MOTHER SLAYS THREE CHILDREN THEN SUICIDES

CEMETERY IS SETTING FOR WOMAN'S ACT

MURDER OVER MONEY MATTERS END IN FOUR DEATHS

(By Associated Press)
LEBANON, Ky., May 24.—Three children were discovered dead near Ryder cemetery here today. Their mother, Mrs. Mamie Sheppard, lay nearby with her head smashed. Coroner Arthur Russell said he believed the woman killed her children and committed suicide. She died shortly after she was found.

The bodies of the children had been found, and apparently they had died several hours when they were found. Two negro boys, one of whom was about 8 a. m. had been used to cover up the bodies.

Children Found First
Negro boys pointed vaguely to a field near the cemetery, where they followed the direction given upon the child. They were found by Sheriff J. H. Ina, Louise, T. and Catherine.

Sheppard is the wife of Carey Sheppard, a lumber company employee, and they have four children ranging in age from 12 to 2 years. Her family said they were carrying over financial troubles. She had said that she "go through another day."

Heavy Rains Flood Streets In Santone

SANTONE, May 24 (AP).—Hours of intermittent rain last night and today blocked traffic, entered human lives, and swelled the San Antonio river three feet above its normal level. Precipitation totaled 2.2 inches.

Police were stationed in Brackley park to warn motorists attempting to drive through the waters. An unknown motorist, attempting to drive through an underpass under the Southern Pacific viaduct, was forced to abandon his car in ten feet of water and out. Homes on South Presa were flooded when water rose to a depth of about 3 feet.

THREE SLAIN AS ROBBERY FAILS

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., May 24 (AP).—Herman Merrill, 80-year-old attorney, Wayne Barry, detective, and a negro burglar were killed here today after Merrill surprised the robber in his home.

Detective Barry and Merrill were killed by the negro who in turn fell before the pistol fire of Detective Patrick.

The two detectives were near the Merrill home when they heard the shot which wounded the attorney fatally. As they gave chase, the negro fired a bullet through Barry's heart. Then Patrick fired three shots into the robber's body.

ROBBERY AND SLAYING ARE CLEARING UP

WOMAN CONFESSES TO HUSBAND'S PART IN SAN DIEGO CRIME

LOS ANGELES, May 24.—An alleged confession naming Lee Cochran and M. B. Cochran as the perpetrators of a sensational \$85,000 hold-up of the Agua Caliente and Tia Juana company's money car near San Diego Monday in which two guards were killed, was made today by Cochran's wife, Marie Cochran.

Mrs. Cochran declared her husband had admitted to her part in the holdup after she had driven to San Diego Monday to meet him. She was arrested in Long Beach, Calif., yesterday.

Confessions Tally
Authorities said the confession tallied with that of Mrs. Agnes G. Kearney, wife of Jerry Kearney, arrested Wednesday in San Diego as she attended to gunshot wounds which police believed Cochran had received in the exchange of shots with the two guards, N. Monroy and Jose Perez Borrego.

Lithuanian Lad Is Executed By State

KOVNO, Lithuania, May 24 (AP).—A student named Vasylius, sentenced to death yesterday for the recent attempt on the life of Premier Wolodarskas, was executed by a firing squad at sunrise today.

After sentence he confessed a share in the crime and implicated certain of his friends as accomplices, among them a student named Gudelis who he alleged was the prime mover in the plot.

The premier and Mme. Wolodarskas escaped injury when a fusillade of shots fired at them struck four of their party as they were entering a theatre.

Jennings Acquitted

ROCHESTER, N. Y., May 24 (AP).—A jury last night acquitted Glenn Jennings, charged with the slaying of Jacob Hanson, secretary of the Niagara Falls lodge of Elks. Hanson was shot when he failed to stop his automobile near Lewiston May 6, 1928, at command of coast guardsmen. A subsequent search of the car failed to reveal any liquor.

Editor Is Dead

LIBERTY, May 24 (AP).—T. J. Chambers, 53, founder of the Liberty Vindicator, widely known among Southeast Texas newspapermen, died in Houston last night.

ONE MAN KILLED
TEXARKANA, May 24 (AP).—One man was dead and several others were recovering here today from injuries received yesterday when the wall of a building which they were razing collapsed. H. O. Campbell, formerly of Ashdown, Ark., was the man killed.

MOISTURE IS PLENTY HERE

RECENT RAINS ENOUGH FOR THIRTY DAYS, EATON AVERS

The recent rains have been sufficient for the crops of the county for the next thirty days, according to D. F. Eaton, Lubbock county agricultural agent.

Mr. Eaton said that warm weather is needed more than anything else at this time. "Although this cool weather and frequent showers prevent the soil from drying out and clodding, germination is slowed down. We need warm weather to increase the speed of germination and prevent seed from rotting," he said.

Planting activities are in full swing at this time and the biggest percent of the crops should be planted within the next week, Mr. Eaton estimates.

Fifty Die In Late Battle In Mexico

MEXICO CITY, May 24 (AP).—An account of a battle at Mexican in the state of Jalisco during which fifty insurgents were killed and fifty wounded was given in Guadalajara dispatches to Excelsior today.

Fifteen hundred insurgents under command of Enrique Gorostiza, described as the supreme chief of the religious insurgents in Jalisco, were defeated by federal troops under General Saturnino Cedillo.

The insurgents, who had captured the town some time ago, were driven from it after two hours of fighting.

Schwab Speaks

NEW YORK, May 24 (AP).—Charles M. Schwab, chairman of the Bethlehem Steel corporation, in an address today before the American Iron and Steel Institute, of which he is president, declared that while there is a greater demand for steel now than there ever was before, earnings of the steel industry are "far from adequate to provide for the industry's future service to the country."

PROBE URGED FOR RESERVE BANK SYSTEM

KING, UTAH, DEMANDS SENATE ACTION ON FEDERAL BANKS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 24.—Senator King, Democrat, Utah, introduced a resolution today to authorize the Senate Banking committee to investigate the operation of the Federal Reserve system and to recommend legislation to cure defects, if any should be found.

