

Herter Says Ike Should Continue Plan For Trip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Christian A. Herter said today President Eisenhower should go ahead with his plans to visit Japan June 19.

Herter told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that despite demonstrations in Japan against the visit, "under existing circumstances, the President's plans ought to remain unchanged."

Herter expressed this view in response to a question from Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa). The secretary told the senators that he would prefer to make any further comment in a closed session.

Herter was before the committee to urge Senate ratification of the new U.S.-Japanese treaty which he said will strengthen the fabric of international peace and security.

Chairman J. William Fulbright said the open hearing on the treaty would be followed by a closed session on questions that were not proper for public discussion.

TIPRO Import Plea To Get Consideration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under Secretary of the Interior Elmer Bross has promised to give consideration to recommendations concerning the oil import program made by the Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners Assn.

TIPRO's recommendations were contained in a letter from its president, John Hurd of Austin. They analyzed points raised at a meeting here May 16.

They included a proposed change in the base used by the Bureau of Mines in computing total demand and the abandonment of the policy under which far western states are treated differently from the area east of the Rocky Mountains.

The result, Hurd wrote, would be "a general reduction in imports." Hurd said that at the May meeting 16 oil producer associations in 15 states contended the import program had failed to achieve recognized objectives.

He said the basis for the demand estimate by the Bureau of Mines includes estimates of demand for such items as export of crude and oil products—shipments to Puerto Rico and the far west, gasoline and kerosene and other products including asphalt.

Mamie Not Going With Ike On Trip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower, hospitalized with asthmatic bronchitis, will not accompany the President on his Far Eastern tour.

Announcing this today, the White House reported that the first lady is "getting along very nicely." She entered Walter Reed Army Hospital for treatment last Wednesday.

Prior to the hospitalization, the White House said, Mrs. Eisenhower was planning to go along with the President on a tour which originally included 10 days in Russia.

Social Premier Nikita Khrushchev canceled the invitation to visit the Soviet Union after an American spy plane was downed in his country May 1.

On the way, he also will visit Alaska and Hawaii.

The President plans to leave Sunday on a two-week trip which will take him to the Philippines, Formosa, Japan, Korea, and Okinawa.

In reply to questions, Mrs. Eisenhower said she did not know when Mrs. Eisenhower will leave the hospital.

Runway Strike Talked

TOKYO (AP) — Radical students today threatened a sit-down strike on the runways of Tokyo's International Airport June 19 in an effort to block the arrival of President Eisenhower for a four-day state visit.

A spokesman for a pro-Communist faction of the Zengakuren student Federation said the runway sit-down might be employed depending on the circumstances.

Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi discussed the students' threat at a meeting with the national public safety and army directors and the labor minister.

A spokesman for the labor unions that Eisenhower's visit he canceled or postponed as an expression of Japanese opposition to the new U.S.-Japan military security treaty.

"I have no intention of changing the schedule of the President's visit," Kishi reportedly told a Cabinet meeting.

Fujiyama told a news conference Eisenhower's proposal "would be a stain on our national honor."

Kishi also ordered the government and police forces to take steps to stop leftist demonstrations before the U.S. Embassy. He appealed to newspaper publishers to support the government in its efforts to insure a friendly welcome for the President.

The students federation said even if it did not stage the airport sit-down, it would bring out 30,000 members on June 19 to demonstrate at the airport and at the U.S. Embassy against Eisenhower's arrival.

The leftist labor federation Sohyo is planning to turn out more thousands wearing black mourning armbands and carrying black flags.

Kishi's Liberal-Democratic party majority in the lower house of Parliament pushed through ratification of the security treaty on May 20 after seven hours of violent physical clashes with the Socialists. The ratification automatically takes effect June 19.

On the day Eisenhower arrives, unless treaty ratification is approved, the force dissolution of the Socialists in Parliament.

In an effort to whip up enough public sentiment to force dissolution of the Socialists, the Liberal party chairman Inejiro Asanuma, Eisenhower's visit from the control Democrats appealed to the Socialists to agree to a 10-day delay validation of the treaty.

The Socialists said they would accept a recess only as a prelude to resignation of Kishi's government.

San George A. Aiken (R-Vt.) took a different view. He said in a separate interview, that only a minor percentage of the Japanese people are opposed to the treaty and a lesser percentage to the President's visit.

"I think the decision probably should be left to the Japanese government," Aiken said. "If the President doesn't go it will provide new propaganda for Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev."

He said the Japanese government reiterated Monday there are no plans to postpone Eisenhower's visit.

