Rivercrest Takes District Opener From Ore City

The Rivercrest Rebels, seeking their third consecutive district championship, made a big lunge forward as they conquered the Ore City Rebels Friday night. The Rivercrest Rebels forced Ore City into several costly turnovers which turned into Rivercrest touchdowns. Ore City made several desperate attempts to defeat the Rebels from RHS, but failed and went down in defeat 21-15.

On their first possession Rivercrest failed to gain needed yardage to keep control of the ball and was forced to punt. James Strickland punted the ball to the Ore City 20 yard line and Ore City began their offense. On the first three plays Ore City gained 29 yards but Rivercrest tightened up and forced the Ore City quarterback to fumble. Bobby Thompson came up with the ball for Rivercrest.

Operating from the Ore City 48, the Rebels inched forward, but came up with a fourth down and 2 yards on the 42 yard line. The offense decided to go for it and not only made the first down, but Strickland passed to Billy Froelich who caught the ball, shook off a host of Ore City tacklers, and went in for the score. Paul Froelich kicked the extra point. Neither Rebel team scored again the first quarter and the Rebels from Rivercrest led 7-0.

The second quarter opened up with Rivercrest controlling the ball. The offense failed to convert a first down and Strickland put off a punt that set Ore City on their own six yard line. Ore City tried to pass their way down field, but Stan Wood intercepted an Ore City pass and returned it to the five yard line. A clipping penalty forced the Rebels from Rivercrest to retreat to the 20 yard line, but the Rebel backs went to work to gain the lost yardage. Billy and Paul Froelich alternated carries before Billy, following Paul's blocking, went in from the four. Paul connected with the point after and Rivercrest led 14-0.

With 4:50 seconds left in the half, Ore City received the kickoff and set up their offense at their own 34. Jimmy Smith and Brian Harville stood out for the Rebel defense which desperately worked to keep Ore City from scoring. Ore City inched closer and closer with each carry until they had a first down on the Rivercrest four yard line. The black and gold Rebels gained two yards on the next carry as the Rivercrest defense closed in. Rivercrest kept Ore City out of the end zone on two more carries, but on fourth and one Ore City pushed through with 8 seconds left in the half. With extra point the score stood 14 for RHS and 7 for Ore City at halftime.

The third quarter was a defensive battle as neither team entered their opponent's territory. To start off the fourth quarter Ore City, feeling pressured to score, put the ball in the air. The Rivercrest secondary held their own and gave Ore City nothing. Ore City ventured to the RHS 44, but was stopped abruptly when Wood intercepted another pass and returned it to the opponents seven yard line. On the first play Billy

Froelich scored again and the point after was good giving RHS a 31-7 lead.

Ore City scored one more time, but Rivercrest did their best to stop them. Starting from their own 31, the black and gold Rebels used their total offense as they alternated running and passing. Ore City found themselves with a first down on the eleven yard line. On the next play Strickland, Paul Froelich, and Dudley Horton caught an offender after he had gained five yards. Then Wood caught an Ore City Rebel behind the line for a loss of seven. On third down Ore City attempted a pass which Paul Froelich slapped away. With a fourth down and 13, Ore City tried to pass, but Bubba Edge defended ably for Rivercrest as the attempt was incomplete. However, a

holding penalty against Rivercrest allowed Ore City another chance. This time the Ore City quarterback found a receiver open in the middle who went in to score for Ore City. The black and gold then set up for their extra point kick, but the holder kept the ball and rolled around to the right. Strickland and Wood read the play and the Ore City player was forced out of bounds, but an offside penalty gave Ore City another chance. Ore City was held again but another offside penalty gave them one more chance. On their third attempt they went in for two points and the score read 21 for Rivercrest and 15 for Ore City.

Rivercrest started their next offensive drive from their own 47 and drove to the Ore City 36 before giving Ore

City possession on downs. Rivercrest was determined to hold Ore City as the defense held tight and Ore City found themselves with fourth down and 21 yards to go. Ore City tried a long pass, but Bradley Moore intercepted and RHS took possession on the opponents 21. RHS then let the clock run out and took an important victory over Ore City by a score of 21-15.

Next week the Rebels from Rivercrest will meet Harmony at 7:30 p.m. at the Rebel stadium for the Rebel's Homecoming.

Students for the month of Sept. are Damon Ward and Judy Via.

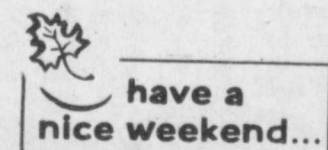
The Student Council officers forum will be held in Linden Tx. on Oct. 15.

