Rural Communities Put Emergency Red Cross Drive Well Over Quota

Sporenberg Shows Way With \$182.91 In Contributions

Thanks to the residents of the rural communities of Dawson County, this county has attached its goal to the American Red Cross War Emergency drive.

At the latest report Wednesday afternoon, a total of \$3,373.61 had been contributed, or \$173.61 over the goal for this county of \$3,200.

Heading the list of rural communities making donations, was Sporenberg with the sum of \$182.91 donated since the rural drive started two weeks ago. A number of Sporenberg citizens had already contributed, and we know that the first donation of \$100 for the drive was made by a Sporenberg lady. Thus, if all this were added to the total for these rural communities, it would make Lamesas a little ashamed of themselves.

Other community contributions are as follows: Klondike, \$22.87; Union, \$15.05; Shumake, \$19.00; McCarty, \$11.32; Key, \$75.55; Patricia, \$9.75; Welch, \$51.10; Harmony, \$74.73; Woody, \$24.00; Sand, \$12.83; Bartlett, \$68.00; O. K., \$63.70; Acklerly, \$121.57; Hancock, \$58.00; Munger, \$38.13; Fairview, \$32.60; Grandview, \$27.56; and Lou, \$17.00.

Contributions are still coming in to local Red Cross officials, and it was thought that the total will be close to \$3,500 before they are all in.

This fund is separate and apart from the Red Cross Roll Call drive, which ended in November. During that drive another \$1200 was contributed to the organization.

The groups of twelve to fifteen year olds who rallied to the Scout banner during that first year was small. But each year saw more and more boys being touched by the Scout Oath and Law.

The first year a scattered few Scouts—61,495 all told—had the advantages of Scouting. But by 1915 almost a half million boys had enjoyed the great game of Scouting—268,043 were active and a slightly smaller group had "graduated" as it were.

The growth of the Boy Scouts of America has been steady ever since. Each year more boys came within influence of Scouting. Naturally boys joined the ever increasing

County Attorney Warns Livestock Owners About Disposal Of Diseased Stock

The penal laws of the State of Texas provide that it shall be the duty of any person owning, controlling or caring for any live stock which die with any of the following contagious or infectious diseases, or any person that owns or controls the land upon which said livestock die from the said following diseases, to-wit: Tuberculosis, anthrax, glanders, infectious abortion, hemorrhagic septicemia, HOG CHOLERA, Malta fever, foot and mouth disease, rabies, and other similar and dissimilar contagious and infectious diseases, recognized as such by the Veterinary profession, to bury the carcass of said animal, by digging a grave not less than five feet deep, placing the carcass therein, covering it with lime and then filling the grave with dirt; or to burn the said carcass with fire, until it is thoroughly consumed.

The penalty for the violation of such laws is a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, for each of such animals. There has been some hog dying from Cholera and other infectious and contagious diseases in Dawson County, and some of the owners have been careless enough to fail to properly dispose of the carcass of

such animals, thereby aiding in the spread of the diseases. Birds are carriers of such diseases, and many of them feed upon the carcasses of dead animals.

If you have been guilty in the past, please do not do so in the future as you may be wiping out the savings of your neighbors. You are also guilty of spreading the disease among animals that furnish much of the food for our armies. Some people might call it sabotage, as there is no question but what Mr. Hitler and his satellites would prefer to see all our live stock die from disease.

For your protection and the protection of others, please abide by this law. Violators will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law in every court possible, and for every offense possible.

It is a violation of both Federal and State laws to tear down or mutilate mail boxes and such crime carries as penalty a Federal punishment as well as State.

Please abide by our laws. We would hate to see any of our citizens prosecuted for such vandalism, but such will be done unless these violators heed this warning.

WAR FLASHES!!!

(By The Associated Press)

SINGAPORE, Feb. 5 (AP) — Despite continuous bombing and strafing by Japanese airmen, Singapore's artillery has blasted enemy observation posts, knocked out opposing batteries and spread destruction in the transport of Japanese troops into jump-points for invasion of this island stronghold.

That the Japanese still have not won complete mastery of the air was demonstrated this morning by Hurricane fighters of the RAF which intercepted a large formation over Singapore, shot down one Japanese plane, probably another, and damaged a third.

Civilian casualties from the past two days of blasting and machine-gunning strafing by the Japanese air force numbered the 300 mark—228 injured and 63 killed. The people had virtually no safe places of refuge from bombs. Officially, however, these casualties were called comparatively light.

