Score of Persons Killed In Mid-West Tornadoes

(By International News Service)
UNDATED—A score of persons were killed and several hundred seriously injured according to reports received today, by terrific windstorms and tornadoes which swept the Middle West and South-east, according to International News Service. The heaviest toll of lives was taken at Rye Cove, Va., where a twister demolished a school building and wrecked other structures, killing 15 students and a male teacher. More than 150 persons were injured in this storm.

COLUMBUS, O., May 3.—Six persons gained their liberty when a tornado struck a wing of the city jail. Two prisoners were killed. One student was killed and several injured when the high school building at Woodville, Va., was demolished. Forty houses were reduced to masses of wreckage and 50 persons injured at Morgantown, W. Va. The outskirts of Jacksonville, Fla., were lashed by the storm and the result was two dead and 12 injured.

Senate Wrangles Over Parish Bill

AUSTIN, May 3.—The senate spent half the morning session today in an argument over the recommitment of the Parish measure limiting the net return of any county official to \$10,000 annually. The measure had been passed out favorably. After Chairman Wirtz of the committee, one of those wishing to have the bill recommitment, agreed to call a meeting of the state affairs committee for Monday, opponents to recommitting the bill acceded.

IOWA GIRL, SIXTEEN, HAS HAD TWENTY OPERATIONS

BRANDON, Ia., May 3.—Twenty operations, one a leg amputation, in four years, is the experience of Iris Zinsner, 16-year-old Brandon school girl.
Iris suffered from a bone infection, contracted in 1923 when she injured her knee. At first thought trivial, the injury grew worse until it affected the whole leg and necessitated its amputation.

The operation proved to be the first of a long series, most of which required bone replacements, long periods in hospitals, and convalescence which seemed only to develop new ailments.

Last June, though, Iris left the hospital for good, although she still reports every month for examination. But she goes to school and plays with the other youngsters.

"And that's the most important thing," says Iris.

NEGRO CONFESSES TO STEALING CHICKENS

FORT WORTH, May 3.—Fear of the "firing squad" led a young negro here to confess to stealing chickens. Chief of Detectives Jackson told the alleged offender "you will either tell the truth or face the firing squad."

"I'll confess, boss, if you won't shoot," declared the negro.

May Day Battles Rage in Germany

BERLIN, May 3.—At least 13 persons were killed in a series of clashes between the police and communists which began on the eve of May Day and terminated today with a violent battle in Neukölln, a suburb. The total wounded were 125. Police charged the rioters in Neukölln using hand grenades. The communists had erected barricades and vicious fighting took place.

First Steps Taken For the Fall Fair

J. D. Motley, secretary of the Runnels County Fair Association, will begin next week on the first work of the year in regard to the coming fair on October 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12.
Mr. Motley, with the assistance of R. E. White, superintendent of the school department of the fair, will visit every school in Runnels county on fair matters to advertise early the dates and create school displays. One of the features of the trip will be to give away season tickets in the schools. Mr. Motley plans to conduct a drawing at each school in the county where from five to 10 students will receive free season tickets to the fair this year. The number of tickets to be given away in each school will be determined by the enrollment but no school will receive less than five nor more than ten.

After the drawings are held Messrs. Motley and White will talk to the students and teachers in regard to school displays for the next fair. This work must be done at this season of the year as few rural schools are open at the time the fair is held. Mr. Motley figures that in addition to starting interest in the school department of the fair that many boys and girls club members will be reached on this trip and interest will be started with them.

This will be the first step towards advertising the 1929 fair. Later in the year the regular trade trip over this entire section of the country will be held and at that time community meetings will be started. The community meetings have been a big factor in getting exhibits and attendance at the Runnels County Fair. In these meetings J. D. Motley, C. W. Lehmburg and Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth have gone to meet with citizens of the communities and have helped them to select and plan their exhibits in the fair. Usually committees are appointed and at a date in advance of the fair all products are brought to one place and those to be used in the exhibit are selected and prepared for display.

Mr. Motley stated Friday morning that more early interest was being shown in regard to the fair than any previous year. Inquiries are being received almost daily about some department of the fair and entertainment people from all over the United States are seeking to book attractions here this fall.

