3 DEATH NOTES TELL OF TIA JUANA OUTRAGES

GIRLS TELL OF BEING DRUGGED ARRESTS MADE

GOVERNOR LOWER CALIFORNIA TO INSTITUTE INVESTIGATION

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 11.—Here are the death bed statements made by Audrey and Clyde Petet following their night of terror in the vice dens of Tia Juana:

"My name is Audrey Petet. I am 19 years old and the daughter of Thomas Petet. I was drinking with my father and my sister when I was introduced to the Chief of Police and danced with him; the last drink that I had, the chief said to the bartender something that I didn't understand and he gave me a small drink; after that I do not remember anything until I woke up partly undressed. I know that I was ravished by the chief of police. Later I was put in a car and taken to the rooms of my mother in the San Diego hotel, rooms No. 1 and 6, Tia Juana.

(Signed) "Audrey Petet."

"I am 25 years of age and the daughter of Thomas M. Petet. My father and my sister and I were in a saloon having some beer and listening to the music. The bartender asked my father if he could introduce the chief of police, who was dancing with a girl, and my father said he could. My sister danced with him. The bartender and the chief were ordering drinks, the next thing that I remember I was in a car with a man by the name of Louie and he had his hand over my mouth. Then he dragged me into a hotel and into a room, and on to a bed—

"All the time I was calling for help but no one came. I think that this hotel is the National. Later a man came to the room and said he had been sent by Louie. At this time I knew what I was doing and put him out of the room. Then a man came and said that I ought to have something to quiet me and he gave me something in a glass. After this I knew nothing until I found myself in bed with him."

"My father came later with a policeman and found me. Later we reported the matter to Mr. Markley at the border.

HILL COUNTY MAN GIVEN LONG SENTENCE

HILLSBORO, Texas, Feb. 11.—After only 10 minutes deliberation, a jury today returned a verdict of guilty with a sentence of life imprisonment against Frank Kucera, charged with the murder of his wife. It was one of the briefest murder trials ever staged in Hill county.

Mrs. Kucera was found shot to death on the floor of their home near Tyson January 30. When the husband was charged with the murder he claimed that his little two and a half year old daughter had killed his wife accidentally while playing with a shotgun. He later confessed to the deed.

INTEREST ON ROAD BONDS ORDERED BE PAID

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 11.—The attorney general today advised the state treasurer to pay matured interest on road district bonds held by the school fund. The permanent school fund owns \$300,000 of such bonds and the payment of semi-annual interest is due in March and April. The treasurer asked, in view of the Archer county decision, whether the interest should be paid and an affirmative answer was given in an opinion by Assistant Attorney General C. A. Wheeler, approved by Dan Moody.

COUNTRESS MAY BE RETURNED TO ENGLAND

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—While Vera, Countess of Cathcart, ponders on the American law which bars from the United States all persons divorced in the courts of Great Britain, Mrs. Gordon Carr, the countess' "only friend," in her present predicament has gone to Washington to argue her ladyship's case before Secretary of Labor James J. Davis. The countess, meantime, is held at Ellis Island, subject to deportation. The countess was excluded from the United States following an hour's hearing at Ellis Island during which the immigration officials learned again from her own lips that she had been divorced by the Earl of Cathcart for an act of "moral turpitude." The countess eloped in 1923 with the youthful Earl of Craven, and Cathcart obtained a divorce, naming Craven as co-respondent. That is admitted by the countess as well as the fact that her ladyship and Craven lived together for some months.

By construing this conduct as "moral turpitude" the American immigration officials automatically raise the bars against all persons divorced in Great Britain where misconduct is essential to plea for divorce.

HUBBARD'S APPOINTMENT WAS BIRTHDAY GIFT
AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 11.—Dean L. H. Hubbard of State University, received appointment to the presidency of the College of Industrial Arts on his 44th birthday anniversary. "It was the best birthday gift I ever received," the president-elect declared today.

Hubbard is a native of Porto Rico, his father being in the consular service at Mayaguez at the time of his birth. He was reared in El Paso and attended school there.

BIRTH OF LINCOLN BE CELEBRATED IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 11.—The capital of Texas will be closed tomorrow for the first time on Lincoln's birthday. In suggesting today that the great president's anniversary be observed, Governor Miriam A. Ferguson referred to "his kindly interest in the south when it was bleeding and sore from the ravages of war."

The day is not designated as a state holiday in Texas.

COMPTROLLER PAYS SUM INTO STATE TREASURY

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 11.—The state comptroller has paid into the state treasury \$1,375,790 representing gross receipt taxes for the quarter ending December 31. Three fourths of the taxes go into the general revenue fund and one fourth into the available school fund. State Treasurer Hatcher announced that by the end of this week, all warrants carried by banks in assisting him to keep the state off deficiency would be paid. These warrants aggregate about \$1,000,000.

