys; and a female probation officer-secretary, Mrs. Charlene Poteet.

District Judge Robert Montgomery, who has jurisdiction in juvenile as well as adult cases, has proposed to the commissioners court that without requesting any county funds for 1977, the program can be continued by reducing the probation department to one adult probation officer and

one juvenile probation officer.

"This involves the elimination of the combination probation officer and secretary, Mrs. Charlene Poteet, Judge Montgomery told the Commissioners Court in a letter.

"The adult probation department pays its own way (through probation fees) and will pay for one juvenile officer if we cut back to one. That is what I propose to do," Judge Montgomery told The Wellington Leader.

The Commissioners Court, thinking that there should be a female probation officer, has told the judge it does not wish to continue the program under such a proposal, County Judge Zook Thomas said.

If Collingsworth County withdraws from the probation program, all juvenile cases

will be investigated and handled by the sheriff's department, Judge Montgomery said.

Also, if the county withdraws from the program, the remaining four counties in the 100th judicial district will continue it the probation program, with the two male probation officers, at no cut in their present salary. This could continue through 1977.

However, beginning in 1978, unless a new source of funding is found, or unless the counties in the 100th district fund the probation program, Judge Montgomery said "it may well be that we will lose all juvenile probation services in the 5 counties."

The multi-county probation program was put together under the direction of Judge Thomas and its federal funding was to Collingsworth County. Judge Thomas was at

that time the county's juvenile judge.

In 1973, action by the legislature made mandatory that the juvenile judge be a lawyer, and the judgeship went automatically to 100th District Judge Montgomery. About the same time, the probation program was realigned to serve the 5 counties making up the district.

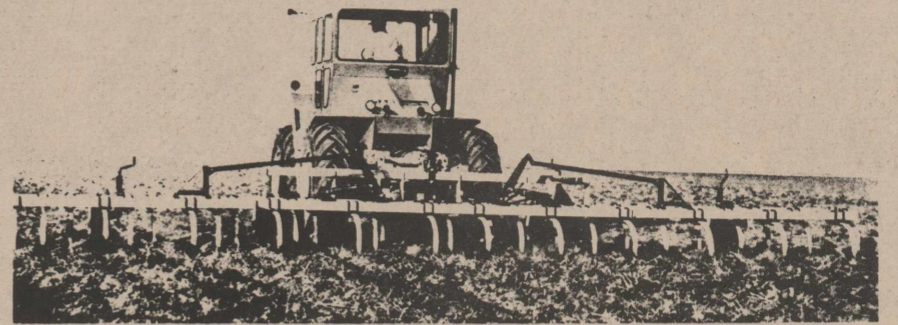

### Hunting Industry? Does Your City Really Want it?

COLLEGE STATION--Attracting new industry to strengthen the local economy is a major concern in many Texas cities and counties. The first step to economic development is to determine if growth is really wanted, what type of industry may be attracted, and the impacts of these industries," points out Dr. James I. Mallett, community resource development program leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Many Texas communities have passed this stage while others are just starting to answer these questions. What other issues must be considered before attempting

to interest specific business or industrial concerns in locating in your community? Mallett lists several. First local interests must be identified to determine community support. The types of growth which are beneficial to the particular community should also be identified. A third issue should be to identify local resources to convince industries that the community is their best choice. The economic effects of growth upon the community should also receive close consideration, such as the fiscal effects of growth and