The program committee has already held several meetings to accommodate advance men for entertainment companies and they state that no trouble will be experienced this year in securing one of the best programs that has ever been offered to patrons of this fair. One member stated that it would be an easy matter to arrange a complete change of program from anything ever seen here with the exception of the football games. This part of the program will be kept with Winters and Ballinger meeting some other strong teams of the newly created District 11 on Wednesday and Friday during the fair. Other games may be arranged as football card to the fair during afternoons.

The executive committee will be called together soon by the president and secretary to go over final plans and to name all committees, community chairmen and others who are appointed each year.

Highway Finished South of Hatchel

Construction work on Highway No. 30 north of Ballinger has passed Hatchel and Thursday afternoon was about one-quarter of a mile south heading towards Ballinger. The giant mixer is running steadily and only a few short delays have been occasioned by inclement weather.

State Engineer Garrett stated Friday morning that beginning next Monday all travel would be routed over the Pumphrey road until they were west of Hatchel with the pavement. At that place is a well travelled road that cuts back east to Hatchel. On the middle stretch of the highway construction there will not be a detour along the side of the road open to the public as it is considered dangerous to travel on such a road at that point. The Pumphrey road will be travelled until the construction is completed and opened to the point south of Old Runnels where the old Winters road can be used as a detour.

Mr. Garrett stated that the new stretch of cement highway north of Hatchel would likely be opened for travel two weeks from Sunday. New cement is usually covered with burlap and dirt for a period of at least three weeks before allowing traffic to ply upon it.

Much interest is shown here in the west end of Highway No. 30. All the surveying, plans, etc., are at present filed with the State Highway Commission and it is hoped that a contract on this stretch of road will be let at the regular meeting in May.

Fight on Mellon Gets a Setback

WASHINGTON, May 3.—An effort to force Andrew W. Mellon out of the cabinet because of his large stock ownership in corporations suffered a setback today when it was learned that three democrats who served as secretary of the treasury under Wilson all owned stock. William G. McAdoo, Ararat and Glass all owned corporation securities while they were holding office as secretary of the treasury. The question of whether their holdings made them ineligible to hold the treasury post under the 100-year-old law which forbids a secretary of the treasury "being interested in or carrying on the business of trade or commerce" was never raised.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—A demand for congressional investigation to prevent the purchase of privately owned newspapers by the so-called power trust, possibly by excluding such publications from the mails, is spreading today with the senate insurgent bloc leading the way. Senator Norris declared the public utilities, revealed as having bought stock in a dozen different newspapers, "were slowly poisoning the source of information for the American people."

Fall is now in New Mexico.

Emerald Charms For the Month of May

"You may have riches,
I'm content with less.
Fame is not vital
To me, I confess.
You may have them both—
I'll take happiness!"



If you were born in the month of May the emerald is your birthstone, and, according to ancient wisdom, the wearing of this gem should bring you your heart's desire, for it is the emblem of true love and happiness.

The emerald belongs to Venus, which is also the ruling planet of many May people, but because of its pure, deep green color, symbolical of early spring and eternal youth, its vibrations are on a spiritual plane rather than the material one usually associated with this goddess. Not only does it favor love in its most sacred, idealistic form, but at one time it was popularly supposed to turn pale at infidelity, as is shown in the old verse:

"It is a gem which hath the power to show
If plighted lovers keep their troth or no;
If faithless, it is like the leaves of spring."

If faithless, like those leaves when withering."

Besides its sensitiveness in this respect, the emerald has also been credited with the power to foretell events, being greatly cherished by all the early Magi for this purpose. In fact, it was claimed that they could do nothing with their magic if an emerald, with its acute sympathy with the occult, were in the hands of the opposing side. Hence, it became known as the "Gem of Intuition," and as late as the seven-

teenth century an emerald device was in fashion having much the same properties as the modern ouija board.

This consisted of an emerald ring which was held suspended over a water-filled bowl, the edges of which were marked by letters of the alphabet. As the string swayed back and forth in the hands of the operator, the emerald set various letters, thus spelling out the answers to questions. Such a bowl, easily constructed at home, would make an interesting novelty for a May birthday party, featuring in the color scheme of the table decorations and favors, the emerald birthstone.

