IT DOESN'T "JUST HAPPEN"

The Edison Electric Institute has issued an illuminating booklet on research and development in the electric utility industry. Last year, it shows, 138 utilities, serving about 90 per cent of all the customers of investor-owned companies, spent \$53.18 million for this purpose; the Institute spent \$757,578; and 14 of the leading equipment manufacturers spent \$97.6 million specifically identified with electric utility equipment research and development, not including utilization devices.

The total comes to \$151.5 million. And that, the booklet stresses, is a conservative figure. It is comparable to the visible part of an iceberg in that it does not include a great mass of other research from which utility customers benefit.

The research activities cover every phase of utility operation from system planning to company management subjects. It is all designed to produce new knowledge, or to apply existing knowledge to problems involved in the creation or improvement of products and processes. The end results is better, more efficient, more economical electric service and expanding use of that service.

The booklet also points out that today electric utility companies are participating in 26 atomic projects involving company expenditures of almost \$1 billion — and each of these, whether in the operation or planning stage, embodies a highly significant research effort.

The excellence of our electric service — and the world leadership of our investor-owned industry in technological breakthroughs and advances — does not "just happen." It is the result of vision and imagination — and an endless search for new ways or better ways to do the job.

From Hole To Service Station

Do you occasionally complain about the price of gasoline? If you do, it's only human nature at work — but a revealing little statement by the head of the Ohio Petroleum Marketers Association, Inc. may give you a new and different perspective.

"It has been said that we in the oil business are engaged in the handling and moving of a very bulky commodity of low value. We search for it in the bowels

of the earth. We lift it out of the ground, put it in tanks, and through a pipeline to a refinery where we lift it again, process it, put it in more tanks, clean it up, mix it up, put it on a terminal, unload it, load it up again, haul it to a bulk plant, unload it, reload it, take it to a service station, put it in another tank, pump it out once more into the customer's automobile tank, wipe his windshield, give him free air and water and charge him excluding tax 3½ cents a pound. What other products that require all this human labor and energy in its handling, can be purchased for anywhere near the price?"

That's a good question, which pretty well answers itself. The oil industry, all that long way from a hole in the ground to the local service station, has done wonders in improving efficiency and holding down costs. Its achievements has been obscured by the fact that gas taxes, over which no one in the industry has any control, add an average 50 per cent to the price of the fuel. In the face of that tax, it is still more of an achievement to be able to hold the price of gas down to a point where such a tax doesn't make general use of gasoline prohibitive. But, increased federal and state gas taxes are now being proposed.

Without Working**

Abaco, Bahamas — (HK) —
Measured by any standards, the
125 residents of Great Guana
Cay have got it made.

They don't have to work for
a living. For food they have
crawfish, chicken, coconuts and
bananas. They farm just enough
to meet their own needs, and
maybe a little more. If they
want to earn some spending
money for a trip into the "big
city" (Marsh Harbour, 9 boat
miles away, pop. 500), they sell
some of their produce to other
islanders in the Bahamas chain.
It's island life in its simplest
form on this 7-mile long strip
located some 100 miles north of
Nassau.

Take Talmadge Albury, for
example. He's in his mid-70's
and can't remember the last
time he worked for pay.

"It was a long time ago, you
bet," he says. "Maybe 40, may-
be 50 years. Don't think I've
missed anything, though. I sit
and smoke, and I fish a little.
Daughter over there does the
cooking. I can work if I want
to. Yes, sir. See that Govern-
ment beach over there? I get
paid if I want to clean it up.
Sometimes I think I might do
it."

Talmadge Albury's day, like
those of his neighbors, runs
something like this: Up at 6
a.m., fishing from 7 to noon,
sleep until 4 p.m., dinner at
about 5, chatting with neigh-
bors from about 6 to 10 p.m.,
then it's into bed.

On Sundays, most of the na-
tives go to Church. There are
two Protestant churches on the
little island. The children, who
represent about 60 per cent of
the population, play games,
swim, sail or fish. Those old
enough, go to school for several
hours each day. There is no
formal recreation on the island.
The only hint of "outside" civil-
ization is a tourist resort, the
Guana Harbour Club. There is
no television, no roads, only a
sidewalk. Only a few of the
homes have electricity.

What's it like to live a beach-
comber's existence?

"Well," says Talmadge Al-
bury, "it ain't too bad. Nope,
it ain't too bad at all."

