WOMEN AS JURORS

Woman's right to do service on jury should not be denied. They have as much right as a man to serve on a jury. If this right was denied, our juries would be neither better nor worse. Just as in elections, women voting in elections would improve in elections. Actual statistics are no better or worse than when women were not allowed to vote. It is only a woman's equal rights with men is the principle involved.

Jury service is craved by few women. Very few women are situated to serve on a jury. Physical peculiarities unfit for regular jury service. Women have babies. Babies need constant care. The mother can't be on juries and care for her at the same time, but that does not mean that she does not have the right to serve if she is otherwise busy with the things of her sex. She pays taxes the same as men.

Women can't have babies and other peculiarities to women. Therefore, they ought to be satisfied to let their men go free of jury service. But they have her rights to serve on sex peculiarities does not qualify her.—Uncle Bill

Currie Dam Nearing Completion

Currie's big dam across Creek about a mile Southeast of his ranch home is rapidly nearing completion. The dam ties a ridge on the north side of creek and stretches Southward the valley toward the hills a distance of 2400 feet into a spillway. It is not intended that water shall flow over the dam any point. After the lake fills, water will flow around the dam the spillway. The dam is a chain of earth. Water is being bed on the earth as it is laid in by four huge dump trucks. When completed, it will be one of the largest artificial lakes in West Texas. When the Spring and summer rains come, the lake will be full and then it will be kept full by pumping from huge wells on its margin.

