Crane wins district crown

The Crane Golden Cranes, behind the 24 point performance of Kenny Walker, handed the Colorado City Wolves a 64-62 defeat at Wolf gym last Friday night.

With the victory, the Cranes dealt the Wolves their only loss of the second half of the district 7AAA basketball race and also earned the visitors the district championship.

The Wolves, who ended the regular season 12-8 with identical 4-1 records in both halves of the district race, now advance to the state playoffs as the district's runner-up.

Colorado City will play 8-AAA champion Gatesville Friday at a site and time to be determined this week. Colorado City and Gatesville also tangled in bi-district football action.

The Colorado City and Crane championship game was as close as the final score indicates. Crane opened up leads of seven and eight points in the second period while the Wolves enjoyed a brief six point lead midway through the final period.

"We had our chances," said head Colorado High School basketball coach Mike Hart.

"We just didn't capitalize. Looking back, there's probably 1,000 things we could've done differently."

"We've got to put our minds to work real hard and take advantage of the two team play off structure."

"I thought we played well," said Hart. "They played even better. We didn't rebound well

and two or three free throws here and there really would've helped."

Both teams came out gunning for points as the two squads combined for 38 first period points—with Crane taking a 20-18 lead. Nine of 14 free throw shooting twice helped the Wolves cut the Cranes' two second period margins.

Walker scored 12 points in the first period but sat out most of the second period with foul trouble—as did Randle.

Randle exploded for 11 of the Wolves 17 third period points as Colorado City took the lead at 46-44 after three periods.

Randle went on to score 10 fourth period points to finish with a team high 23 points after scoring only two the entire first half.

The Wolves made only seven of 16 free throw attempts the second half while Crane made eight of 13.

Armando Rivera stole an in-bounds pass with the score knotted at 62-62 with 38 seconds left, but the Wolves threw the ball away at least three times after that.

Scoring totals were Randle 23, Doug Chitsey 13, Ruben Rivera nine, Armando Rivera six, Mike Ligon and Terry Jackson four and Ken Woods three.

Gerald Mitchell added 15 for Crane.

Crane won the junior varsity contest 43-39 in double overtime. Scoring for the Wolves were Scott Dennis 12, Michael Swann 11, Marty Cleckler eight, Larry Mayes six and Cory Flanagan two.

Sparks named police chief

The city council of Colorado City Friday named Bobby Sparks of Colorado City as police chief.

Sparks, 35, a native of Colorado City, was chosen from a final field of three candidates and assumes the position left vacant by Ken Farrow who resigned Jan. 8 at the request of the city council.

During a special meeting of the council Friday, City Manager Brenda Tarter recommended that Sparks be hired for the \$18,500 a year job. Don Bennett made the motion with Jessie Munoz seconding it. The decision was unanimous. Council member Robert Hoback was absent.

The council interviewed Sparks along with Lt. Don Pennington of the Colorado City Police Department and Steve Brasher of Abilene on Feb. 4. Those three candidates had been selected from about 30 applications the city received.

In making her recommendation, Mrs. Tarter stated that "I want to thank the police department for all their time and effort during this period" without a chief.

"Lt. Don Pennington has done a fine job during this period and we thank him and the entire department for their support," said Mrs. Tarter.

During the time the city was without a chief, Pennington was in charge of the police department.

Sparks, whose duties were to begin Saturday, thanked the council for their decision and pledged his support.

"I'm looking forward to working with you," he said. "I know

"it was a hard decision."

Sparks said he plans some immediate changes in the department, with one of the top priorities to get the department opened back up to the public.

He stressed cooperation between the department and residents.

"The department has been a long time getting this way and it'll take a while to get it straightened out," said Sparks.

Sparks is a graduate of Colorado High School and Howard County College. He is a former police chief of Loraine and a former member of the police reserves. Most recently, he has been a used car dealer.

During his interview with the council at the Feb. 4 meeting, Sparks said "I was born and raised here, I've raised my family here and I plan on staying here."

