## Grocerymen To Make Only Two Deliveries Per Day Starting Monday, Feb. 2

At a meeting of the retail grocery merchants of Lamesa Tuesday afternoon, it was decided that they would make only two deliveries of groceries per day, beginning Monday, February 2.

The morning delivery will be made at 9:30 o'clock, while the afternoon deliveries will be made at 3:30 o'clock. So if you want your groceries delivered in the morning you must get your order in before 9:30, while the same procedure will hold good for the afternoon. An extra delivery will be made on Saturday to care for the extra business usually had on that day.

The purpose of these restrictions in delivery service is to conserve both tires and automobiles. As will be recalled, tires cannot be purchased for use on the delivery wagons, and the stopping of car manufacturing prevents replacement of these vehicles. Cooperation and understanding of all is asked by the grocers in this move.

## Red Cross Nears Emergency War Relief Quota

John Allen, secretary-treasurer of the Dawson County chapter of the American Red Cross, reported Thursday morning that donations to the War Emergency Drive had reached a total of \$2980, which is only \$218 short of the goal of \$3200.

Following the inauguration of a county wide rural community drive a few weeks ago the following communities have turned in the quoted sums:

Ackerly, \$121.57; O. K., \$63.70; Harmony, \$74.73; Woody, \$24.00; Sand, \$12.83; Klondike, \$30.12; McCarty, \$54.32; Bartlett, \$68.00; Hancock, \$58.00; Key, \$44.65; Munger, \$38.13; and Fairview, \$32.60.

A number of the communities in the county have not turned in their receipts as yet, and others are still working to raise their quota to the full amount. It is hoped that when these sums are reported, that Dawson County will have completed the goal set by National Headquarters.

Local Red Cross officials, however, state that they are still desirous of further contributions, and that any amount donated will be much appreciated.

## Merchants Inaugurate Plan To Eliminate Bill Collectors On The First Of The Month

At a meeting of the Retail Merchants Credit Council Wednesday morning, at which time representatives of 27 Lamesa business firms were present, this organization went on record as favoring the adoption of a uniform system of mailing out bills the first of the month instead of having bill collectors sent out by each individual firm. Bill Boyd, of the Lamesa Auto Company, presided at the meeting.

Reasons advanced by this organization for this method of collecting bills were that it would be of mutual benefit to customer and merchants alike, and that because of a scarcity of tires and automobiles it was a patriotic duty; and that it was honestly felt to be a better business procedure.

It was said that as a general rule bill collectors were more of a nuisance than anything else, and that much time and a great many ill feelings could both be saved by the mailing out of the bills. All retail bills were made due and payable in 30 days, and if the bills were not paid by the 10th of each month following the making of the debt, each individual merchant would collect his delinquent accounts as he saw best.

The group also decided on a calendar of holidays for the year, with July 4, November 11, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day being definitely accepted as such, and with the way left open for any special occasion to be included in this calendar.

## Only 2,150 Poll Tax Receipts Issued In This County Up To Thursday Morning

R. W. (Buster) Herndon, Dawson County Tax Assessor-Collector, reported Thursday morning, that at the present time only 2150 poll tax receipts had been issued by his office for the present year. A total of slightly over 3,500 were issued in 1940, which was the last election year.

Mr. Herndon also wishes to call attention to the fact that all persons who reached their 21st birthday after January 1, 1941, or who will be 21 before election day, must secure their exemption certificate before Feb. 1, 1942, if they wish to vote in this year's elections. This ruling has only recently been received from the attorney general.

While there is no way of estimating the total number of poll tax receipts that will be issued this year, it is hoped that every person eligible will take time between now and Feb. 1 to pay his poll tax. Besides the election of city, county, district and state officials, there are a number of important constitutional amendments to be voted on this year.

Plans were discussed for the co-operation of this county in the Food-Food-Freedom program. It was decided to hold another meeting Friday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock in the District courtroom when final plans would be made.

At the Monday meeting a number of county chairmen were appointed for various phases of the War Board's work. J. R. Payne was appointed to head the dairy work in the county; Roscoe Holton, beef cattle; J. Logan Green, swine; B. J. Baskin, poultry, and Miss Mattie Phenix was appointed to direct the Food-Food-Freedom garden and diet efforts. C. M. Burton was delegated to make arrangements for the collection of all farm and ranch scrap iron and other useful materials that are to be gathered.

