TRACT FOR NEW BRIDGE BEAVER TO BE LET IN JANUARY; WILL SHORTEN ROUTE

Work of improving U. S. Highway No. 33 from Liberal south is progressing steadily. The grading work completed from Liberal to Turpin, Oklahoma, only a few miles remaining to be put in. The new route of the highway leaves the old route at the Burris Wright bridge south of Second street, a mile southeast a distance of about 10 miles to the A. D. Jones farm, then runs straight south to a point 2 1/2 miles south of Turpin. It angles southeast for a distance of a mile and then turns a mile east of the old highway.

Going straight south four miles it will angle five miles south, crossing the Beaver river at a point two miles east and three miles south of the present Boyd crossing. At that point that the new bridge is to be constructed and the road-way for this angle is now being secured. This bridge is to be a long one and is to cost around \$50,000. The contract will be let in the first of the year.

The five mile angle the highway runs straight south to Gray, Oklahoma, then one mile east and then to the Texas line, connecting the pavement leading in to Texas. —Liberal News.

ROGERS RETURNS TO LEGISLATURE

STATE REPRESENTATIVE ROGERS INVITES HELP AND SUGGESTIONS FROM CONSTITUENTS

B. L. Rogers, Farnsworth, representative in the Texas Legislature from the 124th district, left Wednesday for Austin, where he expects to put in about two weeks hard work in research and conference before the regular session convenes in January. He can be reached there by letter at Capitol Station, Austin, Texas. Solon Rogers made the following statement to this paper just before he left for the capitol.

"More than ever before, do I feel the weight of responsibility of the position the voters have made mine, and as stated many times before, I feel the need of all the help and suggestions that I can have and invite all who will to write me from time to time, especially concerning matters that may be foremost in the news columns from day to day."

"It was thought, at the time, that the 43rd Legislature which convened two years ago, was confronted with about the heaviest load of hard problems for many years, but as I see it, the job is no less now, and perhaps even greater."

"Perhaps I should say that in asking the people to let me hear from them, I can hardly expect to reply personally to all letters. To do so, would take too much time which I would need for the work there. Perhaps, on occasion, I may use the columns of your paper to send for wholesale as it were, a reply to letters received, or to invite specific comment or opinion."

"If I may be pardoned, I suggest you get and read 'The Open Door At Home', by Charles A. Beard; Macmillan. It came to my attention and I bought it last month. Today, in a copyrighted story in a large eastern daily, I read: 'Two recent studies are being used by the authorities, one by Charles Warren, originally published in 'Foreign Affairs', and the other by Charles A. Beard in his new book, 'The Open Door At Home'. This latter volume, observant reporters have seen, has been seen persistently and alone on President Roosevelt's desk. He has been obviously studying it with some care; few books are ever thus honored. This is the third book of Beard's I have, the others being 'Whither Mankind' and 'The Rise of American Civilization'. These were published in '29 and '30.'"

TEXAS CENTENNIAL HALF DOLLARS ON SALE HERE

The first shipment of the Texas Centennial half-dollars was received in Perryton Friday by the Perryton National Bank. A large part of the lot received by this bank has already been sold. Through an unavoidable error, the coins ordered by the First National were delayed in shipment; however they expect to receive 300 coins this week end. By a special act of Congress, 1,500,000 of these one-half dollars have been minted. They are sold for one dollar each, the fifty-cent profit on each coin sale going into the fund for the purpose of building a \$750,000 state historical museum on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin. The building of this museum will be the Texas Legion's permanent contribution to the Texas Centennial celebration program.

International Sunday School Lesson

By A. C. Williams, Minister Perryton Church Of Christ

VICTORIOUS FAITH

Lesson 13—Dec. 30, 1934

Lesson Text: I John 5:1-12

Memory Verse: I John 5:4

"And this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith."
I. Faith: Its Grand Object (5:1)
Men and women are not called upon to believe a system of theories and speculations. They are asked to believe Jesus Christ, the Son of God. In no age of the world has there arisen a Character so worthy of our confidence. Predicted by the prophets in the long ago, typified in symbols of the Jewish age, and heralded by the forerunner, John, Christ made his advent into the world of men. He did not come with pomp and display of earthly kings, but wrapped in swaddling clothes, pillowed in Mary, worshipped by ruddy shepherders, the Christ was destined to live for our example, die for our ransom, be resurrected for a pledge of our immortality and ascend to heaven to be crowned at God's own right hand.

