



### Joe Hill, Member of Byrd Antarctic Expedition to Speak Here

"Joe Boy" Hill, youngest member of Admiral Richard E. Byrd's expedition to the icy regions of the South Pole, and the only West Texan ever to visit the Antarctic, will speak in Lamesa next Wednesday night, June 19, 8:30 o'clock at the High School Auditorium.

Young Hill, who is proving a popular speaker wherever he goes, is being brought to Lamesa by the Lamesa Boy Scouts, Troop 22, of which Joseph N. Spikes is scoutmaster. The local boys will receive a part of the proceeds. He is making a stop here just prior to beginning a lecture tour of the colleges of Texas.

Joe Hill will have with him pictures taken at Little America which will be shown on an improvised screen. He will also display equipment used by the men. Another feature of the program will be the appearance of Neeka, Malemute sled dog, given Joe by Admiral Byrd. Neeka went east with the party that explored Marie Byrd land.

Joe is the son of Dr. J. A. Hill, president of West Texas State Teachers College, Canyon, and is well known by a number of Lamesa ex-students of that institution.

Imagine working under climatic conditions as extreme as 72 degrees below zero, a sunrise and a sunset that simultaneously lasted only 15 seconds, then five months of midnight, and living fourteen of the 22 months the expedition was away in houses chiselled from ice.

Imagine being gone 63 days on a tractor expedition, lost and caught in a blizzard that lasted eight days, the wind blowing 55 miles an hour, the temperature standing at 64 degrees below zero, and just a tent and clothing for protection. Hill was a tractor driver, and this is one of the many experiences he will tell of. Also he was the tractor driver that succeeded in reaching Admiral Byrd at his advance base 123 miles from Little America when the latter was sick and near death and all other attempts to get him had failed.

Cold! It was so cold that one could hear his own breath freeze and crack; so cold that the skin was pulled from bare hands when it was necessary for them to come in contact with metal objects; so cold that the lunks of Eskimo dogs froze.

The speaker tells of storms at sea, the fight with icebergs, the fight to land on the ice barrier, the beautiful aurora australis (southern lights), the pleasures and daily life of the men, purposes of the expedition, and many other things of interest to all America. As the personal aide to Admiral Byrd, Joe Hill Jr., gleaned much experience that he tells his audience. His narration of the adventurous expedition is filled with thrills, adventure, humor, and pathos.

Forty percent of the proceeds (the admission is 25 and 40 cents) will go to the local Boy Scout troop.

### Amendments Will Be Voted on by Texans August 24th

The fate of seven constitutional amendments is to be decided by the voters of the State of Texas at the polls in a special election set for Saturday, August 24th. The amendments were submitted by the recently adjourned 43rd Legislature.

The notice of election and the nature of the measure is being given by publication in newspapers in each of the 254 counties of the State.

The text of four of the amendments have been printed in the Courier for the past four weeks. Briefly stated, the amendments provide for the following:

House Joint Resolution No. 48: To permit the passage of constitutional amendments by special sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions. (Constitutional amendments may now be originated only by regular sessions of the Legislature.)

Senate Joint Resolution No. 6: To abolish the fee method of compensating officers in all counties having population of more than 20,000 and authorizing commissioners courts in smaller counties to decide whether pay shall be on a fee or salary basis.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 24: To permit the furnishing of free text books to every child in the state attending any school.

House Joint Resolution No. 46: To authorize the courts to place defendants on probation.

House Joint Resolution No. 39: To permit the legislature to enact laws providing for the temporary commitment for insanity of any person so adjudged by a county court without trial by jury.

House Joint Resolution No. 19: To empower the legislature to provide a system of old-age compensation for all persons more than 65 years of age, not to exceed \$15 per month.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 3: To repeal state-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon, and providing for local option.

### Heavier Penalty, Interest Coming on Delinquent Taxes

Delinquent tax payers have only the remaining days of June in which to settle their accounts to the state and county at a low penalty rate and without interest.

After June 30, all delinquent taxes will bear 8 per cent penalty and interest at 6 per cent per annum from the date they were returned delinquent, according to Miss Willie Belle Cleveland, assessor-collector.

The announcement is based on information contained in a bulletin issued by the Assessor-Collectors Association of Texas on May 27.

A \$2.00 redemption fee and other accumulated costs will also be charged on delinquent taxes after June 30.

The June penalty rate is 5 per cent. All payments before July 1 are without interest and the redemption fee.

Miss Cleveland urged immediate attention of tax payers, since the last few days before the deadline are expected to find a rush of delinquent payers at her window.

### CCC WORKERS TO COME FROM RELIEF ROLLS

The County Relief Administrator has received a communication from Neal E. Guy, CCC Enrollment Supervisor of the Texas Relief Commission advising that hereafter only those boys whose families are on the relief rolls will be selected for CCC work.

