Black News Briefs

Top Black Businesses Grow In 1985

New York, NY -- According to Black Enterprise magazine, the nation's 100 largest Black-owned businesses grew by an impressive 14.8 per cent last year. That compares to a 2.8 per cent average growth in sales from the gigantic Fortune 500 companies. Although, none of the largest Black-owned firms was large enough to make the Fortune 500 list. Last year the five largest Black-owned businesses were the Johnson Publishing Company of Chicago; Motown Industries in Los Angeles; H. J. Russell Construction of Atlanta, the newly acquired Coca Cola Bottling Company in Philadelphia and Soft Shoe Products Company based in Chicago. Overall, the top 100 Black businesses employed in excess of 20,000 people.

NFL Drug Problem Raises Racial Issue

Washington, DC -- Accusations have begun surfacing from within and from outside the National Football League that league officials are enforcing their policies against player drug use in a racially discriminatory manner. News reports recently revealed that since 1980, 86% of the players whose drug involvement has been made public are Black. Commissioner Pete Rozelle says he doesn't think white players are being protected. But NFL Players Association head, Gene Upshaw, told the Washington Post recently that he knows of situations where drug use by white players has been hidden from the public. The Rev. Jesse Jackson has indicated that he plans to speak to Rozelle saying the situation in the NFL "appears to reflect a pattern of institutionalized racism."

Boston Black Seek Separate City

Boston, Mass. -- A group of Boston Blacks is pushing a plan to have a predominantly Black section of the city split-off and reincorporate itself as a separate city. Leading the effort is Andrew Jones and Curtis Davis. Boston Mayor Raymond Flynn has labeled the secession move "counter productive. It is unclear what percentage of Boston Blacks support the idea but if it is successful the new city will have more than 150,000 residents and would be named after Black South African freedom fighter Nelson Mandela.

Denying He is A Racist, Sessions Seeks Judgeship

Washington, DC -- President Reagan's nominee to a federal judgeship in Alabama has begun fighting back against charges that he is a racist and is insensitive to the needs of minorities. Liberal senators had been seeking to block the appointment Jefferson B. Sessions, III. Sessions told a recent senate hearing that he is innocent of accusations against him. Among those accusations are reports that he once referred to the anti-Black Ku Klux Klan as an "ok" organization; called his Black assistant "boy" and once accused the NAACP of being un-American.

Civil Rights Groups Want "Defunding"

Washington, DC -- A coalition of civil rights organizations has called for "defunding" of the U. S. Civil Rights Commission. The coalition charges that the commission has lost its independence and has become a tool of Reagan administration conservatives. Members of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, which includes most of the nation's major civil rights groups, says it will push its "defunding" campaign during deliberations over the 1987 federal budget.

Liberals Seek To Block Democratic Shift To Right

Washington, DC -- Over a thousand Democratic party activists met in Washington last week hoping to block what they see as a shift to the conservative right by the party's national leaders. Conference organizer Michael Harrington told the gathering that "One Republican party is more than enough." The Rev. Jesse Jackson also addressed the conference.

Black Community Priorities

"Ceasing Down Our Buckets

Where We Are"

One of the major objectives of every group of responsible people is to take their rightful place, by reaching out, in mutual interdependency roles with other peoples. However, a necessary precedent to acceptance of responsibility and/or privilege of interdependence is independence. Nonetheless, we are faced with a costly and devastating fact that 30 years after the historic 1954 U. S. Supreme Court decision on school desegregation over 47% of the nation's Black Youth are 'functional illiterates.' These Black youths, as such, and along with many others, are forced to be a dependency role on society as a whole. There must be a re-assessment of our immediate goals priorities. Something must be done immediately to change our past and present policies of paternalism, largesse and irresponsibility. We need encouragement that fosters independence, positive policies that call for, and encourage excellence in education, equitable opportunities for achievement and community pride that builds self-reliance or independence.

Therefore, our communities and nation's priorities during the 1980's call for a shift away from certain kinds of "integration" or reaching-out and immediate emphasis on the things necessary within our communities to save our presently denied youth and millions of others in our communities, where there appears for many, no other way out than a life of idleness or crim... All spelling-out, non-productive and negative dependency.

