However, collections on department store charge accounts are still under 50 per cent of total amount of bills outstanding, while only 17 per cent of installment plan accounts are being paid on time.

DEATH OF VARE ENDS ANCIENT GOP DYNASTY

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 7. — William S. Vare who for nearly a generation held political control of Philadelphia, died today at his Atlantic City residence.

He was one of the last of the old time political bosses who, 30 years ago, controlled various key cities of the nation. He was 66 years old.

Over 450 Attend FFA Encampment at Lake

Registration at the Future Farmers of America tri-district encampment at Lake Cisco had already exceeded expectations at noon today with over 450 in attendance. CAT LIVES 36 HOURS BY USE OF NEW FLUID

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 7.—Slowly taking form behind walls of the University of Tennessee school of medicine here is a fluid which may revolutionize operating surgery and save thousands of lives.
The fluid is artificial blood.
Dr. W. R. Amberson, conductor of the experiments, has kept a cat alive 36 hours with nothing but this synthetic blood in its veins.
Dr. O. W. Hyman, dean of the school, who made the announcement revealing the nature of Dr. Amberson's experiments, said the scientists had been working for three years on the fluid.
Despite the hopes with which all associated with the work here have for "artificial blood," all emphatically declare that it is still in the most experimental of stages and that its use in relation to humans hardly is being mentioned.

none of its own blood in its veins, a full pint of the synthetic mixture was pumped in, while the normal capacity of a cat is only one-quarter of a pint.
Chief stumbling block to Dr. Amberson is the fact that hemoglobin changes to met-hemoglobin because it is outside the cells. Met-hemoglobin will not carry oxygen effectively and the animal dies. When this is conquered, men of medicine here believe it will be feasible to try the artificial blood on humans.

Describe Highways To Link Hemisphere

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 7.—Highways that eventually will link the entire western hemisphere, were described in papers read before the highway and constructed division of the American Society of Engineers convention here.
Details of the Alaska-United States highway, which will stretch for 2,204 miles north of Vancouver, and the Inter-American highway, linking the United States with Central America, and which eventually

will be extended to South America, were given by American engineers.
The proposed Inter-American highway, which will cross seven countries and pass through seven capitals in linking up the United States and Central America, is the longest ever surveyed and planned. It was revealed. It will skirt volcanoes, penetrate jungles and open areas now practically inaccessible.
Roads already in existence will be utilized and, like the Alaska-United States highway, it will, when completed, be of historic, economic and social significance.
The Alaska-United States highway project will be about 2,204 miles long.

Golf Hazards Are Made by Indians

OAK INDIAN RESERVATION, P. Q. Can., Aug. 7.—The Indians are on the war-path again and this time with the third business man golfer as the prey.
After a little sleuthing, Louis Jarguile, head of the Quebec provincial police, has discovered the cause of the great holes which of late have made the Kanawaki golf links here assume the appearance of a shell-marked battlefield from time to time. He has traced the trouble to a band of Mohawks, who, insisting that the palefaces have built a golf course on their century-old pasture land, have gone on the war-path to the extent of boring holes in fairways and greens, creating additional hazards.
The Kanawaki golf course is the only one in the world built on an Indian reservation and a majority of the Indians settled here with the Troquois nation are not only kindly disposed to the invasion of the paleface sportsmen, but actively

welcome them and their caddie fees. American tourists say they find the redmen excellent caddies, challenging the ancient Scots of St. Andrews for taciturnity, and ranking high as eagle-eyed ball hunters.
Despite the holes made by the dissatisfied Mohawks, the course is kept in top-notch playing condition by greenkeepers, who go to work after every foray. It was on this layout that Leo Diegel won the Canadian open championship in 1929, setting the existing record of 274.

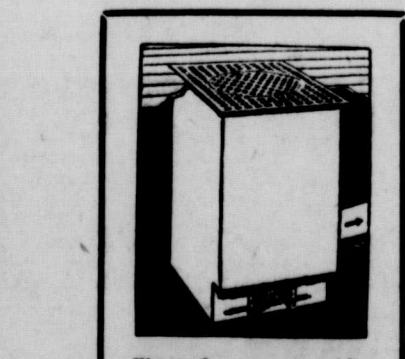

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON.—Both here and in New York, belief in the certainty of inflation seems at this moment stronger than ever.

To the real insiders who know approximately what plums Roosevelt really has in mind, this wave of conviction is just one of those curious phenomena.

They suppose it traces to the fact that industrial production has dropped sharply since July 1 and a resultant feeling that the administration will feel required to give business a shot in the arm.

But the summer decline doesn't mean any such thing to the chart and graph experts among Roosevelt's most trusted economic advisers. They toss it off with a confident smile and direct your attention to the drought, which has upset recovery calculations, but assures higher farm prices—always a strong antidote to pressure for inflation.

The three essential factors in the current drop are: Steel, which produced at 60 per cent of capacity for three months and turned out most of the metal that would have been made this summer except for a previously announced price boost for June 30 and fears of strike.

Textiles, which overproduced and had to curtail 25 per cent for the summer.

Tires, which built up stocks in fear of strikes.

