### Cotton Co-op Society To Hold Meeting Here Next Monday

## FIGHT TO BE WAGED ON RAISE IN FREIGHT RATE

### COMMITTEES NAMED; MEET NEXT WEEK

Important in the breaking of news this week is the announcement of increase in freight rate on cotton from South Plains towns. As this announcement came the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce with its proper committees entered protest and attended a committee meeting at Lubbock Tuesday afternoon. J. H. Harp, Chairman of Transportation, W. W. Evans Chairman of Industrial, J. E. Barron representing banking interests, and Wm. A. Wilson, manager of the local chamber of commerce attended the meeting.

The Interstate Commerce Commission in a ruling handed down the 11th of May this year granted increase rates on cotton shipments from one and one half cents to six and one half cents. At Lamesa the new rate has been increased four and one half cents which makes the new rate 98c instead of 93 1/2c as heretofore. This means, taking for granted that Dawson County produces 50,000 bales this season the producers of cotton will have to pay to the railway company about \$12,500 more than they have been paying to move cotton out from this station.

At the Lubbock meeting an organization known as the South Plains Freight Rate Association was formed with the prime motive of fighting these new rates. Arthur P. Dugan of Littlefield was chosen as president and A. B. Davis of Lubbock was elected as secretary. The following are directors in the new organization: M. A. McLaughlin Ralls, Glenn A. Smith Plainview, R. M. Kendrick Brownfield, H. B. Adams Lockney, and W. W. Evans Lamesa.

The purpose of this newly formed association will be to employ an expert freight rate attorney and to study the new tariffs that affect the whole country.

Another meeting will be held shortly.

### J. A. Sumpter, Lamesa Pioneer, Passes Away

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 3:30 in the Methodist Church for J. A. Sumpter long time resident of Lamesa and well known here. Mr. Sumpter died last Saturday morning in Wilcox, Okla. where he was visiting. He was ill before he made the trip. At the time of his death he was 77 years old, which occurred on his wedding anniversary. He had been married 49 years.

He leaves six children to mourn his passing: James, Ruby and Mrs. Ware of Lamesa, and Mrs. Effie Clinton and Earl and Love Sumpter all of Garbansville, Okla. Russell Hobbs of Garbansville, Okla.

He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church and a member of the Woodman of the World Lodge here. Interment was in the Lamesa Cemetery.

His passing is mourned by those who knew him and the Courier joins friends of the family with sympathy.

Earth tremors that rocked Central and West Texas were felt in Dawson County early Sunday morning. The tremor was only slight causing little or no damage but causing considerable alarm.

The tremble which lasted for possibly fifteen seconds shook windows and rattled doors. Most people upon feeling the tremors thought that there was either someone in the house or under the beds.

The quake the first to be recorded in this part of the state for over twenty five years was felt as far east as Taylor, Texas and as far west as Alpine and the Big Bend country, and as far south as Austin and San Antonio.

Another slight tremor was felt Tuesday afternoon about 1:15.

The big county wide Red Cross canning event at the West Texas Gas Co. Garage started promptly on time Monday morning at 8:30. Eight hundred cans of corn, beans, peas, squash were canned and each succeeding day the groups of communities filed in with trucks and cars loaded with surplus food to be saved for possible needy families this winter. The systematic order in which the work proceeded is due to the cooperation of the various organizations working each day under the direction of the county agent, W. W. Evans and Home Demonstrator, Miss Rozelle McKenney. The County Council of Home Demonstration Clubs sponsoring the humanitarian service. The local chapter of the American Red Cross headed by Judge Phillip Yonge and the committeemen and committeewomen worked daily.

The American Legion which is headed by a working force with Clyde Backenstoss as leader assisted by Bland Taylor, Allen G. Barnard, J. H. Harp and E. Anderson turned in some effective work during the canning week.

Twenty steam pressure cookers were busy during the day cooking the surplus food. The garage was a veritable beehive during the week and Dawson County vegetables were piled high on the tables while truck loads were outside awaiting to be unloaded. Men and women from the different communities spent the day shelling peas, cutting corn, or doing anything that came along proving that the generosity of Dawson County folks is something to be proud of.

