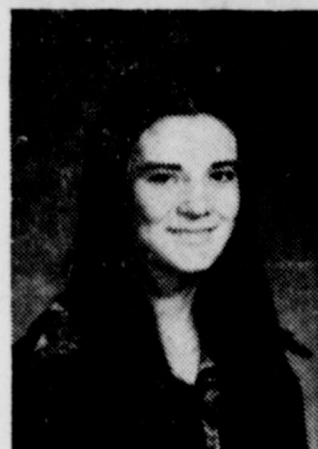

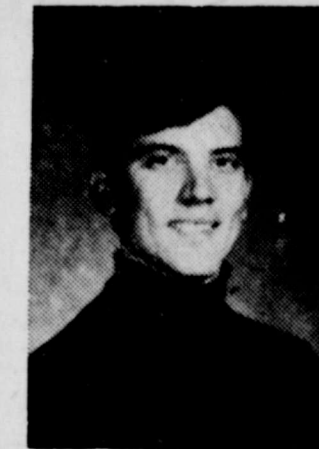

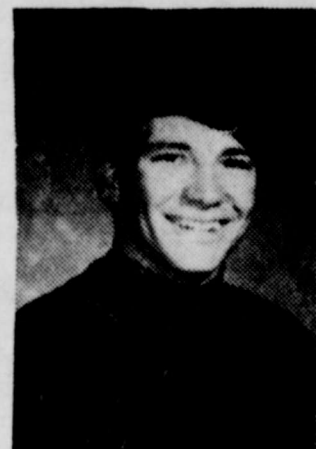

Write-ins Win Two Spots

Two write-in candidates took the two positions on the Robert Lee School board of trustees in an election held here last Saturday. Dr. Phillip C. Ray polled 151 votes and Joe R. Ash polled 136 to gain the

two places on the board.

The three candidates on the ballot were D. J. Walker Jr. and Foy Askins, incumbents, and Ben Bessent. Bessent received 123 votes, Askins 102 and Walker 70. W. H. Allen and Billy Wayne Roe each received one write-in vote. A total of 306 ballots were cast.

Incumbent George Newby was re-elected as Precinct 1 county school trustee with 186 votes. Horace Scott received one write-in vote. One hundred eighty-eight voted.

A total of 245 voted in the election to name two directors to the board of West Coke County Hospital District. Joe Ash led the ticket with 143 votes and incumbent W. E. Jacoby received 143 votes.

Other candidates were Derwood Mumford with 102 votes and Maurice Yarbrough with 94. Dr. Phil Ray received one write-in vote.

In the city election, the three candidates seeking the three vacancies on the City Council were elect-

ed, with Hank Baker getting 133 votes, Allen Clendennen 131 and Lewis Heuvel 126. Receiving write-in votes were Dale Wojtek with 8 and Frank Hearn 6 (both incumbents who did not seek re-election); and Terry Bryan and Douglas Robertson 2 each. Receiving 1 write-in vote for the alderman jobs were Bill Allen, Billy Wayne Roe, Joe Ash, Jim Herford, Ronnie Ruff, Maurice Yarbrough and Lucille Bryan.

Several Persons Tried In Coke County Court

Recent sessions of Coke County Court presided over by Judge W. W. Thetford have resulted in jail sentences and fines.

Bobby Large has been charged with burglary, but was released on bond.

Alamo Theatre to Have Last Show Saturday

An era of Coke County history will come to an end this month when the county's two theatres close. The Alamo in Robert Lee will close after the show Saturday, April 12, and the Texas in Bronte will close one week later on April 19.

Steer Band Going After Sweepstakes

The Robert Lee High School Steer Band will compete in the University Interscholastic League Region II Concert and Sightreading Contest to be held next Tuesday at Cooper High School in Abilene.

The band will play three selections, including: "Sodermanland" March by James Playhar; "Prelude and Fughetta" by G. F. Handel; and "Welsh Folk Suite" by Albert Davis.

The Robert Lee Band is the only Class A band in Region II that is qualified for Sweepstakes honors this year. The musicians are trying to win their third consecutive Sweepstakes award.

The Alamo Theatre was built in almost 40 years ago. It started and has continued to be a partnership 1935 and opened Oct. 15 of that year, of Otto, Victor and Frank Wojtek.