The real big news, however, is the anticipated disappearance of farm surpluses. Drought continues to wipe out excess grain supplies, is cutting down corn, and promises a tremendous wallop at the cotton surplus. A shortage of hay and feed grain looms. There'll be far fewer cattle and less milk

in the fall than anyone expected. Food costs will rise and farmers outside the drought belt are likely to wallow in prosperity. But while increased buying power for those farmers will put factory people to work, losses of drought-stricken farmers will put others out of work.

NEARLY all presidential secretaries enter the lobbying business here sooner or later. Walter H. Newton, one of the famous Hoover secretariat, is expected to be the next recruit.

Wilson's Joe Tumulty has been in the business a long time and last appeared publicly as representing some liquor interests. Unusually recently, at least, Coolidge's Bascom Slomp was one of the most highly paid in the fixers' corps.

Ted Clark, another Coolidge secretary, represents drug interests here and Everett Sanders, another, has been "practicing law" since his White House days except when busy as G. O. P. national chairman.

Hoover's secretaries haven't the same perfect record. George Akerson got a big job with a movie company, but Ted Joslin has gone back to writing. Larry Richey is what might be described as Hoover's personal lobbyist here.

As Hoover rode with Roosevelt from White House to Capitol on inauguration day, he is said to have asked that Newton be given a federal job. So F. D. appointed Newton to the Home Loan Bank Board.

But the promise wasn't for keeps. Newton's term has expired. He wasn't reappointed. Friends expect him to open a Washington "law office."

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ABBE BELIEVES UNIVERSE ONCE COSMIC ATOM

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—A gigantic super-radio-active cosmic atom may have been an original universe. Such a picture is presented in a theory proposed by the famous astronomer and mathematician, Abbe Lemaitre, is carried to its full and logical conclusion.

Billions of years ago, it is quite possible that either all matter was in the form of individual electrons and protons, which progressively evolved into such simple atomic combinations as hydrogen, then helium, and gradually more complex atoms, or as suggested by the noted Abbe Lemaitre, of Belgium, the process might have been quite the opposite.

The Abbe's Theory
Conversely, according to his theory, the first chemical units in the universe might have been very complex and have been disintegrated slowly to form more elementary atomic particles.

Supporting this theory, an observation of some of the present known 93 types of atoms will show that they are disintegrating at a "very, very rapid rate" according to Dr. Merrill, of Carnegie Institution, to form lighter and simpler atoms.

Chemical Unity
Such hypotheses carry the implication that a chemical unity exists between those sections of the universe examined by astronomers. In turn, one might speculatively suggest that the atoms are eternal; that the atoms which constituted the universe in the primeval past are identical with those which compose the universe today.

Cosmic rays, it is believed by some scientists, will provide an answer to this problem. Dr. Robert Millikan suggested that cosmic rays are emitted in connection with the synthesis of atoms in interstellar space.

STONE HALLOWS RITE
CLEVELAND, Aug. 7.—A fragment of stone from St. Giles Cathedral in Edinburgh, Scotland, was deposited beneath the Williamson channel of the Church of the Covenant when the 90th anniversary of the Second Presbyterian church here was celebrated. Miss Elizabeth Dalrymple Gourlay donated the relic, from the church of her childhood.

CLOCK REPAIRED ONCE
ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 7.—Mrs. A. E. Nichols owns a clock that has operated 27 years with a single repairing. She received it in 1907 with a newspaper subscription.

SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

PICKING a melon is as much of a gamble as choosing a husband. You MAY get a good one. If you have a trained ear, the time-honored practice of thumping a watermelon with your knuckles is a reliable test. A full-grown ripe melon has a dull, muffled sound when thumped, while a green one sounds metallic. The ripe melon says "plunk" and the green one says "plink."

If the under-side of the watermelon is a pale yellow, lemon or a warm ivory color with the skin rough, then the melon is ripe. A warm yellowish green rather than a bright clear green on the top indicates ripeness, too. However, the variety of the melon influences the color to some extent.

Thumb Nail Test

There's a thin film-like coating all over the surface of a watermelon. When the thumb nail is drawn across it, this coating will peel off like dry wax if the melon is ripe.

Although mis-shapen melons should be avoided, the natural shape of the fruit is of no importance, round or long melons being equally good.

Large melons are more desirable than small ones, but a small, heavy melon is preferable to a lightweight large one.

Over-ripe melons may be detected by the dull appearance of the rind and the large number of yellow veins showing through the green surface.

keep in mind that the flesh should be a deep pink or a bright red well out to the rind with a lovely silver sheen over it all.

Must Mature on Vines

Regardless of variety, all melons must have plenty of heat before they can reach maturity, so weather conditions throughout the country have much to do with the quality of the fruit. They must mature on the vines and they must be ripe when cut for use. They may ripen after picking without greatly harming the flavor, but full growth must be allowed before harvesting.

Thoroughly chilled watermelon is refreshing for summer meals. Serve as a cocktail with a sherry dressing, in a salad, in a sherbet or a frappe. Since it is chiefly water, it is of little fuel value and adds a minimum of calories to one's diet, though rich in vitamins.