Fulbright and Aiken said they would not support the treaty's ratification if the treaty, which was signed here earlier this year.

The pact, replacing one signed after World War II, is designed to give Japan added recognition of an equal rather than a conquered nation and to provide for mutual defense arrangements.

But Japanese Socialists and others have protested, particularly a provision continuing U.S. bases on Japanese soil for at least 10 more years, although the present treaty permits their indefinite.

Student riots and other demonstrations have been staged in Japan.

Firm To Build Barricades On Padre Island Property

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) — A land and cattle company said today it will build barricades at three points along the beach at Padre Island to fence its property.

The company said it did not consider the barricades a defiance of the state's new "open beach" law.

The barricades, one of which will have a gate to permit control of all traffic, will be erected by the Padre Island Land and Cattle Co. which owns most of the island property inside Nueces County.

A 24-hour guard will be on duty at the gate to allow passage of authorized vehicles as well as private vehicles whose passengers sign a statement releasing the company from any liability for damages.

"We don't mind the public using the beaches," M. E. Allison, officer of the company said. "It is just that we don't want to be held liable for any damages."

The Legislature enacted a law which declared the beaches belonged to the people of the state. It defined the public beach as that area "from mean low tide to the vegetation line."

Allison said that although state law and a court suit at Galveston involve whether beaches in some areas of the state must remain open to the public, the company's beach on Padre Island in Nueces County are not involved.

"The multiple bounces for one purpose but not for another may be helpful in cases where private property fronts on the ocean," Wilson said.

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Johnson On 'Today' Show

NEW YORK (AP) — Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Texas) appeared today on Dase Garroway's "Today" show and was asked if he is a candidate for the presidential nomination.

The Senate majority leader answered: "I have said the same thing repeatedly that I have said publicly, that is, that I have not announced my candidacy."

He said he would like to be able to answer the question, "Am I a candidate?" in the affirmative. But since I am the majority leader of the Senate, my duties require me to be in the Senate most of the time between now and convention. I don't feel that it would be proper for me to shirk my duties leave my job here."

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Picket Lines Virtually Halt All Activity At Atlas Bases

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Union picket lines virtually halted activity today at bases that set out to launch the Atlas—the United States' powerful counterpunch in case of war.

The Atlas, only operational long-range U.S. missile, still could be fired in an emergency from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., the only base with combat-ready Atlas facilities.

But the strike, by a comparatively few key technicians against the Atlas division of General Dynamics Corp., stopped or crippled construction of new Atlas launching sites.

because large scale strikes are too costly. Five bases were idled when many other union workers refused to cross the Atlas picket lines.

They were Vandenberg AFB, where war-ready pads and canisters are being readied; a nearby missile plant; Cape Canaveral, Fla., the Atlas missile range that recently to the tip of Africa in a test shot; Warren AFB, Wyo., and Offutt AFB, Neb., where Atlas launch pads are near completion.

Holloman AFB, N.M., where long-range Atlas missiles are being assembled, is the only Atlas launch site in the United States. The strike—first major work stoppage in the aircraft-missile industry—had serious overtones. A tie-up of a majority of the Atlas division's plants could result, if day,

other strikes follow the IAM walk-out. The union asks a 14-cent hourly wage boost and fringe benefits. Convair's offer of an 11-cent hourly raise and a 3-cent cost-of-living hike. The wage scale now ranges from \$1.79 to \$3.30 an hour.

Reports from the bases said upwards of 5,200 workers were idle. The union said it had no exact figures, but termed the strike "effective."

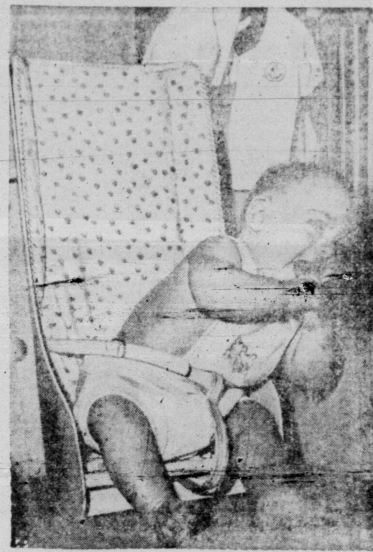

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Figures On Junket Revealed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep Robert Chipperfield (R-Ill.) and an aide spent \$1,358.23 obtained from U. S. embassies during a 10-day study mission to Venezuela, El Salvador and Mexico in 1967, the Knight-Newsletters said today.

Travel and other expenses raised the trip's total cost to the taxpayers at least to \$2,446.02, the account added.