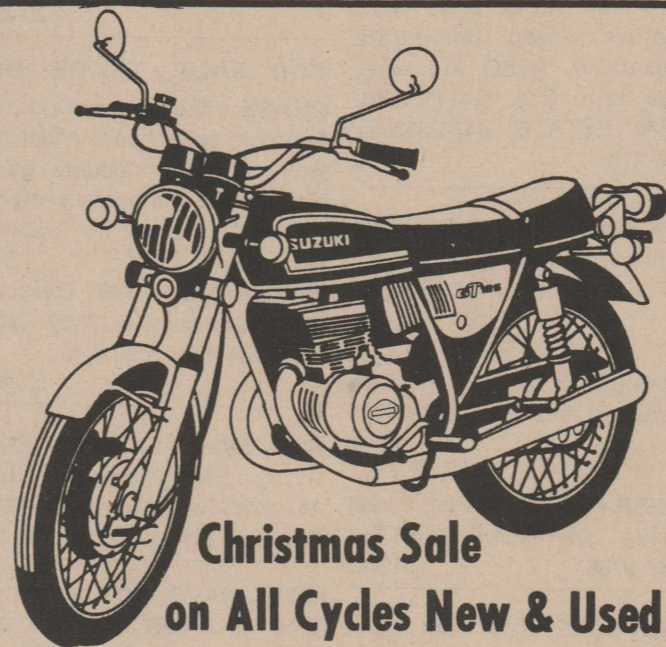
effects on the public sector, the local tax structure, and the community's facilities and services. Mallett says adjustments are often necessary in the school system, water and sewer systems, highways, streets, transportation facilities, and fire and police services. If new public facilities or services are required by new development, the community should investigate whether increased tax revenues will be sufficient to offset increased costs. "To seek additional economic

development is a local decision, but several agencies stand ready to assist both before and after the decision is made," points out Mallett. "These agencies include the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System, Texas Industrial Commission, Texas Department of Community Affairs, Farmers Home Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture, and other federal, state and regional organizations."

If married, each spouse's income is treated separately whether or not you file a joint return. Each spouse individually sets up their own retirement plan.

For example, a husband earns \$12,000 and puts the maximum \$1,500 into his plan while the wife earns \$5,000 and puts 15% or \$750 into her plan. Between them, \$2,250 of their combined income is tax exempt. If the wife's income increases to exceed \$10,000, she could then also put in the maximum \$1,500, and between them \$3,000 of their combined income would be tax exempt. Naturally, you can put in less than the maximum allowed. If one spouse has a retirement plan at their job which makes him or her ineligible, the other spouse is not affected.

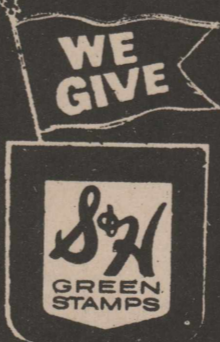

## Change in Certified Seed Labeling Law

COLLEGE STATION—Farmers buying certified seed to plant their 1977 crop should pay particular attention to the labels on the seed bag—there's been a change.

"Certified seed sold after January 1 next year must bear two labels—one certifying the variety and the other indicating a number of seed quality factors," points out Dr. Robert B. Metzger, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Whereas in the past, seed was certified for both variety and quality factors, the certification now pertains only to the genetic identity of the seed. However, since the Texas seed law still requires that seed quality information be truthfully stated, an analysis label will tell the farmer such things as purity, inert matter, other crop seed, weed seed, noxious weed seed and germination," notes the Texas A&M University System specialist. "The fact that the seed is certified has nothing to do with these particular factors."

Metzger explains the new certification labeling this way. "Take cottonseed, for example. TAMCOT SP37 sold as certified seed must bear a

label (blue in color) that indicates that the seed is indeed the SP37 variety. The certification label will show net weight, kind and variety and who produces the seed, but nothing on quality factors. A second label on the seed bag will list the various quality factors mentioned above and will tell the farmer the percentage that the seed contains, such as the percent of weed seed.

"The main thing for farmers to remember when buying certified seed for the 1977 crop is to look at both labels on the seed bag," emphasizes Metzger. "Both labels must be checked to get the complete story on the seed."

The change in seed certification standards in Texas came about recently in an effort to assure a more dependable supply of certified seed and to give seedmen more flexibility in producing seed for different markets, explains the specialist. The change also establishes uniformity with the Federal Seed Act and encourages international seed trade.

Seed that is certified for genetic identity has been produced and processed under standards and procedures

The other label on the seed bag gives specific information on various quality factors that farmers need to know in selecting their seed.

"All the information that farmers need is on the two seed bag labels," contends Metzger.