All vocational agriculture teachers, home economics teachers, AAA committeemen, and a number of key farmers have been asked to attend the Friday meeting, when final plans will be worked out for this county's participation in the USDA war effort.

Mrs. Lindsey, known over this entire section as "Mother Lindsey," widow of the founder of Lamesa, and a resident of Dawson County for 39 years, was near 81 years of age, being born in Henderson County, Texas, on March 25, 1861.

She was married to John J. Lindsey on December 31, 1876, and moved with him and their family to this county in 1903. Mr. Lindsey was one of the founders and promoters of the original townsite of Lamesa.

Mrs. Lindsey was a faithful member of the First Baptist Church, and of the Order of the Eastern Star, and until the infirmities of age stopped her, she was a regular attendant at all church services and chapter meetings. She held many offices in the Eastern Star, and was looked upon as one of the guiding spirits of that organization.

## 2,536 Federal Auto Use Tax Stamps Are Sold

At mid-morning Thursday, Dawson County citizens had purchased a total of 2,536 Federal Auto Use Tax Stamps at the local postoffice. This represents approximately 90 per cent of the automobiles registered in Dawson County.

Frank Schofield, collector of internal revenue at Austin, announced Wednesday, that February 2 is positively the last day for the paying of the new tax without being subject to penalty. The tax is \$2.09 per vehicle.

Penalty for failure to have such a stamp on automobiles is a fine not to exceed \$25 or not more than 30 days in jail.

The collector also suggested that stamps be stuck inside the front windshield and that each motorist write the automobile's make, serial number and his name across the stamp to nullify theft.

## All-Out Drive To Salvage Waste Paper Scheduled To Get Under Way Next Week

It cannot be replaced for this amount; in fact, it would be almost impossible to purchase the electric equipment at any price; and for your information, there are several towns wishing to buy this equipment for their football parks.

Now the following proposition has been worked out, whereby we can save this park, and to do so we not only will have the park, but we will save what we have invested in it, which consists of planning, work, and money. The plan is that the Dawson County Fair Association, by and through its Board of Directors, has voted to issue sufficient amount of stock in the Association at par value that when sold to pay off the indebtedness against this property.

A committee of civic minded men have met and agreed to assist in selling this stock. The drive will begin on Thursday, February 5th, and they hope that by this date you will please arrange to do your part in this civic matter. We cannot afford to let this park unit be torn down. It is a necessity in every town, and we should have one as every other town of this size, or smaller, has.

When this drive has been completed, and sufficient stock sold to liquidate this debt, the Dawson County Fair Association will own and operate the park through its Board of Directors.

## Texas Farmers Eligible For Tires And Tubes

Texas farmers are eligible to apply for tires or tubes for farm tractors, other farm implements or trucks which carry the farm products and foods to market, according to B. F. Vance, chairman, Texas USDA War Board.

Distribution of tires or tubes will be made through certificates issued by county rationing boards, the chairman said.

"The first step is to obtain an application form from local rationing boards and obtain a statement from the board's inspector that the tire or tube to be replaced cannot be repaired, recapped or retreaded, or otherwise made useable," Vance said.

## Girdles, Sports Materials And Other Non-Essentials Hard Hit By War Order

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP) — Sorry, girls, but the War Production Board confirmed that bad news about girdles today.

After Feb. 1, an order declared, no more crude rubber or latex may be used in manufacturing girdles or other foundation garments, golf balls, erasers, bathing suits and caps, lawn and garden hose and hundreds of other common household items.

Extending already strict government control over the rubber industry, the board made public a long list of "essential" products which may be manufactured, established production quotas for each class of products, and directed that use of crude rubber for a wide variety of "essential" civilian goods be reduced about 75 per cent below recent annual consumption.

After Feb. 1, the order stipulated, all products not on the list may be manufactured only from reclaimed rubber.

It was this provision which torpedoed girdles. Reclaimed rubber, experts say, cannot be used satisfactorily in material which is subject to recurrent stretching. After a few stretches, it doesn't bounce back into shape.

### NUPTIAL BARGAIN

GUTTENBERG, N. J. (AP) — There may be more wedding bells than usual, in Guttenberg. The town clerk, Peter Helz, announced that the men in the armed forces who want to marry Guttenberg girls may do so without paying the \$2.00 marriage license tax.

