DEMONSTRATIONS FOLLOW EXECUTION OF 2

BANK CHECK SHOWS BIGGER LOSS AT AUSTIN

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—An all-night search for the three robbers of the University Bank here was reported fruitless today by National Guardsmen and officers who returned from the brushy and hilly country northwest of Austin.

The loot, it was revealed yesterday when a late check-up by the bank officers was made, was more than \$26,000.

The haul included \$10,000 in non-negotiable bonds, \$10,000 in signed bankers' association checks, \$1,600 in cash and \$5,000 in Liberty Bonds.

MORE SHIPS IN SEARCH FOR MISSING FLYERS

WASHINGTON, August 23.—Fifteen destroyers and one light cruiser, under the command of Rear Admiral McNamee, were ordered today to join in the search for the missing Dole flyers in the Pacific Ocean.

HONOLULU, Aug. 23.—Acting under orders from Washington, the Navy's search for the missing Dole flyers was extended today to cover various small bits of Hawaiian waters which have not been covered closely during the larger and more general operations.

Rear Admiral John McDonald, commander of the Fourteenth Naval District, declared he was still hopeful that the aviators may be found.

MOODY ASKS FOR MEXICAN

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—Governor Moody today issued a requisition on President Calles of Mexico for Eugenio Bianchini, wanted in San Antonio, who escaped the state authorities into Mexico in 1924 after he is alleged to have killed Officer J. T. Holloway while en route to San Antonio from Eagle Pass.

Bianchini is said to be in the state of Coahuila.

STORM NEARS EASTERN COAST

WASHINGTON, August 23.—A tropical disturbance which began to the east of the Bahama Islands and north of Turks Island is recurring northward and is now of great intensity and attended by hurricane winds near its center, the United States Weather Bureau announced today.

Storm warnings have been displayed today on the Atlantic coast from Wilmington, N. C. to Boston.

18 Communities to Have Booths at Fair this Year

"We already have eighteen spare time working on some unique collections of agricultural products," J. D. Motley, secretary of the Runnels County Fair Association declared Tuesday morning when expanding on the possibilities of the seventh annual fair, to be held on October 4th to 8th, inclusive.

"This is a much larger number than we have ever before had on the line this early in the game," the secretary continued, "and of this number five are coming in for the first time. The five new community exhibits will come from Offen, Hagan, Barnett, Blanton and Sweet Home. These communities are 'getting the habit' and are working hard to make their first effort a decided success."

"There are thirteen communities who had booths last year who are planning 'bigger and better' displays this year. These include Rowena, Crews, Hatchel, Wingate, Norton, Drasco, Bethel, Miles, Spring Hill, Winters, Dale, South Ballinger and Herring. While these places have always had good displays at the county fair they are determined it seems to outdo their previous records."

"Besides the regular community exhibits, several prominent farmers are planning individual displays this year. They have been looking ahead, and during

the fair has been growing yearly by leaps and bounds, and prospects are brighter than ever this year for a comprehensive exposition of the county's resources. More people seem to be taking an interest in the fair and it is being discussed in almost every section of the county, and especially by rural club members.

The boys' and girls' and women's clubs of the county will enter seven or more booths this year, and the clubbers are planning the best showing ever made in Fair Park.

Other communities and clubs are discussing possibilities for booths at the fair and within the next few weeks more applications are expected.

Mr. Motley said there would be a thirty-five per cent increase in livestock exhibits this year due to the fine dairy cattle brought into the county by progressive farmers, and that if there was room he believed there would be an increase of fifty per cent in this division.

Three fourths of the fair catalogues and premium lists have

BOSTON, Aug. 23.—The bodies of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti are to be taken in specially constructed caskets through the cities of the East, it was announced today by the Sacco-Vanzetti Defense Committee.

GENEVA, Aug. 23.—About 2,000 manifestators assembled before the United States consulate today in protest against the Sacco-Vanzetti executions.

Firemen were called out and the mob was drenched with water.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Demonstrations in behalf of Sacco and Vanzetti were staged at various European and South American cities after the publication of news of their execution.

The most serious outbreak occurred at Geneva, where a mob after marching on the United States consulate and being beaten off by the police, broke windows in the Great Hall of the League of Nations Palace.