Loraine council sets election

The Loraine City Council decided Thursday night, during its regular monthly meeting, not to hold a joint election with the school district this year.

Instead, Loraine citizens will be casting ballots for mayor and city council candidates at the city hall on Saturday, April 6.

Mayor Tommy Green has announced his intentions to seek re-election to that post and councilman Rick Rickard also has filed for re-election. The

only other candidate for council to date is Roy Price. The council seats currently occupied by Kent Boyd and Joel Ray Atkins are also up for re-election this year.

In other business, Thursday, the council named Guy Hilderbrand as city fire marshal to replace the late Ray Preston.

Final plans were also made for purchase of a land site. The five-acre site is being purchased from Lonnie Williams for \$5,000.

The council also discussed needed repairs to a city-owned house and the possibility of renting the house, but no action was taken on the matter.

The council tentatively agreed to a contract with the Fort Worth law firm of Purdue, Brandon, Blair and Fielder as the city's delinquent tax attorneys. City attorney Ralph Strother recommended a change in part of the contract before the council gives final approval.

In 1978-79 he was vice chairman of the board.

Cone also currently serves as president of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

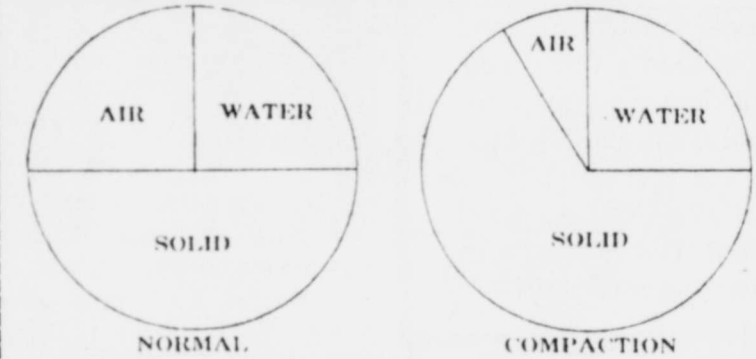

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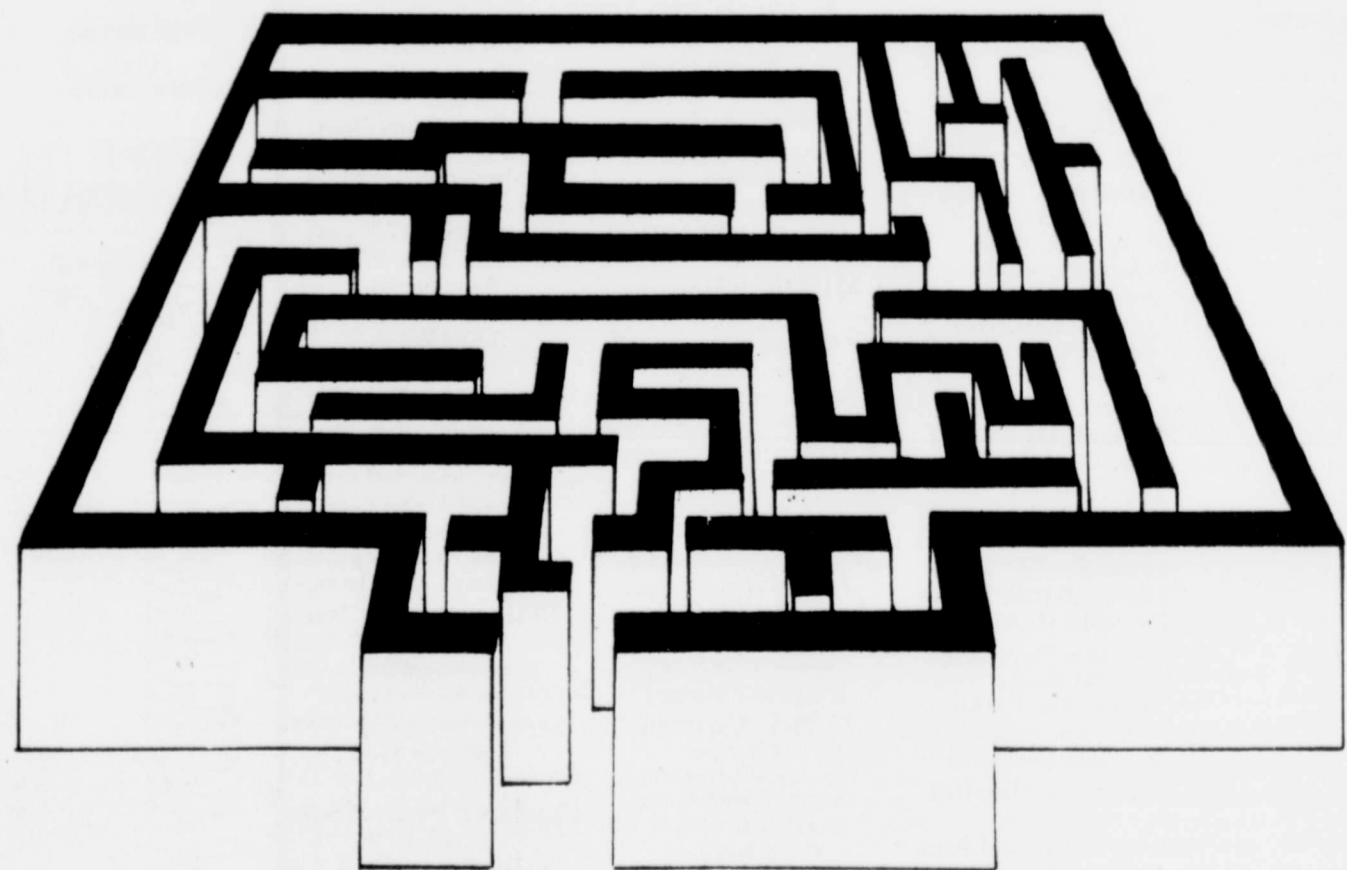
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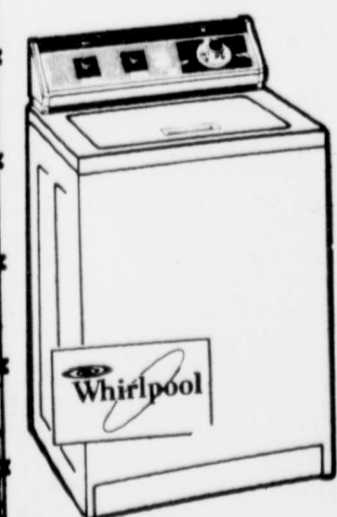

Rev. Glenn Roenfeldt First Baptist Church "MISTER, WHAT GOES ON IN THERE?"

As a minister walked up the steps to enter a church building in New York State he noted three youngsters about seven to ten years of age, playing on the steps. They were intently listening from the outside to a congregation singing on the inside. One of the underprivileged youngsters quizzed the entering minister, "Say, Mister, what goes on in there?"

The Princeton pollsters tell us that about forty million people in America attend church each Sunday. Perhaps the other 160 million are asking themselves the same question asked by the youngsters, "What really goes on in there?"

Why do people attend worship? They do not attend out of coercion, because this is a free country where a man has a right to any or no religious beliefs. They do not attend for amusement purposes since more professional entertainment can be found elsewhere. They do not attend to parade their piety, because present day morality and standards do not require it.

They attend worship because they need God's forgiveness. They attend in order to find fellowship, as many find themselves today a part of a lonely crowd. Others attend in order to find daily strength to face their temptations, frustrations and failures of life. The music, the people, and the inspiration from God's Word help them experience God's presence and infuse them with strength they must have for trying times. They attend because there is, as one great theologian said, a God shaped vacuum in every heart.

"What goes on in there?" Forgiveness, healing, fellowship with God and man, recognition of a God who loves us and strengthening of personal relationship with the living God, that's what goes on in most church buildings. I for one need that!