Accordingly, to eliminate these burdensome needs from within Black America, we have chosen as our over-all theme for the 1980's, "Ceasing Down Our Buckets Where We Are." This new emphasis, or priority, will have to involve getting all of our Black Community organizations and institutions together to encourage our youth and others to take pride in preparing themselves early to be our community's economic builders. This means new forms of massive training to take over our Black community needs for Black bricklayers, carpenters, electricians, Black street sweepers, as well as Black lawyers, Black merchants etc. It calls for new forms of partnerships why we, simultaneously, can encourage the Black community to selectively support those White-owned businesses and institutions which have policies that tend to build our long-denied communities in an equitable manner.

This new priority of rebuilding our communities from within, calls for new roles for all in the Black community. It means that the Black press and all others will have to examine every possible way we can to "Pull up our community by whatever bootstraps" we have, as we seek the long-overdue and deserved support required of the White community, such as the Chamber of Commerce-Board of City Development, city financial institutions, builders, investors and others who have a concern for the total community.

However, the leadership to make our communities the responsible and self-sustaining market places must come from within our communities. East Lubbock Advisory Council is working on making this a reality.

The Erosion of Our Spiritual Foundation

With 10,000 psychiatrists assembling in Washington, DC for the annual American Psychiatric Association, it's time black political, religious and community leaders start to pay close attention to the negative effects psychiatry has, and is having on Black America.

This is really an urgent matter of survival, for the spiritual and religious foundation of Black America is being covertly eroded by deliberate, Godless add alexander jones destroy the traditional role of the church as well as the concept of right and wrong. Strong words, I know, but the facts point conclusively to this.

In a 1940 speech, psychiatrist Colonel John R. Rees made clear his intentions stating, "Especially since the last world war we have done much to infiltrate the various social organizations throughout the country... similarly we have made a useful attack upon a number of professions. The two easiest of them naturally are the teaching profession and the church... if we are to infiltrate the professional and social activities of other people I think we must imitate the Totalitarians and organize some kind of fifth column activity."

Colonel Rees was the first president of the World Federation of Mental Health. This group, by the way, was organized from the postwar racial "hygiene" which sought to keep society healthy by eliminating inferior types of races through birth control, forced sterilization, and outright murder. Thousands of mental patients were gassed or starved to death in Germany as part of this movement. It has also resulted in Blacks being cited by various psychiatrists as being an "inferior genetic type."

The key point to understand in all of this is that psychiatry views man as an animal, and thus, all its so-called solutions spring from this viewpoint. Nothing could be more contradictory to the beliefs of Black American, which has survived because of its strong spiritual and religious base. In short, this pseudo-science is not a friend of the black community.

Our hopes for the future lay in revitalizing traditional moral and ethical values among our youth, not in having them destroyed by members of a fraudulent science that believes they are "obselets."

Homework: A No-Cost Education Aid

All parents want to see their children do the best they can in school. We know that a solid grade record will boost our children's chances of getting into a good college or landing a challenging job.

While much of the task of teaching our children is up to the schools, we parents have an important role to play in after-school hours: encouraging our children to do their homework.

There is nothing new about homework. We can all remember juggling home our arithmetic books. But today's increased pressure on our children to compete in the classroom makes us look at this old tradition in a new way.

Educational experts now tell us that parents of public school children, especially parents of Black or Hispanic children, want schools to give more homework assignments to their children. These parents see homework as a no-cost way to better their children's achievement in school.

But our children cannot do it alone. As parents, we can and should help our children get the most learning they can out of doing their homework. Recent research at the University of Illinois suggests that as much as half the improvement in student grades and test scores stems from parent participation in school related activities, including homework.

Helping your child with homework should not mean playing policeman or tutor, according to Network: the Paper for Parents, a monthly educational report published by the National Committee for Citizens in Education. It does mean encouraging your child to tackle homework in a responsible, independent fashion, and watching for any recurring problems. Here are some of this publication's tips for parents:

Keep an eye on how much time your children spend on their homework. Elementary school children should spend a minimum of one hour a day, and high school students two or more hours a day.