"Civilian Conservation Corps selections are limited to applicants who can make a proper allotment to dependents" the statement says. "It has been ordered that selectees for enrollment beginning June 15, 1935 must in every case represent families on the public relief rolls.

"The above quotation is specific and it will be useless for you to request exceptions as our actions must be guided by this rule.

"An assigned quota larger than the number of available applicants does not mean, in any instance, that you are authorized to select non-relief applicants. There will be no non-relief applicants in any county."

In the certificate of compliance, the farmers who received funds will be required to state how much money they received for listing land, how many acres they were unable to list. If, for some reason they were unable to list some of the land which they agreed to list when they received the funds, the Commission will request a refund of ten cents for each acre which was not listed.

### DAWSON COUNTY GETS 5.20 INCHES RAIN THIS WEEK

One of the biggest rains seen in many years fell in Lamesa and surrounding territory Wednesday afternoon and night. The government gauge here measured 4.40 inches having fallen in the last twenty-four hours. This makes a total of 5.20 inches since it started raining Tuesday.

The rain fell so fast for a short time Wednesday afternoon that water was gushing down every street, and standing up to the running boards on automobiles in the low places. The Sulphur Draw for the second time in the last two months was running full. The water was reported to have run over the bridge on the Stanton highway at one time during the afternoon. All highways out of Lamesa were reported to be under water.

It is thought that serious damage has been done to the growing crops and to crops just planted. We have had no definite report on how serious the damage was, but we understand the rainfall was heavy over the entire county.

As we go to press (Thursday morning) a slow drizzling rain is still falling.

Last year in this county alone, Santa Fe paid taxes as follows: County, \$1,428.95; State tax \$1340.42; Ind. School Tax, \$1789.40; City \$795.77, a total of \$5,353.77 for 1934.

"An average of \$12,249.66 per month business was had by the Santa Fe in Lamesa in 1934. The business is running around \$9,000 up to June in 1935.

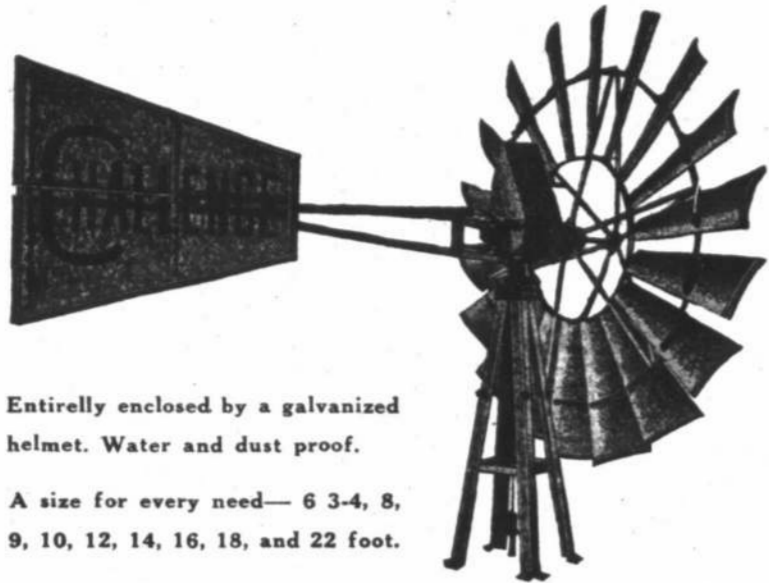

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**SEVERAL PERSONS BITTEN BY SPIDERS THIS YEAR**

Austin, June 11.—Several cases of spider poisoning caused by the bite of the so-called black widow spider have been reported in Texas this year and people who live in rural districts might well take precautions against bites from these poisonous insects, warns Dr. John W. Brown, State Health officer.

The scientific name of the black widow spider is *Latrodectus mactans*, and it is called the "hour glass", the "black widow" and "shoe button" spider. Its shiny black, round abdomen gives rise to the name of shoe button and the bright red patch, which may be shaped like an hour-glass, is responsible for the hour-glass designation. It obtains the name "black widow" from its custom of eating its mate. The body of the female is often an inch in length and the long, shiny black legs may stretch over a spread of as much as two inches.

This spider builds its web in dimly lighted places, generally in old toilets, garages, and other outbuildings. Its rough, coarse, irregular web is found under floors, in corners, between rafters, but especially under the floors of the building.

Many requests have been received by the Texas State Department of Health relative to the best methods of controlling these insects. Spraying with cresote oil or rosoote in cracks and crevices, particularly around the seats of old toilets, is an invaluable procedure, but precautions must be taken against fire. It is possible, also to crush the egg masses with a stick. Other methods of control are unknown, although efforts are being made at this time to bring a parasite which will feed on the egg masses.