Subjects Are Listed
The resolution listed more than a score of subjects for investigation. It also proposed that the committee determine whether facilities of the Reserve system had been loaned for trading on stocks and whether member banks had afforded "unduly large accommodations to brokers."

The investigation also would determine whether the banking laws ought to be amended to restrict the use of general bank credits for speculative purposes.

Files Movie Suit

LOS ANGELES, May 24 (AP).—Pauline Stark, motion picture actress, brought suit in superior court yesterday against James Cruise, Inc. for \$6,050 charging breach of contract. Miss Stark contended she had been engaged to act for four weeks in a production starting May 14, for \$1,500 per week. Four days later, she complained, she was discharged.

Gasser Goes Wild

SCHRIEVER, La., May 24 (AP).—The roar of a wild gasser was heard for ten miles early today in lower Terrebonne parish. The gasser, which came in about midnight, is located on a lease being developed by the Texas company working the Louisiana Land and Exploration company's holdings. It is about ten miles from an oil well brought in yesterday. Plans are being made to bring the gasser under control. The field is located about 40 miles below Schriever.

MEXICAN SOLDIERS ON GUARD AS ENVOY COME HOME

(By Associated Press)
LAREDO, May 24.—Dwight W. Morrow, United States ambassador to Mexico, was one of the way to his home in Englewood, N. J., today to attend the wedding of his daughter Anne to Col. Charles A. Lindbergh. Mr. Morrow refused to announce the date of the wedding but said, "It will take place while I am on this trip north." He plans to return to Mexico City in July.

The ambassador arrived here late yesterday from the Mexican capital escorted by 200 Mexican soldiers. Before his departure from Mexico City last Wednesday, news—permen pledged to secrecy so he would not be exposed to danger by announcement of his itinerary.

Pilot Train Leads

Two hundred soldiers were on a pilot train which ran ahead of the regular Mexico City-Laredo passenger train to which the ambassador's private car was attached. The other 80 soldiers occupied an armored car in the regular train. In addition to the soldiers, commanded by General Acosta, two Mexican detectives and two United States Army sergeants attached to the embassy at Mexico City, were on Mr. Morrow's train.

Americans With Him
With the ambassador were Edward P. Lowry, third assistant secretary of the embassy; Arthur Springer, Mr. Morrow's private secretary; Hal Mangum, owner of a ranch in the state of Coahuila where Colonel Lindbergh was a guest last December; and Harold Walker, vice-president of the Huasteca Oil company.

Mr. Morrow left for San Antonio several hours after his arrival here and said he would go directly to Washington without stopping at Washington.

Man Is Slain

GRANITE CITY, Ill., May 24 (AP).—Ed Dietrich, 62, former St. Louis policeman and saloon keeper, was shot to death last night at his farm house at Long Lake, near Granite City. His assassins were three unidentified men who escaped.

Woman Is Freed

CANTON, O., May 24 (AP).—Mrs. Maeme Guerrier, 27, who shot and killed Rev. Father Joseph A. Ricci, pastor of St. Anthony's Catholic church, several weeks ago, was found sane and ordered released, following a sanity hearing here today. Tried on a charge of first degree murder, Mrs. Guerrier was found not guilty on the ground of insanity.

New Record Set

PARIS, May 24 (AP).—The French flier Lemoigne today beat the world's height record for a plane loaded with half a ton, reaching a height of about 31,500 feet at Villa Conlay. The previous record of the German Schinzinger was just over 30,000 feet.

Churches Merge

EDINBURGH, Scotland, May 24 (AP).—The Church of Scotland and the United Free Church of Scotland at their respective assemblies today agreed by overwhelming majorities to unite. The formal act of union will take place in October.

Fire Victim Dies

HOUSTON, May 24 (AP).—The fire which destroyed the home of S. P. Doggett at Weimer Wednesday claimed its second victim today when Doggett died at a hospital. Mrs. Doggett was burned to death when she ran back in the house after being carried to safety by her husband. The condition of Mary Louise Doggett, 13, now an orphan, remained serious today.

HAMILTON IN LEGAL PLEAS FOR FREEDOM

WIDOWED DAUGHTER IS CALLED TO STAND IN AMARILLO HEARING

AMARILLO, May 24.—Theresa Hamilton Walton, 19, appeared in District court here today to testify at a hearing for her father, R. H. Hamilton, seeking release under bond. Hamilton is under indictment for murder in the slaying of his son-in-law, Thomas Walton, Jr., 21, Theresa's husband, here May 4.

The young widow, whose whereabouts had been kept secret for two weeks, appeared in court just after District Attorney E. W. Thompson told the judge his office had been unable to locate her. Defense Attorney C. B. Reeder said: "The girl is here in Amarillo and she will be in the courtroom in five minutes." At the expiration of that time the girl walked into the courtroom with her mother and brother.

She Kisses Father
Hamilton arose and embraced his daughter. She kissed him.

Hamilton's attorneys asked that Mrs. Walton be excused from the courtroom until she was needed to testify. The request was granted, and the young widow left with her mother.

Legal points on the motion for bond, asked under a habeas corpus writ, were being argued, and it was expected the girl would be called this afternoon.

Walton was shot to death in Hamilton's office when he went there to tell of his marriage to Theresa.

OTTAWA, May 24 (AP).—Senator George P. Graham termed United States prohibition law enforcement worse than a joke in the course of a debate on suppression of liquor smuggling in the Canadian Senate yesterday.

Defending the government policy of refusing to grant the request of the United States that liquor laden vessels be denied clearance he said that when liquor was shipped across the Detroit river, the United States customs officers found it convenient to disappear.

Sir George Foster, urging greater cooperation on the part of Canada, charged Canadian distillers were in actual collusion with the rum runners.

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MAN SHOT IN DARING RAID IN OKLAHOMA

BANK MESSENGER HELD UP ON OKLAHOMA CITY STREET

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, May 24.—Robbers held up a messenger for the American First National bank on a downtown corner today and escaped with approximately \$80,000.

The messenger had just left the bank on his way to the Federal Reserve bank.

The messenger, Charles Vowell, 25, was shot in the right arm.

