## Chinese Tong Guns Ring Out In Cities

GANG METHODS USED IN CHICAGO; POLICE GUARD AREAS

CHICAGO, June 5.—Gang gunnery went Chinese last night. A group of celestials armed with pistols and a machine gun, swept through Chinatown, taking the territory in the neighborhood of Archer Avenue and Twenty-Second street. Their purpose, police learned, was to assassinate Frank Chin, but in this they failed.

Chin told police he was a representative of the Chin Oak Tin Tong, a national organization devoted, he said, to the interests of the Chinese in the Chicago gang manner.

Police questioned him at length to learn just what the interests of the Chinese family really are. This is believed to have been the first Chicago appearance of Chinese gunmen performing in the Chicago gang manner.

SEVEN SHOTS FIRED INTO HEADQUARTERS

BOSTON, June 5.—Seven shots were fired into the headquarters of Hip Sing Tong in Chinatown early today. No one was injured, but the police were rushed into the district to quiet hundreds of excited Chinese.

NEW YORK WAITER IS KILLED

NEW YORK, June 5.—A Chinese waiter was shot six times and killed today and police saw in the slaying a possible Tong war. The victim, Ha Gong, 25 years old, was killed by two men who had concealed themselves near the door of his furnished room in Allen street.

NEWARK, N. J., June 5.—Eng Sing, 28, a Chinese laundryman, was found slain today behind his shop with a hatchet buried in his skull.

Fliers Plan Flight Westward Over Ocean

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, June 5.—Captain Charles Kingsford Smith, his three associates today supervised installation of wireless batteries in their plane, the Southern Cross, before departure Friday or Saturday for Curragh, from where they will take off in an attempt to fly the Atlantic to New York.

These aviators plan a great circle route to Cape Race, thence down the coast to New York. The plane has a cruising radius of 38 hours, and it is estimated the projected trip will take 34 or 35 hours.

SOUCEK SOARS EIGHT MILES

NAVAL FLIER BELIEVED TO HAVE SET NEW ALTITUDE MARK

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Lieutenant Apollo Soucek, high-flying naval aviator, today availed word from the bureau of standards that he had set a new altitude record.

He soared nearly eight miles above the earth yesterday. His special altimeter recorded 42,000 feet, but his graduations were so fine that he could not tell whether he had exceeded the 42,000-foot record held by Will Neuenhofer, of Germany.

If the checking of his instruments proves he did not break the record Soucek plans to have another try at it soon, and he believes he can go even higher by using a wooden propeller instead of the metal type employed yesterday by increasing the pitch of the metal one.

He found that at the top of his flight the propeller "just fanned the air with no effect." The temperature in the cockpit was 38 degrees below zero and a thermometer attached to one of the wings recorded a temperature of 60 below.

MRS. MORROW CUTS POLITICAL WORK

SHORT TO BE WITH DAUGHTER, ANNE; INTERESTING EVENT IS ANTICIPATED

NEWARK, N. J., June 5.—Mrs. Dwight W. Morrow has curtailed temporarily her activities in behalf of her husband's candidacy for the republican nomination to the United States senate in order that she may remain near her daughter, Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh.

Her decision is assumed to have been reached in anticipation of an interesting event in the Lindbergh family.

Making No Engagements

Morrow headquarters has announced that Mrs. Morrow is making no engagements which will take her far from the Morrow home in Englewood, N. J., and that it may be necessary for her to be with her daughter Anne for a week or ten days.

Colonel Lindbergh and his wife have been at the Morrow residence for some weeks, and the colonel recently arranged for hangar space for his airplane at the Newark airport, within easy accessibility of Englewood.

WEALTHY YOUTH IS FOUND IN COLORADO

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., June 5.—Discovered here where he was earning his living by selling newspapers, Peter Imhoff, 18, said to be a member of a wealthy Utah family, has refused to return voluntarily to his home.

Police said the youth, a senior in Utah academy, had been sought widely since his disappearance last October. Thousands of dollars, it was said, have been spent in the search.

Police Inspector L. B. Bruce notified Utah police after the youth was located. A telegraphic answer was received, asking if Imhoff would return if money was sent him by his father. Bruce said the young man refused the offer.

### TEXAN FLAYS PRESS VIEWS ON DECISION

BUYING IS ENCOURAGED BY RULING, HE DECLARES

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 5.—Senator Sheppard called it "grotesque" today to consider liquor buyers innocent of law violation.

The Supreme Court has held them innocent under present law, and the Texas senator was advocating judiciary committee approval of his bill to make buyers as guilty as bootleggers.

Sheppard testified press comments on the Supreme Court decision "have been to the effect that purchasers could now feel a profound relief and proceed to buy intoxicating liquor with impunity."

"The whole structure of liquor lawlessness rests upon the buyer of illicit liquor," he continued. "Without him, traffic in illicit liquor could not persist."

Although the committee may act, there is little prospect of senate action on Sheppard's bill at this session.

Judiciary committee members who heard the Texas dry indicted Stewer of Oregon, Waterman of Colorado and Ashurst of Arizona.

Waterman commented "there is no possibility of any question of constitutional power to prohibit the purchase of liquor. The only thing is whether congress should legislate it."

Ashurst observed he could not see how the wets could get any satisfaction from the Supreme Court.

"The only way any one could make a purchase with impunity, under it," he added, "would be to sit in an office and have some one else buy liquor for him."

"Even then," return Sheppard, "the purchaser would possess it."

"The liquor gangs of the great cities are as truly maintained by the buyer of illicit liquor as was any gang of braves in the pay of a medieval robber baron," said Sheppard.