The Sheriff's Department has the responsibility of enforcing all city ordinances and they are empowered to destroy those dogs or cats not wearing a tag.

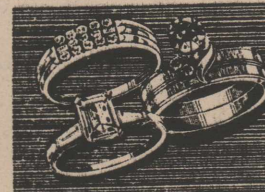

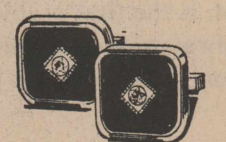

## Let's Back the Childress Bobcats to a Championship

This particular part of the southeast Panhandle and southwestern Oklahoma seems to be in a cycle in which it is producing championship football teams. Part are out of the running but they did a fine job.

## Coal: Ultimate Solution

Within a few decades at most, the world's supply of petroleum will be near enough to depletion to make remaining reserves too expensive for any use except in petrochemicals. However, the world has a 200-year supply of coal languishing underground. Why isn't feverish activity under way to find new uses for this fossil fuel?

Nobody has the answer, although "American has no choice; coal must be developed as an energy source," according to a University of Texas scientist. Dr. Michael Leesly, assistant professor of chemical engineering, said problems involved in making better use of coal "are institutional and environmental. At every step of the way, we can find problems. We just have to decide what to do."

The greatest single obstacle, lack of commitment to coal, is the easiest to surmount, in the view of Dr. Charles Groat, acting director of the Bureau of Economic Geology at UT-Austin. Groat also cited an immediate barrier to fuller use of coal, transportation. Railroads are an efficient interim method of transportation, but other solutions such as slurry pipelines are seen as the ultimate carrier for coal.

Predictions are that the railroads don't have the capacity to expansion of coal transportation, but this discounts advances in scheduling, loading and unloading techniques and other breakthroughs in railroad efficiency which are likely.

Chances are that ultimately a combination of railroad and slurry pipeline transportation will be operating at capacity to deliver coal for processing into a natural gas and gasoline substitute.

Lack of federal policy, closely akin to lack of commitment, is the first problem that should be attacked. Public awareness is the most direct route to a federal policy and commitment to solving this problem.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Comptroller Bob Bullock has predicted the 65th Legislature will have available to it 34 per cent more money — \$2.9 billion more — when it convenes in January than did the last legislature.

The Comptroller unveiled his revised estimate to legislators and other state officials attending the LBJ School of Public Affairs Pre-Session Conference in Austin.

Bullock said a "boom in the Texas economy" was the reason his office had increased the estimate of general revenue cash surplus to \$949.4 million. "That's how much money will be in the till on Aug. 31, 1977, the last day of the current biennium," Bullock said.

"I'm not saying the 65th Legislature will have \$2.9 billion more to spend," Bullock stressed. "The legislators make those decisions. They can use the money for new programs, for expanding existing ones, for a capital reserve fund or they can return some of it to Texans in the form of tax cuts."

He said a dramatic rise in tax collections — led by the sales tax, up nearly 17 per cent over last year, the motor vehicle tax, up 33 per cent, the franchise tax, up 28 per cent and the inheritance tax, up 22 per cent — prompted the increased estimate.

### Swine Flu Booster

The federal government, which initially ruled that everyone should get a swine flu shot, has now determined that all persons under 25 years of age will need a second shot — a booster.

The booster shot recommendation was included in a bulletin received by the Department of Health Resources from the Public Health Service Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices.

State Health Department officials said the booster shots should be taken by persons in the under-25 age group no earlier than four weeks after the first dose was taken. "If it's earlier than that, it won't do a

thing," an Austin physician said.

### Paternity Suits

State Welfare Department officials estimate as much as \$12 million could be returned to the state treasury in 1977 if fathers of welfare children were required to pay for their support.

The first batch of potentially hundreds of paternity suits have been filed in Travis County. Thousands of other cases will be filed statewide.

Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell said at least half of the 95,000 Aid to Families with Dependent Children cases in Texas are women with children who have been deserted.