Prized by all ages, the emerald, which is the most distinguished member of the beryl family, has always been extremely rare, and incidentally, a flawless emerald is considered a phenomenon, since the stone is soft when it is taken from the earth and hardens only by exposure to the air. Perhaps it is just as well for this day's emerald addicts that for centuries several emerald mines known to the ancients, including the famous mines of Cleopatra, were lost, for the demand for this gem in recent years has been such as to tax these re-discovered sources of supply to the utmost. Emeralds still come from Egypt and the once-lost In-



dian mines of Bogota, but the Ural Mountains of Russia have lately become the chief resource of jewelers.

K. C. to Get Air Line Direct to the Coast

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 3.—The opening of a St. Louis-Kansas City-Omaha air mail and passenger service by the Universal Aviation Corporation, which has been announced for May 1, will give Kansas City its first direct air mail connection with the Pacific Coast.

Heretofore it has been necessary to send mail to Chicago by way of the National Air Transport, Inc., and there it has been rerouted for the West.

Under the new system air mail planes will leave Kansas City at 10:15 o'clock in the morning and will reach Omaha in time to connect with the planes of the Boeing Aircraft corporation, which operates a Chicago-San Francisco mail route, at 1 o'clock.

The mail will arrive in San Francisco at 4:30 o'clock the next morning, giving Kansas City a service of less than 24 hours with that city.

The Boeing corporation has announced it will add day planes to its present night service from the West, which will permit the delivery of air mail in Kansas City several hours earlier than has heretofore been done.

After the establishment of the new Universal route, Kansas City will become the clearing house for all air mail from Texas and other Southern points. Mail brought here by the N. A. T. lines from the South will be separated and that designated for western points will be transferred to the Universal planes and carried to Omaha.

American Made Talkies Hit by London Critics

LONDON, May 3.—American talking pictures have scored an unprecedented success in England, but many improvements will have to be made in them before they meet with the approval of the movie critics of the London newspapers.

Much as in the United States, the opinions of the theatrical and movie critics here are widely read, but they rarely if ever have any bearing upon the ultimate success or failure of the productions which are discussed.

In the case of the "talkies," the critics on the London newspapers have had a lot of fun at the expense of Hollywood, but in almost every case they have been forced to admit that in spite of derogatory criticism, the pictures have managed to draw the crowds.

The principal criticism launched against the present crop of talkies from Hollywood concerns the American accent which is so noticeable in the films. The films which have starred Clive Brook and William Powell have been favorably commented upon because of these actors' British accent, but in almost every other case, the critics have poked fun mercilessly at the Americanisms with which the pictures bristled.

Following the premiere of one super-talky here, almost every critic commented on the line spoken by one of the actors, when he told the leading lady that she "spoke perfect English."

"As not one of the actors or actresses had spoken anything even nearly approaching 'perfect' English throughout the entire film," one critic declared, "the audience was justified in bursting into hysterics when this ingenuously uttered line was spoken."

The critics are unanimously agreed that the English people want talkies made with British voices, but so far the producing concerns here have been slow about getting around to make them.