## PRUITT TO DIE FRIDAY

SETS AIR RECORD

CLEMENCY IS DENIED YOUNG DALLAS MAN

HUNTSVILLE, June 5.—William "Dagger" Pruitt will die before another sun at the hands of "the law," whose compulsion his youthful bravado used to deny.

In the early morning darkness tomorrow a small procession, like many another, will move along a narrow walk in the "back yard" of the state prison here. It will end, as they all end, at a squat stone chamber whose only furnishing is an electric chair with spindly, reaching arms. There Pruitt will be executed because he killed William Mann, a 17-year-old Dallas high school boy.

"Dagger" waited today as he must, while the sun was shining outside, and in his particular cubicle in death row he preserved a quiet stoicism. If the way he was "taking it" was remarkable at all, it was remarkable because of his youth—22 years is young to die. He had hoped for clemency, but none, he knew, was coming, and he was "ready to go."

His mother was coming today to see him; his routine was all the same. Breakfast in silence; lunch in silence; dinner tonight—that "last dinner" where the state gives a man whatever he wants, "even to chicken"—probably in silence, too.

Pruitt has been here in his cubicle for a bit more than a month. One man he has seen precede him in the early morning procession.

"Dagger" Pruitt has been a "quiet prisoner" here, but two years ago in Dallas he was a different boy. There the police called him "the one man crime wave," and they arrested him only after storming a house where he had barricaded himself and had loosed a pistol upon them.

REPORTED GOLD AND SILVER DEPOSIT LURING PROSPECTORS TO SECTION IN CANADA; YUKON VETERAN DISCOVERER

WRANGELL, Alaska, June 5.—Lured by the discovery of a body or ore believed to contain copper, gold and silver, with \$60 a ton, prospectors are rushing to the Cassiar district, 100 miles up the Stikine river, northeast of here in northern British Columbia.

The discovery was made by George Drapich, old time Yukon miner, on the eastern bank of the stream near the village of Glenora. Early arrivals in the district have already staked 32 claims, while a large number of miners will leave here on the next boat.

One of the veins is about 30 feet wide, reports received here said. Samples brought down by Drapich ran \$49.44 in copper, \$3.20 in gold and indicated a silver content of 1.5 per cent.

NATURE PLAYS TRICK ON DEATH VALLEY MYRIAD BLOSSOMS APPEAR IN ARID AREA

BEATTY, Nevada, June 5.—Death Valley, forbidding, mysterious desert, whose scalding heat usually is an effective barrier against entrance of summer visitors, has been transformed by a prank of nature into a brilliant area of flowers.

Back in covered wagon days, in 1850, a party of emigrants, California bound, perished from thirst in the arid waste. The valley, 150 miles long and from 10 to 35 miles wide, received its name from the incident.

So extreme is the heat during most summers that even the lizards and horned toads, extinct reptile life from October until the middle of May, mysteriously depart for other habitations.

In 1925 less than half an inch of rain fell in the Death Valley, which is the lowest dry land in the western hemisphere. This year, however, Dame Nature, digging deep in her bag of tricks, brought about a complete reversal of the usual order of things.

For nineteen consecutive days in May fresh showers fell on the parched desert sands. Myriad varieties of seeds which apparently had lain dormant for many years, suddenly burst into bloom

FLOYDADA, June 5.—Floydada has a market for mules according to Robert Medlin, agent of the Quana, Acme and Pacific railroad. During the past year some 100 mules have been shipped from Floydada, mostly to Fort Worth markets for resale.

Two men are engaged in buying mules and horses. Besides mules, cattle, hogs and sheep are shipped from Floydada. Cattle shipments the past year have amounted to around 125 car loads, with slightly more than that number of hogs. Thirty-five loads of sheep also were shipped.

## GIRL IDENTIFIED AS "DEATH LILY"

CHICAGO, June 5. (P)—Margaret Hamilton, alias Mary Collins, 24, under investigation here in connection with operations of a huge jewel theft ring in New York, was identified today as the "Death Lily", the girl who is said to have been the sweetheart of five notorious gangsters shot to death in the past few years.

The identification was made by police who had given her the sobriquet because of the successive demise of her gangland admirers, when she was arraigned today on another charge, involving theft of a quantity of goods from a Cincinnati department store.

Listed among her admirers, according to police, were Dion O'Banion, who died among the flowers of his North Side shop; Irving (Sonny) Schlegel; "Dandy" John Sheer; Johnny Phillips and "Jew" Bates, all former princelings of the underworld and all sent to their graves by gangster bullets.

### NORTH CAROLINIAN SAYS STATEMENT ABOUT HIM WRONG

RALEIGH, N. C., June 5.—Josephus Daniels, Raleigh publisher and former secretary of the navy, made public today a letter which he addressed to United States Senator Thomas J. Walsh, member of the senate lobby committee, protesting a statement of Bishop James Cannon, jr., before the committee.

Mr. Daniels' letter to Senator Walsh follows:  
"The papers state that in his testimony before your committee yesterday, Bishop Cannon read a report from the temperance committee of the general conference of the Methodist church at Dallas which he explained was submitted by its chairman, Hon. Josephus Daniels."

"Nobody knows better than Bishop Cannon that in the committee on temperance I opposed the endorsement of that portion of the report approving his actions before it was reported to the conference. When the report was presented by me as chairman of the committee to the general conference I stated to the conference that I strongly disapproved from a portion of the report and it was well known that my dissent was mainly to Bishop Cannon's action."

## TOBACCO SAID TO CAUSE CANCER

HARRISBURGH, Pa., June 5. (AP)—Protracted use of tobacco was called the principal though remote cause of mouth cancer at a meeting today of the Dauphin county medical society.

It also was said that tobacco may be rid of much of its danger by cleanliness of the mouth. "There is no question," said Dr. Joseph Colt Bloodgood of Johns Hopkins, "that the most common cause of cancer of the mouth today is the long continued use of tobacco. The second is ragged, dirty teeth. Cancer of the mouth must have been very rare before the discovery of tobacco in America."

