Texas University Centennial Will Close On Dec. 1st

AUSTIN.—The University of Texas' Centennial Exposition, which has been host to more than 250,000 visitors since opening in June, will be bowed out Dec. 1 by the University basketball team.

The exposition's central exhibit has been housed in Gregory Gymnasium. With basketball season almost here exhibits must be packed and stored and the gymnasium vacated.

Exhibits will be stored for a year. At that time the half-million-dollar Texas Memorial Museum, upon which work has begun, will be completed and the exhibits will be set up permanently. The museum is situated on the University campus.

Exposition Director William McGill reported the attendance even better than was expected. During the summer visitors have registered from 39 foreign countries as well as from every state in the country.

The exposition, organized as a preliminary step in the building and equipping the Memorial Museum, had as its purpose depicting of the civil and natural history of Texas. Exhibits were set up in history, zoology, anthropology and geology. All departments of the University co-operated in the displays.

The Department of Petroleum Engineering erected an extensive display of oil well drilling and pumping equipment. The Department of Business Administration designed a map depicting the business resources of the state and the Department of Physics conducted a display of its laboratories and the student observatory and planetarium.

Young Dog Saves Life of Mistress

PLAINVIEW, Texas.—"Buddy," a seven-month-old German Police dog, was credited with saving the life of his mistress, Mrs. C. F. Buske, farmwife who lives near Abilene, Texas.

AIR BATTLE IS AGAIN RAGING OVER MADRID

Nationalists and loyalists air forces clashed in another spectacular battle high above Madrid today which resulted in the shooting down of at least three planes.

Loyalist squadrons which had patrolled the air above the capital, darted into the fight in an effort to drive the enemy away.

Pursuit planes of the latest type made up the loyalist fleet.

Before the planes went up, the nationalist bombers made another early morning raid to send more bodies of men, women and children to crowded city morgues and to start new fires.

Official figures put the death list in 36 hours at more than 300 and the total of seriously wounded at nearly 1,000.

The 13-story American-owned telephone company building, high in the city, seemed the target for most bombs.

Cooperation May Aid Education

AUSTIN.—Educational resources of Texas and of the nation will be better conserved through co-operation among educational institutions, said Dr. H. Y. Benedict, president of the University of Texas.

Speaking to the Association of American Universities, Dr. Benedict urged such cooperation.

"Upper and lower education," he said, "barring sporadic exceptions, flourish or suffer together, rising and sinking as if riding in one airplane."

"What about the future of our resources?" he asked. "We know that our educational resources will continue to be limited and it is our duty to use them to maximum united and not competitive advantage."

He believed a closer cooperation between institutions of higher education and elementary schools should be established.

"The college must pay attention to the criticisms of it coming up from the schoolmaster and the school to criticisms of the professor," he said.

Rejected Woman Sued by Suitor

RUFFALO, N. Y.—After Charles Duerbach had courted Miss Mary Frie for 20 years, she believed he was serious. Then he married another woman and Miss Frie began sending him bills for 2,000 meals eaten at her house on Sundays and holidays.

Charged with sending annoying letters, Miss Frie was taken into city court, where the judge found her guilty. He fined her \$50, which he later suspended.

As her defense, Miss Frie explained: "The letters weren't annoying; they were just bills."

A. F. of L. Is Told To Seek Settlement Of Labor Strife

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 19.—Max Zaritsky, an ally of John L. Lewis, today denounced craft unions seeking reprisals against the insurgents and called on the A. F. of L. convention to seek a peaceful settlement of labor's internal feud.

Shortly after the convention had passed a resolution condemning the "communistic abetted" strike movement in Atlantic and Gulf ports, Zaritsky said the threat of boycott and reprisal had been to "stiffen the resistance and provoke hostility which has nullified efforts at conciliation."

City of Eastland Attacks Validity of Bond Issues Aggregating \$115,000

The validity of two Eastland bond issues is attacked in a suit filed by the City of Eastland against C. C. Huff of Dallas county and C. C. Harris of Eastland county and "unknown holders."

The suit, filed by John Sayles of Abilene, Perry Sayles of Eastland and J. Frank Sparks of Eastland, asks cancellation of "City of Eastland Water Revenue Bonds, Series 1927" and "City of Eastland Water and Sewer Plant Revenue Bonds, Series of 1928." The 1927 issue aggregates \$15,000 and the other \$100,000.

The petition also asks 91st district court to void deeds of trust or mortgages purporting to secure payment on the bonds and to remove clouds on property of the city as described in the deeds or mortgages.

The city holds issuance of the bonds was illegal as, they claim, it was executed without vote of the citizens. The petition says the bond issuance was authorized by the city commission in ordinances.

ITALY, FRANCE PREPARING FOR THEIR DEFENSE

ROME, Nov. 19.—More guns, more airplanes, more warships and more men were voted by the fascist grand council today to back up Premier Mussolini's policies.

Meeting in the dead of night after the Italian and German recognition of the Spanish nationalists, the grand council affirmed the necessity of speeding preparation for war, especially as regards air and sea strength.

It was explained that the present international situation was the reason for the vote.

PARIS, Nov. 19.—France has taken emergency measures to safeguard her interests in the Mediterranean, it was disclosed today in answer to the Italian-German recognition of the new government of Spain.

There was open anxiety at the possibility of trouble within the next few weeks. Rumors persisted that France might send army men to Spain.

LISBON, Portugal, Nov. 19.—Premier Largo Caballero of the Spanish loyalist government, has protested to the League of Nations against Italian and German recognition of the nationalists, the radio station at Valencia said today.