LONDON, Feb. 5 (AP) — The admiral asserted today that several Italian submarines had "paid the ultimate penalty" after having been sent to help the Germans' submarine campaign in the Atlantic.

BANDONG, Java, Feb. 5 (AP) — Morale in outlying Dutch army posts remains high despite frequent Japanese bombing attacks, Netherlands Indies army headquarters announced today.

Members Of Methodist Church Raise Money To Clear Building Of All Debt

At a meeting, Monday night, of members of the First Methodist Church, the campaign which has been underway for some weeks was brought to a final consummation when the last dollar was provided for the payment of the entire indebtedness of \$10,500. Mr. Hatch, who has directed the campaign from the beginning, presided at the Monday night meeting, and when it was announced that sufficient money had been provided in cash and pledges to lift the debt, there was enthusiastic applause, and many tears of joy upon the faces of the people.

Since 1928, when the beautiful new Methodist Church was completed, at a cost of approximately \$70,000, the congregation has labored under the burden of an indebtedness. Many of the people present Monday night had seen the beginning of the enterprise. They had experienced the struggles of the congregation through the depression years, as they carried the tremendous debt. It was therefore no great surprise to see tears upon their faces when it was announced that the debt had been lifted.

In 1938, under the ministry of Rev. T. C. Willett, the indebtedness was reduced from \$25,000 to \$15,000. Since that time the debt has been reduced to \$10,500, which is the final balance being liquidated in this drive. As soon as the few remaining pledges are paid, the notes will be paid, and announcement will be made concerning an appropriate celebration of this very joyous achievement.

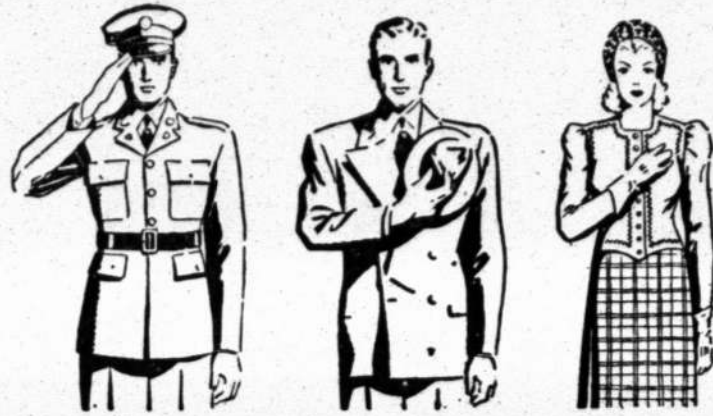

Every Patriotic American Salutes His Nation's Flag



During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag, or when the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention and salute.

Those present in uniform should render the right hand salute.

Those men not in uniform should remove their headress

with the right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart.

Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart.

The salute to the flag in a moving column is rendered as the flag approaches the spectator and is held until it has passed.

There Is A Job For All In This Nation's War Efforts

This is the job. To mold our entire country into a single weapon of attack, as the separate fingers of the hand unite to form a clenched fist. And now, under the new War Production Board, we are really hammering at that job.

WPB's chairman, Donald M. Nelson, intends that every ounce of material not required for absolutely essential civilian needs, be used in production of war materiel. Every production machine and every qualified plant that can be spared from civilian production and can be converted to military use shall work for war.

That's going to bring this struggle to the home front as it hasn't been brought before. As time goes on, it's going to test the mettle of everyone of us — in one way or another.

For some while now, the war has been indicated that the American consumer faces increasing deprivation. Must be prepared for increasing sacrifice, and last week was no exception.

Fear Breeds Hoarding
All of this underlines the fact that the civilian in this fight for democracy must practice two soldierly virtues: He must be cheerful and unafraid.

What the President said about fear, that "the only thing we have to fear, is fear itself," is particularly true on the consumer front.

Hoarding is fear—operating in the sphere of the consumer. You can't beat shortages by hoarding. Hoarding, where potential sacrifices exist, simply hastens the day of rationing—and hoarding may actually create artificial shortages of goods of commodities that actually are plentiful. We are going to ration sugar because of the tremendous quantities

required for the production of alcohol used in making explosives, and for other military purposes. With sugar, as with spices, we may not be getting quantity because the Japanese stand against our Far Eastern trade routes. We certainly can get along with less pepper, if we have to.

