CARS POULTRY SHIPPED THIS YEAR

Noted an article in the Canadian Record a few weeks ago in which much stress was laid on the fact that Canadian had just shipped its first car of poultry. Well that is think a little. Well that is as that is good to tell the world and we have been sleeping on our laurels in regard to our shipments.

To make a long story short, after a little investigating we want to know the neighboring own of Canadian for Loomis of the Record that is in some chicken shipping business. During the year of 1921 Perryton shipped out 19 cars of chickens and turkeys and 11 cars of eggs. To date this year we have shipped 11 cars of poultry and 11 cars of eggs. And we don't think shipping so very much either.

Men who are in touch with the poultry business estimate that Perryton will load out at least 50 cars of poultry during the year of 1922.

SENATOR CULBERSON SCORES KU KLUX

We are printing the following letter which Senator Charles A. Culberson wrote to a friend in Houston. It is explanatory of his attitude on the Ku Klux Klan question:

Washington, D. C.
March 30th, 1922.

Major H. V. Fisher,
Commercial Bank Building,
Houston, Texas.

Dear Major:

Your recent letter asking my position with reference to the order known as the Ku Klux Klan which is now in operation in our State was duly received and I answer at the earliest opportunity.

I have no affiliation directly or indirectly with this organization and I am unqualifiedly opposed to its operations. If not curbed, it will usurp the functions of the state and be destructive of government itself. It will indeed overthrow our Anglo-Saxon civilization in its relation to government.

Steps should be taken, therefore, at once to arrest its progress and finally to destroy it.

Appeal cannot be made to the Federal Government for this purpose for it is without jurisdiction unless application is made by Texas to the United States in the manner provided by the Constitution for protection against domestic violence, and this is unthinkable.

Fortunately, however, the power of the State is ample, and if no law now exists adequate to the occasion The Legislature may be called in extra session to supply this deficiency.

AN ANSWER TO COMMISSIONER BRILLHART'S LETTER

We are submitting this article in reply to Commissioner Brillhart's letter which we published in last week's issue.

In the first place we are taken to task and told that the Perryton Chamber of Commerce would make better headway if they would cease fighting their neighboring towns and spend some time in co-operating with them. Well you know that is a fine idea, in fact it is just what the Perryton Chamber of Commerce has been trying to do with the County Commissioners. Co-operate, as we understand it means an association of people for their mutual benefit. Well as far as we can see, there is not one single iota of co-operation in the building of a road in the southwest part which will be a direct injury to the county seat. We do not blame Spearman, we are for them strong if they can go into another county and persuade the Commissioners of that county to build them a road which will be the means of giving them a National Highway. Yes, we say they are there and also that we are mighty proud of our officials who "Co-operate" with them in getting this road. The Perryton Chamber of Commerce does not take up their time fighting the neighboring towns. There is a difference between fighting a town and clean competition. Of course we are for Perryton and Ochiltree County, first and forever over any neighbor town or county and we think that the man who does not feel that way is a mighty poor citizen and that we would be better off without him. We are going to fight a clean fight for Perryton and Ochiltree County every time we get a chance. You know just because a bunch is fighting for one town don't necessarily mean that they are knocking the other town. We think that Ochiltree County has the biggest percentage of boosters among her citizenship of any county in the Panhandle and we consider Commissioner Brillhart one of the best citizens of this county.

Another thing that Commissioner Brillhart criticised us strongly on was the condition of the streets of Perryton. Well we believe that any fair minded person will agree with us when we say that the business streets of Perryton will never be anything to point to with pride until we are able to pave them and that is out of question right at present. Their is no dirt street that will stand up under the travel which the streets of Perryton are subjected to. We will admit that our streets are rough but it is impossible to keep a dirt business street in condition. And another item that has retarded street improvements in Perryton is the lack of city funds. If he will recall, Perryton is an incorporated city and an infant. Taxes have been collected for just a little over a year, yet during this time much has been accomplished. You know starting up a city government is just like starting up any kind of business, there is a world of initial expense which must be met the first year. And then the City Council has purchased a fire truck and hose. It all costs tax money but we have to have it. We venture to say that when Governor Pat Neff rolls into Perryton off of the D.C.D. Boulevard, he will pass all kinds of compliments on our little city and the wonderful progress we have made. We will gamble that he will do all this for he is a politician and that is part of his stock in trade.