TECH SUMMER SCHOOL WILL OPEN ON JUNE 14TH; NUMBER OF PROMINENT INSTRUCTORS HAVE CHARGE OF WORK

Decision to establish a summer school at the Texas Technological College was announced following a faculty meeting at the administration building Thursday. The first session will open Monday, June 14th and a six weeks term will be held.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the college, announced the action of the board of regents in authorizing the establishment of the summer school, following which a committee from the faculty composed of Dr. J. M. Gordon, Dean of the college of liberal arts; A. W. Evans, head of the Department of history, was appointed to direct the summer school.

It was this committee that made the first official announcement of the establishment of the summer school and the date on which the initial session will be opened.

The session will include six days work each week, the committee announced.

Full Program
The program for the summer term as outlined by the committee yesterday is complete in every detail and includes special work not included in the regular course of study, as will be shown later.

Courses in the four schools of the college, namely, liberal arts, home economics, engineering and agriculture, will be offered and in addition to this special courses in vocational agriculture, teacher training and vocational home economics will be offered.

DIFFICULT FOR COURT TO KEEP ORDER IN ROOM

ATTORNEY FOR DEFENSE DENOUNCES MANY WITNESS IN CASE

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 11.—The verbal fireworks spluttered, and shone spectacularly Thursday afternoon as attorneys argued the evidence in the case of Carl J. Peterson, former banking commissioner of Kansas, charged with conspiring with ex-Governor Jonathan M. Davis, to solicit bribes for pardons.

The whole category of vituperation was loaded on the heads of the witnesses against Peterson by his attorney. His prosecutors were not neglected, but they met recrimination with recrimination and spectators were treated to a strange mixture of legal terminology and such picturesque phrases as "fear, greed, pay, yellow dog, frame up, political trap, graft and boodle."

Judge Otis E. Hunsateer had difficulty at times in preserving order and he instructed the jury to disregard all arguments that had nothing to do with evidence.

A total of three hours and forty minutes of argument still remain for the jury to hear before it will be permitted to deliberate the evidence. That would indicate the jury will be sent to the jury room between 3 and 4 o'clock Friday.

Judge Hunsateer announced that he intended to keep the jury together until a verdict is reached and told the jury men to make arrangements that way.

Peterson sat behind his counsel with his family all afternoon listening first to accusations and then to his own attorneys present his case.

VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY RETURNED IN DALLAS MURDER CASE; RELATIVES OF DECEASED WOMAN ASSIST DEFENDANT

DALLAS, Texas, Feb. 11.—Amid a din of applause and shouts that filled the courtroom of Judge Felix D. Robertson, L. E. Arnold, on trial charged with murder in connection with the death of his wife, today received a verdict from the jury of not guilty. The jurors deliberated forty minutes. Judge Robertson had repeatedly warned the spectators against any demonstration but unable to restrain their approval of the verdict pandemonium let loose in the crowded room and lasted for fully a minute.

Mrs. Arnold died from bullet wounds received while riding with her husband here during the holidays. State's attorneys claimed Arnold had told them he had killed his wife. Defense counsel denied this, and Arnold testified his wife shot herself during a moment of despondency. Mrs. Arnold's parents and other relatives testified in behalf of the accused husband.

WALSH WANTS OIL LANDS GIVEN AT ONCE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The Smoot bill limiting time for recovery of government lands in western states would give the Standard Oil Co., of California clear title to section 16 of the Elk Hill naval oil reserve from which it already has taken \$10,000,000 in oil. Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, leader in the oil scandal investigations, charged Thursday.

When Senator Smoot, republican, Utah, was informed of the effect he said he would have the measure amended so as to protect the reserve. He said the bill was drawn by land commissioners of western states to limit the time in which the government could reclaim lands given to the states for school purposes.

"The bill appears to have no other purpose than to turn the Elk Hill sections over to the Standard Oil Co.," Walsh declared.

NEW ARRANGEMENTS FOR SETTLEMENT MINE STRIKE

SCRANTON, Pa., Feb. 11.—All members of the scale committee of the anthracite miners have been summoned to meet at 9 o'clock Friday morning in Philadelphia.

It is understood that the operators are also issuing a call to their full committee for a similar conference in Philadelphia.

The scale committee as a whole is called into session only when there is something before the union calling for an approval or disapproval.

Following separate meetings of the miners and operators at Philadelphia during the day, news of the full scale committee meeting brought new hope of a settlement of the anthracite strike.

INVESTIGATION OF OSAGE CASE TO BE RENEWED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The federal government will resume Friday before the federal grand jury in Oklahoma efforts to secure conviction of persons tried by the Osage Indians. Attorney General Sargent announced Thursday Assistant Attorney General O. E. Lahring, in charge of the criminal division of the justice department, will assist Oklahoma officials in the grand jury investigation.