"Like Bob Murray, the new general manager of the Texas Cotton Cooperative Association," Mr. Forrest declares, "I think the present need is for business men to understand our farm problems and what farm owned and farm controlled cooperatives are trying to do."

"The 48,000 cotton farmers of Texas who are members of this association," so Bob Murray told a gathering of farmers and business men in Lubbock recently, "0,000 bales of cotton to their association have delivered approximately 60."

The gas rates for Lamesa this winter will be reduced approximately 15 per cent, after the first six thousand cubic feet have been consumed by domestic and commercial customers, according to an announcement made by R. F. Hinchey, vice president and general manager of the West Texas Gas Co.

This reduction offers a saving of 10 per cent per thousand cubic feet over the present rate, beyond the 6,000 cubic feet mark, and is made possible by the adoption of a winter heating rate schedule. The new rates become effective from and after, the October 1931 meter readings, and will prevail up to, and including, the March 1932 meter readings.

"This is the most substantial rate reduction the West Texas Gas Company has been able to offer its customers in Lamesa," Mr. Hinchey declares, "and will effect savings for the great majority of our customers during the part of the year when they need and use the most gas."

"During the months of November, December, January, February, and March, which are covered by the winter heating rate schedule our Lamesa domestic and commercial users burn approximately 70 per cent of their entire year's consumption of natural gas."

Under the present rate schedule the domestic consumer's rate is 67 1/2 cents per thousand cubic feet for the first fifty thousand cubic feet. All over 50,000 cubic feet is 50 cents per thousand. The minimum bill is \$1.50.

The new winter heating rate will be 67 1/2 cents per thousand for the first 6,000 cubic feet. The next 44,000 cubic feet will be at the rate of 57 1/2 cents per thousand, a reduction of 10 cents per thousand cubic feet. All over 50,000 cubic feet will be 40 cents per thousand, a reduction of 10 cents per thousand cubic feet. The minimum bill is \$1.50.

Mr. Hinchey also announces that the winter heating rate schedule will give Lamesa schools a classification under the industrial rate, which is the lowest rate of the company. At present we are included in the commercial classification.

## High School Entrance Exams Will Be Given

To comply with the regulation of the High School Division of the State Department of Education regarding admission of pupils from unaffiliated schools. Examinations will be given for all pupils, who have not yet passed college entrance examinations or the examinations given by the local high school in June, on August 31 and September 1, 1931, at the high school building at 8:30 a. m.

Pupils entering the eleventh grade are required to have passed these examinations before admission.

The subjects for the examinations are American Literature, Algebra, American History, Biology, Home Economics, Plane Geometry Spanish, Civics, Economics and Arithmetic or such of these subjects that the candidate has studied in his home school.

Pupils will need in addition to grades as indicated above, their last report cards, book cards, and vaccination certificates for enrollment.

The Lamesa Schools open on September 7th, and class work will begin immediately.

elation the past season. This season we will have a million bales. "There is no reasonable excuse under high heaven," Mr. Murray continued, "for five cent cotton. We can't maintain our highways, our schools, our churches, our governments on cotton that sells for as low as a nickel. Unless the cotton farmer of the South Plains has money in his pocket, there will not be any business in the South Plains."

C. A. Barron, of Lamesa, vice president of the Texas Cotton Cooperative Association, will be a principal speaker at the Lamesa meeting Monday afternoon, as will also Earl J. Davis, Lubbock County director of the association. Bob Murray may be present as effort is being made to secure him, according to Mr. Forrest. "It seems to me," says Mr. Forrest, "that the only hope left for the cotton farmer is for him to take charge of his own business and operate it, and I know, with Bob Murray as their general manager, the Texas association will be a great business institution operated for the growers of cotton."

Lamesa will this year again have a branch office of the Cotton association, with a federally licensed classifier in charge. Dawson county has a total membership of more than 600 in the association and last season made delivery of some 6,000 bales.