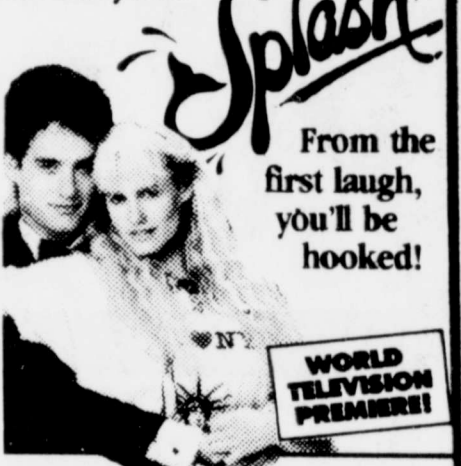

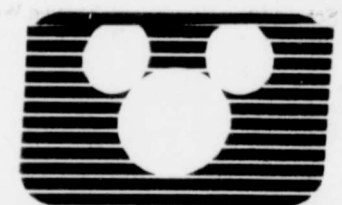

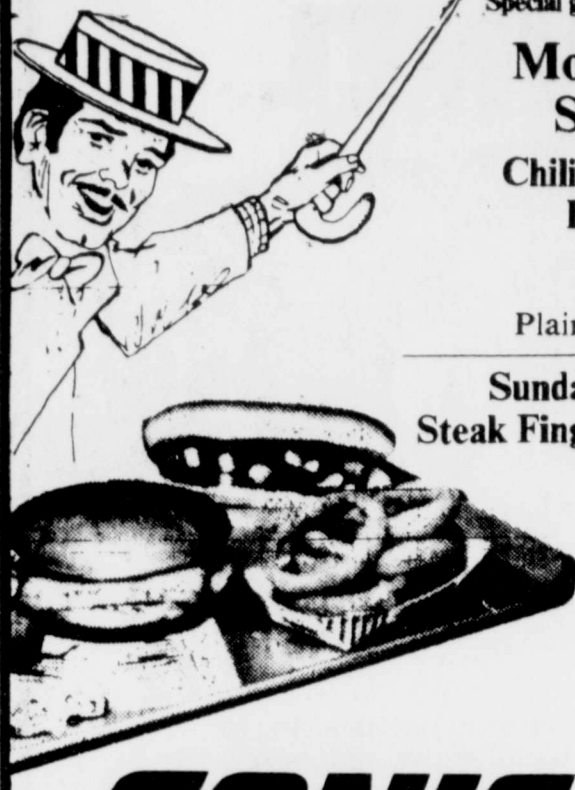

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Wolves clinch playoff spot

The Colorado City Wolves got revenge and clinched a playoff spot by posting a 46-40 district 7AAA basketball victory at Ballinger last Tuesday night.

The win over the Bearcats improved the Wolves' second half record to 4-0, erased a 58-52 loss to the Bearcats here two weeks ago and set up a showdown between the Wolves and the Crane Golden Cranes.

Colorado City and Crane tied for the first half title with 4-1 records. The two teams were scheduled to play here last Friday in the last night of the district schedule. To the winner of that game would go the district championship and to the loser would go the runner-up slot.

Results of that game can also be found in this issue of the RECORD.

Against Ballinger, which ended the season in sole possession of third place, the Wolves led through practically the entire game but never really opened up a comfortable lead.

Had Ballinger shot better than its 10 of 24 free throw attempts, it might have been a different story. Same for the Wolves, who made 14 of 25 charity shots.

Colorado City led by four

points after one period (8-4) and at halftime (20-16) but Ballinger pulled to within one (28-27) after three periods.

The Wolves enjoyed their best offensive output in the fourth quarter to take the win—scoring on five goals and eight of 12 free throw attempts for 18 points.

Two goals by Ruben Rivera and one each by Armando Rivera and Don Randle gave the Wolves their 8-4 lead then both teams scored 12 second period points.

