## CLEAN-UP DAY IN JUNCTION MARKED BY CLOUDS OF SMOKE AS TRASH AND WEEDS BURN

### FIRE STATION OCCUPIED BY TRUCKS

The fire truck and hose truck of the Junction Fire Department were moved into the new fire station building this week. With the exception of some interior work and the completion of stuccoing the walls, the building is finished.

The lower floor is arranged for two large fire trucks which will be kept there. In the upper story sleeping quarters have been provided for four men. A recreation and reading room is another feature of the new building. It is the plan of the city fire marshal, John M. Hankins, that four men will stay in the building every night.

When the new fire truck and pump arrives, Junction will be adequately protected from fire. The improvement in the fire department in the past two years has been nearly phenomenal. Two years ago there was no adequate water supply. Fire plugs throughout the city were not then installed. A small ill-equipped truck with a few volunteers with no water pressure or connections was about all the fire department.

Now the city has fire plugs on every corner with abundant pressure; a two-story fire station modernized and equipped, and a new fire truck and pumper to be delivered within thirty days. That is a record of progress to be proud of.

### LIONS CLUB WILL FETE BUSINESS MEN

At the regular luncheon of the Junction Lion's Club held at the Baptist Church, plans are formulated to entertain the members of the Business Men's classes of the various churches of the city with a smoker next Thursday evening at the Baptist Church. ### NEW MOTOR BOAT BURNS SUNDAY

Another naval disaster was reported this week, but no one was drowned or killed. The new motor boat which Howard Blackburn launched last week, met a watery grave Sunday night.

The boat caught fire and sunk to the bottom of the Llano River. Pete said that he thought the fire was caused by the hot exhaust pipe of the motor. No one was near the boat when it caught fire.

The amount of the loss is not known, because Pete said that he had not gotten up enough nerve to figure out how much it had cost. The boat was twenty feet long and powered by a master Buick motor. It would accommodate 14 persons.

After the smoke screen cleared away Tuesday morning Junction looked as if it were clothed in a new clean dress. From all parts of the city, clouds of smoke ascended, making a towering monument for all the rubbish, dead weeds and trash which were destroyed.

It would be hard to estimate just how much better the business section and residential section looks after the concerted effort to clean up the city was over. The work has not been completed, but merely begun.

The grounds at the rear of the business houses have been partially cleaned up, and present a better appearance. A grader is working on the streets in the city now, cleaning out the gutters and leveling the streets. Sometimes it is hard to realize just how much weeds and trash can mar the beauty of an otherwise pretty street or business house.

There has been a close co-operation among the business men in this recent clean-up campaign and individuals have responded gladly in aiding in the work.

### RANCHMEN'S ROUND-UP WILL BE HELD AUG. 6-7

Final preparations are being made for the Fifth Annual Ranchmen's Round-up which will be held at the Ranch Experiment Station west of Junction between Rocksprings and Sonora August 6 and 7.

A splendid program has been arranged and several noteworthy speakers will appear on the two day program. Captain J. L. W. Rieck of Junction will appear on the program. Special music for the two days has been provided, and everything is in readiness for the biggest crowd in the history of the Round-up.

People expecting to attend both days are requested to come prepared to camp as accommodations can not be supplied for everyone attending.

### BAPTIST CHURCH ADOPTS BUDGET

The First Baptist Church of Junction has adopted the budget system of church finance, according to Judge Weaver H. Baker who has taken great interest in the matter.

This system calls for systematic and regular donations which stabilizes the financial condition of the church. The plan has met favor with the congregation as a whole.

A message has been received from Judge J. H. McLean stating that court will not be convened next week. The last called session of the Legislature created a new court and the Eagle has not been advised just when the new court will meet.

### STORAGE BUILDING UNDER CONSTRUCTION

A new storage building for the Highland Chevrolet Company is being erected on the lot adjacent to the present building of that company.

## LATEST COUNT AMENDMENTS DEFEATED

Recent returns from practically two-thirds of the counties of the State may be accepted as indicating the decisive defeat of the proposed constitutional amendments to enlarge the Supreme Court to nine members and raise the Governor's salary to \$10,000 annually.

When doubt was raised as to the fate of the amendments, a complete canvass of every county was made and the returns Monday night from 152 counties (one county not voting) showed the following result:

Enlarged court: For 43,812, against 63,718.