The copyright story by reporters Don Oberdorfer and Walter Pincus said details of the trip's expenses came to light because the U. S. embassies in those countries had no counterpart funds in local currencies on hand.

Counterpart funds are foreign currencies normally obtained under foreign aid programs and held by the United States overseas.

The article called the case unusual only because "it provides the public for the first time a picture of how a congressman draws down foreign currency from American embassies and spends it overseas."

Under the mutual security law, congressmen with a letter from their committee chairman can draw on counterpart funds.

Normally congressmen spending such overseas money have to make only the most sketchy sort of reports on where it went and even these reports, which are often extremely informal, are never made available to the public, the story said.

Instead, the story said, the counterpart spending reports are consolidated by congressional committees before they are published "so no taxpayer can tell what any one lawmaker drew out and expended."

In the case of the Chipperfield trip, the story said, the embassies in the three countries bought local currencies with American dollars to give to Chipperfield's party, since no counterpart funds were on hand.

Wage Offer Is Expected

STOCKTON, Calif. (AP)—An AFL-CIO organizer predicts San Joaquin Valley fruit growers soon will make a wage offer to prevent multimillion-dollar crop losses due to picketing.

"I believe an offer is an inevitable as crops ripening," Norman Smith, director of the AFL-CIO Agricultural Workers Organizing Committee, headquarters here, said.

Union pickets at peach ranches are demanding \$1.25 an hour minimum. Field workers average \$1 an hour.

Fruit is ripening in the warm late spring weather. One farm which held out against picket lines reported three-fourths of a \$300,000 cherry crop would be written off.

Picketing began last Friday. Smith said the AFL-CIO was attempting to make the San Joaquin Valley a base for expansion of its activities across the country.

Kiss Is Blamed For Auto Crash

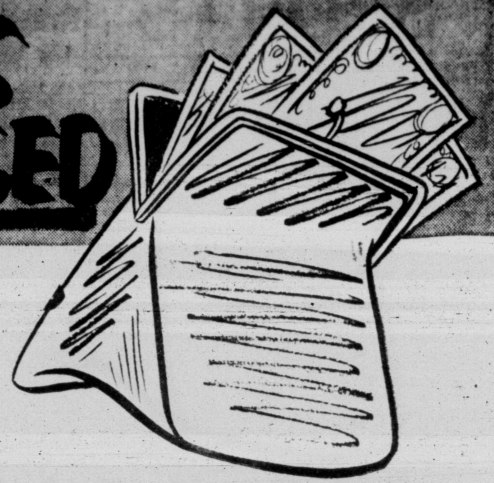

Panel Hearings To Set Stage For Lively Convention

AUSTIN (AP) — Three significant committee hearings Monday should provide all the stimulus needed for another rousing, chaotic State Democratic Convention the following day.

The State Democratic Executive Committee will meet Monday and then send out sub-committees on credentials, resolutions and order of convention business.

The Credentials Committee, headed by Henderson's Dean Turner, will hear contests from seven counties representing 37 per cent of the convention strength.

Several issues could wreck the Texas "unity" and send a rump delegation to the national convention in Los Angeles next month to the embarrassment of presidential hopeful Sen Lyndon Johnson.

SDEC officials believe a test on the loyalty oath question will come first at the convention. The AFL-CIO and the liberal faction of the party want delegates to take a loyalty pledge before being admitted to the convention.

One SDEC official said even if the majority surrenders to the liberals on the loyalty issue the liberals would come up with another—such as the endorsement of Mrs. R.D. Randolph of Houston for another term as Democratic national committee woman.

Speaker Sam Rayburn, Gov. Price Daniel, SDEC Chairman J.E. Connally and others in the controlling moderate-conservative element feel strongly that the Houston woman must be replaced.

Daniel repeatedly has underlined the SDEC's program which calls for support of all nominees of the party, local, state and national.

Johnson says he is confident the Texas delegation to California will return and work for the party. But Mrs. Randolph and her labor friends claim the present party leadership is not loyal enough. She recalls that Daniel and other Democrats helped to President Eisenhower in 1952.

Sammy Davis Set To Wed Blonde Swede

LONDON (AP)—Sammy Davis Jr. says he and blonde movie actress Mai Britt plan to raise a large family and he doesn't care if the children are "polka dot."

The 3-foot-6-inch Negro entertainer and the 5-foot-2 Swedish actress told a news conference Monday night they plan to marry after her divorce from American actor Eddie Greason becomes final Sept. 28. Davis conceded some people won't approve of the interracial match.