Vowell, on his way to Federal Reserve bank to deposit the money, stopped his automobile at a stop line. A man leaped from another car, which drew alongside, and, jumping to the running board of Vowell's car, pointed a pistol at him, fired and grabbed the messenger's satchel.

Vowell said the robber then jumped back into his own car and sped away with a companion, who had waited at the steering wheel.

Witnesses said the man who robbed Vowell was of heavy build and wore a light suit and Panama hat. He leveled his gun at Vowell and seized a white satchel containing the money.

Reached For Gun
Vowell reached for his own gun, attached to his belt on the left side, placing his left arm in front of the robber's gun as the latter fired.

Heavy traffic and a crowd of pedestrians prevented Vowell from firing on the bandits, who fled in a small sedan, he said. Instead he fired in the air.

Three persons who witnessed the holding said they could identify the bandit.

Vowell was given first aid treatment in a drug store in front of which the robbery occurred, and later was taken to a hospital.

ROBBINS AND KELLEY NEAR RECORD MARK

FT. WORTH MEN BEAT GRAF ZEPPELIN TIME ON OCEAN HOP

15TH HOUR PASSED
FORT WORTH, May 24 (AP)—The 15th hour of continuous flight was passed at 11:53 a. m. today by the monoplane "Fort Worth" with Reg. L. Robbins and James Kelley alternating at the controls. The single-engine monoplane had shattered every record for sustained flight with the exception of the Question Mark record of 150 hours, 46 minutes. Robbins and Kelley were in high spirits.

PORT WORTH, May 24 (AP)—Soaring proudly aloft, her single motor driving a march to victory, the endurance monoplane Fort Worth today gave no indication of surrendering to the law of gravitation.

At dusk tomorrow, if the motor resumes its uninterrupted roar, the Fort Worth, piloted by R. L. Robbins and James Kelley will have become supreme in the air. It had been up 116 hours at 7:33 a. m. The refueling mark of 150 hours, 46 minutes and 15 seconds made last January by the army monoplane Question Mark, carrying a crew of five men, will be equalled at 6:13:15 a. m. tomorrow night. An additional hour would set a record. The plane took off at 11:33 a. m. last Sunday.

Graf Record Beaten.
The dirigible endurance record made several years ago by the French-owned Diagonde was only a few hours away. The record of 111 hours and 46 minutes made by German Graf Zeppelin in his flight to America was passed at 3:19 a. m. today.

Bovent and happy in the face of their prolonged ordeal, Robbins and Kelley were cheerful as to the final outcome of the flight. A note dropped at Midland Field, their base, said, "we will try not only for a new record but a good one."

The fliers broke the monotony of the flight last night by idling over the town of Fort Worth, and then down over the crowd riding amusement device at the park on the shore of Lake Worth. Shortly after midnight a light rain began, and the fliers pulled above the broken clouds.

IT JUST DIDN'T PAN OUT THAT WAY

THREE MUSKETEERS' FAIL TO AGREE WHEN FUSELAGE RIPS; RECORD FLIGHT HALTS

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., May 24 (AP)—Failing to live up to the Dumas' tradition of "one for all and all for one," the crew of the monoplane Three Musketeers today after a quarrel indefinitely postponed any further attempt to set a refueling endurance record.

A dispute between H. B. Clarke, chief pilot, and Martin Jensen that started in the air on their second attempt to pass

the record of the army plane "Question Mark" resulted in Clarke's withdrawal from any further attempts.

Clarke brought the plane down at 6:19 o'clock last night after 22 hours and 28 minutes in the air when a hook used in the refueling device tore four rips in the fuselage fabric. Jensen contended he could have repaired the damage in the air as he had done twice during the day.

GRAF ZEPPELIN, MONARCH OF AIR, IS TAKEN BACK TO HOME BASE BY CREW

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 24.—The Graf Zeppelin returned at dawn today to Friedrichshafen from Cuers, France, where it made an emergency landing a week ago after turning back from an attempt to cross the Atlantic.

Aboard the dirigible were 14 of the 18 passengers who made the outward bound trip, and in addition seven French naval officers, invited as the special guests of Dr. Hugo Eckener, the ship's master, in appreciation of his services.

WILLIAMS, LOTTI AND MATES PREPARE FOR OCEAN JAUNT

OLD ORCHARD BEACH, Me., May 24.—The monoplane Green Flash, bound for Rome, and the biplane Lotus, bound for Yellow Bird, which has Paris for its goal, rested here today awaiting fair weather over the Atlantic. Prospects are the two planes will fly together for 1,000 miles.