After the sharp stinging bite, acute pains develop in the region of the surface bitten, spreading to other parts of the body. In addition to the pain, there is generally writhing, muscle contraction, difficult breathing, cold perspiration, nausea, and an extreme rigidity of the abdomen. If recovery occurs, there is a long convalescence, during which there remains general weakness, numbness and pain. There should be no delay in calling a physician in cases of spider bite.

**EMPLOYABLES BEING REGISTERED WITH NRS IN TEXAS**

Austin, June 11.—Registration of all employable persons receiving emergency relief in Texas with the National Reemployment Service was ordered by State Relief Director Adam R. Johnson in a communication addressed to all county administrators and directors of transient divisions.

The state director acted under instructions from Federal Administrator Harry L. Hopkins, who said it is necessary that such persons be classified as to occupation and fitness for work, and thus be available for referral to public and private employment.

The regulation applies to non-resident persons receiving transient relief and to all rural rehabilitation families. Local NRS officers are making arrangements to handle this new registration immediately.

At the same time, Johnson said the State Board of Control has adopted the policy of denying aid to employable persons who refuse to accept employment as farm laborers in the county of their residence.

"We continue daily to hear about shortage of farm labor in many sections of the state, in counties where this condition prevails, we expect relief administrators to supply this labor from the relief rolls. The employable relief client who refuses to work on a farm is not worthy of further assistance from our organization," Johnson said.

Another step toward reducing the relief load was taken when the state agent of the United States Department of Labor promised to supply relief officials with all reports of labor shortages from the Farm Placement Service in order that relief clients may have an opportunity for placement in farm work.

**REDUCED FREIGHT ON FEED IS CONTINUED**

The Commodities Purchase Section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration has informed Congressman George Mahon that an agreement has been reached with railroad officials and approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission which will make possible a continuation of the reduced rates on shipments of livestock feed for the drought area. The agreement which made possible these reduced rates during the past few months expired May 3 and Mr. Mahon had been working with this Section and with the Interstate Commerce Commission on this proposition for several weeks.

The new agreement provides a basis of two-thirds of the regular rate to apply on hay, and fifty per cent of the hay rates on other feed shipments. The agreement took effect June 5 and will continue until August 31.

The destination territory to which the reduced rates apply includes 131 counties in mid-western states, 60 of which are in West Texas.

### S. J. R. No. 3 A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas by striking out Section 20a to Section 20e, both inclusive; prohibiting the open saloon and vesting in the Legislature the power to define and enact laws against such; vesting in the Legislature the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of intoxicating liquors, including the power to provide for a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered or exchanged in any county, justice's precinct or incorporated city or town wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option election held under the laws in force at the date of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing that such shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverage containing less than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such Amendment prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication of such by the Governor and making an appropriation therefor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20a to Section 20e, both inclusive, and substitute in lieu thereof the following:  
"ARTICLE XVI Section 20.  
"(a) The open saloon shall be and is hereby prohibited. The Legislature shall have the power, and it shall be its duty to define the term 'open saloon' and enact laws against such.  
Subject to the foregoing, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.  
"(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic content.  
"(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local

option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any such county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous, or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties, or political subdivisions thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:  
"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:  
"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

It appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.  
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.  
Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.  
The above is a true and correct copy.

### H. J. R. No. 19 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citi-

zens of Texas over the age of sixty-five (65) years, who are not habitual criminals, nor habitual drunkards, nor inmates in any State supported institution; and providing that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance; providing for the necessary proclamation and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of proclamation, publication and election.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power by general laws to provide, under such limitations and restrictions and regulations as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no habitual criminal, and no habitual drunkard while such habitual drunkard, and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such old-age assistance; provided further that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.  
"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for old-age assistance as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinbefore provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday of August, 1935 at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:  
"For the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."  
"Against the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per person per month and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same printed as re-

quired by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.  
The above is a true and correct copy.

### S. J. R. No. 24 A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend Sections 3 and 5 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to permit the furnishing of State official text books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:  
"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and poll tax of One Dollar (\$1.00) on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed Thirty-Five Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of the State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside, under such regulations and in such manner as may be provided by law, a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children within the scholastic age attending any school in this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the General Funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by General Laws, and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the district voting an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year One (\$1.00) Dollar on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by General or Special Law."