With this money the United States will "build toward our offensive knockout blow," the appropriations committee was told by Lieut. Gen. H. H. Arnold, deputy chief of the staff for air.

The vote of 389 to 0 by which the house sent the bill its way toward final enactment was a foregone conclusion. No sign of opposition developed during the debate and except for inclusion in the bill of \$30,000 to build another dam in the Tennessee Valley Authority system the vote could have come in the first hour.

But after a bitter exchange, largely along partisan lines, the bill went through bearing the separate appropriation to build Douglas dam, on the French river near Dandridge, Tennessee.

Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.), of the appropriations committee brought the bill before the house with a solemn assertion that "the whole issue of this war depends on taking and holding control of the air in every theatre of the war."

## Twelve Billions Are Voted For War Planes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP) — Less than four hours after it received the request from its appropriations committee, the house voted unanimously today to pour another \$12,525,872,474 into this nation's drive to seize aerial mastery over the foes of the United Nations wherever they may be found.

The appropriation, which now goes to the Senate, will pay for 23,000 combat planes and 10,000 trainers, only a starter toward President Roosevelt's goal of 60,000 U. S. built flying warcraft in 1942 and 125,000 in 1943.

It is the largest single outlay for military purposes ever proposed in congress, but only a small part of the \$6 billion dollars of war expenditures which President Roosevelt, in his budget message at the start of the session outlined for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Provided are \$933,000,000 to expand aircraft plants, build bomber assembly plants and construct facilities for production of explosives and incendiary materials; \$7,144,056,340 for complete planes; \$1,547,948,529 for armament, cannon, ammunition, bombs and pyrotechnics; \$1,900,000,000 for spare engines and parts, and approximately \$1,000,000,000 for signal corps and chemical warfare service supplies.

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## Wilson County To Receive Food Stamps

According to information from the Department of Agriculture, Washington, to Director H. H. Williamson of the A. and M. College Extension Service, the Food Stamp program for distributing certain agricultural commodities soon will be extended to Wilson County, Texas.

Under the plan of distribution, eligible families will be given the opportunity to buy orange colored stamps at rates approximating their regular food expenditures and to receive free blue stamps for use in obtaining specially designated commodities to supplement their food supplies.

Wilson County, which has a population of 17,066, was selected as a result of conferences between representatives of the Surplus Marketing Administration, and local public officials, welfare officials, business men and bankers who will be connected with the operation of the program.

It is estimated that there are about 880 cases, representing 3,800 persons, receiving public aid in the area.

Today the English people depend on American farmers for both cheese and other milk products.

## School Lunch Program Fights Malnutrition

Approximately 270,000 rural and 90,000 urban Texas school children in 5,000 Texas schools took part in the community school lunch program during December.

The school lunch program is serving two purposes, according to Emmett A. MacBryde, Texas USDA War Board member representing the Surplus Marketing Administration. It creates wider markets for American farm products, assisting American farmers to obtain fair return on their full production of food-stuff, and it helps the national health defense program by combating the evils of malnutrition and "hidden-hunger" evident in some 9 million American school children.

The SMA supplies nourishing foods to the Texas Department of Public Welfare for the school lunch program. This food is distributed to all eligible schools. Local civic clubs, PTA's and school organizations act as sponsors and operate the program locally. In certain areas sponsors receive assistance from the WPA and NYA in assigning personnel to prepare and serve the food. In many areas, however, where such assistance is not available, local sponsors either hire helpers or do the work themselves.

Records disclose SMA last year purchased 56 million pounds of farm products per month for nearly 5 million American school children in 67,000 schools throughout the nation. Seventy-two percent of the children participating in the program lived on farms and in rural areas.

In addition to the increased farm market which school lunch food purchases represent, MacBryde pointed out a secondary value. Once a school lunch program is started the local sponsor must agree to purchase the basic foods, and in no case can SMA foods be substituted for money already being spent on school lunches in the community. This creates an added local market for farm products as sponsors usually purchase fresh vegetables, meats, milk, fruits and other local products to round out the school lunch.

Texas farmers are doing their share in the Food-For-Freedom campaign, and production goals set for 1942 will be surpassed in most instances. Much of the Texas food crop will be purchased by the Surplus Marketing Administration for Lend-Lease, school lunches, direct

distribution, and the Red Cross. The Surplus Marketing Administration at the end of this school year hopes to reach 6 of the 9 million American school children in need of the school lunch program. In Texas the program is expanding and it is the hope of officials of the Department of Agriculture that

If Texas farm families supply much of the farm produce needed in nearby towns and cities, they will release large shipments to local dealers for use by the growing number of army camps and defense areas.