Sargent said further inquiries will be made into the deaths of Ann Brown and the Smith family. He predicted interesting developments would be unearthed in these cases. No indictments will be asked in the Henry Rean case to meet technical objections made to indictments returned by the grand jury at its first session.

For World Dollar

JURY DISCHARGED IN ASHBACHER CASE

The jury which heard the testimony in the case of the states of Texas vs. R. G. Ashbacher, charged by indictment with theft of cattle, was deadlocked soon after receiving the case 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and at 10:30 o'clock Thursday R. J. Murray, the foreman, reported to the court that in his opinion they could never agree on a verdict.

This jury was excused and work of selecting a second jury for retrial of the case was immediately entered into.

Work of taking testimony in the second trial of the case was started soon after noon Thursday and when court adjourned last night several of the state's witnesses had been heard.

Too Much, To Bad, And Maybe Worse

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 11.—Fined \$100 and costs on a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated, the Rev. John A. Bratton, Catholic priest, Thursday served notice that he would appeal the case.

"Things are coming to a pretty pass when men of the cloth are driving cars in an intoxicated condition," said Judge Martin in police court in passing sentence.

The Rev. Bratton who appeared in his clerical robes, did not testify. Police said they arrested the priest when they noticed his car "weaving up the street."

With him was Mrs. W. S. Kinnan, a pretty divorcee, who denied her escort was drunk.

The arresting officer testified that the priest offered him "any amount of money" to "hush" the charges.

LOSS ESTIMATED AT \$175,000, NO LIVES ARE LOST

FIRE TRUCK DESTROYED WHEN CAUGHT BETWEEN TWO BUILDINGS

DALLAS, Texas, Feb. 11.—Fire which started near 3 o'clock this afternoon in less than two hours had completely destroyed the three boys dormitories at Southern Methodist University here.

The fire started in south hall and spread rapidly to Runkin hall, adjacent to the north. North hall followed quickly and by five o'clock all that was left of the three buildings was a portion of one wall of North hall.

A hasty check up made by the university officials failed to find any loss of life. Minor injuries were reported among boys who sustained ankles and wrists in carrying personal valuables outside the flaming building.

The university is located well outside the city limits and the small equipment from the university park fire station was totally unable to cope with the raging flames. A general alarm sent into Highland Park and Dallas did not bring help in time to save any portion of the three structures. Fanned by a high wind the flames devoured the structures. Firemen finally devoted their efforts to saving the gymnasium across the street and fraternity house a half block away.

Loss is expected to run around \$175,000. The three buildings were valued at \$100,000.

Of the 140 boys occupying the dormitories very few managed to save anything. Probably fifty trunks were salvaged before the heat became too intense to enter the buildings. Origin of the fire has not been determined.

Defective wiring is thought to have been the cause of the fire, according to Dean Jennings of the university. He said that the fire originated in South Hall between the ceiling of the first floor and the floor of the second.

Dean Jennings said that of the 148 boys that suffered loss in the fire about one fourth of them were working their way through school and that the fire would be a hardship on them. The dean had his coat tail burned off while assisting the students in carrying their clothing and books from the burning buildings.

Layton W. Bailey, business manager of the university, said that checks will be issued immediately refunding the semester's board to the boys and every effort will be made to adjust the losses so that the boys can continue their school work.

The fire truck of the Highland Park station was completely destroyed when it was caught between two buildings. Efforts to drive the car out were hampered by the heat.

DRY OFFICERS TO PLUG BORDER LEAKS

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Feb. 11.—An international dry conference was in session here today to discuss plans for checking the smuggling of liquor from Mexico into the United States. The session is meeting under the leadership of the V. C. T. U. headed by national President Mrs. Ella A. Smith. Federal prohibition officers, through Maj. H. H. White, prohibition administrator for Texas and Oklahoma also held a prominent place on today's program.

Several Mexican leaders were present.

For the sake of their child, the princess is ready to forgive the man who recently renounced his rights to the Rumanian throne and came here to dwell with Mme Lupescu.

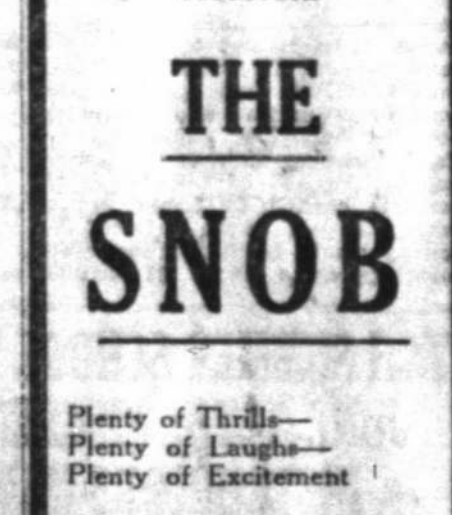

GEORGE WASHINGTON

As a result of well organized effort, aided to a great extent by an international press, the observance on Feb. 22 of the 194th birthday anniversary of George Washington takes on an entirely different national aspect than that we have been accustomed to.