To have faith in God therefore, we must "believe that he is and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him" (Heb. 11: 6). Jesus has merited our confidence by freely dying for our transgressions. As High Priest, he now stands ready to make intercession for all who come to him in obedient faith.

II. Faith: Its Great Test (5: 2, 3)

Faith that is real and living, works by love. The test of love is obedience. "For this is the love of God that we keep his commandments". Saving faith in Christ requires humble obedience. There is no case in New Testament conversions where a man's faith saved him until that faith became obedient to the terms of pardon. The jailor at Philippi, was told by the apostle Paul that if he would believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, he would be saved and his house. But what did it mean to believe on the Lord Jesus Christ? We learn that Paul and Silas "preached unto him the word of the Lord". The jailor, obedient to that word took them the same hour of the night, and washed their stripes, and was baptized he and his household. Thus repentance and baptism were a part of the faith necessary to save these people. Thus "we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand" (Rom. 5: 2).

III. Faith's Victory (I John 5:4)

Faith is a muscular word. It teams with action. It longs for battle. It senses the atmosphere of conflict. It signs no truces. It compromises not with evil. Faith looks most beautiful when in uniform. It stands for something. It does not battle for sake of conflict but for sake of truth. It "speaks the truth in love" (Eph. 4: 15). Though it wounds, it heals. The probing instrument of truth is not an enemy's dagger, but the surgeon-knife of the Great Physician.

Faith is victorious over time. Though each year adds feebleness to the physical body, faith has bathed herself in the fountain of youth. Years do not make her grow old. The nearer she gets to the setting of lifes sun, the more vigorous her foot steps.

Faith does not evade temptation, she masters it. She strives to overcome Satan above us, the world around us, and selfishness within us. She feeds upon the word of God, enriching her fibre by the nuggets of testimony found therein.

Faith is victorious over the world. Not the world of flowers, seas and stars, not the universe of God's virgin handiwork, but over the corruption of the Evil One. But hers is a constructive victory. Amidst the wreck and ruins of broken

hearts, broken homes, broken hopes, she moves with a healing majesty that administers the Balm of Gilead. She removes ugly ash heaps and plants in their places beautiful flowers. Hearts who have been ready to given up in despair, have taken a new hold on life. Despisers of law have been transformed into respectable citizens. Immoral characters have been rescued from the gutter and filthy garments of sin have been exchanged for spotless robes of righteousness.

IV. Faith: Her Resources (5:6-12)

And why is faith so rich? If we examine the sunshine she inhales; if we notice how deeply her roots have penetrated into the rich truths of God's word, we can answer. Like the water supply of a great city that feeds from a lake high in the mountains, like the thousands of electric lights that feed from the power of the mighty Niagara Falls, faith extends her hungry hands into heaven's storehouse of testimony and gospel evidence and receives that she might give.

The Spirit, water and blood agree in one. Faith does not seek to separate them. For what God has joined together, no man should put asunder. We cannot separate the Spirit from the word for the Spirit inspired the word. We must not separate the water from the blood, for the same Lord who shed his blood to cleanse us commanded that we be baptized (Mark 16: 16) for the remission of sins (Acts 2: 38).

So faith, humbly embracing the great facts of Christ's death, burial, and resurrection, renders obedience to his commands (Heb. 5: 9) and possesses the threefold witness found in heaven and earth that she walks in harmony with the will of the Redeemer.

1. All products should be entered by 9:30 A. M. Monday, March 11, 1935. It takes times to judge and arrange an exhibit attractively, hence promptness in making entries will be appreciated.

2. This contest is open to all members of Home Dem. Clubs, members of girls 4-H Clubs, and other individuals.

3. All products exhibited by members of Home Dem. Clubs should carry the Texas Home Demonstration Pantry Label, except demonstrators whose products have been standardized for market. They should carry the Texas Better 4-H Products label. Products from individuals who are not members of a Home Demonstration Club should be labeled.