If your child is spending too many hours on particular assignments, get in touch with the teacher. It is important to prevent your child from developing a negative attitude toward subjects that can be difficult to tackle alone, like math. Help your child feel in control of his or her studies by listening, helping to go over instructions, and encouraging short breaks.

Structure homework into your home life. If both parents are out when homework should begin, set an alarm to remind your child. Try to minimize distractions. Then, most important of all, reward your children after their day in school and after their homework by making sure they get free time to watch television, read, listen to music, or play.

Supercomputer Requires Studious Minds

An English Education for Blacks and Whites

"It is a national tragedy," to tell the truth, the learned Englishman dedicated to a well-educated audience of Cornell University alumni attending the regular Friday meeting of the Commonwealth Club of California after Elster Sunday. The waste of Black American minds may be easier for a white person from across the big pond (Atlantic) to comprehend as a root cause of the collapse of the U. S. global-dominating economic system than for the average American white person to personify. Failure of a country to use its total human resources is a major reason for the fall of such empires as "Egypt, Greece, Rome, Spain, and England, nations that once led the world economically and politically but no longer do," quoted Frank H. T. Rhodes, president of Cornell University in his speech, "Supercomputers and Supercompetitors." Suethe, English-born Rhodes was not, in stating what it takes -- to take charge of global economic growth for a great nation to produce jobs and prosperity for all its people. And Black people in his view are a necessary part of America's aim for a healthy economy.

Even though Mr. Rhodes centered his address on the need for the U. S. to continue to build and fund for research and development in the use of supercomputers such as IBM's 3084 QX mainframe, its size of a basketball court and is able to perform 100 million arithmetic operations each second to combat the challenge of overseas competition; the core of his complaint was the lack of use of people of color in our country. "Even the most sophisticated supercomputers cannot offset an adult illiteracy rate" of one out of every five U. S. adults or a "dwindling number of Ph.D.'s in engineering" needed to operate the mega-machines observes Mr. Rhodes. In Japan, literacy approaches 100%. Further Mr. Rhodes found in his travels to Japan, that in one plant, their workers not only could read the computer manual, but did so in the English language!

Imagine the average American youth with a high school education of African ancestry with the ability to read in any two languages! That child could get a job. And getting an education to get a job is what too many Black Americans are missing. Minorities in America in general are missing out on higher education as is evident in the most recent U. S. Census reports. The college-going rates of Black and Hispanics are still far below those of whites and the gap grows with each higher educational level. Looking at a recent year, Rhodes gave an example that is a national disgrace! Thirty-three million Black Americans across the country were allowed to produce only 29 Ph.D.s in the physical sciences, 20 in engineering, and one in computer and information sciences. If America is "to compete effectively in global markets, we have to expand the pool of talent upon which we can draw for new processes, new products and new ideas," declared the dean of Supercomputer using university presidents.

Cornell University, first of five supercomputer center universities, has struck a partnership with businesses like IBM and General Electric to utilize the computer for industrial purposes. But, as the practical Rhodes has reiterated, people are the essential ingredient to make America competitively strong in the global market. He quotes, the old Chinese proverb to make this point, "If you are planting for one year, sow corn. If for ten years, plant trees. But if you are planting for a lifetime, educate men and women." With that caveat, corporate America

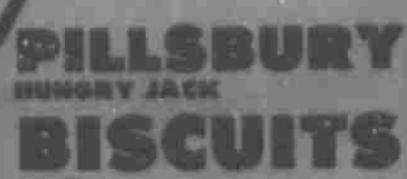



Today's selections include 2 one-dish meals that are colorful, delicious and, best of all, can be prepared in a single baking dish. Until next time, good cooking.