Our participation in the World War and influences, financial and political, to interest the United States in world affairs, in hope of promoting permanent peace, has had a tendency to relegate not only the maxims, but the historical wisdom of our dead leaders.

It is argued that if any of the great political or religious leaders of the past return to earth after having been dead for a hundred years the least congenial associates they could find would be their disciples.

Patriotic followers of the great dead too often overlook the fact that changed conditions and altered needs necessitate a facing of today's facts instead of living in ancestral worship.

It means that we should imbibe the courageous and creative spirit that enabled our leaders to become great and apply it to today's facts and needs with the same undaunted courage and candor that they would exercise if here.

If George Washington had slavishly followed his fathers we would still be a British colony. Before criticizing China and other nations for ancestral worship we should be sure that we have acquired a safe and sane system regarding our own ancestors.

PURE FOODS ACT A DEAD LAW

Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, former chief of the Bureau of Chemistry in the agricultural department, and author of the Pure Food and Drug Law, is throwing grape and canister broadsides into the Bureau of Chemistry through letters to the president and a series of articles in Good Housekeeping. Dr. Wiley has finally forced an admission from the department that the laws not being enforced even in specific cases passed upon by the Supreme Court.

The trouble seems to be that the execution of these Food and Drug laws is left almost entirely to decisions of the Reference Board of Consulting Scientific experts, a body paid by the government for reviewing the world of the Bureau of Chemistry at the request of the adulterators and misbranders of our foods. The matter has been taken out of the hands of the Bureau of Chemistry and the law became practically a dead letter.

A Bureau of Chemistry that will not, or because of restrictions cannot function in the interest of public welfare under the Food and Drugs Act, falls far short of what it should be and what the public has a right to expect.

It seems to be another case of wheels within wheels and bureau red tape designed to double-cross the people who pay the bill going and coming.

BACK TO THE FIRST PRINCIPALS

The proposition that colleges and universities instruct students in the word of "investigating the social and economic evils of its state" and start the students upon the problem of curing such evils is met with intense hostility from what President Roosevelt designated as "vested interests". They contend that this line of study would result in breeding radicals.

If there was nothing wrong with our governmental gear there would be no radicals. Nothing exists without a reason and there is but one way to get rid of radicals.

The labor leaders of Great Britain have just issued a manifesto which says: "It is our conviction that statesmanship will fail and political programs will prove futile as a solvent of social troubles unless they embody the spirit and practice of Christ."

The purpose of the manifesto is to unite all people who realize the need of spiritual regeneration, to combat the materialist trend of modern civilization and to acknowledge the authority of Christian conscience as paramount to political allegiance and class loyalties.

This doctrine may be set down as radical but, after all it means the solution of most our troubles, for the challenge of our time is to the good will in men.

and poverty, but to set the machinery in motion to remedy them.

COMMAND OF THE SEAS

France and England have decided not to participate in any disarmament conference not called by the League of Nations and President Coolidge's proposal for a separate conference seems destined to failure. The proposed Geneva conference has also been postponed and it may be many years before anything definite is accomplished.

Mr. Bridgeman, First Lord of the British Admiralty, declares that England is not in the same position as other countries; protection of its enormous expanse of Empire trade depends on the most up-to-date cruisers and the command of the seas. The British program, which has been accepted by the government, including the great dry-dock at Singapore, will in time provide the greatest navy ever known, and Great Britain will take no chances that she cannot control.

UNITED STATES AND MEXICO

To this date the interchange of notes between Mexico and the United States over the interpretation of the new land laws, has only made clear the fact that the two governments are further apart. President Callas insists that the new laws do not contemplate confiscation of American property and that the laws are not retroactive.

Back of this question of interpretation, however, is the question of future investments of American capital with its demands for raw materials. Our capitalists seek this new field of investment but protest all barriers.

Mexico, on the other hand, contends that the question is fundamentally one of self-preservation. The unrestricted flow of American capital into Mexico may help develop that country but the price may be the loss of political independence. There is no gainsaying the fact that American oil interests in Mexico, for instance, have been an important factor in the various revolutionary movements that have plagued Mexico since the fall of the dictator Diaz and it may also be true that many of the land titles now held by mining companies were fraudulently obtained.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, which conducted a special investigation on the subject, asserts that the new Mexican legislation is "nothing more than what our own government has done."

Murder, the result of a moment of intense aggravation or blind fury is horrible enough, but during the past two weeks the people of this country have been treated to an epidemic of premeditated, calculated, cold-blooded crimes for financial gain that causes a shiver up and down the spinal column. And the great pity of it is that under our systems the men and women who have done these things will obtain almost endless delays in legal quibbling and playing to the galleries while the news-reporter makes flashes and moving pictures of the trial scenes, and the Bar Associations "resolve on the growing disrespect for law."