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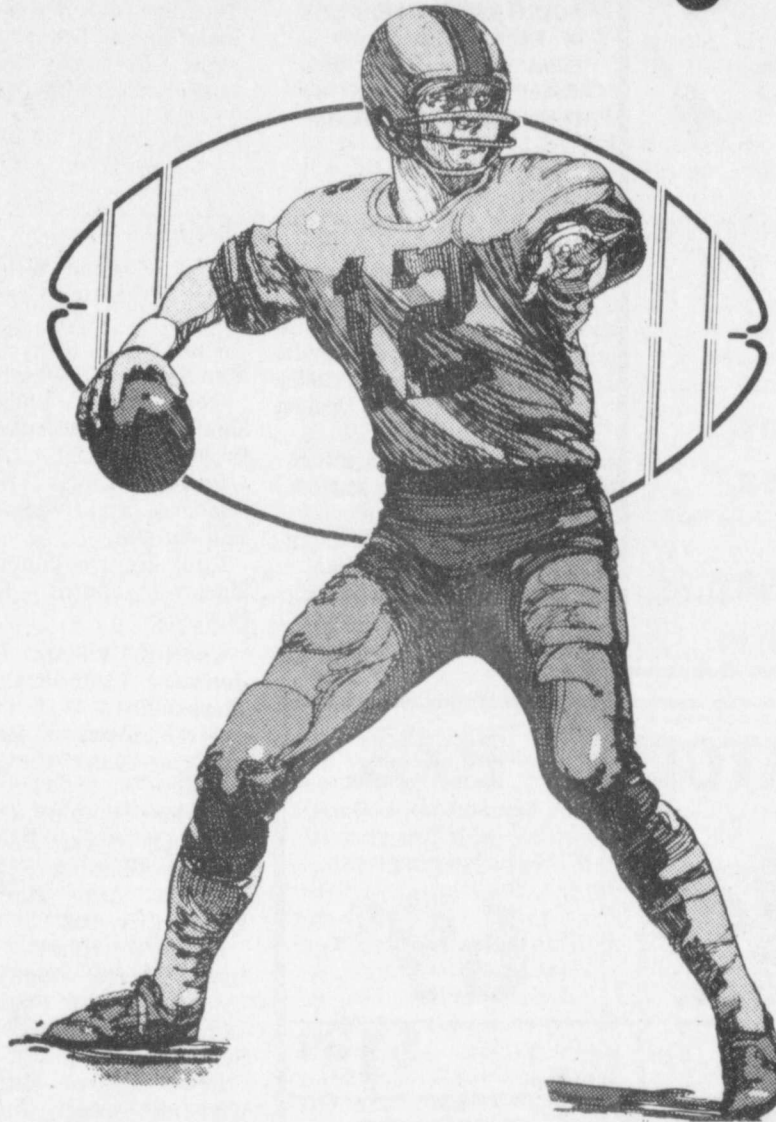

Hall Opposes Zip Code Expansion

An announcement plan by the U. S. Postal Service to expand the zip codes system to nine digits is being opposed by First District Congressman Sam. B. Hall, Jr.

Representative Hall said that he and other Members of Congress are writing Postmaster General William Bolger to urge a delay in implementing the ZIP code expansion until the Postal Service has fully explored the economics and social impact of its proposal.

"The proposed Zip code change needs more study and evaluation by the Postal Service and Congress, especially since the public is being told to accept it without benefit of strong citizen input," Mr. Hall said.

In the letter to the Postmaster General, Congressman Hall and his colleagues stated: "To date, there appears to have been little if any consideration by the Postal Service of the social impact of the plan, no real consideration of the cost to mailers, and no coordination with existing, pre-sort business mail programs.

"In addition, technical issues are still unresolved; there has been a failure in planning to distinguish between the need for more sophisticated machinery and the need for additional Zip digits; and there has been so study of alternatives, such as providing incentives to business mailers to imprint special bar-coding on billing and reply mail, a particularly glaring omission since the real target of the extra sorting number is large business mailers, not the public."