Employees from Breckenridge, Eastland, Albany, Ranger, Dublin and Mineral Wells attended. The banquet was a regular meeting of the chapter.

Merger Is Planned For Two Departments

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Transfer of Rexford Tugwell's re-settlement administration to the agriculture seemed likely today as a result of Tugwell's resignation.

Report of the merger was circulated many weeks before Tugwell's intention to resign became known.

Charge Is Filed In Freezing of Baby

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 19.—A murder charge was filed today against Mrs. Willie Wright, 28, accused of permitting her 10-month old daughter to freeze to death. She placed the baby on a porch and forgot it until the next morning.

The charge specifically alleges "murder without malice."

Senate Committee Seeks Information Of Strike Violence

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The Senate civil liberties committee today instructed agents in coastal cities to report any violation of the workers' rights in connection with the maritime strikes.

Meanwhile the Department of Interior prepared to advertise for bids for chartering private vessels to carry food and fuel to Alaskan ports where there is a shortage due to Pacific coast maritime difficulties.

HOUSTON, Nov. 19.—Seamen aboard the American freighter, Oakwood and City of Joliet, joined the maritime strike today, bringing the number of ships tied up in this area to 15.

Mays May Realize Life's Ambition

Eastland Mavericks Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock will have the "opportunity of a lifetime," when the Cisco Lobos invade Welch field.

Since Eastland has been in the Oil Belt football sector it has not ever defeated Ranger and Cisco in the same season. The Mavericks are nearer this realization this year than ever. The game with Ranger resulted in the Mavericks gaining its only victory to date.

While many believe Cisco a set-up, still other declare that the Lobos will not allow their previous defeats to impress them in any manner Friday afternoon. Cisco will be fighting to stay from the Oil Belt cellar, for which it is apparently doomed with Ranger unless a victory is obtained from Eastland.

The Mavericks have been arch foes of the Lobos for years. Eastland hasn't been defeated by the Lobos since 1933 and it is striving to maintain that record. Last year the Mavericks tied with Cisco and the year previous hampered their way to a 28 to 7 victory. In 1922 the team tied.

The game will be called at 3:00 o'clock.

AUSTIN, Nov. 19.—Four bids were received by the state board of control, sitting as the old age assistance commission today on a \$3,000,000 loan to aid financing of old age assistance.

The loan was authorized by the last session of the legislature. The money will be used until funds accrue from the new taxes levied last month.

Worker Absorption Study Is Advised

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—President Roosevelt today suggested to the business advisory council that it study further absorption of workers by private industry, improvement of living conditions by low cost housing and better wages and working conditions for industrial employees. The suggestions were made public in a letter dated Nov. 16 to Secretary of Commerce Daniel Roper.

First Sheriff Ill In Austin Home

"Uncle" Henry Schmick, 93, first sheriff of Eastland county, whose wife was buried at Eastland last week, was seriously ill Thursday in the Confederate home at Austin.

Mrs. Agnes Harwood Doyle, a niece and an adopted daughter, was summoned Wednesday afternoon by officials of the Confederate home.

Schmick, born in Pocahontas, Ark., came to Eastland when 26. He was commissioned by Governor Pope to serve as sheriff when the county was a wooded section.

Roosevelt Proves To Be Good Sailor

ABOARD U. S. S. CHESTER, at sea, Nov. 19.—President Roosevelt proved a good sailor today as he sped south aboard the cruiser Indianapolis toward South America for the opening of the Pan-American conference at Buenos Aires Dec. 1.

The weather was warm and no seasickness among the presidential party had developed despite heavy seas.

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 19.—The pajama-clad body of a girl found on the Fredericksburg road today was identified as that of Miss Clara Marsh, 27, of Sequin.

Officers considered the possibility that the girl had been murdered.

The battered condition of her body, a crushed skull, fractures of both legs and a broken left arm and shoulder hampered efforts at identification.

Cattle Ranchers of Five States Urge More Restrictions

DALHART, Nov. 19.—Cattle ranchers from five states urged today that not more than 75 per cent of the grazing land in this section be used at any one time.

The proposal for giving the land a rest was among those made to President Roosevelt's Great Plains drought committee here.

The Government under the proposal would pay ranchers the prevailing lease for land taken out of use at a rate not to exceed 50 cents an acre.

GREAT BRITAIN WILL PROTECT HER SHIPPERS

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Great Britain will protect her shipping in event of a blockade of Spanish ports, Anthony Eden, told the house of commons today.

Asked if British ships would be protected on the high seas if carrying goods to Barcelona, which the Spanish rebel government has threatened to blockade, Eden asserted:

"The rules would normally govern international action on those actions will be pursued by his majesty's government in the fact of legitimate British entry."

He promised he would seek specific assurances from Italy and Germany that their recognition of Gen. Francisco Franco's government would not mean they regarded themselves free to supply arms to the nationalists.

A thick concentration of loyal warships in the Mediterranean was reported. This was regarded as a sign Madrid is preparing to defy the threatened blockade of Barcelona and other ports and, if necessary, to challenge the insurgent fleet to a test of naval strength.

Autocracies to Blame for Menace of War

Recent news from Europe may be both confusing and ominous, but it does seem to prove once more that it is the autocracy and not the democracy which is a menace to world peace.

The reason is simple. An autocracy can get very hard-boiled in an international crisis without stopping to find out how the man on the street corner feels about it. A democracy cannot.

The democracy looks for a peaceable way to settle things; the autocracy lays its chips on the line and invites anyone who thinks it is bluffing to call the bet.

The Spanish rebellion offers an instructive example.