Between Secretary Hoover and Great Britain's financial managers the business men of the United States have been taught a valuable lesson during the past few months. In some respects Uncle Sam has been the victim of the old, old shell game. While Great Britain pushes us into the World Court with one hand she dipped into our trousers pocket with the other—until Mr. Hoover called the "cops". As a result of his activities the price of rubber has dropped for the time being from \$1.09 to 68 cents. This means a saving on the 1926 American rubber supply of \$352,600,000. Of course Great Britain needs the money—and as its only a matter of sharp business practice it is probable that rubber merchants will see to it that they control their own supply in the near future.

The New York Stock Exchange announces that the borrowings of its members on stock and bond collateral at the end of January was \$3,513,174.154—not including many big transactions by brokers who are not members or the vast sums carried by banks, outside of New York. The total figures are great surprise to speculators, indicating that values are to some extent paper values.

Colonel Billy Mitchell takes great pride in his record of work done for the good of his country and promises to keep on the job. Notwithstanding the fact that he is bucking an age-old foggyism he may accomplish much good if he does not overdo it.

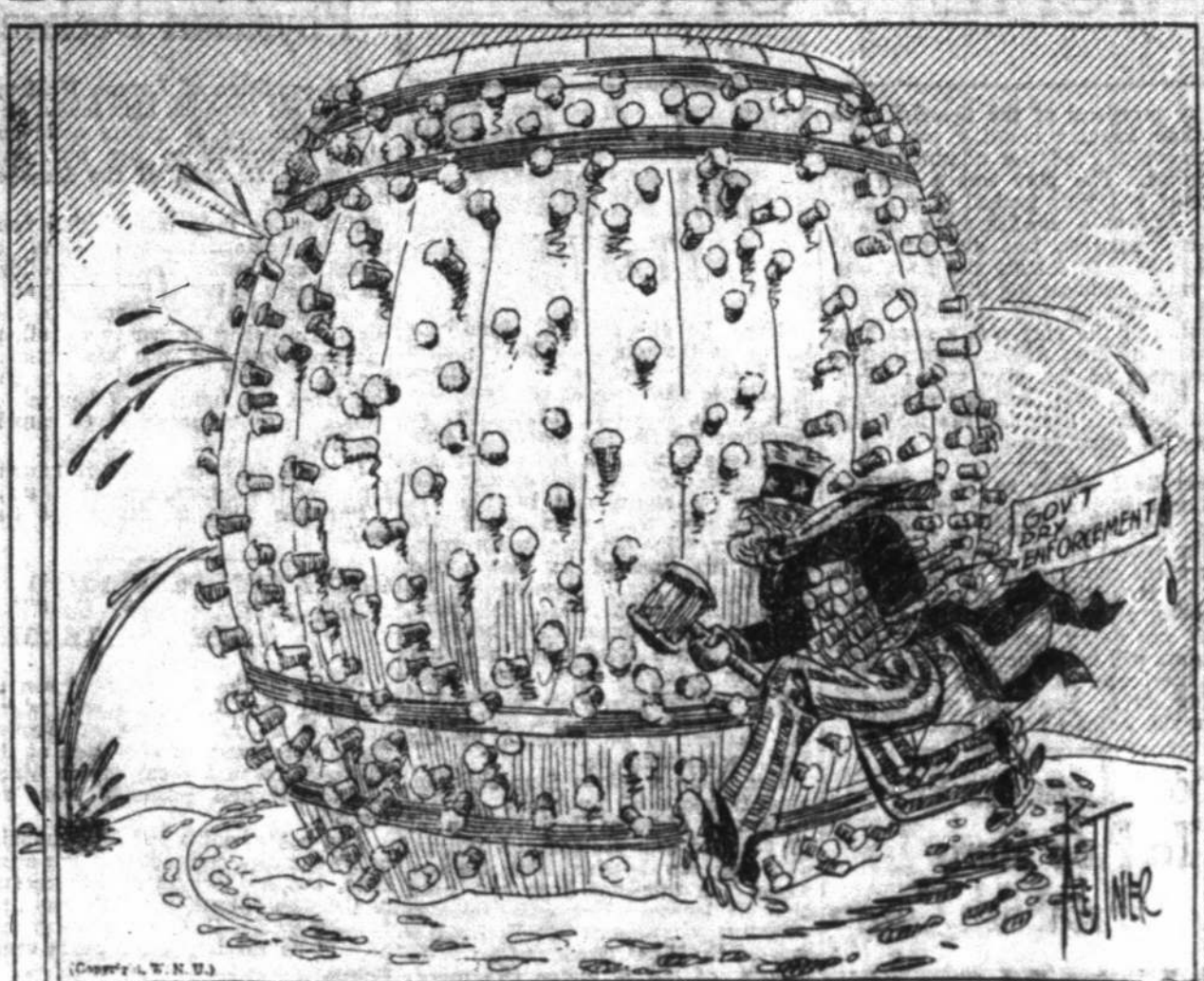
Henry Ford who has sold Russia thousands of tractors has offered to pay all expenses of 100 Soviet students for one year at his factories—providing the Secretary of State will admit them.