There Is Food Aplenty

The point is that, fundamentally, we have plenty of food. Even under the most unlikely conditions, our standard of nutrition still will seem extravagantly high to the Japanese, with his 35 handfuls of rice each month, or to the German living on a diet of potatoes and ersatz. But suppose some people, motivated by unreasoning fear, begin to hoard staple commodities. If enough people were moved by the contagion of example and do likewise and retire great quantities of staples to what amounts to storage, there are the rudiments of a serious situation. Prices pyramid in response to suddenly stimulated demand. The time comes when retailers' stocks really are depleted, when ware houses and processing plants stagger under a rush of orders, when the whole economy of food supply is upset.

The OPA received reports that at least one grocery distributor has been encouraging hoarding in handbills given to housewives with their purchases at the store. Any one urging housewives to stock "emergency pantry shelves" at this time is seeking temporary profit at the expense of truth, and is doing himself and his fellow citizens and his country a disservice. Don't have any of it! Buy your food stuffs as you need them. Be prepared to make adjustments if and when they become necessary. There'll be plenty to eat for everyone.

Just the opposite from that type of grocery distributor, other grocers voluntarily discourage overbuying by their customers. An example is sugar. A large system of stores instructed its sales people to limit amounts sold to customers in accordance with those customers' normal purchases.

But, regardless of whether it is sugar or some other commodity, the rule is good: Keep your head, and don't be afraid!

Even The Birds Are Joining The U. S. Army

Even birds are joining Uncle Sam's Army, and believe it or not, the Game Department revealed today, they'll play a big part in winning the war.

There's no joke about this. The species referred to is the Antwerp Messenger Pigeon, commonly called the carrier pigeon.

In the Army Signal Corps they have what is known as a Pigeon Service, and one of the eight base lofts in the United States is located in Texas to serve the Army Eighth Corps Area.

The Legislature last year passed a law making it illegal to kill or maim or molest any of these carrier pigeons in Texas. Game wardens, months ago, were instructed to enforce this law diligently and all other peace officers have the right to enforce it.

To date, the Game Department has no record of a single violation, but the Department today warned sportsmen to be on the alert and never take a shot at these birds. It may be bearing an important message.

The question then bobs up "How can I identify a carrier pigeon?" That's about as tough as the identification of ducks by inexperienced (or experienced) waterfowl hunters who are supposed to leave some of the species alone.

The carrier pigeon closely resembles the common domestic pigeon you see every day around town. Their coloration varies, just as does the coloration of the domestic pigeon. So, you won't get any help at all there.

But they are a little smaller than the domestic pigeon, and more stream lined built, say, like mourning doves. The carriers are larger than mourning doves, however.

Since carrier pigeons are thus virtually indistinguishable from domestic pigeons, the best thing to do in order to stay within the law and help out the Army would seem to be to just let all pigeons alone. Don't kill any of them.

As for the carrier pigeons joining Uncle Sam's Army, that's no joke, either. Most people don't know it, but, the Game Department said, there are over 300 civilian lofts of these birds in 10 Texas cities, and each of these lofts has been registered for auxiliary service at the request of the War Department. They're "in the Army now."

Most other kinds of birds are helping out in this war, too, for that matter. What would we eat if it were not for the birds? Without them we could grow no crops, because insects would destroy them in the fields. The birds, by feasting on insects, make it possible for us to grow most of our food. It is roughly estimated that the birds of Texas are worth \$84,000,000 annually to Texas agriculture.

So birds, and wildlife generally, are doing their part, just like air raid wardens and other workers among us human beings.

Farmers Asked To Save Burlap And Baling Wire

Burlap and baling wire are the latest additions to the materials which farmers are being asked to use sparingly.

Imports of burlap from India have been drastically curtailed by the war. B. F. Vance, chairman of the Texas USDA War Board, pointed out in urging Texas farmers to make every possible effort to extend the life of their burlap sacks. Two-thirds of the burlap still being imported is being taken by the Government for military purposes.

Vance urged farmers to refrain from ripping their burlap sacks when opening them, to use no hooks, and to hang the sacks in dry, protected places for later use.

As for the baling wire situation, Vance declared that farmers could make a direct contribution to the war effort and protect themselves from possible shortages by using the wire as sparingly as possible. U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates

indicate that farmers will need between 90,000 and 100,000 tons of the wire for baling hay, straw, and other forage crops in 1942. The steel shortage makes it imperative that farmers draw upon products made from steel as little as possible.