The two principle democracies of Europe, England and France, have worked desperately from the start to keep the trouble from spreading. Obviously, they do not want to go to war—for the excellent reason that their statesmen know perfectly well the ordinary Englishman and the ordinary Frenchman wouldn't stand for it.

So the English and the French devised a non-interference pact and went around Europe coaxing everyone to sign it.

Now look at the record of the dictatorships. The Italians gave a contemptuous lip service to the agreement and sent a flock of military airplanes to the Spanish rebels. The Germans sent a naval squadron to Spanish waters, acted very tough with it, and circulated the impression that they were ready to move up horse, foot and guns if anyone didn't like it.

Then the Russian dictatorship followed suit, denouncing the Germans and the Italians in a way that has led Europe much closer to the edge of war than most people like to think about.

All of which creates one more tense situation which the statesmen from London and Paris are trying frantically to ease.

The thing to bear in mind is that all the warlike moves have come from the dictatorships, and all the peaceful moves from the democracies.

The dictators are perfectly willing to skate right up to the edge of the precipice—up to a point where the smallest "incident" could send them and the rest of Europe over the brink.

The democracies are doing their level best to stay as far away from the precipice as the law allows.

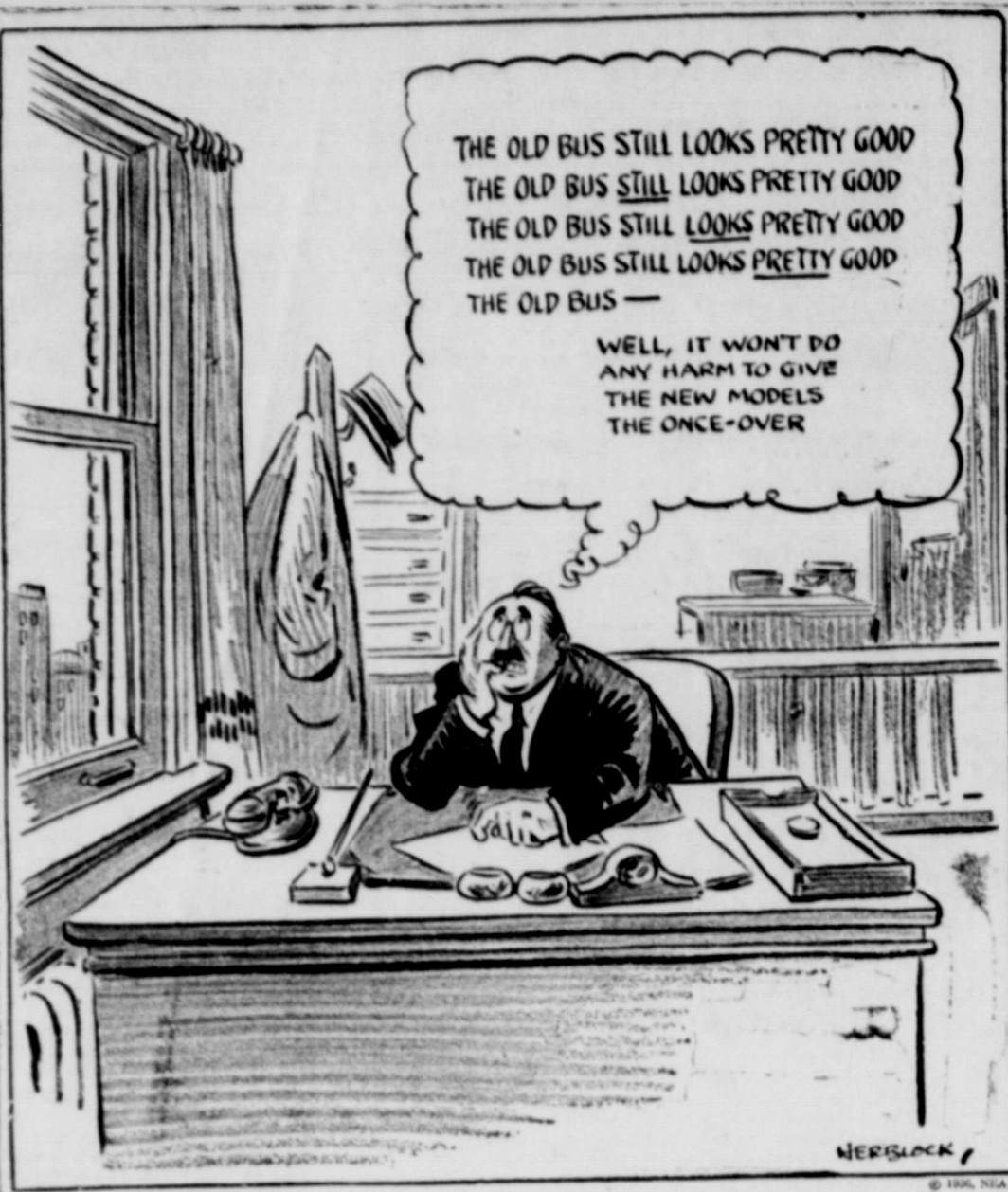
Now the ordinary German, the ordinary Italian, and the ordinary Russian may not feel any more like going out and getting shot on some foreign battlefield than do the ordinary Englishman and the ordinary Frenchman, who don't feel like it at all.

But the point is that what the German, the Italian, and the Russian feel like is of no importance. They have to do as they are told and like it.

It is only in the democracies that the citizen's abhorrence of war is something that need be taken in account.

Nearly 20 years ago we were advised that we must make the world safe for democracy. The advice is still sound. A dictatorship is a standing menace to world peace.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WITH RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON—Of the several more important members of the famous brain trust which helped Franklin D. Roosevelt plot the strategy, the speeches, and the promises of his 1932 campaign, only one was on the job in a close, intimate capacity in the 1936 campaign.