"I'm liable to prejudice every time I walk out of the front door. But I'm not shaking in my shoes about my career. If it's so flimsy that it could be ruined by marriage, then it's not worth having."

Miss Britt is 24. Davis 34. Davis was married to Loray White, a Negro singer, in 1958 and divorced a few months later. Last November he announced his engagement to Joan Stuart, a 21-year-old white Canadian dancer. Her parents objected on racial and religious grounds.

Miss Britt's father arrived from Sweden Monday to meet his prospective son-in-law, who is filling a night club engagement. He told her he liked her very much, Davis said.

The entertainer added that his family in Los Angeles and Miss Britt "get along unbelievably well together."

Davis is a convert to the Jewish faith, but Miss Britt said she would remain a Protestant.

He walked into the basement beer cooler of a lower East Side tavern.

Partner Is Ambushed By Doctor

ELIZABETH N.J. (AP)—An angry doctor took revenge for the loss of his job Monday by killing a former associate and firing several shots at his one-time senior partner.

Police said Dr. Anthony Ruvolo, 37, had a shotgun ambush for two former partners serving him, after he had been dismissed from the medical group they had formed.

He ran down his quarry in the parking lot of St. Elizabeth's Hospital, killing Dr. Annunzio La Face, 45, the head of the group. Dr. Francis Merlo, 51, jumped over a 3-foot wall and ducked into an entrance to the hospital as Ruvolo fired wildly at him several times.

Ruvolo then threw aside his double-barreled shotgun and sped off in his sedan. A hospital employee told the license number and told police. They picked up Ruvolo 15 minutes later at a road block. "What's the trouble, officer?" they said he asked.

He was taken to headquarters for questioning and held on an open charge.

The three doctors, all anesthesiologists, had formed a partnership earlier this year. Merlo was the senior partner as well as the chief anesthesiologist at St. Elizabeth's and Alexian Brothers hospitals.

About a week ago, police said Merlo told Ruvolo he might be dropped from the partnership in a dispute over how to bill their patients.

Ruvolo made threats, a hospital source said. Monday Merlo ousted him from the partnership. The hospital where Ruvolo worked also said it no longer needed his services.

La Face, was married and had three children.

Ruvolo's wife and their three daughters are in Italy visiting relatives.

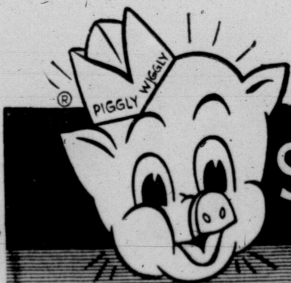

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FDA Probe Unit To Launch Work

WASHINGTON (AP)—A special investigating unit will start a probe this week into alleged wrongdoing in the Food and Drug Administration, Secretary of Welfare Arthur S. Flemming said today.

He told reporters the starting point will be testimony in the Senate drug hearings alleging that some FDA officials have been too friendly with the drug manufacturers they are supposed to police.

Flemming said a lawyer, a doctor and a trained investigator will head the unit.

His statements followed the windup Monday of Senate Anti-Fraud and Monopoly subcommittee hearings on financial affairs of Dr. Henry Welch.

Flemming ousted Welch on May 18 as director of the FDA anti-antibiotics division. Evidence was produced in the hearings that Welch received \$287,142 since 1953 from medical journal publishing ventures which did business with firms policed by Welch's division.

Flemming testified that the investigative unit will look into allegations from "any responsible source reflecting on the integrity of FDA employe actions."

He told newsmen he was deeply disturbed by testimony Thursday of Dr. Barbara Moulton, a former FDA official, that some of her former colleagues were far too friendly with drug manufacturers. She said this had resulted in some unsafe drugs going on the market.

Sabine Dam Considered

BATON ROUGE (AP)—The hope of financial help for a multi-million-dollar power and recreation project at Toledo Bend came before the Louisiana Legislature today.

Lawmakers of three west central parishes are backing the plan which also requires Texas help.

The proposed dam on the Sabine River, between Texas and Louisiana, already has been declared economically feasible.

Rep. Bert Adams introduced a constitutional proposal Monday to create the Sabine River Authority with power to incur debt and issue bonds.

Sponsors ask the state to lend the project three million dollars a year for five years, from oil and gas reserves. The state would be paid back from sale of water and electricity.

The project would create a source for hydroelectric power, furnish 252 billion gallons of fresh water for sale to municipalities and industry, and form a tremendous recreational area.

The dam would create a lake extending from west Leesville to Logansport, occupying parts of Newton, Sabine, Shelby and Panola counties in Texas.