In the United States announcement of the executions was received quietly, according to reports reaching here.

BOSTON, Aug. 23.—Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, radicals in whose behalf there has been a world-wide agitation, today paid with their lives for the murder of two men. They were convicted six years ago.

The two radicals died calmly

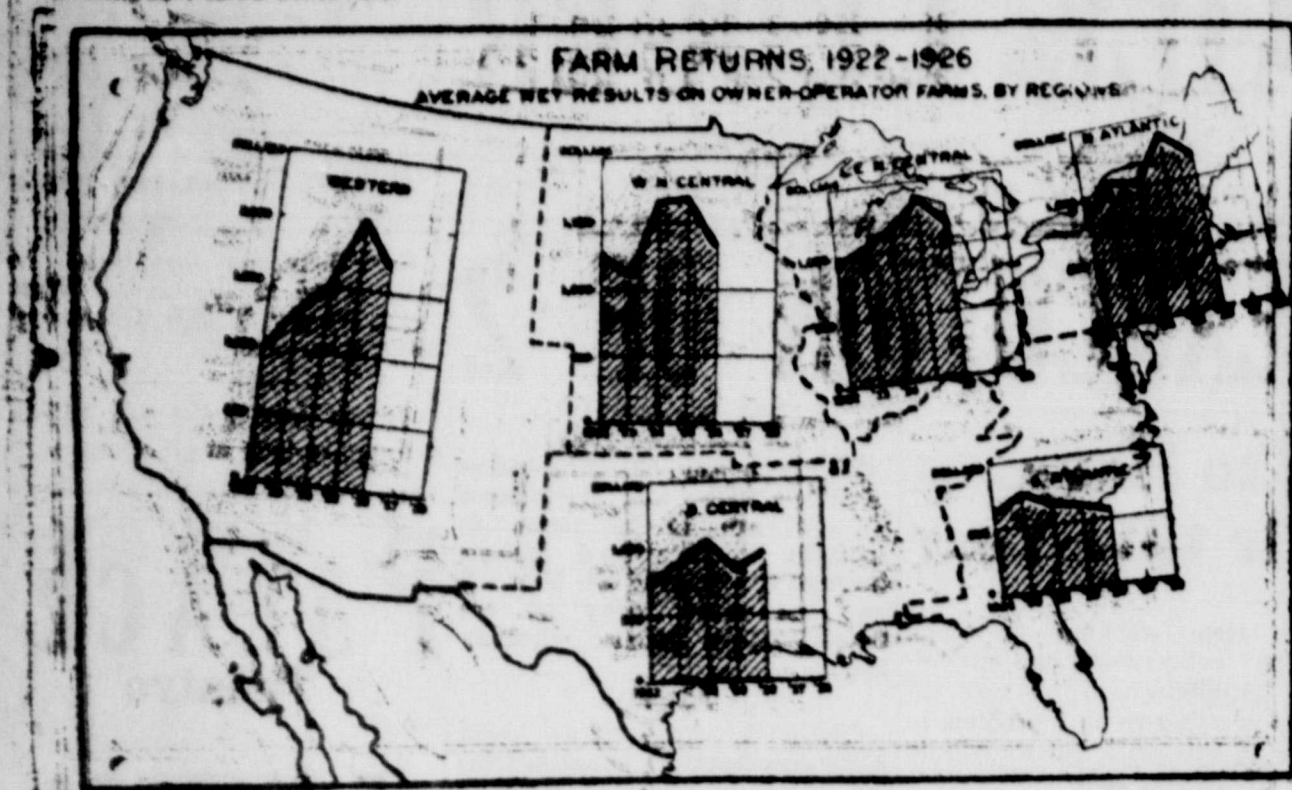

BIGGER THAN EVER

Result Charts Show Farmers Less Prosperous than Year Ago



(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, August 17.—Western farmers were the most prosperous in the United States last year, net result charts fashioned by government economists indicate. In all except the South Central states, returns were lower than in 1925.

Chart comparisons were made from reports from 13,475 farmers throughout the nation. Gross receipts averaged \$2,448, of which \$926 represented sales of crops; \$894, sales of livestock; \$589, livestock products; and \$39, miscellaneous other sales.