FARMERS URGED TO "ROUND UP" SCRAP IRON

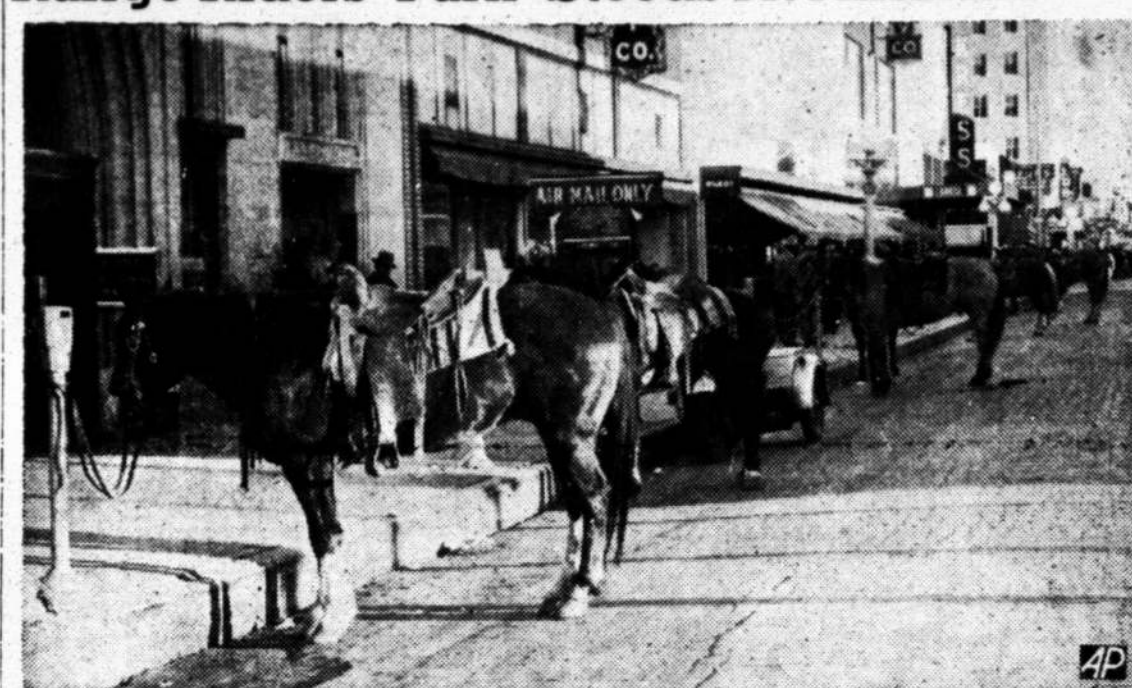

Farm Income Tax Returns Present Many Problems

Many farmers will be liable for filing income tax returns and payment of tax for the first time this year. The term "farmers" includes livestock raisers, fruit and truck growers, and operators of plantations and ranches.

Farmers may maintain their records and file their returns of income on either the cash receipts and disbursements basis or on the accrual basis of accounting. A consistent method must, however, be employed. If a cash basis is used, Form 1040F, "Schedule of Farm Income and Expenses," is required to be filled out and filed in conjunction with Form 1040.

Deductions from gross income may be made by farmers as necessary expenses, all amounts expended (other than those constituting capital expenditures) in carrying on the business of farming. Deductions for expenses include such items as cost of feeding and raising livestock, (except the value of farm produce grown upon the farm and the labor of the taxpayer); cost of seed, minor repairs to farm buildings (other than the dwelling of the farmer); small tools used up in the course of a year or two; fuel and oil used for farm work; repairs and maintenance of farm machinery; hired laborers and hired machines, and cost of commercial fertilizers the benefit of which is of short duration.

The cost of farm machinery, equipment, and farm buildings; amounts expended in the development of farms, orchards, and ranches, as well as the amounts expended in the restoration of soil fertility preparatory to actual production of crops and the cost of liming soil to increase productivity over a period of years, are capital expenditures.

Losses incurred in the operation of farms as business enterprises are

deductible from gross income. If livestock has been purchased for any purpose, and afterwards dies from disease, exposure or injury, or is killed by order of the authorities of a State or the United States, the actual purchase price of such livestock, less any depreciation allowable as a deduction in respect of such perished livestock, may be deducted as a loss if the loss is not compensated for by insurance.

If gross income is ascertained by the use of inventories, no deduction can be taken separately for livestock or products lost during the year.

Government To Issue Special "Sugar Stamps"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (AP) — Special "sugar stamps" to be issued by the government to registered consumers, will be required before purchases can be made under the pending sugar rationing program. It was learned today.