"It is since the discovery of tobacco that we have learned that some barbarous tribes in Africa have cancer of the mouth following the chewing of beetle nuts. It was the smoking of the short pipe in Ireland that first called attention to cancer of the mouth and lip. We have no evidence, now that we are recent experience, that it makes much difference whether it is pipe, cigarettes, cigars, chewing tobacco or snuff, or betel nuts. Apparently it is the irritation that is the chief cause."

## Amarillo Men Are In Ice Squabble

AMARILLO, June 5. (AP)—Federal Judge James C. Wilson Wednesday ordered three Amarillo business men to appear in federal court to show why a preliminary injunction should not be granted the Dry Ice corporation of Delaware restraining them from using the trademark, dry ice in the manufacture of a new type of ice.

The three, Joseph S. Belt, A. J. Kelly and Edward M. Ladd, received citations to appear in federal court at Fort Worth July 7.

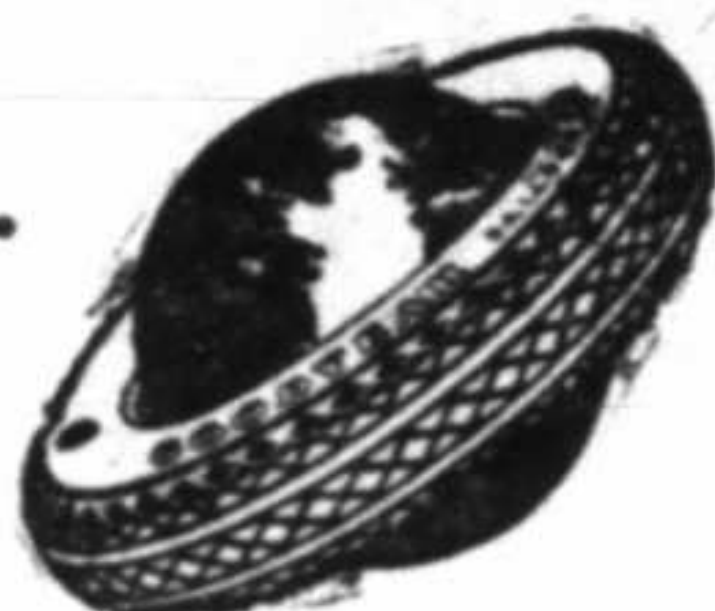

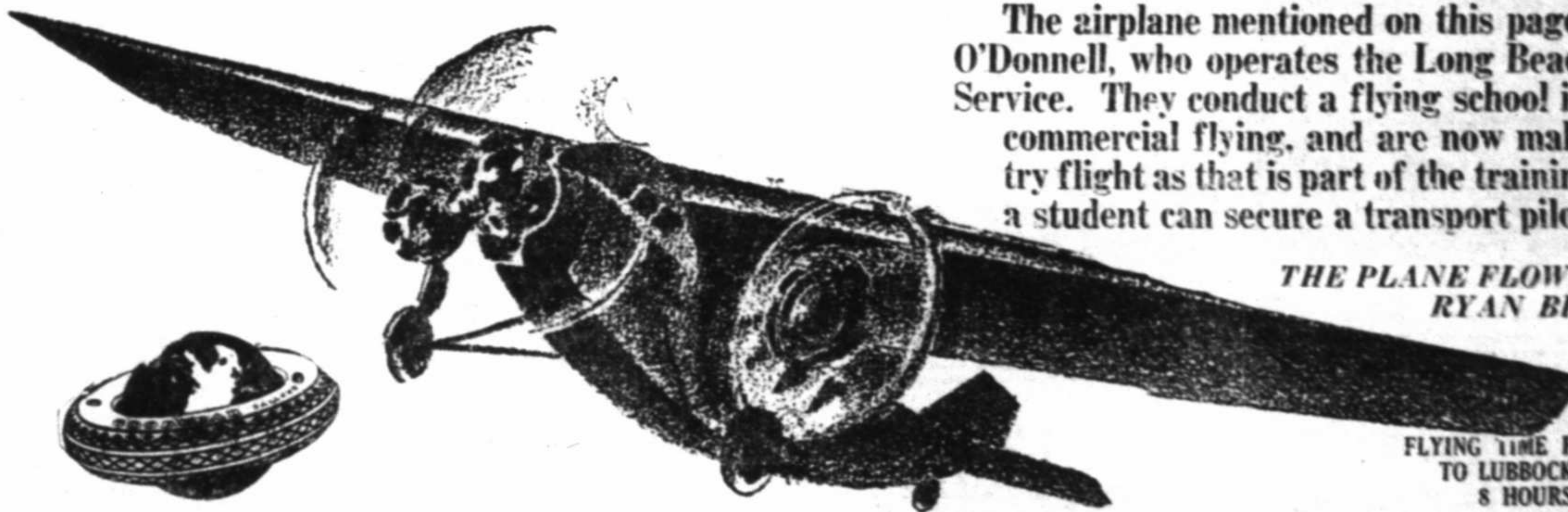

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, June 5.—Governor Moody named a committee of Texans to investigate the feasibility of Texas providing a building and exhibit for the Chicago world's fair in 1933. He said he was creating the committee at request of a delegation of Chicago business men.

The committee: A. M. Watson, J. Kennedy and John W. Carter of Dallas; Tucker Royall of Austin; C. M. Caldwell of Abilene; George Sealy and L. W. Reed of Galveston; W. J. Neale, E. S. Jones and W. V. Crawford of El Paso; Edward Kayser, George B. B. and H. L. B. B. of El Paso; Marston, John C. Griffith and J. H. Beck, of Fort Worth; H. A. W. W. Young, and J. K. K. of San Antonio; A. D. Brown, W. P. Hobby and John A. B. of Houston; and W. C. B. J. Lindsay Nunn and Ross of Amarillo.