Ken Woods scored seven second period points with two goals and three free throw and went on to score on five more second half free throws to finish with a team high 12 points.

R. Rivera added a second period goal and in the fourth, scored a goal and two free throws to also finish in double figures with 10.

Other scoring totals were Randle, eight, Armando Rivera seven, Terry Jackson four, Doug Chitsey three and Mike Ligon two.

The Wolves committed 19 turnovers and collected 41 rebounds.

Randle, the team's usual scoring and rebounding leader spent most of the game on the

bench because of foul trouble.

He finished with eight rebounds while Chitsey, Woods and Armando Rivera collected 12, 11 and four respectively.

Defensively, Chitsey, Armando Rivera and R. Rivera finish-

ed with 13, 11 and eight defensive marks. Armando Rivera posted three of the team's seven total assists.

Ballinger won the junior varsity contest 42-31.

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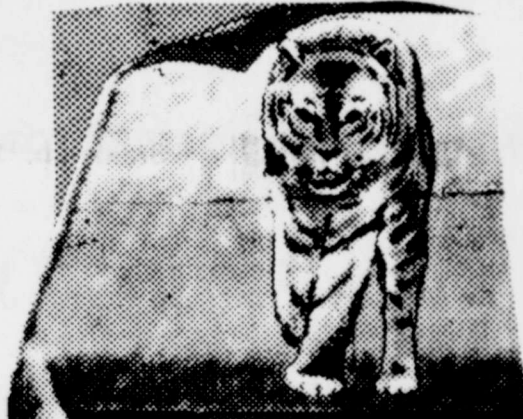

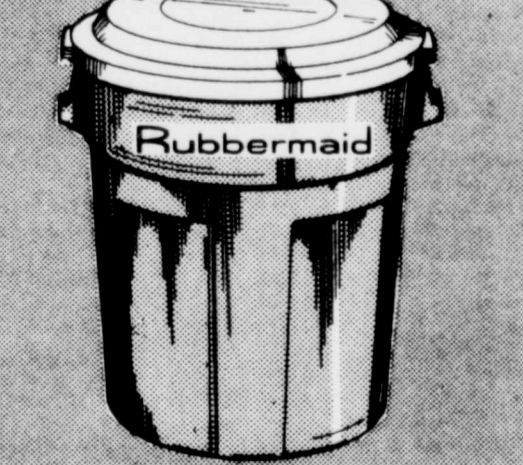

Crop insurance discussed

Dottie Samly of the Big Spring office of the Federal Crop Insurance Corp. told a gathering of Mitchell County farmers Thursday that the maximum level of coverage for cotton will be 55 cents a pound this year.

Hosted by Don Stewart of the local ASCS office, Thursday's meeting drew a crowd of about 50 farmers.

Ms. Samly was on hand to explain changes in the 1985 cotton insurance program as well as the grain sorghum program.

She said April 15 is the last day to sign up for crop insurance and encouraged those present to do so as soon as possible.

"If you have not requested it, do so as early as possible. Have your yields figured on your cotton and grain sorghum even if you're just thinking about it," she explained.

She said she understands many farmers may be diversifying this year and planting grain sorghum as well as cotton.

"If you do not have records for grain sorghum, there is a transitional yield that can be used if you have not grown grain sorghum before in order to establish your some yields for 1985," she said.

She said that this year, when establishing yields, the last 10-year average will be used with the lowest year and the highest year dropped.

"It makes no difference with FCIC who you buy crop insurance from," she said. "There are plenty of agents out there who can help you."

She said if a farmer does not want crop insurance, he must say so by April 15.

"If you had crop insurance in 1984, you'll automatically have it in 1985 unless you submit a written request to get out of it," she noted.

Stewart announced that the 1984 deficiency checks are in and that the 18.6 deficiency payment should generate about \$3.5 million in payments to Mitchell County alone.

Stewart said that the target price for upland cotton this year is 81 cents a pound and that the weighted national loan rate is 57 30 cents a pound.