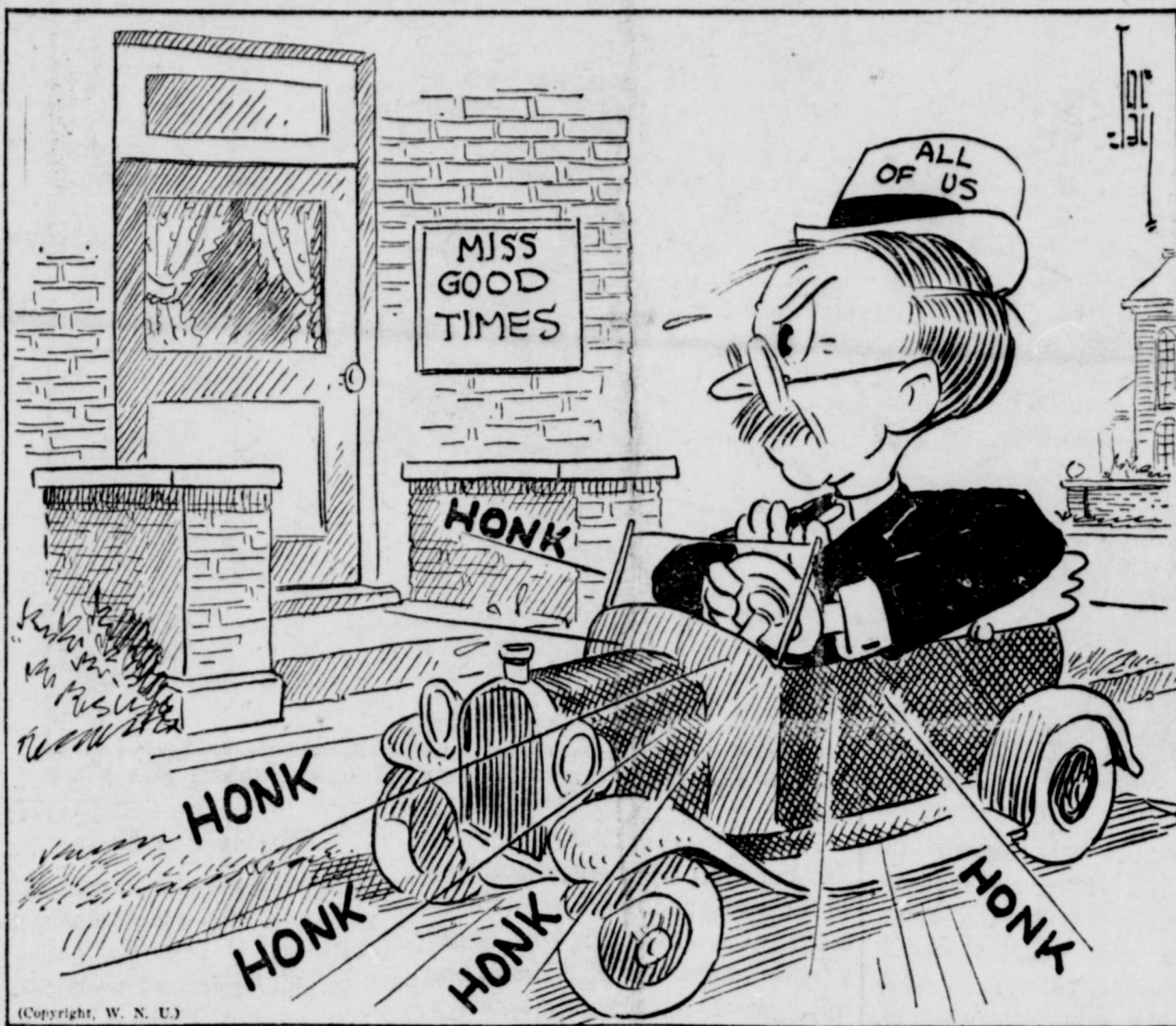

Youngest 4-H Boy Gives His Club Even Chance for the Davis Cup

Ross Foster Exhibits Champion Calf

Jack Durham, 10, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Durham and a member of the 4 H Club, exhibited the grand champion fat lamb, thereby winning the right to have his name engraved on the J. T. Davis loving cup, and giving his club an even chance of becoming permanent possessor, three consecutive wins being necessary for permanent ownership. George Mills of the F. F. A., took possession of the cup last year, the first time that it was put up.

Three and a half dollars first prize money will jingle in Durham's pockets, and made-to-measure pair of \$30 cowboy boots will be added, a gift of the Chesney Boot Shop. His grand champion lamb was one from his father's, W. W. Durham, flock.

Ross Foster, 14 son of Mr. Mrs. Rufus W. Foster, and a high school freshman member of the F. F. A., captured the W. N. Reed loving cup award and a cash prize of \$10 when his dry-lot calf, bred by R. W. and T. F. Foster, was judged the grand champion of the Sterling County Fat Stock Show here Saturday. The cup will become the permanent possession of the club which wins it three years in succession. This is the first year that it has been offered. Jack Mitchell, 4-H Club exhibited the reserve champion calf from the herds of W. N. and L. R. Reed.

R. D. Garrett, a high school junior, and an F.F.A. member, collected \$5 for his champion pen of three lambs from the Robert Foster flock. The prizes reduced one dollar as each placing was made. Jimmy Mack Matbis, 4 H, won second money with a pen of three from the Roy Foster ranch. Colbert Littlefield, 3rd, with Claud Collins lambs.

Neal J. Reed, 4 H, won fourth place with lambs from the J. C. and N. H. Reed flock. Fifth place was won by Junior Blackburn, 4 H, with Bade Brothers lambs.

In the light weight (under 800 pounds) division of the dry-lot fat calves, Jack Mitchell, 4 H Club, exhibited the champion, a W. N. and L. R. Reed animal. His prize was \$10.

Second prize of \$8 in this event went to Bubba Foster, F.F.A. with a Lester Foster calf. Claud Broome F.F.A. received \$6 with his third place calf, one from the Broome Estate. Fourth prize, \$4, went to Loyd Sharp, F.F.A., who exhibited a W. N. and L. R. Reed calf. Woodrow Mills 4-H Club, took fifth money, \$2, with a Chat Reynolds calf.

Champion of the Rambouillet ram division was shown by Claud Broome, 4-H Club. It was a Broome Estate ram and brought a \$3 award. Second and third places were taken by Ira Lee Langford, F.F.A.

The first prize, \$3, in the registered Delaine ram lamb class was taken by Jim Bob Clark, F. F. A. George Mills, F. F. A., took second and third money.