The trio opened the Texas Theatre in Bronte approximately one year later on Nov. 16, 1936. It was first located in an old store building where the WTU office in Bronte is now located. The brothers built the present Texas building in 1948 and 1949.

A skating rink was added at Robert Lee a few years later. It was open regularly, drawing skaters from all over the county for several years, then open part time for awhile. It has been closed the last few years except for special parties.

The Alamo Theatre property has been sold to David Key who plans to move his feed store into the building after he does some remodeling.

Victor Wojtek said this week that they have enjoyed being in the show business and serving the public the past 40 years. The partners issued their thanks to all their customers and friends for their loyal support during this time.

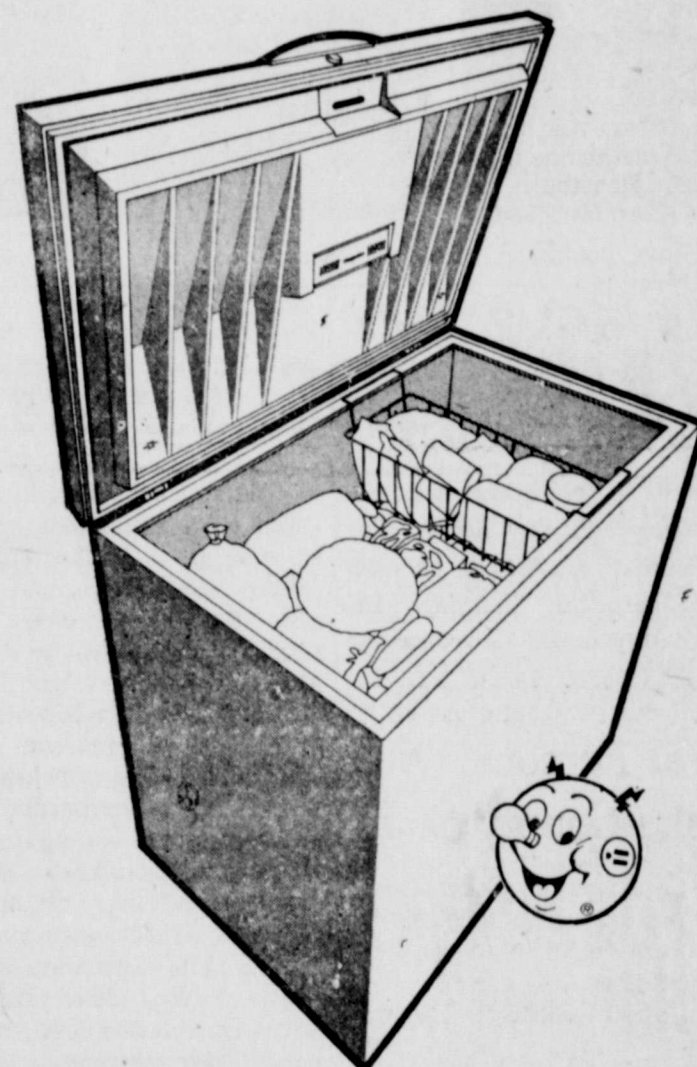

Several people reported seeing the funnel cloud as it passed over Robert Lee. A light shower of rain fell during the stormy weather.

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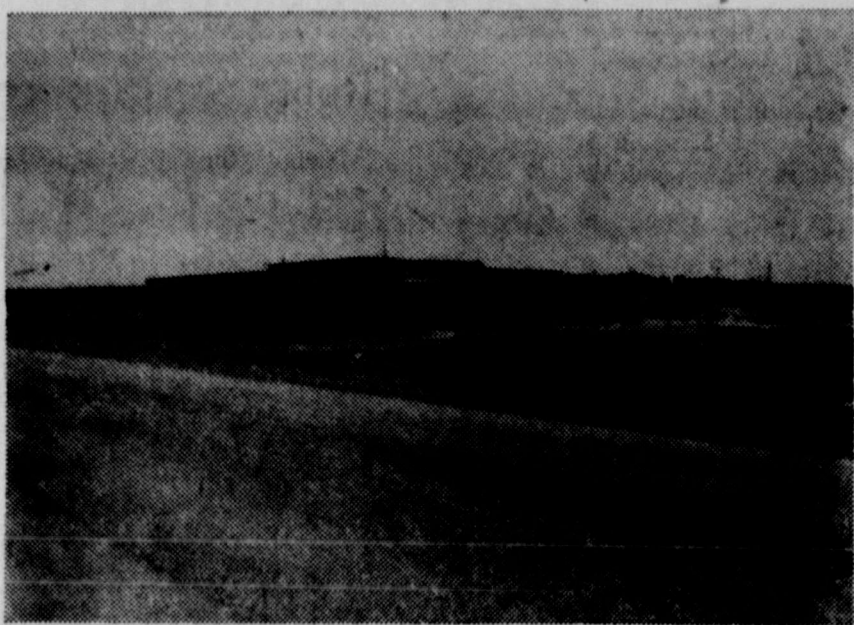