SALISBURY STEAK SKILLET SUPPER

- 1/4 cup crushed Frito-Lay® brand Potato Chips-No Salt Added (measure after crushing)
- 1 large egg
- 1/4 cup catsup
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 lb. ground beef round
- 1 tablespoon salad oil
- 1 can (10 1/2 oz.) condensed golden mushroom soup, undiluted
- 1/4 cup dry white wine
- 1 can (1 lb.) whole new potatoes, drained and sliced or sliced potatoes, drained
- 1 pkg. (9 oz.) frozen Italian green beans

In medium bowl, with fork, combine crushed potato chips, egg, catsup and salt until well blended; mix in ground beef. Shape into a large patty, about 1-inch thick. In large skillet, over medium-low heat, heat oil; brown beef patty, or Salisbury steak, on each side. Meanwhile, in small bowl, mix soup and wine. Drain excess fat from skillet. Add soup mixture, potatoes and frozen green beans around beef patty in skillet. Cover, and simmer 10 minutes longer, stirring vegetables once during cooking. Makes 4 servings.

CHICKEN WITH SPANISH RICE

- 1 tablespoon salad oil
- 3-lb broiler-fryer, cut into eight pieces
- 1/2 cup frozen or fresh chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 can (14 1/2 or 16 oz.) stewed tomatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano leaves
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 pkg. (4.6 oz.) Spanish rice mix
- 1 pkg. (9 oz.) frozen artichoke hearts
- 1/4 cup pimiento-stuffed olives, halved crosswise (about 10)

In a large skillet, over medium-high heat, heat oil; cook chicken pieces, skin side down, until browned—about 10 minutes. Add onion; cook 5 minutes more. Stir in garlic; cook 1 minute more. Add tomatoes and oregano, breaking up tomatoes with spoon if necessary. Reduce heat; simmer, covered, 15 minutes. Uncover skillet; turn chicken pieces. Add water, rice mix, artichoke hearts and olives. Stir, and cook 10 minutes longer, or until rice is tender. Makes 4 servings.

JUSTIFICATION

The universal need of justification was recognized by Job. Job 9:2; 25:4

I. THE MEANING OF JUSTIFICATION.

1. It DOES NOT mean making righteous or imparting of righteousness.
2. By justification we mean that act of God by which, on account of Christ, to whom the sinner is united by faith, He declares that sinner to be no longer under condemnation, but to have a standing of righteousness before Him.
3. The Scriptures teach that justify or justification means to "declare righteous" and "free from guilt and punishment." Ex. 23:7; Deut. 25:1; Psa. 143:2; Prov. 17:15; Isa. 5:22,23; 53:11

II. THE SCOPE OF JUSTIFICATION.

Justification begins with the present and extends to the past and the future, dealing with the sin and guilt of both and establishes him as eternally righteous before God.

1. It involves the remission of sins, including the removal of their guilt and penalty. Acts 13:38,39; Rom. 8:1,33,34; Num. 23:21
2. The reckoning of Christ's righteousness and the restoration of God's favor. II Cor. 5:21; Phil. 3:9; James 2:23; Rom. 3:20-24

III. THE METHOD OF JUSTIFICATION.

We cannot be justified by our moral character or by the works of the Law. Luke 16:15; Rom. 3:20; Gal. 2:16; 5:4

1. It is a judicial act of God. Rom. 8:33
2. It is caused by His grace. Rom. 3:24. "Freely" is the Greek "DOREAN" and is translated "Without a cause" in John 15:25 and in other places.
3. It was made possible by His meritorious substitutionary death. Rom. 5:9; 3:24
4. It is manifestly declared in His resurrection. Rom. 4:25. Notice "for our" used twice in this verse and means "because of". His resurrection is God's seal and guarantee that Christ's death settled the sin question and accomplished our justification.
5. Justification is mediately by faith. Rom. 5:1; 4:5; 3:23-26. Faith is not the cause of justification, nor can it be regarded as its ground or basis. It is only a mediating function, through which justification is received. It is a prerequisite, but not the cause of justification.
6. Justification is evidenced by works. James 2:14,24. Here there is a contrast between a say so or dead faith and true saving faith.

