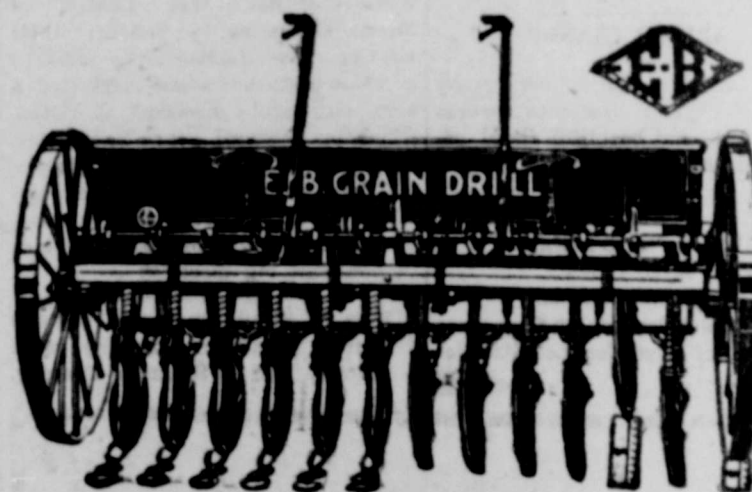

Fire Insurance On Grain in Field

As harvest time approaches and grain ripens, there comes a danger that crops will catch on fire (from trains, tramps, harvest hand, cigarettes, pipes, thrashing-machines, lightning and numerous other causes) and that whole crops will be partially destroyed.

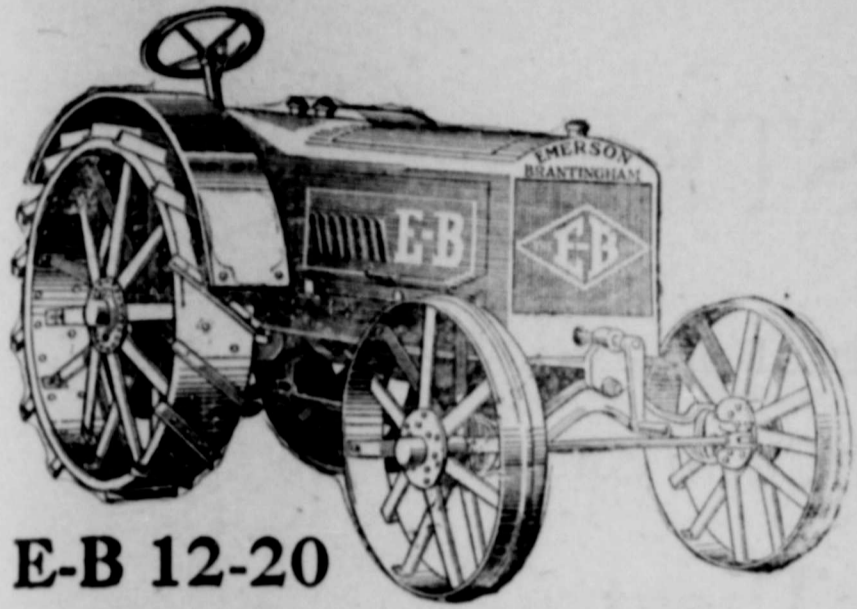

SUMMER FOODS.

A good emergency dessert or salad may be made with any good gelatine jelly as a basis.

Lemon jelly is especially good. Try it with this one: Arrange some lemon jelly, a teaspoonful or two of peaches cut in quarters, a

spoonful of orange marmalade and a tablespoonful of pineapple preserve with a little of its juice to top the sherbet cup. Whipped cream may be added if one has it, but it is good without. Some of the same lemon jelly may be used as a salad with fish at some other meal. Serve it on head lettuce with a rich mayonnaise. Peanuts are nice sprinkled over the top of such a salad.

Creamed Onions With Parsley.—Cook even-sized onions in boiling water, adding salt as they are nearly cooked. Melt three tablespoonfuls of butter, add the same amount of flour for half a dozen onions, a half teaspoonful of salt and a little less of paprika, stir until well blended, then add a cupful of rice milk and half a cupful of the liquor in which the onions were cooked; serve poured over the onions and sprinkle with finely minced parsley.

Lamb Stew With Peas.—Take a shoulder cut, cover with boiling water and cook until tender, thicken with flour stirred with some of the meat liquor, add a pint of green peas and cook until the peas are tender. Season well and serve the meat on a platter surrounded with the peas.

Now is the time to put up the small fruits, crushing until well mashed and mixing with an equal amount of sugar. Stir until the sugar is all dissolved, then can in sterile jars. Set on the cellar bottom or in the ice chest where they will keep cool.

Grape Nectar.—Put a cupful of sugar with a quart of water over to boil. Cook ten minutes, cool, then add the juice of three lemons, two oranges, one-half can of pineapple and a pint of grape juice. Let stand about three hours then serve iced with thinly sliced orange on top of each glass.

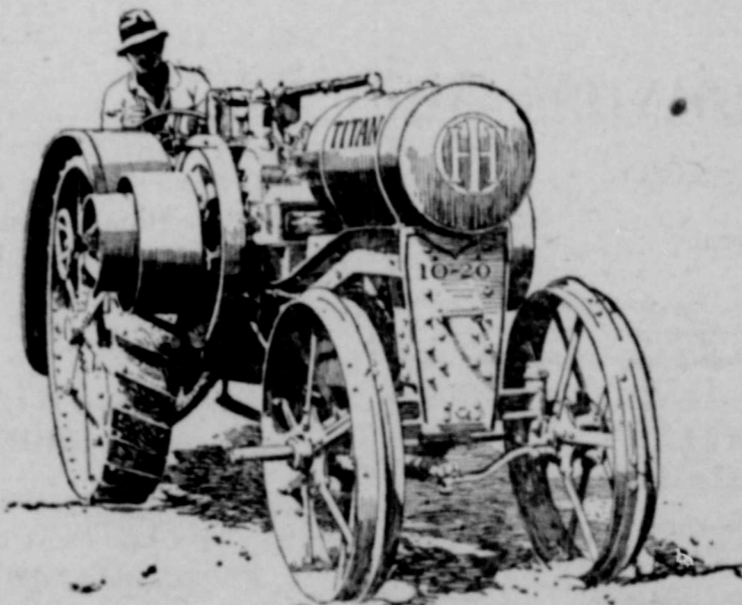

NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the old Paradise Schoolhouse, within the Huntoon Independent School District, on the 30th day of August, 1921, to determine whether the bonds of said district shall be issued to the amount of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, payable twenty years from their date and bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, for the purpose of making permanent repairs on and constructing an addition to the public free school building within said district, of wood material, said building so to be repaired and to which said addition is to be constructed, being constructed of wood material, and also for the purpose of equipping said building so repaired and the addition to be constructed thereto, and whether there shall be annually levied, assessed and collected on the taxable property in said district for the current year and annually thereafter, while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay the principal at maturity.