Governor's salary: For 43,595, against 62,840.

These returns were furnished by the County Clerks, after the Commissioners' Court had canvassed the votes.

The lead established can not be overcome, it is believed, by the returns from the counties still to be heard from and on the fate of the amendments is sealed.

### B. C. MUSIC SHOP IS MOVED TO NEW LOCATION

### Junction, Ozona, Rankin Sonora and Ft. Stockton County Seats

By an act of the Legislature, Kimble County is in a new Court District, and will be grouped with Sutton, Crockett, Pecos and Upton counties. The county seat towns of these counties are Junction, Sonora, Ozona, Ft. Stockton and Rankin. Every one of these towns are located on the Old Spanish Trail except Rankin. This is an ideal circumstance.

This new district will be known as the 112 District. The bill was a Senate bill introduced by Senator Berkeley of Alpine. The Hon. Cole R. Stevenson gave his support to the bill in the House. Governor Moody failed to sign the bill, but will permit it to become a law without any action on his part. It has been filed with the secretary of state.

Under the terms of the measure the 33rd judicial district is reorganized so that it is composed of Gillespie, Mason, Blanco, Menard, San Saba, Llano and Burnet counties.

The new district is meeting with favor among local citizens.

### THEFT BILL WILL HELP RANCHERS

House Bill No. 157, which was passed by the Legislature in a recent session, provides that all drivers of trucks, automobiles or other vehicles must have and exhibit to peace officers upon demand a written permit covering movements of live stock and domestic fowls contained therein, or make a written statement in the absence of such permit. Penalties will be made for failing to exhibit such a permit, or failure to make a statement in the absence of such a permit, or for making a false statement or forged permit.

The fine for the violation of this law is not less than \$25 and not more than \$200 for each head of live stock and each domestic fowl in the movement.

The permit shall include the name of place of origin, including name of ranch, point of destination, market center, packing house or other place, number of livestock or fowls and description thereof, including kind, breed, color and also marks and brands if there are any.

This law was passed as a result of the wholesale theft of livestock on the ranches in Texas, especially the sheep and goat section of the Southwest.

The Hon. Cole R. Stevenson introduced the bill in the House. Representative Penrose Metcalfe of San Angelo was co-author of the bill with Stevenson.

### MRS. TOM HIBDON ATTENDS REUNION

Mrs. Tom Hibdon returned Tuesday from Christoval where she attended the Confederate Veteran's Reunion. She stated that never in the past history have the wives and widows of the Confederate soldiers been so royally entertained as they were last week at Christoval.

Mrs. Hibdon was there for the entire week. She said that Christoval had charge of the entertainment one day, Eldorado the next, and San Angelo had charge of it the last day. Mrs. Hibdon stated that an extremely large number was present at the reunion. A number of states and sections of the United States were represented.

### MISS INEZ WRIGHT DIES

Miss Inez Wright passed away at the family home in this city at 10 a. m., Monday, July 8th, following an illness from which she had undergone an operation two weeks ago and was thought to be doing nicely and well on the road to recovery, until a sudden attack of heart trouble seized her early Monday and the end came quickly, due to embolism of the heart according to Dr. DeMoss, attending physician. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. W. W. Wilkerson, pastor of the Baptist Church, from the family residence in this city on Wednesday afternoon followed by interment in the Lordsburg Cemetery.

One of the largest gatherings that ever attended a like service in Lordsburg was present Wednesday afternoon to pay their last respects to this wonderful good woman who had endeared herself to the entire citizenship by the beautiful and useful life she had lived. Many beautiful floral offerings banked the casket, coming as a silent tribute from friends far and near.

Miss Inez Wright was born near Beeville, Texas, Feb. 29, 1880, and with the Wright family left that section on May 2, 1909 for the west, coming to Lordsburg in 1904, where the family settled. Miss Wright completed her school work and engaged in school teaching in the public schools in 1908, following this profession continuously she served as County Superintendent of Public Instruction of Hidalgo County for four years, having been the first regular elected County Superintendent.

Deceased was a member of the Baptist Church, joining at the early age of 13 years, and had been a consistent and active member until her demise. She was a charter member of the Lordsburg Baptist Church and superintendent of the Sunday School of this church at the time of her death.