IV. THE RESULTS OF JUSTIFICATION.

1. Freedom from condemnation. Rom. 8:1,33,34
2. Peace with God. Rom. 5:1
3. Assurance and realization of future glorification. Titus 3:7; Rom. 8:30

TIME DOES HAVE WINGS AND WILL FLY

Time does have wings and flies faster when you have reached the high side of forty. However it fails to effect all of us alike. Out there in "Lost Wages" a good buddy of mine pulled out all the memories and celebrated reaching another mile post which few of our pals have reached. Much of her colorful life is worth writing about, but nobody can do it better than Alice Keyes herself, from Las Vegas:

"Dearest B. Rowe - I arose at the usual hour, 6 a.m. The sun is shining brilliantly, the wind is blowing fiercely, it's now near 9 o'clock and I am still piddling around. Where does the time go? Can it be that next month (May) will mark the 50th yr. since this wide-eyed California gal first became dazzled by the glamour of N.York. In retrospect, it was the pace of N.York that made the greatest impression on me who came from the "laid back" environs of Southern California. I remember shortly after arrival Allan McMillan asked me to write a guest column for him, but I don't recall the paper he was writing for. I remember writing of my impression of and reactions to the sights and sounds, the fascination that Central Park held for me, the tawdry gaiety of Coney Island, the remarkably and frightening experience of riding in one of those lofty skyscraper's express elevators; the beautiful beaches of the big Atlantic Ocean. They are whiter, prettier and more expansive than those along the Pacific in Southern Calif., the public one anyway. I also recall noting that of all the show girls, I had considered Marion Egbert the prettiest and Cleo Hayes the most attractive.

Speaking of a half century ago, I was feted and celebrated to an incredible degree on the occasion of my seventy fifth b'day, March 18th acting like 65. The festivities went on for a solid week. I was in such demand, it was necessary to schedule my activities. I suppose it has something to do with the fact that the icager you survive in this mad world, the more the survivors of any closely knit group feel the desire to hang on to each other. At any rate, my family, daughter and grandsons, observed the approaching date with a luncheon at Mt. Charleston Lodge, a favorite recreation spot for me. Ron D. Givens Reports

G I Bill Termination

According to State Representative Ron Givens (R-District 83), efforts to terminate the newest G I Bill are taking place in Washington, D. C.

The new G I Bill, designed to help veterans with monetary benefits to complete their educational pursuits, went into effect July 1, 1985. The bill also provides some educational assistance to reservists and National Guard personnel who are interested in additional education.

The 1987 budget is proposing that the new G I Bill be terminated effectively October 1, 1986, with a reversion to the Veteran's Education Assistance Program

(VEAP), a program that had been in effect until July, 1985. Under this proposal to terminate the program, a large number of reservists and National Guard personnel would be left without any educational assistance program, and would lose some enthusiasm for such services.

The G I Bill has thus far been a plus factor in getting bright young men and women to enlist in the regular armed forces as well as the reserves and National Guard. Rep. Givens stated that he can not understand how or why the support for the bill from last year is now so adamant in having it killed, before any lasting good effects can even be recognized. The program should be continued at least until it can be proven to be ineffective, which he does not

believe will ever be.

"I encourage all veterans, active duty personnel, Reservists

and National Guard to express your views to your Congressman," stated Givens.

FIBER...WHAT'S IN IT FOR YOU?

Concerned about fat? Calories? Fiber? Today, eating a good diet can be difficult. What you don't eat is sometimes just as important as what you do eat. According to the National Cancer Institute, eating a high fiber, lowfat diet may reduce the risk of certain types of lower digestive tract cancers. This may sound straightforward, but how does this translate to daily food selection and meal planning?

High fiber ready-to-eat cereal is an easy way to boost your daily fiber intake. Fruits, vegetables and other whole grain products are also good sources of fiber. The National Cancer Institute recommends that we eat a combination of foods that provides 25 to 35 grams of dietary fiber each day. Are you the average American? If so, your daily fiber intake may be falling short at only 10 to 20 grams of dietary fiber. Reaching your goal of 25 to 35 grams is simple—eat whole grain breads and cereals and liberal amounts of fruits and vegetables daily.

And, to lower your fat intake, start by substituting lowfat or skim milk for whole milk on your breakfast cereal. When possible, choose lowfat dairy products like lowfat cheeses, yogurt and milk. Also choosing leaner meats, fish and poultry can reduce fat in your diet. Beans combined with grain products are also lowfat protein alternatives to higher fat meats.

Here's a sample menu that demonstrates how fiber-rich lowfat foods can easily fit into your daily fare.
