## AARP GROUP SETS SLIDE PROGRAM; TO ELECT FOLKS

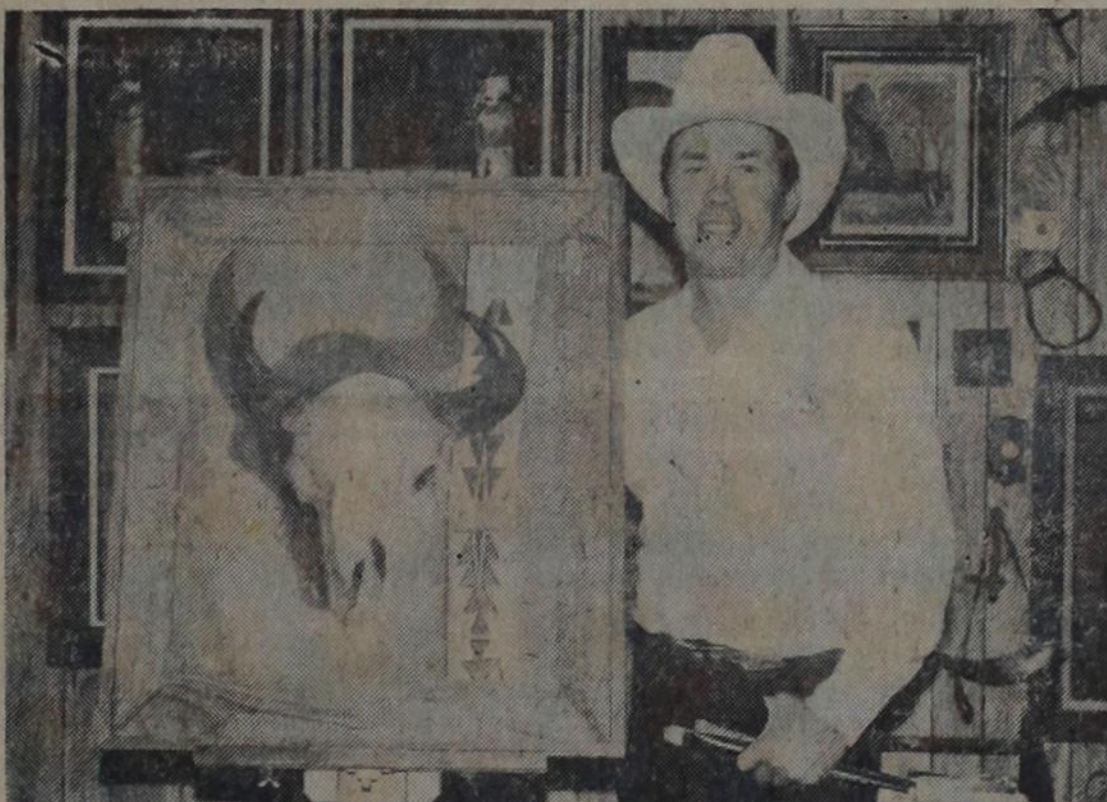

## Light Vote Turnout Expected Tuesday

An expected low number of voters are expected to cast ballots in an election in which 11 proposed constitutional changes are to be decided upon by the citizens of Texas Tuesday, Nov. 8, here and all across the state.

Although regular election day, only questions on the ballot are the proposed 11 changes to the Constitution, the underlying theme of which most of the amendments is government revenues, either state or local and aim at enhancing services without raising taxes.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. across the state and in Callahan County and Cross Plains. Voters are asked to have registration ready when they sign to vote at the City Hall in Cross Plains by Katie Kilgore, election judge. Helping Mrs. Kilgore hold the balloting will be Wanda Montgomery, Marguerite Sipes and Donna Wagner.

Mrs. Kilgore said, "Please vote, proposed changes to the state constitution are important, and should be approved or vetoed by the public."

Callahan County Clerk Darlene Walker informs that absentee balloting will continue through

Friday at her office in the courthouse at Baird. No absentee votes had been cast just before noon Tuesday, and she reported that only 1 ballot had been requested and mailed, noting that it had not been returned.

## Mighty Mites Clip Blanket 22-18; R-Star Due Nov. 3

Cross Plains Junior High School Mighty Mites captured a 22-18 victory over visiting Blanket here last Thursday, Oct. 27, after losing two hard fought contests to Santa Anna 23-12 and to Evant 30-12 the past two Thursdays.

Mites scored in the first quarter Thursday when left halfback David DeShazo rambled 30 yards on a right end sweep. A successful pass from quarterback Terrell Smith to left end Devin Harris on the conversion attempt made it 8-0.

Local gridders made it 16-0 in the initial stanza when a 40-yard pass and run combination from quarterback Smith to right end Billy Grissom worked. Halfback DeShazo tacked on the two-point conversion on a sweep of right end.

Blanket cut the deficit to four points in the second quarter by tallying on a long drive and a halfback pass. Attempted two-point conversions failed after each touchdown.

Cross Plains built its lead to 22-12 in the third canto when quarterback Smith threw a pass to end Devin Harris which worked for a 30-yard counter. Two-point conversion attempt failed.

Blanket scored early in the fourth quarter on a long drive, aided by a pair of holding penal-

ties. Later in the frame, an unidentified Mite caught a Blanket runner after covering 40 yards, and another unidentified Mite recovered the ensuing fumble from what looked like a Blanket touchdown run. Local unit then ran out the clock. To preserve the victory.

Coach Mack McConal praised the Cross Plains defense as "Did a good job in recovering four fumbles." Darin Apple did a super job in kicking, the coach stated. He has been back with the team as kicker only the past two weeks after being knocked out of the competition in the season opener game. McConal continued that Greg Weiss and Stacy Montgomery did fine inside power running in the game.