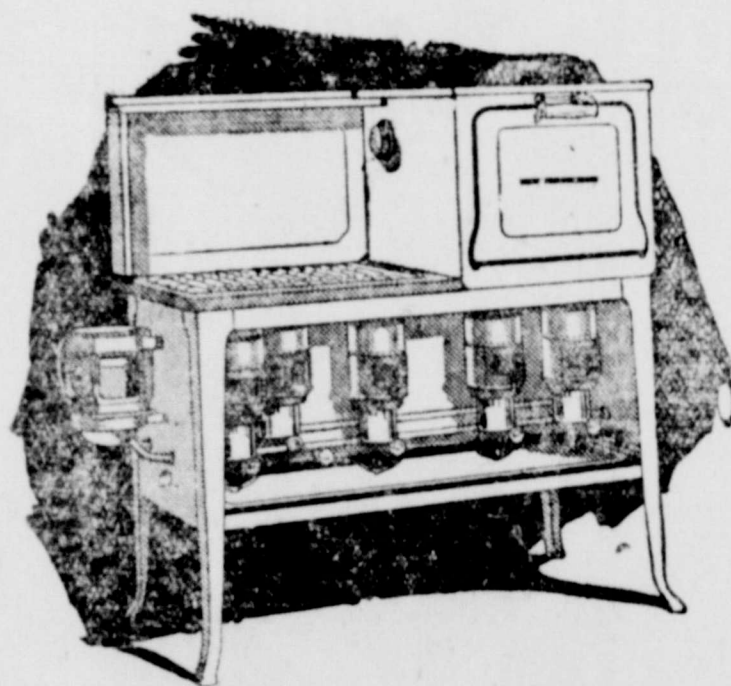

White Way of Nogales is Dim Due to Revolt

NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, May 3.—The grim shadow of revolution has darkened the once-glamorous splendor of Nogales' Little White Way.

Oh, yes, this border community of 16,000 souls did have its White Way before that fateful day on March 3 last when General Manuel Aguirre seized control of Sonora in the name of the revolution.

Comparable to some of the big American cities' classiest night clubs, at least eight cabarets flourished here before the heavy voice of revolt stifled their gaiety. Where once these pleasure haunts rang with syncopated merriment and the happy shouts of Gringo boys, all is dark and desolate now.

All that is, except the Cosmopolitan Club, sole survivor of the rebel storm.

The last to close its doors was the Palais Royale, or Aztec Club, as it was popularly known, a commodious place de nuit. Shortly before this, Luck of business had padlocked the Club Royal, a lavishly constructed joy-house, the project of a well-known Hollywood night club proprietress.

In this graveyard of the cafes still stands the Cosmopolitan, bravely breasting the winds of insurrection. Somewhat pathetic, nevertheless, are the bawling notes of its jazz orchestra, the mellow beatings of its blues singers, the listless movements of its white-clad waiters.

The demise of the night clubs is attributed to heavy assessments imposed by insurgent authorities and the sudden slackening of American trade.

Together with Chinese merchants, cabarets and bars were perhaps the most acute sufferers at the hands of the rebel tax collectors. Often arbitrary and irregular, the taxes usually are collected in the forms of "loans," cutting deeply into the profits and in some instances eliminating all revenue above operating costs.

But even this difficulty could have been overcome, had it not been for the sudden interruption of the flow of traffic across the boundary from the United States. For the thirsty Americans were

and still are, for that matter, the vital factor in Nogales' night life.

Still there are plenty of Americans, whose Volsteadian aridity will not permit them to fear the hazards of musket nor cannon nor to talk at the necessity of obtaining special visas from insurgent immigration officials. From all parts of the United States, but especially from the cities of Arizona and California, a stream of dry-docked Americans trickle across the border nightly to slake thirsts with glittering glasses of tequila, cerveza, habanera, cognac, champagne or just plain Scotch whisky. Drinking, dancing, chatting, laughing, the gay, pale-faced foreigners continue to pour their dollars into the coffers of the Cosmopolitan, while just a few blocks away the shrill cry of a bugle summons a contingent of hard-featured fighting men to a new front.

NEW STAR SYSTEM IS STUDIED BY ASTRONOMERS

(By International News Service)

BERKELEY, Calif., May 3.—Two stars which the naked eye appear in the heavens as a single point of light, have been found by University of California astronomers to be approximately a billion miles apart.

The stars are known collectively as "99 Hercules," a star system with a sun about as large as that which shines on the earth. One period of revolution requires 56 years to complete.

Maud Makemson, research assistant in the department of astronomy, estimates that "99 Hercules" is 1,114,800,000,000 miles from the earth. The stars, she said, will closely approach each other in 1943.

Construction has started on Hamlin's large lake, and the site for the big iron reservoir has been cleared. Digging of the ditch and laying of the main to town is under way. This lake will hold sufficient water to furnish a city of 25,000 people, and supply Hamlin three years if necessary, without rain.

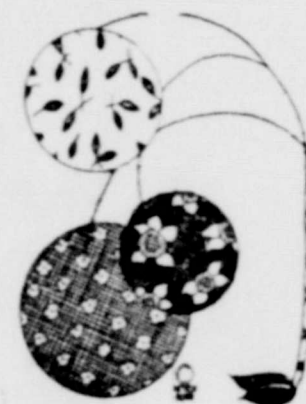