4. Each can must be labeled with name of product, name of owner and name of county.

5. An individual entry consists of 3 cans of any one product listed below, canned by the same person. One can will be opened for judging, the other two will be placed in the County exhibit and returned to the owner.

6. No one will be permitted to make more than one entry of an individual product. But an exhibitor may make an entry, in each of the products listed.

7. One can of first and second prize winners will be reserved by the department.

8. Team demonstration judging time not to exceed 15 minutes.

AUTO AND OIL TRADES GIVE MANY TEXANS JOBS

Washington, D. C. — Automotive petroleum, and other trades connected with highway transportation provide jobs and wages for one out of every five persons employed in wholesale, retail, and service trades in the State of Texas.

This statement, based on recently completed Census Bureau figures for the year 1933, was made here today by the National Highway Users Conference.

Among other things, the Conference analysis shows:

Out of a total of 93,719 wholesale, retail, and service establishments that operated in 1933 in Texas, 23,300, or approximately one-fourth were wholly dependent on motor transport.

Of the total payroll of \$172,089,000 for all wholesale, retail and service trades, \$38,344,000 or 22.3 per cent, accrued from automotive, petroleum, and allied trades.

The total volume of sales for all wholesale, retail and service trades in the state amounted to \$2,119,310,000, of which \$366,701,000 represented purchases by motor vehicle owners of all classes.

In proportion to the total volume of sales by all trades, the trades catering to highway transportation provided more jobs and a higher standard of wages, accounting for 21.7 per cent of jobs and 22.3 per cent of payroll, as compared with 17.3 per cent of sales.

"These figures," said Roy F. Britton, Director of the National Highway Users Conference, "enable us for the first time to get a clear and accurate conception of the contribution of the highway transportation industries to the economic welfare of the state."

"Except for the continued needs of the motoring public, every fourth business house or service establishment in Texas would close; every fifth person employed in the wholesale, retail, or service trades would lose his job; and more than one-fifth of the business payroll of the state would dry up instantly."

"There is every reason to believe that with equitable operating conditions, particularly as regards taxation and regulation, the automotive trades group will contribute even

more to the prosperity of the state in the years immediately ahead."

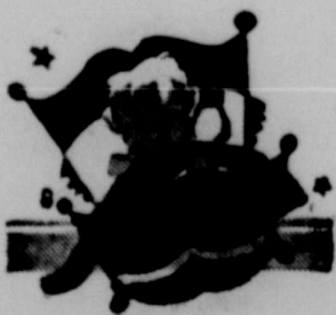

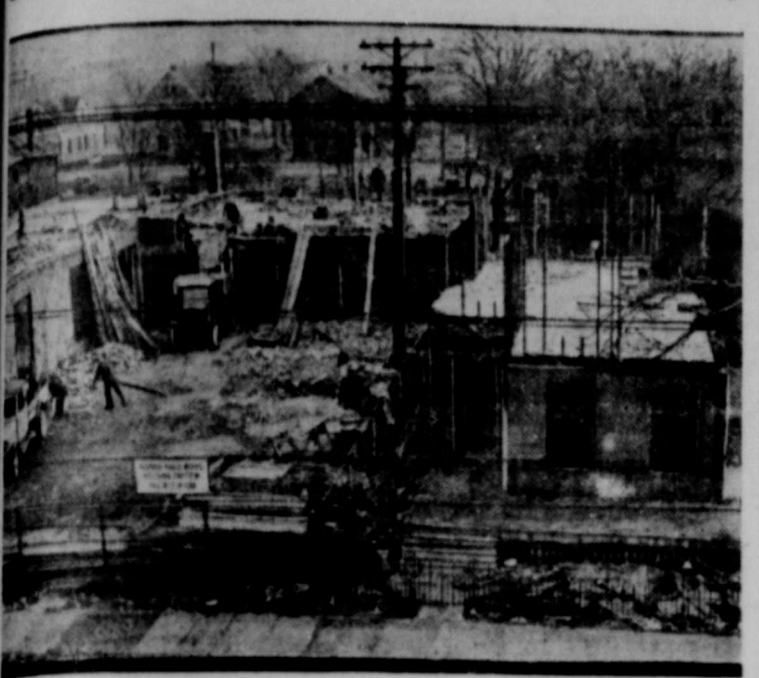