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP)—John H. Rudy, 36, father of three children from nearby Rottsville, says he has quit a \$10,000-a-year job with the Radio Corporation of America to become a pastor of the Mennonite Church near Gettysburg, Pa. He will make \$1,300 a year in his new post.

"From the financial point of view it is foolish, but dealing with the spiritual needs of people is more important to me now," Rudy said Monday.

800 Airman Ready To Donate Blood

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP)—Eight hundred airmen volunteered to donate blood for a girl scheduled to undergo heart surgery at the University of Kansas Medical Center today.

Allen Coffman, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Coffman, Kansas City, has a rare blood type—A, RH positive with rare antibody factors that must be matched. The operation requires 13 units of blood. If the operation is not performed, doctors say, Allen will live only 60 days.

An appeal to Forbes Air Force Base at Topeka, Kan., was made after two Kansas City blood banks tested 1,000 persons and found only five with the correct blood type.

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Truman Says He Opposed Spy Planes

CHICAGO (AP)—A robust Harry S. Truman, harking back to his seven years in the White House, says he and Secretary of State Dean Acheson turned down a suggestion that the United States send spy planes over Soviet Territory.

"I didn't think it was right," he told newsmen Monday. "Espionage is a dirty business. I didn't want to be a part of it."

He said he and Acheson rejected the State Department idea in 1949 or 1950. Asked whether he made use of espionage information while president, Truman said, "I suppose so. Reports came to my desk about things that were going on."

Midland Man To Head Bar

AUSTIN (AP)—William Kerr, Midland attorney, has been chosen president-elect of the State Bar of Texas in a mail poll of the bar's members.

Kerr will take office in mid-1961, succeeding incoming president Paul Carrington of Dallas.

Joyce Cox, president of the Houston Bar Assn., was elected vice-president. Cox and Carrington will be installed at the close of the bar's annual convention in Houston June 28-July 2.

Members of the bar's board of the convention include W. A. Combs, Houston; Frank Jennings Jr., Graham; Charles Hale, Corpus Christi; E. H. McIlhennan, Westlaco; and J. E. Thompson, Pampa.

In the balloting, Kerr defeated Frank Husmyre of Orange.

Martelle McDonald, director-elect from Odessa, died Sunday before learning of his election. The resulting vacancy on the board of directors will be filled by appointment.

The New York Times quoted Acheson as saying in Washington that he advised Truman to reject the suggested use of spy planes "because I did not think the possible results justified the risks."

Acheson was quoted as adding that he did not think the equipment available at the time was adequate to the task.

Truman—76, ruddy and spry—soberly condemned the denunciations of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and chided unnamed Americans as he warned a large audience the world is "in serious trouble."

He told a gathering of book-sellers and publishers.

"The brutal and boorish tirade by Khrushchev directed at the person of the President of the United States has the sinister purpose of undermining the prestige of the office of the president in the eyes of the world."

He called the Khrushchev blasts

"an offense to the whole free world."

He added, "My instinctive reaction would incline me to be sympathetic of the occupant of the White House when he is involved in a conflict with a foreign power and under personal attack by that power."

Truman suggested that "certain people would be wise to avoid criticizing our country in a manner and language that would fortify Khrushchev in the belief that there is approval here for his devilish campaign to divide us."

He would not name the "certain people."

He hinted the American people "will pass judgment in due time—about the second Tuesday in November," in an allusion to the U2 incident and the failure of the summit conference.

He warned that "in the field of foreign policy there is no room for irresponsible talk—especially at a

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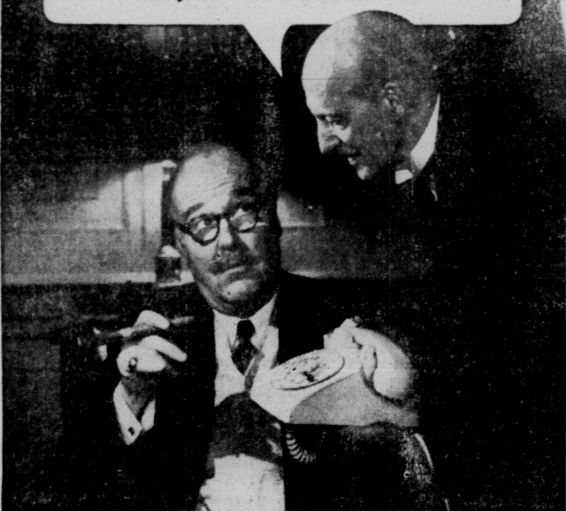
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