One by one the brain trusters who took important administration jobs, made speeches, and got into the limelight—unwillingly in some cases—have gone into the doghouse, turned sour, or at least moved several yards away from the throne.

The only one of the old crowd who went through the recent campaign at the president's side, collaborating on his speeches, advising on the strategy and phraseology, was the one who has been least publicized among the group. He is State Supreme Court Justice Samuel I. Rosenman, counsel to Roosevelt when the latter was governor of New York. Rosenman first moved to organize the original brain trust in 1932. He is 42 and served several terms in the New York legislature.

ROSENMAN, when Roosevelt started after the presidential nomination, called Ray Moley from Columbia University. The two planned a program for summoning academic experts to function in the field of economic thought while Farley and the political ex-

perts were busy working for delegates and votes. Moley recruited others, notably Rex Tugwell and Adolf Berle, from Columbia, and was a major factor in the Roosevelt speeches and messages for two or three years.

Then Moley made the mistake of accepting the post of assistant secretary of state and became a target for many brickbats. His blow-up with Secretary of State Cordell Hull at the London economic conference forced Roosevelt to move Moley into a more ambiguous post, but he remained a most important consultant. Moley left Washington with the presidential blessing to edit a pro-New Deal weekly magazine and for a time continued in presidential councils.

THE president's affection for Tugwell is still strong and there is no evidence that he is out of sympathy with Tugwell's ideas. But Tugwell became a political liability. His influence at the White House has diminished and likelihood is that he will return soon to Columbia University.

Berle went out of the picture after participating in much early New Deal legislation. He's a specialist in public finance, banking and railroad rehabilitation.

General Johnson, who joined the brain trust professors early in their career and later fought and bled for NRA, put in some effective licks with campaign speeches. The president is still fond of him, but Johnson has been erratically off and on the reservation and he is no longer of the "inner circle." The most effective advisers—or brain trusters—who maintained their influence have been men like Rosenman, who shunned the fierce white light which beats upon the throne.

WASHINGTON—If you think that millions of Americans are relieved that the campaign is over, you ought to talk to the boys who guard the president.

The tens of millions who have seen the chief executive in the last few weeks have little conception of the tremendous strain the campaign imposed on officers of the U. S. Secret Service.

The task of seeing that the president gets safely there and safely back again is one of the most intricate and important of assignments, and Col. Edward W. Starling's boys are glad it's over. That is, over for the campaign. For the responsibility of guarding the life of the president goes right on around the clock, every day of the year.

COLONEL STARLING, genial and alert chief of the White House Secret Service, invariably proceeds as the advance guard of presidential trips.

Starling plots the course the president will take and surveys the terrain at every platform stop. He goes into huddles with police chiefs, instructs them as to the handling of crowds, the placing of their men, the roping-off of certain areas, and the "spotting" of national guardsmen in case it is felt advisable to use them.

He arranges for stationing uniformed and plain-clothes men in hotels and other buildings which the president is to visit.

He consults with rail executives and trainmen, local politicians, hotel managers, waiters, and elevator operators.

When the president is to speak in a large stadium or auditorium, the whole structure is searched as if by fine-tooth comb.

Hours before the presidential party arrives, the building is practically sealed tight with Secret Service and police officers on constant guard. Through the stands usually are scattered hundreds of local plain-clothes men, under Secret Service supervision.

THE presidential party and train are in the charge of Russell Wood, first assistant to Starling. At the outset of every trip Wood goes through the entire train and checks up on everyone on board.

Only the presidential party, Wood's men, railroad men, newspapermen, photographers, and radio men travel on the train.

About a mile ahead dashes a pilot engine to assure clear tracks. Behind is a dummy train, there to prevent possible collision from the rear.

The greatest strain comes when the president leaves the train to be driven through crowded streets to a crowded destination. In cities, motorcycle cops usually travel ahead, followed by a pilot car full of local police and Washington operatives which precedes the presidential car. A Secret Service car invariably follows close behind the president on any automobile drive.

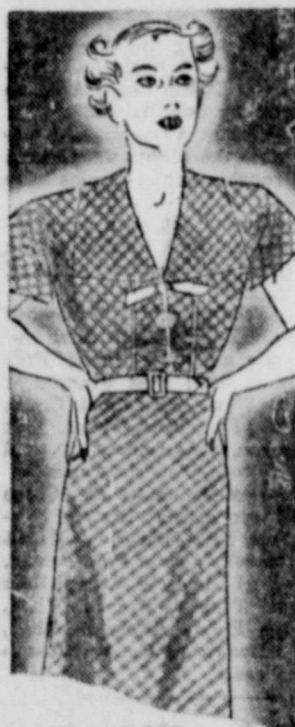

CANADA RATES PICKUP IN JOBS AHEAD OF U. S.

MONTREAL—Canada is making greater headway toward business and employment recovery than the United States, the Royal Bank of Canada reports in its current monthly business letter.

Although the recovery in business during the past three years has been accompanied by expansion in employment in both countries, unemployment continues to be a major problem, the bank states. Comparative figures show, however, that Canada has traveled more than half of the road toward recovery in employment whereas the United States has covered only one-quarter of the distance.

Reviewing the employment situation in the United States and Canada since the start of the depression, the bank declares that in both countries the volume of employment fell to lower levels than it did in most other parts of the world. At the worst period it amounted to from 15,000,000 to 15,500,000 in the United States and to about 1,000,000 in Canada.