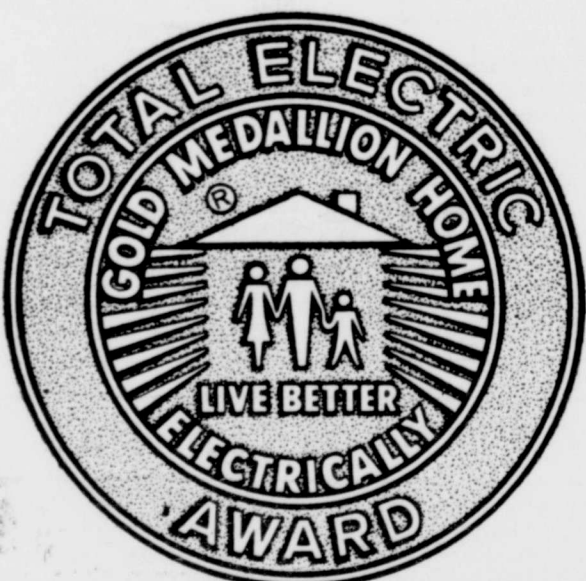

MODERN EDUCATION

The wife of a losing football coach wrote a friend: "Each Saturday as I walk to the stadium, I feel as if my stomach were filled with sharp stones. I'm sure that everyone in my vicinity can hear my heart beat. As we stand to sing 'The Star Spangled Banner,' I ask God not to let them boo my husband or the team. I ask Him to let the fans understand that these are boys playing—they don't want to make mistakes. They don't want to fumble."

"I've asked this same God to help me explain to my daughter a television panel show that rips her father apart. I've asked Him to teach us how to keep our own sons from being small and petty and vicious—there are so many evidences that show how hard the boys have worked on the practice and playing field. I know that my husband has given his very best toward their development. We just can't believe that everything has to be measured by the scoreboard."

But a big-time college football coach has declared: "Winning is not the important thing—it's the only thing." A certain winning basketball coach, whose players have been found guilty of "shaving points" for gamblers' payoffs, derisively refers to losing coaches as "character builders." And many coaches will cheat, and teach the youth they're molding to cheat, in any way possible to win.

In big-time college football cheating in recruiting, in classrooms, in remuneration and on the playing field is customary. "Win at all costs," the alumni demand. (Most of them take football more seriously than their freedom.) Coaches caught in rules violations are never fired—if they win. Many of the self-styled molders of youthful characters have no character. The contract of a football coach with a college is a one-way street. If he gets a better offer, he walks out. If he gets fired, the college has to buy up his contract. The trouble with America is erosion of morality. Freedom and morality are indivisible. Our country today needs nationalism, patriotism, morality, courage, dedication and religion as never before. And these eternal verities—these necessities if we are to survive as a free people—should be taught from kindergarten through college.

This is the best educated generation our nation has yet produced, say the educators' statisticians. They don't say what they're educated for. They mean that a higher percentage of students now graduate from high school and college than ever before, which really means very little. One of the first things many graduates should do as soon as possible is to unlearn the untruths they were taught by mistaken educators. Our "progressive educators" have been stressing "life adjustment" instead of the preservation of a free nation. They have taught security, peace and brotherhood, but left out duty, honor and country.

When American U-2 spy Powers faced enemy trial, he saved his neck by pleading, "I didn't know what I was doing and if I had known it, I wouldn't have done it—I know now that I was risking world peace—My superiors were responsible."

A staggering number of American soldiers—more than any other nation ever had—sold out their fellow American soldiers and their country in the Korean War. Not to save their lives, but to get better treatment in prison camp, they licked the boots of their Chinese captors and made tape recordings praising Communism. And why not? These spineless creatures were taught in school that patriotism is old hat, that capitalism is wicked, that the wave of the future is a one world, non-profit, socialist brotherhood.

Steel Guard Rails Prevent Head-On Collisions

New York — (HK) — Statistical data shows that one out of every seven fatalities on the nation's highways can be attributed to head-on collisions.

The National Safety Council reported that 6,700 individuals met violent death in this manner in 1963. This is 15.4 percent of all fatal highway accidents.

Highway experts express agreement that head-on collisions could be virtually eliminated by the use of dividers to separate traffic moving in opposite directions.

A series of tests by these officials coupled with experience of several major toll road authorities show that most of these deadly highway accidents need not occur, especially on the 9,632 miles of old-fashioned undivided multi-lane highways.

Many highway officials feel the best way to brake the acceleration of head-on crashes is to modernize these roads with tough steel median beam-type guard rail. Currently such roads have traffic lanes separated only by painted lines, low curbs or grass medians spotted with shrubs and trees, styles that all date from the days when traffic volume and speeds were far below today's peak levels.

Joseph L. Lawler, chairman of the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, attributed the excellent safety record of his 470-mile, four lane, steel divided highway to "excellent condition of the turnpike, alertness of the state police, ability to keep unsafe vehicles off the road and construction of the steel median barriers."

His opinion was echoed by Joseph Morecraft, Jr., chairman of the New Jersey Turnpike Authority, the first major toll road to provide motorists with median guard rail protection.

He said there has been only one cross-median fatality since the turnpike completed installation of the rail over almost its entire length in 1961. Between 1952 and 1958, 48 of the 158 fatal accidents on the turnpike were caused by vehicles crossing over the unprotected strip.