This paper is not playing politics nor is it espousing the cause of any one man or set of men. But when we think any public official or official needs criticism we are not going to stand back on account of friendship or power. Everybody looks alike to us.

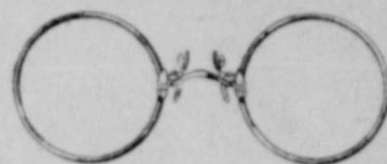

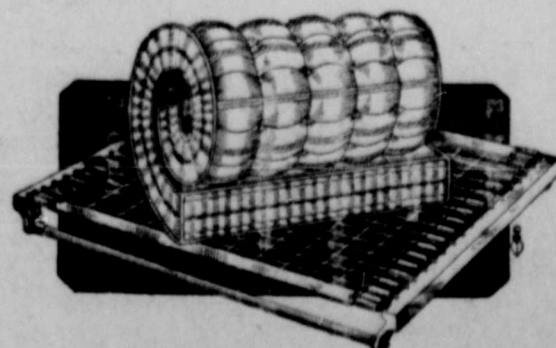

ORDINANCE

Specifications for Street Crossings for City of Perryton.

1. Sealed bids or proposals will be received by the city council for the furnishing of all materials and labor for constructing and finishing of the street crossings herein mentioned, until the 11th day of April, A. D. 1922, in strict accordance with these specifications. The city council reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

2. A certified check in the sum of \$100.00 made payable to the city council must accompany each bid or proposal as a guarantee that such bidder will, in good faith execute within 15 days the required surety bond, and will at once enter into a contract with the said council for the laying and finishing of crossings. Contractor failing in the above requirements will forfeit unconditionally said deposit guarantee to the city council as actual damages. The money will be returned to those not successful in their bids.

3. The contractor shall provide a bond in the sum of 50 per cent of the contract price with two ample and approved securities, or a surety company as surety to the approval of the city council and also for the use and benefit of all parties who may become entitled to liens under the said contract.

4. The contractor binds himself to protect and save harmless the owner from all damages arising from violation of the city ordinances, caused by obstructing the streets during the building of crossings, he shall place warning lights, barricades, etc. as may be required by the city authorities.

4. All crossings shall be four feet wide and eight inches thick, consisting of 7 in. base and one inch top, to be marked into blocks eight inches by four feet as will be directed.

5. All dirt shall be excavated or filled in as the case may be to bring the surface to the proper level. All fills shall be well packed with water before placing concrete.

6. All materials used in said street crossings shall be of some standard brand of Portland Cement and good clean gravel and sand or crushed rock and sand, all to meet with the approval of the city council.

7. The base shall be seven inches thick, well tamped and to consist of five parts of gravel and sand and one part of cement.

8. The top coat shall be one inch thick, this top coat shall be placed before the base has attained its initial set and is to be composed of one part of cement to one and one half parts of sand, this coat shall be spread with a strike board, floated with a wood float and then trowelled till pits, blow-holes, bubbles and other such defects are removed. All work shall be done by experienced cement workers and to be done in a thoroughly workmanlike manner and to the entire satisfaction of the council.

9. All work must be guaranteed against defects in material and workmanship to the extent of repairing and making good any of the above defects for a period of one year from date of completion of same.

10. After the concrete has sufficiently hardened the contractor shall cover the surface with not less than two inches of dirt, this covering to be kept moist for at least four days.

11. There shall be an expansion joint every fifty feet, same to be one inch wide and to extend full depth of base, same to be filled with hot asphalt.

12. Cart away from premises all dirt from excavation not required or unfit for filling and all rubbish accumulating during the progress of work.

13. The contractor will receive payment semi-monthly, consisting of eighty-five per cent of the value of all labor performed and material incorporated in crossings, the remaining fifteen per cent will be paid within five days after crossings have been completed and accepted by the council.