According to a recent report issued by the House Subcommittee on Governmental Information and Individual Rights, the Postal Service 9 digit zip would: Cost the Postal Service \$1 billion in new equipment; Cost business \$1 billion to convert mailing lists; In-

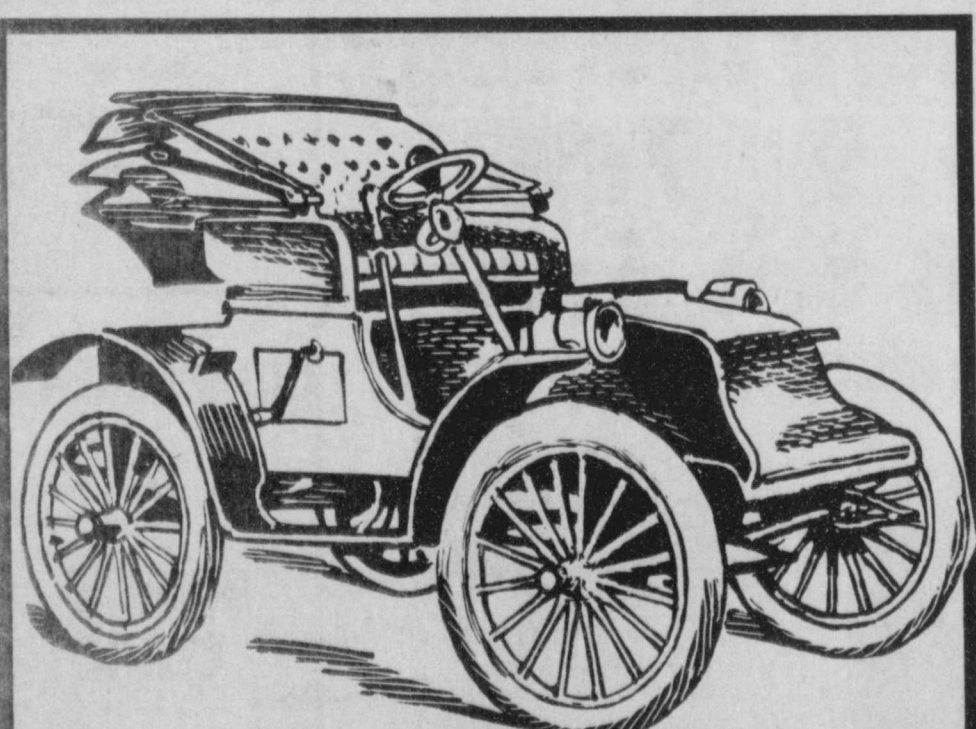

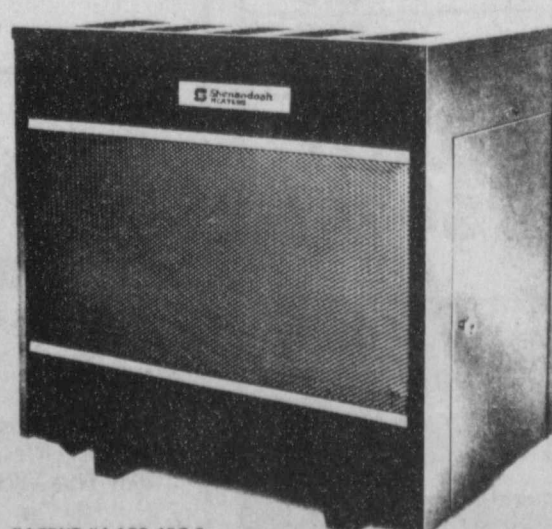

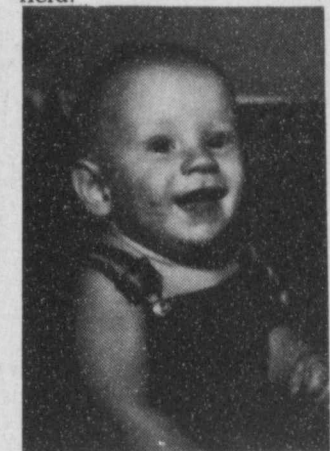

Brucellosis Vaccine Ages Extended

Two major changes in the Texas brucellosis control program are announced by John Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission.

"Beginning today, a reduced dose of Strain 19 vaccine will be available for all eligible cattle in Texas, and this will also mean a change in vaccination ages for those animals. We believe these developments will have a favorable impact on the Texas plan for brucellosis control," Armstrong said.

Brucellosis is a highly contagious disease of livestock, centering in the reproductive organs. It causes abortion, weakened calves, sterility, and a loss in milk production. In humans, the disease is known as undulant fever.

The changes are a significant victory for Texas' livestock producers, Armstrong said. "All nine members of the Texas Animal Health Commission as well as the entire staff of the TAHC worked for the past two years to get these improvements approved by the national brucellosis program officials. Commission members are also indebted to the livestock producers in this state who volunteered their time in developing the Texas plan," Armstrong explained.