The governor named Crawford temporary chairman, and requested the committee to communicate with the businessmen and arrange an initial meeting.

## INSURANCE BOARD ATTACKED IN SUIT

AUSTIN, June 5.—Right of Texas board of insurance commissioners to prescribe forms of insurance policies of title companies to fix the premium rates was attacked Wednesday in a suit filed in federal court by the New York Life and Mortgage company of New York City and Dallas.

The plaintiffs seek an injunction against W. A. Farver, W. Dewese and W. B. Pope, state insurance commissioners. Attorneys said they expected a hearing the latter part of June.

In prescribing forms and fixing premium rates, the insurance commission assumed legislative powers which the legislature did not have the right to confer, the plaintiffs claimed. It was contended title insurance did not affect the public interest at large and was not subject to regulation. It also alleged restraint of trade and claimed such regulation prevented buyers of title insurance policies from obtaining better and premium rates in open competition.

## New Service For Freight Announced

DALLAS, June 5.—Organization of a new transportation company to supplement the freight service of the M-K-T railroad company Texas has been announced at a general office of the railroad.

The new concern will engage in

freight, express pick-up and delivery service in Texas, expanding as conditions may require. Existing agencies will be utilized rather than setting up of new facilities.

## Floydada Compress Worked 8,000 Bales

(By Staff Correspondent)

FLOYDADA, June 5.—Eight thousand bales of cotton were handled by the Floydada Compress and Warehouse company during the 1929 season, Manager Underwood, announced.

Drouth caused the reduction in cotton production. In previous years the cotton ran as high as 25,000 bales.

Approximately 100 bales of cotton are now on hand at the compress. In addition to the 8,000 bales, the compress handled considerable cotton for other towns. No record was kept of the amount of these towns, it was explained.