Three registered Delaine ewe lambs were shown by Woodrow Mills, 4 H Club president.

In a class of Rambouillet ewes which was restricted to 4 H Club youths, Ross Foster scored first place, adding \$3 more to his winnings. Another that he exhibited was judged third best, second prize going to Claud Broome with a Broome Estate ewe.

Other than first winner in the heavyweight dry-lot fat calves winners were: Jack Mitchell, second, with a W. N. and L. R. Reed calf, \$8; Fred Mitchell, another 4 H Club boy, took third prize of \$4. Fourth place money of \$4 went to Fred Curry of the F.F.A. Fifth place, \$2, was awarded to Earl Smith, 4-H Club.

Winners in the fat lamb division were: Jack Durham, 4 H; C. J. Copeland, Jr., F.F.A., second; Sam Augustine, president of the F.F.A., chapter, third; Junior Blackburn, 4-H fourth; George Mills, the defending champion and a member of the F.F.A. fifth; Colbert Littlefield, 4-H, sixth; Neal J. Reed, 4-H, seventh; Junior Blackburn, 4-H, eighth; Richard Abernathy, F.F.A., ninth; and Neal J. Reed, 4-H, tenth.

The show was judged by R. M. Mihollin, soil conservationist, San Angelo.

Two hundred and twenty-five dollars were given in prize money solicited by a Lions Club committee.

The 4-H Club and F.F.A. Chapter were each \$10 richer as a result of donations from W. V. Smith who presented the money in behalf of the San Angelo Medical and Surgical Clinic.

Thirty-five good will trippers from San Angelo attended the show and extended an official invitation for exhibitors of fat stock to bring their animals to the San Angelo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo, March 3, 4, 5, 6. All of the animals shown here will be entered there.

Mitzi Broome, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Broome, attired in four-leaf clover bedecked dress, attended the show as official "sweetheart" of the 4 H Club. Phyllis Bowen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Bowen, wearing cowboy regalia, represented F.F.A. Chapter as "sweetheart."

