Farmers Vote Dec. 11 on AAA Leaders

Scrimmage Play For Whirlwinds Here on Friday

The Whirlwinds at least will have the advantage of a scrimmage game before their conference championship struggle with the Spur Bulldogs at Jones stadium, on Thursday of next week, which is being observed by the schools of the area as Thanksgiving day.

The scrimmage will be held on the western field Friday afternoon and the opponent for the practice scrap will be the Plainview Bulldogs of District 1-A. Plans for the scrimmage were made by Coach Murry and Plainview's coach the first of the week. Both teams have some players and some timing that need to be tried out. Additionally the Whirlwinds are badly in need of a game to keep in condition. They were idle last week-end except for team practice.

Lindell Roberts Working Out

If he can get back into condition Lindell Roberts, early season back with a broken collar bone, will see some practice in the Friday scrimmage and will get to play some against Spur. It is now believed, Roberts has some weight and is the team's speediest man. His loss from the backfield was a considerable blow when it happened. However, he helped out by making Ralph Womack a more versatile man. Womack now carries an assignment on the end on defensive play and takes the backfield on offensive. His brother Bill has had the assignment at end on offense.

Spur Game November 30

The Green and White will close their season with the championship game against Spur Bulldogs at Jones stadium in Spur. It will be a holiday for the schools and most of the stars of Floydada will be closed to observe Thanksgiving, so that many local fans, if they can find a way to go will be on hand when the whistle blows at 2 o'clock next Thursday afternoon. Change in the schedule from today (Thursday, November 23) was made some weeks ago when the school authorities revised their schedules. Chiefs Jackknives and Crosbyton Falls dropping out.

The Spur-Floydada game will be played on three days ahead of the deadline set by the Interscholastic League authorities, which names December 2 as the last day on which a champion may be determined and certified.

R. J. Kidd, athletic director of the league, says in a statement from Austin that bi-district championship must play not later than December 9. Regional Conference A championship play must be no later than December 16.

A second election, this one without parties, speeches and torchlight parades, and limited to the farmers of the nation will be held between December 11 and 16. Sometime within these six days every farmer taking part in AAA programs will have an opportunity to vote for community committeemen.

In Floyd County these elections will be held on Monday, December 11, at 2:30 p. m. in the following communities: Lone Star, South Plains, Aiken, Lockney, Cedar Hill, Floydada, McCoy and Baker.

The farmers elected at these meetings will be responsible for insuring maximum benefits to farmers of their communities for the many programs and activities of the Agricultural Adjustment agency.

The work of local committeemen includes explaining AAA practices, certifying applications for payment and assisting with storage and loan programs.

More important than anything else, Paul Snodgrass, County AAA chairman points out, the organized effort made possible by the elected farmer committeemen puts American agriculture in a position to act quickly and unitedly in the reconversion to peace, just as it made agriculture the first in effectively adjusting in the needs of war.

All farm operators—men or women—who will take part in the program in 1945 are eligible to vote in community elections. In addition to electing community committeemen, the meetings also will name delegates to a county convention to be held later to elect county committeemen.

In emphasizing the importance of full attendance at the election meetings, Mr. Paul Snodgrass quotes N. E. Dodd, national AAA Chief:

"These elections, much the same as local school elections and like the town meetings of other days, constitute real democracy in action. With the approach of peace, AAA elections take on a new significance. It is more important than ever to have the best men available on AAA committees. The solving of farm problems at this stage of the war, and those that face the nation from here on out will require the best possible leadership and the full participation of farmers."

Earl Edwards, Ben Quebe on County Board

Earl Edwards of Lakeview and Ben Quebe of Providence are the two new members of the Floyd County School Board. They were chosen Monday in a meeting of the county board.

Edwards takes the place of member-at-large succeeding Judge Jno. W. Howard, who died last week, while Quebe was named in Precinct Two to take the place of F. S. Byars, who died in September while a member of the board.

Members of the board which made the appointments Monday are J. T. McLain, precinct one, C. W. Burton, precinct three, and R. M. Battey, precinct four.

C. O. Spence, Hit And Run Driver Victim, Recovers

Chas. O. Spence, 56, knocked down and dragged several yards by a hit and run driver about 9 o'clock Tuesday night on the highway three miles west of Ralls is recovering at Pitts hospital here and reported doing well this morning.

Brought to Floydada by Roy Edmonson after being left for dead, Spence has a bad gash in the top of his head, a chipped place on the bone of one leg and many abrasions and bruises on the left side of his body. His condition is considered satisfactory although he suffered the loss of much blood and will be days and weeks regaining normalcy.

Spence was one of three struck by the hit and run car. The other two were a Ralls youth, 13, and a man living at Robertson in southwest Crosby county. They had emergency treatment at Ralls and Crosbyton. They had stopped to give aid at a wreck which involved "Uncle Billie" Smith, aged Ralls man, and Buck Squires, of Crosbyton. Smith's car and Squires' truck sideswiped as they traveled in opposite directions.