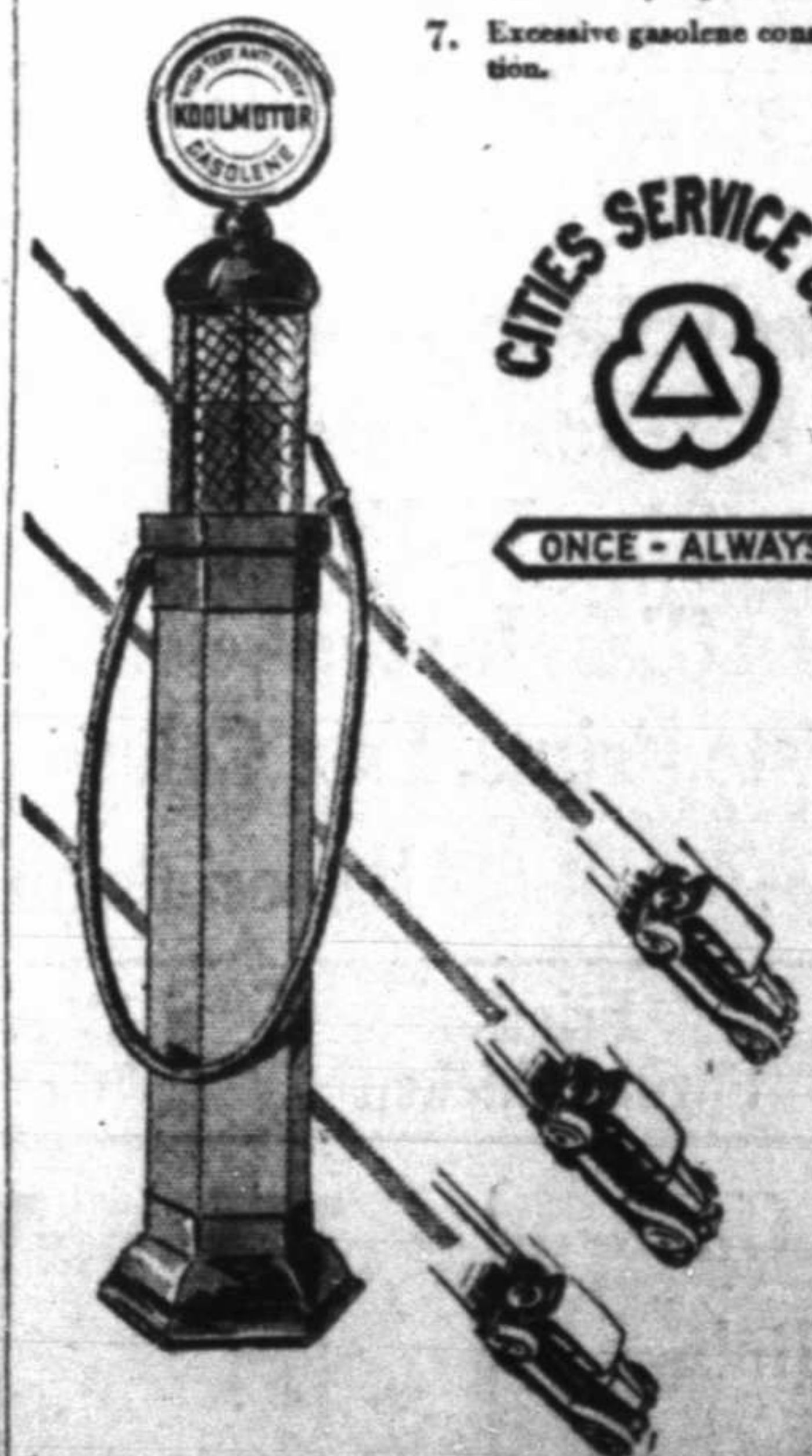

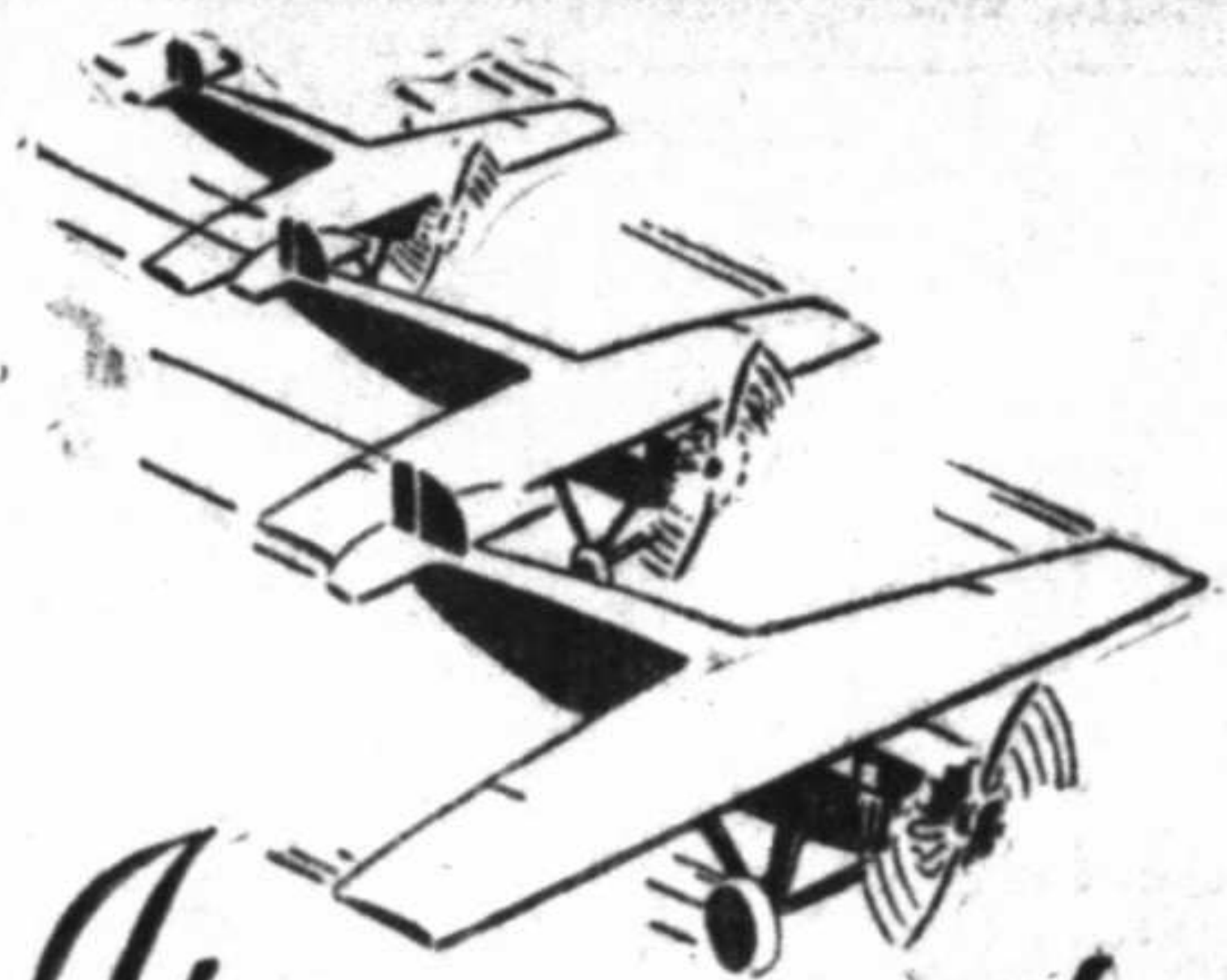

### Tourists

You get something of a conception  
of the extent to which the American  
people go touring about in their  
autos every summer when you  
learn that the hot dog and soft  
drink stands along the roadside do a  
total business of around \$500,000,000  
a year.

This figure is furnished by Dr.  
Julius Klein, assistant secretary of  
commerce. He finds that there are  
now between 110,000 and 125,000  
roadside stands; that more than  
half of them remain open all the year  
around and that new ones are being  
added at the rate of 3000 a year.

Half a billion dollars is a sizable  
turnover for any business. The hot  
dog stand is pushing its way up into  
the rank of major industries. Some  
organizing genius probably will come  
along presently and loop a few  
thousand of these establishments in-  
to one vast, coast-to-coast chain;  
meanwhile the industry, unique in  
a land of great mergers, is composed  
of innumerable small, one-man  
concerns—a new field for individualism  
in the business world.

It isn't the size of this business  
that is interesting, however so much  
it is the meaning back of it. The  
number of tourists must be simply  
stupendous for the hot dog and pop  
sales to rise to half a billion dollars.  
That sales figure reflects a spread  
of the vacation habit greater than  
anything the world has ever known  
before.

The surface of the earth has been  
pretty well furrowed in the course  
of history by the migration of its  
peoples, but was there ever anything  
like this annual migration of Ameri-  
cans and Canadians? Millions of  
men, women and children go roving  
every summer. They make the wander-  
ings of the romantic Greeks look  
puny. They cover a whole contin-  
ent.

Dwellers in the interior go spin-  
ning off to see what the oceans  
look like, coast folk swing over to  
the mountains and have a look at the  
midlands. Mountains and lakes and  
rivers and sea beaches and deserts  
slide under the wheels of a million  
cars, and provincialism goes out of  
existence under a million sets of  
rubber tires. The whole nation  
shuffles itself each year, and Mr.  
Average Citizen, perched behind his  
steering wheel, does more traveling  
in one month than his ancestors did  
in all their lives—and does it in  
comparably greater comfort.