### Job to Pay Less

State senators have decided to pay considerably less — in the \$19,000 to \$25,000 range — to replace Senate Secretary Charles Schnabel who announced several weeks ago he will not seek reelection to the job he has held for 24 years. Schnabel's current salary is \$37,500 a year.

He pleaded guilty to an official misconduct charge Sept. 16, after which five felony indictments against Schnabel were dismissed.

The screening committee which will interview applicants for the job will first meet on Dec. 14. Over 100 applications for Schnabel's job have been received.

### Hill Goes to Mexico

Atty. Gen. John Hill was in Mexico City last week as a guest of the committee for the inauguration of the new Mexican president, Jose Lopez Portillo.

While in Mexico, Hill held a conference with Pedro Ojeda Paullada, attorney general of Mexico, to discuss mutual problems, including the recently-signed prisoners' exchange treaty.

### Carter Eyes Armstrong

Political observers say Texas Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong is being carefully "checked out" by President-elect Jimmy Carter's talent scouts.

An Austin political writer says routine checks on

Armstrong are being made from Washington and Atlanta.

Possible areas of assignment for Armstrong include the Department of Transportation and the Interior Department.

### AG Opinions

Atty. Gen. John Hill has ruled that employees of a county hospital have automatically become members of the Texas County and District Retirement System when they become county employees, if the county was already a participant in the system and the county commissioners court took no action to exclude hospital employees.

Hospital employees who have become members of the system must remain members and cannot receive membership credit from another state or county retirement system for the same service.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

The Texas constitution provides a procedure for forfeiting vehicles to the state when the vehicles have altered identification numbers and the owners are unknown and cannot be located. However the state must plead and prove final deposition of the charge in order to receive valid legal title to a vehicle forfeited under the statute.

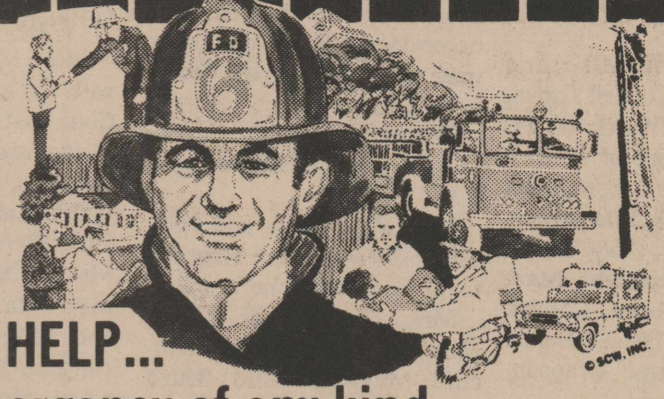

## Cotton Trading Still Moderate

Trading on the local market remained moderate this week according to T.J. Proske, in charge of the Memphis, Texas Cotton Classing Office. Supplies of new crop cotton continued to increase as weather conditions remained generally favorable to harvesting. Local prices dropped during the week, especially on spotted and tinged grades. By Friday, prices for spots averaged 2800 to 2900 points over the loan and prices for tinges averaged 2700 points over the loan. Last week similar grades brought 3300 to 3400 points over the loan. Light spotted and white cotton ranged from 3300 to 3500 points over the loan compared to 3450 to 3550 points last week. Physical prices for mixed lots ranged from 60.00 to 69.00 cents per pound with most falling in the 63.00 to 66.00 cent range. Growers received 95 to 100 dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

Approximately 34,000 samples were classed at Memphis for the week ending Friday, December 3, bringing the season's total to 88,000. Grade 32 predominated again comprising 24 percent of the total classed compared to 27 percent last week. Grade 42 made up 19 percent and grade

33 made up 17 percent. Staple 31 accounted for 54 percent compared to 46 percent last week, while staples 30 and 32 accounted for 22 percent and 21 percent respectively.

Micronaire readings were in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9 on 82 percent of the samples compared to 79 percent last week. Nine percent "miked" 3.4 and lower. Pressley results indicated that 91 percent of the samples tested had a breaking strength of 80,000 psi and above. Average for the week was 86,000 psi.