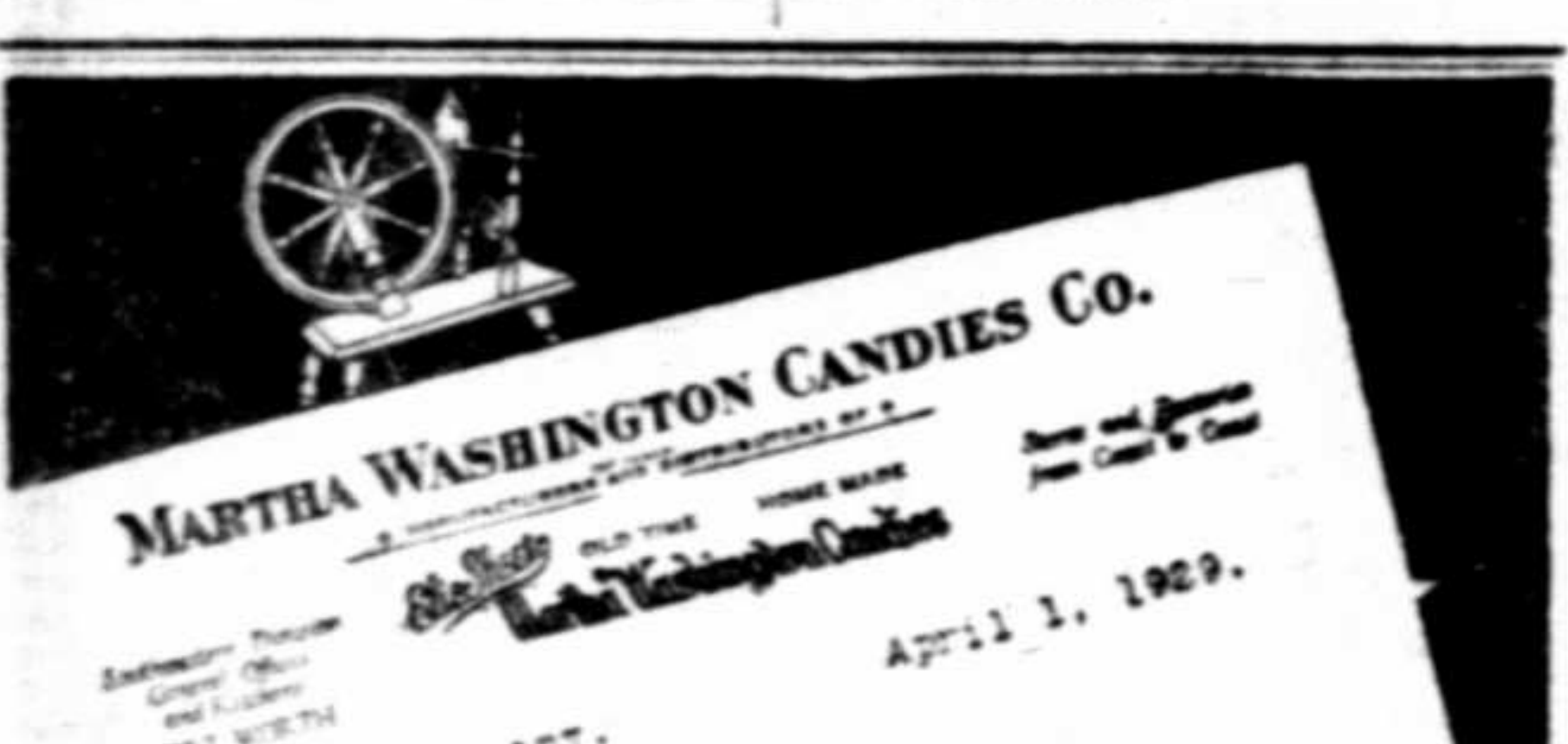

EX-GANGSTER FINDS MOVIES PAY BETTER THAN CRIMES

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., May 24.—

They say that crime doesn't pay—

but the movies know no rules.

Take for example the case of Ray

Renard, former St. Louis gangster.

Ray has given up his life of crime

but the experience he gained dur

ing 12 years as a gangster is paying

him big dividends now.

After being pardoned from the

federal penitentiary at Atlanta by

President Coolidge, Renard came to

Hollywood and opened a tire shop.

About a year ago, when the wave of

crime films swept Hollywood's stu

dios, there was a great demand for

technical experts to act as advisors

on these pictures. So Renard sold

his tire business and became a mo

tion picture "crime technician."

Learned by Experience

"Some people think they may be

come expert criminologists by

merely studying criminals, but it

can't be done," declares Renard.

"The only way to really know crime

and those connected with it is to be

one of them. I spent about 12

years with various gangs and

learned about all there is to know

about this crime business.

"There is no truth to the theory

that there is something wrong men

mentally with criminals. Most of them

go into the racket with their eyes

wide open and with the full realiza

tion of what the consequences may

be. I know that there was nothing

wrong with me when I first became

a criminal. I had been working

for \$20 a week and saw nothing

but hard work ahead of me. That

didn't suit me a bit. I wanted to

live comfortably so I chose that

method of earning my living.

"I am through with crime now,

however. I have no desire for a

great deal of money. I only want

enough so that I can live com

fortably. Right now I am moving

from studio to studio acting as a

technical advisor on various crime

films, but as soon as I get set in a

studio, which I hope will be soon, I

expect to write several books on

criminology. With the money they

will bring me and my salary as a

movie crime expert, I will be able

to have anything I want.

"Nothing could ever take me back

to a life of crime again. Sure, it's

exciting—but a little too much so.

I lived through two big gang wars

but I have no desire to go through

any more."

Renard started his life of crime

while in his early twenties and

eventually rose to a high position

in gangland, being the chief lieuten

ant to the notorious "Dinty" Col

beck in St. Louis. During his career

he is said to have been arrested 138

times, charged with almost every

major and minor crime from pick

ing pockets to mail robberies.

It was while serving a seven-year

term at Atlanta on an inter-state

freight theft charge that he was

granted executive clemency by Pres

ident Coolidge. This was his re

ward for turning "squealer" and

furnishing the government with evi

dence that sent 26 of his former

partners to prison for long terms.

