State Capital NEWS

Austin. — Within a few weeks the tourists and school children who flock to Austin will be able to get a lesson in Texas history by visiting the most beautiful of all the new buildings on the state capitol grounds.

It is the State Library and Archives Building, now nearing completion on a site directly east of the Capitol.

For many years history-minded Texans decried the fact that the priceless early documents of the state had no real home. Finally these documents were moved from a mouldy basement to a Quonset hut. There many feared for their safety.

Now, the new edifice provides the state's historic documents with a magnificent home. In addition there are quarters for the State Library and the General Land Office.

More interesting to the visitor will be the way in which Texas history is dramatized in the architectural decor of the building. On each side of the entrance are six large flagpoles. From them will fly the flags of the nations which have ruled Texas—France, Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Confederate States of America and the United States.

Embedded in the stone of the front are bright-colored mosaic shields. These also represent the same six nations. Smaller bronze emblems decorate the heavy metal doors at the front. Across the back of the structure, even larger shields, bearing the six nations' seals in colored ceramics, are mounted on the face of the building.

Pink granite, the "official" stone for state buildings, is used for the entire exterior. Carved in the granite across the left front are these words:

"The People of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent republic and we fearlessly and confidently commit the issue to the decision of the Supreme Arbiter of the destinies of nations." (Texas Declaration of Independence, 1836.)

On the right front side is carved: "All political power is inherent in the people and all free governments are founded on their authority and instituted for their benefit." (First Constitution of Texas, 1845.)

Although the building has four floors, there are seven "stack floors" where the building is divided for storage of books and documents.

One end of the main floor will be devoted to the library. There you will find a charge desk and a large reading room.

Another large room will house the archives. In it there will be a large work room where researchers may look at old papers.

Land Office, to be on the third and fourth floors, will have a separate entrance at the south end of the building. (Building faces west.)

State Archives Building is the fourth of the new edifices erected since the building program began in 1957. It is neither the largest nor the most expensive, but because of the historical designs, it is attracting the most attention. Those who have had an advance peek believe that it will, as intended, be a fitting residence for the heritage of Texas' 125 years.

RATE INCREASE EXPLAINED — Texans who are irked at the prospect of an auto insurance rate increase should take note that they've had a year's reprieve since the increase was indicated,

says the Insurance Board chairman.

Claim costs indicated that a rate increase was justified last year, says Chairman Tom Ferguson, but the Board postponed making it because the safe driving plan had just gone into effect.

In that 12-month interval, said Ferguson, drivers actually have paid \$20,000,000 less in insurance premiums than cost figures show they should have. As a consequence, he said, companies absorbed a \$20,000,000 deficit.

LAST ROUND — Legislators waxed both heated and hopeful in the last round of public hearings before the committee appointed by Governor Daniel to study all tax plans and suggest a compromise.

Committee, mostly made up of board chairmen of state agencies, is to select ideas or merge them into a recommendation to be offered at its final meeting July 6 and 7. Special session to enact a tax plan begins July 10.

Rep. Reed Quilliam of Lubbock said he felt the people should see clearly what their choices are—a sales tax, income tax or sharp reduction in state services.

Reps. Charles N. Wilson of Trinity and Maco Stewart of Galveston suggested a plan that would combine a 2 per cent general sales tax, with exemptions, and a 6 per cent corporation profits tax.

Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo apparently favored a sales tax. He told the committee he thought the governor had been asleep, Rip Van Winkle fashion, since 1939 when Governor Daniel, then a House member, was one of the "Immortal 56" who blocked a sales tax. Hazlewood pointed out that the state has had a population explosion and an 800 per cent increase in cost of government since then.

BUS INQUIRY POSTPONED — An Austin court of inquiry into the prices being paid by the state for school buses has been postponed until July 10.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson called for the inquiry, noting that Texas paid from 10 to 25 per cent more for buses than some other states.

Judge granted the postponement of the defendants' statement that they had not had the required 10-day interval between the issuance of the subpoenas and convening of the inquiry.

A second son of Mrs. Coleman, Jimmy, was ill Monday but was not hospitalized.

Twelve members of the family were in the hospital Wednesday after Jay Mohler was hospitalized Monday night and Jimmy Coleman, Tuesday.

Governor Daniel Designates Farm Safety Week

College Station. — The period from July 23-29, already proclaimed by President Kennedy as National Farm Safety Week, has been designated as Farm Safety Week in Texas by Gov. Price Daniel.

In his official memorandum, the Governor said, "The nation's economy is dependent upon the continued well-being and progress of our State's agricultural population. Accidents from farm work cause needless suffering, distress and loss of life each year among our rural families.

"A vigorous farm accident-prevention education program will be conducted during this week by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Safety Association.

"I urge all Texas farm families to increase their vigilance against needless accidents and further encourage interested organizations and individuals to participate in this program."

President Calvin Figg of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council said the Council was cooperating with all interested organizations, agencies, groups and individuals to make the week's program as effective as possible.

He added that plans in most counties for the observance of Farm Safety Week have been made and noted an increase in youth participation. This, he said, is especially gratifying since youth are often the victims of farm accidents. County extension agents and local 4-H adult leaders are given much of the credit for this improvement.

The Council is hopeful, Figg said, that all citizens will cooperate and participate in the local observances, for each is dependent upon agriculture for many of the necessities of life.

Hike In Auto Insurance Rate

Austin. — The state insurance board ordered an average increase of 15 per cent in automobile insurance rates.