Sec. 2. That Section 5, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that hereafter it shall read as follows:  
"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of lands heretofore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund, to which the Legislature may add, not exceeding one per cent annually, of the total value of the permanent school fund, such value to be ascertained by the Board of Education until otherwise provided by law, and the available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school, provided that the State Board of Education may furnish State Adopted Text Books free to every child of scholastic age, attending any school within the State; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties as may be provided by law and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the election to be held on the Fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following:  
"FOR the Amendment to the Con-

stitution of the State of Texas permitting the furnishing of free text books to every child of scholastic age attending any school within this State," and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the furnishing of free text books to every child of scholastic age attending any school within this State", and every voter shall mark out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, or the word "FOR" or the word "AGAINST", at the beginning of such clause, so as to indicate his vote for or against each of said proposed amendments.

Sec. 4. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 5. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as shall be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay the expenses of the publications and elections provided for in this Resolution.

### H. J. R. No. 48 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas providing that: Constitutional Amendments may be submitted by the Legislature at Special Sessions under certain conditions; providing for an election on the question of the adoption of such amendment and providing for the proclamation and the publication thereof; describing the form of ballot, and making an appropriation therefor.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1, of Article XVII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. How the Constitution is to be Amended. The Legislature, at any biennial session, by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the Journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed Amendments shall be duly published once a week for four (4) weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said Amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any Amendment, the said Amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof; provided however, that in cases of extraordinary emergency affecting the State as a whole, Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the manner hereinabove set out upon the submission of the proposed Amendment by the Governor at any Special Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State who are qualified to vote on proposed Constitutional Amendments at an election to be held on the 24th day of August, A. D. 1935, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon for those favoring the Amendment the words:  
"FOR the Amendment to Section 1, Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed at Special Sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions." And those against the Amendment shall have printed the words:  
"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 1, Article XVII, of the Constitution of Texas, providing that Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed at Special Sessions of the Legislature under certain conditions." Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which does not indicate his desire regarding the above proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed Amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.  
Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

**ON TEXAS FARMS**

"Knee deep in June" is okeh for the poet but apparently not for the dairyman if he is knee deep in Sudan grass gone to seed.  
 According to Extension Dairyman E. R. Eudaly, the value of Sudan grass is reduced about half if allowed to form seed.  
 He says it should be cut for hay just as it heads. If it is being grazed but not kept down, mow half of it now and two weeks later the other half. That way grazing will not be interfered with.  
 Mow the permanent pasture too. Twice a year mowing will kill the weeds Eudaly says. Cut high the first time, three or four inches off the ground and low the next time to get the suckers and new branches.  
 Plant now for trench silo filling. Three tons per cow is what will be needed. Cane or grain sorghum can be planted on the oat stubble if there is enough moisture.  
 Cows need dry feed too, Eudaly says. And roughages are cheaper than grain. So plan for one ton of hay or bundled feed for each cow.  
 The Governments drouth relief cattle buying removed about one million dairy cows from Texas farms, according to Eudaly. Remaining milkers should now be tested to be sure they are "worth their board and keep."

**APPEALS TO OFFICIALS TO HELP REDUCE RELIEF LOAD**

Austin, June 11. State Relief Director, Adam R. Johnson has appealed to municipalities and counties of the state to aid county administrators in reducing the Texas relief load.  
 The request came after a demonstration last week at Paris, where relief clients had picketed the county relief office and refused to permit employees of the Lamar county relief office to enter their offices.  
 Pat Warner, Lamar county administrator, told Johnson by telephone that leaders in the demonstration refused to leave the place until concessions in the form of more adequate relief were granted by relief authorities. Johnson replied that relief funds were distributed to all counties on an equitable basis and that the Relief Commission is not in a position to bargain about the amount of relief extended. After the state director informed Warner that he would have to discontinue all relief activities in Lamar county if local officials were not able to maintain order there, Paris officials wired that the crowd had been dispersed and that order prevailed.  
 "We are sending to the counties every available dollar for relief as soon as it reaches Austin and picket lines wont improve the situation."  
 "It's true that our per case grants will be reduced almost in half this month, but that's because the allotment to us has been reduced by a like amount."  
 "We think every county in the state should do everything possible to reduce the relief load by helping employable persons on relief to find jobs. We understand that farmers all over the state are in dire need of help in the fields. Able-bodied men

on our relief rolls should not fail to seek this type of employment. If enough of them do find farm employment it will mean more adequate relief for those unavoidably left on the rolls.  
 "Under this reduced allotment, work relief projects will necessarily be confined to those most essential such as canning plants and sewing room projects. Others, however, will be slowed down on account of reduced budgets."  
 "I don't believe we may reasonably expect larger relief grants in the future," Johnson continued. "Federal officials know the drouth has been broken in Texas and they expect an increasingly large number of our relief cases to become self-sustaining as a result. It simply means that Texas relief clients must exhaust all resources in an effort to find work."