Idle Ranks Compared
Today there are between 10,500,000 and 12,000,000 unemployed in the United States and from 600,000 to 750,000 in Canada.

"In neither country has unemployment been reduced to a reasonable magnitude," the letter states, "but at no time in the depression or during recovery has unemployment been proportionately as large in Canada as it has been in the United States."

Canada has shown a greater improvement than the United States in almost every one of the major categories of employment.

Canadian Mining Booms
"In mining, for example," the bank adds, "stands the strong contrast between the position of the anthracite miners in the

United States, where fewer than 50 per cent of the miners are employed, with that of Canada, where the index of employment is above 250 per cent of that in 1926. In other branches of mining the comparison is not so overwhelmingly favorable, but for mining as a whole, employment in Canada is well ahead of that in the United States."

In transportation in May, 1936, the last month for which detailed statistics are available for both countries, the United States index was 69.9, while that of Canada was 72.3. The wholesale and retail trade indexes stood at 85 in the United States and 118 in Canada. In manufacturing, the index was 84.7 in the United States and 102.7 in Canada.

The bank estimates that the number of workers gainfully employed constitutes 24.77 per cent of the population of Canada, and 24 per cent of that of the United States.

100,000 Germs In Average Sneeze

NEW YORK.—One hundred thousand germs may be poured into the air in an average sneeze, estimates the American Institute of Sanitation. A heavy sneeze by a person suffering from a deep cold or other ill may carry many more germs.

"The spread of colds and other respiratory ills is now generally recognized as often resulting from coughs and sneezes. The nose and throat of every person contain large numbers of bacteria. Influenza germs are often harbored by well people. When a person has a cold or gripe, influenza and other bacterial germs increase in number. As many as 50,000,000 bacteria in the mouth of well persons is not uncommon. In disease the germ population of the mouth may run into the hundreds of millions.

"The best way to keep free of colds this winter is to keep away from sneezers. Infection is caused by two things (1) exposure to germs, and (2) lowered resistance. Proper diet, exercise and rest will aid in sustaining resistance. But at the same time germs should be dodged as much as possible. Personal hygiene requires one to avoid close contact with persons with colds. The use of an antiseptic mouth wash is often effective as a preventive. Tests have shown that persons who gargled regularly during cold epidemics, thus reducing the number of bacteria in the mouth, had fewer colds than those who did not take such precautions.

"From a general health viewpoint the use of antiseptics in cleaning floors in schools, offices and homes should be regular practice. With countless germs floating about and landing on the floor, it is best to kill them there and not permit them to be scuffed into the air again. Another important preventive measure is the proper cleaning of dishes. Tests have shown that a 'clean glass' may have 50,000,000 germs on it. All dishes, both in homes and in public eating establishments, should be sterilized either with water, almost boiling, or with antiseptic chemicals."

Crew Saved, but It's Tragedy for Broken Ship



When an ocean-going steamer breaks in two and is left to the mercy of the waves, it's serious business, and dangerous for the crew. That is what happened to the 5696-ton ship, Bessemer City of New York, above, when it ran on rocks at Pinnacles Point, Cornwall, Eng. A farmer ashore heard the crash and warned a lifeboat station, which put out boats and saved the entire crew of 33 and the ship's cat. But there was tragedy for the ship itself. Its two sections are seen here wallowing in the shoals as Cornwall residents on the cliff watch it go to pieces.

Salute Once Fired With Sky Rockets

Nineteen guns fired by A. & M. College's student artillery corps were not in honor of Houston's Jesse Jones, head of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, who received an honorary law degree from the agricultural and mechanical college.

Although Jones' power and duties outweigh those of many cabinet officers, his position entitles him to no military salute. The guns boomed for Lieut. Gov. Walter Woodruff, who attended the ceremonies as Acting Governor of Texas.

Nineteen guns did fire a salute once for Jesse Jones, and they were set off by Woodruff. Jones had just secured the national Democratic convention of 1928 for Houston. Woodruff decided he should have a rousing welcome home. As part of the arrangements he wanted a salute. Military organizations could not give it. Regulations specified exactly for whom the guns might be fired. Officials in charge of the program substituted for the gun salute 19 sky rockets of a type that exploded with a bang after being shot into the air. As the train with Jones aboard rolled into Houston the first of the rockets was set off.

Salutes, incidentally, cost about \$50. That much powder is used up in the artillery courtesy. A President's salute of 21 guns costs proportionately more.

Strike Affects Hawaii's Menu

HONOLULU.—The tie-up of shipping in the Pacific as a result of the strike on the California coast is causing a serious situation here as regards foodstuffs, especially vegetables.

Contrary to popular belief about tropical islands, Hawaii is not self-sufficient from the standpoint of vegetables. With the prospects of a food shortage, the first result of the strike was an increase in the price of fresh inland-grown vegetables. On the first day of the strike they began rising till noon and after that prices advanced at the rate of a half cent an hour.

"Hawaii's supply of vegetables is somewhat limited at present," Ross H. Gast, manager of the Island Island Growers' Service, explained. "While there will not be a complete shortage of all vegetables should the strike continue, prices probably will increase as the strike goes on. This territory buys more than a million dollars worth of fresh vegetables from the United States each year, so that the situation created by the strike is evident."

"Government, army, navy and civil authorities have been campaigning for years to increase the amount of island produce, and if the strike has no other effect, we are hoping it at least will open the eyes of everyone to the necessity of becoming self-sufficient as to vegetable supply."

Stimulation of the Heavy Industries By-Product of WPA

SAN ANTONIO.—Stimulation of the heavy industries by expenditures of \$8,750,947 during the past year was pointed out as a by-product of the Texas Works Progress Administration in an analysis of materials, supplies and equipment purchases released by State Administrator H. P. Drought Saturday.