The reduced dose is as effective as the large dose. Larger doses of Strain 19 have been blamed for causing some animals to be diagnosed as having brucellosis when, in fact, it was a reaction of the vaccine itself.

"This will help eliminate the confusion over levels of antibodies in the blood of the vaccinated animal," Armstrong explained. Some animals develop persisting residual blood titers after vaccination with the standard dose. Titers are measurements of antibodies resulting from vaccination or infection of brucellosis.

"Titers induced by the vaccination using the reduced dose are lower and recede more rapidly although the degree of immunity is not different from that produced by the higher dosage," Armstrong said.

Along with the reduced dosage will come a change in vaccination ages for eligible cattle. Previously, official calfhood vaccination ages were 3 to 6 months for dairy breeds and 3 to 10 months for beef breeds. With the reduced dosage, the vaccination ages are 4 to 12 months for all breeds, Armstrong said.

"This is another great advantage since cattle can be vaccinated up to 12 months of age with much less worry about false reaction to blood tests," he

said. Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, TAHC, said plans to implement the reduced dosage throughout the state are now in effect.

The state will provide funds for vaccination of eligible cattle. Armstrong and Holcombe urged all livestock producers to contact veterinarians in their area for details of the reduced dose vaccination program.

The vaccine must be administered by personnel approved by the Texas Animal Health Commission. The vaccine is fragile and must be handled under controlled conditions to establish a good immunity. Official ear tags and tattoos must be applied and official records kept and reported. There is some personal danger involved when untrained people handle brucellosis vaccine, Dr. Holcombe explained.

A 25-year study of vaccination for brucellosis in Texas concludes: a large portions of the cattle herds in Texas are susceptible to the introduction and spread of the disease because of the low percentage of vaccinated animals.

"We reached a peak of vaccination in the early 1960's, but since 1976 we have seen and increase in vaccinations," Dr. Holcombe said.

One of the goals of the Texas Animal Health Commission is to raise the immunity level in cattle so that 70 percent of the adult female population will have

been vaccinated. This is the level judged by experts to significantly reduce the disease.

"The implementation of the reduces Strain 19 is the most important step in the Texas plan for brucellosis control and eventual eradication," Armstrong said.

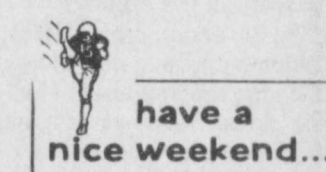

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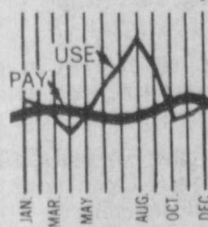

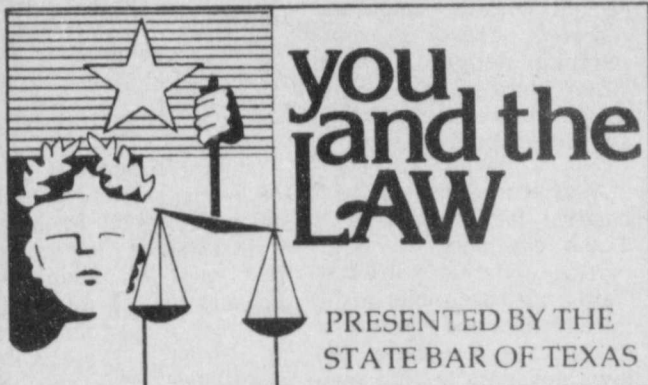

Q: My aunt has been sending store coupons to a non-profit organization in California that aids senior citizens. Is it against the law to send or use coupons in this manner?

A: If the non-profit organization is, in fact, distributing the store coupons to assist senior citizens' purchase of food or other items, without charging for the coupons, the practice is not fraudulent. To avoid fraud, the organization must disclose whether another "use" is being made of the coupons or whether a charge is imposed. Also, some coupons may require the purchase of other items to receive the coupon value, and some states prohibit this. However, on the facts you presented, your aunt is probably not participating in an illegal system.

Q: I signed a one-year lease on the apartment I rent. Now, six months later, the landlord has decided to sell his apartment. He demanded I leave now so he can make repairs before he sells. Can he force me to get out? I thought we had a one-year deal.

A: Your landlord may sell the apartment complex in which you rent. The new owner of the complex, however, will be bound by the lease you signed with your landlord. Read your lease to see whether the landlord reserved the right to evict you under certain circumstances. In the meantime, be sure you are in strict compliance with the lease, and be ready to move out at the end of the year.