The announcement followed a June 22 hearing on the controversial subject before the three-man board.

"This is the first rate increase granted since June 1958," said Thomas C. Ferguson, chairman of the board.

The new rates on private passenger automobiles amount to an average increase of 8.7 per cent on comprehensive insurance, 10.6 per cent for collision and 23.6 per cent for public liability including bodily injury and property damage, Ferguson said.

Let Dirt Contract Campbell Soup Co.

Campbell Soup Co.'s announcement Monday of the letting of a dirt contract to the Inwood Construction Co. of Dallas is the first work to be announced on the plant site near Paris.

Building of the grade and the storm sewers in the plant area is due to begin next week. It is expected that the work will be completed by October 1.

Actual construction of the multi-million dollar plant is due to begin shortly after the dirt contract is complete and is expected to be completed in 1963.

At the outset, 750 persons will be employed at the plant and employment is expected to reach 1,200 ultimately. One out of every 12 persons employed will be concerned with quality control of supervision.

Vegetables for the Campbell Soups processed here will be grown in the Red River Valley on a contract basis. Technical assistance by the company's agronomists will be provided the growers free of charge.

**ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY
COMMISSION OF THE CITY
OF TALCO, TEXAS:**

1. That effective the 1 day of
July, 1961, the City of Talco will
collect 1 time a week all gar-
bage from the water and sewer
connections and/or all water con-
nections and/or sewerage con-
nections at the following rates:
Residential customers \$1.00
per month
Commercial customers \$2.00
per month
2. Failure by any customer or
user of water or sewerage or both
to pay the above set out fees
and/or charges for the collection
of garbage shall result in the dis-
continuance of water or sewerage
or both by the City.
3. The City Secretary is au-
thorized and directed to report
to the City Commission at each
meeting of said commission all
persons or person delinquent in
the payment of the fees estab-
lished by this ordinance and the
City Commission shall forthwith
direct the water and sewerage Su-
perintendent or other employee of
the City to discontinue and dis-
connect water and sewerage con-
nections with such customer or
user.

Passed, adopted and approved
this 15 day of July, 1961.

ARE YOU A HELPER?

Once I read a little poem that
I liked very much. I can't re-
call its rhythm or rhyme, but its
message stuck fast in my mind.
The truth the poem taught was
this: God has put us on the
earth to make it a better place
in which to live. But we often
ask ourselves how one small and
unimportant person can do any-
thing in such a large and com-
plicated place as the world. The
poem answered the question by
saying, "Just build a better
you."

This is a great truth. The
way to help the world is first to
make yourself better able to
help.

And strangely enough, the
way to become better is to help
other people. Actually, all you
need to do is just practice
Christianity—live it—let it work
in your life. If it works in your
life, many other lives will be
helped.

Help someone else. When you
do, you help yourself. The story
is told about a man asking a
little boy, "Is your father, the
doctor, at home?"

"No, he's away," came the
answer.

"Where do you think I can
find him?"

"Well," said the little boy
with a thoughtful look on
his face, "you've got to look for
a place where people are sick

or hurt or something like that.
I don't know where he is, but
he's sure to be helping some-
where."

Could this have been said
about you? Are you a helper?
Helpers are the kind of people
who change the world. They
are people who have discovered
abundant life. They are partners
with God.

If you want to discover how
to make yourself better, try ac-

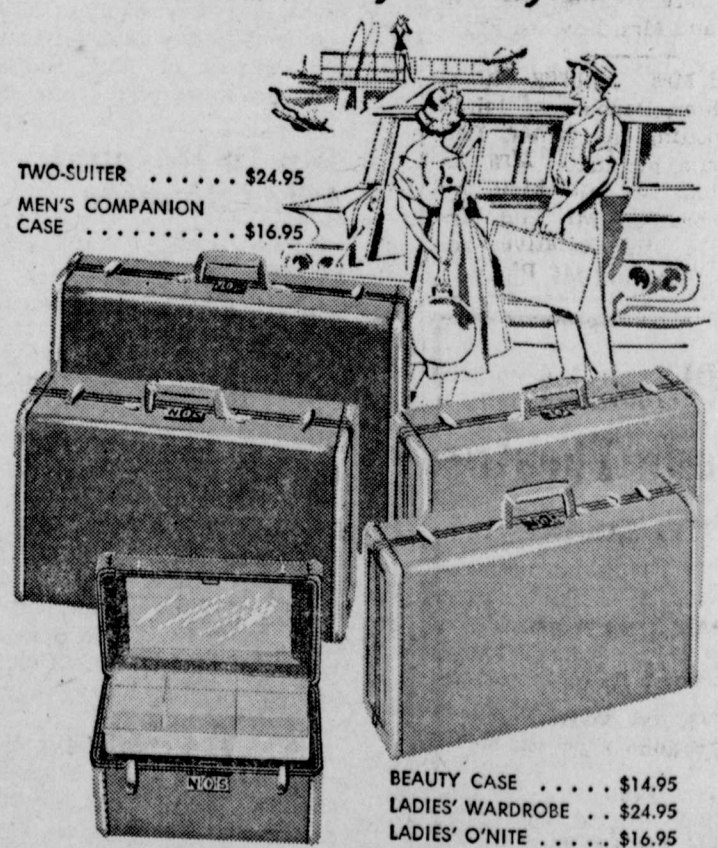