Lumping together \$4,986,100 spent by WPA and \$3,854,847 expended by sponsors on materials, supplies and equipment required for the operation of WPA projects, Drought enumerated the following purchases: lumber and its products, \$1,144,505; paints and varnishes, \$47,673; sand and gravel, \$950,630; crushed stone, \$268,908; cement, \$779,460; concrete products, \$344,997; brick, hollow tile and other clay products, \$243,009; stone and glass

products, \$378,107; structural and reinforcing steel, \$540,037; cast iron pipe and fittings, \$664,715; plumbing equipment and supplies, \$41,983; heating and ventilating equipment and supplies, \$13,908; tools, \$233,223; other iron and steel products, \$301,268; electrical machinery, apparatus and supplies, \$85,776; paving machinery, apparatus and supplies, \$4,683; motor trucks, \$5,383; other machinery and equipment, \$112,330; paving materials and mixtures—bituminous, \$557,643; petroleum products, \$118,048; office supplies and equipment (including furniture) \$77,281; textiles, \$1,211,730; chemicals and explosives, \$107,841; coal and other fuel except wood and petroleum, \$7,851; tires and rubber goods, \$6,262; non-ferrous metals, \$64,266; miscellaneous, \$458,330.

"Thus \$8,750,947 has gone to industrial and business firms," Drought commented. "Whenever possible, we have procured materials, equipment and supplies from firms operating in Texas. Figures quoted here are cumulative through October 31, and represent approximately one year of operation."

Drought analyzed the disposition of purchased materials, supplies and equipment by type of project as follows: Highway, road and street projects, \$3,539,413; public building projects, \$1,132,994; recreational facilities projects, \$661,359; flood control and conservation projects, \$278,402; sewer systems and other utilities projects, \$1,147,111; electric utilities projects, \$19,043; airports and other transportation projects, \$61,459; education projects, \$11,775; professional and clerical projects, \$207,169; goods projects, \$1,389,316; sanitation and health projects, \$229,643; distribution of surplus commodities projects, \$17,662; projects not elsewhere classified, \$55,601.

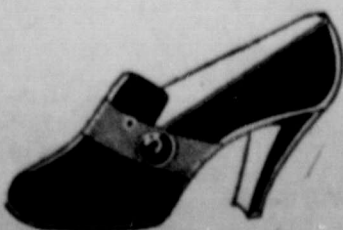

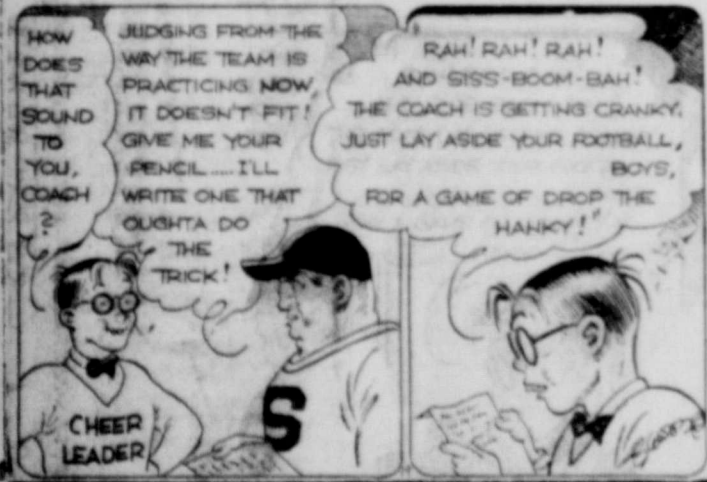

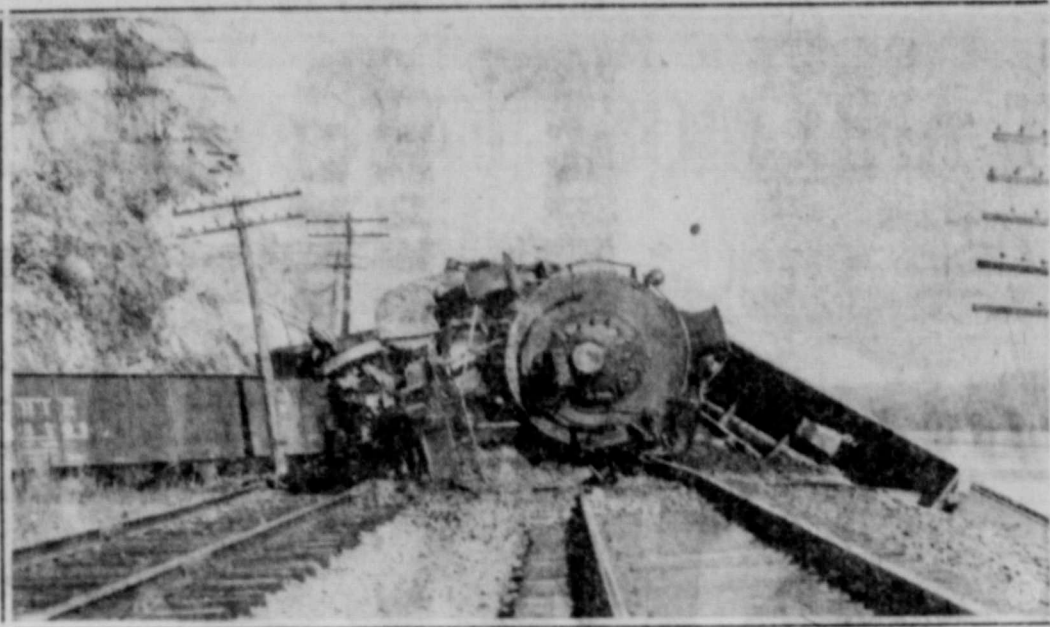

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

FOR protein and thrift, flavor and consistency, consult the lowly lima bean—especially dried lima beans. Buy them packaged by the pound. They make good house pets when the budget is to be carefully guarded.

