Horns Trap Wolverines In Homecoming 'Hunt'

The Hart Longhorns continued to roll in their bid for the district championship before a cold, but excited homecoming crowd as they skinned the Springlake-Earth Wolverines 42-0.

Hart kicked off to S-E to open the game but neither team was successful on their first offensive series. However, when Hart punted to the Wolverines, the Horn's Jackie Ethridge knocked the ball loose

from Terry Hood and Gary Jackson fell on it on the six. Three plays later Kerry George, using blocks of Larry Marble, Glen Black, and Lester Aven, struck from 3 yards out for the score with 6:42 of the first left. Bobby Allensworth continued his string when the PAT kick was good.

After the second kick off, S-E had only four plays before they had to give up the ball on a punt. The Keevin Kelley kick came off the side of the foot and

only traveled five yards. As a result, the Horns had the ball on the Wolverine's 34. Using only seven plays, George got the final 6 yards for the Horns thanks to extra effort blocks of Bryan Irons, Marble, Aven and Black. With 1:42 showing, Allensworth extended his PAT kicks to seven straight.

Defeat Of Farwell Steers Horns' Pass To Play-Offs

Hart Longhorns seek a big win Friday night as they take on Farwell in the Steers' own corral. Both teams have identical season records of 7-1 but the Longhorns hold the top

notch in District 3-A with a 3-0 showing compared to Farwell, Kress and Springlake-Earth who have identical 2-1 records.

A victory Friday would move the Horns into "good field position" and entitle them to represent the District in the play-offs despite the outcome of the season finale with Bovina.

Should Hart lose to Farwell and Kress win over Springlake-Earth Friday night, a three-way tie would exist. Victories by each in their final outing would require a coin toss.

The giant rally is slated for 4:30 p.m. Friday in the parking lot of Hart Oil and Butane. Everyone is needed to make the send off a success.

Carrasco, driver of the vehicle, was transferred Monday to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He was suffering from neck injuries but a Plainview spokesman reported his condition as fair.

According to investigating officers of the Department of Public Safety, the car ran off FM highway 194 and overturned at 4:50 p.m. Sunday.

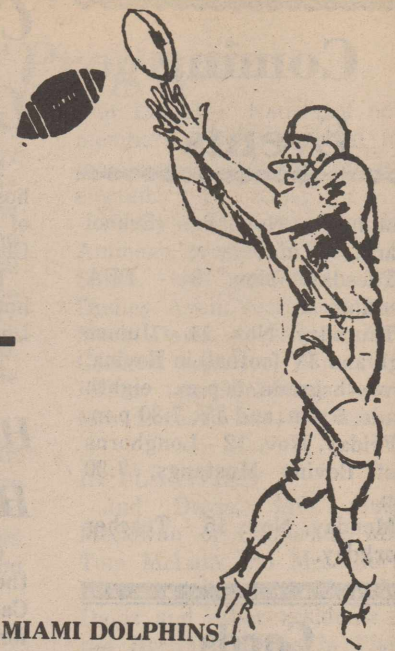

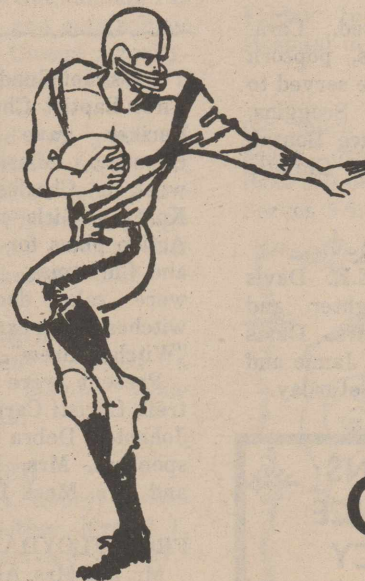

move on the next series, they punted to the Hart 34. Then the Wolverines got their first break of the game when George didn't get his hands on the ball and S-E's Kirk O'Hair covered it on the 30. Springlake then moved to the Hart 13 for their only penetration of the night before Timmy Thomas' pass was picked off by Hart's Allensworth in the end zone to stop the threat.