Each stamp will permit an individual to buy 12 ounces of sugar — his weekly ration.

A spokesman for the office of price administration disclosed that booklets containing enough stamps to last three months or more would be printed and that the time required for the printing would delay operation of the rationing machinery for at least another month.

It was reported that the plan contemplates registration of consumers by families, with stamp booklets to be issued to each member of the family regardless of age. However, no more than one stamp per person may be used each week. This would allow a family of three, for example, a weekly ration of 36 ounces of sugar.

Whether a bill is picked or not, it's just another method Texas farmers are using to get their financial house in good shape, the AAA official said.

Premiums for insurance are due at approximately ginning time and may be paid for in cash, cash equivalent, loss payments, if any are made, cotton loans, if available, or from AAA checks.

Farmers who need cash to start cotton crops can use their insurance contracts as collateral because 50 or 75 per cent normal yield is already on the dotted line. Scale added.

Insurance Takes Guess Out Of Cotton Farming

The guess has been taken out of cotton farming this year, according to Frank B. Seale, state AAA committeeman and Robertson County cotton farmer.

"Heretofore, we've planted cotton and hoped to see it through to harvest, but with insurance it'll be a different story this year," Seale said in pointing out that Federal Crop Insurance protects the potential crop against insect infection, flood, drought, storm and all other unavoidable hazards.

Insurance does not mean that farmers can plant cotton, let the grass and weeds take it, and sit back and wait to collect, the committeeman said, since insurance does not protect crops against losses caused from poor farming practices, or uses of inferior seeds.

Landlords, tenants and sharecroppers having an interest in a 1942 cotton crop may insure either 50 or 75 per cent of their average production. Each interest may be insured independently of the other, the committeeman said. Amounts of premiums will vary since they are based on actual risks of growing cotton on individual farms.

Inaugurates New
War ProgramFor ten years "Reveille" at the
Agricultural and Mechanical Col-
lege has been the black mongrel
dog that is mascot of the crack
210-piece Texas Aggie band. And
for 66 years a sleep-eyed bugler
has blown the call that starts the
day at Aggie-land.But on Monday morning, Janu-
ary 26, 1942 at 6:25 a. m. when
the clarion notes of "You Can't
Get 'Em Up, You Can't Get 'Em
Up," came from the megaphone bu-
gle that stands in the middle of
the 4500 acre Texas A. and M.
College campus, 5000 Texas Aggies
went on a strict war-time basis.Aggie-land is stream lined for
speed and action. Strict military
discipline prevails. The school is
on a 12-months basis for classwork
and military education. In two
years and eight months a freshman
student has the opportunity of
completing a full four-year college
course, and at the same time qual-
ifying for a commission in the Of-
ficers Reserve Corps.The first semester of the new
speed up program began with first
call on week days at 6:15 a. m.
Three minutes after reveille, the
cadet corps assembles for a 10-min-
ute period of brisk calisthenics. At
6:43 a. m. the bugler blows "fatigue
call," and every man on the cam-
pus has just 17 minutes to ready
his quarters, and his person for in-
spection.Upperclassmen make their own
beds, sweep their own rooms, stand
in line to receive their own laundry,
in other words freshmen perform

quate when the immediate purpose
of every red-blooded American is

Oil Industry Of Texas Mobilizes For War Effort

The Texas oil industry was mobilizing today for any war-time emergency.

A state-wide organization to meet defense needs and effect co-ordination with civilian defense authorities was being set up under leadership of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association. Co-operative in it are oil operators and companies, field superintendents and farm bosses, and petroleum engineers and technical experts. The work is being done with the approval of civilian defense officials.

First oil area to be organized is the Texas Gulf Coast, with East Texas next and others to follow soon. George Sawtelle, association president said. Local field committees in the producing areas will work closely with civilian defense authorities to co-ordinate oil industry defense measures with all other defense activities.

"The function of the Texas Mid-Continent in this program is to assist the operators in meeting the requirements of defense precautions," Mr. Sawtelle explained. Through our state-wide organization and plan we hope to take the work off the backs of the oil producers and effect co-ordinated action in all the fields of the State.

"Technical committees of the industry are developing the safest methods for effective blackouts, and studying ways to eliminate hazards and extra expense without interfering with production operations. The association will assemble this information from technical groups, oil operators and civilian defense authorities and keep the field committees advised."

The organization now being set up will extend from the operators down to the individual leases, to make complete and efficient working facilities available to civilian defense officials. The facilities in each area can be put into operation by the chairman of the field committee upon authorization by the proper defense authorities.