And—just to set the picture in its  
real proportions—the incidental food  
and drink bill of their roving tour-  
ists comes to a half billion dollars.  
There never was anything remotely  
like it before. Its ultimate effects  
can hardly be estimated, but you  
may be sure they will be profound.  
The American spirit, 50 years hence,  
will be infinitely the richer because  
of this background of wandering.

### The Tariff

It is not often that you find the  
voice of Wall Street raised in favor  
of lower tariff duties. But the cur-  
rent issue of the Magazine of Wall  
Street presents an editorial which  
is as sharply critical of the pending  
tariff bill as anything that Senator  
Moore "sons of wild jackasses"  
have ever said.

The editorial begins by asserting  
that a policy of protection was  
needed by this country throughout  
the early part of its existence, but  
it adds that times have changed so  
that protection is not the boon it  
once was.

"We have had free trade on a con-  
tinental scale, despite the tariff  
barrier at the boundaries," says the  
magazine. "Now we require, not free  
trade, but greater freedom of trade  
abroad. The policy that was good  
for 100 years will be a handicap in  
the future."

The new tariff law will be re-  
corded later as an act of folly—ob-  
structive to foreign trade and con-  
trary to manifest destiny.

There may be some consolation in  
the fact that while the rural com-  
munity is declining in population  
bottles liquor is giving us an in-  
creasing number of holes.

While it is entirely possible that  
Mr. Blanton is doing a great deal for  
his district and his state, The  
Plainsman can't recall any great

the front pages with monotonous  
regularity, but when he does there's  
usually a big fuss mixed up in it  
somewhere.

In any line of work it is usu-  
ally the fellow who goes quietly  
along, minding his own affairs,  
who does the most and makes the  
outstanding success. Mr.  
Blanton must be popular in his  
district—he gets enough votes to  
indicate that he is—but whether  
he is doing anything construc-  
tive or not is a matter for re-  
flection.

**SPEAKING** of West Texas con-  
gressmen, Marvin Jones, of Am-  
arillo, who represents this district,  
is a fair example of a man who ac-  
complishes the maximum under dif-  
ficulties. He is the ranking demo-  
crat on the house agricultural com-  
mittee and his answers to con-  
stituents are prompt and pleasing.

Marvin Jones rarely makes the  
front pages—he's not the type to  
kick over the rostrum and howl his  
way to public attention. On the other  
hand he is a detail worker who  
would be a second Martin Madden  
were he representing a district in  
the more heavily populated and re-  
publican section of the United  
States.

To be downright frank about  
it, a Texas democrat can't do a  
great deal in congress, either in  
the senate or in the house, as  
long as republican majorities  
rule the roost. Add to that dis-  
advantage coming from West  
Texas and a solon is sure enough  
handicapped. It is against the  
law for West Texas to be given  
anything much politically—either  
in state or national politics,  
unless it is something that is  
impossible to stop.

see how quick he'll take you up.