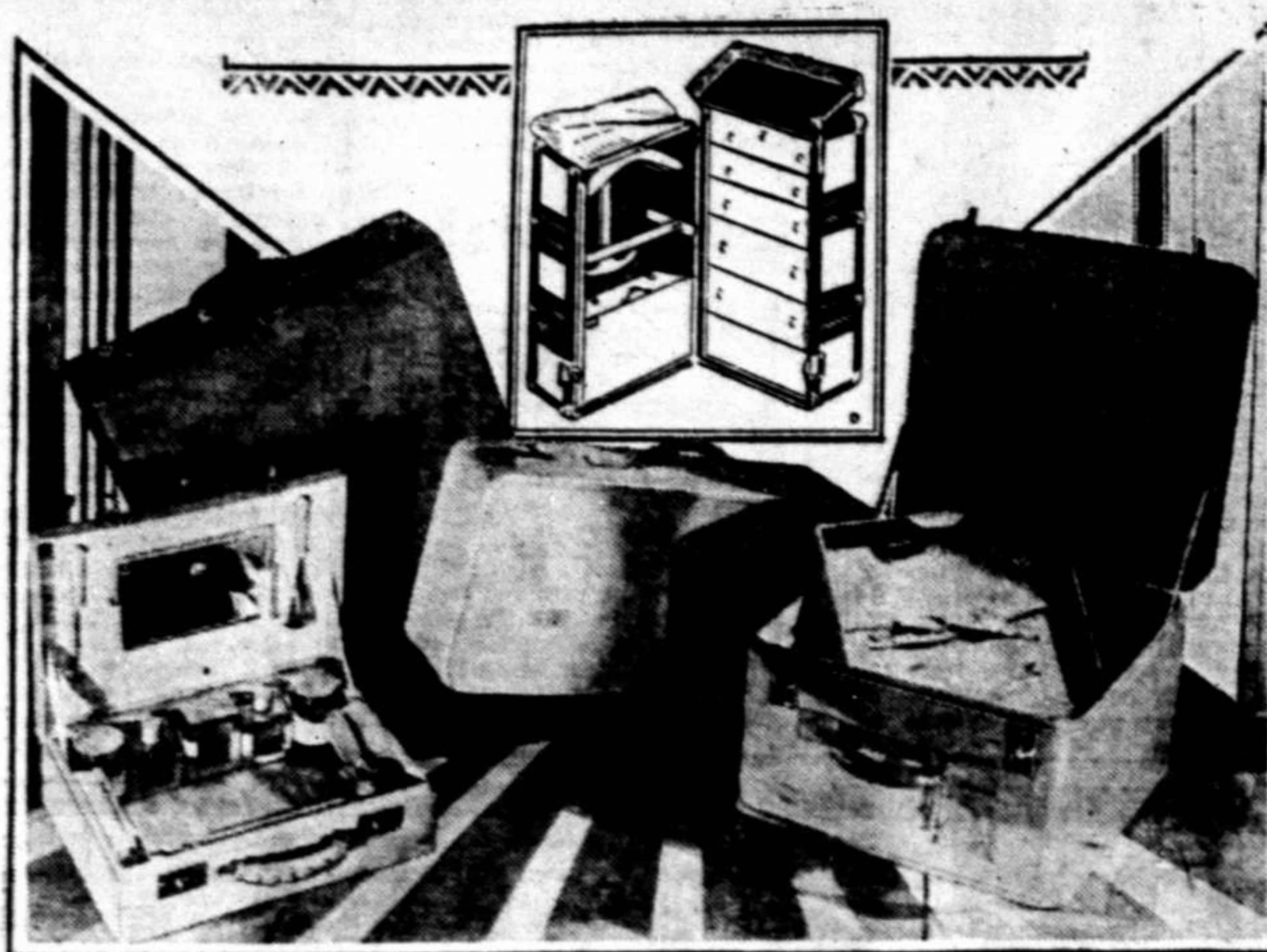

LA FOLLETTE ISSUES DEF

DARES SENATE TO SAY HE CAN'T GIVE HIS VOTING STATUS

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 24.—The Senate was challenged yesterday by Senator LaFollette, republican, Wisconsin, to employ its rule of expulsion on him if he tells his constituency how he votes on nominations in executive sessions.

LaFollette issued his defy as he denounced the Senate rules committee for investigating newspapermen instead of Senators for the publication of a roll call purporting to show the vote of the confirmation of Irvine Lenroot as a federal judge.

Discussion Follows
The speech was the signal for more discussion of the Senate's indignation over the constant publication of proceedings in its executive sessions. The press gallery joined in the laughter as Dill, democrat, Washington, warned the rules committee that it would likely have to investigate itself for "leaks" from its committee if it holds the proposed investigation of newspapermen in executive session.

Earlier LaFollette offered an amendment to the rules to provide that representatives from the press associations be accorded the privilege of the floor. This courtesy was withdrawn from the press associations yesterday on demand of the Wisconsin senator after the rules committee had voted unanimously to deny the privilege of the floor to the United Press Associations. No action was taken on the LaFollette amendment.

"Inaccuracy" Charged
The United Press associations was one of the news agencies carrying the purported Lenroot roll call. The roll call has been described as "inaccurate."

Meanwhile, Harris, democrat, Mississippi, member of the rules committee, offered a resolution to call before it each Senator "for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not he divulged any secrets of the Senate in connection with the confirmation of Irvine Lenroot."

Sackett, republican, Kentucky, objected to immediate consideration of the resolution.

About 200 members of this year's Tech college graduating class, alumni and faculty are expected to attend the annual banquet reunion of the alumni association to be held in the Hotel Lubbock at 8 o'clock Monday night.

Plans for the annual event are virtually complete. It was announced yesterday by members of the association. E. M. Barnett, president of the association, and member of the Lubbock high school faculty, will preside at the banquet.

The program will consist of talks, songs, yells and the annual election of officers. A farewell dance will follow.

MEXICO COLLEGE STUDENTS SLAIN

MEXICO CITY, May 24 (AP).—A delegation of striking students came to the office of the newspaper El Universal last night and declared that at least two of their number had been killed and many wounded when police fired on them during a demonstration.

The students said that mounted police found several strikers inside the Medical school of the university. The students barricaded themselves, whereupon the police were alleged to have fired through the doors and also to have clashed with students outside the building.

HOUSTON IS DEFEATED AGAIN; PANTHERS ARE VICTORS

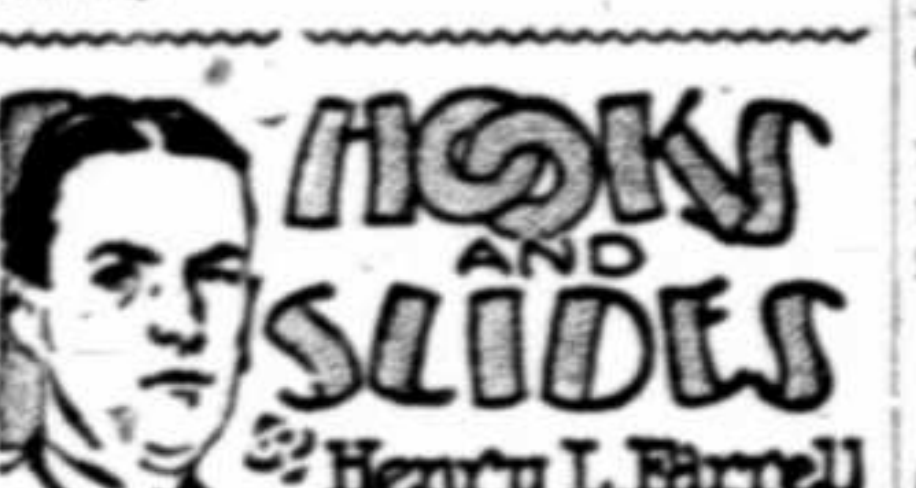

BYRNE GIVES TIPS TO NEW GOLFERS COUNTRY CLUB PROFESSIONAL EXPLAINS HOW TO HIT THE BALL IN THE RIGHT WAY

(This is another article of a series prepared for the Daily Journal by J. W. Byrne, Lubbock professional, on golfing fundamentals, intended for the beginner.)