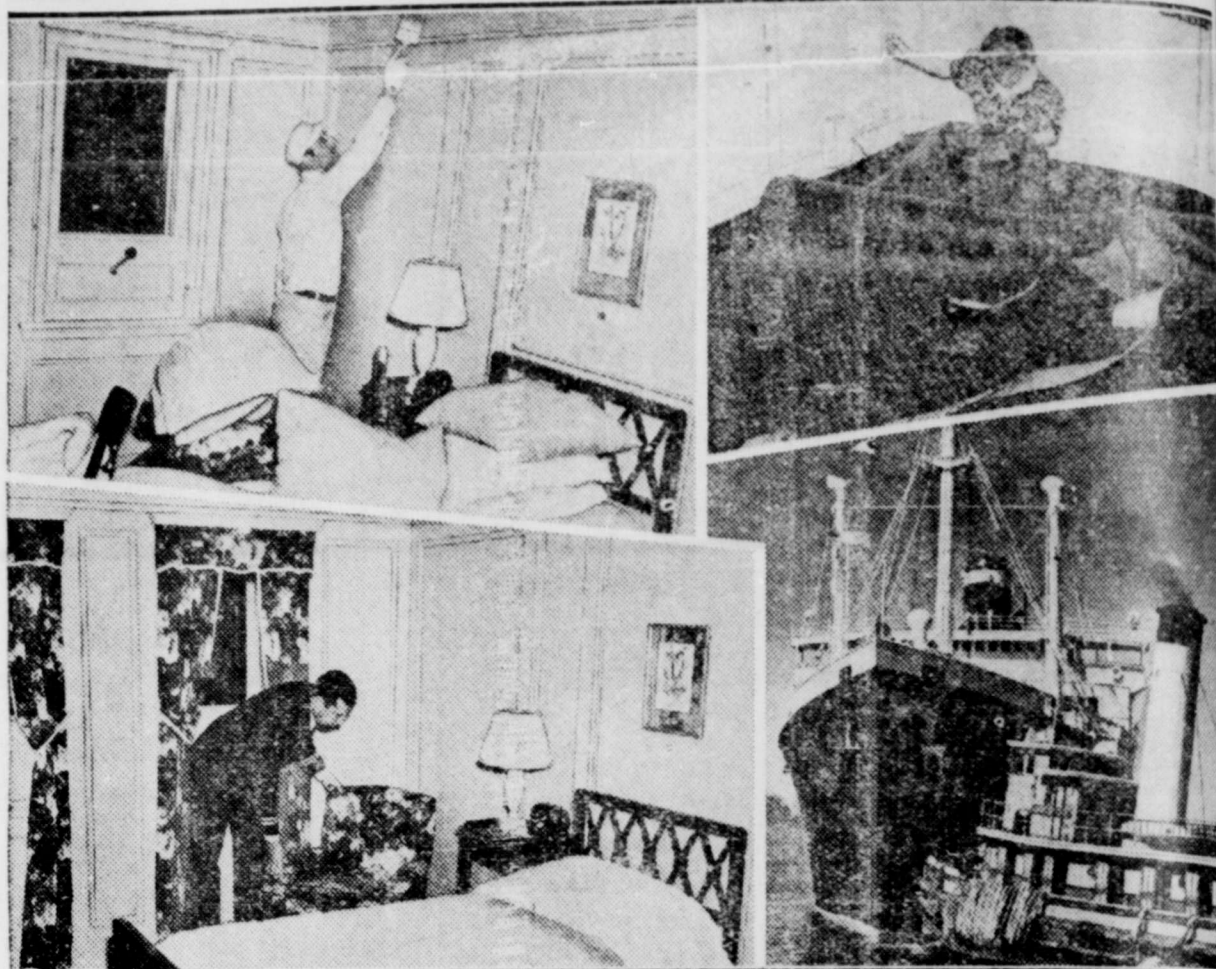

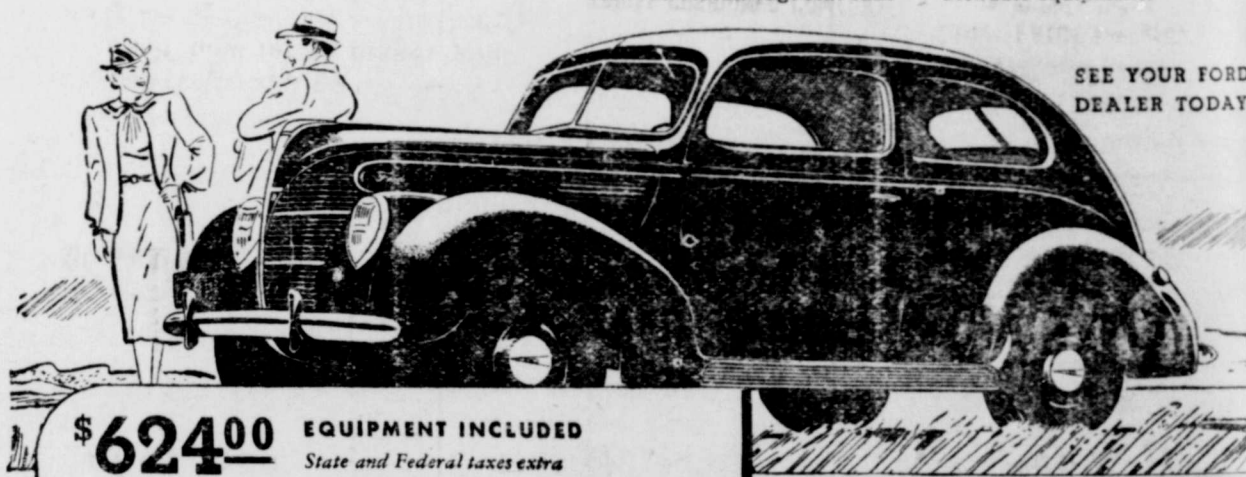