Deceased is survived by the aged mother with whom she lived in this city, four brothers and three sisters who follow: Jim Wright, of Junction, Texas; Tom Wright, Dallas, Texas; George Wright, of Douglas, Arizona; Martin Wright, Inspiration, Arizona; Mrs. A. E. Arnold, Campbell, Calif., and Mrs. Marshall and Miss Gertrude Wright of this city. All were present for the services Wednesday except Jim and Tom Wright, who were unable to reach here in time for the services.

Miss Wright was a member of the Eastern Star, Rebekah Lodge and the Woodman Circle, and was at all times an active and valued member in church, lodge and civic work.

Active pall bearers chosen from close friends of many years standing included: Messrs. S. M. Chase, Frank Carbell, Sam Gass, E. M. Fisher, Ralph Smith and J. H. McLeod.

The following words penned by her pastor, Rev. W. W. Wilkerson, touchingly and fittingly portray her beautiful faith and spotless life:

Death hath come with reckless footsteps.

For the soul of Inez Wright, It has stilled her lips forever, In this land of blackened night, Earthly ties nor fleeting riches, Could not stay God's Holy will, That her soul in heaven was needed,

## JOHN WARE, YOUNG COUNTY RANCHER WINS 200 RIBBONS

Recently an article appeared in the Dallas Morning News concerning Mr. John Ware, noted livestock breeder and diversification farmer of Young County. "Uncle Johnny," as he is called, is a subscriber to the Junction Eagle and keeps up with the livestock situation in this section. The article as it appeared is reproduced below:

"Johnny Ware of Graham, who through his skill as a master farmer and stock grower, has won more than 200 ribbons in the five years on live stock and agricultural exhibits in three county and district fairs and in the Fort Worth Live Stock Show. "Uncle Johnny," as he is admirably called by his friends, was born in North Devonshire, England, in 1862, and spent the early years of his life on the island. He never had the privilege of attending school in his boyhood, and laughingly said the first time he was ever in a school building was after he became a member of the board of trustees of the public schools of Stephens County.

Despite these educational disadvantages, Uncle Johnny has the fundamental basis of education, being able to read, write and solve problems.

Uncle Johnny became caretaker of the live stock for various notables in England, and while attending these duties, first dreamed of the United States and the large possibilities of the stock industry in the West. In 1895, he sailed from Liverpool and thirteen days after his departure stopped at Breckenridge, 30 miles southwest of Graham.

Not long after his stopping

at Breckenridge he began working on the various ranches of West Texas and invested his earnings in live stock and land, and is now an owner of a large ranch in Stephens County, and has always prided himself as being an owner and raiser of thoroughbreds and prize winning live stock and poultry.

His ranches are stocked with thoroughbred Herefords while about his residence he keeps the finest breeds and finest quality of poultry, hogs and dairy cattle, having won prizes in beef and dairy cattle, Berkshire and Poland China hogs, the white Wyandotte and White Rock poultry in the various fairs in Northwest Texas.

At the Young County Fair in 1926 with fifteen entries he won fifteen ribbons as follows: Eleven firsts, one second and three thirds; in 1927 with twenty entries he won twelve firsts, five seconds, one champion and one grand champion; in 1928 with twenty-two entries he won twenty-two ribbons, twelve firsts, eight seconds, champion and grand champion. He has also won the champion and grand champion prizes in various other fairs, including Fort Worth Stock Show; the West Texas Fair at Abilene; Wilbarger County Poultry Show at Vernon; North Texas Poultry Association, Wichita Falls; Bowie Poultry Show at Bowie; Hall County Fair, and several others.

Along with his stock raising, Uncle Johnny is an excellent farmer. Despite the two-year drought, he still has hay in grain in his barn, and boasts that he has never been entirely out of feed during his farm career."

**MOODY HAS MANY PLACES TO FILL IN NEAR FUTURE**

Gov. Dan Moody, who recently has filled vacancies in the University of Texas board of regents, the teacher college board, the board of water engineers and the prison commission, and named the nine-member judicial council, still has many other official appointments to make in the near future.

Heading this list is the selection of a state auditor, to set up a new department of government. The auditor will represent the germinal principle of civil service, according to Governor Moody's statements. The law creating the office is now in effect, but Governor Moody said he will take his time to hunt someone to head the department who is not an applicant for the job.