Lima bean and tomato casserole is a beautiful luncheon dish. To make enough to serve eight, use 2 cups dried lima beans, 1 large onion, 1 tablespoon bacon drippings, 3 sprigs parsley, 1 cup canned tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste. Soak the beans overnight. Slice (not chop) the onion and then fry it lightly in the bacon drippings. Add onions, drippings and parsley to the beans in a large saucepan. Turn in the canned tomatoes and cover with boiling water. Season. Simmer until the beans are tender and practically all the water is absorbed.

Grease a large casserole dish. Turn in the cooked beans. Remove the parsley. Smooth the top, then dust with dry cracker crumbs. Dust crumbs with 1-2 cup grated cheese. Sprinkle with paprika. Place under broiler until crumbs and cheese have become familiar enough to form a tempting cover for those beans and tomatoes.

Lima Beans and Fresh Vegetable Casserole for Eight

Lima beans and fresh vegetable casserole is another inexpensive, healthful dish that doesn't remind you of medicine. For eight servings, use 2 cups beans, 1 large onion, 2 raw carrots, 1-2 cup celery, chopped, and 1-2 cup canned tomatoes. Soak beans and cook until tender. Drain and chop. Chop the onion, carrot and celery and mix with the chopped beans. Add tomatoes. Grease a baking

dish, add seasoned vegetables evenly mixed. Moisten with bean stock. Bake in moderate oven for 35 minutes. As the liquid cooks away, add a little more. The finished dish should be moist, not wet.

Cream of Lima Bean Soup for 4

Cream of lima bean soup makes a delicate luncheon dish. For 4 servings, use 1 cup cooked dry lima beans, 1-2 cup cream, 1 cup lima bean stock, 1 cup clear chicken or veal stock, 1 teaspoon minced onion, parsley, salt and pepper, and 1 teaspoon lemon juice.

Chop the cooked lima beans. Return to saucepan with bean stock and soup. Season with salt and pepper. Add 1 teaspoon minced onion and 1 sprig of parsley. Simmer 10 minutes, then strain through collander. Return strained soup to saucepan, add cream and lemon juice. Bring to just below boiling point. Remove from fire. Serve in cups with 1 little chopped parsley on top of each cup.

Sport Glances. By Grayson

NEW YORK—Directors of the Brooklyn Baseball Club have one redeeming feature. They somehow always manage to come up with a manager who keeps the game close to the customers.

The lamented Wilbert Robinson and Casey Stengel and now Burleigh Grimes. Try to match that trio for entertaining qualities.

The Flatbush board made just one mistake. It was signing Max Carey to succeed Uncle Robby. Carey tried to make head or tails out of the situation. Lionel Barrymore wouldn't be any more out of place in burlesque than was the erudite Carey trying to make the Dodgers run bases like himself. Ebbets Field patrons never forgive Professor Max for trading Babe Herman, the most perfect Dodger of them all.

Before Carey took charge, Brooklyn at least had a show. When he had finished, the Dodgers weren't even funny. And the Flatbush trade insists upon its laughs.

Grimes, a Dodger at heart, meets all requirements of a Brooklyn manager. Old Burleigh qualified for the post well—by finishing seventh with the Louisville club of the American Association.

It was a rare opportunity for the Missouri farmer to demonstrate his showmanship and salesmanship and he made the most of it. The Colonels doubled home attendance with more than 80,000 paid admissions, which is vastly more than far better Louisville clubs have played to in their own park in years.

It just naturally followed that such a leader would be paged by the Dodgers.

If you considered John McGraw an umpire baiter, just wait until you get a peek at Grimes. Old Burleigh was given the bum's rush no less than 22 times in the

American Association last season. Fortunately for the owners, the famous old spitball pitcher found it hardest to hold his temper on Saturday afternoons in Louisville, which was as good a way as any of bringing the addicts out on Sunday, when they had the time.

There must be a little wrestler in Grimes, for he made his tantrums very realistic on occasion. As a matter of fact, old Burleigh became a bit too vigorous at times, as Fred Haney, the one-time Detroit third baseman managing Toledo, will testify.

OLD BURLEIGH likes to get aboard opposing pitchers, too, especially those with rabbit ears. It just so happens that Grimes can handle his dukes pretty well himself, so it was inevitable that the two would have it out sooner or later. It happened—in Louisville on a Saturday afternoon, of course—when Grimes was directing one of his verbal blasts at one of the Mudhen moundmen.

Old Burleigh not only knocked Haney down, but did a fair kind of job of carrying his initials on the Toledo guide's face with his spikes when he got him there. Grimes stirred up plenty of excitement in whipping the Bloomington club to the Three-Eye League pennant in his first managerial assignment in 1935, too.

Old Burleigh knows all there is to know about baseball and certainly ought to know how to handle pitchers.

The biggest point in his favor, however, is that there never was a dull moment during his pitching days or since, and it is to be hoped that he doesn't let the major league billet cramp his style.

The dodge can stand a shot in the arm such as Burleigh Grimes is competent of giving it.

And the matchless Brooklyn show simply must go on.