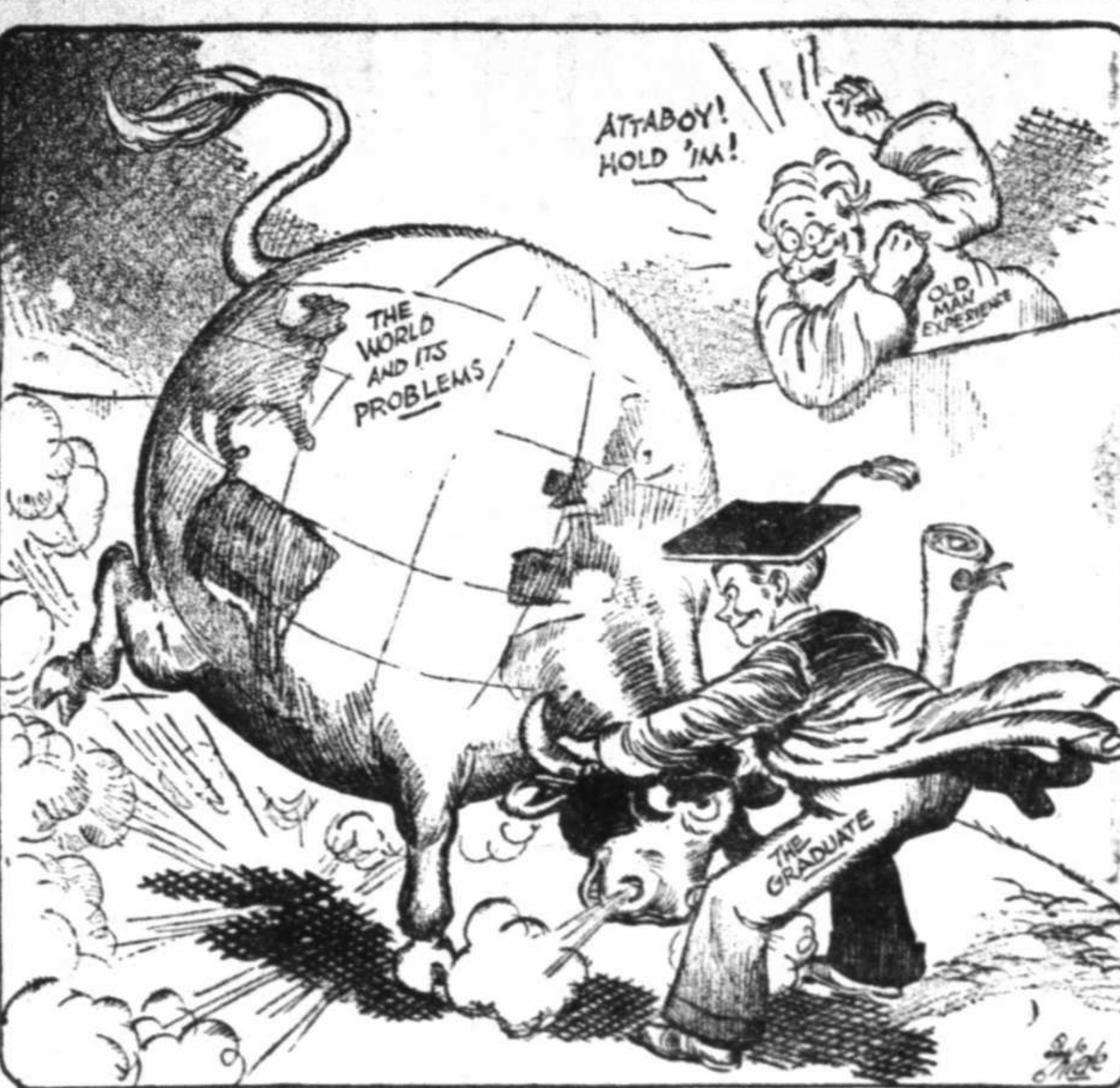
Incidentally, the Dean family

### Now That Canada's Reply To New U. S. Tariff Law Starts Hurting Our Pocketbooks Washington Plans Better Study

WASHINGTON, June 5.—It used  
to be small Latin-American coun-  
tries that Uncle Sam was accused  
of bullying. Now there seems to  
be a plea of growing volume that  
we be a little  
more considerate  
in our treatment  
of neighboring  
Canada.

There is plenty  
of testimony to  
the effect that  
Canadians have  
been more or less  
irritated for  
some time by  
American "ar-  
rogance." But  
Canadians with  
whom this writer  
has talked have  
taken the rates  
of the Hawley-  
Smoot tariff bill  
far more seriously  
than the minor irritations previously  
accumulated.

Worst of all Canada decided to  
take a whack back at us. Probably  
that has had more than anything  
else to do with the growth of op-  
inion among us that we ought to be  
nicer to Canada. One seldom ignores  
a sock at one's pocketbook.

So Canada Passed a Law  
Both countries were able to strike  
at each other and when it ap-  
peared that our lawmakers in devising  
the new tariff law were going to  
disregard the fact that Canada is  
our biggest export customer the Can-  
adians revised their own tariff  
rates in such manner that the De-  
partment of Commerce estimates  
25 per cent of our Canadian exports  
would suffer adversely.

We have been exporting more  
than \$800,000,000 in goods to Canada  
yearly. We have been buying less  
than \$500,000,000 worth from her.  
Lately our exports have been di-  
minishing; the figures showed a 25  
per cent decrease in our exports  
across the border for March as com-  
pared with March, 1929. And that  
was before the Canadian finance  
minister announced his tariff  
changes—which our commercial at-  
taches in Ottawa reported would ef-  
fect American exports amounting to  
from \$125,000,000 to \$225,000,000 a  
year as well as put British exports  
to Canada on a much stronger base  
of competition.

One widely circulated expert esti-  
mate is that the Hawley-Smoot  
tariff would reduce Canadian sales  
to the United States by about \$80-  
90,000,000 a year, whereas the Cana-  
dian government's new rates will cur-  
tail our exports to Canada by about  
\$110,000,000. There must also be taken  
into consideration the general  
effect of increasing preferences  
granted by Canada to imports from  
Great Britain.

Mackenzie King, the present Can-  
adian premier, has a record of  
friendliness to the United States.  
Political factions have often attack-  
ed him on that ground. But al-  
though the King's government re-  
cently put through the House of  
Commons a measure banning liquor  
exportation to the United States, it  
was in no mood to take the Hawley-  
Smoot tariff without refigitation.

One Canadian viewpoint, which  
may or may not be common, is ex-  
pressed by an experienced Canadian  
writer named Leslie Roberts in the  
current issue of Harper's Magazine.  
"If you have lived beside a fel-  
low grown paunchy with wealth,  
and have endured countless irrita-  
tions and pin-pricks which come  
from being patronized or hav-  
ing your liberties trespassed upon,  
you will not find it difficult to un-  
derstand the feeling which is grow-  
ing in Canada against the United  
States," Roberts writes.

banks are opened and a huge daily

The technical  
name for cold  
sores is herpes  
facialis. Herpes  
is an inflama-  
tory skin disease  
characterized by the formation of  
small vesicles (blisters) in clusters.

According to the location, there  
are different types of herpes, herpes  
facialis (on the face), herpes labialis  
(on the lips), herpes zoster, or shin-  
gles (water measles), forming  
part of a girdle around the body, fol-  
lowing the cutaneous nerves.

Herpes facialis and labialis, accom-  
panied with a cold, are known as  
cold sores. When they come with  
fevers they are known as fever blis-  
ters. They seem to recur frequently  
in some and there is no doubt a  
reason for this, connected with the

coholic beverages to the United  
States. American legislators in  
Washington are engaged in banning  
the importation of Canadian maple  
products to please the farmers of  
New Hampshire and Vermont."

"Add to such major items as  
these the petty annoyance suffer-  
ing by Canadians at the hands of  
immigration officers, customs of-  
ficials, state policemen, border pa-  
trolmen, and humble traffic cops  
with the manners of longshoremen,  
and only one result can be looked  
for, a complete exasperation among  
Canadians, at the thoughtlessness  
and in-tolerance of the United  
States towards its northern neigh-  
bor."

If Roberts is correct President  
Hoover may have to consider mak-  
ing a good will tour through the Can-  
adian provinces.