"The program has been planned to cause the least possible interruption of necessary industry activity," Mr. Sawtelle said. "Unity of action is highly essential, and as far as our industry is concerned, can be accomplished only through this character of organized effort. We know that every operator will co-operate to the fullest in meeting the demands of civilian defense."

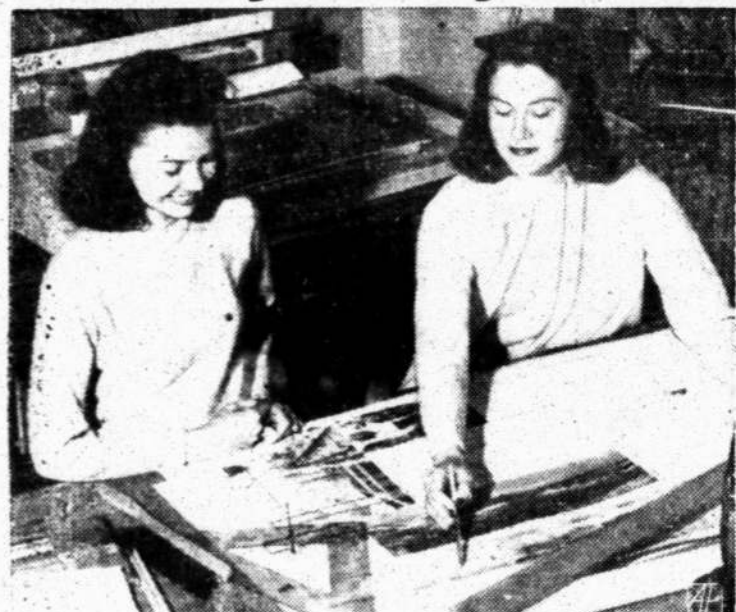

Can Join Navy Then Finish School Year

High school and college students between the ages of 17 and 20 may now enlist in the naval service and finish the current term of school unless the military situation necessitates the Navy Department calling them to active duty, recruiting officers at Big Spring announced today.

Navy recruiting is expected to continue on a strictly volunteer basis and many students may volunteer immediately under this order without fear of losing scholastic credits for the current year by enlisting in Class V-1 of the Naval Reserve. Navy recruiting officials said.

Enlistment for immediate active duty are also being accepted in the regular Navy and other classes of the Naval Reserve. Age limits are from 17 to 36 for unskilled men, and to 50 for skilled men. The Navy is now operating 72 trade schools in which thousands of recruits are being trained to become highly skilled mechanics.

ones. The decrease was among the smaller operators. The average capacity of all the silos in 1940 was 116 tons. The average capacity in 1941 was 137 tons.

"The decline in number does not mean that farmers think less of silos. The shortage was a result of weather and labor conditions," Eudaly says.

Excessive rain in the spring and early summer prevented many farmers in the eastern half of the state from making feed crops. And excessive fall rains in the western part, plus a reported labor shortage, in some cases, hampered many farmers in harvesting their feed, and in others in filling silos.

Eudaly says there is an increase in the number of trench silos in Texas, Cameron, Coke, Crosby, Dawson, Concho, Cochran, Floyd, Guadalupe, Hale, Haskell, Hockley, Lynn, Martin Wharton and Wilson counties in 1941. Twenty seven counties showed a decrease and the remainder was practically unchanged.

Quantity Of Silage On Texas Farms Shows Increase

There was a slight decline in the number of trench silos filled on Texas farms in 1941 compared with the 1940 total. But, says E. R. Eudaly, dairyman of the A. and M. College Extension Service, there was an increase of 828,613 in the tonnage put into the containers over that of the preceding year.

According to Eudaly, 40,000 silos had been filled on January 1, 1941, but on January 1, 1942, the number stood at 38,054. In quantity, however, the story is different. During 1940, Texas farmers put up 4,384,785 tons of silage, but in 1941, the tonnage reached 5,213,398. The specialist attributes this to the fact that large operators not only re-filled existing silos, but dug new

Defense Courses To Be Taught At WTSC, Canyon

Equipment valued at more than \$200,000, some of it placed by the Federal Government, will be used by the departments of industrial arts in defense courses at West Texas State College in the spring semester opening February 2.

Courses will carry regular college credit and regularly enrolled students will pay no extra fees. Out-of-college men and women may take the courses for a fee of \$7.50 for each class. Some courses are planned to be of specific use in the military services and others for work in defense plants.