Q: After 14 months we moved out of a house we were renting. We notified the owners well in advance and we left the house in good condition. Now we've been told that there

were some small repairs and that the house would be painted in preparation for sale. They said, "we might" get some of our money back. We were responsible only for any damages beyond normal wear and tear, but what is the interpretation of "wear and tear"?

A: The landlord may not use your security deposit to do all pre-sale repairs. Texas law does not allow security deposits to be withheld for normal wear and tear. That phrase has not been precisely defined and the courts must interpret when landlord and tenant cannot agree. Justices of the Peace typically hear these smaller lawsuits.

Q: My ex-husband has taken my son and refuses to return him. I know the child is also his, but in our divorce, I received total custody rights. I don't want my son to live with him. Can he be arrested for kidnapping his own son?

A: When a child has been taken from the managing conservator — that is, the person given custody of the child in the decree of divorce, the proper remedy is a writ of habeas corpus. If the other parent does not comply with the order of the court resulting from the habeas corpus proceeding, he may be sent to jail for contempt of court. If the child is taken out of state in violation of a court's custody order, the individual may be guilty of a third degree felony.

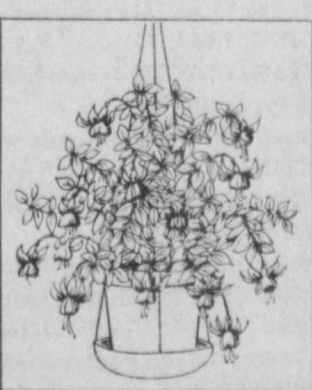
Fuchsias A Cool Temperature Plant

Fuchsias, commonly called Ladies' eardrops, are related to the Onagraceae family and originated in Haiti and Santo Domingo.

The free hanging flowers on flexible stems, resemble ladies' pendant earrings with bright red trumpets hanging from deep purple cups.

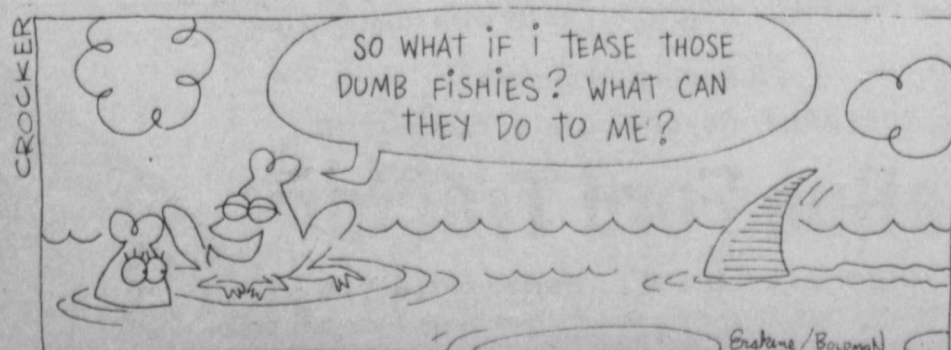
Unlike most house plants, fuchsias require cool, damp temperatures. Under proper conditions they will bloom throughout the year.

Pot in a mixture of three parts leaf mold to one part well rotted manure and sand. Place in a bright location with good air circulation. Cool temperatures of sixty five to seventy degrees during the day and fifty degrees at night are needed for real success in growing the plant. Humidity should be thirty five percent or more.



Fuchsias can be propagated by rooting soft cuttings in the spring or can be grown from seed.

Water frequently to keep the soil evenly moist and apply plant food often for continuous growth. Fuchsias attractive foliage and flowers are suitable for hanging baskets.

A Penchant for Pensions



Life, Bill Flynn, president of the then-National Health and Retirement Association.

Four post-retirement jobs were in the offering when Earl Helsel was forced in 1973, by company policy, to retire at age 65.

For one reason or another, Helsel, a resident of Morristown, New Jersey, did not take any of the four, but feared nonetheless that he would have to "stay home and tend the garden", a prospect he did not relish.

Now, however, the 72-year-old insurance man applies his experience to retirement planning for others.

It is not surprising that there were demands for Helsel's talents. He had, after all, been a senior vice president for Equitable Life Assurance Society.

"But", he told a writer from the National Council on the Aging, "I turned down those jobs," (including a bid to become Commissioner of Social Security), "because I did not want to leave the farm", his term for the wooded acreage he loves.