Typical beam guard rails are made up of steel sections 12.5

feet long and slightly more than a foot wide. The individual beams are bolted together to form a single continuous unit.

The strength of the beam is increased by a deep groove or corrugation extending from one end to the other. When bolted together and mounted on steel posts about two feet above the ground, the individual beams virtually become a single unit which withstands the shock of collision and helps redirect out-of-control vehicles.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance 277 Park Ave., N.Y., N.Y., 10017

Q. I understand that the proceeds of my life insurance will not be subject to Federal estate taxes if I give up ownership of the policies at least three years prior to my death. Would this also work for my group life insurance where I work?

A. Probably not. To remove life insurance from your estate for tax purposes, you have to give up all "incidents of ownership," including the right to change your beneficiary, to surrender the insurance, to choose settlement options, and so on. Most states require that an employee must have the right to convert his group life insurance to a permanent individual policy if he changes jobs or if his employer terminates the group contract. This right to convert your group protection is an "incident of ownership" which you could hardly transfer to anyone else.

Transferring ownership of any life insurance in order to reduce estate taxes involves some complex legal questions. If your life insurance and other assets are large enough to present an estate tax problem, you should consult your attorney and life insurance agent before taking such a step.

Q. Which kind of life insurance is most used by American families — permanent or term insurance?

PERMANENT PROTECTION 72%
TERM INSURANCE 28%

A. Of the \$389.2 billion of ordinary life insurance in force in the United States in 1962, over 72% was permanent protection — including whole life policies, endowment and retirement income policies, and the permanent part of combination policies (which also include some additional term protection). All types of term life insurance (including the term portion of combination policies) amounted to slightly over 28%.

Human beings, like other animals, have a built-in "physiological clock" which governs their activities over 24 hours, two University of Georgia psychologists report. However, the "clock" may sometimes be as much as three hours wrong in judging the time of day, they say.

Warning Signs
A history of chronic cough, shortness of breath and other seemingly mild symptoms seems related to lung cancer later in life, a Dutch physician reports. The relationship, she says, is independent of smoking.

Lunar Rains
Folklore has long linked the moon with the weather, but three U. S. investigators now think they may have proved it. They found a strong relationship between phases of the moon and rainfall patterns.

Job Risks
Persons in legal, administrative and other intellectual occupations carry a higher risk of stomach cancer than of lung cancer, a German scientist has reported. Lung cancer incidence was higher among metal workers, mechanics and other industrial occupations, he said.

Pocket Riches
One of the many minor planets or asteroids — this one about three miles in diameter — may be nearly solid platinum, some U. S. space scientists believe. That much of the precious metal would be worth \$50 trillion — enough to pay for the entire space program, the national debt, and the anti-poverty program, with a lot of money left over.

How to Have \$5,000 A Month for Life
NEW YORK — (HK) — How does a woman guarantee herself a \$5,000 monthly income for life? One woman, 59 years old, has just solved the problem by paying New York Life Insurance Company a lump sum of \$922,980.

The money bought a single-premium annuity — the largest the company has sold in its 119-year history.

The largest previous annuity of this type issued by New York Life cost a 72-year-old woman \$707,706. She received from it an income of \$2,099,000 before she died — at the age of 99.

Women are now outnumbering men as purchasers of single premium annuities by 2 to 1, the company notes. It has 14 annuitants who are 100 years old or older, of whom 12 are women.

MOTION: KEY TO HOME MOVIES

Anyone, by observing the difference between a static, motionless snapshot and a real life scene of the same subject in movies, can see that motion is the essence of true-to-life photography.

The antics of the children, the puppy, the kitten . . . the hobble of the old Veteran who marches in the parade . . . the gracefulness of the diver or the dancer . . . yes, these and a million other actions convince us that motion is what makes the world go 'round.

We want to capture, to retain, to re-enjoy, those subjects—in motion. Fortunately, we are living in an era that permits us to do so. Grandpa could not. His movie camera and movie projector were feeble in their efforts to capture motion truly and re-enact it.

We're lucky. Today's movie cameras not only have jam-proof mechanisms, self-threading devices and automatic exposure controls . . . they also have optional speed controls to permit us to capture motion in any manner we desire. Dad's golf swing can be pictured in true-to-life motion, or it can be projected in slow-motion so that Dad can analyze the strengths and weaknesses in his golf-driving habits.

Sweet sixteen just happens to be the normal pace for a movie camera. This means that the camera takes 16 pictures per second, consecutively, and the projector re-creates the human action by projecting 16 pictures per second, also consecutively. The human eye, watching the incessant parade of pictures on the screen, convinces the human mind that this is true-to-life motion. Actually, of course, it isn't. It is merely a parade of still pictures. But the parade is going so rapidly we absorb the impression of true-to-life motion.