In our last article, we devoted the majority of space to the pivot in golf and getting the club to the top of the correct position to start the club down properly. Outside of balance, the downward swing is the most important part of the stroke. The first move is to get the club and the left arm into a straight line by allowing the left arm to straighten out with the back of the hand facing upward, which will throw the head of the club to the right and rear as the club comes around and down from the right. The body movement is checked by the pressure on the inside of the left foot. Maintain this pressure until you see the head of the club come in contact with the ball.

By this time the hands are at the line of hips and the right hand is beginning to work. As the club comes around with the body coming out of the pivot and the roll of the forearm, the head of the club meets the ball at a slight angle to the line of direction and crosses the line in the course of the arc after it has met the ball. At no time does the club travel parallel to the line of direction.

There should be no trouble about following through if the club is swung properly and you hit from the inside. Hitting from the inside to the outside confuses quite a few golfers and brief explanation would seem timely. Draw two lines on the ground, one to represent the angle from which the ball should travel and the other the line of stance. The club in coming through should bisect both these lines, continuing in the arc of the swing after it meets the ball.

Body Sways Badly
Swaying of the body is another cause for bad shots. So many golfers when starting the back swing move the whole weight of the body on to the right foot. Consequently the center of balance has been moved somewhere from inches to a foot to the right. In raising the left heel, many forget to bend the left knee. As the club starts down the left heel goes down also and to get the club through one should lift the left foot completely off the ground and finish the shot on the right leg.

It is much easier to hit the ball the right way than the wrong way. There is much more pleasure to keep the ball in the fairways than starting out on a ball-hunting expedition after every tee-off.

Not Yet

Now that Harry F. Sinclair has
actually entered a jail there seems
to be an impression abroad in the
land that the majesty of the law
and reign of exact justice have in
some way been vindicated by his im-
prisonment.

Here, as everybody is careful to
point out, we at last have the spec-
tacle of a million dollars going to
jail. Sinclair is very rich and he
has had an able corps of lawyers,
nevertheless, he is now in seclusion,
just like a penniless chicken thief or
pickpocket.

Thus, we read the traditional al-
l-men-are-created-equal slogan has
been upheld.

Maybe it's so. But, somehow, we
can't see it.

It is true enough that Sinclair is
in jail just like a penniless chicken
thief or pickpocket. But it happens
that he is serving just about as long
a sentence as a petty offender of
that variety would serve. And his of-
fense was somewhat more serious
than stealing chickens or picking
pockets.

Furthermore, if a something like
five years since the meat was first
uncovered. And no friendless ven-
erant, hailed into court for decapit-
ing with a respectable citizen's pul-
lets, could hope to have his term in
jail postponed quite that long.

Beyond a doubt, these days in jail
are not pleasant for a rich oil man.
No jail is a pleasant place for any-
body, and the more luxury a man
ordinarily has, the more irksome his
imprisonment will be to him.

Nevertheless, it ought to be ob-
vious that Sinclair is getting off
easy. Think of how much the Teas-
dale case oil field is worth, con-
sider the fact that many a man has
been imprisoned for five years for
stealing as small a sum as \$5—and
see if you don't agree.

The whole oil scandal proved, be-
yond the shadow of a doubt, that
there is one law for the rich man
and another law for the poor man.
Doherty went free altogether. Sin-
clair would have done likewise if he
had not been so ill-advised as to de-
fy the senators who were question-
ing him.

The cynical old saying "If you
just steal enough you'll be all right,"
still holds good.

The only thing Sinclair's imprison-
ment proves is that our adminis-
tration of justice is not quite a total
mockery.

But it's close enough to that to
demand a lot of revision. And the
American people will be the losers
if they let the fact that Sinclair is
actually in jail kid them into think-
ing that exact justice has at last
been done.

Freedom of Port

Despite the fact that a New York
grand jury condemned an "un-
American" habit of granting
"freedom of the port" to members
of Congress who return to the United
States after trips to foreign
countries, it is announced at Wash-
ington that the Treasury Depart-
ment will continue the practice.

The freedom of the port, as you
no doubt know, permits the recipi-
ent to bring his baggage in unex-
amined by customs men. It is a
graceful compliment for a nation
to extend to a distinguished visitor;
but just why congressmen com-
ing back from foreign parts should
be accorded the privilege is hard to
understand—particularly in view of
the public hunch that not every
congressman's baggage is as dry as
it might be.

For the past several days the af-
fairs attendant upon the closing of
nine South Plains mercantile es-
tablishments operated by the Bar-
rier Brothers of Lubbock, have been
attracting considerable attention.
By virtue of the fact that the par-
ent store of the organization has
long been a leader in its field, and
because so much money was tied up
in the stock of the concern, the
Barrier bankruptcy has probably at-
tracted more attention than any
similar misfortune in the history of
this section.

The entire affair is a regret-
table one. The Barrier Brothers
have always been good citizens of
Lubbock, good friends
of the entire section and the
misfortune which attended their
efforts has the sympathy of
the Plainsman, together with
thousands of other persons
who have had business trans-
actions with the company.

There is one phase of the subject,
however, which is misconceived as
far as the public is concerned. That
phase is that the closing out of
these stores will act as a business
setback for Lubbock and the sur-
rounding section. The Plainsman
does not subscribe to that view.

The term "bankruptcy" has al-
ways been a business bugaboo.
Mention it in almost any gathering
and it's just the same as shouting
"fire" in a crowded theater. The
idea used to be that wherever
there was a business failure the
field must be bad and that such a
misfortune was certain to react to
the disadvantage of the commu-
nity affected.