Average current cash expenses of these farmers totalled \$1,473, consisting of \$386 for hired labor; \$242 for livestock bought; \$232 for feed; \$73, fertilizer; \$48 seed; \$183, taxes on farm property; \$130, machinery and tools; and \$179 for miscellaneous items.

Receipts less the expenses averaged \$975, in addition to which the farmer used homegrown food products valued at an average of \$282. The value of fuel used and of house rent was not reported. Coincidentally, the expense total

(\$1,473) does not include any allowance for the labor of the farmer and his family, estimated at an average value of \$779.

The cash balance of \$975 represents all the cash the average farmer made available to the owner-operator to pay his living expenses, take care of interest and principal of debts, and make improvements.

Inventory values showed an average increase of \$158 over 1925, which, together with the cash balance of \$975, made a return from the farm averaging \$1,133, the "net result."

shortly after midnight in the electric chair at the Charleston state prison, protesting their innocence of the crime with which they were charged, affirming their belief in anarchy and refusing the benefits of religion.

Celestino Madeiros, sentenced for the murder of a bank cashier, whose execution had been held up on account of connection with the Sacco-Vanzetti case, preceded the two others to the chair by a few minutes.

Sacco and Vanzetti, up to the hour set for their execution, had continued the struggle to save their lives through seven years.

Naval Altitude Record Maker Seeks to Perfect Oxygen Tank

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, August 23.—Altitude record-making is only part of the task undertaken by Lieutenant Carleton C. Champion, Jr., sky-climbing naval pilot, who successfully brought down his plane the other day from an altitude which he placed at 47,000 feet or better, with the motor flying apart and shooting flames. He is trying to perfect the oxygen tank which makes it possible for aviators to breathe and remain conscious in the extremely rarified atmosphere six or seven miles above the earth.

When the oxygen tube was knocked out of his mouth on his recent flight, apparently by a flying part of his engine, he lost consciousness, but regained his faculties quickly enough to fight valiantly against the flames from his motor and to strive to save the precious barograph which had made a record of his ascent. One was demolished and the other damaged beyond usefulness, he fears, by the bursting motor, but he managed what the Navy Department described as an "exceptionally fine" landing.

Champion, born September 20, 1896, has been flying only five years, but he has put in more than 1,000 hours in the air in all types of craft. Graduating at the Naval Academy in 1919, he served aboard the U. S. S. Michigan and Olympic in the Mediterranean, and then with the destroyer squadrons and the scouting fleet before taking the aviation course at Pensacola.

In the air meet at Philadelphia last September he won the speed and efficiency race and both the speed and the efficiency tests in the transport race. He also established the world altitude record of 33,445 feet for single-seat fighting seaplanes at Hampton Roads last May 5 in the same plane, converted to a land type, which he brought down under such perilous conditions July 25. He has been designated alternate pilot for the Navy in the

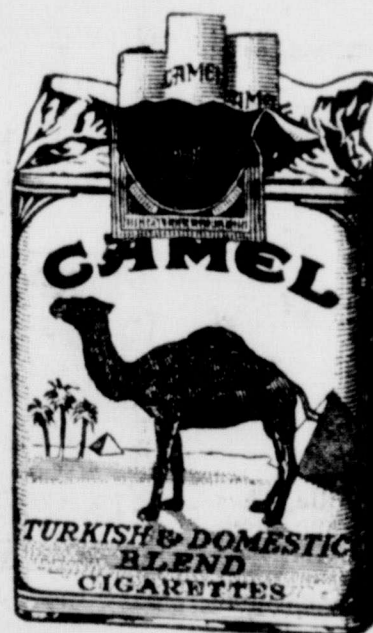

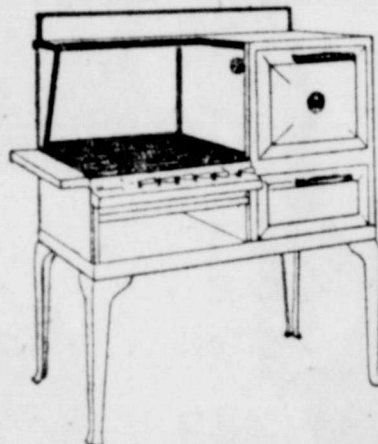