Hon. Charles F. Hughes definitely announces that he has irrevocably retired from public life, and will not consider any nominations or appointment for any position. Mr. Hughes has been in public life nearly all his active lifetime. He's one of the few men who ever voluntarily let go of the meal ticket.

The Senate investigation of the Aluminum Trust has encountered an ancient custom of withholding information in the Attorney General's office, that only a special Senate resolution can overcome. The committee has asked for this instruction—but it may die in transit.

Elihu Root, one of the ablest big-business lawyers in this country strenuously opposes the "farm bloc" system in the Senate and says it is a disgrace. Mr. Root offers no objection to the financial "bloc" or the industrial "bloc", the railroad "bloc" nor the other "bloc's" that have had more or less free hand in legislative matters these many years—and generally at the expense of the farmers. I am never too busy or too tired to be interested and by questioning, I can usually bring out both sides of a story if it relates to an incident in which he himself is involved. So far, I have reason to believe that he has always given me an accurate account of events even if he himself is somewhat discredited by the recital. If he has been in the wrong I do not scold or punish but say to him, "Do you think you were in the right about that?" or "Couldn't you have avoided the trouble?"

During his first year at school, came running in one afternoon with the eager exclamation, "Say, Mom, I got even with James today for some of the tricks he's played on me!"

Realizing that many people who reside in Texas know very little about it, and who are possibly not in position to get information regarding the State, we have secured a series of articles that will run in the Lubbock Morning Avalanche each day for more than a month. You will do well to make a scrap book of these articles, for they are reliable, and contain much valuable information, and is the product of much close study and hard work. The first one appears below.A VAST DOMINION
Not long ago, Arthur Brisbane, one of the great editorial writers of this country, made a journey through our state. On his return to New York he said that Texas is the State for which the flying machine was invented. Automobiles will do for other States, not for Texas; they can't go far enough in a week.

On the fastest train you leave the eastern border of Texas at Texarkana at 8 a. m. You reach the western edge of the State at El Paso at 12:59 on the next day. Several on each side of that stretch of European nations could be packed railroad track. Fold your map of the United States up toward the North and Texas reaches Canada. Fold it down toward the South and it reaches well into Central America. Fold it to the right, eastward, it reaches New York; to the left, westward, it reaches California. Yet more bigness is the least of Texas' greatness.

One of the most remarkable speeches on "Texas" in recent years was made by Governor Pat M. Neff, in June, 1906, at Peoria, Illinois, before the Head Camp Meeting of the Woodmen of the World. It is a classic, both in oratory and humor. Beneath all the laughter is the solid ground of truth. In that remarkable speech he declared: "To fully appreciate the boundless area and magnificent dimensions of Texas, it is necessary to combine States and Empires for illustrations."

Why, you could put New York and Colorado and Utah in the Panhandle of Texas, and it would take the cowboys in that western district one of them. You can put all the two weeks to find the borders of New England States in Texas and they would reach like peas in a pod. Texas is 112 times larger than Rhode Island. We are six times larger than the Empire State of China, Maryland, Delaware and New York. Did you know that if you could turn Texas upon her western border as a hinge, that the fruit growers of Eastern Texas could load their products on the American fleet floating two hundred miles out in the Pacific ocean. Do you know that it is a mathematical fact that every man, woman and child on the globe could all come to Texas and each could have a town lot?

Our men still possess the bold and philanthropic spirit of the Texas pioneers who walked upright and fearless before the world as it is in their veins flowed the blood of a thousand kings.