The classes will include welding, internal combustion engines, radio,

sheet metal, blue-print and map reading, mechanical drawing, bench work, printing, advanced mill-work, and carpentry. Most subjects will be taught by Prof. John Gillis and Prof. Holmes Smith, but special instructors will be used in other courses.

Most of these classes have been underway for a month. Night classes are available in some instances.

In the course on engines, studies will include power plants of automobiles, tractors, stationary engines and air planes. Laboratory work will include tearing down, assembling, and testing various engines.

In radio, elementary principles will be studied and codes will be learned. There will be some repair and testing.

A course in photography will be taught by the instructor in journalism. This will include classwork, field trips, and laboratory experience. Half a dozen shops are available for these courses.

Notes Offered For Help In Increased Taxes

To make it easier for tax-payers to meet the increased taxes required by the National Defense Program, the Treasury Department is offering for sale two series of notes, both dated August 1, 1941, and maturing August 1, 1943.

In January of each year two new series will be provided so that the tax-payer can always purchase notes during the entire year in which he is receiving his income for use in payment of taxes due the following year. The reason for the two-year note is to permit a tax-payer, if he so desires, to begin saving in January of one year and continue through that year to save for his taxes due the following year.

All notes are sold at par and accrued interest. When presented in payment of income taxes they will be received at par and accrued interest up to and including the month in which such taxes are paid. Interest will not accrue beyond the maturity of the notes.

Month In Lifeboat

Workers Cannot Get Statements From S. S. Board

Workers cannot secure statements from the Social Security Board, showing wages as reported by their employers for the purpose of filing income tax returns, according to Robert M. Mayne, manager of the Social Security Board field office in Big Spring, Texas.

Many requests were received for such information at this time last year and numerous requests are being received now. Wages reported for 1941 are now being posted to the individual employee accounts by the Social Security Board, but the job will not be completed until July of this year. Since income tax returns must be filed with the Bureau of Internal Revenue before March 16, the wage records of the Social Security Board will not be available for use in preparing the tax returns.

"Every wage earner is urged to make a periodic check-up of his old-age and survivors insurance account to make sure that wages have been properly reported," Mayne said. "There are now approximately 60,000,000 employee accounts, and the job of posting the wages reported by employers to each worker's account is done by automatic book-keeping machines, but the processing of so many accounts cannot be completed before the dead-line for filing income tax returns."

The Social Security Board has a post card form for use in requesting a statement of wages reported. Persons desiring to check their wage accounts for accuracy can secure a request form by writing to, or calling at, the field office at 206 Petroleum Building, Big Spring, Texas. "Statements being mailed now cover the period from January 1, 1937, to July 1, 1941," Mayne explained.

President's Birthday Parties Reported To Be Financially Successful Tuesday Night

That the President's Birthday Celebration in Lamesa was a complete success, is shown in the financial statement released by Dan Y. Davis, County Chairman, Thursday morning.

Mr. Davis reports that 330 tickets were sold at \$1.00 each, and that donations were received amounting to \$13.57, which gave gross receipts for the celebration at \$423.57.

Expenses amounted to \$75.00 and the Federal amusement tax came to \$33.00 on the 330 tickets sold. This leaves a net profit for the enterprise of \$315.57, which according to all available records is approximately three times as much as has ever been raised for this purpose in this county at any one time before.

Half of the net profits or \$157.78 will be sent to the National Founda-

tion for the prevention of infantile paralysis, while the other half remains in the county to be used in the fight against this dread disease.

J. D. Dyer Jr., Enters Naval Training Unit

Uncle Sam's Navy gained fifty more prospective officers this week as that many University of Texas students signed up for Naval R. O. T. C. training.

The additional fifty were accepted by the unit in view of the National Emergency, the previous quota for trainees having been only 100 a year. The two year old unit now has over 200 men in training.

Work for the new "plebes" will include six hours a week of classroom in Naval science as well as the customary drill three times a week. The cadets are allowed to finish four years' work in the University, at which time they are eligible for commissions as Ensigns. Training includes at least one summer cruise.

The Naval R. O. T. C. unit boasts a drum and bugle corps and a rifle team participating in inter-collegiate matches. Rifle practice is, of course, a part of the general training. One R. O. T. C. cadet, Rom Rhome, has received an appointment to the Naval Academy at Annapolis.

Included in the latest group of cadets was J. D. Dyer, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Dyer, of Lamesa.

