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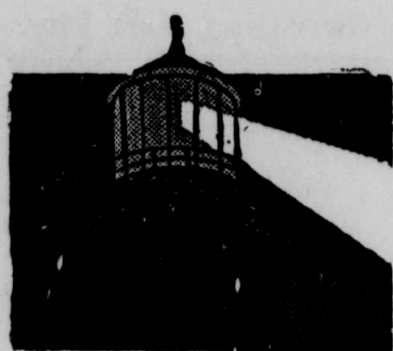

The incident that happened in Austin last week when an Abilene boy was drowned in a lake, makes us wonder sometimes if such trips by high school students are properly supervised. We are not suggesting that the coach who went with the team to Austin was negligent in his duties, but we are suggesting that perhaps not as many adults went on the trip as should have gone. Competition among students of different schools is necessary and of course, the boy who drowned was a member of a track team there to compete in UIL events. Such trips as this are necessary, but there are trips made by high school students, with the knowledge and consent of school authorities, that are not necessary.

Too many young people in these times are not disciplined at home and when they go in a group of other students on a trip, their unwillingness to be controlled by their elders sometimes causes students who are well behaved to stray from the path they should take, and consequently cause trouble for themselves and those who accompany them.

I hope that no tragedy ever befalls any group of students, Boy Scouts, or any other who make trips away from Loraine. We hope there will always be enough adults accompany such groups to keep each member under control at all times.

Loraine is to have a clean-up period and it is hoped that everyone will join in and really do a good job of cleaning up on his premises.

Texas State Historical Survey Committee Holds Regional Meet

Mrs. Bruce Johnson, Mrs. Maggie Hamrick and Mrs. Hal Bennett represented Mitchell County TSHSC at the Region 16 meeting in Midland Sunday. This was the first of five such meetings to be held over the State. Dedication and unveiling of the Midland Man Marker was at the Courthouse at 2 p. m. Mrs. McKinley was in charge.

Truett Lattimer, executive director of TSHSC told of an appropriation of \$50,000 by the State Legislature in the interest of "Travel Trails of Texas." These roads are to be constructed to lead away from the super-highways to tourist attractions in near-by or out-of-way places. The amount spent in any locality will be largely determined by interested leaders and business men with vision.

Phil Davis, Chief of Community Relations, TSDA, displayed a large poster, showing 1968 as a year of opportunity for the tourist industry of Texas. San Antonio will celebrate her 250th anniversary with a HemisFair.

Last 6 months, April 6th to Oct. 6th, this will be Texas first World Fair, with 7 1/2 million visitors expected. There will be much to see and learn, with the HemisFair located on about 30 square blocks. The theme is "The Confluence of Civilizations of the Americas."

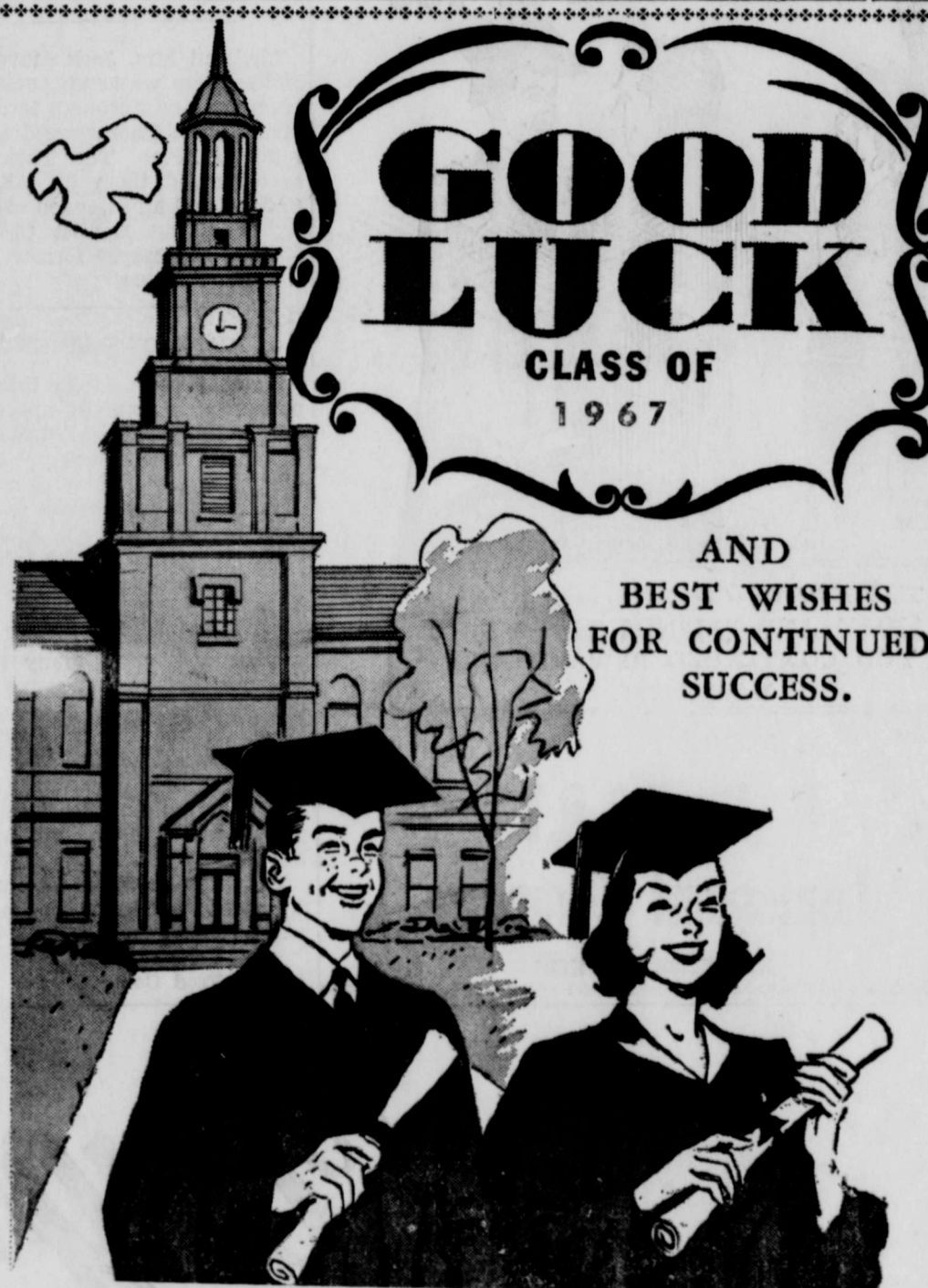