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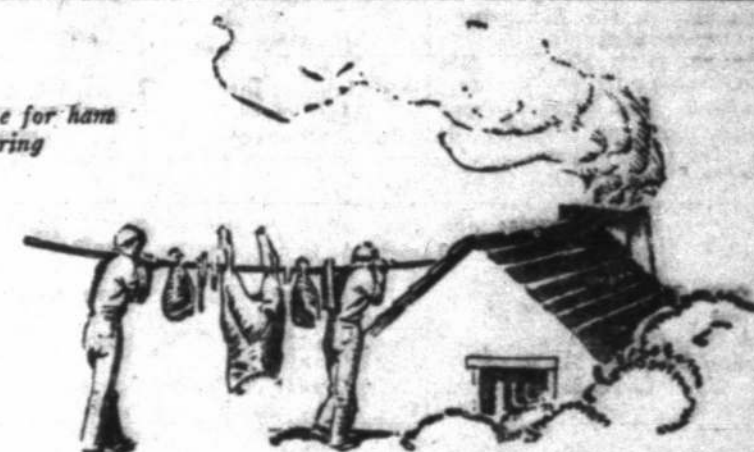
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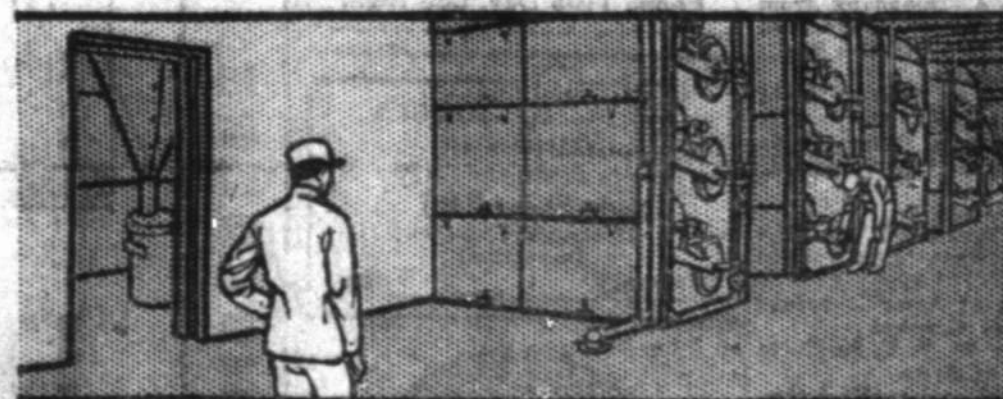

FEDERAL OIL BOARD STARTS SURVEY TODAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The Federal Oil Conservation Board, appointed by President Coolidge to survey the nation's petroleum resources and make recommendations for prolonging their life, opened hearings today preliminary to drafting a final report.

The hearings will continue today and tomorrow, before Secretaries Work, Hoover, Davis of the War Department and Wilbur. Leaders of the oil industry have been invited to give their general views of the situation confronting the country and pass on the opinions of those close to the heart of the industry.

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Frank E. Samuel Named Assistant to Adj. Barton

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 11.—Appointment of Frank E. Samuel, of Topeka, Kansas, formerly for five years adjutant of the Kansas Department of The American Legion, as assistant to National Adjutant James F. Barton and director of administration at national headquarters has been announced by Mr. Barton.

Mr. Samuel will handle all general administration, organization and membership matters for the national body of the Legion. He will perform the duties of the national adjutant in the absence or incapacity of the latter.

Oakleigh E. Marquette, of Indianapolis, heads the expanded Emblem Division which now includes the old Film Division. Mr. Marquette has been director of the Emblem Division for the past five years.

The appointments, it was announced, are part of a general redistribution of headquarters functions in the interest of economy and greater efficiency. The plan was devised by Mr. Barton and adopted at the January meeting of the National Executive Committee on recommendation of the National Finance Committee.

Under the consolidation, the Administration Division includes the old Organization and Membership Division, which is now abolished as such. The post activities section of the latter is combined with the Community Betterment Bureau of the National Americanism Commission.

Emblem and Film Divisions merge under the name of the former.

For the past two years Mr. Samuel has been director of the Organization and Membership Division. A graduate of Fairmont College, he taught English from 1912 to 1916 in Canton Christian College, Canton, China. He served overseas during the World War as an enlisted man in the 353rd Infantry and was then assigned to special duty with the regimental intelligence and operations section. Following a brief term as assistant adjutant of the Kansas Department of The American Legion, he became department adjutant in September, 1919. He held that position until he was called to national headquarters in 1924.

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DUNCAN BELIEVES MUSIC IS IMPORTANT SCHOOL STUDY; IS CONSIDERED BY HIM A MOST IMPORTANT AVENUE OF EDUCATION

M. H. Duncan, superintendent of the Lubbock public schools, is enjoying noticeable success in establishing in the schools of the city those institutions that tend to give the student that kind of training that equips him to meet the practical needs of life, and his views on education and educational methods have met with approval of the parents of Lubbock children.

Mr. Duncan is especially interested at this time in having all of the students in the schools here become better learned in the subject of music, as is reflected in the following written statement prepared by him on this important topic:

To my notion there is no more important subject taught in the schools than music, and I am in favor of giving it a very prominent place in the school program. I think every child in the schools should have opportunity to learn to sing or play a musical instrument. From the kindergarten the child's musical sense should be developed, and every child has a musical sense to some degree. Not all children can learn to sing in an attractive way or to play a musical instrument, but all have a latent musical ability to be developed which means much to their lives if cultivated along the right lines.