Myrtle Murray, Extension Service specialist in home industries, says in taking over this responsibility of supplying food for others as well as themselves, farm families will need to consider: Varieties of fruits and vegetables best suited to their section of the state, cultural methods, the amount to plant, availability of farm labor for harvesting.

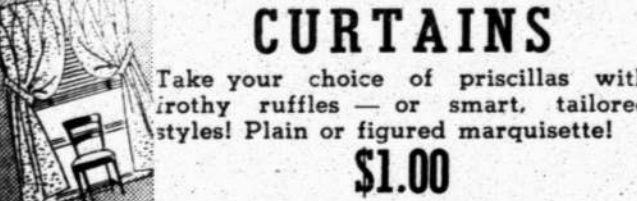

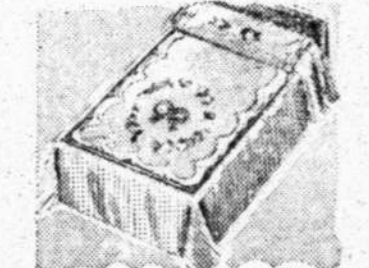

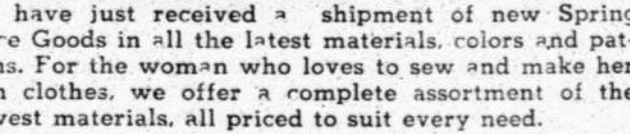

## Filipinos Subjected To Jap Terrorism As Death Penalty Given For Trivial Violations

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—"free circulation by slanderous statements." A reign of terror in Japanese-occupied section of the Philippines was indicated tonight by a war department communiqué which told of the establishment of the death penalty for trivialities such as questioning the worth of the Jap army's special "invasion currency."

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, in command of American and Filipino forces, reported to the department that the commanding Japanese general Masaharu Homma, had signed a proclamation warning the civilian population that capital punishment would follow this and a list of other presumed offenses.

Failure to obey Japanese orders was one of them. Others were hiding food and clothing to prevent commandeering by the Japs, rebellion, spying, sabotage, looting, polluting drinking water, stealing arms, or "any other act against the interest of Japanese forces."

Earlier reports from MacArthur had told of a continued series of Japanese attacks upon the American-Filipino defense line. All assaults, he said, were repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy.

The Japs came to the Philippines with currency already printed for forced circulation in the islands. Filipinos are compelled to accept it in exchange for goods, or services or for the usual currency of the Philippine government, backed by gold and credit of the United States.

It was made a capital offense, MacArthur said, to refuse to accept this bogus currency or to hinder its

## Sugar Rationing To Start Early Next Month

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—Government rationing of sugar, it was announced today, will begin early next month with each person limited to about a pound a week.

Announcing the program, Price Administrator Leon Henderson said it was proposed too, to recover excess stocks from persons who have hoarded supplies.

The prospective allowance of one pound per person per week compares with average per capita home consumption of about one and a half pounds a week in 1941.

Henderson said there was an actual shortage of about one-third in the sugar supply, and that this, rather than hoarding, necessitated this first food stuff rationing of this war.

Rationing books have been designed and printing of them will be started in a day or two, he said.

Then, in a direct word of warning to hoarders, Henderson asserted: "Those who have stocks on hand are advised to start using them now."

"Consumers are warned that they will not be permitted to gain an advantage from their supposed foresight."

He did not amplify on this statement, but OPA officials stressed it as one of the most important in the rationing announcement. Action against hoarders will be an important part of the rationing program they said.

"The most important reason for rationing sugar," Henderson declared, "is to insure that all the customers are treated equitably. There will be enough sugar for each person next year to supply all basic dietary needs. Until the formal rationing system is instituted, every user of sugar can help the Government by restricting his purchases of sugar to minimum current requirements. Retailers during this period in many cases may be expected to restrict the amount of sugar which can be purchased by any one customer."

## Abilene Flyer Is Wounded In Burma Battle

ABILENE, Jan. 24 (AP)—George L. Paxon, Jr., American volunteer flyer, cabled his sister here today that he was wounded a second time fighting the Japs, in Burma. That was good news to the family, and friends—they had feared far worse tidings.