NEW YORK, June 5.—In spite of

## DIVORCE LAW IS WORRY IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, June 5 (AP)—

union in legal circles here is that Supreme Court's decision against divorce law of the state of Mexico does not automatically annul all divorces granted under that law, although it lays them open to question.

Competent authorities hold that the Supreme Court's action of yesterday is a precedent, the annulment will be granted, they believe.

Since it is felt that the more than 2,000 who obtained divorces at Matamoros under the Mexican law, recent years, including several hundred Americans, are safe unless the parties to the divorces sue for annulment.

The Supreme Court's decision, issued in connection with the grant of a divorce to Mrs. Clara Salas de Moran of a divorce filed her husband at Cuernavaca today that the fourth civil court of Mexico City on May 1 granted a revocation of a similar divorce to a woman whose husband obtained a divorce after a marriage of 26 days.

It both cases it was held that the complainant had a just cause for annulment on the grounds that the law was invalid, and it is considered probable a similar decision will be given in any future case.

## Dallas Field Will Get Weather Station

DALLAS, June 5 (AP)—Opening July 1 of an aerological station at Love field here, to serve as a weather guide to aviators over the entire southwest, was announced Wednesday by Dr. J. L. Cline, United States weather observer.

Six additional weather bureau men are expected to be detailed here.

Hourly weather reports will be sent out by radio and teletype to pilots in their planes and observers in stations along air lanes in this section of the country.

a distance the giant death bowl, usually an arid waste of scorched and sand, appears as a thick purple carpet.

Bright yellow is added to the varied hues by splashes of dandelions, hedge mustard and dog daisy.

Nature has painted a gorgeous masterpiece in the desert, those who have seen the flowers agree, but the rays of the sun probably will shrivel and obliterate the colorful spectacle soon.

## THWARTING OF NAVAL DEBATE IS RUMORED

### GROUP SAID TO BE IN OPPOSITION TO LEADERS

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, June 5.—Two rumors of efforts to upset the plans of senate leaders for debating the London naval treaty at a special session gained circulation today on Capitol Hill.

The first of these attributed to the young republican faction a move to bring the pact to a vote before adjournment of the present session. The second laid to the opponents of the treaty an endeavor to have the senate recess rather than adjourn a technical session which would prevent President Hoover from calling the extra-ordinary session.

### To Seek Vote

Leaders of all factions of the senate, except the young republicans, entered into the agreement to consider the pact at the special session. Word that they would seek a vote on the treaty before adjournment spread after Senators Vandenberg of Michigan and Allen of Kansas had discussed the situation with President Hoover.

Their calls at the White House followed that of Republican Leader Watson and Senator Moses of New Hampshire, the president pro tem of the senate, who informed Mr. Hoover of a general desire among their colleagues to get away from Washington for the summer and the coming campaign, as quickly as possible. They suggested the treaty be deferred until next winter, but such a course was opposed by the chief executive.

SHREVEPORT, La., June 5.—(AP)—A proposed journey of Charles Dannehy and Tom Gillespie, 11-year-old boys, who showed off from the boat landing on the Big Cypress river at Jefferson, Texas, in a 16-foot boat with the avowed intention of making their way down the Red and Mississippi rivers to New Orleans, where they expected to work their way on a boat to the Panama Canal zone, was interrupted here when relatives of Gillespie, coming overland, overtook the boys and informed them that Gillespie's father had died. The boys were found asleep in their boat, tied up at a bend in the river just north of Shreveport.

Instead of continuing their trip down the river, the boys were hurried back to Jefferson by auto.

## KEY PIECE OF LEGISLATION UP IN SENATE

CHANGE IN TRIAL OF  
PRO CASES RESULT  
IF MOVE MADE

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, June 5.—The key piece of legislation in the Hoover law enforcement commission's program for increasing the effectiveness of the prohibition statutes today bore the approval of the house and awaited the action of the senate.

This was the much disputed measure to permit United States commissioners to handle minor violations of the dry laws without a jury trial. It was passed by the house yesterday after a heated debate. Three other measures connected with it were approved by the house on Tuesday.

Amending Law Code  
This group, pending the Jones law and the United States code would define and fix maximum penalties for misdemeanors and authorize an accused person to waive his constitutional right of trial by jury. These, too, aroused a bitter controversy.

The fourth bill was attacked by the wet bloc and by some dry members as unconstitutional and involving an undesirable change in judicial procedure. They attempted to send it back to conference but failed by a vote of 225 to 137. It was approved 218 to 117, with many dry democrats joining administration republicans in voting for its passage.

The bill was amended from the floor to authorize commissioners to handle petty offenses against the federal statutes, not only the prohibition laws, to permit a defendant to appeal for a jury trial or a judge, and to fix a limit upon the amount in fees that a commissioner could collect for pleas of not guilty.

## TO ATTEMPT WORLD-GIRDLING HOP

(By Associated Press)  
ALEXANDRIA, La., June 5.—Patrol guards and levee laborers engineers today had the Red river flood in check for the time at least and hoped that the victory might be permanent.

Some anxiety, however, prevails about the levee at Barbin's landing near Marksville, on the lower Red river, twelve miles above Moncay Ferry. The tanks at that point began to cave yesterday, and efforts were directed toward the construction of a "run-around" levee.

Conditions encouraging the levee workers were the fact that Ebb and Benruth Cross levees in Avoyelles parish have been reported in good shape.

At the same time the levee at Vicks on the north side of the river near Moncay, was regarded as weak. If the dyke broke there, it would be a repetition of a catastrophe that occurred in 1927. A large farming community would be endangered.

Residents of the Red river valley many of whom have been stricken severely by the flood, awaited the announced visit next week of Congressman Frank R. Reid, chairman of the house flood committee.