I am of the opinion that nothing is doing more to drag us down as a nation than the low grade of music that the people are hearing today in the picture shows and other places of amusement. The people get this kind of music because it is the kind they want, and it is the kind they want because they have been educated to appreciate nothing better or higher. Our moral standards will continue to be low and will get lower if we continue to have the kind of music we have. A nation that lives in a jazz atmosphere will be a jazz nation. Its people will be a jazz people and will think jazz thoughts. Jazz thinking is in harmony with the moral looseness that obtains today in every sphere of our lives—in business, in dress, in talk, and general conduct. I do not say that the right kind of music would correct all the moral wrongs of the day, but I do say that if we could get the people to hear good music, immoral conditions could not continue, and the best index of our national moral tone is the kind of music we appreciate.

The real musician feels that he has a mission in the world and that mission is to uplift the moral standards of the people through music. He will not step down to the standards of masses, but he will try to raise those standards to their proper levels. He will not compromise to meet popular demands in music any more

than he will compromise his religious faith to meet such demands.

Because of the very great educational value of music, I am very much in favor of its having a prominent place on the school program. I feel that its moral value is such that it should rank along with English, history, and other subjects that we have been honoring so highly in our schools. We can't make musicians out of all the children, but we can see that they have opportunity in the schools to develop their musical ability in singing or playing a musical instrument and that they hear the best in music. There is a large volume of music selections that would lead the children in the right direction morally if it were properly graded and made accessible to them, and it is the task of the music teachers who love truth and righteousness to so arrange it and teach the people its educational value.

If I am any judge, we have not yet even begun to attack the problem of music appreciation. We can not get results with a few weeks' attention to the subject during the year. The children must every day hear the good in music. I should like to see the best music of the day, both vocal and instrumental, catalogued, arranged by grades and adapted to the stage of development of each child from the first grade through the high school. This arrangement should be made by musicians who

have made a study of the pedagogy of music, and a campaign made throughout the country to make such a program a part of every school's work. If the music people would arrange such a program and make a campaign for its introduction into the schools, they would confer one of the greatest of favors on the people of future generations.

The trouble with our music program of today is the same trouble that obtains in all other departments of school work and that is rendering ineffective the efforts of the schools along moral lines. We are adapting the program too much to the demands of the children. We are influenced by a false philosophy of education and life that the native tendencies of children, or even grown people, are in the right direction, when such is not the case, as we can clearly see from a thousand evidences all around us. This attitude has caused us to compromise with human nature and to meet its demands rather than lift those demands to a higher plane. In music we can not afford to give the children or even grown people what they want, but we must attempt to lift their wants to higher and higher levels. Human nature's natural tendency is not upward but downward, and a constant fight must be made to keep it from going in its natural way. Music can be made one of the most effective agencies for elevating the morals of the people, if we but arrange the right kind of a music program and make it accessible to the children in the schools. This does not mean that we are to try to cultivate in the minds of the first graders a taste for the higher type of classical music. We would not do this any more than we would try to teach the child in the first grade to appreciate the poetry of Browning.

But we should arrange the program of music that we would make accessible to each grade in such a way as to lift each one to a little higher plane of appreciation, and thus the process should continue until the pupils who complete the high school can appreciate and would demand a very high type of music. There is no more glaring evidence of the failure of the schools to elevate the morals of their pupils than the very low plane of their music appreciation which causes them to take a delight in the most demoralizing type of what we call popular music.

Big Bargains Offered At Hereford Sale

HEREFORD, Feb. 11 — Buyers will have a chance to get three for one in many of the female lots, in E. B. Black's big Anxiety 4th Sale April 15, in which he has drafted forty head of his strong breeding females and twenty young bulls. Some thirty calves with a large number of them carrying straight Anxiety 4th pedigrees, will be sold with the same lot as their mothers.

Mischief 5th by Superior Mischief and out of Dorana 29 by Beau President will probably have more calves in the sale than either of

Black's other two herd bulls, Modest Mischief or Donald Stanway. Practically every female that has been drafted for the sale will be bred back to Mischief 5th before April 15th.

Black has selected sixty head from the cream of his herd, and is offering some strong breeding animals. Twenty nine of these are straight line bred Anxiety 4th animals and the rest of the lot are rich in Anxiety 4th breeding. There are twenty young bulls between fourteen and twenty months of age, eight of which are straight line bred, and forty females, consisting of twenty breeding cows and twenty-two-year-old heifers. Fourteen of the heifers and seven of the cows have pedigrees that read perfect. The sale is expected to draw a number of Hereford breeders from distant points,

as the upward trend in cattle prices is causing many breeders to increase their herds. While Black is offering an unusually strong lot of breeding cattle, he is not expecting them to bring excessive prices. The sale is

being held more to advertise his Herefords, than as a money making proposition.

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