In 1974, however, Helsel, as Treasurer of the Morris Area Girl Scouts Council, was investigating a possible pension plan for the Council and ran into a former colleague from Equitable

The Scouts got a pension plan and Helsel got a job.

"At first", he says enthusiastically of his part time position, "we had so many projects that I worked four or five days a week". Now he commutes 30 miles to New York City just two days a week.

Switching from a large mutual life insurance company where his work focused on individual plans to a "non-profit for non-profits" pension association, administering group plans, was a change of pace, but according to Helsel, "a valuable one."

BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

Giving The Fireplace A New Look

Can a discolored brick fireplace be given a renewed look to add to the decorating scheme?

Brick fireplaces can be given a new look with a coat of paint.

The fireplace's size can be minimized by painting it the predominant color of the room or it can be made to stand out by choosing a contrasting color, say specialists with the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service.

Surface preparation prior to painting is extremely important. Remove loose ashes and soot and use a wire brush to scrape away dirt and loose particles.

If a white, salt-like material is present, wipe with a diluted acid solution. Remove smoke film and grease by applying detergent or soap suds with a scrub brush. Be sure the surface is completely dry before painting.

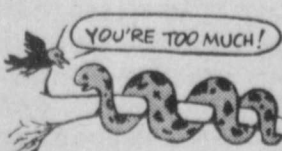
If the brick has never been painted, coat first with a masonry primer and let dry. Applying a filler to rough edges will create a smooth painting surface. Then apply a quality interior latex paint for best results.

I received a set of wooden bowls as a gift. The wood does not have a finished look. Can I use them as they are or do they need to be treated before using?

Wooden bowls and accessories such as spoons, ladles, forks, etc., should be treated to preserve the wood.

Apply a generous coat of mineral oil to the bowls, inside and out, and allow to penetrate the wood overnight.

Wipe off excess oil and repeat the same procedure several times. Mineral oil has no taste or odor and will season the new wood.

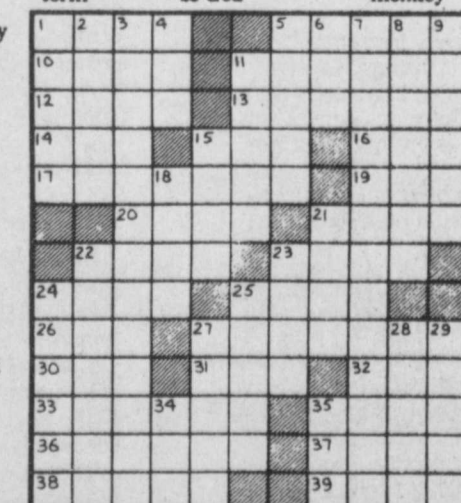

It was cold when folks got up back then, and harnessing up the four strongest mules to a bedder to plow up and cooten or corn stalks was a fall job each year.

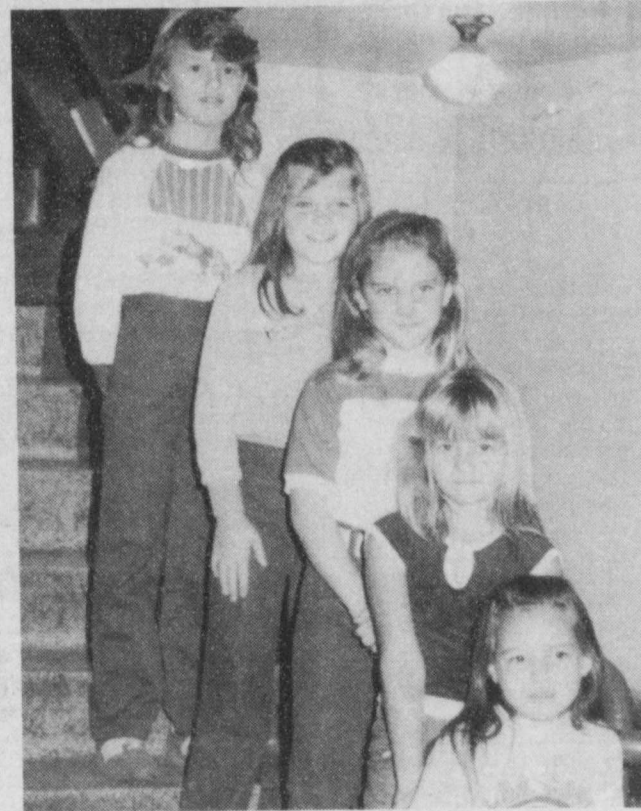