The next time Springlake had the ball, QB Mark Barton bobbled the wet ball on the Hart 35 and linebacker Cary McLain alertly swept it in for the Horns. Hart then marched the 65 yards to pay dirt on six plays one a 39 yard locomotive runaway charge by Black, and capped by the half yard plunge of Aven. Allensworth had his "string" of PAT's broken by a real string when the one he uses to tie up his toe knotted up and would not do its job. At this point, there was 2:56 left in the half.

With the Wolverines in possession, and a touch defense facing them, S-E decided to go to the air since time was short and they had been unable to sustain their ground game. One pass was incomplete, then a penalty cost them their only completion of the night, and finally Irons intercepted a Kelley pass on the Springlake

35 and returned it 5 yards to the 30.

On the second play of the series Eliazar Castillo hit Johnny Newsom for 34 yards. On the next play, Hart did not punch in and motion penalty moved the Longhorns back to the 5½ yard line. From there, Castillo rolled around end on a keeper for the score with 28 seconds left behind blocks by Newsom and Black. After a Wolverine penalty on the PAT moved the ball to the 1½, Hart decided to go for two points but a missed block allowed a S-E man to tackle Aven. Springlake then ran out of time after two plays.

Newsom took the second half kick off on the 15 and returned it to the 30. Then Hart proceeded to cram the ball down the Wolverine's throat as they marched it 70 yards to pay dirt on 10 plays. One of those was a 23 yard scamper by Aven and the drive was capped by Black when he plunged across from the two with 7:20 left. Marble, Irons and Donald Robinson were key blockers on the TD. Allensworth's kick was good.

Disaster struck the Wolverines again on the kick off when Terry Hood could not find the handle and Rodolfo Gonzales came up with it on the 24. Hart's first play went for no gain and then Aven followed the blocks of Allensworth, McLain and Castillo for 24 yards and the score with 6:31 showing Allensworth kick was no good following a Hart penalty. The \$26 footballs that were used by Allensworth on the last two extra point tries were ripped off by some thief.

On Springlake-Earth's next possession, they moved to two first downs before Black, Berto Minjarez and Irons demolished Timmy Thomas for a 10 yard loss when Barton pitched wildly.

Hart then took the ball following the punt and marched it 91 yards, including a 40 yarder by Aven, on 8 plays capped by a 15 yard run by Aven on the second play of the final quarter. The TD, however, was called back for a clipping penalty. On a third and eight, Hart failed to get the first so Bobby Allensworth

lined up and drilled the uprights for a 34 yard field goal.

The rest of the game, neither team could keep moving the ball because of mistakes as new people got in the game. Hart lost three fumbles, one by Black and two by sophomore QB Ricky Rowland, that ended scoring threats. S-E's Barton lost a fumble to Black on their 14. Newsom intercepted a Barton pass on the Wolverines 34 and Bryan Irons polished off the game by intercepting a Barton pass on the last play of the game.

For the night, the Hart coaching staff praised the whole team with special recognition for defensive players Black with 8 tackles, 1 fumble recovery, 4 big hits; McLain with 8 tackles, 1 fumble recovery and 1 big hit; Irons with 9 tackles, 1 big hit and 2 pass interceptions; and Marble with 7 tackles.

Offensively, Hart had two players with over 100 yards. Aven was the leading rusher with 176 yards on 18 carries and he scored two TD's. Full-back Black had 106 yards on 18 carries and 1 TD. Kerry George had 32 yards on 9 carries and 2 TD's before he was injured in the second quarter. Castillo guided the Horns flawlessly, throwing 1 pass for 34 yards to Newsom and scoring a TD.

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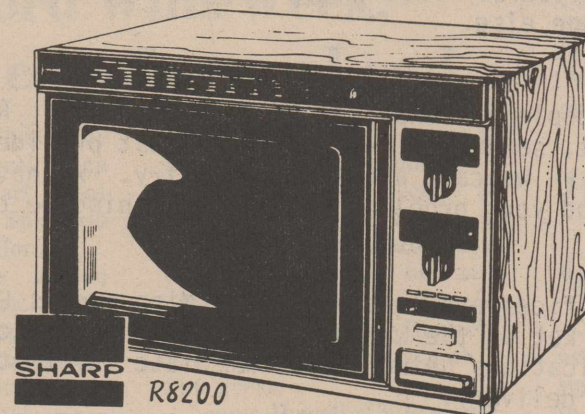