EVANSTON—Lynn Waldorf was known as a November coach when he assumed command of Northwestern's football forces last year. In eight seasons his clubs have lost only two contests in November.

"I guess I never have learned to bring a team to top form soon enough. It is one of those things that I must get around to doing," remarked Waldorf, when on Nov. 2 of last year his Wildcats lived up to their coach's reputation by beating Illinois after having lost to Purdue, Ohio State, and Minnesota.

Waldorf seems to have corrected his one fault, for Northwestern hasn't been repelled since. But Waldorf plainly found a way of making haste more rapidly in an easy manner. Beating mighty Minnesota and being in the position of protecting the foremost position in football hasn't altered the practice of the Northwestern array. It still is a bunch of kids having a lot of fun, with their coaches enjoying the sport as much as they do.

WALDORF was throwing passes for the Northwestern freshmen against the varsity. The 250-pound chap who played so much tackle at Syracuse isn't the most accomplished passer in the world, but blond Don Heap, Ollie Adelman, Fred Vanzo, and the others were getting a terrific kick out of knocking down or intercepting their coach's passes.

At the whop let out by Waldorf when he completed a forward won't be any more enthusiastic if he completes a perfect season by repulsing Notre Dame, Nov. 21.

Although Waldorf is only 31, your boy,

the Northwestern players call him "Pappy." I can't recall a coach who was—or is—closer to his men.

"The boys have got to like you if you are to get the most out of them," smiles Waldorf.

"We whipped Minnesota in the line, and the reason we were able to do it was that our linemen like their coach, Burt Ingerson. They play their heads off for him."

WHEN Northwestern sprang one of the bigger upsets of 1935 by beating Notre Dame, Waldorf remarked that it was a happy culmination for boys who had suffered three defeats.

Reviewing the victory over Minnesota, Lynn O. plainly derives the most satisfaction out of the performances of Vanzo and Bernie Jackson.

The blocking and defensive work of Vanzo, 215-pound quarterback, was so superb that it attracted All-America attention. "I am extremely happy about Vanzo's game, for it will make him forget the Purdue game in which he was the victim of a bad break last season," says Waldorf.

"A young and awkward substitute for Duval, Vanzo helped buck the ball to the Purdue line where he fumbled and we lost the ball. He has felt very badly about this, which is something I don't want my players to do."

"I am very proud of Jefferson. He danced in one place when we got him. See his long stride now. And there was plenty of courage in back of that long kick he got off from behind our goal line."

Lynn Waldorf is the kind of a man you would like to have coach your boy.

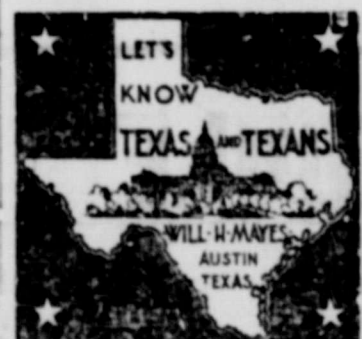

believed that it was filed and destroyed by a fire that burned the Adjutant General's office at Austin, in October, 1855. There is a certified copy, however, attested by Adjutant General J. C. Swisher and James Davidson. The Dallas News has a copy, the complimentary closing and signature of which is in Houston's handwriting, dated April 25, 1836 and addressed to the editor of the Louisiana Advertiser by Houston, in which paper it was first printed.

Q. What was the "Mer expedition" and what were the results? O. P.

A. When Gen. Adrain Well invaded Texas in September, 1842, some 750 Texans under Gen. Alexander Somervell chased the Mexicans to the Rio Grande where Somervell ordered his forces to withdraw to Gonzales because of lack of provisions and equipment. About 300 refused to obey the order and under leadership of Col. W. S. Fisher pursued the Mexicans to Mier, where the Texans were forced to surrender after a desperate fight, December 25-26, 1842. Every tenth Texas prisoner was executed by the Mexicans, and the survivors were imprisoned in Castle Perote.

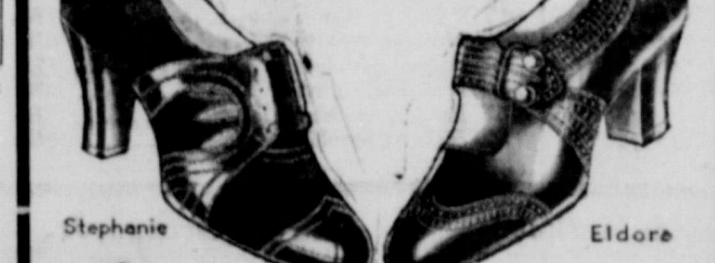
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Giant Bombers Tax Navy Bases

SAN DIEGO, Cal.—The problem of housing the navy's new 13-ton flying boats faces officials at North Island air station as the first group of six of the giant ships nears completion here.

The navy has contracted for 110 of the flying boats to be stationed at various strategic bases. Two already have been delivered to the North Island air station at San Diego, but there is not enough hangar space available to accommodate all the smaller planes there.

The problem is more than one of housing. "A system has to be devised which would enable the flying boats to get away quickly in case of emergency," Lieut. Cecil F. Harper, operations officer at North Island, said. "This type of airship is being manufactured larger every year, and that makes it difficult to figure on permanent hangars."

Capt. Arthur L. Bristol, commanding officer of the Naval Air Station, spent several days at the Pan-American Airways base at Alameda observing methods of housing and handling the trans-Pacific clippers.

The first six of the giant patrol bombers are expected to be completed some time in December and will be flown to Pearl Harbor air station in Hawaii shortly after the first of the year. A second group of six is tentatively scheduled for completion two months later. These ships also will be flown to Pearl Harbor.