Tunney In Dallas February 13-14

Lieutenant Commander Gene Tunney will be in the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station, at Dallas, Feb. 13 and 14 to interview applicants for Physical Instructors in the U. S. Naval Reserve. The Officer in Charge of the Dallas office said today. He will be in the Station from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. and it will not be necessary to make appointments.

Qualifications necessary to obtain interview with Lieutenant Commander Tunney and for enlistment as a Physical Instructor are: be a male citizen of the United States, be between the ages of 21 and 33 years, hold degree in Physical Education from approved college or university, and have in possession at time of interview a transcript of college record, a small recent photograph of self and a birth certificate.

In general, the applicants who are unmarried will be given preference over those who are married. Those accepted are listed as Chief Petty Officers for duty as Physical Instructors and will be sent where needed and will be released from active duty after the war as soon as their services can be spared. Pay begins at \$99.00 per month, plus lodging, board, medical and dental attention, first uniform and an additional \$1.15 a day for those that have dependents.

Negro Churches To Present Play "Pearly Gates"

An all-colored cast of fifty voices, featuring Negro spirituals and folk songs, will be given Monday, February 9, in the Lamesa High School Auditorium, by the local Negro Churches, under the direction of A. E. Washington, El Centro, Calif.

This is an original and graphic production with a high moral theme, in that it points out the spiritual and material progress of things high and noble in life. It is based on the idea made popular by John Bunyan in his "Pilgrim's Progress," in that it depicts the trials and the tribulations of Pilgrims on their way to Heaven, dramatizing these trials by the personal appearance of a realistic "Red Devil."

The production sprang from the soul of a primitive people, and is Negro folk music at its best, and in the proper setting — the setting of religion because it is inspired by religious enthusiasm. It is a sacred production, a genuine spiritual offering to the Lord, who demands perfection. The most popular of these songs was arranged and put into one harmonious whole, such as would interest and reverence. You will see the upward strivings of a primitive race of people, telling in the depth the tale of their sufferings.

The great charm of the pageant lay in its simplicity, accentuated through repetition and the twin medium of music and pantomime.

earlier by the sun than you are now to catch up with the clock and get your kids to school on time.

Many of the large agencies of the nation such as bus lines, railroads, mail service, communications, etc., are to observe the time change, and the Lamesa School Board realizes that parents will desire school time observation to be in accord with the general practice. So until the business firms of Lamesa can get together on their official opening and closing hours, the Board held that they would observe the new official time.

A number of Lamesa business firms are to follow the new arrangement, and set their schedules by the clock. That is to say will keep the same hours such as opening at eight and closing at six o'clock. Others report that they are going to open at nine o'clock under the new time, and close at seven.

The United States governmental agencies such as the post office, will observe the new time schedules. While no agreement had been reached by the banks, and other such establishments, it was thought that they would conform with the general practice.

But regardless of whether you go by the clock or the sun, you'll have to set your watch or clock up an hour before you go to bed Sunday night in order to wake up at the right time, for if you stay with the clock it means an hour earlier by the sun although the time will be the same as it is now, and if you go by the sun, it will be an hour later by the clock, although the same time by the sun as you are getting up now.

One local commander in a small village on the west coast of Borneo wired that his troops were as spirited as "red peppers" despite the fact that a fire set by Japanese raiders had forced them to evacuate the village.

MOSCOW, Feb. 5 (AP) — Soviet guerrilla detachments today were reported to be creating wholesale panic behind the German lines as the Nazi armies sought to throw up fortifications and attempted counter attacks in many sectors of the front.

On the main battle front, meanwhile, today's Soviet communiqué announced recapture of five localities in the Kalinin area, with 5,300 of the defending Germans slain or wounded, and the seizure of six other populated places on the central front.

In this zone the red army apparently was pushing westward on the road to Smolensk in the teeth of snow and ice and bitter Nazi resistance.

RANGOON, Burma, Feb. 5 (AP) — The British officially acknowledged today that Japanese patrols had crossed the lower Salween river at a number of points since the invaders occupied Moulmein last Saturday.

All men of the above age bracket must register, regardless of whether or not they are citizens of the United States. So regardless of color, nationality, or race, if you are between the ages of 20-44, inclusive, you must register.

Any man now living in this county but whose home is in some other place may register in this county, and give their home address. Their card will be mailed to their home county or state and they will belong to the local board they give as their home.

It is requested that all employers see that their employees get to a place to register, which in this county will be the courthouse. All Mexican and other foreign speaking people should bring an interpreter with them when possible.