Highway patrolmen and officers of Crosby, Floyd and Lubbock counties are investigating. It was not known here whether an arrest had been made in the hit and run case this morning.

Plans Take Form for 6th War Loan Campaign

Committees Get Ready for Drive In Communities

No figures had been made available last night at the close of the first three days of the Sixth War bond campaign on total subscriptions in the county.

But ample signs of activity were in evidence as committeemen in the various communities began to make and announce their plans. The big rally in Floydada Wednesday night of next week, planned and sponsored by the Floydada committee is one of these signs. Other communities also are making their plans and the drive to meet the goal set will be a determined one, with full co-operation from every citizen.

Of the overall quota of \$310,000, the Series E bond assignment is \$165,000 which committees must sell by the close of business on December 16. J. M. Willson, county chairman of the U. S. Treasury War Finance committee has expressed confidence that the quotas will be met. Every school district has been organized, with promises of active work in each one and a live committee to see the prospective buyers.

One of the oldest paratroopers in the United States is Sergeant Mayo, of Nevada, Texas. Leaving his Texas farm he joined up in 1942. A veteran of the last war he saw eight months service in France with the Rainbow division. He argued 10 days with his commanding officer to get a chance with the combat troops. At 47 years of age he landed as a paratrooper on Cherbourg peninsula. He is a patient in the McKinney, Texas, army hospital.

First Sergeant Guy B. Cohea of El Paso is an old head in the army. He served with the First Cavalry division in New Guinea and the Admiralty campaigns. He wears two bronze stars for action in these campaigns and was wounded while still in action in the Admiralty islands.

Pfc. McCarthy, of Albion, New York, is a veteran of the campaign to recapture Guam. He went overseas in March of this year and was with the first infantry unit to hit the beaches. He went through the full 17 days of fighting before he was injured and forced to return to this country.

Rally Wednesday Night to Feature Band, Heroes

Headed by a group of returned war heroes from every battlefield, a special unit of the "G I Jamboree" show will visit Floydada on Wednesday night, November 29 at a huge bond rally as part of the Smashing Sixth War Loan campaign for this sector.

Accompanying the heroes will be a "G I" military show complete with band, entertainers and novelty acts from Lubbock Air Base. The "G I Jamboree" unit which will visit Floydada is one of four such units touring 200 towns of the Lone Star state under the supervision of Phil Isley of the War Activities committee for the motion picture industry.

Acting as master of ceremonies for the show here will be M. M. Murphree, manager of the Granada theatre in Brownwood, Texas, and Marvin Brown, retiring District Attorney of Tarrant County.

Three War Heroes Coming

Three servicemen who have just returned from the European and Pacific theatres of war and who will speak at the rally are Sergeant Clyde Mayo, Private Richard J. McCarthy and Sergeant Guy B. Cohea. Sergeant Mayo from Nevada, Texas, is one of the oldest paratroopers in the U. S. Army. The 47 year old Sergeant landed on the Cherbourg Peninsula on D-Day within 500 yards of a German infantry regiment but was not seen. Mayo was injured in this landing but established contact with the French underground who helped him return to his own lines.

EDITORIAL

FOURTEEN MONTHS AGO

Those who so confidently predict when a certain campaign will be over, or when the war will be done, can hardly imagine how mad, impatient or vexed, whatever you call it, they make the men who are on the fighting fronts. The boys in the Italian campaign for instance.

It was 14 months ago these boys were told that little opposition was expected at Salerno beach and that Italy would be overrun in three months. A whole division of Texas boys, many from Floyd county in the Thirty-sixth, were in this outfit. The survivors buried a lot of their buddies there and are still fighting trying to take the northern Italy bastions from the Germans. They have a rainbow division now. Less than half are Texans since the replacements came in from states all over the nation.

Convinced of our invincibility we Americans here at home forget that the Germans and the Japanese as well have been working at this war business for many years. A good man can hardly start from scratch and surpass another man in the art of war in the matter of three years time. So pay no attention to these early-victory visionaries and pipe smokers. Rather, get set for the sixth, the seventh, the eighth, probably the ninth and the tenth war loans. Don't get your victory bunting out and let it get soiled while you wait, either. And don't talk and write about an early victory to your boys. Such a thing infers that you expect them to win against odds that are too big to be quickly brushed aside. You make them mad and quite unhappy when you do it.

SEE AFTER YOUR HEALTH

You recall that the first Thanksgiving day, according to the books, was proclaimed for the purpose of giving thanks for material things. One of these in particular was the bountiful harvest with which the Lord had blessed the first settlers at Plymouth. The other blessing vouchsafed was sturdy health and endurance that had permitted them to survive hardships and exposure.