Campana Petroleum Co. and Mamm Rankin of Midland will drill their No. 3-A Harris Estate-Sadie as a 1,650 foot southwest offset to the Strawn opener and 1,200 feet south of the Canyon opener of the Willmo Sandy field. The spot is about eight miles south of Silver.

The location was spotted 2,530 feet from the north and 467 feet from the east lines of Winfield Scott Survey No. 12. Plans call for testing to 6,500 feet.

The Strawn opener, No. 1 Harris Estate-Sadie was completed Oct. 29, 1973, for 155 barrels of 42.5 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 900-1. Production was through a 12-64 inch choke and perforations at 6,325-327 feet.

The Canyon opener, No. 2-A Harris Estate-Sadie, was finished May 1, 1974, for 75 barrels of 48 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 22,786-1, through a 16-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,584-572 feet.

Both openers were drilled by the same operators as the newly started offset.

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Report Made on Bicentennial Plans

(Second in a series of reports on progress of the Robert Lee Bicentennial Community and written by Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, Chairman, Coke County Historical Survey Committee and General Chairman of Heritage 1776-1976 Projects for the Bicentennial observances in Robert Lee.)

Plans developed by The American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas include projects listed under three general classifications: (1) "Heritage 1776-1976;" (2) "Festival USA" and (3) "Horizons '76."

This report concerns what has been done by the "Heritage" Committees.

The Heritage projects planned for Robert Lee's Bicentennial Community include the establishing and developing: (1) A Historical Museum, (2) a Public Library, (3) Collecting and Transcribing Oral History of Early Settlers, (4) Constructing and Furnishing a "Replica of a Pioneer Dugout" and (5) Publishing Jessie Newton Yarbrough's "History of Coke County."

Projects one, two, three and five are well underway and making good progress. Walls and ceilings of the downstairs rooms of the old Coke County Jail, center for these projects, have been painted, floors have been covered with commercial grade carpet, and plans are in the making for improving and landscaping the grounds.

The Museum committee has several display cabinets installed and is ready to assemble artifacts that have been collected for several years.

The Coke County Library has made the most progress of all the Heritage projects. It is looking like a library and is almost ready to begin serving the reading public.

The Oral History project was begun two years ago, but many more tapes and transcriptions are needed. Three members of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee compose this subcommittee. Help from others who have tape recorders is needed and requested.

The "History of Coke County" is nearly ready for the publishers. The author has recently added two chapters to her original history, but needs more biographies, family histories and pictures of Coke County pioneers.

Project four, "Construction of a Dugout," has not been started, but its sponsors expect it to be completed in time for 1976 celebrations.

At a joint meeting of the Library and Museum project committees recently, additional ideas and details were discussed, and plans for the opening of the library and museum were made. The formal opening of the Library-Museum complex will be held at the old Coke County Jail at 601 Chadbourne in Robert Lee from 3-5 p.m., Sunday afternoon, April 20.

Members of the Robert Lee Bicentennial community committees are dedicating their best efforts to develop, direct and carry out programs that will help make the town and surrounding area a more attractive, interesting and worthy part of our state and nation's Bicentennial observances.

May each citizen determine to do his part. Let us demonstrate our love for our country and our faith in its future. Let us determine to do everything humanly possible to keep our country free and worthy of the America's slogan, "Land of the Free and Home of the Brave." Also, let us remember that "WE HAVE A PAST TO HONOR AND A FUTURE TO MOLD."