But times have changed.
Competition in all fields is
faster than it has ever been, and
especially in the mercantile busi-
ness has the battle of dollars
raged incessantly. A mad money
market in the north and east,
an upheaval in redoubts of the
federal reserve system, in-
flation, credits and suicidal cred-
it systems in every line of busi-
ness have changed conditions.
Mass production, too, of the
machinery age, has also played a
part. Wherever there is a
business venture there will be
found unsuccessful ones. It is a law
of life.

The fact that there has been a
bankruptcy in Lubbock will have,
as The Plainsman sees it, no effect
upon continued entrance of outside
capital. The misfortune of one
firm—or a half dozen firms for that
matter—in a city the size of Lub-
bock means nothing from a stand-
point of general business setback.
Nobody welcomes any such occur-
rences, of course, for they are al-
ways unfortunate for some body.
But like other human misfortunes,
a certain number are inevitable, and
there's no use looking on the lar-
ger side of any question—especially
when the darker side does not exist
in fact.

The way outside capital is looking
upon Lubbock and the Plains sec-
tion is perhaps best to be judged by
what financiers say. There is no
secret to the fact that outside com-
panies are lending and spending
millions of dollars every year in
this great country of ours. For in-
stance, take M. H. Gossett of Hous-
ton, president of the Federal Land
Bank in Lubbock yesterday. Mr.
Gossett showed no hesitancy about
expressing his views upon Lubbock
and the South Plains when inter-
viewed by a Journal reporter.

"We are pleased with the
steady, substantial growth of
this section," Mr. Gossett said.
"The growth is not of the boom
type but of the substantial type
which will result in a permanent
boom. Incidentally, Mr. Gos-
sett's concern has representative
interests in every corner of the
South Plains and is doing a tremen-
dous business in this area. As
long as big money interests
feel that way about us we need
worry a great deal about the
needs of the future."

WASHINGTON, May 24.—When
last your correspondent visited the
democratic headquarters here there
was so much plastering, painting,
hammering and sawing going on
that no one seemed to know just
what was being done. But it was
perfectly apparent that the offices
were being considerably expanded
and the inference was that the new
space would be given over to active
occupancy.

It may all be very futile and
nothing good may ever come of it
but the fact that the democrats
plan to keep their business alive
between campaigns ought to be con-
vincing proof that some persons
having to do with the leadership of
the party still have enough sense
to realize what ought to be done in
the party's interest, whether it can
be actually achieved or not.

Raskob is on the job.
There will always be democrats
who will dislike little John J. Ras-
kob, the national chairman, because
he is a Catholic and because he is
wet, but unless you count those
items in there are very few harsh
things that can be said about him.
In fact, little Raskob, since the cam-
paign, has been doing all sorts of
things which ought to entitle him
to rounds of loud cheers from
any stray democrats who are
still interested in some day electing
a democratic president.

It is little Raskob, of course, who
is putting in the main licks in the
attempt to put the party back on its
feet. In the face of all the abuse
he has had, publicly and privately,
from democrats of the south, he
has been patiently and quietly pick-
ing up the pieces and proceeding to
raise money to pay the bills.

Many men in his position might
have given the party up as a bad
job and plunged right back into
business to make a few more mil-
lions. But Raskob played the game
like a good sport, and democrats
in Congress were astounded when
they learned of the extent of his
success in reducing the party debt
left over from the campaign.

Little Raskob is a modest person,
almost shy. The southern democrats
have never liked him very much,
but he has treated them so well
that they are leashed high and dry
when they want to tell him where
to get off. The fact is that the
southern leaders themselves
have been unable to prove any-
thing in the way of national lead-
ership and are not exactly in a po-
sition to crab.

Of course, if little Raskob had
been arbitrary and hard-boiled since
the campaign they might have been
in a position to eat him up, but he
isn't like that. He has transferred
national headquarters from New
York to their own stamping grounds
in Washington, promised them
plenty of help in the next congress-
sional campaign and stepped po-
sitely into the back-ground with
pleasant words to the effect that
they would really be the most im-
portant factor in welding party
policies for the next few years.

It may even be that little Raskob
ought to get some credit for the
recent surprising stiffening of the
democratic backbone in Congress. It
is since his recent visit to Wash-
ington, with words of kindly cheer
and inspiration—and promises of funds
—that democratic senators have
been herded together behind the
export debenture proposal for farm
relief. Support of that measure is
not storing up an immense num-
ber of votes for the party now, but
it offers some hope to democrats
who would like to see their party
present a more or less solid front

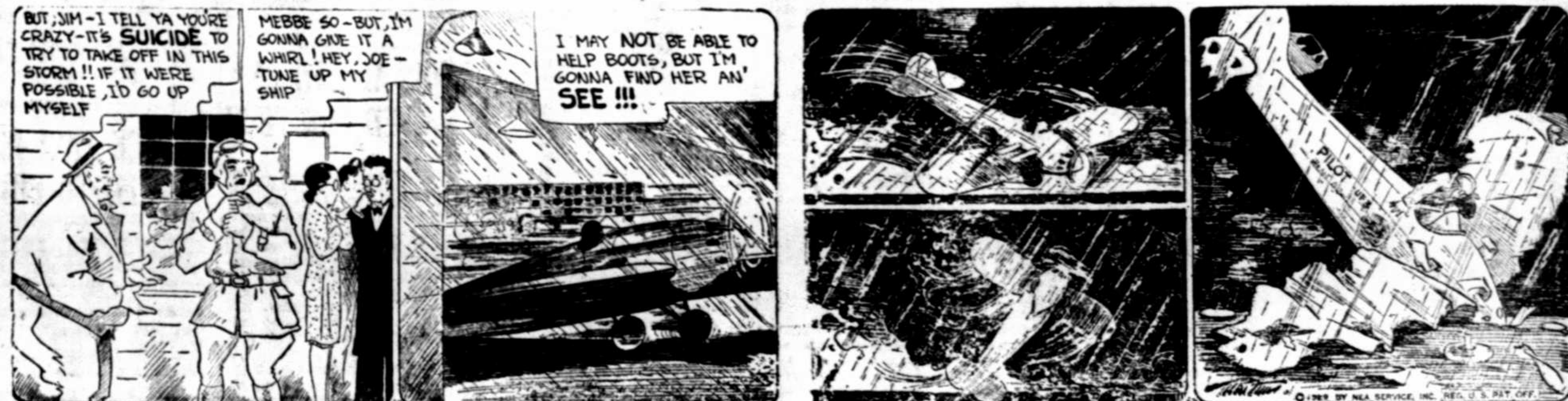

MOODY SIGNS ON STATUTES

THIRTY-THREE BILLS
GET SIGNATURE OF
GOVERNOR

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, May 24.—Thirty-three additional bills passed by the special session of the legislature, were filed with the Secretary of State by Governor Moody today. Some of them were turned in without the Governor's signature.