Floyd county people well enough can be thankful for equally as much this year. The crops have been reasonably bountiful—the feed so much more than could have been imagined on September 1. And the health and endurance of the graybeards, their wives, and their girl children have permitted them to plant and cultivate and somehow or other get through the year today.

True, for many, the harvest is not over. But we can indeed be thankful we have gotten as far as we have and have had as few casualties as we have. Naturally, the complaints have been few and far between. Bud, who is overseas or elsewhere far away doesn't know how tough the going has been. The folks know he has had it so much tougher they'd be ashamed to mention any of their own troubles.

But it is time to give thanks that we have been able to carry on. That

Manpower And Transportation Shortages Demand Buying And Mailing Packages in November

Public response to the Post Office department's "Shop Now! Mail in November" campaign is good but needs to be better, according to Mrs. Barbara H. Smith, postmaster.

"Extraordinary wartime conditions face us. Unless more people buy and mail this month the Postal Service cannot do its job of delivering all Christmas gifts on time," Mrs. Smith said.

Quoting postmaster General Frank C. Walker in a recent appeal, Mrs. Smith continued:

"It is not pleasing to us to have to ask the American people to mail packages so far in advance of the delivering date. We do so only because it has to be done. The job is a tremendous one, but we are confident that it will be done because we know from experience that given sound reasons Americans cooperate magnificently."

"Unprecedented shortages of manpower and transportation facilities growing out of the war compel early mailing. The postal service has given 50,000 experienced employees to the armed forces and 300,000 railroad workers have to war. Equally serious is the fact that rail and other transport facilities are taxed to the limit with the great burden of war traffic which all of us know must take precedence."

"In a great number of our 43,000 post offices the manpower situation is critical. The 200,000 extra workers whom we normally recruited to handle the swollen Christmas volume of mail were able to work long hours of overtime and to do heavy work. This cannot be expected from the women and high school boys and girls to whom in large part we must look this year to meet the situation."

"The way in which everyone responded in making it possible for us to handle a volume of 70,000,000 parcels for the armed forces overseas leaves no doubt in my mind that the November Christmas mailing will be equally successful. I ask for the help of the press, radio, business advertisers, civic groups and all Americans in making it possible for the Postal Service to do its work."

"We urge everyone to buy now, mail in November and mark gifts Do Not Open Until Christmas."

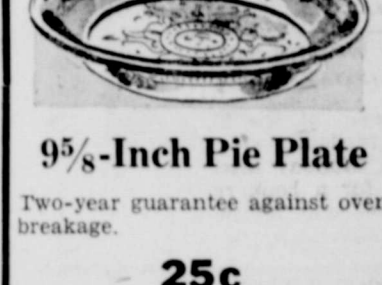

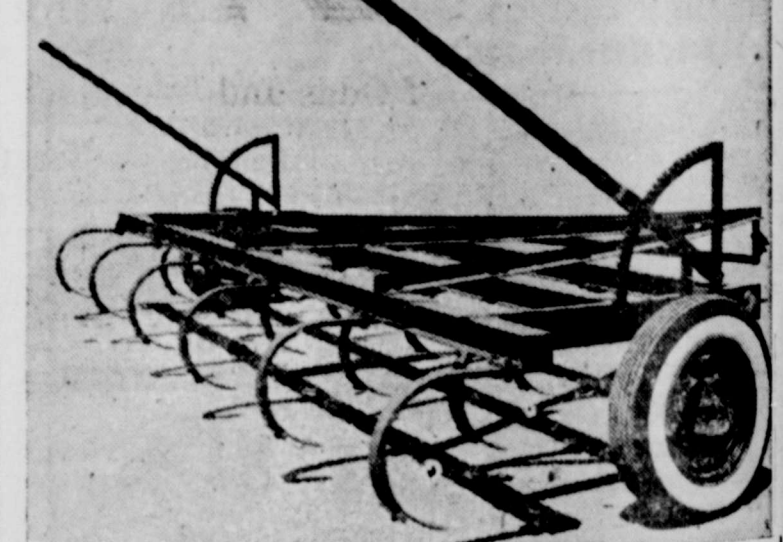

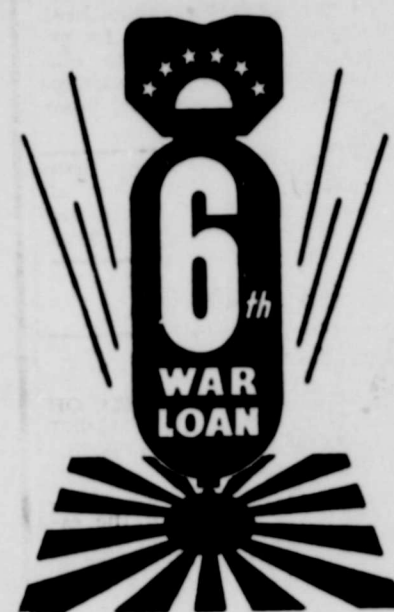