Governor Moody also is to appoint the third member of the new board of pardons and paroles, and reappoint the two present members who constitute the pardon board. These appointments will be made effective about September 1.

The nine-member state game commission, replacing the present game department administered by one man, will be appointed before September 1. Former State Senator, A. E. Wood, of Austin is known to be scheduled for appointment as chairman and Will J. Tucker, present commissioner, as executive secretary in the new set-up.

Governor Moody also will appoint the nine-member state board of education, created under authority of a constitutional amendment to replace the present three-member ex-officio board, of which the governor is the chairman. When he names this board he will abolish the state text-book board, the new law substituting an advisory book committee to be named by the new board of education.

If the nine-member supreme court amendment is adopted Governor Moody likely will have the appointment of six members of the court as soon as a subsequent legislative session passes an enabling act.

Governor Moody will have the appointment of a six-member board of pharmacy.

Next January 1, he will be called upon to appoint a member of the board of control to a six-year term, the term of R. B. Wathall, Neff appointee, then expiring.

A provision that would have barred State Superintendent S. M. N. Marrs from future terms was stricken out by the last legislature from a corrective department of education bill. That said no individual who "heretofore or in future" accepted campaign contributions from representatives of text-book companies would be eligible. The "heretofore" was stricken out. Superintendent Marrs said a representative of a book company had personally made a contribution to one of his former campaigns without his knowledge at the time.

**SACRED STONE OF ERIN LODGED IN CATHEDRAL**

The ancient Clogh-Oir stone from which Clogher, Ireland, is said to have derived its name, has, with the consent of the bishop of Clogher, been placed in the vestibule of St. Macartan's cathedral, to preserve it from the weather. The Clogh-Oir stone is said to have been one of the three sacred stones of Erin, the others being the Lia Fail, or Stone of Destiny, which rests under the coronation chair in Westminster abbey, and the Crom Cuagh, which is supposed to have bowed before St. Patrick. This famous stone which has hitherto rested against the north wall of the cathedral, was visited at one time by Concober MacVessa, high king of Ulster. Canon Maguire, who wrote a commentary on the register of Clogher in 1490, states: "This sacred stone was preserved on the right of the entrance into the church, and traces of the gold with which it has been covered by the worshippers of the idol Ceomeod Celsetacht are still visible."

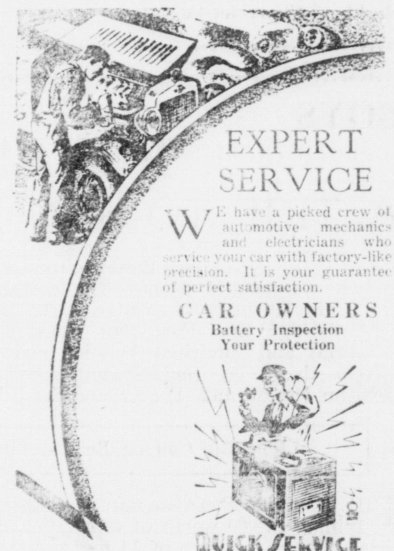

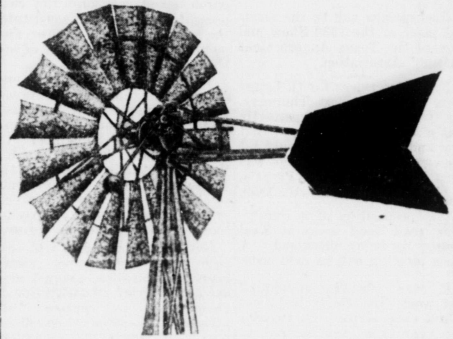

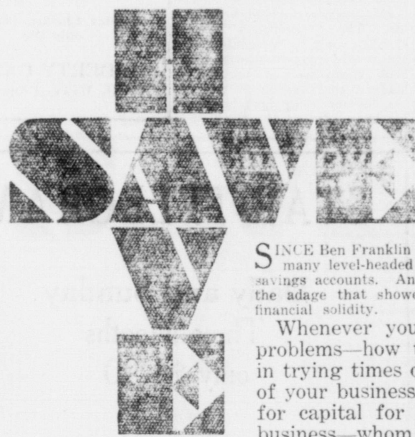