Among those yet to be acted upon are the board of education, prison concentration and barber bills.

Some Are Listed
Some of those of general application filed today were: fixing \$5 trial fee for county courts and \$4 for justice courts; increasing the maximum time limit for payment of automobile registration fees from January 1 to February 1 of each year; creating advisory civil judicial council; creating the board of pardons and paroles of three members and better defining the jurisdiction of the railroad commission in regulation of motor buses.

Governor Moody said he would probably hold the Board of Education bill until the second special session convenes to give it a chance to correct a defect in the caption, but that should it make the correction he would sign it as it is.

Caption Not Amended
In the haste of the closing days of the session, when it was finally decided to eliminate reference to how the superintendent of public instruction should be selected, thus leaving the office to be filled by popular vote rather than appointment of the board, the caption was not amended accordingly.

The opinion has been expressed that since the caption covers something not in the body of the bill, the measure is valid. It is pointed out that had the reverse been true, something incorporated in the body of the bill that was not covered by the caption, the bill would have been invalid.

DALLAS, May 24.—A correlated decorations scheme, with Texas flowers on every light post on the three principal streets of Dallas, will welcome delegates to the Rotary International convention when they arrive here Sunday.

Tomorrow night workers will begin hanging the flowers. South Texas roses, Simla, also will be shipped to Dallas. The flowers already are being shipped to Dallas in refrigerator cars. During the convention new flowers are to replace the old ones as soon as they have wilted.

Wheel Is Being Built
As another part of the decoration, a mammoth Rotary wheel, 40 feet in diameter and electrically lighted and operated, is being erected on Ferris Plaza.

Although the convention proper is not to begin until Monday, special Rotary services for the 10,500 delegates are to be held Sunday in many churches. Monday night Governor Dan Moody and Mayor J. Waddy Tate of Dallas will open the convention with addresses at Fair Park Stadium. In the afternoon there is to be a preliminary assembly of registered delegates to discuss legislation.

The convention, which is to close Friday, will elect officers Thursday. Although President I. B. Sutton already has arrived, the greater portion of the delegates are not to arrive until Sunday. One of the first trains will bring the Colorado delegation Sunday morning. Seven special trains, in addition to chartered Pullmans, are to carry Rotarians into Dallas.

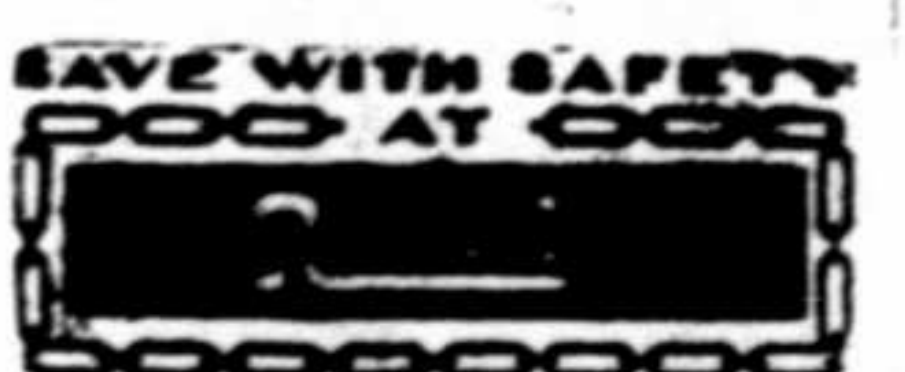

TARIFF BILL TO VOTE

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP).—The tariff bill will be brought to a vote by the republican majority in the House at 3 p. m. Tuesday with 91 amendments approved by members of the Ways and Means committee to be considered in the meantime.

Decision to fix the time for the vote and limit consideration of amendments by means of a special rule giving priority to those offered by the committee was reached by the republican majority late yesterday at the end of two conferences on the subject. The vote was 206 to 24. One hour was allotted today for consideration of the special rule, which was approved, automatically shutting off general debate on the measure.

Schedules Unaffected
Under the republican agreement no schedules in the bill not affected by committee amendments will be subject to change from the floor. Proposals to admit amendments on the schedules affecting sugar, cement, brick, shingles, hardwood and cedar lumber, flaxseed and on the new flexible provisions extending the powers of the president, were rejected by the conference.

None of the 91 amendments announced by the republican members of the Ways and Means committee was put to a vote in the conference, and those attending were not bound to support any of them in the House. Those were worked out by the committee members after discussion with rates proposed in the bill and caused various groups of republican representatives to block an earlier agreement on a rule limiting consideration of amendments. They included proposals for higher duties on cattle, butter and other farm products and transfer of hides, leather and shoes from the free to the dutiable list.

Amendments Can Be Made
The text of the rule which the committee's work thus made possible does not prohibit the offering of amendments from the floor, but it is expected to operate effectively to that end. During consideration of the Fordney-McCumber tariff schedules seven years ago, a similar rule shut off all except committee amendments because consideration of such proposals, given priority, consumed the entire

time allotted for changing the bill.

man, was acquitted last night of manslaughter in the fatal shooting of Jacob Hanson, secretary of the Niagara Falls lodge of Elks. The jury was out nearly twelve hours.
Hanson was shot when he failed to halt his automobile at the command of coast guardsmen near Lewiston May 16, 1928. Jennings was tried in Elmira in January and the jury disagreed.