Others playing good offense and defense for the Mites were listed as Scott Cupit, Chris Duncan, Ken Masters, Tim McCoy, Matt Pirtle, Chris Brown, Bill Johnson, Richard Smith, Ricky Wheeler, Casey Williams and Curtis Wyatt.

Mighty Mites will host Rising Star here Thursday beginning at 6:30 p.m. It was reported that Rising Star has one of the best teams they have had in a long time. Reportedly both Cross Plains and Rising Star are looking forward to the game.

### State Crop-Livestock Report Is Due Soon

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for final 1983 crop acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley reported that producer compliance with the current farm programs reduced crop acreage across the state, and many farmers and ranchers are depending on this survey information for an accurate picture of the 1983 agricultural situation.

Findley explained that the confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, provide information used by producers to make their production and marketing plans for the coming year.

"Without these reports, farmers and ranchers would have to rely on other sources for crop and livestock information," he added.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state as well as county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

## Veteran's Service Officer Warning About Report

According to Charles E. Brandon, Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, a large number of Veterans Administration beneficiaries will soon be required to complete the annual income report. This report is required at this time each year so that a determination can be made as to whether a person continues to be eligible for the disability or death benefit payments.

Required to provide the annual income accounting will be all

veterans receiving disability pension, all widows and children in receipt of death pension benefits, and all parents in receipt of dependency and indemnity compensation following the service-connected deaths of their veteran sons or daughters.

The income report was to have been mailed to all of the VA recipients on November 1, 1983. The completed report must be returned to the Veterans Administration prior to January 1, 1984. Failure to return the report will result in termination of the benefits being paid.

Some of these income report forms will be difficult to complete and many pensioners will require assistance to be sure the cards are properly filled out. All persons needing assistance should contact their local Veterans Service Officer or veterans organization representative. All information entered on the card should be accurate, since most of it is subject to verification by the VA. It must be remembered that the Veterans Administration always verifies

For the hundreds of older workers in the Green Thumb senior employment program, responsibility has been a way of life, an essential part of the traditional work ethic that most older persons accept.

"Working hard is the most important thing in many people's lives," said Green Thumb state director Diane Parrish of Waco. "Yet what most of us don't think about is that we can't work if we aren't healthy, and to be healthy we have to take care of ourselves."

Green Thumb provides part time work in public service agencies for low-income persons 55 and over. Texas Farmers Union sponsors the program, which operates in 108 counties across the state.

Parrish emphasized that it is far better to prevent a disease than to deal with it after it has attacked the body, and in a film produced by the American Occupational Medical Association, the Green Thumbs learned how diet, exercise and good habits can forestall the onset of disease.

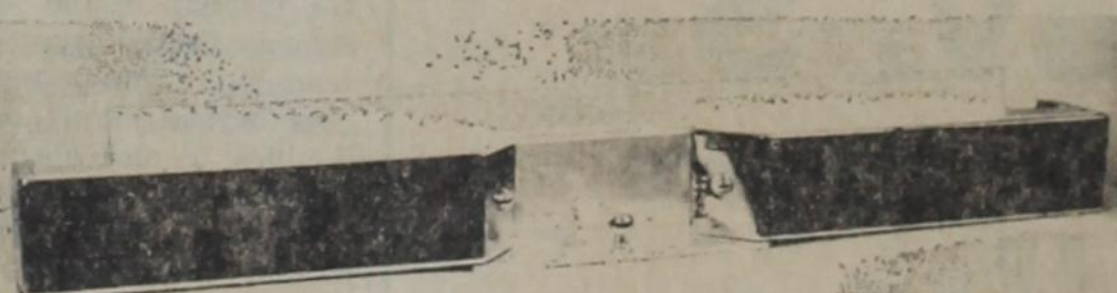

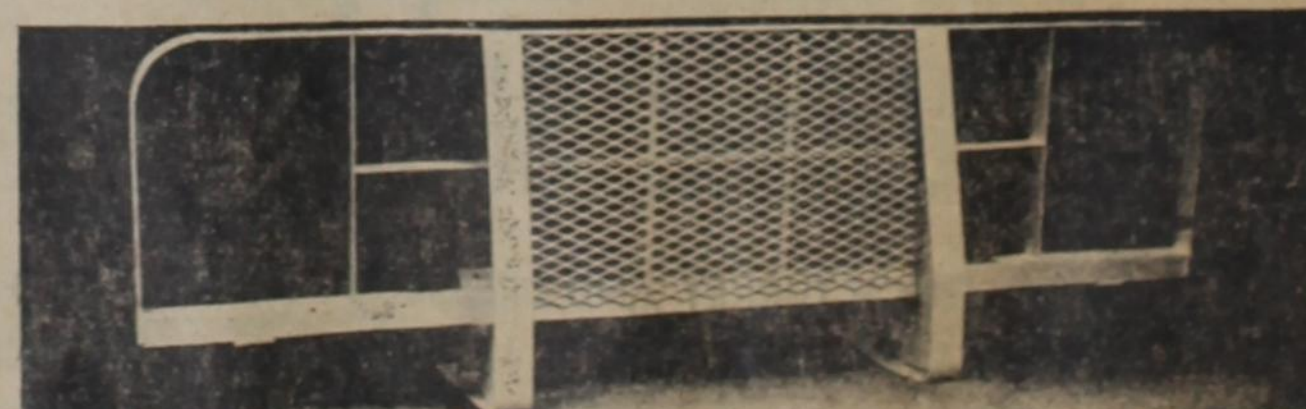

Darden went 18 yards for his first touchdown with 4:24 left in the first period. The tally capped a 70-yard drive in 12 plays. Joe Don Mackey kicked the point after the score.