News dispatches, describing yesterday's engagement, in which American and British Airmen shot down 21 Japanese planes over Rangoon, said two fliers failed to return, one American, one Briton.

The description of the missing American said he previously had been wounded on Jan. 4. This led the family and friends to believe it was Paxon, because he was wounded on that date.

The cable today, to his sister, Mrs. H. A. Pender, from the former Hardin-Simmons University student and Yale graduate, said:

"Careless. Shot full of holes, skin deep. In private home feeling great. Sweet revenge shortly." After he was wounded Jan. 4, he messaged his sister and mother, Mrs. George L. Paxon, Sr., "All Okeh. More fun soon."

## Auto And Tire Bans May Reduce, Hike Death Toll

AUSTIN, Jan. 16 (AP)—Will the ban on the sales of new automobiles and tires, reduce the State's traffic fatalities?

The Texas Safety Association's answer is, maybe.

The curtailment may cut deaths if it:

1. Reduces sharply the number of cars in use.
  2. Influences owners to conserve cars by driving less.
  3. Causes motorists to drive slower to prevent excessive wear.
  4. But, there are opposing factors which might balance or might even tip the scale the other way.
- They are:
1. Motorists will be driving older cars and might find it a tough job to keep them in safe condition because of shortages of spare parts and mechanics.
  2. Tires in many instances, will be used beyond the safety point.
  3. Many vehicles discarded as unfit for service, will go back on the road.
  4. The tempo and urgency of war production and transportation will increase daily, further aggravating problems that have sent the death toll to near-record proportions.

3. Blackouts have become common in many cities.

## WANNA FIRE ENGINE? VISIT THE JUNK YARD

BUCHANAN, N. Y. (AP)—If your town needs a fire truck, take a jaunt to the junk yard, is the advice of the village residents.

Until recently the community depended on nearby towns for fire-fighting equipment but it was argued that war might mean more urgent need.

A junk dealer offered his wares and the boys got together and assembled a fire truck from 50 old cars, scattered around the junk heap. Only cost was about \$25 for ladders, a gallon of red paint and a can of polish.

## Lamar County To Get Food Stamps

The Food Stamp program for distributing agricultural commodities will be extended to Lamar County, with operation expected to begin in about a month, according to advice from the Department of Agriculture, Washington, to Director H. H. Williamson of the A and M. College Extension Service.

The total population of the county is 50,425. An estimated 5,112 cases, representing about 15,210 persons, receive public assistance in the area and are eligible for the Food Stamp program. Under the plan, eligible families will be given opportunity to buy orange colored stamps at rates approximately their regular food expenditures, and to

receive free blue stamps for use in obtaining specially designated agricultural commodities to supplement their food supplies.

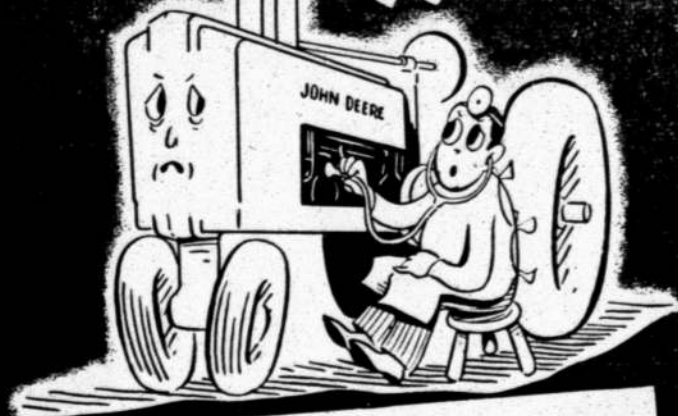

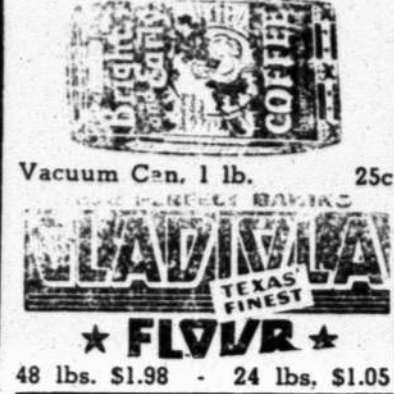
